Dungarvan Solicitor Tops In Yoplait International

A total of 140 anglers from England, Holland, U.S.A., Germany, France, Scotland, Wales, South Africa as well as from many parts of Ireland competed in the Yoplait 2-Day International Gold Medal Sea Angling Competition sponsored by Waterford Foods plc and run by Dungarvan S.A.C. last Saturday and Sunday.

The miserable fishing conditions of Saturday were replaced with sunshine and calm seas on Sunday and over the two days a total of 758 fish comprising 14 varieties were landed by competing anglers who put to sea in 16 boats from Dungarvan Quay.

The eventual overall winner was Dungarvan Solicitor Joe Lavan who hooked enough fish (most, strangely enough, during the miserable Saturday outing) to register a superb score of 535 points to take the Yoplait Trophy and Replica and in addition 2 return air tickets to London.

The presentation of the awards took place at the Quay on Sunday evening and the fun extended late into the night with music by Dungarvan Brass Band and general merriment as the international contingent of anglers from 9 nations and their families celebrated another very successful event.

Gold, silver and bronze medallions were presented to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd for each of the following classes: Conger, Ling, Flatfish, Pollack, Greatest Variety, Greatest Number, Best Out of State, Greatest Number of Points. Trophies also presented included the Aer Lingus Shield, Conger King Cup and Bill Mullins Trophy while there were special prizes for the top angler on each of the two days.

The awards were presented by Mr. P. J. Cummins, Assistant Chief Executive, Waterford Co-op, who was accompanied by his wife Miriam.

Waterford Foods In Surprise Acquisition Deal

It was reported at the week-end in U.K. industry sources that Waterford Foods plc was close to completing a stg£40 million deal to take over United Co-operative Dairies (UCD) in England. The sources stated that they expected the deal to be announced soon, possibly this week.

It is not clear how Waterford Foods will organise the funding to pay for the English Co-op but sources indicated the purchase may be made by Waterford Co-op, the major shareholder in Waterford Foods and be transferred at a later stage to Waterford Foods when it has arranged the finance to pay for the acquisition.

UCD is expected to generate turnover of around stg£85 million in 1991 and produce operating profits of around £3 million. The company has two dairy plants and a major door-to-door milk delivery system in the Manchester area. It is expected to provide a complementary fit to the Healds business which Waterford Foods bought in the area late in 1989 and it is likely that Waterford could effect a major rationalisation programme through merger of the two businesses.

Waterford Foods is currently engaged in merger negotiations with Avon-

more Foods but this is not expected to hinder any fundraising undertaken to pay for the United Co-op deal.

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THIS BREAD GIVES ETERNAL LIFE

In the first reading the Lord is inviting us to the banquet of wisdom, and is actually saying to us, leave your foolish ways, and come and learn to live and walk in the ways of wisdom. Indeed, the reading does prefigure the messianic banquet of the Eucharist, but the aim of the writer is to get his listeners to accept God's message, and seek Him. You'll note, how like the Gospel is, to this reading. It says, receive the Good News, put aside your foolish ways and come and refresh yourselves at the Banquet of the Lord. You must literally be a fool for Christ!

Paul has told us already that we enter into this new life through the gates of Baptism. From thereon, it is up to ourselves to promote and nourish this new life, and then persevere until we reach fulfilment in the glory of Heaven. Just as it is necessary to care for our human life, we must likewise be on our guard against dangers to our soul. Paul alludes to the general dissipation, and the wild drunken orgies that were so common in his day. He is cautioning us against the evils of drink. And, he does so, because apart from the harm it causes in the home, over drinking makes it impossible for a man or a woman to remain chaste.

Paul understands only too well the weakness of human nature, so he urges us to be wise, and not risk falling back into our old ways. Hence, he wants everyone to make good use of their time, and not be like the unbelievers who show such scant respect for God's law. Therefore, if he tells us to be careful, he also has in mind the uncertainty of life. It is essential that prayer play an important role in our lives. And, because prayer keeps us safely in God's arms, he would have us praying without ceasing. Paul is not so foolish as to believe it is possible for anyone to maintain a constant flow of acts of thanksgiving. Rather, he is suggesting that whatever we do, we do it for God. As good Pope John put it: "My God, I give you my day." So, be constant in your prayers. It is a great means of keeping the windows of our soul focussed on God. Just imagine what a lost soul would do if he had our opportunity. The ball is at our feet!

You'll recall that last Sunday's Gospel told us that Jesus was the Bread of Life. Next Sunday's proceeds to develop this teaching. The crowd clamour and ask, how can this man give us His flesh to eat? Jesus ignores the question, and goes on to explain clearly and definitely that it was absolutely essential to eat His flesh and drink His blood to gain eternal life. He further went on to explain that feasting on the Heavenly Bread creates and fosters a union with God that is similar to the bond existing in the Divine Godhead.

We know we eat ordinary bread or meat, we by our own natural powers

convert it into our own flesh and blood. However, when we eat Christ's Body, we do not change It. It changes us, and makes us more like Christ. So much so, It fills us with His spirit, and makes us want only that which pleases our God. We live in Christ. He lives in us. And, eventually, the new life makes it possible for us to rise like Christ. Then, we'll realise the life in which we partake of here, we'll enjoy to its fulness in Heaven. That's why the Church tells us that living on the Eucharist, is a foretaste of what is to come. The moral is, eat the Bread of Life, and you'll live for ever.

WE MUST TAKE GOD SERIOUSLY

Never forget, God made you for Heaven. He also made it clear, we must nourish ourselves on the Eucharist if we hope to reach our home. It would be very very foolish not to take God seriously. The simple fact is, if you do not eat the Bread of Life, you'll die. Heaven is not so much a reward given to us at the end of our earthly journey, but it rather the natural consequence of living the life of Christ here. That's why Jesus said: "Anyone who eats this Bread will live for ever."

Jesus has left us in no doubt about the necessity, the power and the effectiveness of the Eucharist. He told the Jews, your fathers ate manna, and they are now dead. The manna was as I already explained, the dwelling of Jesus in us, and we in Him, is eternal life, which evolves, once time has past, into a permanent existence.

We all know why we are here. We know what has to be done. Yet! many appear to be losing their way. Most of us are reasonably good at making provision for our earthly life, so one is forced to ask: why are we so blind, so foolish and so stubborn when it comes to securing eternal life. It is a serious matter, but it is up to ourselves. (You may think from what I said that those, who never heard or do not know about the Eucharist, have no hope. That is not so. God judges everyone on their lights, and those of good will, will somehow and in some way share in the graces of the Sacraments.)

Red Kettle and "Tir Faoi Thonn"

On Sunday, August 25, a most unusual street event will come to Waterford. Macnas, the street theatre company based in Galway, are bringing their "Tir Faoi Thonn" show to Waterford and Red Kettle Theatre Company with generous support from Supermac's, are promoting the event.

Waterford, apart from Galway, will be the only centre in Ireland to see the full parade this year. This will be a massive community event and Red Kettle are hoping to attract 10,000 - 15,000 on to the streets on the day, not only from

Waterford, but from the whole South East area.

Called "Tir Faoi Thonn" (Land Beneath the Waves) the show will transform the streets and quays of Waterford into an undersea kingdom. Giant models of whales, lobsters, salmon

and other sea creatures will dance and play to the rhythm of several marching bands.

The Barrack Street Band, the Sub Aqua Club, the Civil Defence and the Order of Malta are just some of the community groups involved on the day. There will also be 150 local people recruited to take part in the actual parade. Waterford Corporation and the Harbour Commissioners have been very supportive both with advice and more practical help.

The parade itself will commence at 3 p.m. in Johnstown and work its way through the centre of the city via Michael Street, down on to the Quay, where the finale will take place.

Teagasc Initiative On Beef Quality Assurance Scheme

Teagasc advisers will play a major role in ensuring that the maximum number of farmers participate in the C.B.F. Beef Quality Assurance Scheme.

Under a joint Teagasc/C.B.F. initiative, announced last week, Teagasc advisers will spearhead the scheme at farm level, through information promotion, advice and inspection.

In a major campaign over the coming months, involving seminars in each county and personal consultations between advisers and farmers, Teagasc will be actively promoting the Scheme and encouraging beef farmers to register.

Commenting on this important new initiative, Donal Carey, Teagasc Programme Director at the National Beef Research and Development Centre at Grange, said:

"The Beef Quality Assurance Scheme is the most positive development in the Irish beef sector for a number of years. With the decline in the influence of intervention, the Irish meat industry will have to find market outlets for our beef. The BSE scare and the use of prohibited substances have damaged both the overall market for beef and the image of Irish beef in certain markets. The Beef Quality Assurance Scheme

is a vital component in the campaign to restore consumer confidence in beef and in gaining access to the more lucrative market outlets."

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have been drawing Unemployment Benefit almost continuously since 1985. From time to time I have obtained temporary employment which has allowed me to requalify for benefit. My most recent job lasted 15 weeks and when I signed on again I discovered that my payment had been cut by £25 per week. It was explained that I was no longer entitled to the temporary alleviation payments which I had been getting since November 1986. Is this correct?

Answer — The temporary alleviation payments were introduced in November 1986 to compensate claimants who lost their wives as adult dependents either because they (the wives) were earning more than £50 per week or were claiming a social welfare payment on their own right.

These payments only last as long as the husband's claim remains unbroken and provided his wife does not revert to being his adult dependent.

A gap of more than 13 weeks between two Unemployment Benefit claims breaks the claim and the new claim is treated as a fresh claim.

This is what happened in your case.

Had you been claiming Unemployment Assistance you could have had a gap of 52 weeks without losing your temporary payment.

WATER CRISIS AT NEWCASTLE

The beautiful area of Newcastle in South Tipperary is experiencing a repeat of the water problems which plagued the village this time last year, with breakdowns occurring just eleven months after residents and County Council officials thought the problems had been cleared up.

People in the area are annoyed and want to know what action is being taken.

Senator Sean Byrne, South Tipperary West Waterford told a recent meeting of South Tipperary County Council, the problem had shown itself too often. South Tipperary engineer, Mr. Michael Murphy, told the members that Newcastle was on a high pressure line with which there had been problems and it would cost in the region of £20,000 to replace it and that kind of money was not available from the Government to do that. The pipe had been investigated but results had not been conclusive, so a second link to the area would be provided at a cost of £5,000. He said it is being treated as a matter of urgency.

BOVINE T.B. ERADICATION SCHEME INTERIM TESTING ARRANGEMENTS

ERAD is advising herdowners whose herds have not been tested in 1991 and who now wish to have their full herd tested, to contact their District Veterinary Office (DVO) for authorisation to have a test carried out by a Veterinary Surgeon (V.S.) of their choice.

The farmer will be responsible for paying the fee which ERAD will reimburse at the current scheme rates (less V.S. withholding tax) as soon as possible following receipt of the test report and other necessary documents.

Blood sampling for brucellosis testing may be required in some areas.

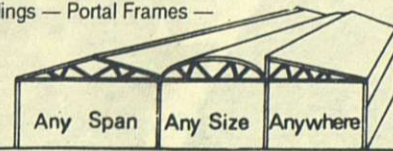

PENSMAN Takes You . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

LOOKING AHEAD IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT

While the month of August is traditionally known as "the silly season" in newspaper circles as it is the vacation period for court sittings and meetings of local authorities — we won't mention Dail Eireann as they have gone out of commission since last month and will remain dormant until October — the only thing to do is to look ahead to the time when matters generally will begin to stir again.

One of the topics concerning which a great deal of interest was generated earlier in the year was the reform and reorganisation of local government. There was a great scenario, stage-managed by Minister Padraig Flynn and his Department of the Environment, set up to deal with the matter. A special Commission of experts was even established to come up with recommendations while all local authorities throughout the country were encouraged to make their own submissions on the subject.

In the heel of the hunt, however, it all turned out to be nothing more than a huge smoke screen and much a-do about nothing. In actual fact no reforms of any importance have taken place and the prime problem of providing adequate financing for local authority projects has been blatantly side-stepped by Minister Flynn. Another problem which was left unsolved was the future of Urban Councils and Town Commissioners concerning which a great deal of speculation continues.

In regard to funding, all local bodies are presently strapped for cash and with the Government in dire financial straits itself there can be little or no hope of anything or at least very little coming from central funds. It is being whispered by those in the know, now that the local elections have been got out of the

way, that Minister Flynn would not be averse to approving of the introduction of a property tax by the local councils as a means of generating funds for themselves at local level.

This of course would be tantamount to the re-introduction of rates, a system abolished by a previous Fianna Fail Government under then Taoiseach Jack Lynch, and a system which the Fianna Fail Party has since undertaken not to bring back again. But no matter what will be said, it will be like the quick-change magician who declares he's the same man in different clothes!

And in regard to the urban and Commissioners authorities, the latest rumour in the grapevine is that these are to be retained. They were supposed to be replaced by sub-county authorities but Minister Flynn told a deputation from the Association of Municipal Authorities recently that the Cabinet had taken no decision yet on what form the new urban structures should take and that the matter would not be considered by the Government until October. However the President of the AMAI stated following their meeting with the Minister that he was confident that urban authorities would remain in place.

And so it just seems to be a case that the mountains were in labour but brought forth only a mouse!

STREET AND PLACE NAMES

Dungarvan Urban Council are to be congratulated on erecting new street and place names around the urban area. On white with a green background they are easily read and should prove a great help to visitors to the town and indeed even to old inhabitants who must be finding it hard to keep up with all the new housing developments both in Dungarvan and Abbeyside.

And while on this topic of place names, a discussion among a number of old residents of the Village (that's Abbeyside) to which we were privy lately was highly critical of recent efforts, obviously by newcomers to the area, to alter the boundaries of certain of the old place names in Abbeyside. In particular it was pointed out that Friars Walk extended from the Curate's residence to the Church, while the area from the Curate's residence to the New Road (Nugent's Corner) is Hermitage, from there to Moloney's farmhouse is Skehacrine and from there on is Land's End. That's how it always was and that's how it should remain and we were specifically asked to point this out.

P.S. — Since writing the foregoing our attention has been drawn to the fact that the new sign indicating St. Monica's Terrace at New Line, Abbeyside has been removed from its stand. Whether it was removed officially or whether these new signs have already become a target for our night time vandals we have not been able to ascertain up to the time of going to press. If the sign has been vandalised then it is really the pits where these ne'er-do-well midnight cowboys are concerned.

ARE INTERNATIONAL PHONE CALLS TOO EXPENSIVE?

It is probably true to say that we, in common with all Europeans, pay far too much for telephone calls made from one country to another. To examine the situation now, the European Commission has launched an enquiry into prices generally charged for international phone calls.

According to a recent issue of "Eurofocus," the European Commission has noted that in the 12-nation Community an international call can often cost two or three times as much as a national call over the same distance.

While a part of the price difference is obviously due to technical and administrative factors, the Commission wonders whether the various national telecommunications bodies in the EC (such as Telecom Eireann, British Telecom or France Telecom) have not reached an understanding among themselves, aimed at keeping margins excessively high. In short, the Commission is hinting that some kind of price fixing arrangement for their own benefit has been agreed by the various national telecom companies.

To find out, the Commission asked the bodies in question in early July to provide detailed information on their tariffs.

The Treaty of Rome, the Constitution of the European Community, gives the Commission the power to ban inter-firm agreements which reduce competition at the expense of consumers. The Commission will therefore take a close look at the charge imposed

on telephone users and the prices paid by each telecom organisation to its counterparts in other EC and non-EC countries. Isn't it a great pity that we

do not have someone with power to take a similar close look at our internal telecommunication charges which have lately taken a further hefty increase.

The Garden Where The Praties Grow

Last Sunday morning while listening to records played on Radio Cornwall (from the BBC) we heard the lady presenter pay a lovely tribute to the great John McCormack. Having referred to his international fame as a tenor and to his operatic prowess, she very correctly said that no one could ever equal him in singing ballads, particularly Irish ballads and she then, as an example, played his recording of "The Garden Where The Praties Grow" which she told us was made way back in 1926.

Since then we have looked up this old song in our ballads collection and found that it was composed by Johnny Patterson who was a noted character in the early years of the present century when he travelled the length and breadth of Ireland performing with a circus. For anyone who might be interested in reviving this fine old song here are the words:

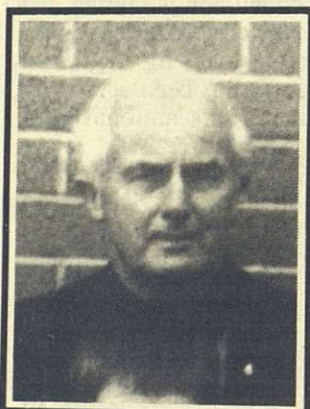

Rev. Bro. Andrew Thomas Farrell



During the dying embers of June, with summer holidays just a matter of hours away, Bro. Farrell paid his usual customary call to the classrooms in Dungarvan C.B.S. He joked, wished everyone the enjoyment of the holidays, a firm handshake with teachers greetings exchanged and he was on his way. Little did we know that day that Bro. Andy himself was shortly to take leave of us all, his sudden unexpected passing was the source of much sorrow and regret in the locality.

Five years ago Bro. Andy arrived in Dungarvan to begin his educational and social mission. In those short years he worked tirelessly and unsparingly and at all times gave of himself unselfishly.

Born in Stokestown, Co. Roscommon in 1924, Andrew began his early education at Roscommon C.B.S. It was here that the message of Edmond Rice

took root, germinated and blossomed. He entered Marino Training College and was professed with final vows in 1941.

From 1945-55 he taught in St. David's Artane, '55 to '66 he was Principal at Fermoy C.B.S., '66-'70 at Carlow, '70-'72 Dingle C.B.S., '72 to '73 Tramore, '73 to '79 Superior and Principal at Killock. He was Rome bound then for a short period and in 1980 he returned to the North Monastery, Cork as Superior/Principal for two years. He was Principal in Mitchelstown from 1982 to 1986. In 1986 he was assigned to Dungarvan where he was Superior/Principal. Just two years ago after a life of toil and labour he retired.

Bro. Farrell was indeed the main driving force behind the Junior School Warden Scheme. His own school in Carlow C.B.S. at the time was the national launching pad. He loved everything Irish, particularly its language, music and games.

He often related his main exploits as umpire at the top G.A.A. venues. He was part and parcel of well known Dublin referee Paul Kelly's team of officials. He often spoke of the hard luck stories of Roscommon's football fortunes. Surely from his Celestial home Bro. Andy will use his influence as the O'Hyde county enter once again an All-Ireland semi-final. He often spent hours in his garden, tending to plant and shrubs, while Irish music was his favourite indoor recreational pastime. Bro. Andy was indeed in many ways ahead of his time, he installed computers in the local primary school, organised parenting groups and worked socially with the underprivileged.

On Thursday Bro. Farrell's remains were brought from O'Flaherty's Funeral Home, Galway, to St. Mary's Parish Church. A guard of honour of local C.B.S. pupils lined the avenue to the church while the staff of the local primary school acted as pallbearers. V. Rev. Fr. G. There's lots to do this time of year

AUGUST is a great month for 'pottering' in the garden. There is time to laze and enjoy the fruits of labours and still chores enough to keep the fidgets happy.

If the deck chair beckons towards late August then why not plait a few ropes from your onion harvest to hang in the kitchen, or tie a few bunches of herbs to hang in the airing cupboard?

On the way up and down the garden to your chair you might also dead head the chrysanthemums and dahlias, ensuring that the showy blooms keep on coming.

Harvest the peas and beans on your trips as well. They should be picked young for the best taste and there will be plenty more to replace them.

During your strolls you can also check any shrubs which need moving in the autumn, either through outgrowing their site or due to changes you want to make to the garden.

By not noting their position now you risk forgetting what they are and their location once they have faded for the year.

The more energetic may want to get on now and prepare the sites for the shrubs being moved or newcomers planned, although in the latter case autumn planting is not necessary if the shrubs are container-grown.

Moving to the more strenuous August jobs, the hedge ought to have a final clip before autumn.

Light digging and raking is needed before planting winter brassicas such as

brussels sprouts, sprouting broccoli and cabbage.

You can also sow the last lettuce and radish crops for the year.

While the spade and fork are out you should also remember to do some preparation for planting bulbs for next spring, at the same time, lifting begonia tubers, amaryllis or hippeastrum, and lilies.

Preparation

If you need to sow a new lawn then August is not a month for sitting around, because preparation of the ground should have started in July with a view to sowing in late August.

The ground should be thoroughly broken up before raking to a fine crumble mixed with well-rotted garden compost.

Sow seeds to the density recommended on the carton and lightly rake soil over them before hanging foil strips and netting to keep birds at bay.

Taking geranium cuttings is more pleasurable, and a money saver for when you come to plant next year's baskets and boxes.

Make a clean cut across a sturdy shoot just below a leaf joint and remove the lower leaves before planting in a tray or pot of cutting compost — beware of keeping the compost too moist or covering the cuttings and causing rot.

USING YOUR LOAF IS SO TASTY

SAUSAGE MEAT AND APPLE MEAT LOAF

Ingredients:

- 4 thin slices cooked ham (about 100g) 4oz), any fat trimmed off
- 675g (1½ lb) sausage meat
- 335g (12oz) apples, peeled, cored, coarsely grated
- 225g (8oz) onions, coarsely grated
- 50g (2oz) fresh white bread-crumbs
- 2 tablespoons Worcester sauce
- Salt and pepper
- Garnish (optional):
- 1 apple
- A little lemon juice

Method:

Pre-heat oven at 190C, 375F, Mark 5.

Line bottom and sides of a large loaf tin approximately 21cm (8½") long x 12cm (4½") wide x 6cm (2½") deep, with ham slices allowing any surplus to hang over sides of the tin.

Well mix together the other ingredients, except apple and lemon juice for garnish. Put mixture into ham-lined tin, level top and fold over ham slices if necessary. Cover with kitchen foil and stand the loaf tin in a larger tin, filled about one-third full of hot water. Bake for 1½ hours. Remove from oven and leave in tin until cold. Turn out onto a serving plate and garnish if required.

To prepare the garnish: Core the unpeeled apple and slice into thin rings. Toss in lemon juice to preserve the colour and arrange slices overlapping along centre of top of the meat loaf.

Serves 6-8.



A GOOD SPREAD

PATÉ CADIZ

Ingredients:

- 1 Large onion
- 8oz (225g) chicken livers
- 8oz (225g) pork sausage meat
- 1 level teaspoon (5ml) salt
- ground black pepper
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed



About 5 rashers streaky bacon
1 sprig rosemary
About 2oz (50g) stuffed green olives

Method:

Peel and quarter the onion, and mince or put through the blender with the chicken livers.

Mix with the sausage meat, salt, pepper and garlic.

Remove the rind and any bones from the bacon and stretch the rashers with the back of a knife.

Put the rosemary sprig into the bottom of a 1lb or 1½ pint (450g or 850ml) loaf tin, line with the bacon rashers on the bottom and up the sides.

Spread half of the meat mixture in the tin, then arrange the olives end to end, in three rows.

Cover with the remaining meat mixture and smooth the top.

Cover with a piece of greaseproof paper and foil, place in a roasting tin half filled with hot water, and bake (325F, 107C, Gas No 3) for 1½ hours.

Lightly weigh the pate with weights and leave to become quite cold. Serve sliced with hot toast.

Serves six.

Beef Premium Concession To IFA

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Mr. Tom Leahy, has welcomed the decision of the Minister of Agriculture to allow farmers who applied for the Special Beef Premium to sell cattle which have been held for two months after application, once their cards have been stamped in the local DVO.

In a statement, Mr. Leahy said: "IFA had raised the problem of farmers not being allowed to sell animals until August 19 with the Taoiseach and the Minister at their recent meeting. IFA made it clear that a concession was required in order to cater for farmers who wanted to sell finished

cattle which had been held for the necessary two month period. Without this concession farmers would have to hold cattle until August 19 at which time they could be over-fat, resulting in massive price cuts."

Mr. Leahy added: "The concession obtained will

operate on the basis that farmers who wish to sell cattle, having retained them for two months, will bring the ID Cards to their local DVO Office, where they will be stamped. Farmers can then sell their animals and will also receive Special Beef Premium on these cattle."

"Treasures are given to suitable museums, and such items as silver salvers, coffee sets and tablecloths are always useful for the many big houses run by the Royal Family."

Do these include the two human skulls presented by the government of Papua-New Guinea?

Or perhaps the talking drums from Ghana, the Nepalese yak's hair fly-whisk, the 110ft Canadian totem pole and a poison-tipped spear from a cannibal king?

Every gift is catalogued, stored and kept in working order so that it can be put into a prominent position whenever its donor comes to stay at one of the Royal homes.

During the Queen's tour of the Gulf States in 1979, the Arabs gave her jewels and ornaments valued at more than £1,000,000.

And when the Queen met the Pope, he gave her a priceless illuminated manuscript by Dante.

Occasionally the Queen makes an exception and accepts small gifts from the public. A retired postal worker, Walter Pagel, who



breeds canaries in Hanover, West Germany, decided to send a prize-winning canary to the Queen.

German officials told him bluntly: "Her Majesty would not want it. It is a most unsuitable present."

But Walter wrote to the Queen, offering her the canary as a "token of friendship with Britain." A letter from the Master of the Queen's Household told Walter that the Queen would accept his gift.

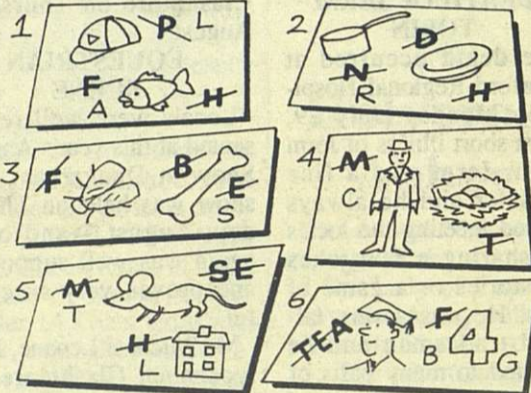
Then there was 10-year-old Heather, Yorkshire, whose cat, Tiddles, had two kittens. She was advised: "Try to find a good home for them."

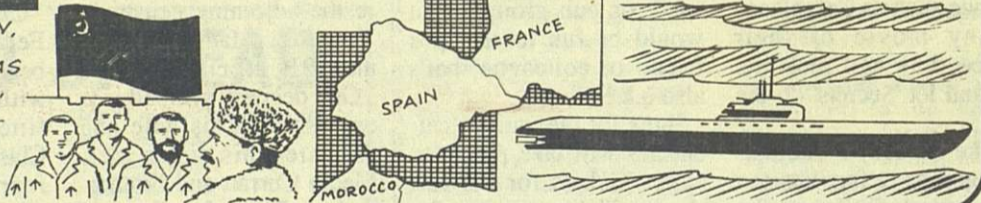

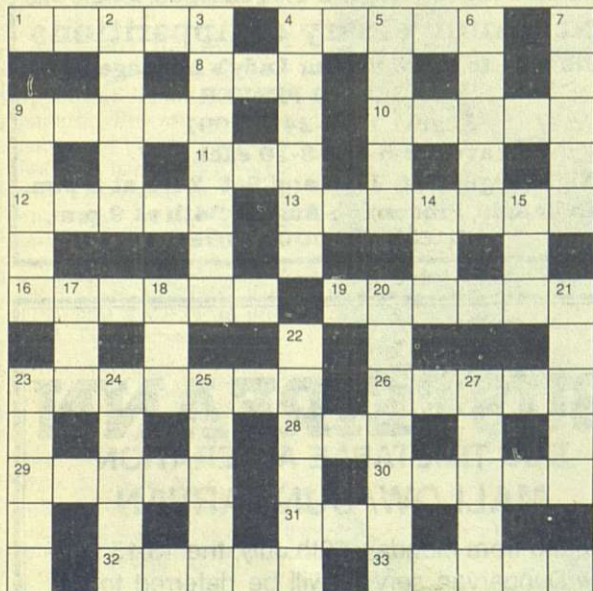

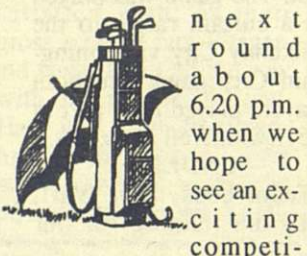

Attractive I.F. Semi-Finals At Cappoquin

I don't believe that the programme of senior hurling matches billed for Fraher Field on Sunday will be attractive enough to lure patrons away from the T.V. which will be showing the Roscommon v. Meath semi-final at Croke Park, but I will also bet that the football game in Dublin will not stop a huge crowd of home fans from going to Cappoquin to see the exciting semi-finals of the intermediate football championships.

It is unfortunate, but unavoidable that these fixtures should clash as very many of our patrons will wish to see the games at both venues, but I will be very surprised if the bigger number do not decide in favour of the Cappoquin programme.

At Dungarvan, the quality of the hurling which is to take us to the concluding stages of the league section of the senior championship, should be good, but the results are of mere academic interest. In the feature game, which is first, the result of the clash between

Tallow and Mount Sion will only determine which team tops the table and which will fill second place before the semi-finals are fixed. The second match is of no real consequence since the winners of the Ballyduff/Ballygunner clash are going nowhere. They, at this stage, are merely fulfilling a fixture.

MOUNT SION v. TALLOW

As far as I can recall the last important meeting between these teams in the senior championship was in

the semi-final of the county in 1988, when Mount Sion came back to win by 3-14 to 3-11 in a hectic finish. That was the year in which Tallow came back up from intermediate and won some good matches before qualifying for the knockout stages.

On Sunday last Mount Sion looked unimpressive when beating Dungarvan and had a lot to worry about right up to the final four minutes, at which stage the game was level. They also had Michael Flannaghan sidelined during the game so he will be absent on Sunday as will Shane Ahearn who is holidaying in Spain.
