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Historic Day For Murray Brothers And Cappoquin Rowing Club

On arrival at the club, President Robinson was welcomed by Billy O'Donoghue, Club Chair-

man.

In a packed clubhouse the President was introduced to Dan Murray, Club Captain, patrons, officers and members of the Rowing Club, and to the members of the family of the late Paddy McGrath, Club President.

On behalf of the club and local business community the President then presented gold watches to Milo and Pat Murray, the reigning All-Ireland elite cox-

less pairs champions.

Mrs. Robinson then launched the new Paddy McGrath boat in the memory of the late Paddy McGrath who was so tragically killed in June.

Mrs. Nora Flynn M.C.C. presented Mrs. Robinson with a gold pen on behalf of Cappoquin Rowing Club and a bouquet of flowers was presented by Helen, daughter of the late Paddy McGrath.

In her address President Robinson paid tribute to Milo and Pat Murray on their many fine achievements and said she was very happy to share in a proud moment with a small club which has put Cappoquin so firmly on the sporting map. The National Anthem was then played by local musician Tom O'Donoghue after which Mrs. Robinson left for Lismore, the next stop on her busy itinerary.

Waterford Foods To Host Major Sports Weekend

228,000 Acres To Be Resurveyed In Waterford For Disadvantaged Status

"228,000 acres have been submitted to the Disadvantaged Areas Appeals Board and inspections will take place from early November," said Mr. John Cusack, ICMSA County Waterford Chairman recently.

Mr. Cusack said that all those who have applied to the Appeals Board will have their farms re-surveyed and all of the areas qualifying will be submitted to the EC following the recommendations of the Panel.

234 appeals were made in County Waterford and these include 898 townlands and 228,000 acres.

"Given the huge response there is no doubt but that farmers feel that they have been wronged in the findings of previous surveys. In all fifteen counties throughout the country

have made appeals which account for over 3 million acres — these figures speak for themselves," said Mr. Cusack.

TECHNICAL OBSTACLES MUST BE REMOVED

ICMSA Representative on the Disadvantaged Areas Appeals Board, Mr. Dan McCarthy who visited the areas appealing in County Waterford said "if these people feel so strongly about their case, then it is obvious that the criteria being used to determine disadvantage status needs examination. We cannot

allow the situation continue where naturally disadvantaged farms are being barred from the Disadvantaged Areas Scheme, for technical reasons. We must remove whatever technical obstacles are preventing them from receiving their proper recognition," said Mr. McCarthy.

He added that in order to co-operate fully with the official surveyors, farmers should ensure that they

have a record of the number of hours worked by their spouses on the farm and that they clearly indicate the amount of leased land being farmed.

"Disadvantaged Area status is vital to farm families working in adverse conditions in this time of declining incomes. If one farm family is excluded from this scheme a great injustice will be done," concluded Mr. McCarthy.

Motion Passed At AMAI Conference

Among the motions passed at the Annual Conference of the Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland held in Dungarvan last week was one from Dungar-

van Urban Council asking that PAYE assessment be done on the net value of the P60 certificates of earnings for all grant and grant related applications.

Urban And Town Councils To Stay

— Flynn Tells AMAI Delegates

The 78th Annual Conference of the Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland held in Dungarvan last week was hailed as one of the best ever anywhere in Ireland during the long history of the Association.

The Conference commenced on Monday evening with the registration of delegates at the Town Hall during which Dungarvan Brass Band under Bandmaster Francis Kenealy gave a rousing recital. This was followed later in the night by the formal welcome of delegates by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, Chairman Dungarvan Urban Council who were the hosting authority for the Conference which took place at the Conference Centre at Lawlor's Hotel. A sumptuous meal which won the highest praise from all the delegates and a most enjoyable social programme brought the opening session in Lawlor's Hotel to a close and sent the more than 200 dele-

gates with their wives and friends to their beds in happy mood.

The Conference proper commenced on Tuesday morning with an Interdenominational Prayer led by Very Rev. G. Canon Power, P.P. and Rev. Dean Weekes, Church of Ireland, Lismore and with further welcoming speeches by Cllr. O'Riordan and County Manager Dan Hurley the delegates got down to dealing with the conference agenda with AMAI President, Cllr. Tadhg Curtis, Mallow in the chair.

Seventeen motions were dealt with during ensuing sessions of the conference and it was unanimously agreed that the existing urban authorities should not only be retained but up-

graded and given additional powers.

On Tuesday night the delegates were hosted to a dinner at Clonea Strand Hotel which was followed by a cabaret presented by Naomh Padraig Branch CCE and again a thoroughly satisfying and most enjoyable time was spent by all.

Two conference sessions took place on Wednesday morning with the afternoon devoted to a social programme which included a choice of a coach tour of West Waterford including visits to Mt. Melleray, Lismore and Ardmore, Golf at Dungarvan Golf Club at Ballinacourty or a Sea Angling Trip.

CONFERENCE BANQUET

That night the climax of the conference came with the Conference Banquet which was held in The Park Hotel and at which Minister for the Environment Padraig Flynn T.D. was Guest of Honour. M.C. for the occasion was Mr. Tom Keith and when the Grace had been recited by Canon Gregory Power the delegates and guests set about enjoying an excellent dinner.

Afterwards speeches were made by Cllr. O'Riordan and Cllr. Curtis before the Minister went to the podium to address the delegates and it was evident that there was keen interest in what he was about to say.

Minister Flynn quickly became the flavour of the night when he told the anxious local councillors that urban and town councils were not to be abolished. He told the delegates that he would not be proposing the withdrawal of elected councils from "any town which has such a council." And the Minister added that he saw the local elected representative as "the cornerstone of the whole democratic local government system."

To mark his visit to the Conference Banquet, the Minister was then presented with a beautiful Waterford Crystal bowl.

A most enjoyable occasion was rounded off by dancing to Mick Delahunty and his orchestra.

Following a morning session on Thursday the Conference concluded with the investiture of the Association's incoming President Cllr. Dermot Ryan, Kinsale.

BEST CONFERENCE EVER

One local councillor who has attended many of these annual conferences in recent years told the "Leader" on Thursday that the Dungarvan conference outstripped any he had ever attended. "Never have delegates been so hospitably wined and dined," he said.

Credit for the outstanding success of the Conference must go to the members of Dungarvan Urban Council which hosted and organ-

ised the entire social programme for the week with particular credit to Town Clerk Bertie White and as-

sistant Ray Moloney who all must now feel satisfied with the success of their efforts.

Tidy Towns Report For Villierstown

Villierstown, classified as Category A, was awarded a total of 164 marks out of a possible 250 in this year's Bord Failte Tidy Towns Competition. Last year Villierstown scored 160 marks and the extra marks this year were won for presentation of buildings (1), appearance of approach roads (2) and presentation of residential areas (1).

Marks were allocated as follows with last year's given in brackets: Effort 32 (32) max. 45; Tidiness 30 (30) max. 40; Presentation of Buildings (30) (29) max. 40; Presentation of Natural Amenities 26 (26) max. 50; Appearance of Approach Roads 30 (28) max. 45; Presentation of Residential Areas 16 (15) max. 30.

The report of the adjudicators were as follows:

EFFORT

Villierstown looked well this year, improvements to buildings have been noted and additional marks have been awarded. Do keep us informed in time for adjudication of what has been achieved over the year. Your long term plans should feature the further amenity development of both the quay and the village square. It is hoped that the observations noted below will be useful when drawing up next year's work programme. Good luck for the future!

TIDINESS

Litter control was very good during adjudication and there was no evidence of excessive weed growth either. Maintain derelict buildings in as tidy a manner as possible until redevelopment occurs. Car wrecks in the back yard of a new house look untidy and these should be either screened from public view or moved out of sight. A good presentation!

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS

The presentation of the "An Cruiscin Lan" premises is very good and is nicely painted. The adjacent shop should be painted also (the one with the petrol pump outside). The stone cladding of the garage/workshop improves the appearance of this building considerably. The apertures of the vacant "A. Duggan" premises should be boarded up properly and maintained freshly painted together with its fascia board — this stone building is worth maintaining well while it is vacant.

PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES

Green open spaces at the entrance to the village from the Dromana Drive approach road were very well presented during adjudication. Young trees are maturing and are enhancing the environment of Villierstown significantly. Flower displays are attractive. The monument looks well. There is a lot of potential for further amenity development within the village, e.g. both the village square and the quayside are undeveloped.

APPEARANCE OF APPROACH ROADS

Approach roads to Villierstown were all presented to a very high standard during adjudication. The green roadside verges looked neat and tidy. Nameplates and other road signs were clean, well painted and suitably visible. Other items of street furniture such as seating, the telephone kiosk, etc., are being maintained to a high standard.

PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Some of the roadside boundary walls to private dwellings located across

from the large green open space need to be painted, as does the boundary wall of the house across from the "An Cruiscin Lan" premises. Work in progress was noted on a house forming one corner of the square and its completion is looked forward to. The upper half of the house located beside the "R. Treacy's Bakery" premises needs to be white-washed and the blue house opposite needs to be painted. Roadside areas to boundary walls of private dwellings near the school could be improved if grassed. "The Ferryman's House" looks very well especially in relation to its natural stone wall and the flower displays in the garden of a house on the Clashmore entrance to the village forms an excellent introduction to Villierstown.

5-Year Development Plan Suggested For Aglish

Aglish, also in category A, scored a total of 155 marks in this year's Tidy Towns Competition and the allocation was as follows with last year's marks in brackets: Effort 29 (28); Tidiness 28 (27); Presentation of Buildings 26 (26); Presentation of Natural Amenities 27 (27); Appearance of Approach Roads 27 (27); Presentation of Residential Areas 18 (17).

The adjudicator's report was as follows under the relevant headings, the principal recommendation being that a 5-year-plan for future development be adopted.

EFFORT

Community effort is obvious in Aglish Village, this type of effort should be further encouraged.

TIDINESS

At the time of inspection — the village was free from litter. Despite the fact that heavy rain was falling at the time, the village looked very neat and clean. Perhaps, service type buildings could be tidied up a little by way of painting, landscaping and keeping forecourts tidy.

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS

The commercial properties and public buildings are maintained to a high standard. Flower arrangements have been used to good effect. The flower tubs at the disused factory are to be commended but the general area around the building requires further attention, the suggestion of a small amenity area seems a good idea. Perhaps the landlord could be persuaded to invest some money into this. The newly thatched house is very attractive. House painting throughout the village is very effective as are the flower baskets.

PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES

The stream opposite the old disused factory is a very attractive feature. Perhaps,

it could be developed in some way as a feature in the village. Aglish, in my opinion, could be classed as one large Natural Amenity and perhaps could be developed say over the next five years. Therefore, a five year plan could be the correct approach. Tree planting could be carried out in practically any part of the village with good effect, however, I would suggest that it be included in an overall plan, ensuring that good quality Hardwoods are used and not planted in areas from which they will have to be removed in later years.

APPEARANCE OF APPROACH ROADS

The hedges and grass margins on approach roads could do with some attention. I am not suggesting completely manicured hedges but rather left with the natural look by careful pruning. The stone walls throughout are very beautiful and should, where possible, be cleaned of weeds and repaired. I would suggest closer contact with your local authority in relation to approach roads.

PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Community effort is obvious throughout, this is the most important ingredient for success. I would suggest you prepare an overall plan. Keep your community involved and liaise with your local County Council Engineer. Good luck in your effort.

Millions of pounds in fee incomes are being paid to a select coterie of advisers, stockbrokers and merchant banks who apparently have the ear of those who hold high political office. It all shows that the old pals act is alive and flourishing in the corridors of power.

The heading to this paragraph is taken from the inauguration speech of U.S. President John F. Kennedy who told the American public that they should be concerned with what they, individually, could do for their country rather than what they expected the country to do for them. It came to mind as revelations of the millions which a select few have been amassing here in recent times came to light in the past few weeks.

It was another American President, Harry S. Truman who coined the phrase "the bucks stops here" indicating his Presidential desk. We were reminded of this as we listened to Taoiseach Charles Haughey on national radio last Sunday being interviewed about these financial scandals. It was evident from what he had to say that in these cases the buck was going to stop anywhere but on his desk as he disowned responsibility for the entire sorry mess in which the country finds itself.

Without doubt the public are deeply disturbed by the whole seedy series of scandals and cannot be blamed for losing faith and confidence in the Government's ability or will to control the sequence of events which has rocked the country in recent weeks and most certainly has tarnished our international financial reputation.

SIDELIGHTS ON PRESIDENTIAL VISIT

Without doubt the manner in which President Mary Robinson met the people on her visit to West Waterford last week won her widespread admiration and greatly enhanced her reputation as a President for all the people. Last week we carried a general news report covering the visit so we will only deal with a few sidelights of the visit here.

Among the distinguished guests at the Augustinian College in Dungarvan where President Robinson had her first engagement was Fr. F. X. Martin OSA, Dublin, a close friend of the President whose name will always be recalled for his defence of Wood Quay in Dublin.

At each of the venues she visited, President Robinson displayed a fluency in the Irish language which surprised many. She spoke with ease and without hesitation on all occasions and showed that she was as masterful in her use of the Gaedhealg as of the Bearla.

Her desire to meet and mingle with the people and especially children was evident in the manner in which she chose to alight from the Presidential motor car and walk through the crowds.

Everywhere she went she thanked the people for the warmth of the welcome she

received and she spoke of the great community spirit which she found in each of the towns which she visited.

Having overshot the time schedule for the visit to the Augustinian College, the President was a little behind when she arrived in Cappoquin where the entire town and district seemed to have gathered in the vicinity of the Boathouse. Hundreds of schoolchildren, scouts and guides with a huge number of adults crowded around the President as she and her husband Nick and ADC Commdt Pat McNally walked to the Boathouse to make the formal presentation to the Murray Brothers and to launch the boat bearing the name of the late Paddy McGrath.

The President apologised for not being able to pay a longer visit because of the very tight schedule but said that she would take away with her a very special memory of her stop off in Cappoquin.

Again, in Lismore a great crowd had gathered to welcome the President (and here also the children from the local schools predominated) as she made her way to the recently refurbished and renovated Public Library Building. Addressing the crowd she said that they had come to celebrate something which had a very high priority in her Presidency, the launch of the West Waterford Heritage Week. Speaking directly to the children she stressed the reason why Lismore had been designated a Heritage Town and referred to the great resource on which they could build. "If Lismore was located in France or Germany or some other European country it would be written up all over Europe because of its value to those who appreciate archaeological and heritage wealth," she said.

President Robinson then

urged the children to build creatively on the past for the future and told them "beidh me ar ais le congnamh De."

In the Brideside Town of Tallow it was a repeat performance as once again a huge crowd waited patiently for the arrival of the Presidential motorcade and here yet again the President alighted from her car and walked through the cheering crowd shaking hands and waving to everyone. In her address she spoke of the wonderful pleasure it was for her to travel through the beautiful countryside of West Waterford in the lovely sunshine and praised highly the Tallow Enterprise Centre which she described as a great asset to any town where people with initiative would be afforded an opportunity to develop their own skills and learn new ones. Certainly, Tuesday, September 17, 1991 will be a day to be remembered by all.

THE MINISTER'S PLEDGE

Speaking at the conference banquet at the 78th Annual Conference of the Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland in Dungarvan last week, Minister for the Environment, Padraig Flynn gave a pledge to urban councillors that he would not be proposing the withdrawal of elected councils from "any town which now has a council." The Minister's announcement was greeted with applause.

The Minister then went on to say that this was why elections to urban authorities were postponed this year. However Mr. Flynn then stated that "the matter will be decided by the Government in the months to come . . ." Could this, we wonder, mean that the issue still remains undecided?

The Minister's speech was punctuated by generous rounds of applause but we think that his remark about there being "no yahoots" in this country as he was presented with a beautiful Waterford Crystal bowl was rather in bad taste. However that, too, was greeted with a round of cheers and handclapping so it just shows there's no accounting for taste!

the same length on Saturday, September 21. From now on until the Spring equinox on March 21, daylight hours will be shortening as we move into the winter.

The date on Friday last, September 19 represented a palindrome when written

in figures as 19-9-1991. As readers will know a palindrome is a word, sentence or set of figures that are the same when read backwards or forwards. Someone has claimed that the next palindrome date will not occur until December 11 in the year 2111.

Add an extra splash of colour this Xmas

SHOPS and garden centres will be reminding us about now about how to add an extra splash of colour to Christmas.

It comes from 'forced bulbs' specially prepared to bloom for Christmas and the gloomy winter months. They can be more expensive than normal bulbs and will not keep once bought, so plant quickly after buying.

The key to success is to keep them cool and dark - a dark technique known as 'plunging' - ideally at about 40F.

Durable

Plant the bulbs in a durable container which will fit inside the decorative one for indoors, and then plant up before plunging into a dormant bed in the garden.

You need a shallow container and though you can use bulb fibre as the potting medium, you will find that standard potting compost gives more nutrition.

This is important if you want to save the bulbs for



use in the garden in later years - note that you will not be able to force them again for indoors.

Whichever medium you use, put a moist layer in the base of your bowl before placing the bulbs, but do not group them close together or screw them into the compost or fibre as this will compact the material and hamper root growth.

Then firm enough medium around the bulbs to leave the tips showing and half an inch between the surface and the rim of the container. The bowl can then be plunged outside

and covered with about four inches of peat or wrapped in plastic sheet before burial.

However, if you are a flat dweller, prefer to keep an eye on your bulbs, or simply remind yourself that they are around, then you can create the same conditions artificially.

Simply cover the planted bowl with black plastic or several layers of newspaper to exclude light and then store somewhere cool indoors or in a garage or shed.

Efforts

But be warned that any warmth will ruin your efforts to fool the bulbs into believing they are passing through winter.

If you are forcing the bulbs for Christmas you then need to wait until the shoots are an inch high or until the end of November, whichever is earliest.

Then move into shade in a cool room for five days before placing the bowl near a window to strengthen the leaves. When flowers start to develop, move to the display spot - somewhere bright yet not in direct sun and away from draughts and heaters. The ideal temperature is 60-70 F.

Keep turning the bowl regularly to prevent the plants growing unevenly by leaning towards the strongest light. Yellowing leaves can be a sign of too little light or, possibly, draughts.

Beware of overwatering and causing rot. Once the flowers are spent you should cut them but continue feeding foliage while it lives, so that the bulbs rebuild strength. They can be dried afterwards ready for planting in the garden next autumn.

The old national school which stood at the Pond for generations came to an end when the Boys and Girls schools were transferred to the new building in Sheare's Street in 1957. Twelve years later in 1969 the school at Ballinacourty was amalgamated with Abbeyside and the building there closed with the pupils being taken in to Abbeyside by school bus. The boys and girls schools were then integrated and the school has since been co-educational.

The centenary celebrations commenced at the school last Friday morning with a party sponsored by the organising committee for all the pupils and that night over 200 people attended a most enjoyable dinner and social in Lawlor's Hotel at which the one and only Danny Leni-

han acted as M.C. and ensured that the merriment was kept at its highest

from beginning to end. Also there was Tadgh O'Reagain formerly from

Abbeyside who was in great voice and regaled the attendance with several

songs.

On Saturday there was an open day at the school when large numbers visited and recalled memories of the past as they inspected old registers and roll books of years gone by.

On this Friday night, September 27, the Committee under the Chairmanship of Mr. Phil Duggan will launch a book, "School Days In Abbeyside 1891 - 1991," at a function in Lawlor's Hotel. The book

covers a history of the schools in the Village over the past 100 years with recollections and photos that should prove of immense interest to all associated with Abbeyside. The Committee are hoping for a great lot of support for the book which will sell at £3. Light refreshments will be served at the function which is timed to start at 8.30 p.m. and to which there is an open invitation.

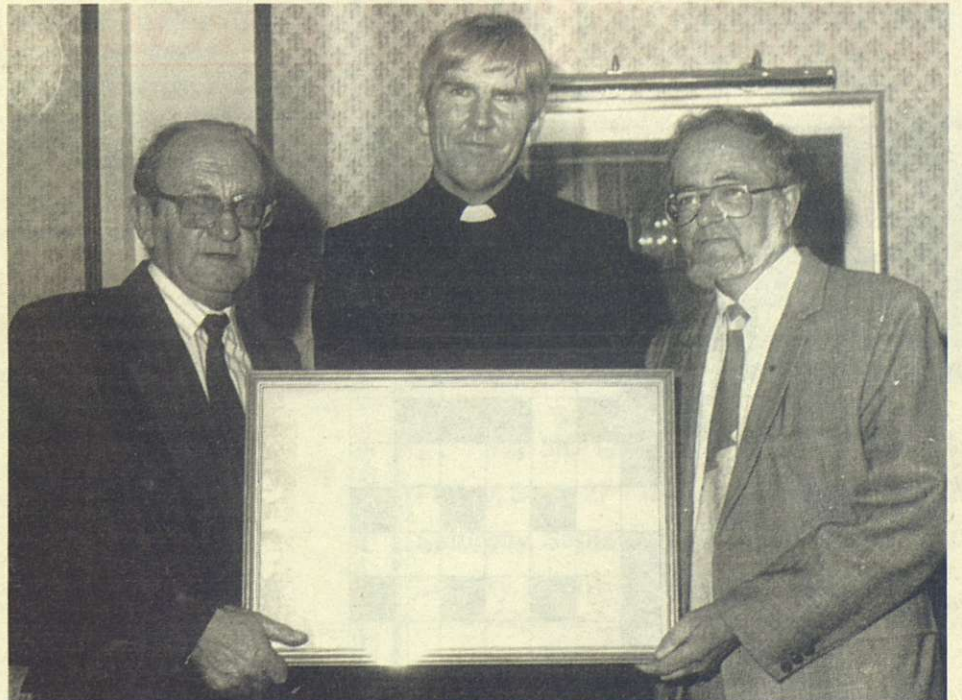

MICHAEL Jackson does not like being touched by anything, but lets his kiss him. Hollywood star Kim Novak turned down a big TV soap contract - to spend more time raising hers. And one, bearing the name Fergie, Duchess of York, was snapped up at auction for more than £20,000.

What are they? Llamas, those humpless ruminants from Peru which combine the affection of a dog, the independence of a cat, the stubbornness of a goat and the toughness of a donkey.

And in America they've become the number one status symbol since pop megastar Michael Jackson bought some as pets. Having one of those long-necked, quizzical pack animals wandering around your garden is the latest in hollywood one-upmanship. And at around £50,000 for the best types, it's no wonder llama-breeding is a multi-million-dollar business there.

Hollywood's hot pets



In Britain, too, llama-keeping is on the increase and it's estimated that there are around 800 of them, not in back gardens, but mostly on private smallholdings, or with those people who have a few spare acres.

Such is the interest that the British Camelids Owners and Breeders Association has been formed with 100 members.

Says Association secretary Pam Walker, a deer breeder from Horsham Sussex: "Anybody who has looked after horses probably has good llama sense. They are excellent animals and

full of good sense; loyal, aloof yet happy creatures."

But she warns prospective buyers that not all llamas are well behaved. A young male who is over friendly might well become nasty tempered and knock you about when he's older, she says.

Treated well and correctly, however, most experts agree that llamas are gentle and shy. According to Professor Philip James who has been studying the creatures at the Rowett Research Institute in Aberdeen, they are extremely docile and respond well to kindly treatment.

In their native South America, where they are mostly beasts of burden owned by not the most patient of people, they have a reputation for viciousness and when upset, can spit with deadly accuracy.

Apart from being a rich man's pet, llamas are kept for their highly-prized fleece. The yield of fleece varies from about two to five kilograms a year and can be worth up to £2.50 an ounce. So a good crop could be worth £400 or more.

There are different kinds of llama including the alpaca, the most expensive (one could set you back more than £10,000) because of its excellent wool; the vicuna, a protected species, and the guanaco, a wild variety for which you must have a licence.

Llamas cannot be bought from their native countries. Import is banned because of endemic foot and mouth disease. Many of those in Britain originated from Swe-

den, Holland and Poland and are now mostly bred locally.

Llamas, surprisingly, don't mind the British climate and are easy to rear, eating short grasses or food prepared for sheep or goats. They mix happily with other animals and are happy to be led on a rope and head collar and will easily carry loads up to 80lb.

Many British farmers are taking a keen interest in the llama because it can be put out to grass on the poorest quality land and give a good return with their fine, silky fleeces.

The fleece can be made into carpets as well as clothes. And it is stronger than sheep's wool. A pair of llama-fleece socks, for instance, is said to last longer than 30 ordinary pairs on sale in chain shops.

A good quality llama coat in the West End can set you back £2,000.

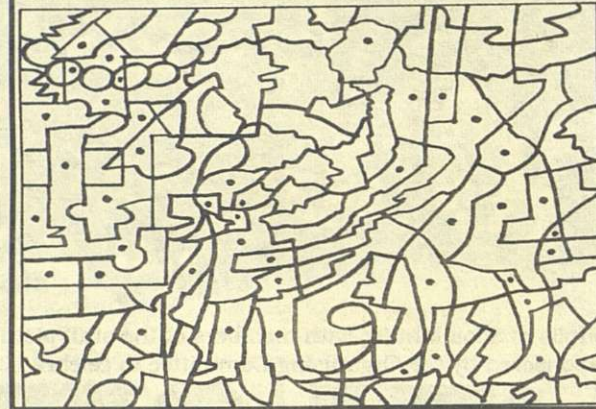
Some farmers are also considering using llamas as sheepdogs. Said one: "The way to protect lambs against foxes may be to have a llama in the flock. Not only do they spit when upset or annoyed, but they also snort, hum, grumble, click and, in distress, scream. They can also lash out with their feet."

Wyoming sheep farmer John Lye had been losing so many of his herd due to coyotes, he introduced three llamas to his flocks.

It proved to be the perfect answer. The llamas fought back with their spits and kicks and sent the coyotes packing.

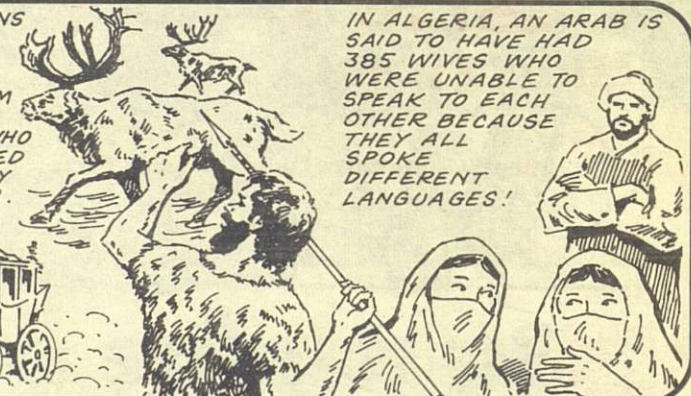

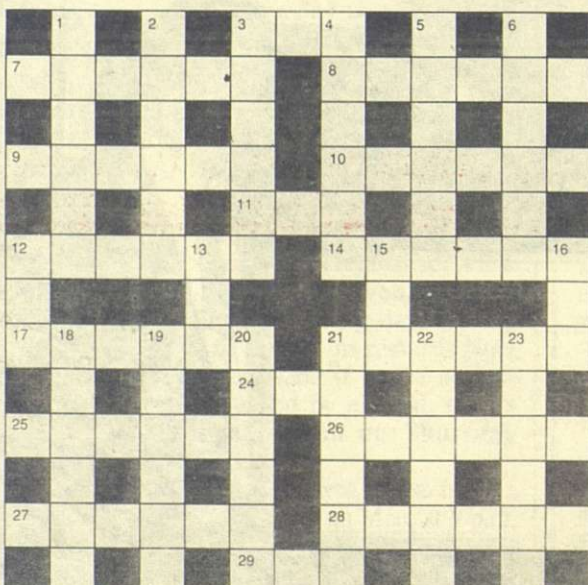

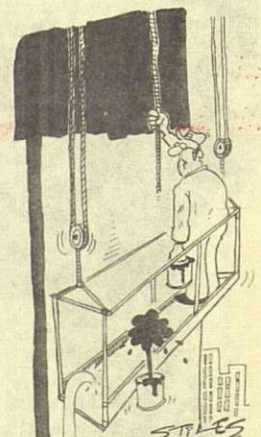

TIDY TOWNS REPORT

In the 1991 tidy Towns Competition Clashmore scored a total of 168 marks, 3 more than last year. The following is the Adjudicator's report with marks allocated.

Effort: 34 marks (max. 45) — Clashmore continues to be an attractively presented village and has increased its marks in the competition for yet another year. Well done to all concerned! As young trees mature they will continue to enhance the environment of the village.

Tidiness: 32 marks (max. 40) — Derelict buildings within the village are well masked and so look very tidy and do not detract significantly from the overall presentation of Clashmore. An untidy site was noted across from the Grotto; is this part of the curtilage area of the nearby house which is undergoing construction work and are there any plans for the site? Litter was noted along the edges of two approach roads. However, litter control was good within the village centre.

Presentation Of Buildings: 32 marks (max. 40) — Most buildings in Clashmore are presented to a high standard, especially those along the main street. The hall on the Dungarvan

Road needs to be painted, as do the railings and boundary of the school. Both the school building and its grounds are well presented.

Presentation of Natural Amenities: 25 marks (max. 50) — Flower displays throughout the village are colourful and give Clashmore a well cared for appearance. The Grotto is also an attractive feature. The river bank and stone wall leading to "St. Mochua's Well" enhance the village significantly. However, the wall itself should always be maintained weed free. The entrance to the well and its surrounds is spoiled by weed growth. The stone wall of the sports ground looks well, the green area behind it should be landscaped and the wire and post fencing should be screened with planting. The roadside area to the new stone wall needs to be resurfaced.

Appearance of Approach Roads: 30 marks (max. 45)

— Approach roads to the village were presented to a mixed standard on adjudication day. The roadside edge of the Cappaquin Road was very muddy and unattractive and the nameplate needed to be cleaned. However, other road signs looked well. The Dungarvan approach road looked well in all respects. The nameplate on the Youghal Road was in need of painting. Street furniture in general enjoyed a high level of maintenance.

Presentation of Residential Areas: 15 marks (max 30)

— The small residential development near the sports ground had a good overall presentation but more attention to detail, such as long grass at the base of young trees, weedy kerbs and the presentation of roadside boundary walls is necessary. A roadside area to a boundary wall located on the Youghal Road needs to be upgraded. The flower display outside of the house near the telephone kiosk is commendable for its attractiveness.

Tourism Fund Allocation For Dungarvan Hotel

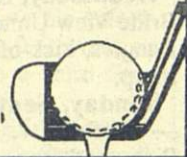

The County Board stage their most attractive programme of the season on Sunday next when they play the Kilrossanty/Stradbally and Nire/Dungarvan football semi-finals at Fraher Field. Following these will be the ladies football National League game involving Waterford and Kerry.

On Saturday afternoon the Western Board will play the attractive divisional junior hurling final when Kilgobinet challenge the present holders, An Rinn for the title. So all in all, it is going to be a weekend of exciting fare at the Shandon grounds.

It is worthy of note that of the four senior football teams competing here on Sunday, three of them played in the semi-finals at the same time last year and the Nire who are the odd one out in this regard, were only pipped for a place in those semi-finals.

DUNGARVAN v. NIRE

In deference to the county champions, this match has

been programmed as the feature event, but whether or not it will measure up to the curtain-raiser in the matter of thrills and excitement remains a matter of speculation at this stage. For fast, open football it may be the better of the two, as Dungarvan and the Nire each play a different brand of football to the sides involved in the first match. In fact the Nire and Dungarvan play different styles of football to each other and this is what makes this game so intriguing for the speculators and patrons. As was expected the matter of the venue for this game was the object of some speculation after both had quali-

fied. But the logic of the Nire's agreement to play the match at Fraher Field obviously lies in the fact that they have played six games at the venue over the past couple of years while Dungarvan played no championship ties there during the same period. Dungarvan, in fact won the title last year without playing in Dungarvan, so effectively the venue should make little or no difference.

Dungarvan have set up something of a record in having won thirteen of their last fourteen championship matches. As far as I recall their only defeat since 1989 was against Stradbally in last year's

championship at Leamybrien when they lost by 1-7 to 1-5. Skill, fitness and a high degree of team work that is a carry-over from their minor days were the factor which enabled them to achieve these victories. When they recently had to depend on a certain amount of luck to overcome Rathgormack, supporters were asking if the champions were beginning to lose their form. While that game might have been judged to be their least impressive display this year, I don't believe that it showed a loss of form. Winning that one was not vital as they had already qualified and they had obviously underrated Rathgormack.

They are not underrating the Nire and certainly have no reason to do so as in their last meeting (at Cappoquin last year) Dungarvan were a little lucky to survive on a scoreline of 0-10 to 1-6.

Dungarvan will have Darrell Donnelly back and may have a little difficulty in deciding which players to leave out of their line-out. Included will be Derek and Bobby Lyons, Dermot Callaghan, Tony Hamilton, Eddie and David Burke, Martin Sheehan, Peter Queally, David Dee, Denis McGrath, Peter, Morrie and J. J. Ferncombe, Ger Beresford and David O'Connor, who has had no green flag raised against him in the championship so far.

A Nire clubman told me at Cappoquin on Sunday last that they were eagerly looking forward to playing Dungarvan and felt reasonably confident of winning, if they can play to their top form. They reckon that the champions will be the hot favourites and will be under pressure. Such an attitude can certainly prove helpful and effective. Their style of football is quite different in a number of respects. They are excellent fielders and favour the catch and kick to an extent, in favour of the short passing style which is Dungarvan's forte. Their most recent performance was most impressive when they beat St. Saviours in a very lively game at Dungarvan. I have written before that they are a side with tremendous potential, but never seem to get the best out of themselves. In their last match they looked very fit and can be expected to last the hour even with a side as fit as Dungarvan.

They are sure of being able to field at full strength here and will have Sean, Tom and Michael Guiry, Ger Walsh and the two Pats, Jackie Hogan and Tony Condon, P. J. and Kevin Mulcahy, Richard Guiry and Paddy Cooney, D. Hogan, D. Phelan and Owen Wall and co. trying to bring the club to their third county final in the past six years.

THE OUTCOME

In this extraordinary year there are all sorts of possibilities and it is not outside

the bounds of possibility that the footballers will do what the hurlers did in the semi-finals and finish up all square at the finish.

Hopefully we will have results in both.

The second game will be very close and the result may be in the balance right up to the finish. I have a preference for the champions and I give them the verdict because of their greater team work, which must be a factor and it is the one outstanding difference in the sides.
