Seamie Hannon's Resignation Shocks County

Waterford selector, Ballyduff man, Seamie Hannon has shocked the hurling community in the county by announcing his resignation just twenty-four hours after the start of a new season.

The former player said on Monday that he could no longer tolerate the arrogance of the Bounty Board or their lack of co-operation with the selection committee.

Hannon, who played with

the county for twelve years before being appointed a selector last season, says that he was "obstructed and hindered" in everything he tried to do for the players.

"Simple tasks, like organising training sessions, trials, supplying hurleys and playing gear to the players all became major battles with the Co. Board. I am no longer prepared to spend my time negotiating

and fighting for basic facilities for the players," he said.

Adding that he had enjoyed working with team manager Joe McGrath and coach Ned Power, Hannon says he believes that officials of the County Board had attempted in every way to make the selectors' time

Fr. Michael Hurley S.J. — An Ecumenical Pioneer

Last month those involved in any way with first or second level education were back at work after the summer holidays. And now people associated with third level education, under its many forms, are once again on the go.

The Irish School of Ecumenics has a very special, indeed unique, function as a postgraduate institution linking ecumenics with general world development. It is not surprising that some members of it, staff and students alike, have lived and worked in various countries around the globe, for nothing quite like this exists elsewhere. The staff and student body which is interdenominational and interna-

tional, systematically explore the questions of relations between churches, faiths and communities.

This year it has come of age, having been founded 21 years ago by the Ardmore born Jesuit, Fr. Michael Hurley, in Milltown Park, Dublin, where he had lectured on theology since 1958, having received training in Louvain and his doctorate at the Gregorian in Rome.

PUT DOWN MARKERS

Father Hurley has been an ecumenical pioneer. Four years before the opening of the Second Vatican Council in October 1962 he put down markers in his brief survey entitled Towards Christian Unity. It was he who edited the 1963 publication, Praying For Unity, hailed by the late Dr. William Philbin, Bishop of Down and Connor, as "a series of exploratory essays . . . in a field in which we have been thought behindhand."

At that time Father Hurley said, "It seems quite clear that the achievement of Christian unity does demand contact and co-operation at all levels with our separated brethren in order to remove the antipathy and ignorance and misunderstanding caused by isolation and in-breeding and to enable us slowly but surely to grow together in truth and love."

Since its inception the Irish School of Ecumenics has had the support of certain distinguished members of all the mainline Churches, and the Provincial of the Society of Jesus, Father Cecil McGarry, agreed to become its first President. The head of the World Council of Churches, Dr. Carson Blake, gave the keynote address at the official opening. However, in the early days a good deal of apathy and even some hostility was encountered at official levels.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have been living with my partner for 8 years. We have a mortgage in joint names and pay a mortgage protection policy. My partner, who is legally separated from his wife has just died. What is my position with regard to our home. Does his wife have a legal claim on it?

Answer — As you are joint owners of the property, the house automatically becomes yours and his wife has no claim on it.

The Land Registry will need an affidavit exhibiting the death certificate, so that they can transfer the house into your sole name. There will not be any fees involved apart from the small charge which the Peace Commissioner or Commissioner for Oaths may charge for the affidavit.

The Land Registry will tell you what they require.

Fr. Sidney MacEwan R.I.P.

[Memories Revived by Johnny Buckley]

The recent death of Canon Sidney MacEwan, beannacht De Lena anam, retired P.P. of Lachgilphed, Argyll, revived memories in those of us who were fortunate to be present at his concert in the Ormonde Cinema, Cappoquin in 1950.

He sang in Waterford the previous night and came to Cappoquin at the request of a West Waterford priest to raise funds for the renovation of his church, possibly Ballinameela or Aglish. He was accompanied by Maire Ni Scolai, an Irish traditional singer and her husband Liam O Buachalla, who was Chairman of the Senate then and also Cathaoirleach of Taibhreach na Gailimhe (Irish Theatre). Seats were booked at Willie McCarthy's that time at seven shillings and sixpence, and people considered themselves lucky to gain admission to hear and savour the sweet voice of Fr. Sidney, who was a renowned ambassador of song. Maire Ni Scolai thrilled the audience with her charming gaelic repertoire, singing no less than 14 numbers, while Fr. Sidney MacEwan in response to several encores sang at least 16 songs with a lovely Scottish lilt and "Barry Strathyre," "Bonny Mary of Argyll," "Ho Ro My Nut Brown Maiden" and Stephen Fosters "Jeanie With The Light Brown Hair" included enthralled the packed audience. Sidney MacEwan gave up his singing career to become a priest and was ordained in 1944. He gave concerts in several countries, particularly in the U.S.A. and many notable people of stage and screen including Judy Garland, Bing Crosby, etc., regularly attended his concerts. He was a great friend of John McCormack, the famous Irish tenor, also his teacher who said of Sidney "In certain areas and arias he could out sing them all." Sir Compton McKenzie termed him "as the greatest singer of Scots, Irish and Island songs." Over three million records of those songs were sold in the 38 years of

his singing career. It was unique too, to hear him speak to Australia that night in Cappoquin as he recorded the concert also for that country. He, Maire Ni Scolai and Liam O Buachalla generously signed many autographs on that night. Canon Sidney, who died at the age

of 82, will be remembered for ever as his beautiful voice comes over singing "O Mary We Crown Thee With Blossoms To Day, Queen of the Angels and Queen of the May."

In 1972 Sidney MacEwan wrote his autobiography titled "On The High C's."

TRAFFIC PROBLEMS

We have referred many times previously to the congestion around the junction of Main Street and Church Street. The Gardai have placed "no parking" cones on both streets which have certainly helped the problem. Unfortunately a few motorists have been seen to park their cars outside the cones and others indeed have removed them and placed them on the footpaths, thus causing an obstruction to pedestrians. The arrangement with the cones is a temporary one pending double yellow lines being painted on by Waterford County Council.

ROAD TO FAMOUS LAKE

Waterford County Council are to spend £30,000 to provide a roadway to Crotty's Lake high up in the Comeragh Mountains. Recently a group known as the Comeragh Mountain Environment Group (CMEG) are calling stop to the proposed road. Carrick-on-Suir Urban District Council are to build a roadway into Crotty's Lake and they claim that this is necessary for the servicing of the public water supply which the Council takes from the lake.

The Carrick-on-Suir Urban Council has been abstracting water from the lake for the past twenty years without the necessity of constructing a road. Why now do they claim it is necessary to build an intrusive roadway at considerable cost into the beautiful and wild mountain-side?

In view of the development which has already taken place on those mountains and the current threat to those ranges, the time has come for the Comeragh Mountain Environment Group and other interested parties to campaign to have the area declared a National Park.

PRESIDENT ROBINSON SAYS WELL DONE

Waterford's hour of glory in Croke Park on Sunday, October 13, received the congratulations of President Mary Robinson some 24 hours later. The President, who is on an official tour of the United States, found time to send a message of congratulations to the Waterford senior ladies football team who defeated Laois in the All-Ireland final. With 14 Ballymacarbry girls on the first 15 and four among the substitutes, the President's message from the United States on Monday evening was well received in that beautiful village nestling in the Nire Valley.

President Robinson was unable to be present at the game but did not forget Mna Phortlaire in their moment of triumph. It's not often that a

little place such as Ballymacarbry can welcome home eighteen All-Ireland medal winners and it's small wonder that local people pulled out all the stops on Monday night when the team returned with the All-Ireland Cup. County pride played a large part in the celebrations as young and old waved the white and blue flags, but one could feel the atmosphere was just a bit parochial, and why not! Bonfires and fireworks greeted the team's bus as they arrived in Ballymacarbry after earlier carrying the girls to other receptions in Waterford City and Dungarvan. It was a proud moment for Marie as it had been in Croke Park the previous day when she led her native county to its first senior title in 32 years.

Manager and coach, Michael Ryan said, as manager of a county team, his first loyalty was to Waterford, but still he could not conceal his pride with the achievement of the Ballymacarbry girls.

The celebrations were muted this week for the Ballymacarbry Club girls despite their historic win, they were back at the Mill field on Wednesday night in preparation for a Munster Club game against Kerry club champions Beaufort last Sunday. Ballymacarbry, who are All-Ireland Club champions, are going for "three-in-a-row" this year, and what a day Sunday week last was for two of the players, Fiona Crotty, Kilmanahan, sister of the captain and Olivia Condon from Sliabh gCua, they were on all three winning All-Ireland teams — u-16, minor and senior.

On Thursday last, Marie Crotty, captain of the Waterford winning team and other members of the team paid a visit to Ballymacarbry National School with the cup, where they were greeted by the teachers and close on three hundred pupils. It was the

SEAN TREACY REMEMBERED

Marching to the strains of "Kelly The Boy From Killane" and a "Nation Once Again," a huge crowd followed the Liam Byrne Memorial Pipe Band to Kilfeacle Churchyard on the occasion on Sunday, October 13, of the annual Sean Treacy Commemoration. Very Rev. Fr. Jim Allis, a first cousin of the legendary County Tipperary patriot, led the large crowd in a decade of the Rosary in Irish, then Mr. Frank McCann, Chairman of the Third Tipperary Brigade Old IRA, introduced the speaker who gave the oration, eminent historian and scholar, Dr. Patrick C. Power.

In his oration he recalled that the burial of Sean Treacy at Kilfeacle attracted a crowd of more than 5,000 people following his untimely death at Talbot Street in Dublin. He said that after 71 years Treacy's memory was still green. This was reflected in the presence in Kilfeacle of the sons and daughters and families of those who fought on his side. They came here each year to honour him where his last resting place is. Sean Treacy's generation had seen the land question resolved after "a ti-

anic struggle." Optimism about Home Rule was shattered by the English who seemed to do nothing to avert a partitioned Ireland. The disappointment of failed parliamentary politics had driven "men of the calibre of Sean Treacy to the use of force" and while others survived to rebuild the new 26 County Ireland, Sean Treacy had sacrificed his life for all that came after him.

Do the people often wonder, he asked, whether those "who gave us this State" might ask, is this what they died for? Is this what we sacrificed so much for? Of there was one loss, nios measa na aon cheann eile is i meath na Gaeilge i sin. Doctor Power said he worried that the day would come when no person would be able to speak the Glan Ghaeilge of our forefathers. May the memory of Sean Treacy never fade, he concluded.

Following the Third Tipperary ceremony, the South Tipperary Republican Commemoration Committee held their memorial ceremony at which the oration was given by Patrick Hackett, Nenagh. The second ceremony ended with the laying of a wreath on Sean Treacy's grave by Mr. Enda O'Riordan and a piper playing the National Anthem.

The sympathy of the district is extended to the Humphries family on the death of Mr. John Humphries, St. Anne's Terrace, Ardfinnan, which sad event took place recently. The remains were removed to Ardfinnan Parish Church and the interment took place in St. Finnan's Cemetery after Requiem Mass.

Also to the family of the late Mr. William Neville, Ballydrennan, Ardfinnan whose death occurred in the USA. The remains arrived in Ardfinnan Parish Church on Wednesday last and the funeral took place on Thursday after Requiem Mass to St. Finnan's Cemetery where interment took place.

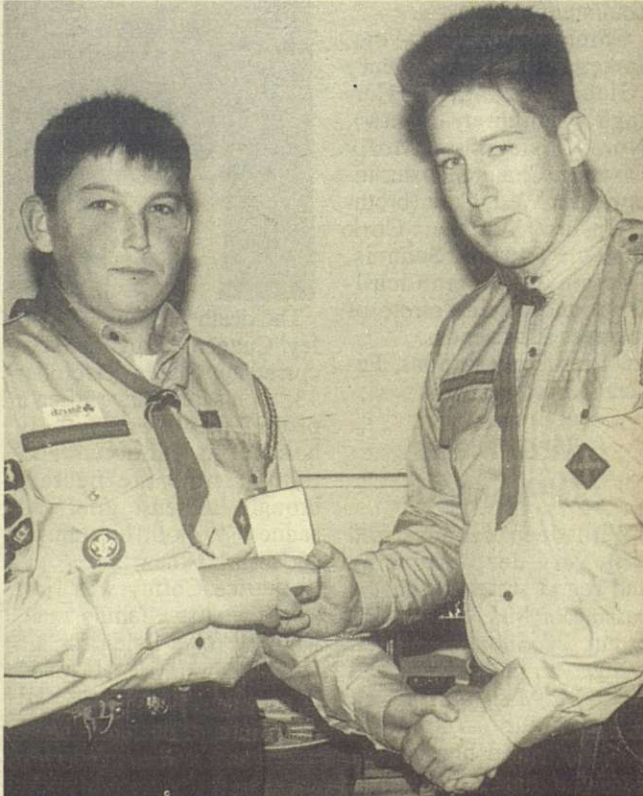
On Sunday afternoon a lot of our scouts seemed just a small bit tidier than normal

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

SO MUCH FOR MINISTER FLYNN'S PLEDGE

Minister for the Environment Padraig Flynn addressed the delegates attending the 78th Annual Conference of the Association of Municipal Authorities of Ireland held in Dungarvan in September when he attended the Conference Banquet in the Park Hotel.

In the course of that address Minister Flynn was cheered to the echo when he gave a pledge to the Urban Councillors and Town Commissioners present that he would not be proposing the withdrawal of elected councils from "any town which now has a council." The delegates applauded the Minister because they accepted that his pledge meant that town councils would not be abolished under the proposal for the Reform of Local Government.

Now just exactly one month since the Ministers "pledge," it has been announced that a new tier of local government is to be introduced to replace existing town councils and the promised new Regional Authorities are to be established by the end of March next.

The announcement was contained in the text of the agreed commitments in the Government's revised and renewed Programme for Government released last Friday and which came as the climax of three days of tense and tough negotiations between the Fianna Fail and Progressive Democrat partners in Government.

In accordance with the agreement, the plans for new local councils are being finalised by the Department of the Environment and are to be presented to the Government by the Minister, Mr. Flynn, before the end of October with the Government making a decision by the end of the year.

The revised Government Programme provides for the establishment of new sub-county structures having regard to the two proposals in the Barrington Report for District Councils and sub-committees of County Councils. The option favoured by the Progressive Democrats is for District Councils which would be based on a town but also take in a slice of the surrounding countryside. These would be directly elected bodies with a membership of between 9 and 12 councillors.

It is now expected that legislation will be brought forward to give effect to these new proposals and that it will be in position in sufficient time to ensure elections to the new bodies in June 1992.

So much for Minister Flynn's September pledge to the AMAI delegates at their Dungarvan Conference or

indeed for the strong opposition of the AMAI to the proposed abolition of town councils.

HOTELS TO COME UNDER HAMMER

In the weeks immediately ahead a number of well-known hotels will come up for sale by public auction or private treaty. For sale by auction at the offices of a well-known Dublin auctioneering firm on Tuesday, November 5, will be the Cliff House Hotel, Ardmore which has been in the ownership of the Nugent family for the past 60 years and where the genial, courteous and extremely efficient Miss Cantwell has been Manageress for many years.

Also on the market for sale by private treaty is the Lismore Hotel, Lismore while in Clonmel, Hearn's Hotel, once the seat of the legendary Charles Bianconi is also up for sale by private treaty.

Another hotel which is well-known to Waterford people is Dobbins in Tipperary town which was always a popular 'stopping off' place for G.A.A. fans travelling to and from Munster G.A.A. fixtures in Limerick down through the years. It is also on the market for sale by private treaty.

It is a sign of the changing times to see so many old established hostleries now coming on the market.

A SCANDALOUS DAIL DISPLAY

The debate on the so-called motion of confidence in the Government which marked the opening session of the Dail after its lengthy summer recess last week developed into one of the most scandalous public exhibitions of charge and counter-charge ever witnessed in the history of public life in Ireland.

After three days of name-calling and squabbling in one of the dirtiest debates in Dail history during which the deputies on both sides of the house raked through the dung-heaps for ammunition to sling at each other, it came to an end when the partners in government announced agreement on a revised Programme for Government and the confidence motion was carried by 84 votes to 81.

It was PD leader Deputy Des O'Malley who remarked after three days of blood-letting that perhaps it was necessary that all the blood had to flow. Maybe

so, but the politicians must realise that the people are no longer fools even though most of those politicians seem bent on still treating them as such. The conduct of these in the Dail last week did nothing to restore the credibility of the public in the State Legislature and the status of all concerned from the Taoiseach down has suffered enormously.

But while our politicians and the favoured group in the 'golden circle' who have been involved in the business scandals of the past couple of months have left the country down and tarnished our image in the outside world, thank God for sport and for the high standing of our national teams in international competition especially our gallant Rugby team for their vintage display against Australia in the Rugby World Cup series last Sunday. It was a marvellous display but very obviously heart-breaking for our men who saw a shock unexpected victory snatched away just three minutes from time. But it made us all proud to be Irish and helped us to forget the public scandals of the previous week!

LONG DARK EVENINGS AHEAD

Next Sunday marks the switch back to Winter time and all clocks and watches go back one hour. Already the evenings have closed in while daylight in the mornings does not come until after 7 a.m. It's a pity though that the switch wasn't delayed until after the Bank Holiday.

With the hour change, the evenings will darken much earlier from Sunday next and while we will have brighter mornings for a little while these will also gradually darken until after the Winter solstice on December 21 when we will return to the lengthening period of daylight with the traditional "cock's step" each day.

Winter time will continue until March 29, 1992 so from now until then it's a case of batten down the hatches and be prepared for the worst.

HOSPITALITY ALLOWANCE FOR CO. COUNCIL CHAIRMAN

News broke last week that a new "hospitality allowance" for the Chairman of the County Council is to be included in the annual

estimates for 1992 which will be considered by the Council at their estimates meeting on November 18. A sum of £10,000 has been mentioned and the "allowance" is to enable the Chairman to host receptions for various visiting V.I.P.'s during the year.

The matter was stated to have been mentioned publicly at the last Council meeting and as having been agreed among the party whips. However our reporter states that he heard no such matter referred to dur-

ing the meeting although he qualifies this by saying that it is sometimes difficult to hear all that goes on from the Press bench.

While we agree that some provision for this propose should be made by the Council we believe that a figure of £10,000 would be far in excess of what would be needed for the year to meet the hospitality requirements without being miserly especially for a body which is so strapped for cash as the County Council.

The Meeting Of The Waters

A couple of weeks ago we recalled the centenary of the death of Charles Stewart Parnell on October 6 in this column by choosing "The Blackbird of Sweet Avondale" as our choice for the ballad corner that week.

Avondale House, Co. Wicklow was the birthplace and home of Parnell and its official re-opening as a forestry school last April was the first of a programme of events to mark the centenary of the great man's untimely death.

It was Coillte, the new State forestry company that decided to dedicate Avondale House to the memory of Parnell and to restore it as a museum and the fact that its national importance as part of our heritage has so been recognised now is to be greatly welcomed. It was indeed most appropriate that Coillte undertook this most welcome initiative as Parnell had a keen interest in forestry and it is recorded that the sawmills at Avondale "remained a preoccupation all his life" and further that his chief interest at Avondale "was in the timber which by means of his sawmills, be manufactured into various articles in order to provide for the growing demand which existed in America for Irish-made articles."

It is of interest to note that just a few miles from Avondale, the rivers Avonmore and Avonbeg join in the Avoca valley to form the "Meeting Of The Waters," immortalised by Thomas Moore in the poem which subsequently became one of the most famous songs in the repertoire of the great Irish tenor, John McCormack.

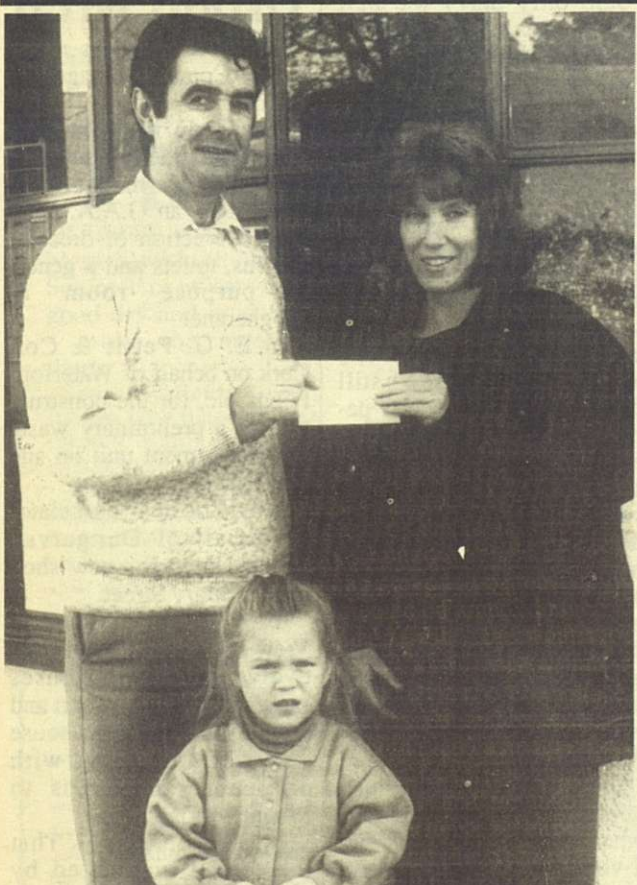

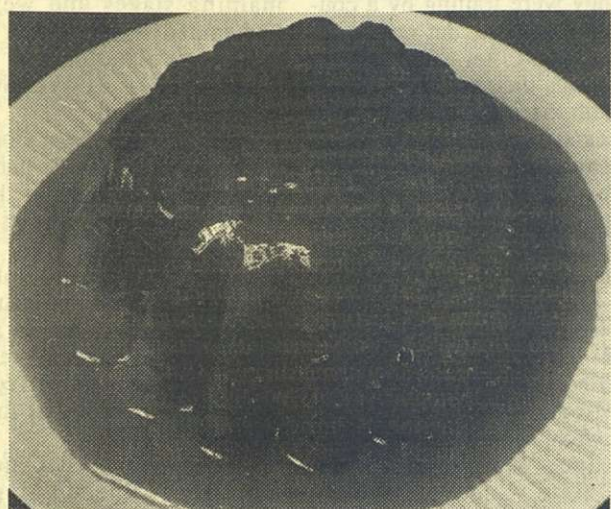

 little milk
To serve: little extra lemon curd
Method:
 Butter a 1½ pint (900ml) pudding mould or basin and put lemon curd in base. Cream butter and sugar

There's still lots to do this month

OCTOBER is sometimes blessed with an 'Indian Summer' or at least some good dry and mild days — make the most of them.

There is plenty to do, starting with digging while the soil is still warm and crumbly and easily worked.

The first job for the fork and spade should be lifting frost-prone plants and harvesting any crops left in the soil, such as potatoes and the last of the root crops — though the latter should really have been lifted and stored during September.

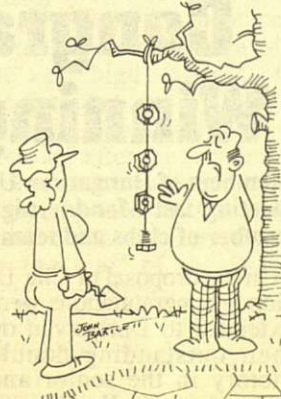
Then go on to prepare the soil for any autumn planting or simply to break it up loosely for the winter weather to really pound and crumble it.

Apples and pears should be picked as they ripen, with longer-keeping apple varieties best picked late.

Store apples in cool, well-ventilated but even slightly damp conditions without touching — don't forget the old saying about one bad apple spoiling the rest.

Good specimens can be wrapped separately to preserve flavour but regularly check all your stock for any going soft or rotten.

Pears like similar conditions but keep them away from apples and never wrap them as they can quickly over-ripen.



"I distinctly heard you say put some nuts out for the birds."

Turning to the lawn, give it a good aerating by slitting or spiking with one of the many tools available or simply using your trusty fork or spade.

This will break up any flattening caused by heavy usage during the summer and also allow you to make the most of an application of autumn feed.

New lawns sown in August and September should now be trimmed at about two inches and again within the next four or so weeks.

One often neglected job is to clean up the base of the hedge where insect pests overwinter ready to plague you next year. Flush 'em out and pay yourself a dividend by planting primroses and snowdrops if the hedge is not coniferous.

If you've been saying you will plant a hedge and want to make up for delays of the



past then choose the hybrid Leylandii. It is fast-growing and tolerates hard clipping into a dense hedge.

Geraniums should be moved to a frost-free greenhouse, sunny windowsill or even a shed or garage though, in those last two locations they may emerge next spring minus most of their leaves.

But if the geraniums have to be dug up and moved then prune them to six inches and remove all leaves. Then plant tight together in trays of compact and slightly moist peat. Most should survive for potting up next spring.

Another Major UK Acquisition By Waterford Foods

Waterford Foods plc. has reached conditional agreement to acquire the business and assets of United Co-Operative Dairies (UCD) a Stg. £88 million turnover dairy company operating in the greater Manchester area. When combined with Healds Foods Ltd. (Healds), this acquisition means that Waterford Foods will control the second largest dairy business in the North West of England.

Stephen O'Connor, Managing Director of Waterford Foods described the acquisition as "an outstanding opportunity for the Group in the context of our strategic plan. It enables the Group to develop rapidly and substantially in an excellent market arena," he said. The combination of UCD and Healds gives Waterford Foods control of the second largest dairy business in a region with a population of over 7 million.

COMBINED TURNOVER OF STG. £190M.

The merged Heald and UCD business with a combined turnover of Stg. £190 million will process 60 million gallons of milk in 4 dairies and will have 750 milk rounds, 37 depots and 400,000 doorstep cus-

tomers. UCD is adjacent to Heald Foods, which is a vital consideration in terms of future integration of the two businesses. Franchising of doorstep deliveries is well advanced and is expected to further enhance future profitability. Healds, purchased in 1989 was the first overseas acquisition for Waterford, and has performed extremely well within the Group.

Established in 1931 UCD currently processes 36 million gallons of milk annually in two production units at Hyde, Cheshire, and Oswaldtwistle, Lancashire. It supplies fresh milk and other dairy products through doorstep deliveries and major supermarket chains, and has extensive sales to other co-operative societies and dairy compa-

nies. It is also a substantial processor of cream, sterilised and long life dairy products which it distributes nationally. The other businesses of UCD include the supply of catering products, frozen gateaux and ice cream to hotels, restaurants and other various outlets.

A circular to shareholders will be issued in due course.

PRE-TAX PROFITS DOUBLED

In the interim results for the first half of 1991, announced on September 12, Waterford Foods plc doubled its pre-tax profits to IR £7.7 million, compared to IR £3.85 million in the first half of 1990. Earnings per ordinary share were 4.21p, compared to 2.38p in the same period of last year. This represented an increase in first half earnings of 77 per cent.

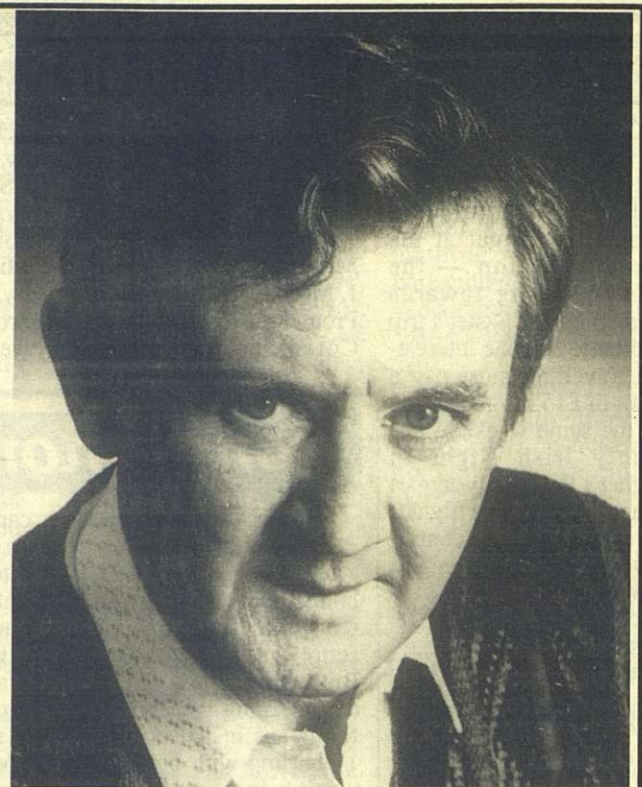

By winning the Tour of Lombardy Kelly — a previous winner in 1983 and 1985 — became one of the only four riders to win it three times. And only two riders are above Kelly — Alfredo Binda of Italy who won four times, and his compatriot Fausto Coppi who holds the record of five wins.

"Certainly this has been a very important win for me. After all my troubles this year with my broken collar bone, abandoning the Tour de France and my brother's death it's great to finish the year on a winning note," said Kelly.

Despite what mischievous sections of the media say, Charlton would have preferred the win and only saw the value of the draw in that light. Turkey will be a handful at home but I feel we have the way to beat them.

England have it in their hands to qualify and it's up to them. Ireland must recover from this searching set back. No doubt Charlton will see to that. —(B.K.)

WATERFORD v. LIMERICK

Following their heavy defeat by Longford at Portlaoise on Sunday last in the All-Ireland 'B' competition, our county team will need to show very considerable improvement if they are to have a chance of beating Limerick in the first round of the Royal Liver football league at Limerick on next Sunday.

Having ran them so close in the championship, Limerick will go all out to repeat that result and will treat the clash with great caution. Limerick's tremendous display in the Munster final against Kerry showed what an improved football side they can be and will now be strongly fancied to go the distance in our section of the league.

Waterford were without nearly half of their panel for last Sunday's match, so it would be misleading to judge them on that display. How they will be fixed for next Sunday's game, is something that we must wait to see when the team is selected later in the week. With county champions, Dungarvan, playing Munster Club football and Shamrocks involved in the intermediate hurling semi-final on Saturday, the county selectors will have a problem in naming their team which must include a number of the players who will be engaged in these club matches. The match has been transferred to Limerick grounds from Askeaton and this may be some little advantage to us, since we have a poor record of success at Askeaton over the years.

In all the circumstances we will travel more in hope than in confidence, but if our side play as well as we are capable of performing against Limerick, we must have a chance against the favourites.

LISMORE v. BALLYDUFF

This Munster Club hurling first round game in which our new county champions face the Kerry champions, Ballyduff at Lismore on Saturday afternoon is a very big occasion for Lismore and while there are hopes that it will be a successful first timer for our representatives, there is also the realisation that they are really up against it in trying to beat a team who have won sixteen county titles in Kerry since 1955.

Not only have Ballyduff won the championship in the Kingdom this year, they have played in the last four county finals. Led by players like John Hennessey (who was an All-Star replacement last year), Christy Ross, Noel Browne, Pa O'Rourke, Jimmy Barron, Chris Houlihan and others who have tremendous championship experience and were on the All-Ireland winning Kerry team in the 'B' All-Ireland, they will be a very difficult side to overcome. Ballyduff won the All-Ireland for Kerry way back in 1891 and they will travel to Wexford on next Sunday to play Crossbeg in a tournament over the long week-end to commemorate the final of a century ago.

The good news from our point of view is that Lismore will play at full strength and that they have prepared very well for this challenge. They are taking the game very seriously and curtailed their celebrations of winning our championship in order to be fit and ready for Saturday's match. One of their mentors told me on Sunday that they were going into this game to represent Waterford as well as Lismore and that they know full well what was expected of them. He also said that they were hopeful of playing as well as they did against Mount Sion in the final. Many hurling supporters believe that hurling in Kerry is way behind our standards at club and county level, but the results prove otherwise as we found in the Munster championships this year. Last year, Causeway, who were the Kerry champions, almost beat the Tipperary champions in a replay

and Ballyduff have since beaten Causeway. So this clash on Saturday will provide a major challenge for Lismore, who are expected to field the side who scored a well deserved win over Mount Sion three weeks ago.

Declan Landers will play in goal and will hopefully further enhance his reputation as one of the county's best net minders this year.

J.J. Duggan, Dave Barry and Mark Sullivan in the full back line and Brendan Crowley, team captain Seamus Prendergast and Billy Lee will complete a defence which helped the team so magnificently throughout their campaign in the current championships. Carthage Barry and Brendan Prendergast will form the midfield partnership again and if both play as well as they did in the county final they should be able to hold their own against Ballyduff's Christy Ross and Mike Joy.

Lismore will have Paul and Sean Prendergast with Brendan Lawton in the half forward line and inside Donal Landers (man of the match in the final) Sean Daly and Michael O'Sullivan. They also have a very strong back-up team of substitutes, several of whom could be expected to be given a call-up during the game if any of the regulars are playing to form.

Winning a Munster Club title is probably a long way off at the moment, but such an achievement is not impossible and it would certainly put the icing on the cake for Lismore who have already won every title from under 14 upwards in the home championships over the years.

The club have produced a 48 page programme which will be one sale at the game which is being refereed by Joe O'Leary, Cork.

Hopefully Lismore will win this first rounder which will take them to the provincial semi-final against Middleton in Midleton in two week's time.

Presentation Of County Medals — Lismore club will hold a special social function on Sunday night when the championship medals will be presented by County Chairman, Frankie

Cullinane.

DUNGARVAN v. DOONBEG

Our football county champions will also be in action on Saturday next and they will have to make the very long journey to Doonbeg to play the Clare champions there. Doonbeg is the home of Clare footballers and has proved to be an unfortunate venue for visiting teams, county and club, over the years. It must, therefore mean something to the Banner county champions when they play hosts to Dungarvan on Saturday. Several of their players were on the Clare county team who defeated Limerick in the 'B' championships on Sunday last, so by all accounts they will provide formidable opposition for our representatives. Dungarvan played very well in the Munster Club championship last year so they won't fail on the score of experience.

They will not be able to field at full strength as John Ferncombe and David O'Connor are still on the injured list. As far as I am aware the other players who helped to win two county titles in a row are available and fully tuned up for the challenge.

Pat Flynn who played very well as substitute goalkeeper in the final, Dermot Dee, Darrell Donnelly and Peter Queally will be their rear-guard behind Martin Kelly, Eddie Burke and Martin Sheehan. Team captain Derek Lyons and David Burke will man the centre-field area and in the forward section, Dermot Callaghan, Morrie Ferncombe, who was their top scorer all through the championship and P.P. Ferncombe (the man who kicked over the 100th point of the 1991 championship) will likely be Dungarvan's half forward line in attack. Denis McGrath and Ger Beresford will be corner forwards and the vacant full forward berth could be given to any of a number of very eligible forwards. It is possible that a rearrangement of the forwards will be considered to take care of the vacancy.

It will take a top class display by Dungarvan to meet this challenge, and by all accounts they will not find it easy to win in Doonbeg, but if they play to form and with the same determination which saw them emerge as our county champions for the second year running, they must stand a good chance of winning.

AN RINN v. MODELIGO

Practically everyone who saw both the junior football semi-finals at Cappoquin on Sunday last, are agreed that the Gaeltacht team will go forward to the divisional

final as firm favourites. This does not mean that Modeligo are not in the game with a chance or that they can be written off before the final is played. They played a lot of very good football on Sunday and won an amount of ball in difficult situations, but at the same time they made more than their quota of silly mistakes that caused them problems at times. Nicky Donovan, who missed the semi-final because of a knee injury, hopes to be back in action on Sunday and this will be something of a bonus for Modeligo and it would be a pity if this great servant of the club were to miss out on a final occasion.

An Rinn are playing splendid football and are very tuned up by trainer David Kiely who has them in the peak of condition in both codes.

They got it relatively easy against Tallow last Sunday and will find this challenge more difficult, but with several exceptionally good junior players they must be strongly fancied to complete the hurling and football double.

This is the only game at the venue on Sunday and the Cappoquin Club have asked me to announce that third level students must produce proper identification to be admitted through the turnstiles. It has come to the notice of the Boards and clubs like Cappoquin who have been controlling gates for our games, that this privilege is being abused by some patrons. The Cappoquin Club will insist on the regulation being adhered to on Sunday next.

SHAMROCKS v. ERIN'S OWN

This is the second of our intermediate hurling semi-finals and it will attract a big crowd to Fraher Field on Saturday afternoon. Because of their involvement in other championship games, the semi-final has been delayed for a bit, but of the two clubs, Shamrocks have been waiting for a much longer time. Up until two weeks ago Shamrocks were concentrating on football and it was only after their defeat by Sliabh gCua that they switched back to hurling. In this game, Shamrocks will be the outsiders and Erin's Own seem to have very suddenly bounced back as serious championship contenders, having struggled along with little success for a few seasons. Their amazing resurgence which brought them from 14 points in arrears to draw with Colligan before beating them in the replay is still a talking point around the county.

A win for the Shamrocks would be a very popular result as this club, with a small catchment area have been

plugging away in this championship for quite a while without success. They have a strong team with a fair amount of skill and great determination and they will certainly run the city side very close, but just now it will take a mammoth effort on their part to overpower this new look Erin's Own team led by Damien Byrne, who proved the match winner against Colligan.

LADIES FOOTBALL EXHIBITION

Ireland's best lady footballers will be seen in action at Fraher Field on Sunday next when All-Ireland champions, Waterford, take on the All-Stars in an official tournament game.

Following their recent success and their performances in previous matches, five of the Waterford girls were awarded All-Star recognition. They are Martina O'Ryan, Aine Wall, Ann Dunford, Marie Crotty and Ann Fitzpatrick. It is also known that a few other members of the successful Waterford team were borderline cases for selection.

The five will not be included in the All-Stars selection on Sunday as all have opted to play for the county.

The game here should be the best we have so far seen in ladies football and is certain to attract a huge crowd. Those who have not yet seen a tournament game of this standard, should not miss the opportunity as it may be a very long time before such a high-profile match will be played in the county.

RECEPTION

The victorious team and party were given a really wonderful reception when they returned to the county on Monday. It was great in Waterford city and in Leamybrien, but Dungarvan were not to be outdone in this regard and they came out in strength to accord the happy champions, a tumultuous reception. Michael Ryan, the team trainer thanked the crowd for the reception and in a short address he outlined the sacrifices that had been made by the ladies and their parents in trying to get to and win a senior All-Ireland for Waterford. One of the many interesting things which he said was that a total of 55 matches had been played this year and on every occasion when they travelled the players each had to pay £6 to help with the cost of transport. This is thought provoking and the first thought that strikes me is that if the players in the hurling and football clubs were asked to make the same sacrifices, there would be something of a revolt in the clubs.

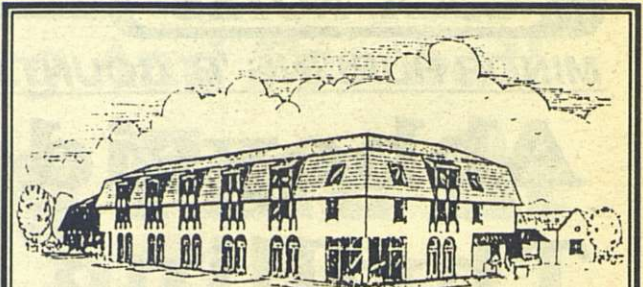
Abbeyside Girl Guides Notes

as difficult as possible.

"I note with irony that some of our prominent players who have been less than co-operative with the current selectors are from the same clubs as these officials," he claimed.

He said that all sponsorship for the senior hurlers over the last twelve months was arranged by the selec-

tors without any co-operation from the County Board and claims that the Board tried to prevent the selectors from acquiring sponsorship for "perks" for the players.

Also, a Finance Committee which had been helping with full support for medical expenses had withdrawn that support "for some inexplicable reason."

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
