High Prices Not Wardens Cause Of Shopping Decline Says Manager

County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley lashed out at critics of the town's parking regulations and his decision to appoint two traffic wardens at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night. He said that he was appalled when he read the reports of the discussion on the matter at the previous meeting as he felt that they were absolutely detrimental to the town.

The matter was raised by Cllr. B. Kyne who said that it would be as well to identify whether the debate was about the actual traffic regulations or whether one or two wardens were needed.

He suggested as a possible solution that parts of the town centre be pedestrianised using removable bollards. He condemned comments on local radio about the matter and he

said he was not convinced that outside shoppers were afraid or were being terrorised to the extent stated.

It was felt generally by the traders in Cappoquin that too many parking spaces had been taken over. She asked for replies to the questions as she wanted to report back to a special meeting of the Traders of the town due to take place on that Monday night.


Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who originally raised the matter at a previous meeting took issue with Cllr. Flynn and said that he had not received as much as one single complaint about the single yellow-lines which had been placed at Main Street. lem there, two options had been looked at but neither had proved satisfactory. A third option now being considered depended on permission being received from the Church of Ireland authorities to make some space at the Church of Ireland at the corner available.

During the week in four it is closed, emergency gynaecological matters only will be dealt with in St. Joseph's Gynaecological Ward which covers all South Tipperary, North Tipperary south from Thurles and a large area of West Waterford. These cutbacks will mean that the current waiting list for the service will be increased.

IRELAND'S OLDEST MONK

One of the longest serving members of a religious order in this country is Brother Gerard Leddy who celebrated his 99th birthday on Tuesday, November 5, at Mount Melleray Abbey. Brother Gerard was born at Gurtnaskehy, North Cork on November 5, 1892. He entered the Cistercian Order at Mount Melleray on September 29, 1914, the year of the outbreak of the First World War, all of seventy-two years ago, an occasion which he clearly remembers as if it was only a few days ago.

He arrived at the Monastery accompanied by his parents in a horse-drawn car which belonged to the local publican, Tom O'Mahony. When he bade his parents adieu he was convinced that he would never again see the outside world. Many years later he learned that his father had indrive slowly on their way out of the Monastery as the father was sure that his son gate, but seventy-two years later he still had not reached that gate!

Br. Gerard claims that he was desperately lonely for the first month or so as he was "a great homebird," but he came to terms with the then austere way of life of the Cistercian Order, Br. Gerard walks to-day in a slightly stooped fashion with the aid of a walking stick and is hard of hearing, but his faculties are pretty much intact. His memory stretches

> Born on the Cork side of Araglen, an area which straddles the Counties of Cork, Tipperary and Waterford, his first education was at the local National School at Coolmahon. He had one sister, Mary, and two brothers, Jack and Con.

Br. Gerard is uncle of well known Ballyporeen Fianna Fáil Councillor, Con Donovan. In his youth his abiding passion was for sport. He recalls an incident when a group of friends and himself were returning from a football game in Dungarvan when suddenly one of the horses dropped dead and they had to walk eight miles to Ballyduff before completing their homeward journey to Araglin, eight miles more on bicycles.

A wonderful athlete, he recalls an event at the Moun-Barracks tain Mitchelstown when he won a famous race which had to be re-run after some supporters had erected a false finishing tape. He won a beautiful ornate clock for his athletic prowess but this prize was lost to him when a unit of the Black and Tans under the command of Captain Anderson, ransacked his home and took his prize clock. It may adorn some building in England.

He says that he has no regrets whatsoever about answering his vocation. Before he did so he felt he was missing something and was delighted to have devoted his life to God. But fulfilling though he has found his life, it has had some hardship attached especially in the early days. Then, there was the vow of silence, the early morning rise, 1.30 a.m. on Sunday, 2 a.m. on week days and the long hours of fasting and

prayer. His father passed to his eternal reward at Easter 1915, six months after Gerard had entered the Order, but he was not allowed to return home for the funeral. When his mother's health

he was granted permission to visit her for a short time before she died in 1939. It was his first time home and it was also his first time outside the Monastery gates in twentyfour years. The regime at Melleray has been relaxed in recent years and the lives of the monks have approached what lay people might consider to be normality.

Very much hale and hearty in his 99th year, you would imagine that Br. Leddy was looking forward to celebrating his 100th birthday this time next year, but he's quite philosophical about his prospects of reaching the century. "That's all in the hands of God," he says in his jovial fashion.

Locals featured on the programme were John Mc-Grath, John Tobin and Tom Walsh. The programme was compered by Michael



Know Your Rights

Question — I would like to attend my G.P. during my pregnancy. Can you tell me what maternity services I will be entitled to and will I be eligible for the Maternity Grant. I don't have a Medical Card?

Answer - Since the 1st June this year all women are entitled to Maternity and Infant Care Services free of charge. An expectant mother can choose to be treated by any doctor who has an arrangement with the Health Board to provide these services. Most family doctors undertake this type of work.

Under this scheme you will be covered for 6 visits before the birth and one visit after the birth for yourself, and one visit for the baby during the first six weeks of life. Most Health Boards allow for additional visits where the G.P. considers them necessary (the G.P. doesn't receive any extra payment for this.)

The G.P. is entitled to charge non-Medical Card holders for visits which are not related to the pregnan-

It is necessary to apply to be accepted into this scheme before the visits start. The special application form M.C.A. should be available from the G.P. or Health Board. When the approval comes from the Health Board the visits can start. Ideally these should commence around the 16th week of pregnancy.

The Maternity Grant of £8 which is payable by the Health Board is only paid to Medical Card holders.

COUNTY COUNCILLORS FACE DIFFICULT BUDGET PROBLEMS

Members of Waterford County Council will meet in Dungarvan next Friday to consider the Estimates of Expenses for 1992 and with a considerable cash shortfall to be bridged some hard and unpopular decisions will, most probably have to be taken.

The total estimated expenditure to fund the various services for the Council for the year is given in the Book of Estimates as £17,189,800 and although at the time if writing no indication had been received by the Council from the Department of the Environment as to what the allocation will be under the Rate Support Grant, a rate of £30.03 has been indicated which is an increase of 3.5% over last year.

The estimates also provide for an increase of 5% in the domestic water charges and for metered water while there is also an increase in the charges for commercial dumping while a charge is also proposed for domestic dumping by individuals.

In regard to the latter, we understand that a sum of £169,000 has been included in the Estimates to provide for the existing Refuse Collection system until the end of June 1992. However as from that date it is proposed to disengage from this operation and to privatise it with the crews presently employed being offered an opportunity to engage in the work in a private capacity.

To meet the higher proportion of the cost of collection and disposal during the first 6 months of 1992, the charge for domestic collection is to be increased from 25p to 50p per bag while a charge of 50p per car discharging domestic refuse will be made at the tiphead also.

At the Council's monthly meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday, Cllr. B. Kyne inquired whether any indication had been received from the Department of the Environment as to the allounder the Rate Support Grant and received a reply in the negative.

Cllr. Kyne remarked that this was symptomatic of what was generally happening at Government level at present. He knew that the Council could hold their Estimates meeting in the absence of this information but added "surely we are entitled to know what the allocation will be." Cllr. Pat will also be buying Irish Coffey said that all members of the Council felt the same as they were being left in the dark.

It was unanimously agreed to send an urgent message to the Department of the Environment requesting that all Local Authorities be notified in good time of these allocations in the

In the meantime ratepayers must wait until Friday to learn what charges they will have to meet for the coming year.

71st Anniversary Of Kilmichael Ambush

Coming up later this month, the 71st anniversary of the ambush at Kilmichael in West Cork during the War of Independence will be commemorated at the site of the ambush on Sunday, November 24. Wellknown Munster MEP T. J. Maher will deliver the oration at the Annual Commemoration Ceremony to be held on that day.

"The Boys Of Kilmichael" which is our choice for the ballad corner this week is a fine swinging ballad which was written to commemorate the attack by members of the West Cork IRA Flying Column on two lorry loads of auxiliaries on a lonely moorland road between Macroom and Dunmanway in the afternoon of November 28, 1920.

It had been noted that a company of 'auxies' (British Army soldiers) quartered in Macroom had, for three Sundays running, made a sortie along this road; so on Sunday, November 28, the men of the 'Flying Column' gathered there during the night and remained in an ambush position all next day until they came along. They annihilated them and burned the lorries.

The ballad is lively, gay and devil-may-care despite the grim action it describes.

> Whilst we honour in song and in story The names of Pearse and McBride, Whose names are illumined in glory With martyrs who long since have died. Forget not the boys of Kilmichael, Those gallant lads stalwart and true, Who fought 'neath the green flag of Erin And conquered the red, white and blue.

Then here's to the boys of Kilmichael Who feared not the might of the foe, The day that they marched into battle They laid all the Black and Tans low.

On the twenty-eighth day of November, The Tans left the town of Macroom, They were armed in two Crossley tenders Which led them right into their doom; They were on the road to Kilmichael And never expected to stall, There they met the boys of the Column Who made a clear sweep of them all.

The sun in the west it was sinking, Twas the eve of a cold winter's day, The Tans we were wearily waiting Sailed into the spot where we lay; And over the hills went the echo, The sound of the rifle and gun, And the flames from the lorries gave tidings That the boys of the Column had won.

The lorries were ours before twilight, And high over Dunmanway town Our banners in triumph were waving To show that the Tans had gone down; We gathered our rifles and bayonets, And soon left the glen so obscure, And never drew rein 'til we halted At the far-away camp of Glenure.

Another version of the latter part of the second verse, perhaps a later corruption of the original, goes:

> But the boys of Kilmichael were ready And met them with powder and shot And the Irish Republican Army Made bits of the whole bloomin' lot!

Call For Early Payment Of Amenity Grants

Cllr. P. Kenneally criticised the delay by the Dept. of the Environment in paying grants approved under the Amenity Grants Scheme when he raised the matter at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday.

Cllr. Kenneally pointed out that 51 projects approved by the Council had been submitted under the 1991 scheme to the Dept. and of these 24 had been sanctioned at a total cost of £85,000 which was funded by the National Lottery. However the problem arose because the grants would not be paid until 1992.

"This," said Cllr. Kenneally, "is most unsatisfactory as most of the projects concerned have been completed or nearly completed and if the clubs have to wait for the payment of the grants until next year it will place undue pressure on their finances because of the Bank charges which the delay will cause for them." He went on to propose that the Council urge the Dept. of the Environment to pay out the grants without delay where the works have been completed and duly certified by the

Local Authority.

Cllr. J. Quirke seconding the proposal said that it was a shame that clubs which were badly in need of the money should have to wait in this fashion.

Cllr. P. Coffey supporting the resolution said that clubs were depending on these grants and should not be asked to wait until 1992 to have them paid.

The resolution was passed unanimously.

Lismore Town Commissioners **Estimates Meeting**

The Estimates Meeting of Lismore Town Commissioners was held in Lismore Courthouse on Wednesday, October 30. Mr. J. Roche presided and also present were Mr. P. Dowd, Mr. F. Geoghegan, Mrs. M. Morrissey, Mrs. M. Ryan and Miss M. O'Connell. Mr. Paul Clerkin, Co. Council Finance Officer and Mr. E. Flynn, Town Clerk were in attendance.

Mr. Clerkin began by apologising for the unavoidable absence of the County Manager and went on to outline the estimates requesting a rate of 74.88p in the pound.

The members at this stage went through the figures as presented.

Mr. Clerkin outlined for the Commissioners the very bright future he saw for Lismore with the concept of the Heritage Town, stating that no less than £60,000 would be invested through various projects in Lismore in the coming year. He then went on to list the projects involved and called on the people of Lismore to make the whole concept work.

Finally, on the proposal of Mrs. Ryan seconded by Mr. Geoghegan it was resolved that the estimate of 74.88p in the pound as submitted be adopted.

LISMORE DUMP

Mr. Clerkin was questioned closely by the Commissioners on the future prospects of a dump for Lismore. In reply he stated that the option of providing a "transfer station" for Lismore was now actively being pursued and would come before the Estimates Meeting of the Co. Council on November 17.

Mr. Roche stated that the possibility of this new service should be highlighted as people were now under the impression that no further dumping facilities were going to be provided.

Mr. Dowd requested that the facility for waste recycling should be provided and in reply to this Mr. Clerkin stated that the Co. Council were becoming very aware of the benefits involved in recycling and a small project dealing with cans would begin next year.

It was unanimously agreed to appeal through the local press, to all County Councillors to support the proposed "transfer station" for Lismore being the minimum facility that was required.

Help the birds through winter

NOW that we live in 'greener' times there is a greater and nicer tendency to think of alternative ways of beating garden pests rather than reaching for the chemicals.

And so many gardeners are looking again at their previously uneasy relation-ship with birds. Of course, some species will have a go at seed beds and flowers but these can be protected, while most birds coming into gardens will help clear pests and weed seeds.

You will also find a great deal of pleasure in attracting birds and making them as much of a feature as your finest blooms.

A great favourite is the Blue Tit which can be lured into the garden during the winter with bags of hanging nuts and suspended half coconuts filled with a mash of kitchen scraps.

They will give much entertainment to adults and children alike by hanging upside down as they feed,



when it is time for them to repay you.

Hopefully, some will nest in or near your friendly garden and scour the area for caterpillars, greenfly and other pests to feed their chicks. When the fledglings emerge, you get even more entertainment.

Seed on a bird table in more rural areas will attract finches, such as Chaffinch, Greenfinch and Goldfinch, which help clean up weed seeds and insects in sum-

And even the humble Starling and House Sparrow will sort out summer pests for you. Much rarer but good at keeping down flies is the Pied Wagtail – a great favourite with garden bird watchers with its tail-wagging sprints from cover and looping tail-wagging flight.

For tackling the bigger pests such as large insects, snails and slugs, try to get the Thrushes, Blackbirds and Robins on your side.

But if you decide to feed any birds and adopt for this brave approach to pest control and garden attractions, there are points to remem-

· Help the birds through the winter by putting out scraps to encourage them to settle in the vicinity. Once you've started feeding them, keep it up through the cold months, as they will rely on

· Make a bird table and set it well away from any cover that cats could use.

 Put out water in a sturdy dish or specially made birdbath for them to drink or bath in. It will add to the entertainment.

•Nest boxes can be put up to further encourage birds to stay around. The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds can advise on designs for certain species - even the size of entrance hole can determine whether you get interesting species like Blue Tits in residence or end up with a ghetto of Sparrows!

·Be ready to give up most spraying in summer because the bodies of insects, grubs and caterpillars will pass on chemicals to birds and their chicks which will build up a lethal dose. If you have to spray then use treatments derived from pyrethrum, which is less toxic.

•Try growing plants which birds like, such as climbers which provide shelter, nesting sites and food storage. They also like holly, which gives good protection against cats and predators.

·Spread nets over brassicas in winter to prevent birds feeding off your crops instead of the bird table, and put up nets and scarers as normal elsewhere and during the other seasons.

The minimum area that will be considered will be a townland and there is no upper area limit stated Mr. Ryan.

Mr. Ryan pointed out that almost 20 per cent of land wasnow eligible for appeal following the latest round of reclassification, emphasising that all areas of the country currently under less Severely Handicapped status were eligible. The I.F.A. man stressed that this included all the new land recently bought into the DAS Scheme for the first time.

The passing of Pa Sheehan has left a void in hurling, none more so than in his native Tallow. His deeds and exploits will live on in the annals of Brideside hurling where his name is carved with pride. On the field of play and off he was an example to all. Pa was the complete hurler. Allied to that he had speed, endless stamina and bottomless heart, a formidable combination. I would say ground hurling was his strong forte, lovely wrist work and his expert timing of the ground ball with or against was a joy to behold. He rarely soloed except to get free and he bemoaned the scarcity of ground play and would say "sure how can they when there is no bit of heel in a hurley today.'

Linking up with his brother Bill, they formed one of the best midfield pairings in club hurling at the time. His brother Tom was a useful half forward and one can readily see what an impact they made on Tallow hurling.

Their workshop in Barrack Street was the mecca for all hurling men, young and old. At that time fellows cut their own ash roots, cut them into planks at Scanlon's Mill, then on to Sheehan's workshop which was a hive of industry, every fellow busy at his own plank. Of course they were under excellent supervision as the Sheehans were top-class hurley-makers. The debates and arguments that went on about the games and outside them as well, if recorded, would generate some interest today.

But back to the hurling: one Sunday Tallow were playing Carrigtwohill, at the time one of the leading clubs in Cork. Pa was marking "Big" Tom Barry who, at that time, was a midfielder on the Cork County team and as they say, Pa "hurled the socks off him" that day. At the finish of the game he came to Pa in admiration and told him "Sheehan, you are the best small man in Ireland today.'

Tallow played Tulloroan in a tournament. Pa was pitted against the great Lory Meagher. It was a miss match as usual. Pa in a sustained all-out effort, covered the field. Lory couldn't keep tabs on him so he wisely decided to stay in one place to deal with whatever came his way. I may add he was on the way out at the time.

Pa was younger, at his peak, in Tallow's great tussles with Erin's Own. He marked "Fad" Browne, then regarded as one of the best centre-field men in the game. I can assure you he had nothing to spare over Pa.

I feel honoured to regard him as a friend. Shortly before his death, at a local game, I had a shake hands and chat with him and recalled old times. The era of togging out by the fence, when transport wasn't too reliable and the ould bike was often called in at short notice, the plain cup of tea after the match was always welcome. Pa was the most genuine of hurling men,. He never wavered in his love and admiration of the game. May his generous soul and spirit rest in peace.

Consumer Choice states that the high level of accidents, high legal costs, high compensation levels, and the high proportion of uninsured drivers are the main factors which contribute to the outrageous cost of our motor insurance.

Many motorists feel that because premiums are so expensive they should claim at every possible opportunity. The high number of claims and the cost of claims results in even higher premiums for motorists.

Consumer Choice calls on the Government to act now on the findings of the special Inter Ministerial Committee for Insurance (1990). This committee looked at road traffic law reform, enforcement of road traffic law, the court system and the motor insurance market. Consumer Choice contends that a safer driving environment should reduce the number of accidents and claims which in turn should stabilise, if not reduce, insurance premiums.

Do you pandiculate often?

DO you pandiculate often? Most of us do, especially when we are tired or bored. And when one person pandiculates. other people nearby often feel an irresistible urge to follow suit.

Pandiculation is simply the medical term for yawning. Although just why it is contageous still baffles the experts. They know why we yawn. It is a reflex action when there's too much carbon dioxide in the blood. It's nature's way of putting things right with a deep gulp of oxygen.

But why is it apparently contageous? A doctor said: "All we know is that the particular nerve - the fifth cranial - which controls the muscles used in yawning is somehow stimulated when someone else yawns.

The experts agree that yawning is good for us. It's almost as good as doing early morning exercises, especially if you do all the stretching movements usually associated with a good, wide yawn.

Some years ago, yawning was included in a set of exercises published by the Central Council for Physical Recreation, and, about the same time, with a special diet issued by the National Dairy Council.

Dr John Clyde, one of the country's leading dieticians, endorses yawning as a way of relaxing and digesting food.

And Sir Paul Dukes, British secret service agent in Russia during the early days of the Bolshevik regime, made a life-long



study of yawning. He wrote books on the subject and even appeared on TV demonstrating how to yawn and grow fit.

He said: "When the body begins to set up wrong tensions - say during prolonged sedentary work -nature whispers, 'Yawn, man, yawn. You're short of oxygen; and stretch yourself, your body is getting stagnant.'

"Trouble is, we rarely heed the warning. We actually try to stifle the yawn. We ought, rather, to make an art and science of yawning and stretching and do them systematically.

"And if the yawn doesn't come naturally, then imitate one - it's easy.

And he gave these instructions for the imitation keepfit yawn:

Take a deep breath and

2. Twist and contort the limbs, slowly and tensely, straining to squeeze out the stagnant blood and stimulate the circulation.

3. Suddenly let go, experiencing - if you've done the job properly - a sensation of delicious relief and fresh-

This aspect of yawning is part of the Hindu cult of Yoga which, among other things, teaches that controlled yawning can bring mental calm.

But yawning can bring anguish, too. There are thousands of cases on record of big yawns causing locked jaws.

And 59-year-old Mrs Maggie Baldwin, of Chesterfield, Derbyshire, committed suicide after a week of nonstop yawning.

A Hereford farmer, Jim Langford, found a television programme so boring a few vears ago, he vawned, Suddenly, while his mouth was still open, something snapped and he found he couldn't close his left eve.


It started when she went to the cellar to get some jam for her three children. It was an old case, and as she reached to get a jar, the cover of the case slipped from her grasp and hit her on the head.



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PA SHEEHAN, TALLOW R.I.P.

The large crowds that assembled for the removal of Pa Sheehan's remains from St. Carthage's House, Lismore to the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Tallow, on Saturday evening, Nov. 2 and again on Sunday, Nov. 3 for interment in the adjoining cemetery testified to this legendary man's popularity amongst all classes of peo-

Pa, despite the many accolades, showered on him, especially during his long and illustrious hurling career remained the same man always and to quote Kipling "he could walk among Kings and not lose the common touch," and at eighty two years of age his happy voice could be heard at bingo sessions, at Tallow and Conna, almost within a few days of his untimely death. And since dispensing with his camán, he held the stronghold in the realms of the G.A.A. as President of his native Tallow Club, and in the intervening years as trainer and advisor to many surrounding clubs.

He was, as well, a member of the Committee of the Tallow Community Centre and was ever available to assist in any matters or work concerning the local Convent and Church, and Pa's virtues were eloquently extolled by two of his life long friends, firstly at the Requiem Mass, by Fr. Killian from Galway and later by that doyen of orators, Pat Fanning, former President of the G.A.A. who gave the graveside oration.

Pa was brought up in a house that was "known to all the vagrant train" of G.A.A. fans, of course, and how we frequented Sheehan's house, morning, noon and night to savour with delight the Gaelic lore which permeated the ambience as the pros and cons of past games and future games would be discussed by a thronged house, mostly composed of Tallow senior hurlers, whilst Pa, Bill or Tommie could be in the process of shaping out a hurley stick with a special pole for ground hurling. And so many of those were presented to us free of charge during the dark days of the economic war.

Pa gained a junior county medal with Tallow in 1930, and a senior one in 1936. In inter-county circles he and Mick Curley were on the Waterford minor hurling team which captured the county's first All-Ireland in 1929. He was one of the 9 players from the Brideside town on the Waterford hurling team in 1931 that brought All-Ireland honours, winning for his native county the junior Blue Riband and again on the Waterford junior hurling team with six Tallow men in the jubilee year when they wrested that All-Ireland from strong opposition in 1934, and 4 years later in 1938 he was on the first Waterford team to contest an All-Ireland senior hurling outset and was always avail-

final in Croke Park, and although experiencing the hard luck of losing by two points, as Pat Fanning said, they paved the way for future victories, the first one coming 10 years later.

It was elevating to hear Fr. Killian refer to Pa's outstanding Christian values, his great love of the Mass, the Eucharist and the Rosary often said on their journeys together to Thurles and Limerick, etc., and one other significant virtue in Pa's life, his care and attention of his invalided wife in her final years, and Pat Fanning's exhortation to the up and coming gaels to model their lives on Pa Sheehan's fervour and spirit and they would be repaid for their achievements.

No doubt Pa's spirit will live on amongst us and although he sleeps in his native Tallow churchyard our prayer is that the green sod of Tallow that he cherished and revelled on may rest lightly on his breast. Go dtugaidh Dia leaba imeasg na Naomh agus na nGael do.

To his sister, nephews, nieces, sisters-in-law, relatives and friends our deepest sympathy. His coffin was shrouded in the Blue and Gold of Tallow and a guard of honour from the Tallow Hurling Club as well as many other clubs was pre--J.B.

IRELAND HAVE NEVER WON IN TURKEY

Poland v. England Poznan kick-off 5.30 p.m.

By now everyone knows it's simple, England must lose and Ireland must win to qualify for Sweden next Summer.

Injuries have forced changes on both sides, Ireland suffering more because of their smaller selection pool. Graham Taylor still hasn't decided on a selection and playing pattern and must be reflecting on lucky wins especially away and at home to Turkey. Can he get that one point he needs? Poland have called in their players from all over Europe and they don't need motivating against England.

In my view England have not improved under Graham Taylor but they may be able to hold on for a point or maybe it's time for lady luck to turn against them, let's hope so.

Ireland play the team that hasn't scored a goal yet but who were decidedly unlucky in Wembley last month. Hurling supporters from the far Western side of the county will journey to Midleton to cheer our champions Lismore in their bid to defeat the home side Midleton in the semi-final of the Munster Club championship.

The Saturday game will bring patrons to the Fraher Field to watch Naomh Brid play Portlaw in the final of the minor 'B' football championship.

ERIN'S OWN ٧. ST. SAVIOURS

The forecast for this very interesting intermediate final is that the result will see the once famous Erin's Own club back in senior ranks after many years in the hurling wilderness. Those who saw Saviours play in the championship might justifiably have other views as the Ballybeg based side are an up and coming club in the hurling world even though they are looked upon by many as being completely football orientated.

Both have several very good player, but there are some weaknesses on each team as well. Exploiting the weak spots will be a tactic of both sides in this intriguing battle. High Prices Not Wardens Cause Of Shopping Decline Says Manager

we are only shooting ourselves in the foot and I think it would be better to bring forward the meeting with the Chamber of Commerce and discuss the problem in a constructive and positive way than in this negative manner."

The Chairman, Cllr. M. O'Riordan agreed that there was sensationalism in the radio interviews on the subject. He said he had also heard on the radio that a bus was now going from Dungarvan to Waterford every Thursday night to take shoppers.

Cllr. P. Power said that they had two Traffic Wardens both doing the same job. Producing a photo of a much littered O'Connell St., he suggested that from December 1 one of the wardens could be put to check litter on the streets.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan said that being the only businessman on the Council he was probably in a better position than his colleagues to really know how the business of the town was being affected. Proof of this was shown in the inclination of the business people to introduce late night trading when the wardens were off duty.

Cllr. Hallahan added that more flexibility should be exercised in applying the regulations which he felt should be implemented in a more sympathetic way.

Cllr. R. Walsh then stated that following his motion on the matter at the last meeting he had been congratulated by scores of people.

Cllrs. Mary Dixon and Nuala Ryan both said that shoppers going on the buses out of Dungarvan were on the look-out for cheaper prices.

WARDENS SHOULD BE COMPLIMENTED

Having made the statement quoted at the outset, the Co. Manager wound up the debate by saying that the two traffic wardens "were doing a bloody good job under very difficult circumstances.'

Mr. Hurley went on to say that the decline in the number of shoppers coming into Dungarvan could be attributed to economic factors rather than to the 2 wardens as people would travel to outside venues for better prices than were available in the town. Apart from parking offences a big number of the dockets handed out was for non-taxed cars, he said.

"People should think positively and business people should get their pricing right and not blame the traffic plan to the dropoff," he said, adding that he thought they should be complimenting the traffic wardens for having such good traffic management in
