£300,000 Project To Develop Lismore As Major Heritage/ **Tourist Centre**

comprehensive report submitted to members of Waterford Co. Council at their monthly meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley detailed plans to develop Lismore, which earlier this year was designated by Bord Failte as National Heritage Town, as a major tourism and heritage centre within the county.

The project envisages an investment in the region of £300,000 and a company to be called Lismore Experience Ltd. has been set up to produce, project and manage the operation. Bord Failte has indicated that they will grant-aid the project up to a maximum grant of 50 per cent and Mr. Hur-ley recommended that the County Council should take up 20% of the equity at an approximate cost of £20,000, pointing out that private sector investment **CONTINUED ON PAGE 24**

Bollard Creating Obstruction At Ballyquin Strond Strand

Cllr. P. Kenneally complained at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday that a bollard which had been placed at the entrance to Ballyquin Strand, Ardmore, created an obstruction for a number of farmers from the Old Parish and Ardmore sides who always had traditional rights of way on to the strand there.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn replied that he was not aware that any right of way existed there but he informed Cllr. Kenneally that he would check the matter

Mr. O'Flynn went on to say that the reason for the bollard was that a prohibition order for the removal of beach material from this area was in force.

Cllr. Kenneally said that this should no longer create a problem as farming systems had changed and beach material was no longer used.

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

ABANDON THE LAW AND YOU ABANDON GOD

Isaiah was fearless in his preaching, and, even though he realised that his teaching would embroil him in trouble, he trusted in the Lord. It is evident he had to suffer and experience rejection, but he remained faithful to his mission. Such discipleship would not have been possible without help from the Lord, and this he never doubted. His deep trust enabled him to surrender himself completely to God's work.

Isaiah is a model for anyone desiring to follow Christ. Confidently, he accepted his cross knowing that the Lord would support and justify his work. It is with that same confidence that the Christian offers to serve the Lord. It is obvious that the only useless suffering is that which is neither accepted or offered to God. In the Christian book, all other suffering and pain bore faithfully in God's name is redemptive, and so draws one closer to God.

St. James is saying in the second reading that one's life should mirror one's faith. Hence, if one's life is bereft of good deeds, one may assume one's faith is dead. What about ourselves? Is our life inspired and directed by what we believe? It is a teaching of our religion that faith alone is not sufficient for salvation: it must be a loving and an active faith. And James is saying to you: do you practice your faith? We already know from Paul that faith is a gift from God, and, to neglect living it as prescribed, is tantamount to telling God you do not want His

Our own dear country has been sucked into the stream of creating a heaven on earth. Many, who once served the Lord, have been swayed and mesmerised by its glitter and attractions. One is appalled by the way God's Commandments are ignored and cast aside. Pick any of the Ten Commandments, and you'll find the "golden calf" is receiving more attention! Our age, undoubtedly influenced by man's great achievements and the wealth and the power they have produced, show a marked change in man's relations with God. Indeed, man in his quest for glory has reached unprecedented heights, but along the way he has forgotten the whole purpose of his existence. It is the old story. Man is never satisfied. The successful man does not need God! You see, God has a habit of getting in the way, and so the easiest solution is to give Him a back seat. The outcome is inevitable. Man is bewitched by his false idols. And, there is no place for God in his life. But, what of you? Like Isaiah, are you holding fast to the truths of your religion? I feel that many, many souls have been and

are being influenced by the new hedonism, and will never reach their eternal reward. Human nature is very frail, and unless God is with us as we walk through the valley of tears, we'll fall by the wayside. Then, we'll have an eternity to lament over our foolishness.

THE GATEWAY TO LIFE ETERNAL

We've been talking about the human situation in which the world is gripped, but no matter what success one may achieve, one is eventually and inevitably confronted with suffering and death. Mark in next Sunday's Gospel draws attention to the fact that the Messiah must suffer and die, and in doing so, he emphasises that it is only through Christ's Passion that man is able to find the fulfilment he longs for. Jesus by dying for us extracted the thorn from suffering and death. Death which heralded man's dissolution is now, through Christ having sanctified it, the gateway to life eternal. It is a great consolation and a great privilege to be allowed to offer and join our sufferings with Christ's Passion and thereby share in the victory of Calvary.

Following the confession of St. Peter, when the veil is lifted for the disciples, the Lord asks them to keep His identity secret, but He is very definite that any true follower of His, must be prepared to accept his cross, and follow Him. Christ gave meaning and purpose to all human suffering. Suffering is one of the legacies of sin, so we can feel grateful that now we're able to express our love of God through the very trials that marked our downfall. Mysterious it may be, but it is wonderful to be able to love and to serve God in this way. What a trial it must be for those who are weighed down with trials and sorrows, and have no Simon of Cyrene to help them! Whereas, we have the joy of being able to walk with Jesus as we carry our cross. Remember, two thieves as well as Jesus carried their crosses to Calvary: both of them felt the pain and the burden. One of them offered his sufferings to God, and gained eternal life. The other one could have done likewise, but he chose differently.

Answer - Yes! Under the Holidays (Employees) Act 1973 your son can cancel his holidays by sending medical evidence to his employer that he

Under Social Welfare laws, Disability Benefit may not be claimed for periods of paid holiday leave. However, as your son will in effect be cancelling his holidays, there should be no bar on his claiming Disability Benefit.

OCTOBER 1, 1991 IS "V"-DAY

The United States Embassy in Dublin announced on Friday last, September 6, the opening of initial applications for the AA-I (Morrison) immigrant visa programme established by the 1990 Immigration Act signed by President George Bush last November.

Among the provisions of the Act is the issuance of 40,000 immigrant visas in each of the three years beginning October 1, 1991. In each of the three years, no less than 16,000 of the immigrant visas will be reserved for persons born in one of the 26 counties of the Republic of Ireland, resulting in the availability of at least 48,000 additional immigrant visas for per-

sons born in Ireland over the next three years.

Persons interested in registering for this year's programme should submit applications by mail to the following address: AA-I Program, P.O. Box 60000, Arlington, Virginia 22218-0001, USA. The application period for the first year's immigrant visa programme will be held from 12.01 a.m. Washington

time October 14 to 11.59 p.m. October 20. Applications will be registered in chronological order of their arrival.

Applications received before or after the October 14-20 period will not be considered so success will depend on timing the applications to arrive as soon as possible after the 12.01 a.m. October 14 Washington time opening date.



A WELCOME ECONOMIC STIR IN WEST WATERFORD

For years the economic situation in West Waterford has been stagnating and gradually worsening with the closure of the few small industries which were still providing some small modicum of employment in towns like Lismore and Tallow.

Last week came the first little glint of silver to brighten the everlasting dark cloud of unemployment in the area with the announcement that a Dutch Company was to start a new industry in Tallow with the prospect of creating 40 jobs within three years and the possibility of another 20 within two further years.

This week brings more good news with the announcement by our energetic County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council that he had succeeded in obtaining approval from Bord Failte for a grant aid scheme of 50% towards the cost of a major project estimated to be in the region of £300,000 to develop Lismore which has been designated as a Heritage Town (details of the project are set out elsewhere in this issue).

Mr. Hurley in the course of a full and most comprehensive report on the Lismore project has informed members of the County Council that Tourism commentators worldwide are forecasting that by the year 2000, tourism will be the largest single industry in the world. He pointed out that in 1990 Ireland earned over £1 Billion from tourism and the South East Region of which Waterford County and City is part earned £105 million with the County and City earning £50 million of that. He expects the new development of Lismore as a Her-

Last week came the first itage Town to play a major role in attracting additional visitors to the county in the lark cloud of unemploy-

The County Manager points out that Lismore by virtue of its geographical location will attract support from the entire surrounding hinterland with a combined population of some 400,000. His report states: West Waterford currently attracts large visitor numbers to places such as Mount Melleray Abbey and Grotto, Lismore Castle and Gardens, Blackwater Valley and The Towers. In addition, a large percentage of visitors from the Ferries at Rosslare choose the N72 route to take them to Kerry and Killarney. A well signposted Heritage Town at Lismore would also attract support from this sector."

All this must surely be most heartening news for the people of West Waterford over the past fortnight and it is indeed a most welcome change from the doom and gloom which has shrouded the entire area for far too long.

ROBERT BOYLE, FATHER OF CHEMISTRY

Dignitaries of Church and State will foregather in the Cathedral Town of Lismore on Tuesday next to honour the memory of Robert Boyle who has very properly been described as the Father of Chemistry. The ceremony will mark the beginning of the West Waterford Heritage Week, the official opening of which will be performed by Her Excellency, Mary Robinson, President of Ireland in Lismore Public Library at 2 p.m.

As County Librarian Donal Brady who has been the principal organiser of the programme for the historic occasion points out, the coincidence of the designation of Lismore as a Heritage Town and the tercentenary of the death of Robert Boyle has highlighted the cultural wealth of West Waterford and this first West Waterford Heritage Week has been organised as a contribution to the promotion of that heritage.

BORN IN LISMORE CASTLE

To give readers an insight into the life of Robert Boyle it is worthy of note that he was born in Lismore Castle on January 25, 1627 and was reared by a local country nurse. He was one of the fourteen children of Richard, the Great Earl of Cork, who had purchased the Lismore Estate from Sir Walter Raleigh.

In 1635 young Robert was sent to Eton College and he subsequently studied on the continent of Europe from 1639 to 1644. During this time his sister Catherine, Lady Ranelagh, introduced him to the poet John Milton and other intellectuals of the age. One of these, Samuel Hartlib, encouraged him in the study of medicine and especially stimulated his interest in experimental work which was subsequently destined to occupy most of his life's activity.

In the following years he became established in Oxford University with a growing reputation in the fields of science and

physics. He conducted experiments in which he demonstrated the physical characteristics of air and showed that air was necessary for combustion, respiration and the transmission of sound.

Boyle also discovered how barometers could be used to measure altitude and was probably the first to use a sealed thermometer in related experiments. But the discovery which enshrined his name for posterity was that which found that at a constant temperature the volume of gas is inversely proportional to the pressure and which all young students who take science as a subject have learned, many to their cost and never forgotten, as Boyle's Law.

Robert Boyle returned to Ireland on several occasions during these years, primarily to restore the family estates which were in steep decline after his father's death but he continued to play a major role in academic and cultural circles. He died on December 30, 1691 at the age of 64 and was buried in the Chancel of St. Martin-inthe-Fields.

ORMONDE FAMILY REFUTE CLAIM BY PRIEST AUTHOR

A few weeks ago we referred in this column to the publication of a new book on the death of General Michael Collins, "The Dark Secret of Beal na Blath," in which it was suggested by the Author, Fr. Patrick J. Twohig, P.P., Churchtown, Co. Cork, that it could have been Lismore man, the late James (Jimmy) Ormonde, who fired a transverse shot which killed Collins during the ambush at Beal na Blath in West Cork in 1922. James Ormonde, according to the priest historian was one of a group of Waterford men who were returning home after a period of training under General Tom Barry in West Cork and came on the ambush scene as the action was taking place.

We have now received a letter from Mr. John Ormonde from Grange Park, London and co-signed by Mrs. Teresa (Ormonde) Harrington of Viewmount Park, Waterford in which they refute the suggestion made by Fr. Twohig about their father and describe the assumption made in his book as a travesty of history. Mr. Ormonde's letter states:

"Fr. Twohig wrote to me in 1987 with a brief account that he had spoken to Ed Lane, a cousin of the family. I replied that my father had never made any reference to Beal na Blath to me or any of our family.

"I was therefore astonished and angered that such a conclusion could have been drawn from the unsupported hearsay of an alleged conversation that took place in New York nearly seventy years ago.

confession by my father to my mother of his involvement that I find most contemptible. This is simply a lie. My mother died six years before my father.

"A bias in historians is understandable but they have a duty to be factual. If these extracts from the book have been quoted accurately, then it is little better than "Sun" type journalism with one objective, "be sensational and sell copy."

"As a matter of courtesy and accuracy Fr. Twohig could have informed any of our family of his intention, but he chose not to do so.

"The Rev, Father can still put matters right, and as an Irish member of his church flock, I would expect him to do so, namely an apology in the National Press and the removal of my father's name from the book"

More Memories of Growing Up in West Waterford

THE DAYS OF THE OLD TRAVELLING ••••• SHOWS ••••

As there was no television and very little radio during the decade immediately preceding the Second World War, one of the amusements we all eagerly looked forward to was the travelling shows. These came usually in the Summer when they had broken up after the winter performances in the cities and large towns. The better shows came to the small to medium towns, especially if there was a suitable hall.

Regal in Tallow. Performers I well remember there were Anew McMaster and his Company. McMaster put on most of the wellknown Shakespearian plays. He was regarded as one of the greats in the leading roles such as Hamlet, Othello (my own favourite), Shylock in the Merchant of Venice and Henry the Fourth. One of his great performances at that time was as the Cardinal in a play called Under the Red Robe.

In his company at that time was a little known actor named Michael Williamson whom I remember playing the scheming Iago in Othello. Michael became better known much later as one of the great international actors of all time - his name: Miceal Mac Liamoir. He was in fact McMaster's brother-in-law.

Another regular visitor to the Regal during those years was Louis D'Alton who put on some of his own plays among them being "Money Does Not Matter" and "Tomorrow Never Comes." He also had in his repertoire a number of Shiels plays such as "The Rugged Path" and "The Summit." One of D'Alton's supporting actresses at that time was his wife Ann who on D'Alton's demise married John Cowley and much later became known in every household in Ireland as Minnie in The Riordans. John Cowley is still acting in both theatre and on films.

Others I remember coming to the Regal were the Kerfoots and the Baileys of whom the well known comedian Harry Bailey was one. There was also variety and great musical hall performances from the Lynton Company who were able to put on six different variety shows on consecutive nights.

FIT-UPS IN TENTS

That was all up in Tallow and suited only those who could travel to town. But for those who were confined to their local locality and who had no transport there were other little known Fit-Ups. One I remember clearly was the Joe Costello Company. They came one year and pitched their tent in Connery's acre Those lesser known rural players had to have their own tent as there were very few halls in rural Ireland at

that time. The Costello Company consisted of five people -Joe, his wife and two sons aged 17/18 years and an old actor whose name was never revealed. It was not unusual for them to play double parts and for the sons to play female roles. If one attended every night one could get the impression that there were about ten persons in the company. The plays put on were mostly melodrama. "Murder in the Red Barn," "East Lynn" and "The Talisman" are three that come to mind. They also put on a number of one-act plays supplemented by some variety. They also resorted to one of the oldest tricks in show business - to get the natives to amuse themselves. There was a raffle every night — tickets were sold at 2d each or four for 6d. The prizes were varied but of little value. Anyway the selling of the tickets and the drawing of prizes took about half an hour and that was important.

Then, of course, there were the inevitable competitions. There were singing competitions for men and women on separate nights. We had pipe-smoking, onion eating and pint drinking. I remember the latter very well. There were about ten competitors all lined up on stage with pint glasses in a row before them. One could see some of the competitors smacking their lips in anticipation of a free pint of porter. When the moment came to fill the glasses there was disappointment when Joe proceeded to fill them with water. You could see the look of derision on Jackeen Morrison's face as he lifted the glass to his lips.

The children too were catered for in the competitions. This was announced on a previous night as a "fun game" for the boys. There were about ten of us brought up on stage. We had to strip off all clothes and footwear except the pants. All the clothes were taken off stage where they were tied and knotted together. Indeed some were hidden in

One such hall was the near Moorehill Cross. the sleeves of pullovers. Shoes and boots were mispaired and so on. The prize was to go to the boy who was first dressed in his own clothes. Imagine the bedlam when all the clothes were thrown back on stage. Did you ever see three trying to open the same knot? I can tell you that there was many a shirt sleeve torn that night. I know that I did not win the prize, in fact a red pullover I had been wearing disappeared entirely.

All that was simple fun put on without the aid of electricity or sound assistance of any kind. It is unlikely that we will ever see the likes again. - M.M.

Don't let vermin ruin the fruits of your labour

time and strained backs, aches and sprains are all forgotten as you collect the crops.

But don't allow vermin and pests to ruin the fruits of your labour. Store vegetables under cover and enclose them with a wire mesh screen.

One of the favourites in any vegetable patch will always be potatoes and the main harvest will go on into October as the top growth yellows to signify the end of any of the tubers' growth below ground.

Tubers

Lift the tubers in dry conditions and let any underground damp and clinging earth dry for a few hours before storing. Lift every one of them or the missed tubers will become harbourers of pests and dis-

problems with next year's

Then store the tubers somewhere cool and free from frost, using trays covered with black plastic another shade against light. Jute sacks are an alternative and will allow air to circu-

Most root crops will also be ready to lift by the end of the month. Clean carrots as you lift them and cut the tops just over a centimetre from the top of the crown.

Then store them in trays of dry peat or sand in dry, cool and frost-free conditions

More traditional storage for carrots and potatoes is an outdoor clamp - a shallow trench lined with six inches of straw where the vegetables are steeply piled before mounding over with more straw and a similar layer of soil.

A ventilation hole plugged with straw should be left at the top of the clamp.

Remaining beetroot can also be lifted and soil rubbed or washed, ready for storage as with carrots, but many people like to leave them in the ground until needed like parsnips, but they should have straw heaped around them for

If you grow leeks and celery you should now be earthing them up in their trenches against the onset

With the durable brassic family the threat comes more from winds, so support brussels and sprouting broccoli in exposed posi-

Cool or windy weather could also wreck your remaining tomatoes at the eleventh hour so take no chances and harvest them

Put green fruit in paper bags in a warm part of the house such as the airing cupboard. Contrary to popular opinion, lining them up on a window sill is useless - they need warmth rather than light to ripen.

YOU'D be amazed how many people don't know how to make an authentic French omelette. If you're one of them here's the secret.

Ingredients:

3 eggs salt and pepper 3 teaspoons of cold water 15g (½ oz) butter

Method:

Put a 7in pan over a low heat to get thoroughly hot. Break the eggs into a basin, add water and seasonings. Beat lightly with a fork, just enough to break up the

THE REAL FRENCH OMELETTE

eggs. Put butter in pan, turn up heat and when butter is sizzling (but not brown) pour in omelette mixture.

With fork or palette knife (use a wooden spatula for non-stick pans), draw mixture from the sides to the middle of the pan, so allowing the uncooked eggs to cook quickly. Repeat until all runny egg is lightly cooked.

When the top is still slightly runny, fold over



one-third away from the handle of the pan. Place filling of your choice along the centre of the omelette.

Remove from heat. To turn out onto a warm place, hold the handle of the pan with the palm uppermost, shake the omelette to the edge of the pan, and tip pan completely over so making another fold.

Suggested fillings: finely chopped onion; finely grated cheese, tomato and spring onion, chopped and mixed; or asparagus tips pre-cooked in a little butter.

Serves one.

Small milk suppliers have been demoralised out of production and quota allocation has been used to strengthen further very large producers while the weaker are being slowly but surely eliminated.

The professed concern of Co-ops for the small man rings hollow while the unwritten policy of extermination is in operation.

The farmer board members who are supposed to see the co-ops are run fairly for the common good will have to give an account of their stewardship.

Unemployment In County At Critical Level I in 4 Without A Job

When the Chairman, Cllr. W. McDonnell invited the County Manager to make a statement on job creation prospects in the county at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday, Mr. Hurley said that it was the lack of jobs rather than the creation of jobs they would have to be concerned with.

Pointing out that at the end of July last there were 7,700 on the live register (unemployed) in the city and county (compared with 6,582 last year), the Co. Manager said that this showed the horrific position that 23.4% of the workforce or 1 in 4 were at present unemployed in the county and city.

Mr. Hurley went on to say that he had had meetings with the IDA and other such agencies and a number of prospects had been discussed but the position where unemployment was concerned was absolutely critical in the county at present. While the picture was most depressing to say the least, he said that he would continue to work to see the situation improved and he recommended towards this end that the Government be asked to include Waterford in the Leader Programme.

Cllr. B. Kyne also had praise for the County Development Officer, Mr. McHugh and the IDA although he referred to the sinister turn in the proposed co-ops merger which he said had been entertained and promoted by the IDA and concerning which people who had been in the industry for the past 25 years now knew nothing.

On the proposal of Cllr. T. Cunningham, the Council unanimously agreed to request the Government to include Waterford in the Leader Programme as recommended by the Co. Manager.

It was also agreed on the proposal of Cllr. O. Wilkinson that the Council

should hold a special meeting with all other job creation bodies to discuss the unemployment situation in West Waterford.

And with something like 6,0000 miles of coastline to play with, you've got plenty of spots from which to choose.

Bournemouth in Dorset is a good place to start.

It's been estimated that some 15 million coins and other objects have been lost on Bournemouth beaches during the last 100 years.

Margate in Kent has always been a favourite resort for London day-trippers and modern coinshooters - as they are called - have already found rich pickings in the area.

And there is always the chance that you might find more valuable coins from the treasure-laden wreck of the Hindustan, a merchantman which went down off Margate Spit in 1803.

There can't be many people around who can honestly claim that they have never lost anything on the beach.

Coins, jewellery and watches are just a few of the things people lose every summer which are sooner or later retrieved from the sand by the beachcomber.

And there are even greater treasures.

It has been estimated by a number of authorities, including the Receiver of Wrecks, that there could well be something like £100 million in bullion and jewellery lying in wrecks which sank around our shores centuries ago.

Coins from such wrecks are still being thrown up by the sea and left on some beach to await discovery by some fortunate beachcomber.

Six years ago, one sandsearcher found 363 valuable coins and three gold rings on Portobello Beach, near Edinburgh, after a storm.

Each one was worth several hundred pounds.

So how do you start beachcombing?

Most experts agree that you should visit your chosen site while the beaches are busy

All you need do at this stage is take a detailed note of where the largest clusters of people are gathered.

You should start scanning

in the evening after the crowds have gone, and not in the morning before they have arrived. Otherwise you will find that somebody has

been there before you. But remember, you must always report and surrender your finds to the police.

If you don't you are guilty of stealing by finding.

In the case of gold, silver coins or jewellery, which may have been washed ashore from an old wreck, they rank as Treasure Trove,


- belonging to the Crown. But you will invariably be given the market value of the find if it is considered by the British Museum to be of sufficient importance to be kept for the nation.

If not, it will be returned to you - like all unclaimed after a while. Then you can either keep it or sell it.

Mr. Hurley then informed the Council that at this stage he had sought and obtained approval from Bord Failte for a grant aid scheme of 50% towards the cost of those works and a possibility of a 75% grant for certain works undertaken by the Council.

STAGE TWO

The County Manager's report went on to state in stage 2, the renewal of the canal and the development of the gasworks building as a terminus for the Lismore-Youghal waterway and a craft shop centre would take place. The old Railway Station will house a Museum and Restaurant and it is hoped to provide hostel accommodation in the Hospital Building.

"A major attraction within the Heritage town concept," the report then stated, "will be the provi-sion of the Heritage Inter-Centre. pretation Agreement has been reached with the Department of Justice that this building will be made available in time exclusively to the Heritage Company for its development. Within the building I propose that there will be a cinematic presentation on the multi-vision audiovisual method using large screens and up to ten cameras working simultaneously to present the history and attractions of Lismore back to its foundation by St. Carthage in the 700's."

Mr. Hurley then suggested that the County Finance Officer, Mr. Paul Clerkin should be the Council's representative and liaison officer on the new Lismore Experience Company and he recommended the adoption of the report as presented by the Council.

Representing the Council on the Heritage Company are Cllrs. W. McDonnell and J. Quirke.

MEMBERS' VIEWS Proposing the approval of the Co. Manager's report, Cllr. Pat Coffey said that the problem in this county as in many other places was that tourists just passed through on their way to such places as Killarney and the West of Ireland. "They will continue to do this unless we have something to hold them here," he said.

Cllr. J. Quirke seconded the proposal.

Cllr. B. Kyne then stated that he wished to raise a word of caution in regard to the jobs which were created by tourism. Many of these were in hotels which paid only £1 an hour and such jobs were not much good. He said that this was a position that needed to be monitored and investigated. "It beholds the Council to create quality jobs and not jobs where people are exploited as is happening to a great extent in the county at present," he said.

Mr. Hurley said that while he shared Cllr. Kyne's concern in this regard their only control could be over jobs created by the Council itself.

Cllr. O. Wilkinson said that while he welcomed this news which would have a tremendous impact for Lismore, it should not be forgotten that the three towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow had always gone together and he asked whether anything could now be done for the other two
