Ardmore Loses Overall National Award By Only A Single Mark

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Malin, Co. Donegal, the most northern village in Ireland has won the overall National Award in the 1991 Tidy Towns Competition organised by Bord Failte and sponsored by the First National Building Society with a mark of 192 points. It has also won the title of Ireland's Tidiest Village and a Population Category.

But just one mark behind with a total of 191 was our own seaside resort of Ardmore which as a consolation was adjudged winner of the South-East Regional Award.

The results of the 1991 competition were announced at a reception in the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, Dublin on Monday evening last.

Ardmore also won the award as best town or village in Co. Waterford with Stradbally only again one point behind with 190 marks in the runner-up position and being highly commended. As County Award winner, Ardmore

President Robinson's Hectic Whistle-stop Tour Of West Waterford

Tuesday, September 17 will be remembered throughout West Waterford for many years to come by those privileged to experience the occasion as the day on which her Excellency President Mary Robinson paid her first official visit to County Waterford. In a hectic whistle-stop tour she fulfilled engagements in Dungarvan, Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow. Fortunately the sun shone bright and warmly throughout the day and the President was obviously charmed with the beauty of the countryside as her motorcade travelled from place to place.

The President was accompanied by her husband Nicholas and Aide-de-Camp Commdt. Pat McNally and sharp on time at 11.30 a.m. the Presidential car, escorted by Garda Mo-

torcyclists and Patrol cars, turned into the driveway of the Augustinian College in Dungarvan where she was to perform the first of her engagements for West Waterford, the opening of an

all-weather hockey pitch for the Dungarvan Ladies Hockey Club.

The President made her way on to the pitch through a guard of honour formed by hockey club members and was greeted by a Presidential salute.

Rev. Fr. Pat Moran, OSA, College Headmaster, welcoming President Robinson said that it was an historic day in the life of the college which in the past had always been known as a GAA school for boys. But, he said, just as the wind of change had hit Arus an Uachtarain it

had also affected St. Augustine's and last September the College was opened to girls for the first time. Thirty-two girls were then enrolled but that number had now grown to 93 in a total of 502 students at present at the College.

President Robinson formally cut the tape and Very Rev. Fr. N. O'Donnell, OSA, Prior at the College performed the blessing.

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Call To Adjust Timing At Dungarvan Traffic Lights

Cllr. Austin Hallahan at the September monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council referred to the information provided in the recent Traffic Management Study presented to them. This, he said, showed that much of the traffic which previously passed through the town centre via Mary Street had now transferred to the new Ring road.

Cllr. Hallahan then referred to the traffic lights at the Mary Street - Square junction and pointed out that these were at present regulated to allow a longer time for the Mary Street traffic than for traffic on the Main Street - O'Connell Street line. He thought that in view of the information contained in the Traffic Management Study it was now time to equalise

the timing of the lights at the junction in both directions.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White, agreed that traffic from Main Street was being held at the lights for longer than the other traffic lane and he had personal experience of that.

It was agreed to refer the request to the County Engineer to see what could be done about it.



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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

THE MASS IS LIFE

This is the last time I'll be writing the "thoughts," and I trust you'll bear with me if I deal with a subject that is the very heart and soul and centre of our religion. The impression is about that many teenagers have stopped going to Mass. Indeed, the Lord never said how often we were to attend Mass, but He did give us the Mass to be our main form of worship; and He did declare it was absolutely necessary for salvation to participate and share in the fruits of the Sacrifice of the Mass. The First Commandment binds us to worship God, and not to dare to put any other god before Him. Truly, it is possible to worship God in our prayers, but the fact is, God has willed that we should use the Holy Mass as our main form of worship. It was to be the memorial of His passion and death. Hence, we all have a grave obligation to share in the Mass.

Holy Mother Church, who speaks with God's authority, has interpreted God's will in this matter. She says, all Catholics over seven, unless excused by sickness or any other reasonable cause, must attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days. She makes it clear that to deliberately and willfully miss Mass is a grave sin. It is not a matter of choice, and to say so, would be wrong and dangerous. I understand someone asked Bishop McComiskey "If it was a sin to deliberately miss Mass on a day of obligation" and he replied "It is almost a sin to even ask such a question." To ignore the church's Law is tantamount to saying, Jesus was not serious when He gave His Church the power to rule and guide.

If we only considered who God is, and the privilege it is to be in His presence, we'd walk on our knees to Mass. Undoubtedly, the Church should always be striving to present the Mass to us in the best possible manner. We do not go to be amused. We go to fulfil our duty of worship. I recall seeing a daddy give his child money for sweets. After a few minutes the child was back saying, "daddy, daddy, you take one." Every thing we have, we have received. We could learn from the little child! What better way is there for us to express our love and our gratitude than to fulfil God's own wish. "Do this . . ."

The following, I think, will help. Each morning before Mass I sit down and say "Lord, this is your servant. I'm not worthy to come into your presence. You are the infinite God, and I am a sinner. You did say to people like me, "come to me." So, here I am. Once more I thank you for your goodness, and I beg you to continue to watch over me. I could not manage without you. I do thank you. You are a good and a great God. You are patient, and your mercy is beyond our understanding. I humbly acknowledge my own

helplessness. I am totally dependent upon You. Hence, in my Mass I will bow down before You, I will adore you and I will praise You. The offering I make of the most precious gift you have bestowed upon mankind, namely, the Lamb of God, is a testimony of my love and devotion. Yes, I know it is your dearest wish that we serve you in this way.

When Jesus offered Himself, the Lamb of God, You opened the gates of Heaven to man. When we join in the Mass, we could offer you nothing more precious or more pleasing."

GOD'S GREATEST GIFT

Why! even the angels of Heaven, if it were possible, would envy our great privilege, and our close relationship with God. If people only half thought of the honour it is to share in the Mass, and take the Lord into their hearts, they'd be so filled and over-powered with love that Communion would be their life. It is important to remember, when we share in the Mass, the same Lamb that was offered on Calvary is the victim. It is not a new and different offering, but somehow and in some way we participate in the Sacrifice of Calvary. And, we could have no better authority for this than God Himself. It is mysterious, but there is no bounds to the power of God. Naturally, God our Father will be pleased with our participation in this great act of worship. It is an opportune time to open our hearts, and ask for help. Above all, we should ask Him to fill our hearts with His love. I am sure it is very painful to God to see His friend leave Him. It is a frightful insult to hear people say "the Mass, which is everything, means nothing to them." To them I say, get down on your knees and beg for pardon. Don't throw away the greatest gift that God has bestowed upon you.

Auditor's Report On Urban Finances

In the course of his report on the finances of Dungarvan Urban Council for the 2 years ending December 31, 1990, presented to the members at the Council's September monthly meeting, Mr. John C. O'Brien, Local Government Auditor stated that the overall standard of revenue collections improved over the two year period from an average of 88.46% in 1988 to an average of 92.31% in 1990. As a result the total of arrears outstanding at the end of the year decreased from £103,370 (9.72%) in 1988 to £86,058 (6.6%) in 1990.

Arrears of Service Charges, the report then stated, amounting to £57,055 accounted for 66.3% of the total arrears of £86,058 at December 31, 1990. A specific exercise will be undertaken during 1991 in order to identify Service Charge arrears which have arisen out of the non-claiming of Waivers by those entitled to them as distinct from those caused by a hard-core of non-payers.

The report also pointed out that in the 2 years, the Council provided 7 new houses and the housing stock at December 31,

1990 comprised 338 rental, 226 on tenant purchase and 309 redeemed or sold outright, making a total of 883.

The report was adopted

unanimously and on the proposal of Cllr. B. Kyne, the Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White and staff were congratulated on the excellence of the report.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I am single, aged 68 and am no longer able to work my farm. So, I have let the land and this brings me in about £3,500 per year. I intend leaving this land to my nephew who lives abroad. If I transfer the farm to him now will I be able to get the Non-Contributory Old Age Pension?

Answer — No! You will not be entitled to the Non-Contributory Old Age Pension. Under the Social Welfare Acts, where property or assets are given away in order to get a pension, that transfer will be disregarded. An exception to this may be made where a farm of less than £30 valuation is transferred to a son or daughter. Even in this case the pension could be refused if the son or daughter was not working the land.

You were very prudent to look into this before taking such a drastic step. We have numerous enquiries from people who have transferred their property and been refused the pension.

Other factors you should consider are that the land could be sold and the proceeds used to:

- (a) Buy a smaller house elsewhere and depending on the amount of capital you have after purchasing the other house you might be eligible for some amount of pension.
- (b) If your health deteriorated you might like to go into a private nursing home.
- (c) You might like the person who looks after you in your final years to benefit from your estate.

Our advice to anybody considering transferring property in order to get a pension would be to get independent advice which is available from Macra na Feirme, Teagasc, Irish Farmers' Association.

2 Years Jail Sentence For Sexually Assaulting Young Girls

Michael Hogan (61) Ballinacourty, Dungarvan, an Irish dancing teacher, pleaded guilty at Dungarvan District Court to seven charges of sexually assaulting five young girls aged between 9 and 13 years contrary to Section 2 of the Criminal Law (Rape) Amendment Act 1990.

The Court was told that the offences occurred on dates between August 1990 and May 31 last and mostly in the defendant's van as he drove the girls home after they had attended his dancing classes. One of the girls aged 10 was stated to have been sexually assaulted on three occasions in March and April last.

Although the hearing was held in camera, Judge G. Haughton allowed the mothers of all five girls (two of them sisters aged 11 and 12) to be present as well as one of the fathers. He also granted permission to Mr. Gerry McCullagh, solr., to keep a watching brief, but turned down his application to make representations on behalf of the parents.

Mr. Niall King, solr., defending objected to Mr. McCullagh's application, and the Judge told Mr. McCullagh that allowing him to keep a watching brief was as far as he could go.

As Supt. Ray McAndrew, who prosecuted, outlined the facts of each case some of the parents wept.

Mr. King for the defendant, a bachelor, told the court that Hogan had been an Irish dancing teacher for 40 years and had had considerable successes in that time. He had fully co-operated with the garda investigations and freely admitted the offences to them when interviewed.

Mr. King said that as a result of the whole affair Hogan had suffered considerable ill-health and has had to have medical and psychiatric treatment.

"I would suggest that none of the children have been adversely affected by the offences," Mr. King went on. "The defendant is held in the highest of esteem by the clergy and by other people in high authority within the community."

NIGHTMARES AND SLEEPLESS NIGHTS

Mr. King said Hogan is very embarrassed and very sorry for what had happened. His livelihood would now be adversely affected and socially too he would be affected. "But for these unfortunate offences he would be seen as a person of very high calibre in the community," he added.

Invited by the Judge to address the court if they wished, one mother told of the nightmares her 10-year-old daughter is now having. She is also receiving counselling from the South Eastern Health Board, and the whole thing had seriously affected the entire family.

Another mother, weeping openly, told of her daughter's sleepless nights and is now on sleeping tablets. "She is also receiving counselling, but she will never be the same girl again."

The mother of the 11 and 12-year-old girls said both

children were outgoing before these sexual assaults but now they were withdrawn.

Judge Haughton said all the girls had been put in the care and trust of Hogan by their parents and he had then been in flagrant breach of that trust. Stating that he believed the maximum two-year sentence he could impose was not enough, Judge Haughton said that were he to refuse jurisdiction in the case and send it to the Circuit Court he would be causing still fur-

ther trauma for the girls and their families. "I want to save them that," he said.

Judge Haughton then sentenced Hogan to one year's imprisonment on each of the seven charges. However he ordered that in the case of the 10-year-old, who had been sexually assaulted three times, two of the sentences will run consecutively.

Recognisances in the defendant's own bond of £1,000 and two independent sureties of £500 each were fixed in the event of an appeal.

Ballinroad Sewerage Scheme Operational By Christmas?

At the September monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. B. Kyne asked when the Ballinroad Sewerage Scheme treatment works would be completed and the new system operational and also whether the roadway on the route of the scheme would require further reinstatement.

Replying to the query, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn confirmed that a contractor had now been selected and sanctioned. He said that work on the project should start almost immediately and was expected to be completed early in 1992. "In fact," Mr. O'Flynn stated, "it is possible that the scheme could be opera-

tional by Christmas."

Mr. O'Flynn also confirmed that further reinstatement would be carried out on the roadway affected by the scheme.

Cllr. Kyne thanked the County Engineer for this information and stressed that it was vital that work on the scheme be completed as soon as possible.

Acute Water Shortage In Ardmore During Summer

Moving a motion at the September monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran proposed that the Department of the Environment be requested to provide funding to resolve the chronic water supply problems in Ardmore and Grange.

Cllr. O'Halloran said that a water shortage was experienced over the entire area and during the months of June, July and August the position was entirely unacceptable for locals as well as for visitors. "Ardmore," he said, is our finest resort in West Waterford and it was a great drawback when they suffered from this water shortage throughout the summer."

Mr. John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer, said that over the

August Bank Holiday week-end there had been over consumption in the lower areas of Ardmore and the situation was aggravated by the big number of caravans in the locality. He agreed that some alterations were needed but said that by and large the situation was alright now.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that some of the caravan parks in the

Ardmore area were "over-caravanned" during the summer and the use of water had been very high. He said that the numbers should be reduced for the future and suggested that the caravan park owners should install their own tanks to cater for peak periods.

The motion was seconded by Cllr. P. Kenneally and passed.

3 Months Detention For Dungarvan Man

"To describe this young man as a lout would be putting it mildly," Judge G. Haughton stated at Dungarvan District Court last week when he sentenced 20-year-old Frankie Keniry, 19 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan to three months detention.

Keniry was convicted of causing malicious damage to the amount of £129 to an unmarked garda patrol car on August 10.

He was also convicted of using threatening and abusive language to Garda Timmy Murphy on two occasions.

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

LARGE CROWD AT MOUNTAINSIDE CEREMONY

One of the largest crowds seen for many years took part in the annual commemoration in honour of the late General Liam Lynch at his

monument on the Knockmealdown Mountains overlooking Newcastle.

A spirited and interesting oration was delivered by well-known historian and author Uinsinn Mac Eoin. He spoke of the life and untimely end of the I.R.A. Chief of Staff and he traced the last weeks of the Civil War to the fatal morning when Liam Lynch and his comrades were retreating on the slopes of the Knockmealdown's the morning of the April 10th, 1923. They were pursued by a large detachment of the Free State Army. After an exchange of fire Lynch fell mortally wounded from a single shot and he died that evening in St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel. He was buried in the Republican plot in Kilmcrumper Churchyard outside Fermoy.

Mr. Enda O'Riordan, Clonmel and formerly of Newcastle, made a strong appeal for opposition to extradition and appealed for support for the national protest march to take place in Dublin on September 28. Mary Healy, Fethard, laid a wreath on behalf of the Republican Movement. The presiding Chairman was Mr. Patrick O'Donnell, Fethard.

Waterford and Avonmore Co-ops Abandon Merger Plans

Merger talks designed to form Ireland's largest food and dairying company have been abandoned by the parties involved, Avonmore Foods and Waterford Foods, according to a joint statement issued by both sides last Thursday.

The year-long discussions, which were only formally confirmed back in May, were terminated "by mutual agreement," according to both companies.

The two also unfurled much better first-half trading results last Thursday.

Waterford's pre-tax profits beat market expectations by doubling to £7.7 million, but Avonmore's were just a shade down on expectations — despite showing a solid 30% rise to £6.6 million.

In a joint statement, the two groups said the talks were undertaken "within an amicable and positive framework," but that it had not proved possible to achieve the shared aspiration of a 50/50 merger.

The statement said "...it has been found that a merger on this basis would not be possible at this time."

This implies that the stumbling block was one of evaluation — one company or both of them placing a value on their business which the other could not accept.

This may have been the key element, but industry sources suggest that a clash of cultures was probably a factor.

"Both companies have very different management styles," was how one food analyst saw it yesterday.

"Avonmore is headed up by a strong leader (Pat O'Neill) supported by a closely-knit team, whereas Waterford is more a collection of strong individuals under Stephen O'Connor."

Knitting the two styles together was clearly impossible.

Michael Murray, a 52 year old unemployed roofer, of Kilcalf West, Tallow, pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol at Kilmore, Tallow, on May 24.




The President then made a tour of the pitch meeting the students, people and finally the College staff before departing.

PENSMAN Takes You . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

THE FAILURE OF CO-OPS MERGER TALKS

Commenting on the failure of merger talks between Waterford Foods and Avonmore last week, the IDA which had played a major role in getting the giant dairy groups to the negotiating table in the first instance said that the formation of three super co-ops in the country was as relevant now as it ever was.

It was on Wednesday morning of last week that the eventful decision was reached when the financial advisers to both groups met in the IDA headquarters at Wilton Terrace in Dublin to set valuation terms for the merger. A suggestion of a 60/40 split in favour of Waterford was put forward and although this was merely a bargaining position it was accepted that the gap between the sides was too great to bridge and the meeting ended on that note.

The parties met again in Clonmel early on Thursday morning but although the Waterford side made several suggestions in an effort to revive the plan again, the position could not be retrieved.

IDA Manager of the Food and Agribusiness Division, Michael Duffy, under whose chairmanship the merger negotiations took place described the failure of the talks as a "lost opportunity" not just for the two companies but for the country. He said that in deciding not to merge, Waterford and Avonmore had bucked the E.C. trend where there is growing fear among food groups double

the size of Waterford and Avonmore combined that they are not big enough to withstand the Europe of post 1992.

But while the failure of the merger talks was accepted with dismay and great disappointment in many influential quarters, the news was greeted with a certain amount of relief among the middle management and general workforce of Waterford Foods where it was felt that the merger would have had its greatest affect in job losses. Many of the business firms in Dungarvan were also not sorry about the breakdown as such job losses would further hit the economy of the town and district which, at present, is far from good.

District Officer of the A.T. & G.W. Union, Tony Mansfield referred to this when, commenting on the abandonment of the merger plan, he said that if the headquarters of Waterford Foods was moved from Dungarvan, as it would be if the merger talks had been successfully concluded, he could not see the IDA being able to replace the type of jobs that would be lost. "That," said Mr. Mansfield, "would have been a

major body blow for Dungarvan."

Following the announcement of the failure of the Waterford-Avonmore talks, rumours have begun to circulate that an alternative merger deal with the giant Cork Co-op, Golden Vale, is under discussion but a Waterford spokesman stated on Friday last that they had no plans to pursue further merger talks. "There is no foundation for suggesting Waterford are in discussion with Golden Vale or anyone else," he stressed. And so that's how matters stand as of now.

BEWARE OF UNSCRUPULOUS MONEYLENDERS

A case at a recent sitting of the District Court in Waterford City has focussed attention on the exorbitant interest charges which many people, unfortunate enough to fall into the hands of unscrupulous moneylenders, have to pay. The case concerned the application by a man in the moneylending business for the renewal of his licence.

The application was opposed by the Garda Authorities on the basis that in effect the moneylender charged a total of 64 per cent interest per annum as he included a 25 per cent collection fee on top of the 39 per cent legal maximum permitted. The moneylender admitted that this was so but his solicitor stated that he had charged the additional 25 per cent collection fee on the assumption that it was lawful and that he understood this was standard practice among moneylenders.

It was only when the moneylender gave an undertaking to the Court that he would cease charging the collection fee and that he would refund all money collected by way of service charges and where there were clients who could not be contacted he would make a contribution in kind to the St. Vincent de Paul that the Court granted the renewal of the licence.

We welcome and applaud this decision by the Court and hope that all concerned will take due note of it.

An article in the current issue of the Abbeyside Parish News under the title "A Perspective On Moneylending" also deals with the problems which many people encounter when they deal with door-to-door salesmen who offer loans. It points out that the St. Vincent de Paul Society encounters many people who have problems repaying debts and is endeavouring to help them through the

Loan Guarantee Fund. This is a fund setup by the Department of Social Welfare and operated by the Society.

The article points out that most moneylending problems are caused by poor understanding on the part of the borrowers who take on loans without checking on the full cost. It then gives a number of examples, one of which shows that a £100 borrowed for 50 weeks from a door-to-door loan group calls for a total repayment of £156.50 while the repayment on the same amount borrowed over a similar period from a Credit Union would be £105.94. That's a very great difference.

The article then states that the best advice the St. Vincent de Paul Society can give to people is to save up the money needed in the first instance but if they have to borrow, then to go the their Credit Union. Never borrow or buy from door-to-door salesmen without checking out a few things such as, how much would the item cost in the local shops, find out the cost of the item at the door and what the sum total of the repayments will come to and if there is a collection fee.

Anyone who may be in difficulties with a moneylender at present is then advised to contact the local St. Vincent de Paul Society or Credit Union. This is good advice which we whole-heartedly recommend to anyone unfortunate enough to have to deal with moneylenders who charge excessive interest rates.

A WINNER IN GREECE

Fermoy song-writer and musician Brian O'Reilly and his band, Loudest Whisper, who had been selected to represent Ireland, did us proud when in face of competition from band and singers from all over Europe he won the Salonika International Song Contest in Greece last Sunday in front of an audience of 7,000.

Brian is due to perform in Lismore with the Lismore Youth Choir in concert on Friday night as part of the West Waterford Heritage Week. Without doubt he will receive a very warm welcome from his great number of friends and supporters.

WHO WAS SARAH PURSER?

On the week-end September 26-29 next, Dungarvan Museum Society have organised a four-day programme of events to

commemorate Sarah Purser (1848-1943). We can understand the curiosity this will arouse among readers who are bound to ask who was Sarah Purser and what were her associations with Dungarvan. We must acknowledge our own ignorance of this lady's existence until we got the Museum Society's brochure for the occasion in which the C.V. of Sarah Henrietta Purser is recorded.

Sarah was the daughter of Benjamin and Ann Purser who came to live in Dungarvan early in 1848. They lived in Abbeyside and later leased the house called "The Hermitage" in Abbeyside. Benjamin who had previous experience in brewing was involved in several brewing ventures in Dungarvan and in 1860 he opened a brewery on the site of the present Waterford Foods complex. He was also a corn merchant, miller and baker with a bakery located in Lower Main Street. He had a store in Carbery's Lane and leased Colligan Mill from

Lord Cremorne.

Sarah was born on March 22, 1848 in Kingstown (now Dunlaire) where her mother happened to be on a visit. They returned to Dungarvan where Sarah spent the first 25 years of her life. At the age of thirteen, she and her sister were sent to school in Switzerland where she started to take up painting.

Nothing is known about her work until 1872 when she exhibited some of her work in the Royal Hibernian Academy. In 1873 her father's business collapsed and the family had to leave Dungarvan and went to Dublin where Sarah attended classes at the Dublin School of Art. She went to Paris in 1878 where she attended the Academic Julian and six months later returned to Dublin where she subsequently became a leading light in artistic and literary circles. She continued to be an influential figure in the world of modern art in Dublin where she died in 1943 at the great age of 95 years.

The accepted anthem for all Corkonians, especially those who live in Cork City is, of course, "The Banks Of My Own Lovely Lee." But an equally beautiful song which is not as popular is "Beautiful City" which has, as a sub-title, "My Home By The Lee." We have chosen this then for our ballad corner this week fully convinced that readers will recognise it as a truly lovely song about the City By The Lee and the love for it which Cork people are always ready to sing about.

I have sought to discover a haven of rest,
Where the sun sinks by night in the land of the West;
I have dwelt with the red man in green forest bowers,
Or the wild-rolling prairie, bespangled with flowers;
I have hied to the north, where the hardy pine grows,
'Mid the wolf and the bear and the bleak winter
snows;

I have slumber'd in palm-groves by clear running

We know of at least two motorists who have had the under side of their vehicles damaged when a wheel dropped over the edge. One lady driver who was a tourist had to obtain assistance from the A.A. to get her car back on the road. She had, in fact, pulled over a little to far too allow oncoming traffic to get by. She was extremely distressed by her experience and couldn't understand how a busy road could be left in such a condition. If it is difficult for motorists, pedestrians use it at their peril. The high speed traffic often forces walkers to take refuge on the grass margins, now they have this step to contend with adding to the risk of injury. This problem will have to be tackled, and soon, by whoever is responsible. In the meantime we urge everybody using this stretch of road to be extra careful.

Jail Sentence For Man Who Terrified Cappoquin Children

Schoolchildren froze in fear on the streets of Cappoquin when they saw a 29-year-old local man approaching, a District Court was told last Friday.

Garda Oliver Croke was giving evidence in a case in which unemployed labourer Charles Cullen, Shanbally, Cappoquin, pleaded guilty at Cappoquin District Court to a charge of indecently assaulting an eight year old girl.

Garda Croke said he and other gardai had spoken to Cullen several times and had warned him about his conduct. "When the schoolchildren see him on the street they freeze. They are terrified of him," he said.

Supt. Ray McAndrew who prosecuted said the incident on April 24 occurred when Cullen went into a shed in the schoolyard and grabbed the little girl and indecently assaulted her. It could have had very serious consequences had not another girl bravely intervened.

The Supt. said Cullen lives near the school, and even though the gardai had been continually advising him to stay out of the schoolyard he hadn't taken the advice.

"He is a cause of great disquiet in the town of Cappoquin," Supt. McAndrew added.

MUST PROTECT PUBLIC

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr., said Cullen had a psychiatric history and had been in and out of hospital. However, during the summer when he again went into the schoolyard the Sister in charge had physically admonished him and he had not been back there since. He urged the court to be as lenient as it could with the defendant.

Judge Houghton, however, said his primary duty was to protect the public. He also had before him a psychiatric report which indicated that Cullen had little remorse for what he had done.

The Judge sentenced Cullen to 12 months im-

prisonment with a recommendation that he receive whatever medical treatment is necessary while in custody.

Recognisances in the defendant's own surety of £100 and one independent surety of £200 were fixed in the event on an appeal.

The scheme, sponsored by the Dept. of the Environment, provides an award of £5,000 for the best submission in each of three categories.

The Dungarvan Town Park as reported in the "Leader" special article has undergone a very welcome facelift and now shows a vast improvement towards what it was twelve months ago.

How to keep your garden good all year

SEPTEMBER is really summer's final fling and the tidying of faded flowers and preparation for falling leaves sometimes brings questions for gardeners.

Why go to all the trouble of planting bulbs for spring and flowers for summer? Couldn't it be easier?

Maybe you're starting to feel the back pains a little more and hate the thought of more digging to come during the winter months.

The answer is to plant more permanent and evergreen varieties which will keep the garden looking attractive all year round and mean less work.

With a little imagination they could be used as the basis for boxes and baskets which can be simply brightened up with a summer bloom or two in season.

One of the favourites and

toughest customers is variegated ivy, which can cascade from a permanent basket, tub or window box yet makes a good bedfellow for a 'crown' or centrepiece of summer bloomers such as begonias.

Aurea is another sturdy plant which cascades, and it would bring a highly attractive golden foliage to baskets and boxes.

Dwarf conifers are excellent labour-savers and the range of varieties on display at the garden centres is quite impressive.

Grouping a half dozen would give an interesting and all-year round feature which could be made even more attractive with some large rocks or a paved border.

If you want some colour

amongst them then try planting knots of aubrietia, which will offer a smoky green foliage all year but add pinkish and mauve flowers from spring to early summer.

They are particularly effective if planted on a slope or the edge of a wall to create a cascading effect.

Another alternative is erica or heath, a low-growing shrub which can be mixed in with dwarf conifers and produces white and pink flowers in winter.

If you need proof that a labour-saving perennial/evergreen approach means a garden only of shades of green then try dwarf lavenders or the unusual looking senecios.

The lavenders have a greyish foliage which can pro-



vide an excellent contrast to 'standard' green. Of course, you will also get flowers in late summer and not always mauve ones - there are now white, pink and blue varieties.

Unfortunately, senecios are not as sturdy as some of the above mentioned types and can get badly damaged by winter, but they do produce silvery-grey leathery leaves enhanced by daisy-type yellow blooms in June. And they are particularly suited to seaside locations.

Co. Council Motions

Among the large number of Notices of Motion dealt with at the September monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council were the following:

Bridge — Cllr. P. Kenneally moved that the Council make provision in the estimates to build a bridge on the Shanakill Road at Twomilebridge. The motion was seconded by Cllr. B. Kyne.

The Co. Engineer, Mr. J. O'Flynn agreed that a bridge was needed there. He estimated the cost at £5,000 but said that no money was available this year. He would be prepared to consider it for 1992.

Villierstown Water Pipe — Proposed by Cllr. Kenneally and seconded by Cllr. L. Hart, "that provision be made in the estimates to replace the old water pipe leading to houses near Villierstown Quay."

The Co. Engineer said that this would cost £10,000 and again it was a question of funds. He said that they would scour the pipe to clean it and look at the position again next year.

Education Grants — Cllr. B. Kyne moved that the Council ask the Minister for Education to take nett income as the income limit in calculating third level education grants. He said there was a great anomaly in the processing of such grants at present.

The motion was seconded by Cllr. P. Coffey and passed.

Public Toilets — Cllr. Nora Flynn proposed that the Council provide public toilets in Cappoquin. She said that large crowds

passed through the town regularly on their way to Melleray and the fact that there were no public toilets in the town was the cause of great embarrassment to visitors.

Cllr. O. Wilkinson seconded the motion.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Hurley asked the Councilors if they would identify a site in the town for public toilets which would be acceptable to everybody.

Abandoned Homes — Cllr. Nora Flynn proposed that the Council compile a register of abandoned homesteads with the aim of acquiring them where owners were willing to sell.

Cllr. Flynn said that there was a big number in Cappoquin and she felt that something should be done about them "as we don't want to leave the fabric of the town fall down around us."

Cllr. W. McDonnell, Chairman, asked for particulars of derelict sites in Tallow, Lismore and Cappoquin and what action the Council proposed to take in the matter.

The Co. Manager said that they were dealing with those matters under the new Derelict Sites Act which was now law. A register of derelict sites was being prepared and this showed 12 in Tallow, 9 in Lismore and 6 in Cappoquin.

He agreed to report progress in the situation to the Council on a quarterly basis.

Chairman's Refusal To Receive Deputation Described As Disgraceful And Unfair

Arising from a request by residents of Caseyville to have a deputation received at the September monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, the Chairman Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that he had turned down the request because of the length of the agenda to be dealt with at the meeting which was the last to be held before the Annual Conference of Municipal Authorities took place in Dungarvan and in the organisation of which the Council was heavily involved.

Cllr. O'Riordan said that the deputation sought to discuss public lights, roadways and cleaning the right-of-way to Cathal Brugha Place and he felt it was a matter for the Council to first decide whether the deputation should be received.

Cllr. T. Wright described

the Chairman's decision to turn down the deputation as disgraceful and showing a total lack of the meaning of democracy.

Cllr. Mary Dixon thought the Chairman's decision had been "a bit unfair." She said that never in the six years she was on the Council had she seen such a re-

quest refused. "I think the Caseyville deputation should have been received," she said.

In reply to a query by Cllr. Kyne, the Town Clerk Mr. B. White said that even if the deputation was received the position was that the Council had no money to do any road repairs. Mr. White added that he was not aware that any extra lights were needed in Caseyville either.

The Chairman said he felt there was a need for the Council to have a general policy concerning deputations and thought that the Council members should first be made aware of what was to be discussed before agreeing to receive

a deputation.

Cllr. A. Hallahan agreed that it was probably unfair to place the onus of deciding this totally on the Chairman.

The Town Clerk said that under the existing rules, a deputation was to consist of 3 persons and 7 days notice was required prior to that date of the meeting. It was a matter for the Chairman to decide whether to receive or refuse if the agenda for a particular meeting was too heavy.

On the proposal of Cllr. Kyne it was then agreed to receive the Caseyville deputation at the next meeting and that the members be informed in the meantime what was to be discussed.

THERE are so many ways to cook British lamb so why not be adventurous and add a taste of the far east to your repertoire? The aromatic herbs and spices associated with Indian and Chinese cookery impart a deliciously fragrant flavour to lamb as you will find out when you try these recipes.

SPICED LAMB KEBABS

Cooking time: about 10 minutes, plus marinating time.

Ingredients: 225-250g (8-9oz) lamb fillet, cubed
4 x 15ml spoons (4 table-spoons) plain yogurt
1½ x 2.5cm (1") cube of fresh ginger, peeled and finely grated
1 small green chilli, seeded and very finely chopped

CHINA STYLE

1 garlic clove, peeled and crushed
1 x 5ml spoon (1 teaspoon) ground cumin
1 x 2.5ml spoon (½ teaspoon) ground coriander
1 x 2.5ml spoon (½ teaspoon) cayenne pepper
pinch of salt and pepper

Method:

Place lamb in a large bowl. Put the yogurt, lemon juice, ginger, chilli, garlic, cumin, coriander, cayenne, salt and pepper into a bowl and mix well. Pour the yogurt mixture through a sieve onto the meat, pushing it through the sieve to extract all the paste you can. Mix the meat and the marinade well, cover and place in the refrigerator for 3-4 hours or overnight. Remove the meat from the marinade and

threat it on skewers, brush with oil and place under the grill. When brown, turn the skewers over, brushing the meat with more oil. Serve with thick slices of lemon.

Serves 4.

CHINESE LAMB STIR FRY

Cooking time: Approximately 10 minutes.

Ingredients:

1 lamb steak - cut into thin strips
1 x 15ml spoon (1 tablespoon) oil
1 clove garlic crushed
selection of vegetables - which could include:
½ a small red or green pepper, cut into thin strips
1 carrot, cut into strips
small bunch spring onions, sliced



50g (2oz) button mushrooms, quartered
25g (1oz) green beans, sliced/or small broccoli florets/1 small courgette, cut into strips
25g (1oz) bean sprouts
1 x 15ml spoon (1 tablespoon) soy sauce
1 x 15ml spoon (1 tablespoon) lemon juice
1 x 2.5ml (½ teaspoon) five spice powder (Chinese seasoning)

Method:

Heat the oil in a wok or large frying pan. Add the lamb and garlic, stirring continuously until brown. Add the vegetables, except the bean sprouts and stir fry for a further 2-3 minutes. Add the bean sprouts, soy sauce, lemon juice and five spice powder. Cook for about one minute. Serve with Chinese noodles or rice.



The Fianna Fail Party were represented at the burial in Tallow by Brendan Kenneally T.D., Ollie Wilkinson M.C.C., Tom Murray and James Tobin who acted as pallbearers with members of the Tallow Cumann.

Mr. Ned Power N.T. on behalf of Tallow G.A.A. gave the oration at the graveside. Rev. Fr. Walsh, P.P. Tallow officiated at the burial.

He is survived by his sisters Brigid Hurley, Mary Murphy, Ellen Pegnam, Peggy Mathews and Kitty Tobin, Frankie Syng (sister-in-law), brothers-in-law, nephews, nieces, relatives and friends.

NED POWER'S ORATION

It would surely be remiss of us if some one of those who knew him well didn't honour the memory of James Tobin, go ndeana Dia trocaire air, now that we have consigned his remains to the earth of his native Tallow. At last he enjoys complete repose after the fever and the fret of this tortuous world.

I know James from my earliest days in Tallow. Even if we didn't move in the

same circles then or share a common life pattern I always found him very courteous, not in any voluble or gushing manner, of course, but he never failed with a cheery salute. And aftertimes with a corrosive comment, he would summarise most of the morning's news. He was economical with the English language but he could express himself on any subject most concisely and wittily and pungently. His wry sense of humour I came to appreciate very much.

I only got to know him properly after one Tallow G.A.A. A.G.M. of the early 60's. The appointment of an Hon. Secretary was creating difficulties. Well, you see, nobody wanted the job. After the usual pleading, excuses and refusals, a voice from the body of the hall caused all heads to turn as it announced, "I'll take the job" and up strode James. The G.A.A. was no sudden, new found phenomenon in James's life, of course. He had always maintained a lively and informed interest in the local, county and national scene but it was his first experience of the inner workings of the organisation at grassroots level. The chairman of a club sometimes makes the headlines, often for the wrong reasons, and occasionally enjoys a high profile. The best tribute to a secretary is that the organisation's affairs run smoothly and unobtrusively and James from that moment when he sat at the table and took a biro in his hand, immersed himself in Tallow G.A.A. affairs with such consistency and dedication that it was no coincidence that his tenure of office marked the most successful period of the club's history. If all of this was a lucky break for the club, it was good for James too. It gave his life a new sense of purpose and fulfilment. He loved the games and loved his native place and served both with distinction while holding that important executive position.

When the family eventually removed to Dublin he maintained contact with Tallow and yearned for news from the Bride of how the hurlers and footballers were faring.

His other great interest was politics and for James there was only one party that mattered in public life. He gave Fianna Fail unflinching support throughout his life and never wavered in his allegiance, actively involving himself in Dail Ceantair and Comhairle Ceantair affairs. When he settled at Conor Clune Road, Dublin, he continued to invest much of his time in political affairs and became Chairman of the local Comhairle Ceantair. But then he always had the courage of his convictions as he showed when volunteering to undertake an onerous and unpopular task at the G.A.A. A.G.M. and his progressive national outlook impelled him to make his own modest contribution to his country's welfare.

He was very fortunate in that his dear mother, whom I

knew very well, was a woman of great energy and resource and patience and kindness and understanding. This helped tide him over a difficult period of his life. Equally James was very good to her in her declining years. He appreciated very much also how blessed he was to have such a fine supportive family, especially his sisters Brigid and Ellen whose homes were a haven of security and tranquility.

Last Chance For Alcoholic At Tallow Court

Remanding Paul Coughlan, Lisfinny, Tallow, on bail at Tallow District Court last Friday, Judge Haughton directed that the defendant admit himself to an alcoholic treatment centre and remain there for not less than 30 days, and that he also attend for any further alcohol treatment that may be deemed necessary.

Coughlan has been barred from consuming alcohol or from entering any licensed premises while the court case is still pending, and he must adhere to a nightly curfew under which he is to remain in the family home between the hours of 9 p.m. and 8 a.m.

Coughlan was convicted of burglary from a local store on August 22 last and taking a van which he and his accomplice drove to Dublin and abandoned.

The court heard that last July Coughlan had been convicted of a number of other offences including forgery and burglary. He was given a suspended three months sentence on

the undertaking that he would receive treatment for his alcoholism.

After the defendant's father made a plea for his son, Coughlan told Judge Haughton that he would now submit himself for treatment if given a chance.

"I have reached the stage where I would do anything for drink, even rob," the defendant said.

Remanding Coughlan on his own bail to Lismore Court on October 2, Judge Haughton told him that if he is in breach of any of the conditions of his bail he will be sentenced to 12 months detention.

"It is your last chance," the Judge said.

For Germany it was their third victory at Wembley and the only comfort for Wales could be German goalkeeper Boco Illgner. Illgner made some great saves, one in particular from a Platt header, but he

looked anything but comfortable under the cross ball. Hope for Wales? — maybe, but with any team that can afford to use Juergen Klinsmann as a reserve? I have my doubts!

HUNGARY 1 REPUBLIC OF IRELAND 2

By all accounts there was more mosquitoes than spectators when Ireland faced Hungary in Gyor last Wednesday. The home side trying to restore its football standing riddled by scandals of bribery used the game to prepare for their away trip to the U.S.S.R. on September 25. Ireland we all know have to win 2 away games and hope for a slip up by England, more realistically against Poland on November 13.

Short amongst others, McGrath, Townsend, Staunton and Whelan, Ireland proved once again that they can play to a pattern and ended a series of drawn games. Interestingly, only Whelan out with ligament damage, was the only one of the 4 not to be playing club football on Saturday. Was it coincidence or was Jack Charlton co-operating with clubs with two tough games in mind.

Roy Keane and Terry Phelan came out of the game with enhanced reputations and David Kelly of Leicester City got his 7th goal in 11 internationals. Mick McCarthy still not playing first team football with Millwall had a testing return and was exposed late in the game for Bonner to save well.

For me Sheedy was the scorer, but who could blame Aldridge from claiming a goal for Ireland.

Ray Houghton's display confirmed how much he has benefitted from the close season break. One of the questions to arise from this game is David Kelly's chances of starting against Poland on October 16. Slight and not as defence restricting as Aldridge, his ability to get a strike at goal should get him in the team in my view. Goals are needed against Poland and that makes the case for Kelly. Denis Irwin and Terry Phelan had fine games with Bonner strangely unsure but he redeemed himself with his second half block.

John Sheridan, not as effective as Houghton and Keane, was replaced by Alan McLoughlin in midfield. Up front Aldridge replaced Kelly with Quinn, trying hard but having an unrewarding night. David O'Leary played well with McCarthy, who found his lack of regular football telling.

The question now is how will the Irish manager react to this display. The pattern of play will be the same, and if injuries are cleared McGrath and Townsend are sure to get back, but Whelan has to prove his fitness yet. Charlton is slow to change his pattern of play but he must now consider changes to get goals and the two games to come against Poland on Oct. 16 and Turkey on Nov. 13 will test Charlton and his selection to the full.



NEXT WEEK-END

Exciting Fare Predicted For All Four Hurling Replays

Now that all eight teams involved in replays over the week-end, have had the benefit of a trial run, we can presume that each will have prepared plans to outmanoeuvre the other in the matter of team tactics and strategy.

Exploiting weaknesses of the opposition which might have been exposed in the drawn match, will feature high up on the agenda of the pre-match team meetings and in a couple of cases where a video was made players will be able to view their costly mistakes.

Extra time will be played if necessary in all the replays, so results are certain in all cases. This means that by Sunday night the pairings for the senior hurling final as well as the intermediate hurling semi-finals, will be known. It is unfortunate that the senior replays had to be fixed for the same time at far apart venues, but patrons won't do all that badly as it will be possible to see both intermediate matches as well as one of the senior semi-finals.

LISMORE v. TALLOW

Although the standard of hurling did not seem to please everyone in the drawn match, very few of the record crowd will want to miss the replay in the expectation that it will be a much better game. Reports from both camps indicate that each will field at full strength, but there could be rearrangement of placings on both sides, depending on how the back-room people in the clubs analyse the performances of the individual players in the drawn match. Speaking to people on both sides, I felt that each is confident of winning. Tallow obviously feel that they should have won the first game, having taken a five points lead at one stage and Lismore can respond to this claim by pointing out that having been able to cut back such a big lead in a low scoring game, they finished much better and should therefore have the capacity to overcome the challenge from Tallow in the replay. The experience of newspaper people who have very many times previewed replays, is that these invariably turn out to be very different from the drawn matches. It is impossible to foretell how much different this replay will be, but I am predicting that we will see many more scores than were registered in the draw. Reflecting on the respective displays, in the immediate aftermath of the game, I felt that an impor-

tant factor in Lismore's favour on the day, was the absolutely brilliant goal-keeping of Declan Landers, who brought off some remarkable saves. Martin Murphy saved a few cracking shots, as well, in the Tallow goal, but he was not kept as busy as his counterpart at the other end. This may not be a factor on Sunday, but it is a factor in helping me to give the vote to Tallow to win this time. But if I was a gambler, I wouldn't invest a whole lot in the chances of either side. It could be very close again. It could even go to extra-time and on form, both must have a chance.

Cappoquin Club have asked me to request the public to show the same very fine spirit of co-operation that helped to make the management of the fixture in the drawn match, so easy and so successful. In reviewing that game, I overlooked complimenting the Cappoquin Club on the excellent condition of their grounds and for the delightful way in which they organised the arrangements.

MOUNT SION v. ROANMORE

At Cappoquin on Sunday, we hope to have our radios tuned in for news of this tremendously attractive replay at Walsh Park on Sunday and which is being played at the same hour. Both these teams claim to have been unlucky on the first day. Perhaps Mount Sion, who shot a total of eighteen wides as against eleven for Roanmore, have more justified regrets in this regard. 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
