Dutch Plastics Industry To Start In Tallow

Mr. Desmond O'Malley, T.D., Minister for Industry and Commerce announced yesterday (Tuesday Sept. 3) that United Industries Nederland B.V. of Gilze, The Netherlands - trading as Flair Plastics - is to set up a manufacturing plant in Tallow, Co. Waterford, with the support of the IDA.

Mr. O'Malley, said that "the company has purchased the site and factory buildings formerly occupied by Bremer Framemakers at Tallow. Recruitment of key staff will commence shortly. Total fixed asset investment including IDA grants is £4.3 million and the company expects to create 40 jobs within three years rising to 60 over five years. The company's decision to establish the plant in Tallow was primarily based on two factors — the availability of a suitable workforce and the company's desire to locate in a rural area."

Active since 1969, Flair Plastics brings a wide range of plastic consumer products onto the mainly European market, under the brand name Flair - practical products for home, garden and kitchen. Alongside a traditionally broad spectrum of practical articles for household use, an attractive range of synthetic resin garden furniture under the brand name Flair Plaisir has been added in recent years.

Demand currently exceeds supply for Flair products, who subcontracted up to 10% of its turnover during 1990. To

SEA CLAIMS TWO YOUNG VICTIMS IN LATE HEATWAVE SPELL

Tragedy struck at two of Co. Waterford's best known bathing beaches on Friday last during the height of the Indian Summer heatwave which saw the country sweltering in the hottest sunny days experienced so far this year.

Fourteen years old John Collins of Bonmahon and nine years old Stephen Smith of Vicars Court, Togher, Cork lost their lives in two separate drowning accidents.

In the first tragic accident, John Collins lost his life at about 2.30 p.m. when he got into difficulties while swimming with friends at Ballydwan Cove about two miles from his home between Bonmahon and Stradbally.

According to gardai the boy was knocked by a wave while standing waist deep in the water, got caught in an undercurrent and was swept out. A number of people including two canoeists made frantic efforts to save him but failed.

Later in the afternoon, the boy, Stephen Smith who was on his holidays with his family from Cork, was rushed to Cork Regional Hospital after getting into difficulties off Ardmore strand.

This tragedy happened while the boy was swimming shortly before 5 p.m. and got into difficulties. He was taken from the water and rushed to Cork Regional Hospital where he

was pronounced dead on arrival.

These tragic accidents are doubly sad as they hap-

pened on the last holiday week-end before children returned to school and

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

LOVING YOUR NEIGHBOUR IS LOVING GOD

Undoubtedly, Mark would have had the prophesy of Isaiah in mind, when he wrote next Sunday's Gospel. As Isaiah looks into the future he sees a time when the Messiah will come, and restore the Kingdom of God. He indicates that certain signs and portents will mark these days. And, he comforts his listeners by telling them the Lord will lead and defend His people. He says that those alive at the time will be able to recognise Him from His works: His very actions will announce His presence. Indeed, He will open your eyes and ears, and make you aware and alive to God's message of salvation.

The times, as foretold by Isaiah came, and the Messiah did free men from the powers of evil and darkness. It follows that we, as members of Christ's Church, have nothing to fear as long as we live and behave as a follower of Christ. I noticed a very telling remark, even if it is an old one, made about the failed Russian coup, namely, "freedom should never be taken for granted." It applies only more so to our relationship with God. We must maintain a constant guard; and, as the Lord said, watch and pray.

St. James in the second reading warns us that all men, whether rich or poor, are deserving of respect, and that we should never allow ourselves to be influenced or motivated by who the person is or what he has. It seems fairly clear that James is writing about a real situation in the local community. You'll perhaps recall how Isaiah presented us late last year with a pen picture of the early Church. We saw then how they'd come to live in close-knit communities, all sharing in a common life. Apart from providing them with a measure of protection, it certainly enabled them to practice their religion more easily. It is easy to understand how those who controlled the common purse would show favouritism, and that inevitably caused trouble. Have you noticed when you meet well-to-do people you always have smiles and time for them! Do you wear a different mask when the needy call on you to help?

Jesus points out that we ought to show kindness and respect to each and to everybody irrespective of their worldly standing, and the compelling reason is, it is the will of God. It is the way and the order established by God. Every creature is created to the image and likeness of God, and must be respected. To show dishonour to any creature, is to show dishonour to God. Hence, the measure on which we judge or treat our neighbours must be based on love, and not riches or poverty. Time after time you'll find concern

expressed in the Gospels for the weak and the poor. The Lord does not judge by appearance. He looks into the heart.

WORK WE SHOULD ALL SHARE IN

What a different place the world would be if people listened to God, and strove to do things God's way. We know from the life of the Church that people constantly devote their lives to the serving of others. You have only to think of Mother Teresa. However, it is a work in which we should all share. At least, we can be generous and help to raise funds for charitable works. Indeed, our taxes, which the Government employ to help the needy, does in part satisfy our obligations, but, that is not to say we have discharged the full debt. As long as we live, there's work to be done, and as long as we're in a position to help, we should. The Lord loves those people who help and care for the sick.

Mark's messianic reference in the Gospel would seem to be the reason why Jesus asks those present "to tell no one about the miracle." He did not wish to have His identity revealed before the appointed time. He had yet much work to do including the undergoing of His passion. Besides, it was His intention to gradually reveal Himself to those with faith. His actions were a sign of what He'd come to do, and so, in opening their eyes and enabling them to see and to hear, He was making it possible for them to be alive to His presence.

We accept and we live the truths revealed by Jesus, but, as Christians, we must be ready and willing to share our faith with others. Remember, faith is not seeing everything clearly, but rather in trusting God even amid uncertainties. After all, we accept and we believe mysteries we do not understand, and we do not hesitate, because we know that God has the words of eternal life. Your faith is precious. Take good care of it.

Waterford Sheep Farmers Protest At Absent Postman

Addressing a large group of angry sheep farmers demonstrating outside the Offices of the Department of Agriculture in Waterford recently, Co. Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Mr. James Coughlan said that the fiasco of this year's Ewe Premium payments should serve as a salutary warning to all farmers that the future designed for them by Commissioner MacSharry would be one of waiting and hoping the Postman called to the door with the income cheque.

"It is not acceptable to me or to any farmer that we should have to submit ourselves to an income system dependent on elastic political promises and red-taped bureaucracy", he said.

Mr. Coughlan also stated that the public demonstration was being held to highlight the case of the 83% sheep farmers around the county who are still without payments.

Local Liaison Officer, Michael Guiry, along with Mr. Coughlan delivered a letter of protest to Officials at the Department's Waterford Office for the attention of the Minister for Agriculture complaining about the delay in payments.

"However", said Mr. Coughlan, "it is clear that the remaining 83% of Co. Waterford producers will probably have to wait until late September for their payments.

"IFA", stated Mr. Coughlan, "will be campaigning for the appointment of a Field Supervisor at the Department's Waterford office to speed up files going for payment. The current ridiculous situation of a Field Supervisor having to travel from Kilkenny to sign the files authorising payment is slowing down payments to Co. Waterford farmers.

"What is not widely un-

derstood is that the Ewe Premium payments now represent 10% of a sheep farmer's net income or take-home pay. If workers

were told that they would have to wait 2 months instead of 2 weeks for their pay-cheque there would be a revolution in this country.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — We have been guardians for the past seven years to three orphaned children and are receiving the Contributory Orphans Allowance from the Dept. of Social Welfare for them. This amounts to £109 per week. The tax office treats this Allowance as part of my husband's income. This puts us into the 48% tax bracket. So, we end up paying £50 tax per week on this money. Each year we hope that the position will change but nobody seems interested in our plight. Have you any suggestions for us?

Answer — We are glad to be able to bring you good news at last. The tax office have now decided that both the Contributory and Non-Contributory Orphans Allowance will be assessed as the income of the child. This means that the child will be entitled to their own tax free allowances and tax exemption limits and will be exempt from tax if their income comes to less than £3,400 per year.

It may also be possible in the case of PAYE taxpayers to even reclaim the tax for the past five to six years.

This welcome change is one of the knock-on effects of the High Court Case taken in 1988 by the Appeals Commissioners against the taxing of children's contributory pensions paid under occupational pension schemes.

Points From Dungarvan Traffic Management Study

Further to our report in last week's "Leader" of the Special meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council at which the Dungarvan Traffic Management Study as prepared by Harewood Associates, Consultant Engineers, Galway, was approved in principle, the following are some further points and recommendations made in the study:

● The new river bridge on the relief road is now carrying over 40% of all cross-river traffic, thus removing this traffic from the town centre.

Out of a daily total of 12,760 vehicles crossing the river over 40% of all vehicles and 64% of heavy goods vehicles use the relief road bridge.

● Records indicate that, while traffic on the N25 (of which the relief road is a part) decreased slightly during the early 1980s, there has been an average growth of over 6% per annum since 1986.

● A one-way traffic system to include the busiest shopping streets to the south of Grattan Square. This proposal would achieve significant im-

provements in the levels of service in the principal streets; but as traffic levels increase it would be necessary to impose additional street parking restrictions.

The one-way proposals may be implemented in two phases: the first phase consisting of all measures except one-way operation in Mary Street and Lower O'Connell Street with the second phase being implemented only after widening of Western Terrace.

● An increasing proportion of cross-river traffic will use the new relief road bridge and Shandon Road (Arus Brugha) in order to avoid the inevitable congestion on the old Causeway Bridge and in Sexton Street. Junction improvements proposed at the

south end of both bridges and altered route signing are designed to establish the Shandon Road link as the predominant access route between the town centre and the Waterford road.

● As part of the proposed improvements on the relief road, it is recommended that the Shandon Road should be traffic signed as the access to the town centre from the Waterford direction and that the Coolagh Road direction sign at the north end of the relief road should be denoted as "Abbeyside" only.

If desired, traffic bound for the town centre from the Clonmel Road may also be routed via Shandon Road. However if Lower O'Connell Street is made one-way as proposed, the need to direct access traffic away from this street will not be as great.

ROUNDBABOUTS

● Proposals to convert a number of key intersections to roundabouts were examined with the aim of reducing traffic conflicts and delays.

Two-Thirds of all urban road accidents occur at or near intersections . . . Roundabouts have a proven safety record when compared with other types of junction. This is because right-turning movements, which are the most dangerous, are eliminated altogether on roundabouts.

● The provision of new pedestrian crossings should be kept under review. . . Pedestrian safety can be improved by the careful location of pedestrian crossings.

Where roundabouts are introduced in areas of high pedestrian activity, such as at the south end of the Causeway Bridge and at Rice's Street, it is preferable from the point-of-view of both pedestrian safety and the free flow of traffic that pedestrian crossing facilities be located some distance from the roundabout. At heavily-trafficked locations, the stream of pedestrian traffic should be channelled towards the crossing by the use of guardrails on the footpath for a distance of at least 10 metres on either side of the crossing. This will also discourage random crossing of the street.

A VERY BUSY PRESIDENTIAL SCHEDULE

When President Robinson pays her first official visit to West Waterford on Tuesday, September 17 she will have a very busy schedule to complete.

She will be in Waterford City early in the morning where she will perform the official opening of the new Irish Epilepsy Office on the Quay at 10 a.m. Then it will be on to Dungarvan where she is scheduled to visit the Augustinian College at Duckspool at 11.30 a.m.

The President's principal reason for visiting West Waterford comes in the afternoon when she will be in Lismore at 2 p.m. to perform the official opening of the West Waterford Heritage Week and unveil the Boyle Memorial Sculpture which commemorates the eminent scientist Robert Boyle and which is located in the Lismore Public Library.

The final appointment in President Robinson's busy September 17 schedule will bring her to Tallow where she will unveil the special sculpture at present being completed by a group of eminent international sculptors who are attending the John Hogan Memorial Sculpture Workshop at the

Tallow Enterprise Centre.

We will have more details of all these official presidential ceremonies next week.

GOOD NEWS FOR TALLOW

This week we bring good news for the people of Tallow and district with the announcement on Tuesday last by Minister for Industry and Commerce, Des O'Malley, that a Dutch firm is to establish a new industry in the town.

Over the past decade or so industries have been set up in the town which at the beginning promised a bright future as far as employment prospects for the area were concerned. But although these were located in a most modern and spacious factory, neither lived up to the initial promise and both faded with the passage of time.

As a result, Tallow, in common with the entire West Waterford area, became an unemployment blackspot and apart from

the very commendable efforts of the local people, particularly those motivated through the Tallow Enterprise Centre, it has remained so up to this.

All the more welcome then will this week's news be that the Dutch Company which will trade under the name, Flair Plastics, is to set up a manufacturing plant in the town with the support of the IDA. The announcement states that the Company expects to create 40 jobs within three years rising to 60 over five years. It will be located in the factory buildings formerly occupied by Bremer Framemakers which the Company has now purchased.

Speaking to the "Leader" on Monday last, IDA Regional Manager Tom McAuliffe, Waterford, said that he welcomed the setting up of an industry by a company of such a calibre as United Industries Nederland as it would provide a tremendous boost for the entire Tallow area.

We also welcome the Dutch Company to West Waterford and hope that it will prosper and flourish and in so doing bring fresh hope and economic prosperity to the people of the Brideside Town and Roundabout.

PROPOSED TRAFFIC PATTERN CHANGES FOR DUNGARVAN

One of the most welcome proposals in the recently presented Traffic Management Study for Dungarvan must be the recommendation to further ease the passage of heavy traffic over the Abbeyside Causeway Bridge.

Despite the claims made concerning its unique aesthetic splendour, the bridge at the Causeway continues to prove a nightmare for the many pedestrians and cyclists who have to pass to and fro over it every day. For elderly people especially and for young mothers wheeling prams it is a most frightening experience to get caught on the bridge by heavy lorries and any moves to ease this position can only be welcomed by all.

Another noteworthy recommendation in the study is the placing of roundabouts to regulate traffic at busy intersections and junctions at a number of places in preference to traffic lights. The rules of the road state that a vehicle which has entered a roundabout enjoys the right of way but we have seen cars absolutely flashing through the roundabout located on the Relief Road at the Spring from the Waterford side with no regard whatever for vehicles already at and about to enter the roundabout in a normal law-abiding manner.

The thing which most needs to be curbed, not only within the Urban area but an all public roads, is speed. Traffic signs appear to have no meaning for a great number of drivers who continually break the speed limit not only in restricted areas but on the open roads as well.

And particular culprits are motor cyclists on their high-powered machines who seem to think that speed limits anywhere do not apply to them. They take particular pleasure in opening up and speeding like bullets even in areas where signs declare 30 and 40 m.p.h. limits. Not only are they a danger to themselves but they are a menace to the general public.

Motor-cyclists seem to forget how vulnerable they are if involved in accidents and in this regard we can only refer to the sad deaths of four young people in motor-cycle accidents around the country last week-end. So all should be warned.

There is little point in Traffic Management Stud-

ies and implementing the recommendations they contain as long as speed restrictions are not observed.

JUDGES OF THE DISTRICT COURT

The mode of address of Justices of the District Court is now to be changed in accordance with the provision of the Courts (No. 2) Bill 1991 passed by the Dail on July 3 and by the Seanad on July 9.

The mode or style of address will change from "Justice" to "Judge." In the Dail debate on July 3, the Minister for Justice, Mr. Ray Burke stated that although under the Constitution, District Justices were Judges, they had been styled as Justices since the foundation of the State.

The existing statutory provisions of the Courts Establishment and Constitution Act, 1961 provided that each judge of the District Court be styled "Justice of the District Court." The Minister stated that there had been recommendations previously to change the style of address of a judge of the District Court and the opportunity was taken in the Courts Bill to make the changes.

The Minister went on to

state that the change in the style of address in judges of the District Court would come into effect three months after the date of the passing of the Bill which means that the rule will become effective as from early next month.

Mr. Burke thanked Deputies in the Dail for the welcome they had given to the proposal that in future justices of the District Court would be known as judges. The Minister said that the change was more than symbolic as 90 per cent of the people who made contact with the courts of the land did so at District Court level. It was important then that the men and women who sat on the bench of the District Court should be addressed as "judge" which was what they were and what the public perceived them to be.

The Minister added that he was glad to have the opportunity to remove the title "justice" — a relic of olden days — from the statute book.

So now from next month the title, District Justice, will cease to exist as it will be replaced by the title "Judge." We are indebted to "Lawbrief" in the current issue of the Gazette of the Incorporated Law Society of Ireland for the foregoing.

ITINERANTS CHARGED AT SPECIAL COURT IN DUNGARVAN

On the application of Supt. Ray McAndrew, District Justice Carroll remanded Mary Ann O'Driscoll in custody to Mountjoy Prison to appear at Lismore Court on Wednesday, September 4. The other defendant, Mary B. O'Driscoll was remanded on bail to the same court.

TRAGEDY AT ARDMORE BEACH

Last Friday a young boy drowned while swimming in the main beach area. Despite attempts to save him it was too late. We can only stress three points (1) Never ignore a cry for

help, even if you think the person is only play acting — Always check — you can't be sure and it may mean the difference between life and death. (2) Children — Never cry "Help" unless you really do need it. Always think of the story of the "Boy who cried wolf". Parents might read it to younger children. (3) You are never too young or too old to learn how to swim.

This correspondent is

speaking for most of the people who live and holiday in Ardmore, that it was a disgrace that the life guards had been sent home the previous weekend. Summer hadn't even ended and children were not back to school — the weather was fine, perfect for swimming but officials deemed it too 'expensive' to keep the life guards on the extra week (last year they did). Ardmore is not alone in suffering a drowning tragedy due to lack of beach guards over the weekend. Ardmore is a large beach area reaching over to Curragh with thousands of people flocking each year for the sun and sand.

Surely it would be a good idea to have three beach guards on at all times; ie. one staying solely in the Beach caravan (to receive any urgent messages) and two patrolling the beach. All should be provided with walkie-talkies so they could respond to give assistance if necessary. Just a few ideas I wish officials would take note of and one last thing The Life Guard hut is for lifeguards - not a meeting point for large groups who might prevent the sighting of a possible drowning.

Sincerest sympathy is extended to the family of the young boy.

REAL ROAST BEEF

WHEN purchasing a beef roasting joint allow 100g-175g (4-6oz) per person for a boned and rolled joint or 225g-350g (8-12oz) per person if on the bone.

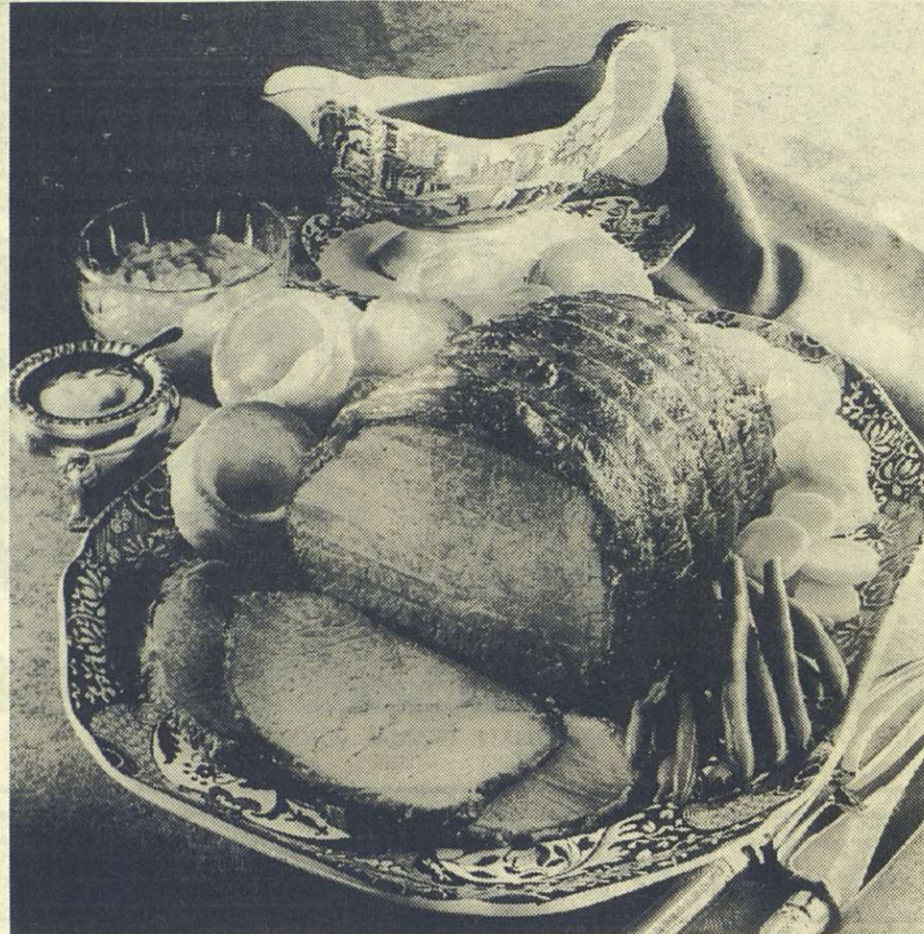
Method:

Preheat oven to gas mark 4-5, 180C, 350F. (For fan ovens, decrease cooking temperature in accordance with manufacturers instructions).

Weight joint in order to calculate the cooking time. Allow: 20 minutes per 450g (1lb) plus 20 minutes for rare; 25 minutes per 450g (1lb) plus 25 minutes for medium; 30 minutes per 450g (1lb) plus 30 minutes for well done.

Place joint, uncovered, on a trivet in a roasting tin and cook in a preheated oven for the calculated time.

An alternative or additional method of checking whether or not the meat is



cooked to the correct degree of doneness is to insert a meat thermometer. The internal temperature readings should be: Rare - 60C/140F; Medium - 70C/160F; Well done - 80C/175F.

Once cooked, allow the joint to stand for 10 minutes before carving.

Serving suggestions:

Serve with traditional accompaniments, Yorkshire pudding, horseradish sauce, and a selection of fresh seasonal vegetables or small potatoes baked in their skins, and a selection of spring vegetables lightly stir fried.

As an alternative way of

roasting beef, rub with crushed black peppercorns or spread with mustard. To add extra flavour spike with slivers of fresh garlic before roasting.

Remember, roast beef is extremely tasty served cold on open sandwiches or cut into strips and stir fry the next day.

Search For Ireland's Outstanding Citizens In 1991 Starts

The search for Ireland's outstanding citizens of the past year got under way in Waterford last week when details of the 1991 People of the Year Awards were announced.

The awards, which are recognised by the Rehabilitation Institute, are being sponsored again by the Voluntary Health Insurance Board. Waterford's Mayor Ald. Hilary Quinlan, was guest of honour at the launch.

Now in their seventeenth year, the People of the Year Awards are accepted as a major national recognition of outstanding contribution to Irish society.

Award winners are chosen from nominations submitted by groups and individuals from throughout the country. Exceptional dedication to others and the improvement of society are

given public recognition by the scheme, as is achievement in sport, business, the arts, science and education.

Previous award winners encompass all these areas of achievement and include major international figures and previously unsung heroes alike. People of the Year Award winners in 1990 include playwright John B. Keane, Irish international goalkeeper Packie Bonner and Kay Murphy who runs Glenravel special school in West Belfast. The Adjudicators' Special Award was given to freed hostage Brian Keenan and his sisters, Elaine Spence and Brenda Gillham.

Grandfather Runs 1000 Miles For CAT Scanner

Brian Bell, a 64 year old "young" former athlete and a native of Dublin is in the process of raising £150,000 towards the provision of a CAT Scanner for Our Lady's Hospital for Sick Children, Crumlin, Dublin.

The CAT Scanner provides three dimensional images of human organs and avoids the need for investigative surgery of heart, brain or other organs in the event of serious illness or accidents.

It is a vital piece of equipment for a hospital such as Our Lady's and costs in the region of £600,000. To raise the anticipated £150,000, grandfather Brian, who set an Irish record in 1954 for 3 miles, is literally running around Ireland. The run started in Artane on July 27 and will finish on Wednesday,

September 18, at Our Lady's Hospital.

Brian, who began his athletic career in 1939, has taken part in 4 Dublin City Marathons and will be the first man to run 1000 miles around the country, a staggering feat for a 64 year old.

He will reach Dungarvan on Saturday next, September 7 and will be met on the outskirts of the town by members of Dungarvan Athletic Club who will escort him to the Square where he will be welcomed by Cllr. Willie McDonnell,

Chairman Waterford County Council and Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, Chairman Dungarvan UDC. Dungarvan Brass & Reed Band and Dungarvan Pipers Band will also be present.

Dungarvan Rugby Club have kindly given the use of their premises for a disco on Saturday night as a fundraiser and will auction Brendan Mullin's in-

ternational jersey and ball at the Rugby Festival on Sunday with former international Mick Quinn "overseeing" the event.

The people of Dungarvan and surrounding areas are asked to show their appreciation for Brian's efforts by donating to the cause when approached by the collectors and by supporting the other fundraising projects over the weekend.

POTTERING in September's garden is particularly enjoyable thanks to its traditional dryness and lower humidity than in peak summer.

If it turns into an 'Indian Summer' stretching into October then so much the better for easing the many chores before the onset of autumn and winter.

Start planting spring bulbs now and remember the rule of thumb that the earlier they are to flower, the earlier they must be planted, so snowdrops and crocuses get priority.

Sunshine

Meanwhile, hyacinths, tulips, daffodils and narcissi can wait until October or even into November, but nothing is lost by planting now if you have time or there is plenty of lovely September sunshine.

You can also sow hardy annuals for next year, such as cornflower, larkspur, pansies and love-in-a-mist.

The lawn should need less mowing and you can start raising the mower blade

height so that the grass toughens up for winter.

Improve lawn condition before the cold weather by using a spring rake or specialist electric mower/rake to remove the thatch.

Doing it by hand is hard work on a large lawn and the rotating tines of the electric rake are excellent for collecting thatch. This is a spongy mass of dead grass, moss and other debris stopping water and fertiliser reaching grass roots as well as harbouring moss, weeds and diseases.

If you are planning a new

lawn or repairs to an existing one, sow seed this month, but new turf may be laid from now until next April except during severe cold.

Don't forget to avoid one of the big chores before winter - trimming and clearing beneath hedges to prevent pests overwintering in the debris.

Varieties

You can also start new hedges cheaply or add thickness to existing varieties such as privet by cutting shoots about eight inches long to leave a small heel of wood and bark where the shoot joined the main stem. Plant these half into moist sand.

Turning to the vegetable patch, you should lift beetroot, carrots and, when the tops yellow, potatoes. Store them somewhere dark, cool and dry and protect from

vermin. Parsnips can stay in the soil until needed.

It is also best to harvest outdoor tomatoes now that nights are getting cooler. Ripen green ones inside paper bags left somewhere warm such as an airing cupboard.

If you aim to raise strawberries next year then clear beds of weeds and their roots, before fertilising with garden compost, manure or peat compost. Water the plants well before planting and keep damp until they are established.

Having to close the greenhouse for the cooler nights is a reminder to overhaul the heat supply if you are a keen greenhouse gardener. A good tip for cutting bills is to line the inside of the glass with bubbled cellotape and packaging.

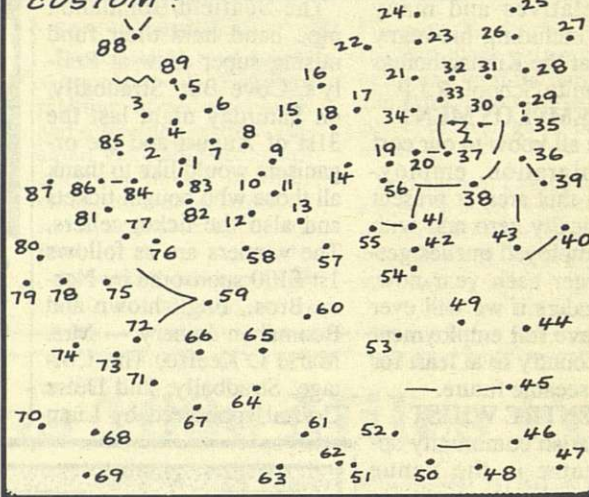

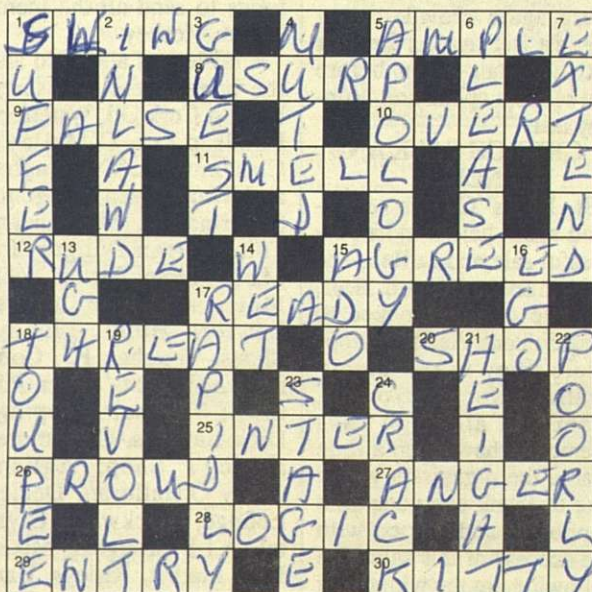

Things began to look up for Ireland when T.J. Kearns won his 110m Hurdles heat, but he was out of his depth in the semi-final. Merlene Ottey of Jamaica, who hadn't been beaten for four years, finally was beaten in the women's 100m Final. The result — 1, Krabbe (Germany), 2, Gwen Torrence(USA), 3, Merlene Ottey (Jamaica). Michael Johnson of the USA won the men's 200m.

DAY 5 — THURSDAY, AUGUST 29

One day of rest later, it was back to business - Sergey Bubka, with his last vault, won the pole vault after nearly 5 hours of competition. In the men's 110m Hurdles Final, Greg Foster piped Jack Pierce by one thousandth of a second, the smallest margin ever in which a race has been decided. Meanwhile, the USSR's Tatyana Ledovskaya beat Britain's Sally Gunnell to the women's 400m Hurdles crown. There was also the first drugs shock in athletics for three years as Delisa Floyd tested positive for amphetamines. The 800m runner, banned now until 1995, came last in yesterday's semi-final.

DAY 6 — FRIDAY, AUGUST 30

What a day! Britain's Liz McColgan won the women's 10,000m, but in an interview afterwards she seemed stunned as she found out what was happening during her race: the breaking of an unbreakable world record. Bob Beamon's long jump mark of 8.90m had stayed unbeaten for 23 years. Then, Carl Lewis jumped a wind-aided 8.91m. But for the wind,

that would have been a world record. More was to come, as relatively unknown Mike Powell jumped a legal 8.95; Lewis couldn't respond. For 2 decades, no-one could come close to Beamon's record and now twice in the space of 15 minutes, it had been beaten.

The women's 200m Final finished exactly as Tuesday's 100m did, while Gail Devers-Roberts of the USA, who six months ago had the crippling Graves Disease, came second in the High Hurdles.

DAY 7 — SATURDAY, AUGUST 31

19-year-old Moses Kiptanui of Kenya won the 3000m Steeplechase while Germany's Heike Henkel won the women's High Jump. For the first time ever, medals were awarded for wheelchair events, a great idea which will be expanded next time around. One black spot though, a Russian athlete tested positive in a dope test.

DAY 8 — SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 1

On the final day, Japanese Hiromi Taniguchi won the marathon in front of an ecstatic crowd, Noureddine Morceli of Algeria won the Men's 1500m Final in Said Aouita's last race, the USA broke the world record in the men's 4 x 100 m Relay and the same country were pipped by Great Britain in the 4 x 400 m Relay for men. Kriss Akabusi ran the "anchor leg" for Britain.

From now on these championships will become more important. Since they started in 1983, they've been held every four years; that now changes to every two. Roll on Stuttgart 1993! The next major championships are the Olympics: next year in Barcelona.
