TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT STUDY Multistorey Car Parks, Pedestrian Ways And More Roundabouts Proposed For

Dungarvan

The long-awaited and much requested Traffic Management Plan for Dungarvan was finally presented to the members of Dungarvan Urban Council at a special meeting of the Council held on last Monday night.

Prepared by Harewood Associates, Consulting Engineers of Galway City, the Traffic Management Study was presented by Mr. Frank Harewood who used slides to explain the various proposals contained in the study.

The recommended proposals were summarized in two groups — those to be implemented in the shortterm and those in the medium term. The short-term proposals are those with the highest priority and which will yield immediate benefits. These were listed as follows:

Two multistorey carparks to be developed with private sector investment in joint venture with the Urban Council — a 3-level park at Davitt's Quay and a 2-level park at Scanlon's Yard to provide an additional 330 parking spaces.

Roundabouts (subject to approval by the Dept. of the Environment) at Shandon Road junction with Bridge Street, and the Quay, at south end of relief road and at Park Hotel junction with a miniroundabout at Crotty's Corner, Abbeyside.

New carparks (up to 150 spaces) located at West of Mary St./Grattan Square: a site for at least 50 cars has been identified in the area north of O'Connell St. and west of Grattan Square and a site for up to 200 cars could be gained by the reclamation of the area between the Fire Station and the relief road.

Pause for Thought With Fr. Paddy

GOD HAS INFINITE WISDOM

God not only chose the Jewish race to be His people, but He also watched over, protected and constantly proved His fidelity to them. God did expect them to show their appreciation in return. He had requested that this they'd show through their observance of His Commandments. Likewise, we the new people of God knowing we depend on God for everything, we should strive to observe the Ten Commandments in their entirety. It is the one and only way to prove our love for God.

The Pharisees failed because they added a super structure to the law, and then concentrated in fulfilling these human requirements and neglected to give God what was His due. Many have made that mistake in more recent years: they were so caught up with their own goodness that they were blind to the needs of others. These people were failing to build a Christian Community, because, whilst they kept some of the Commandments, they neglected to keep the whole law. Too, you have others whose faith is so weak that they declare God's law is too rigid and too demanding. In fact, the reading makes it clear that those, who accept and live by God's law, find great joy and consolation in sharing in God's plan of salvation. The law is not framed to be a burden, and those, who wisely follow it, will tell you, it is the road to happiness.

When people reject God's law, and act and do as they please, they generally create trouble for themselves. One thing, they never find real happiness. God's law is designed to bring order and peace. Everyone readily understands the absolute necessity to have road traffic laws. Experience shows, where God is not honoured, there's no restraint. In sexual matters, where there's no control, disease abounds. The Commandments are designed to see that man gives God His due and renders a like service to his neighbour. Instead of being restrictive, God's law protects man's freedom. Dispense with traffic regulations and see how free you are to use the roadways!

It is important to bear in mind that God is Lord of heaven and of earth, so when He directs us to do something, we ought, as St. James puts it in second reading, to comply with His request. He is the all wise God, and it would be foolish to ignore Him. He loves us. He knows what is good for us. And, since His word is law, we'd be stupid not to listen and act upon it. St. James says, we must be practical Christians. We must live our faith, help those in need and keep the Commandments. The attitude

in the world is greatly at variance with Christ's teachings. It has openly declared that rubber goods are a necessity in order to allow people have unlimited sex. The Church declares that this is wrong, and can never be justified. It is much the same with those who promote abortion, which is another name for murder. This sin is so great, it cries to Heaven for vengeance.

I have heard of Catholics, who lived without God, and did not want to know Him on their death-bed. I was shocked when told of someone, I'd known and respected, died like a pagan. Not knowing all the circumstances, I cannot pass judgement. Ever after, when I visited the sick, I always blessed the house before entering. We do not give half enough credit to "old nick." I would always advise people to say at least one daily prayer for a happy death.

BLIND TO HUMAN NEEDS

Next Sunday's Gospel would apply well to present day society. It is well known that some people, who haunt the Church, are blind to the human needs that surround them. Unwisely too, some, who are most unselfish in caring for the needs of others, fail to render due service to God. One has to keep the whole law. Just imagine a Catholic saying, "a divorced person deserves a second chance." As the Lord said: "you are for me or you are against me." You cannot have two masters.

The Lord is not satisfied with lipservice. He wants to be worshipped, and He wants it to come from the heart. The Pharisees were condemned, because they'd woven a lot of little structures into the law, and ended up by giving wholesale attention to these traditions, and forgetting all about God's law. Mark is actually referring to this problem, when he makes it clear that defilement does not arise from eating a particular food, but comes from man's heart, such as envy, evil thoughts etc. We must keep the Commandments. Yes, we must keep all of them. They contain God's law for all time. No one can change them.

CYCLING Think twice before allowing your child to cycle to school. A bicycle is a vehicle, not a toy and a cyclist is very vulnerable, even when trained and experienced.

No child under the age of ten should be allowed cycle in any sort of traffic.

Mr. Jack Verbrugge the well-known Dutch Sculptor and Industrialist officially opened the second John Hogan Memorial Sculpture Workshop at the Tallow Enterprise Centre in Tallow on Sunday night last. Mr. Verbrugge suggested that art and its creators do not receive the kind of due recognition it deserves. "Appreciating art might be a question of personal taste but people must be allowed to express their individual talents where possible," he said.

"This event," Mr. Ver-brugge said, "is an ideal opportunity to bring creative individuals and the public in a well organised manner." This year the Workshop has an International flavour with sculptors from five countries and three continents. In his role as an industrialist Mr. Verbrugge stated he readily recognises the role the artist plays in making everyday consumer products such as irons, toasters, vacuum cleaners, etc. more visually acceptable. We all like to look and handle attractive items.

In the context of our economy art might not seem high on our everyday priority list and the amount of direct foreign earnings might not impress many of us. But Ireland with its already very rich heritage of cultural ambassadors, be it writers, playwrights, actors, painters, sculptors and many more, provides the world with many pleasures which far outweigh any of the negative publicity.

A garden party in scenic St. Anne's Rose Garden in Clontarf, Dublin, was the setting as The Right Honourable Lord Mayor, Councillor Sean Kenny officially launched Roseweek 1991 in aid of the Irish Society for Autism (ISA) and the Irish Epilepsy Association (IEA).

This is the third year that both the I.S.A. and the I.E.A. have joined forces for the national Roseweek campaign. For one week, between 24th and the 30th October, 1991, thousands of roses will be sold throughout the country in an effort to generate £500,000 and to increase awareness of both autism and epilepsy. The volunteer network will ensure that a plentiful supply of roses at £1 each will be available to the general public. Although both conditions are unrelated, the united effort of the previous two years has proven beneficial to both. First described and named in 1943, autism is a severe, lifelong disorder of communication and behaviour affecting twentyfive new born babies every year. The outstanding characteristics are extreme aloneness, difficulty in relating to others, severely impaired or no speech and retardation in some cases.

Epilepsy can happen to anyone at any time and affects one in every two hundred people. There are many types of epilepsy, ranging from absence in consciousness to attacks with convulsive movements of the body and limbs. These attacks can occur as often as once a year to several times per month depending on the level of control.

The Story of Dick and Mary and the Ploughing Championships

On October 4, just four days before Limerick is thronged for the National Ploughing Championships, Dick and Mary Fitzgerald will hold the official opening ceremony for Woodlands House Hotel at Knockanes, Adare. Mary's energy and way with people attracted her into catering and she hung up her first B and B sign in 1976. A year later they were on the Bord Failte list of farm guesthouses and members of a very supportive Failte Tuaithe.

rooms with own bathroom. No one would say that Mary married Dick for his cooking but cook he did, when the chips were down, in a manner of speaking. They were now heavily committed to middle market catering and there was a substantial investment loan to service. STIRRING TIMES





GUIDE TO SAFE BOATING

The popularity of water sports, especially boating, has increased during the recent spell of fine weather. The National Safety Council, anxious to ensure that people are aware of the dangers involved in boating activities, has issued the following guidelines:

Ensure the craft is seaworthy — check your boat, sails, oars, oarlocks, engine, fuel on board; Inform a responsible person of your intentions, duration of your trip, number and names of persons you have on board, and when you expect to be back. If

you do not return on time the rescue services should be notified at once by dialling 999.

Check the weather forecast for the area in which you intend to operate and also check that you have lifejackets or buoyancy aids for everyone on board and also at least one lifebuoy with line attached.

If you are undertaking a voyage outside your local areas check that you have a properly corrected compass and charts on board for the voyage, and you know how to use them correctly.

Any small boat going to sea should have at least two parachute distress flares, two red hand-flares, and two smoke signals on board. Instructions for their use are on the sides of the signals. They should be stowed in a clearly marked water tight container. Boats with engines should have all necessary spares including fuel, engine tool kit, spare plugs and a small fire extinguisher, while all small boats should carry in watertight containers some fresh drinking water, water resistant torch, small first aid kit and a knife. All boats, irrespective of size, should have a small bailer on board. Larger size

boats should carry a bucket

MILK QUOTA SYSTEM **ALLOCATION OF QUOTAS TO** "MULDER" PRODUCERS

This notice concerns producers who participated in the Nonmarketing of Milk Scheme or in the Dairy Herds Conversion Scheme.

Under recent decisions of the EC Council of Ministers and Commission, producers who:-

- complied with all the conditions of those Schemes; and - whose non-marketing or conversion period ended between 1 January and 30 September, 1983 inclusive; or - who, in the case of non-marketing or conversion schemes expiring after 31 December 1982, received a holding by inheritance or similar means following the expiry of the nonmarketing or conversion period in respect of that holding and prior to 29 June, 1989; or

- whose non-marketing period ended after 30 September 1983 and who had already received a milk quota based on deliveries during the period October to December 1983;

are subject to certain conditions, entitled to milk guotas calculated on the quantities on which the non-marketing or conversion premium was based. Among the conditions to be met is the establishment to the satisfaction of the Department that the applicant is capable of producing on his/her own holding up to the level of the quota applied for.

Quotas are allocated provisionally for two years and will only be allocated definitively where the producer has recommenced milk deliveries or sales before 1 July 1992 and in a twelve month period prior to 1 July 1993 has delivered or sold quantities equal to at least 80% of the quota provisionally allocated. The quotas concerned will not be transferable except by inheritance. The closing date for the receipt of applications in the Department is 30 September 1991. Application forms and full details may be obtained from any milk co-operative or dairy, or direct from the Milk Policy Division, Department of Agriculture and Food, Kildare Street, Dublin 2. A spokesman for the Council informed Pensman that it had originally been considered to place the signs at a high level but it was then decided that it would be more useful to In 1798 when the Hessians place them at vehicular eye-level. "Perhaps," the spokesman ventured, "it would have been better to have placed them higher up out of reach but then how high would you have to go

to ensure this!"

Indeed we can only again condemn in the strongest possible terms the vandals who roam around, obviously at night, destroying and damaging public property in this manner and we strongly suggest to anyone who may have any information about any of these wanton acts of destruction that they should make it available to the authorities in charge, either at the Town Hall or at the Garda Station.

TO FIGHT LIKE KILKENNY CATS

We have all heard this old saying over and over again but we are sure that very few are aware of how the saying originated. With little else to do at the weekend we started browsing through some of the books which we have collected down through the years and came across one, "Proverbs and Sayings of Ireland." This was a book compiled and edited by Sean Gaffney and Seamus Cashman and first published by the Wolfhound Press, Dublin in 1974.

The book contains an illustrated collection of over 1,000 proverbs, sayings and triads from all over Ireland most of them translated from Irish. It also has an explanation about several of the old sayings which are still commonly used and how they originated. The one which interested us most in this classification was "To Fight Like Kilkenny Cats."

It explains this as follows: (English soldiers) were quartered in Kilkenny they amused themselves by tying two cats together by their tails and throwing them over a line to fight. Their officer on hearing of

this, ordered his men to stop. However the soldiers continued to practice in secret, and one day while they were amusing themselves in this manner they heard the officer approaching. One soldier drawing his sword cut down the cats leaving only their tails hanging. When the officer enquired as to where the cats were, the soldier replied that the cats had fought so furiously that they had devoured all but each other's tails.

It could be true but it could also probably be just another tall tale!

PRIEST AUTHOR CLAIMS LISMORE MAN SHOT MICHAEL COLLINS

"The Dark Secret of Bealnablath", a new book on the death of General Michael Collins by Rev. Fr. Patrick J. Twohig, Parish Priest of Churchtown, Co. Cork, which was published in Dublin last Tuesday, suggests that it was a Lismore man who shot Collins in the ambush which incidentally had its 69th commemoration on Sunday last, August 25.

The claim made by the priest historian will raise new questions as to how Collins was, in fact, shot at Beal Na Blath 69 years ago. Already many other theories have been put forward and as many as six or seven others have been named as the men who fired the fatal shot but nothing positive or generally accepted has so far surfaced.

Now Fr. Twohig, in his account of the ambush, deals with the involvement in it of various groups of Republicans including some from Waterford and Kerry who came on the scene. He states that the Waterford Group were returning from West Cork where they had gone to train under General Tom Barry for a possible campaign in the North. He then records that in 1986 he got the story on tape with a signed statement from Ned Lane some weeks before he died at his home in Dublin. In this, old Ned related how James Ormond of Lismore, his cousin, had told him that he had come on the ambush at Beal Na Blath from the Bandon side, that he had fired some shots and "saw the big man" fall. The two cousins, who had fought on opposite sides in the Civil War met in New

York in 1926 and it was there that Jimmy Ormond made this revelation to Ned Lane. The book states that the tired and hungry Waterford men were making their way across country in single file with Ormond as the last in line when they heard distant firing. They made for the scene in the hope of capturing some transport but the firing ceased just as they arrived. They saw an army column halted on the road. A big man appeared from behind an armoured car and walked in their direction. They fired some shots and Ormond saw him fall. Other soldiers appeared around the bend and having fired some more shots as a gesture, the Waterford men went on their way.

The book states that "this revelation in Broadway in 1926 was the only one Jimmy Ormond ever made, even to his family" but it goes on to claim that the Lismore man did, however, admit to his wife on his death bed in 1978, having been at Beal Na Blath on the ambush date.

Historian Fr. Twohig spent five years research-ing his subject and completing his 320 page book published by Tower Books

of Ballincollig, Co. Cork. "The Dark Secret of Bealnablath" is the latest book on one of the most intriguing incidents of the Civil War in Ireland and its launch in Dublin on Tuesday is bound to raise once again all the old questions as to who really fired the fatal shot that killed "The Big Fella".

TALLOW SCULPTURE WORKSHOP




Facelift For Dungarvan's Elegant Town Park and Bandstand

Dungarvan's Town Park located at the Look-Out on the seafront commands a panoramic view of Dungarvan Harbour with the Drum Hills stretching along the Ring peninsula to Helvick Head on one side and the low-lying market-gardening area of Ballinacourty stretching out to the Lighthouse on the other.


As indicated in the carved stone set in the archway over the main entrance, the Park was the gift of the Gibbons family to the people of Dungarvan. The inscription states: "These recreation grounds were acquired and the adjoining bathing

place extended and improved with portion of the large sum of money generously bequeathed for the benefit of his fellow townspeople by the late William Gibbons 1894."

The Park was laid out in that year in

typical Victorian style and some six years later in 1900 further improvements were carried out and the bandstand with its attractive wrought iron railing, which has been an outstanding landmark ever since, was added. The recitals provided there by the local Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band have been a feature which have provided wonderful entertainment for not only the townspeople but for the big numbers of visitors known as "gaybricks" for whom Dungarvan was a summer Mecca in the early years of the century.

In latter years, however, the Park and particularly the Bandstand had become rather neglected but recently the Urban Council in the general drive by County Manager Dan Hurley to beautify the town, had a survey of the Park carried out by the Council's Consultants, Niall Hyde & Associates.

In their report the Consultants recommended that no change be made to the Park, such as the laying out of flower beds or the planting of additional trees or shrubs. As it stood, the Park was an elegant, typical park of the Victorian era and the report recommended that this image should be retained.

In adopting the report the Urban Council agreed that the Bandstand be repaired and painted and this week with the job just completed the Bandstand now stands resplendent in its colour scheme of fresh red and black paint.

MONUMENT CLEANED ALSO

The entrance archway has also been cleaned and the gateway painted while the monument in the park has also received a cleaning and its inscription, as follows, is now clearly legible: "In memory of Edmond Power who was hanged in Dungarvan for his love of country in 1798. Also in memory of the Heroes of '98 who fought and shed their blood for Ireland. May God bless the cause for which they fought."

Without doubt this elegant Town Park is an architectural gem set in ideal surroundings and of which all Dungarvan people can now well feel proud.

Get Those Bulbs In Now For The Spring



SPRING bulbs and new shrubs are a priority in what can be a busy month for planting in the garden.

Crocuses and snowdrops, as the earliest flowering bulbs, should head the job list with daffodils and narcissi following by the end of the month.

If you have lots of bulbs to put in then a bulb planting tool is a good investment. It will neatly draw out a tube of soil and the bulb can be dropped into the hole and the plug returned.

Foliage

It is particularly useful when planting bulbs into lawns to bring freshness to the grass in spring – the foliage has usually shrivelled by the time the lawn becomes vigorous and can be simply mown away.

You should also be looking for spring bedding plants in the shops and garden centres, especially wallflowers – the delicate scent belies their ability to weather the winter.

Also consider pansies, forget-me-nots, double daisies and some hardy annuals such as alyssum, calendula and nigella.

Shrubs and trees can be expensive if you are buying commercially-grown varieties, so here are some tips on buying:

•Avoid plants with old

and faded labels or lots of weeds in the container. It is a sign of being in stock too long and neglected.

•Choose a sturdy and balanced plant with strong branches. A compact and stout specimen is often a better bet than a bigger and pricier one, because then it will grow its new home better than a more mature plant.

•Watch for yellowing, sagging or damaged leaves. They are signs of pests and neglect

neglect. •Check that roots are well anchored, by carefully lifting the plant from the base of the stem. The other extreme is being pot bound with roots pushing out from the base of the container.

Planted

Container grown trees and shrubs can be planted at any time of year but avoid dry spells and, while evergreens are well suited to planting now, others may be better planted next month.

Water the plant beforehand and then dig a hole to take the size of the container, allowing the soil ball to sit no more than an inch below ground level.

Break up the bottom of the hole to allow the roots easy purchase and then fork in moist peat and compost. Polythene bag pots should

Polythene bag pots should have their bases cut away first before the plant goes into the hole and the sides can be slit away.

can be slit away. Fill around the soil ball with a mix of two parts soil/ one part moist peat with garden compost/planting compost. Firm down and cover with mulch to keep weeds from establishing in the broken soil.



Britain's Shrinking Mountains highest reach the top than on any other peak in the British mountain is going thin on

Isles. Our hills are becoming threadbare in other spots, too. Armies of climbers aiming to tackle the mountainsides have worn the paths into deep grooves.

In some places, as much as 10ft has been worn away, exposing 30-ton boulders that are ready to roll downhill and crash into the villages below.

In Great Langdale, Cumbria, it took a task force of National Trust volunteers months to shovel and crowbar the Raven Crag hillside back into place. Staircases were built up steep scree.

Climbers are now routed up the special stone-paved path and the pub and farm below are safe from dangerous rock falls.

Elsewhere, paths to our



mountain tops are being eroded as deep as trenches.

Girl Guides walking up the Pyg track on Snowdon from Peny y Pass had a lucky escape when the sides of the path caved in on top of them during a rainstorm.

They were buried for a few moments, but fortunately the covering of sodden earth and mud was not thick enough to smother them. The struggled out to safety.

Conversation teams are constantly topping-up the erosion caused by millions of footprints, from Dartmoor in Devon to Dingwell in the **Highlands**

Even famous skylines like the Crib Goch in Snowdonia and Striding Edge in Cumbria need regular facelifts.

In holiday times, queues of people form along these very narrow but popular crests. Inevitably, boulders come away and plunge down the mountainside, to leave yet another gap.

Planting trees is a good way of welding slopes together. Indigenous types like holly, oak, rowan and juniper are favourites.

On sections of the 250mile Pennine Way, the route is so well trampled it can be seen for miles.

Where it crosses the Peak

District hills in Derbyshire, plastic matting has been laid over acres of moorland trampled down into the peat.

One National Parks volunteer warden told us: "Our hills have been eroded for centuries by the wind, rain, ice, snow, frost and nibbling of sheep.

"Now heavy boots are smashing through the tender skin of the landscape. Pounded earth goes hard and sterile as cement. Where the surface is lacerated, rain deepens the grooves with streams."

Another reason mountain tips are sinking is because people take the stones home as souvenirs.

When Balmoral Castle become a royal residence in Queen Victoria's time, local people wanted to make the district famous in another way


They believed a massive cairn would raise the height of Ben Macdhui kin the Cairngorms to beat that of Ben Nevis.

The cairn was not completed. Today, the half-finished cairn is still huge.

A walker, lost in mist, walked smack into it and knocked himself unconscious.





Services At Dungarvan Post Office

Under date August 21, Mr. Austin Deasy TD, has received the following letter from Mr. John Hynes, Chief Executive of An Post:

Dear Deputy,

Thank you for your letter of 7 August 1991 regarding services at Dungarvan Post Office. You refer to two specific areas affecting customer satisfaction and comfort.

With regard to office size we are aware that at certain times of the week, notably between 10 a.m. and 11.30 a.m. on Fridays, appreciable numbers of customers tend to arrive for payment of allowances. With this in mind we have examined the retail area and are in the process of drawing up plans with a view to maximising existing space.

You will appreciate that we are making an ongoing and determined effort to upgrade our building stock nationwide. The time scale for the carrying out of any remedial works at Dungarvan will, therefore, depend on the availability of funds governed by possible more pressing needs elsewhere.

You also refer to understaffing. As part of our commitment to customer care we carry out a daily

monitoring of queueing times at Company Offices. An examination of the Dungarvan results indicates that in the period 29 April 1991, when the monitoring system was introduced, to 20 July 1991 queueing times exceeded 5 minutes on two occasions only. Generally the waiting time is less than 3 minutes.

Counter staffing always takes priority when absences occur. Please be assured that absent counter staff are always replaced.

I trust that you will find the foregoing to your satisfaction and thank you for your interest.



Let us hope that it will be good value for the expensive admission price and that our supporters will get their money's worth.

There was a huge amount of demand for stand tickets and again there were very many disappointed applicants. No tickets were available to individuals and the distribution, as usual, was through the clubs. I know that many of the tormented County Board officials are praying that the final will not end in a draw.

On the home front practically every game is of great importance and for some of the twelve senior football clubs who will be in action, it will be their final outing of the championship season. With unusual interest in the junior hurling championship, there will be big crowds in Cappoquin on Friday and Saturday evenings to witness the semi-finals, both of which are quite open affairs.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The immediate objective of the committee will be to raise funds to help the County Board over its present financial problems, to advise the Board on financial matters and to assist in the funding of county teams in training. It was also stated that John McGrath had been elected chairman and Christy Dowling as secretary. The remaining officer posts were filled when the committee met on Thursday August 22nd.

The County Board unanimously approved the committee and wished them well. Several delegates said that this was a very welcome development and asked the officers to convey the thanks of the Board to the members who had agreed to serve.

DECEMBER CONVENTION?

Timmy O' Keeffe, Clashmore said the Board should very seriously consider the idea of holding our annual county convention in the month of December as was being done in most counties. This, he said would allow more time for organising the championships every year. The chairman said that such a proposal would need notice of motion and asked if the delegate would be prepared to submit same to the September meeting. This was agreed.

OPEN DRAW

Phil Fanning asked about Waterford's views on an open draw in Munster next year and it was unanimously agreed to support the open draw for both hurling and football in the province in 1992

UNDER 21 HURLING SELECTORS

The final selection committee report on the championships, was submitted by the outgoing under 21 hurling selectors. Having discussed the report, Coisde Na Peil were asked to prepare a list of recommendations regarding the appointment of selectors in the junior, under 21 and minor grades and if possible to have same ready for the next meeting.

It was agreed to have time set aside for a discussion on the format of the championships at the October meeting of the Board and all clubs were asked to consider this matter and make their views known when the subject is being debated.

REFEREES' REPORTS

Arising out of these, a number of reports of misconduct were read and several players whose suspensions will exceed the minimum two weeks, will be written to and given the opportunity of being heard in their own defence. These suspensions will be dealt with at the next meeting.

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
