Lismore Win S.H. Title With Inspired Display

Lismore showed that they were well and truly Waterford Senior Hurling Champions when with a superb display they took the title at Walsh Park, Waterford last Sunday and in the process inflicted their heaviest defeat ever in a final on pre-match favourites Mount Sion.

Lismore had to wait a long time for this sweet victory as their only previous championship success was way back in 1925. However, Sunday, October 6, 1991 will now go into the Club annals as the day on which they trounced the fancied Mount Sion side by 5-7 to 1-5, a winning margin of 14 points and will be a date remembered by Lismore supporters for years to come.

Lismore's great victory was a real team effort with each and every man on the side playing his heart out. They were amazingly relaxed from the very beginning and settled down to hand out a mauling to the city hurlers throughout the first half. They held a lead of 13 points (3-5 to 0-1) at the break and at that stage were well on

OUR HIGH FLYING MINISTERS

The low standards in high places which have been rocking the country in recent times and the scandalous revelations which have tended to destroy the people's credibility in the Government and in our State and semi-State bodies do not seem to have much affected our Government Ministers and those others in high places.

Our Ministers continue on their merry high-flying missions all over the place while in particular our Foreign Affairs Minister, Mr. J. Gerard Collins would seem to spend more time in the air than on terra firma.

Over the past ten days Mr. Collins has been in Brussels and in the Netherlands and has taken himself off to the recently liberated Baltic States of Estonia, Lithuania and Latvia this week; Mr. Terry Leyden, Minister of State at the Dept. of Industry and Commerce has just returned from a 5-day trip to Iran where he attended the Teheran Trade Fair and has gone to Manchester this week; Mr. Albert Reynolds has been in Luxembourg as has also Minister of State at the Dept. of Tourism, Mr. Denis Lyons.

Minister of State Mr. Michael Noonan has been in Geneva while Mrs. Maire Geoghegan Quinn, Minister of State at the Dept. of the Taoiseach is at present in New York where she will represent Mr. Haughey at the 1991 American Celtic Ball.

And just for good measure the Director and six members of the Board of the National Lottery with their spouses have just returned from a seven-day, all-expenses paid trip to the United States.

PLACE NAMES OF ABBEYSIDE

The recent publication of the book "School Days In Abbeyside" to mark the centenary of the establishment of the primary school in Abbeyside has given rise to several discussions among old pupils of the school con-

cerning the past history of the school and some of the old street names in the Village.

One of these concerned the meaning of the name "Cuil a' tSailin" which was the name old residents of Abbeyside called Home Rule Street which was, we believe, before that known also as Victoria Street. Those with an interest in place names hold that "Cuil a' tSailin" refers to a salt factory which stood one time at Strandside South near the Pond and as "salann" is the Irish for salt and the street was behind the salt factory hence the name.

However we consulted the late Canon Power's "The Place Names of Decies" and there we found that he gives the meaning of "Cuil a' tSailin" as the "Corner of the (Sea) Pond." The Irish word 'cuil' certainly means corner or nook while 'saile' means seawater. On the other hand the Irish word "cul" means a goal as in games.

Perhaps of interest also to readers is Canon Power's reference to the "Boithrin Caoch" or "Blind Road" which was a name one time given to King Street in Abbeyside while our recent reference to the limits of the road known locally as Friars Walk is also borne out by Canon Power. He refers to it as "Bothar na mBrathar" and gives as the anglicised version "Friars' Road" now "Castle Road." The latter undoubtedly refers to the old McGrath castle, now long demolished, which stood in olden days in the field owned by Mr. Jack Tierney near Abbeyside Church. This would certainly seem to verify that the name Friars' Walk refers solely to this

section of the roadway.

NOW A LEADING LONDON HAIRDRESSER

Featured in a recent issue of "The Cutting Edge," a journal for professional hairdressers in the U.K. is an article under the title "Shooting Stars" which details a survey which was carried out "to find the hairdressing stars of tomorrow." A section in full colour follows in which four hairdressers are named as qualifying and one of these is Fergus O'Brien.

The caption states that Fergus is as Irish as his name suggests and that there's more than a hint of Bob Geldof about his laid back easy going nature.

Fergus relates how, having tried a few things, he decided to have a go at making hairdressing his career. He went to London and having served an apprenticeship at the John Simon Salon in Hampstead he continued to work there as a qualified young stylist for three and a half years.

He then moved to the modern hi-tech 350 Salon in Battersea where he worked as a senior stylist for a clientele who were provided not only with hairdressing facilities but with a consultancy in beauty and fashion.

In recent months Fergus has returned to the John Simon Salon where he is presently working and continuing to make a name for himself as one of the hairdressing stars of to-morrow. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent and Sarita O'Brien, Newline, Abbeyside, Fergus is to be congratulated on the success he has achieved in his chosen field.

THE COMMA AND APOSTROPHE

According to the English dictionary which we consult when we have difficulty

with the spelling of a word or concerning the correct meaning of a word, a comma is described as a punctuation mark used to make the shortest pauses in the division of a sentence while an apostrophe is stated to be a mark indicating the possessive case or the omission of one or more letters of a word.

In regard to a great deal of the copy submitted to us for publication we find that the comma is now something which has almost been entirely forgotten as it is seldom or ever used. It indicates that the majority of people no longer know how to properly punctuate the sentences they write or that they are too lazy to place a comma wherever it should be correctly used.

The use or should we rather say, abuse, of the apostrophe is a different kettle of fish. While the omission of a comma is no great mistake, the manner in which the apostrophe is dealt with by so many can only be described as most aggravating in a very big number of cases.

We have seen reports and manuscripts which have emanated from legal establishments, local authority offices, business houses and even in press releases issued by public relations firms where the incorrect use of the apostrophe sticks out like a sore thumb.

The mistake usually concerns the use of the words its and it's. While it is properly used in the possessive case as John's hat, when used in the word it's, it signifies 'it is' while when written as "its" without the apostrophe, it indicates the possessive case as in the sentence, 'the bird stuck its long beak into the sand!

Perhaps teachers would place a little more stress especially on the correct use of the words its and it's while typists might also make note as nothing, we think, takes from an otherwise fine typescript than to see these all too common mistakes sticking out like sore thumbs. 'Nuff said!

HUNTING THE CUSTOMERS AWAY

An irate lady from the Ballyduff district in West Waterford has complained to us that she will never again come to Dungarvan to do any shopping following a brush with one of the traffic wardens operating in the town during a recent visit.

The lady told us that she was on business in the vicinity of Dungarvan and decided to come into town to purchase a pair of shoes. She was away from her car

a brief period but when she returned she found it festooned with a £15 parking ticket. "It made the shoes I bought very expensive," she told us adding that never again would she dream of coming to Dungarvan to do any shopping and would instead opt for Fermoy "where customers are not hassled by traffic wardens as they are in Dungarvan."

It's just another case to prove that Dungarvan is

now being "over-policed" with two traffic wardens who appear to be vieing with each other in the same streets.

Perhaps the local Council should instruct one or both of these gentlemen to watch for litter-bugs — they are or at least one is a litter as well as a traffic warden — and so do something to stop the proliferation of litter about the town at present.

Van Dieman's Land

Our ballad choice for this week recalls the dreadful days when for the most trivial of offences against the "establishment" people were sentenced to the penal settlements in Van Dieman's Land. It is interesting to record how the dreadful place first got its name. Abel Tasman and his aide Van Dieman were Dutch colonisers. Tasman gave his name to Tasmania while Van Dieman's Land became synonymous with Australia and transportation not only for thousands of Irish but for many Scots and others as well.

Possibly the best known ballad concerning banishment to Van Dieman's Land for Waterford people is "The Connerys" but our choice for this week is one that first appeared in print in 1830 and became popular not only in Australia but in Ireland, Scotland and America also. Here then is "Van Dieman's Land"—

Come all you gallant poachers that ramble void of care,
That walk out on a moonlit night with your dog and gun
and snare,

The hare and lofty pheasant you have at your command,
Not thinking of your last career upon Van Dieman's
Land.

Poor Thomas Brown from Nenagh town, Jack Murphy
and poor Joe
Were three determined poachers as the county well does
know,
By the keepers of the land, my boys, one night they
were trepanned,
And for fourteen years transported unto Van Dieman's
Land.

The first day that we landed upon that fatal shore
The planters came around us there might be twenty
score,
They ranked us off like horses and they sold us out of
hand
And they yoked us to the plough, brave boys, to plough
Van Dieman's Land.

The cottages we live in are built with sods of clay,
We have rotten straw for bedding but we dare not say
nay,
Our cots we fence with firing and slumber when we can,
To keep the wolves and tigers from us in Van Dieman's
Land.

Oft times when I do slumber I have a pleasant dream,
With my sweet girl sitting near me close by a purling
stream
I am roaming through old Ireland with my true love by
the hand,
But awaken broken-hearted upon Van Dieman's Land.

God bless our wives and families, likewise that happy
shore,

Waterford Included In "Circuit 92"

A TIME FOR CHECKING ON YOUR FENCES

MILD weather in October should be seized upon for all those garden maintenance jobs needed before winter really sets in.

It's time to check fences, gates, trellises and the shed and summer house. They should be treated with preservative once every two years anyway and brushed to remove algae, dust and mud before application.

Then think carefully about what preservative to use. Creosote is still arguably best in terms of preserving power and cost, but is highly toxic to nearby plants, so be careful where you apply it.

Note that creosote fumes carry particularly well in hot weather so wait until cooler conditions, for extra safety, but never apply during or after rain which will affect the finish and effectiveness.

The most obvious clanger would be to use creosote on a trellis, which should be treated with one of the growing number of 'green' preservatives. Some of these are actually washable so cleaning yourself and the brushes is easier.

The gradual replacement of creosote by modern alternatives has been mirrored in paints, so gardeners have new options.

For so long the problem was that paint was simply not durable or giving enough, where necessary, to be satisfactory for garden use without repeated upkeep.

But a new ranch and porous paints can withstand more of the flexing and water penetration and seepage suffered by garden fences, greenhouses and sheds and offer a potentially smarter finish.

Technology has also come to the rescue of garden iron-work and gates.

Hammerite enamel paints



can be applied over old paintwork after a vigorous attack with a wire brush to remove the worst of the rust.

Your fencing checks are most likely to reveal necessary repairs. Loose boards may simply need new nails, preferably galvanised against rust, but rotten or split boards should be replaced.

With close-boarding, take out the defective length and cut a new one to fit before carefully sliding and nailing it back into place.

A rotten fence post is trickier. Many people rip out the stump of the old post and fit the top section or a new length into a fence spike, driven into the same position as the base of the old post.

But the most secure method is still to take a pick and break out the old concrete setting before installing a new full length post that has been saturated in preservative.

Dig down at least 18 inches for posts supporting a six foot high fence. Pack the bottom and surround the base of the post with hard core before pouring in a rich concrete mixture.

Always top the post with a cap or cut it off at an angle to avoid water settling and promoting rot.

Base or gravel boards are also prone to rot but easily replaced once the soil around is dug out. Saturate with preservative and secure firmly to adjoining fence posts.

Method:
Put cornflour and mustard into a pan and stir in Guinness. Bring to boil, stirring all the time. Then allow to simmer for 2-3 minutes.

Add the cheese and eggs; cook until the cheese has melted and the mixture thickened. Do not let mixture boil. Season to taste. Pour into serving dishes and sprinkle with chives and spring onions. Use toast as dunks.

ALL THE WORLD LOVES A CONKERING HERO

THERE'S no room for kids in this month's World Conkers Championships. Ever since it all began on the village green in Ashton, Northants, 27 years ago, boys under 18 have never been allowed to enter.

What started off as a schoolboy game has now become a very serious annual event, raising thousands of pounds for the blind and attracting so many people that all weekend leave for local police is cancelled.

It really is a world championship, attracting would-be conkering heroes from America and Australia. The only foreigner to win was Jorge Ramirez of Mexico in 1976.

The rules, as befits such a serious event, are strict.

All conkers and strings are supplied. You can't bring your own favourite conker which you've 'decorated'.

Players have to take pot luck by selecting a string sticking out of a bag.

"If we allowed entrants to bring their own conkers, it wouldn't be fair," said an organiser. "There are so many sneaky tricks to get your conker into a world beater, like burying it in horse dung for a week, or soaking it in vinegar or baking it."

"We use a Black & Decker to drill our conkers, which



are specially chosen to be roughly the same size and weight.

"We thread them with 21in long leather laces and players must have at least eight inches of lace showing, whether they're holding or striking."

"Each challenger is allowed three strokes in turn until one conker is shattered from the string."

Championships can attract more than 4,000 spectators and raise thousands of pounds for the blind.

Winner gets a silver cup to hold for a year and an engraved tankard to keep.

Ashton became the official home for organised British conkers 27 years ago when two anglers organised a village fishing trip which had to be cancelled. Instead, the two spent the day on Ashton's village green, encircled by 20 thatched houses and a chapel and, of course, the pub, playing conkers.

Crowds gathered to watch and the contest rapidly turned into an annual event. It's not known for certain

just how the game of conkers started or how they got their name, but many believe it was first played with empty snails shells in Medieval days and *concha* is the Latin for shell.

In 1914, War Ministry boffins discovered that chemicals could be extracted from conkers to make high explosives. Schoolchildren were formed into local groups to collect them.

One of Britain's toughest nuts to crack is the Rev. Keith Potter, a West Yorkshire vicar who has a conker that has survived, he claims, more than 3,000 bouts. But he still has a long way to go to beat the British record of 5,023.

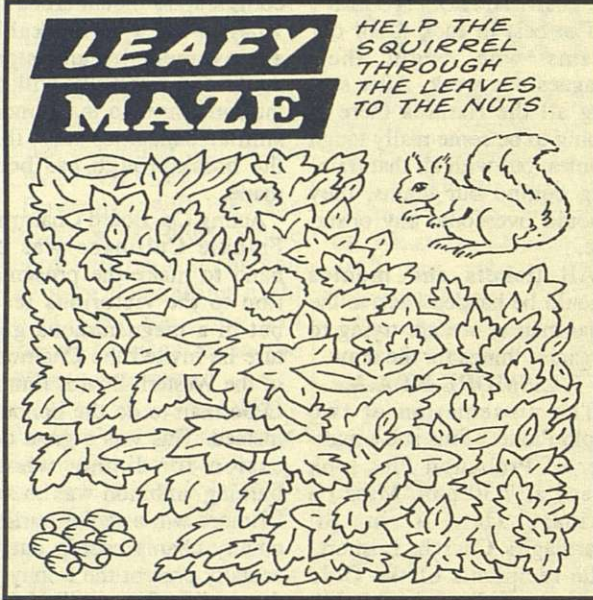

This score gave a tremendous boost to the Western team, but the alarm bells were not yet sounding in the Mount Sion camp as the game was still young and the strong wind waiting to assist them in the second half. Sean Daly pointed a free and then came a Carthage Barry special in cutting the ball off the ground for a lovely point, thus repeating something he did against Tallow in the replay. Lismore were now 1-4 up without reply from Mount Sion and they had sent six balls wide as against 2 wides for Mount Sion. In the 21st minute Mount Sion were beginning to realise that they were in trouble when Michael Sullivan picked and shot to the net to give his side a ten points lead. Almost effortlessly the accurate Sean

Daly sent over from a '65' and four minutes later when a Seamus Prendergast free landed near goal, it was snatched by Donie Landers. The alarm bells were now sounding loud and clear in the Mount Sion camp and with the trend of the game clearly in Lismore's favour, they seemed unable to do anything about. It was in the 29th minute that Pdraigh Fanning put the city team's first score on the board. This gave Lismore a 13 points half-time lead (3-5 to 0-1).

BIG THINGS EXPECTED

With wind advantage after the turn over big things were expected from Mount Sion. Lismore were obviously expecting this also and they turned on the power from the throw-in and had two vital scores within six minutes. Sean Daly pointed a 32nd minute free and 4 minutes later Donal Landers had his second goal of the game. This was a killer blow for Mount Sion who now found themselves trailing by seventeen points and with the result inevitable the pressure was taken off the visiting side. In the 43rd minute Tony Brown had Mount Sion's second score of the game and a minute later John Meaney had their third which reduced Lismore's lead to 15 points by the 45th min. Mount Sion, although defeated at this stage were showing no signs of surrender and kept up their determined fight for scores, that just would not come. Paul Prendergast pointed in the 46th minute and two minutes later Donal Landers had the ball in the net

again for Lismore to put the game completely out of reach for 'Sion. For the final eight minutes Lismore were on the defensive, but were holding out very well in spite of severe pressure from the losers.

Pdraigh Fanning in the 53rd min. and Pat Ryan, who had been switched from defence to attack, had points and with just two minutes left in the game Shane Ahearne had Mount Sion's only goal of the match to leave the full time score Lismore 5-7 Mount Sion 1-5.

The scenes of jubilation and excitement which followed the final whistle had to be seen to the appreciated. Every one in the huge crowd of Lismore supporters as well as hundreds of neutrals rushed on to the pitch to cheer their heroes.

Lismore people who had waited for more than half a century for this wept in joyful emotion at the result.

NICE GESTURE

Because of the occasion that was in it, County Chairman, Frankie Cullinane, offered Western Board Chairman, Jimmy O'Gorman the honour of presenting the Waterford News and Star cup to the winning captain Seamus Prendergast. Jimmy was for a long number of years the very efficient secretary of the Lismore club. Seamus in accepting, praised everyone associated with the effort to bring about this very historic result.

Mount Sion, as usual, were very gracious in defeat and all their team waited for the presentation and were the first to congratulate the Lismore play-

ers on their win.

Senior & U-21 Football Co. Finals At Dungarvan

In any situation where the contestants could be judged to have an equal chance of winning it might seem unwise to name one or other as the favourites. However, when one of the two are the reigning champions it affords sportswriters a way out of the dilemma to show a slight preference for them.

No matter how deeply we search the form book and their respective records of the past two seasons, we cannot come up with a solid reason for showing a strong preference for either. This football county final will be a battle all the way, with ever kick of the ball counting for something and I am certain that there will be precious little between the champions and challengers at the end of an exciting hour's football.

Dungarvan and Stradbally have met on three occasions in tight and tense championship clashes over the past two seasons and the results have shown amazing scoring equality.

In the three matches Stradbally have scored a total of 3-22 against Dungarvan and Dungarvan have scored 3-21 against Stradbally. 1989 championship: Stradbally 1-9, Dungarvan 1-8; 1990 championship: Stradbally 1-7, Dungarvan 1-5; 1990 county final: Stradbally 1-6, Dungarvan 1-8.

In last year's county final which was played at Walsh Park after Stradbally insisted on the bye-law being followed, Dungarvan were under tremendous pressure in the final seven minutes as Stradbally

put on enormous pressure and the view in the Stradbally camp after the game was that they had left their effort too late and had the game gone on for a further four or five minutes that they would have taken the title.

But at the end of an exciting hour, Dungarvan were the worthy champions and are undefeated in their seven matches this year. In a number of these they have played overpowering stuff and looked to be an unbeatable side while they maintained this form. In a couple of their matches, their performances gave them some cause for concern. I have in mind their escape against Rathgormack and their dismal second quarter against the Nire. They won these games so their temporary lapses are excusable, but will, no doubt, be top of the list in their pre-match discussions this week.

They played a couple of challenge games over the weekend and their mentors are happy that everything has gone well in their preparation for this challenge to their title.

I am informed that they will field at full strength with the line-out showing not more than one or two changes from the team which brought them their 21st county title in the

grade.

David O'Connor who holds the distinction of having no green flag raised against him over the entire championship so far, will again mind the net. David Dee, Darrell Donnelly and Peter Queally, Martin Houlihan, Martin Kelly, Eddie Burke and Martin Sheehan are seven of the six to be named as backs.

David Burke, who played very well against the Nire and who was not on the winning side last year, with Derek Lyons, will be their midfield pair and in attack the champions will have Pepe, Morrie and J. J. Ferncombe with Dermot Callaghan, Denis McGrath and Ger Beresford.

With some very skilled and experienced players on the substitutes bench, Dungarvan have a tremendous back-up group, any of whom can be confidently called into action during the final.

Stradbally look on this final as the big opportunity to make amends for last year's two points defeat and while they seem to be keeping a low profile, there is confidence in the camp that they will recapture the crown which they held three years ago. Throughout the championship they had a few near misses, but survived without defeat until they reached their final match of the league section. Then they flopped against an inspired Kilmachomas side at Leamybrien. After this they woke up in time to handle old rivals Kilrossanty and in that semi-final could be said to have played better than Dungarvan in the semi-final against the Nire.

Team trainer Sean Ahearne is now satisfied that the players are well tuned for this challenge to the champions and that at worst,

Stradbally have an equal chance of victory.

They, too, expect their line-out to include twelve or thirteen of the players who lost to Dungarvan in the 1990 final and it won't surprise followers if they field the same side which defeated Kilrossanty two weeks ago.

Their long-serving goalkeeper, Kieran Hefernan will be their net minder and in front of him will be Laurence Walsh, Conor O'Brien and Martin Curran. Veteran David Kirwan, Eoin Phelan and Fintan O'Brien are likely to complete their defence. Paul Mullaney and Pat Curran are their likely centre-field duo, but as very many times in the recent past, Curran may be moved to one of several other positions. 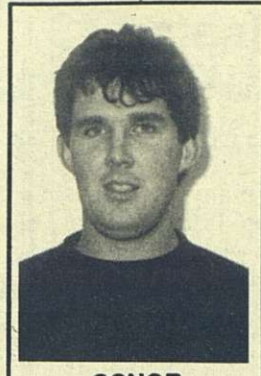
