HALL FOR YOUGHAL

Plans for an exciting sports facility for the town of Youghal were announced by Mr. Pat Nolan, Chairman of the "Hall for Youghal" Committee at a press conference held on Thursday, October 24 at the Walter Raleigh Hotel.

Present were Mr. Bob Troy, representing the Youghal Chamber of Commerce; Mr. Paddy Lenihan, Chairman of Youghal U.D.C.; Mr. Denis Murphy, Chairman of the Board of Management of the Youghal Technical College and also local representative of the Cork V.E.C. and Rev. Canon Thornhill, P.P., Youghal. The sporting organisations of the town were well represented. The project is being organised by the staff and parents of the Youghal C.B.S. Secondary School.

The Cork County Vocational Education Committee authority has proposed to make available the spacious site between the Youghal

Technical College and the Secondary School for the building of an Indoor Sports Hall.

When asked why such a project was being undertaken, a spokesman for the Hall for Youghal Committee said that indoor facilities are es-

sential in order to provide a continuous programme of physical education for pupils throughout the winter months, since it was not unusual for pupils to be deprived of P.E. during the periods of inclement weather. The spokesperson paid tribute to the pupils of the C.B.S. Secondary School who have excelled themselves in football, hurling, golf and tennis in recent years.

Lismore Waste Disposal Site

Cllr. Willie McDonnell, Chairman, Waterford County Council has received the following letter from Mr. John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer:

Dear Chairman, I refer to your representations to me concerning the closure of Lismore Waste Disposal Site and outlines for the establishment of a Waste Transfer Station at Lismore. The position is as follows:

As you are aware Lismore

Waste Disposal Site has now been closed due to the fact that it is full and unable to accommodate further waste. It is our intention to develop and open a transfer station on the same site in Lismore as soon as practicable. In this regard a tender has been accepted for the provision of the mechanical equipment necessary for this site and tenders are being sought for the civil engineering works ac-

companying the installation of the equipment. When these have been received work will commence and it is hoped to have the station opened by the end of the year or early in the new year. I would inform you that it is also proposed to instal equipment for the extraction of CFC's from disused fridges and freezers at the Lismore site.

I trust this is the information you require.

Michael Nolan, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, had been given 24 hours to pay £88 compensation when he appeared before Judge Windle at Dungarvan Court on the previous day where he pleaded guilty to causing malicious damage to a window at O'Connell

Street, Dungarvan, on October 3.

When Mr. David Keane solr. disclosed that Nolan had been unable to raise the money because he would not receive his dole until the following Tuesday, Judge Windle sent him to prison for one month.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I am insured at the Class D rate of PRSI and understand that if I start to pay Class A PRSI before my 56th birthday that it will be possible for me to get a Contributory Old Age Pension. I have been offered part-time weekend work for which I will be paid £30. Will this be insurable at the Class A rate of PRSI?

Answer — No! In your particular case it will be insurable at Class J.

Civil and Public Servants who pay the modified rate of PRSI in their main job and who also have part-time jobs are only insurable at Class J rate in the part-time job. Some employers may not be aware of this and might incorrectly record the person at the Class A rate. This would eventually come to light and the Class A rate would be changed to Class J and you would be refunded the difference between the two rates. However, people earning less than £60 are exempt from paying their share of PRSI. So, only the employer would be due such a refund in these circumstances.

Atlantic Seek New Partner In Helvick Oil Field

Atlantic Resources is seeking a new partner for its Celtic Sea interests following the decision by the Australian/Dutch consortium not to proceed with development after drawing up a feasibility study.

"The study showed that in certain circumstances development of the Helvick oil field would appear to be commercially feasible.

"However, the consortium declined the opportunity to participate in the development in view of perceived attendant risks," Chairman Dr. A. J. F. O'Reilly tells shareholders in his statement with the interim results.

He adds that Atlantic "is currently reviewing the development possibilities with

other companies in light of the recently completed production plan."

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Former Co. G.A.A. Board Chairman's High Court Application

Eamonn O Murchú, the suspended chairman of the Waterford Co. Board of the G.A.A., wants an early hearing of his case against the Association because he is anxious to run for office again, the High Court in Dublin was told last Monday.

Mr. Justice Lardner adjourned for one week the hearing of Mr. O Murchú's application for a declaration that his one year suspension is contrary to the rules of the G.A.A.

Mr. David Kennedy, BL, for Mr. O Murchú of Shanclune, Dunhill, Co. Waterford, said the urgency arose because for reasons best known to themselves, the Waterford Board had brought forward the date of the annual county convention by six weeks.

Mr. O Murchú, who wanted to go forward for office, had to have his nomination papers lodged by November 16. Mr. Kennedy said his client would not be in a position to run for chairman if he was not reinstated before that date.

Mr. Liam McKechnie, SC,

for the Association, said the allegation was that Mr. O Murchú breached the amateur status rules and that there were ancillary breaches.

The decision to hold the convention earlier had been made in April of this year and was unrelated to these proceedings brought by Mr. O Murchú. The first decision had been made in relation to Mr. O Murchú in May and his appeal was disposed of in June this year.

The proceedings on behalf of Mr. O Murchú were not brought until October. He had done nothing for three months knowing how the matter might affect him.

HOTLY CONTESTED

Mr. McKechnie said that the allegations against the

defendants were that the proceedings had not been in accordance with the rules of natural justice. In his view the best that Mr. O Murchú could hope for, if successful, was that the matter go back for rehearing. The issues would be hotly contested.

The dispute arose out of the appointment in 1990 of Joseph McGrath to be coach to the county hurling team and who was to get £15,000 per annum and expenses.

Mr. O Murchú claims he has been singled out for victimisation and as a scapegoat for certain other members of the Association.

The annual convention of the County Board is fixed for December 14 and Divisional Boards meet on December 5.

Invisible Cyclists

The National Safety Council is mounting a campaign during November aimed at invisible cyclists. Too many cyclists don't seem to realise that without lights they cannot be seen by motorists — they are next to invisible, indeed most drivers can tell of near misses with unlighted bikes.

This is not just the National Safety Council being alarmist — cyclists do get killed. Since January 1988, 142 have been killed and 1,889 injured.

Yet surveys show that less than 40% of cyclists are lighted. Who are these cyclists? Mostly the 16 to 25 age group and this is the high risk group being targeted in the new campaign.

"BIKES NEED LIGHTS" CAMPAIGN

The National Safety Council and the Gardai are joining forces — as they do for the Anti Drink/Driving campaign — to make cyclists aware of the need to "light up."

"We are mounting one of our most determined campaigns against unlighted cyclists ever," said Gavin

Freeman, Information Officer, National Safety Council. "Unlighted cyclists are a menace — they are a danger to themselves and to all other roads users. We are highlighting this fact throughout November when longer hours of darkness increase the danger."

Large posters at bus stops in all the major cities will carry a dramatic message and there will be attention getting ads. on radio. In all the National Safety Council are spending £30,000 on this month long campaign.

The Gardai will strengthen the campaign by a stricter enforcement of the law on unlighted bikes. All Garda Stations have recently received instructions on this. Unlighted cyclists will be prosecuted.

Road Safety Measures At Leamybrien

I wish to refer further to your representations on behalf of the parents of the Council's Housing Estate at Leamybrien regarding the provision of traffic ramps to slow down traffic using the

link between the two main roads and thereby enhance road safety.

I have had this matter examined in the context of the Road Traffic (Bollards & Ramps) Regulations and am informed that the location concerned would not comply with the provisions of these regulations and

that accordingly it is not possible to provide speed ramps at this location. However, in order to alleviate the situation I am asking the Area Engineer to erect Children At Play signs at either end of the link road concerned. I trust this will have a beneficial effect.

Deasy

NATURAL GAS SUPPLY

Deputy Austin Deasy asked the Minister for Energy if he will examine the feasibility of extending the national gas grid to Dungarvan, County Waterford.

In his reply Energy Minister Mr. Bobby Molloy said: Bord Gais Eireann has a statutory obligation to develop and maintain a system for the supply of natural gas on a commercial basis. Accordingly, proposals for the extension of the gas grid are a matter for the Board itself to assess in the light of that obligation.

I am advised by the Board that it is not, at this time, considering a supply for Dungarvan. The nearest gas supply is 20 miles away, the cost of extending the gas network would be very high and there are no loads en route which would contribute, in any significant way, towards recovering the infrastructural cost. In these circumstances, the Board is satisfied that it would not be

economically viable to extend the network to Dungarvan.

GARRANBANE N.S.

Deputy Deasy asked the Minister for Education if she will grant approval for the appointment of a fourth teacher to Garranbane National School, Dungarvan in view of (1) the increase in pupils to 140 and (2) the demographic study carried out locally which will ensure that these numbers will be maintained and further increased over the next four years.

Minister for Education (Mary O'Rourke, T.D.) in reply stated:

The staffing of national schools for a particular year is determined by the enrolment in the school on 30th

September of the previous year. This is in accordance with the Agreement on Staffing made between the Government and the I.N.T.O.

As this school had an enrolment of 108 pupils on 30th September 1990, the authorised staffing of the school for the 1991/92 school year is Principal and 3 Assistants.

My Department has received an application from the Board of Management of the school for the appointment of a 4th Assistant and has informed my Department that enrolments have increased substantially. Because of this I have requested an Inspector from my Department to furnish a report on the school. On receipt of this report my Department will be in touch with the school authorities regarding this matter.

THE LATE PATRICK SHEEHAN R.I.P.

The unexpected death of Pa, as he was affectionately known, Convent Street, Tallow, on Friday, November 1, 1991, sent waves of shock throughout the town and surrounding areas. He will be sorely missed in the community. In his 82nd year he was an agile man and it was a familiar sight to see Pa driving his car in the neighbourhood.

Pa was well known all over West Waterford - East Cork area, where he worked, until his retirement in 1972, as an insurance agent for the Royal Liver Insurance Co. He also carried out plumbing and electrical work in the town up to some years ago.

He was a devout Catholic and was always involved in Church activities where he served for many years as a collector and fund-raiser. He was a kind and generous man who was willing to help everyone. He was a special friend to the Carmelite Community in Tallow by whom he will be sadly missed.

But it was as a G.A.A. man that Pa will be remembered throughout the county. In his younger days he won minor, junior and Munster medals with Waterford and was on the Waterford senior team that was defeated by Dublin in the 1938 All-Ireland. His love of hurling saw him travel to hurling matches all over the country and he saw his last match on the previous Saturday when Lismore defeated Ballyduff (Kerry) in the Munster Club Championship. He held all offices in the Tallow Club and was President at the time of this death.

His remains were removed to the Church of the Immaculate Conception and were received by Very Rev. M. Walsh P.P. In attendance were Fr. Killian O.C.D., Loughrea, Fr. Bonaventure, Fr. Cotter and Fr. Fitzgerald. Requiem Mass on Sunday was concelebrated by Fr. Clancy and Fr. Killian. Fr. Killian's homily referred to Pa as a true follower of Christ.

Soloist Josephine Barry accompanied by Alice Tobin and Tallow Parish Choir rendered appropriate hymns.

Fr. Walsh, P.P. officiated at the graveside after which Pádraig O Fainin former President of the G.A.A. delivered a most gracious oration.

The coffin was draped in the blue and gold of his beloved Tallow colours, and on both days a guard of honour was formed of past and present members of the Tallow G.A.A. Club and members from the St. Catherine's, Shamrocks, Ballyduff, Lismore, Tourin, Cappoquin, Dungarvan, Abbeyside, Paddy Walsh, Colligan and Mount Sion Clubs. LAUNCH OF NEW IRISH RURAL LINK

THE NATIONAL HERITAGE COUNCIL

In a Dail Question, Deputy Austin Deasy asked the Taoiseach last Wednesday if he would outline additional incentives available through his Department to centres which have been classified as heritage towns.

Mr. Haughey in his replay stated that funding for projects relating to the physical heritage was available from the National Heritage Council subject to his approval and he pointed out that the Council had already assisted a project in a town now designated as a heritage town.

The Taoiseach went on to say that the question of whether or not to offer grant assistance to projects was entirely a matter for the Council which has complete independence in deciding on the priorities for grant assistance and the amounts, if any, in each case. Mr. Haughey further stated that it would be a matter for those concerned with projects in heritage towns to make application direct to the Council.

Deputy Deasy's question is a very relevant one as Lismore has been designated a Heritage Town and a good deal of progress has already been made in establishing the structures on which its development as a heritage and tourism centre will be progressed.

In this regard we believe that it might be well that we do not go over the top in what is to be expected when all these developments have been put in place and the town and district of Lismore is functioning as a heritage and tourism centre. We have heard claims made on local radio that Lismore will become as good an area to attract visitors as Killarney but with the greatest will in the world we believe that such claims tend only to raise false hopes.

Without doubt the plans for Lismore, once they have materialised, should see an appreciable increase in the numbers that visit the historic town of St. Carthage located as it is in beautiful sylvan surroundings on the banks of the Irish Rhine. But there is no point in over-reacting to the position by claiming that Lismore will out-Killarney,

Killarney as this will only raise hopes which will hardly ever materialise and which will, sooner rather than later, create a great deal of disappointment among the local residents.

Certainly the plans for the Cathedral town now in train are deserving of every support and a good deal of prosperity is bound to accrue to the locality when they become fully operative. The developments should also prove a most welcome fillip to the economy of West Waterford in general.

NO MORE FIRE AND BRIMSTONE

The two weeks Mission preached by the Redemptorist Fathers in the parish of Dungarvan proved to be a wonderful success and one of the most edifying scenes witnessed in the town for a long time took place at the final closing on last Sunday week when more than twelve hundred people packed the spacious edifice of St. Mary's Parish Church for the closing ceremonies.

For the record the names of the Redemptorists who conducted the mission were Fathers Tony and Peter Flannery and Fr. Pat McLaughlin. It was a mixed mission with ceremonies taking place in both the Parish and Friary Churches. The first week was devoted mainly to the teenagers of the parish and the second was for the adult population. Like all post Vatican Two missions, the sermons and talks were more subdued and gone were the fire and brimstone of old, an aspect of the mission which was stressed by the missionaries who declared that the old pulpit thumping preacher was a thing of the past.

It was interesting to note during the second week of the mission that one of the permanent features of all the missions of old again made their appearance. These were the mission

stalls which, as tradition has it, displayed an attractive array of holy objects which were freely purchased as souvenirs of the Parish Mission of 1991.

Speaking at Mass last weekend, Very Rev. Canon Power, P.P. referred to the edifying scenes witnessed during the mission particularly at the closing ceremonies and said that he and all the priests of the parish were most pleased with the wonderful manner in which the people had turned out throughout the Mission. We feel sure that the Redemptorist Fathers were equally pleased with the success of their efforts and returned to their base happy in the knowledge of a job well done.

AMBULANCES SHOULD GET RIGHT OF WAY

It is an unwritten rule of the road that ambulances on emergency runs to hospitals be given the right of way by all other traffic. We should all realise that where emergencies occur it is vital that those injured or taken suddenly ill be moved to hospital for treatment with the least possible delay. Minutes sometimes can prove the difference between life and death. There should be no need for us to stress this as it is something that every responsible person should be well aware of.

However there are still those on the road who are not prepared to give the right of way to an ambulance even when it comes up with the emergency siren blaring. We were informed of such a case recently when an ambulance taking a very ill patient to Waterford Regional Hospital was obstructed several times by vehicles which failed to allow it to pass. This failure by certain road-users cannot be too strongly condemned. Holding up an ambulance on such a mission could well mean life or death for some one. So let us all remember that.

IT'S AN OSTRICH ATTITUDE

Last week we had reports in the "Leader" of the Annual Meeting of Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and from the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council of a discussion on a motion calling for a review of the parking and traffic policy at present operating in the town.

The Chamber of Commerce meeting was attended by more than forty business people who heard their incoming President

declare in his opening speech that while Dungarvan was an excellent business town, they had, in recent years been losing shoppers to Waterford and Cork but particularly to Clonmel. No reason for this drop-off was put forward.

In the case of the Urban Council discussion the topic of business in the town also came up when the two backers of the motion before the meeting put forward the claim that it was the intensive operations of the two traffic wardens in the town which was responsible for the decline in the number of outside shoppers. However most of the Council members appeared to disagree with this and one went so far as to say that he had been told by several shop-owners in the town that they had never experienced such a good run of business as they had during the past summer!

This surely is at variance with the views expressed at the Chamber of Commerce meeting. It is also at variance with the entire tenor of the feed-back which has come in following the publication of last week's reports in the "Leader." We did have a big reaction from readers to the subject with the principal questions asking being, 'are they (the Councillors) living on the moon?' and 'why are they adopting such an ostrich attitude to this problem?'

In the latest Tourism and Travel statistics released last week it was shown that there was a 25,000 drop in the total of overseas visitors to Ireland during the peak summer period this year as well as a substantial decrease of 46,000 in the number on non-resident Irish people travelling on Cross-Channel air routes. Very obviously Dungarvan must have been affected, however slightly, by this fall-off in foreign tourists and Irish people coming home on holidays to Ireland.

In the overall, the opinions expressed by the Chamber of Commerce members where business problems in the town are concerned would seem to be nearer the mark than some of those held by the Urban Councillors, all but one of whom are not connected with business activities, and this would indicate that the fact of the matter is that a problem does exist.

Perhaps a joint meeting between the Council and the Chamber at which all aspects of the problem would be discussed might result in an acceptable solution which would again see Dungarvan become an attractive place for all to visit and do their shopping in leisure.

KEVIN BARRY

It was on November 1, 1920 that Kevin Barry, then a young medical student in UCD and a member of the Volunteers in the College, was executed in Mountjoy Jail and became "another martyr for old Ireland" as the ballad which immortalises his memory tells us.

An account of those tragic and stirring times is contained in an article written by a University colleague of the patriot and which came into our possession all of 30 years ago.

In this she relates that: "On our return to the College in October, 1920 there was a persistent rumour that Kevin Barry had been caught and was a prisoner in Mountjoy Jail. He had taken part in an ambush in North King Street in which a soldier had been killed. Kevin had been found crouched under a lorry with a jammed revolver in his hand. Although he had not fired a single shot the authorities were determined to make an example and it became evident that they would be satisfied with nothing less than the death penalty. His youth was not to save him from the hangman's rope . . .

"On the evening of October 31, Hallow Eve, we knelt in the rain outside Mountjoy Jail reciting the Rosary. Inside those grim walls Kevin Barry was bidding his mother a last farewell. His fortitude was heroic. His only thought was for her. He was not afraid to die, he told her, he was a soldier of Ireland and he was proud to die for his country. As she left him after saying farewell for the last time, he drew himself up and stood rigidly to attention, and it was thus she saw him for the last time her gallant soldier son."

The account then goes on: "On that dismal Monday morning, November 1, 1920 we marched with the Cumann na mBan from St. Stephen's Green to Mountjoy Jail and on the cobblestones there we knelt and prayed. There must have been several thousands kneeling there. An armoured car patrolled the area, but the crowd was quiet and there were no incidents. At 8 o'clock we heard the passing-bell from the prison tower. An official emerged and affixed a notice to the prison gate and we knew it was all over. The notice read:

The Sentence of the law passed on Kevin Barry found guilty of murder was carried into execution at 8 a.m. to-day.

By Order.

"Fr. Albert prepared him for death and said Mass in his cell. He spoke to us afterwards and told us how he died a brave and holy death, resigned to God's will and praying for his enemies."

Seventy-one years have passed since Kevin Barry died. His name has passed into history. The song composed in his memory has now become one of our most loved patriotic ballads. In the annals of his country and in the hearts of those who remember those tragic, troubled times in Ireland, Kevin Barry's name will never die.

In Mountjoy Jail one Monday morning,
High upon the gallows tree,
Kevin Barry gave his young life,
In the cause of liberty,
Just a lad of eighteen summers,
Yet no one can deny,
As he walked to death that morning,
Proud he held his head on high.

Just before he faced the hangman,
In his dreary prison cell,
British soldiers tortured Barry,
Just because he would not tell,
The names of his brave comrades,
And the things they wished to know,
"Turn informer or we will kill you,"
Kevin Barry answered "No!"

Calmly standing to attention
While he bade his last farewell,
To his broken-hearted mother
Whose grief no one can tell,
For the cause he proudly cherished
This sad parting had to be,
Then to death walked, softly smiling
That old Ireland might be free.

Another martyr for old Ireland,
Another murder for the Crown,
Whose brutal laws might kill the Irish
But can't keep their spirit down.
Lads like Barry are no cowards,
From the foe they will not fly;
Lads like Barry will free Ireland,
For her sake they'll live and die.

Best Time To Tidy Up And Plant Shrubs

THERE may not be much to see and cheer about in the November garden but there is lots to be done, both tidying up from the previous season and preparing for next.

It calls for an orderly mind to list your priorities and with the weather beginning to deteriorate, try and get your planting done as soon as possible.

For instance, this is the right time to plant deciduous trees and shrubs, climbers - such as honeysuckle or Virginia Creeper - and roses and make sure all are well tied and staked ready for the winter winds.

New fruit trees and bushes should also be planted now and while you are sorting out the new, think about the old - apple and pear trees will need a brave pruning and make sure you cut out and paint any cankers.

While you have the secateurs and knives out you can also prune deciduous trees where necessary and give roses a light pruning as a preparation to the main pruning in spring.

Take these and any other woody or diseased cuttings and burn or bag them up for the household rubbish or a trip to the tip - they will take ages to break down on the compost heap unless you have one of those electric shredder machines to start the process.

Treat these jobs as the priority and do your winter digging and clean up tasks where you can.

Herbaceous borders will be looking scruffy now and most plants can be cut back or discarded, either being spent or starting to suffer frost damage.

Having created some kind of order, start preparing for next season by forking in



well-rotted garden compost or farmyard manure before covering with a mulch of pulverised bark or even shredded newspaper to keep weeds and pests out.

Perhaps surprisingly, November is a key month for working on the lawn especially after the browning suffered in this summer's drought and the ongoing hosepipe bans.

Edges are usually worst hit and can be repaired by simply cutting out an area around the damaged section and turning it inwards where it can easily regenerate. In bad cases, lift and replace with turf from another part of the garden.

It is also possible to lay a new lawn from turf now but good preparation and drainage is vital to ensure good results. Even then frost damage and the cost of turfing make many people opt for the cheaper option of sowing seed sowing seed next spring.

Avoid walking on the lawn now because it is easily damaged after frost or wet weather, but do remove dead leaves when they gather or they will blight the grass where they lay for some time.

If the weather stops you getting outside you could also just check over any stored fruit, vegetables, bulbs and overwintering plants, discarding any rotted ones before they do damage.

Christmas Chutney? Make it now!

NOW is the time to make your Christmas chutneys for the Boxing Day cold cuts.

Making your own chutney takes time but is worth every minute and it can save money. You can use fruits and vegetables of your choice and add the flavourings and spices that appeal to your palate. Make plenty as a well-made chutney will keep for at least two years.

The fruit and vegetables do not have to be of the highest quality, nor do they

necessarily have to be ripe. Even so, it is essential to use sound fruit, discarding anything bruised or damaged.

Plums, marrows, green and red tomatoes, beetroot, sweet peppers, damsons, pears, pumpkins and sour, green apples, are among suitable ingredients. Many recipes also include onions.

An important choice is the type of vinegar. This should be of excellent quality with an acetic acid content of at least five per cent. Generally, malt vinegar gives a better flavour. The vinegar, together with the salt and

spices are preserving agents.

Before getting down to the task, check that everything needed is to hand: suitable sieves, pans, jars and coverings, as well, of course, as the ingredients.

Because certain utensils can give a metallic taste to a chutney, it is best to use nylon sieves and to avoid brass, copper or iron pans. Ordinary jam jars, or pickle jars are suitable containers but whatever lids or coverings are used they must be vinegar-proof, with no risk of vinegar getting straight

on to a metal lid.

If vinegar has a chance to evaporate, the chutney will dry out and shrink. There are ideal commercially-made coverings available but paper covers and some jam covers are unsuitable.

All ingredients need to be cut up very small and allowed to simmer slowly in an uncovered pan until there is no loose liquid left and the ingredients are very soft and smooth, with the consistency of a thick sauce. Bottle, while hot, in clean, warm jars.

HE MAY BE UGLY BUT A WALRUS HAS BRAINS AND DEVOTION ...



THE walrus may seem like one of nature's jokes looking something half-way between an elephant and a whale, with warty skin, and a face as ugly as a satyr; but he is intelligent, a faithful-lover, devoted family man and, unless in danger, rarely dangerous.

BIGGER than his cousins, the seals, he is not so clumsy on land and doesn't have to flop along because he can turn his hind feet forward and can walk after a fashion.

WHEN being chased, or just in a hurry, he can move overland as fast as a man can run.

HIS feet are webbed. The fore-foot has small nails and rough under-pads which helps him keep his footing on ice.

Difference

THERE are two types, the Greenland and the Pacific, but the differences between them are mainly size and weight. A full-grown Pacific walrus is about 12ft long, and weighs between 2,000 and 3,000 lb.

WALRUSES can remain under water for up to an hour and the great weight of their bones helps them keep their balance on the sea floor.

THE sea is their real home and they rarely go far from the water's edge. When they do rest on land, they always lie very close together keeping themselves warm with their thick layers of fat. In autumn they become lethargic and often lie in heaps for days at a time without looking for food.

A walrus's tusks go on growing throughout life and can become 3ft long. They are formidable weapons for he can strike downwards, sideways and even upwards quickly.

Even the polar bear, the only animal strong enough to attack him, has to be careful for if the walrus succeeds in pinning him down he will hold him under water until he drowns.

Huge

ONLY one baby is born at a time; mums could hardly look after two such huge creatures because she has to keep it with her for two years until it grows its own food-digging tusks.

A walrus uses his tusks as spades, digging with them on the shore for the shell-

fish he feeds on. For his dinner, he requires a cartload of shell-fish (500lb) which he ekes out with starfish and shrimps.

OLD walruses are always covered with scores of wounds. Some of them they get from their own kind for they battle fiercely in the mating season, inflicting terrible gashes with his tusks.

THE name "walrus" is a corruption of *whaleros* ("whale-

horse"), given to the creature by the old Vikings.

WHEN dozing on land, they use a novel method of keeping watch for their enemy, the polar bear. One walrus wakes up suddenly, looks round for a minute or two, then gives his neighbour a push before dozing again. The neighbour does the same, and prods the walrus on the other side, and so on all down the line.

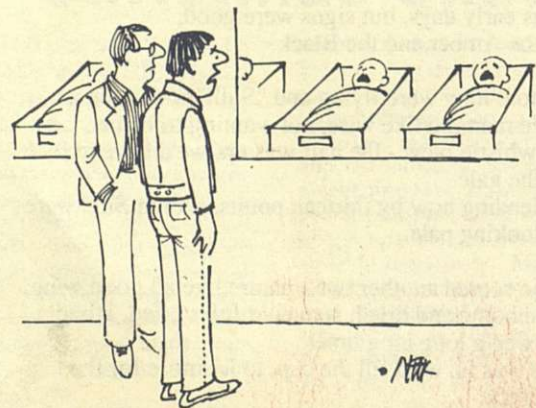

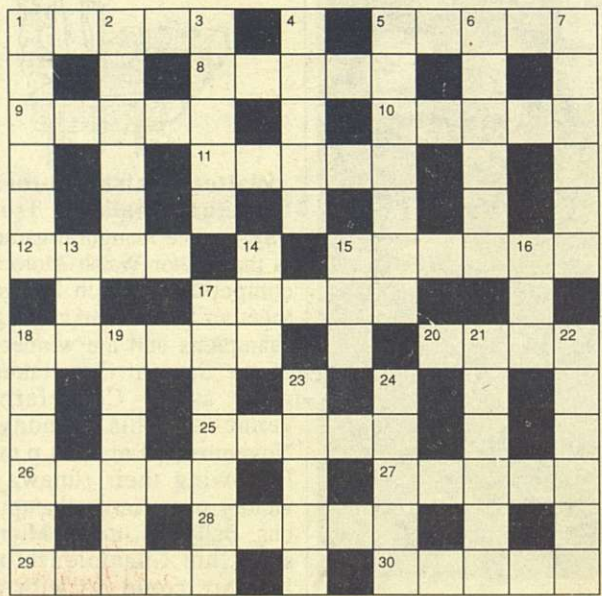

Pa Sheehan R.I.P.

The announcement of the unexpected death of Patrick ('Pa') Sheehan of Tallow caused widespread sympathy throughout the county over the week-end. The great Tallowman's role in all spheres of G.A.A. activity extending over 60 years is very well-known and his wonderful record as one of our leading hurlers as a county and club player has made the very popular Pa Sheehan a legend in this county. Former President of the Association, Pat Fanning, who delivered a fine oration at the graveside in Tallow on Sunday morning described him as one of the 'trail blazers who had brought Waterford hurling out of the darkness and into the limelight in the early and late 'thirties.'

He was a member of our minor team who brought our very first All-Ireland title to Portlaine and was a player on the 1931 and 1934 junior All-Ireland teams, before moving up to senior ranks in the county colours which he wore with distinction on so very many occasions in the good and bad times for his beloved Waterford. Winning a senior hurling title with Tallow in 1936

was one of the many highlights of a great career, but his role in the many other fine achievements of this club will also be long remembered.

I had the privilege of knowing Pa over a very long number of years and like his legion of friends inside and outside the county found him delightful company. He seldom missed a game in which the county or his club played and he was a regular at all the venues when a hurling match in any grade was being played. He was present at the intermediate semi-final between Shamrocks and Erin's Own on the previous Saturday, but was unfortunately involved in a traffic accident some days afterwards and died in hospital on Friday.

At his funeral and burial, very many of his old playing colleagues were present as well as a huge number of G.A.A. people from all over the country. His coffin was draped in the Tallow colours and true to tradition, his club paid him the respects in a very fitting way.

To his family we extend our very sincere sympathy as well as to his club who have lost one their greatest.

Co. Board Meeting

Next Monday night's meeting of the Senior Board will be the last of the year (if the court injunction to have all the conventions deferred is not successful) and will have many important matters for decision on the agenda.

Foremost among these will be the decision on the appointment of a hurling coach and a replacement for county selector Seamus Hannon. Joe McGrath's contract with the hurlers expired on October 31 and his situation will have to be decided on. Only the County Board at a full meeting can decide such matters, so it will be interesting to see what tran-

spires when this matter is finalised. The situation in relation to Ned Power, who was assistant coach, is unclear, even though Ned is believed to have made his feelings known on certain aspects of his role.

There are other important items and reports listed for decision as well.

This game, played in very unsuitable conditions, saw the Gaeltacht team win an overdue county title when they defeated Tramore in an exciting contest before a big crowd at the Fraher Field on Saturday. Tramore were the outsiders but for a time the Ring side must have wondered why their opponents were so under-rated, as at times they led the Western champions a merry dance to hold a half-time five points lead. It was an opportunist goal by Seamie McGrath in the 36th minute which brought the winners into the picture and gave them the inspiration to fight back.

Western Board Meeting

This open Board meeting was called specifically to deal with a number of referees reports, but much other business came up for discussion as well. Jimmy O'Gorman, Chairman presided and there was a reasonably good attendance.

Correspondence from David Whelan, Naomh Brid, who was recently suspended was read as was a letter from his school in relation to his suspension. Both letters pointed out that the severity of the punishment had denied him a chance of playing in roughly ten or twelve competitive games with this club and school. The letters were effectively seeking a reduction of the three months suspension but the Chairman ruled that because the minimum had been imposed by the Board, there was nothing he could do to change the suspension. (The suspension of 12 weeks will end this week.)

Three Kilrossanty officials and one player, Kevin Lonergan, were each suspended for two months for having abused referee Tom Maher, An Rinn, during the course of the divisional minor football final in which Kilrossanty were beaten by Dungarvan. The people concerned had apologised to the referee and at the meeting they publicly apologised both to the referee and the Board.

WESTERN CONVENTION

Many matters relating to the county and divisional conventions were dis-

cussed and Nioclás Mac Craith, An Rinn, said that his club were totally opposed to the decision to bring forward the County convention. His club felt it was not necessary and could not understand why the Board had changed from the traditional date. The Chairman stated that the decision to hold the County convention on December 14 was taken by the Board following discussion on a motion which had been tabled in accordance with rule and accepted unanimously by the meeting of the Senior Board. He also pointed out that the Western Board had no option but to bring forward their convention in the circumstances.

The ruling given last year that minor clubs are not entitled to representation at convention was mentioned by a number of delegates. John Kiely, St. Patrick's, pointed out that in the majority of counties, minor clubs came under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Boards and in other counties minor clubs had a separate Board. This was confirmed by S. O'Brien. The idea of having the minor clubs taken over by Bord na nOg was also referred to but it was pointed out that this would be a matter for convention.

SPONSORSHIP

The matter of sponsorship of the divisional championships was discussed when Treasurer, James Walsh, referred to the huge increase in the price of the Board's championship medals. Last year the medals cost the

Western Board approximately £2,600 and it was difficult to sustain this, particularly if prices kept on increasing. It was discussed, but the meeting eventually decided on holding the quality and seeking to have some of the championships sponsored.

The Chairman thanked the clubs for their support and co-operation during the season and said it was because of the manner in which clubs had helped, that it was possible to complete the championships in reasonably good time. The Board's final championship match was due to be played on the following Saturday.

Final Games

After next week-end, just two championship finals will remain to be played at Western venues. After these finals our venues will close for the winter months. Sliabh gCua are involved in both the above finals. They await the outcome of next Sunday's intermediate Eastern final between Newtown and Portlaw, before knowing their opponents in the county final which is fixed for Dungarvan. Sliabh gCua with Modeligo minors are involved with Naomh Brid who will play Portlaw in the minor "B" county football final.

Naomh Brid Win Minor 'B' Divisional Final

This was the divisional final of the minor 'B' football championship and it was switched to the Abbeyside venue on Sunday and not played as a curtain-raiser to the National League match because of weather conditions.

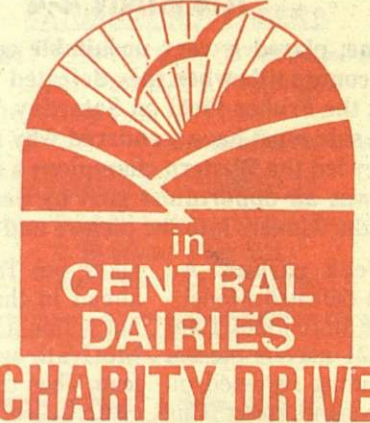
After a considerable
