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Young Dungarvan Couple Killed In Car Crash

A young Dungarvan couple were killed instantly early on last Friday morning when their car was in a head-on collision with another car at Carrigbyrne about eight miles on the Wexford side of New Ross. Edward McCarthy (25) from Deelish, Dungarvan and his fiancée, Michelle O'Riordan of 47, Congress Villas, Dungarvan (22) had travelled from London and had crossed on the ferry from Fishguard to Rosslare and were on their way to Dungarvan when tragedy struck.

It was shortly after 7.30 a.m. when the horrific collision, which left the people of Dungarvan numbed and shocked when they heard the news, occurred. The other vehicle, driven by an Englishman, was going in the opposite direction. He was not seriously injured and has since been

Black Year Forecast As Manager Presents "Appalling Book Of Estimates"

A black year was forecast for Waterford County Council by County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley when he presented what he described as "an appalling book of estimates" for 1992 for the consideration of the Council at their Estimates Meeting in Dungarvan last Friday.

At the outset Mr. Hurley told the members that he and the officials of the Council had been working in a vacuum in attempting to balance the books due mainly to the absolute erosion of local authority finances over the last number of years. Although the Department had not so

far notified the amount of rate support grant, an "optimistic" increase of £115,000 had been included.

The figures as submitted disclosed that expenditure for the coming year totalled £17.19 million with income from receipts and

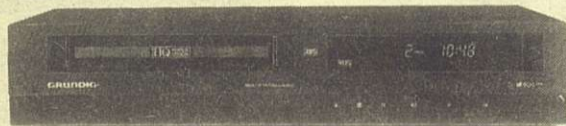

Crotty's Lake Project Deferred

Objections by environmentalists to the proposal by Carrick Urban Council to build a roadway for access to Crotty's Lake on the Comeragh Mountains and to which Waterford County Council had already agreed to contribute part of the cost were again mentioned at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last week.

At the previous meeting, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn in reply to a query by Cllr. Con Casey explained in detail the reasons for and what was involved in the project and

said that the proposals would not be environmentally objectionable.

At last week's meeting, Cllr. Brian O'Shea, T.D. said that in the interim he had again received a lot of

representations objecting to the project and he asked for an update on the matter.

Cllr. B. Kyne said he understood that some difficulty had arisen about a wayleave over some land adjoining the lake.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that at the last meeting the Council had unanimously agreed to the development of what was to be a forest walk giving access to the lake. However in view of the latest information which he had he had decided to defer the implementation of the project in the current year until next Spring.

Cllr. O'Shea — Will it have to come before the Council again then? Co. Manager — Yes.

Passed Derogatory Remark To Ban Garda

An unemployed Dungarvan labourer who told a ban garda to "go and f... yourself," was bound to the peace for 12 months at Dungarvan District Court last week.

John Connors, 64 Childers Estate, was also fined £10 on each of two charges for cycling without a light on the night of April 6 last.

Ban Garda Ann Sweeney told the court that Connors made the derogatory comment to her after she had stopped him a second time.

"It is intolerable that anybody should direct such a remark to a ban garda," said Judge O'Connell who also directed that in the event of Connors not entering the bond to keep the peace within seven days, a two month prison sentence will be imposed.

"Most Co-operative" Motorist Fined And Banned

A "most co-operative motorist," whose alcohol concentration was described as "quite low" by Judge O'Connell, was fined a nominal £20 and banned from driving for 12 months at Dungarvan District Court last week.

Richard Moylan, 43 Congress Villas, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol (114 milligrammes) in his blood at O'Connell Street in the early hours of March 17 last.

The court heard that the defendant was stopped at a "routine" garda check-point.

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WHY NOT GIVE US A TRY?

Davern Appointed First Ever Cabinet Member From South Tipp.

Newly appointed Minister for Education Noel Davern, whose elevation from the back-benches over the heads of current Junior Ministers stunned most observers, in Mr. Haughey's Cabinet reshuffle announced last Wednesday said the decision of the Taoiseach to promote him came as "a total surprise but a pleasant shock."

He described the attacks made by the Workers' Party against his appointment as "vicious": "They are certainly the worst ever made in this House. But I would expect nothing else from them." The first ever Cabinet

Minister from South Tipperary, Mr. Davern has now commenced the gruelling exercise to acquaint himself with the intricacies of one of the biggest spending departments in the Government.

"I will bring a lot of commonsense to the job, I will listen to the expert advice. But I learnt from the late Jerry Cronin that commonsense goes a long way," said Mr. Davern. He had no doubt about his own ability to do the job: "It is a matter of applying myself. I applied myself in Europe on the agriculture issue and earned myself a decent reputation."

The major priority now was to see work on the Green Paper on the future of Irish education finalised and to have it brought before the Cabinet and onwards.

On the local front, Mr. Davern will have to resign his chairmanship of South Tipperary Co. Council as well as his seat on South Riding's Vocational Educational Committee.

However, there is "no chance" of him losing contact with his constituency: "I will be working in Dublin, but I will be living in Tipp. I don't think that someone with my personality will lose contact," he declared.

His wife, Ann Marie and children Mark and Davina, were present in the Dail with him to witness the announcement shortly after 11 p.m. by Mr. Haughey on last Wednesday morning.

STINGING OPPOSITION ATTACK

On the new Education Minister, the Labour leader Mr. Dick Spring stated: "The concept of Deputy Davern in charge of the education of our children is a mind-boggling one."

A stinging attack was also launched on Mr. Davern by W.P. leader Proinsias de Rossa, who described the new Minister as "a baluba." The vicious assault goes back to a Dail exchange some months ago, when Deputy Davern made allegations about W.P. members.

Deputy de Rossa said: "When it comes to smears, he is the man who is sent in to say what the Taoiseach thinks but is afraid to do himself. There is no rock too low for him to crawl under or sewer too putrid to explore." He added: I cannot think of a worse role model in this House for our school children than this card-carrying member of the Fianna Fail backwoods-men." Mr. Davern declined to reply personally to the attack but Leas Ceanann Comhairle Jim Tunney reprimanded Mr. de Rossa.

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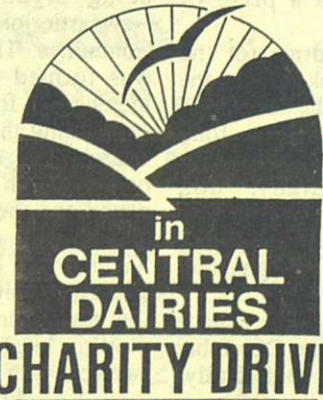

**Black Year Forecast As
Manager Presents "Appalling
Book Of Estimates"**

grants estimated at £11.66 million. With a shortfall of £944,000 to bridge, the rate required would be £30.03, an increase of 3.5% on the current rate. In addition, the Manager proposed a 5% increase in the current annual water charges and proposed that as from June 1992 the Council should disengage from the refuse collection service and hand it over to private sources which would result in a saving of £165,000 but could possibly mean up to 11 job losses for the existing crews. In the meantime collection charges would go up from 25p to 50p per bag.

Mr. Hurley said that it was with regret he submitted these proposals but he had to reduce expenditure and increase charges to balance out as they had to contend with their very limited means of raising money.

"However," the Manager then told the members, "at the end of the day it will be your decision. It is an appalling book of estimates but it must be considered reasonable as far as the money available to us is concerned. It is a black year in my 15 or 16 years as County Manager and will just barely keep the county services ticking over."

Cllr. Jackie Fahey T.D. said that his greatest objection to the service charges which he always opposed was the fact that they differed so much from county to county. The only good news he had for the meeting was that Lismore Development Committee had been allocated a grant of £150,000 while Lismore Heritage Centre was to get a grant of £75,000. "This welcome news for Lismore should offset some of the gloom," he said.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that he and his Labour Party colleagues would be against the shedding of jobs because even if this was carried out by agreement with the union it would set in motion a spiral that would eventually affect the machinery yard. "We were talking about creating jobs at our last meeting and here we are today taking about shedding jobs," he said.

When members generally expressed the views that they didn't want to see charges increased or services disengaged, the Manager commented that if the money was not available to him he could not provide the services. "Local authorities all over the country are in dire straits and it gives me no pleasure to seek these increased charges but in view of our overall financial situation there is no other way out" he said.

The proposal to raise the current water charge from £98 to £103 was next discussed and following a number of suggestions, Cllr. G. O'Halloran said he saw no point in continuing the

discussion until they knew what they were to get in the rate support grant. "It is a futile exercise," he said.

When Cllr. Kyne referred to the fact that water charges had been increased from £29 in 1982 to almost £100 this year, Mr. Hurley said that they were not even at break-even point. "The Council is being starved of money and as a result I have had to cut out certain things which I had hoped to include but just could not do," he said.

On the grounds that they would have to wait for information as to the exact amount of rate support grant to be allocated it was then unanimously agreed, on the proposal of Cllr. C. Casey seconded by Cllr. T. Cunningham, to adjourn further consideration of the problem until Friday, November 29.

On the proposal of Cllr. Kyne seconded by Cllr. L. Hart it was also agreed to write to the Minister for the Environment and the Congress of Trade Unions pointing out that an additional £350,000 to £400,000 would resolve the Council's financial problems and keep people in employment. "That small amount should be asked for as otherwise we could lose the ship for a ha'porth of oil," said Cllr. Kyne.

PENSMAN Takes You . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

A BLACK YEAR AHEAD FOR COUNTY

Presenting what he described as an "appalling book of estimates" to the members of Waterford County Council at their Annual Estimates meeting in Dungarvan last Friday, County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley forecast that financially there was a black year ahead for the county.

A full report of the meeting appears elsewhere in this issue of the "Leader" from which readers will learn that no decision on the position was reached and that the Council will meet again on next Friday week to have another go at the problem. Main reason for adjourning the matter was the failure of the Department of the Environment to notify the Council of the Rate Support Grant they were to receive for 1992. The cause of the delay can be easily understood in the light of recent happenings at Government level which, among other things, has resulted in Environment Minister Flynn being chucked out on his ear by "the Boss." The former Minister very obviously had other things bothering him in recent times besides such petty problems as the finances of the country's local authorities!

From the report of the Estimates meeting, readers will also quickly and readily gather that Waterford County Council is an authority very strapped for cash. As the County Manager repeated again and again during the meeting they had to cut the services to the very bone — in fact he said they would be barely ticking over — because they were being starved of money and the only means of generating funds at their disposal was through increased charges, something which Mr. Hurley reiterated several times, he was forced into doing with the greatest regret.

Indeed, the County Manager made no bones about stating that the position was the bleakest he had to deal with in the 15/16 years since he became a county manager.

PROVISIONS OF 1991 LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT

Browsing through the County Manager's official report on the Estimates during the past week we came across a section which points out that as previously advised to them, the Local Government Act 1991 provided for determination by the Council, as reserved functions, the inclusion in the estimates of certain items of expenditure to cover (1) Representation

Functions (2) General Competence (3) Allowance for Expenses of Chairman (4) Expenses of Receptions and (5) Twinning of Local Authority areas.

The report then pointed out that the sum of £7,500 was included in the estimates under General Competence towards the Heritage Centre in Lismore but stated that as no suggestions had been previously made by members, no sums in respect of the other headings had been included in the estimates.

However we have learned through the grapevine that an effort had been made to get the party whips to agree a figure, whispered to be in the region of £10,000, as a special expenses allowance for the Chairman and to have it back-dated to last June. We understand also that suggestions were made that the item be slipped through as quietly and as unobtrusively as possible.

In the event, we have learned that the three Labour Party members of the Council would not be prepared to give approval to anything approaching the amount mentioned while it would not surprise us if the Fianna Fail members would totally oppose any such proposal as the Fine Gael-Labour pact on the Chair will exclude them from that position during the life time of the present Council. We have not been able to ascertain what the attitude of the Fine Gael members to any such proposal, should it come forward, would be.

In the dire financial straits in which the Council now finds itself and faced with the need to increase local charges and reduce the services in order to make ends meet, it would be an absolute scandal for the Council

members to attempt to bring in a proposal to vote any sum at all, big or small, as an "allowance for expenses for the Chairman."

As it is, a sum of £42,500, an increase of £4,500 over the current year, is included in the estimates towards "Members Expenses" and this should more than adequately recompense the members for the monthly meetings which they attend. Any move by the Council to bring in additional expenditure under this head, would, without doubt in the circumstances that are prevailing find little or no approval among the ratepaying public of the county and indeed among all householders who are already faced with the prospect of increased burden of local charges.

AMBIENT IMPROVEMENTS

The recent controversy concerning the activities of two traffic wardens in Dungarvan and their affect, beneficial or otherwise, has given rise to several discussions concerning the declared decline in the number of people who come into the town from outside areas to do their shopping.

We found ourselves involved in one such discussion recently in which two people who work in but are not resident in the town expressed the view that much could be done to improve Dungarvan as a shopping centre by making the Square a more attractive area with an ambience that would make it more pleasurable for shoppers and visitors to browse around in.

Indeed the first of these improvements has now been completed at the Square with the completion of the magnificent Bank of Ireland building which has been extended (incorporating the former Nicky Casey licensed premises), reconstructed and completely refurbished. The fine job is indeed a credit to the main contractors, Messrs. E. O'Brien & Sons (Dungarvan) Ltd., and particularly

to Vincent, John and Eddie O'Brien who have been personally involved in the work from the original demolitions to the final completion of what is now a building of which any town could well feel proud.

Indeed the floodlighting of the new Bank and of the A.I.B. across the road in Bridge Street now adds greatly to and does much to brighten the night scene in Dungarvan.

As a further step to improve the general appearance of the Square we understand that plans are afoot to replaster and paint the corresponding premises at the opposite corner of the Square and this, with the other improvements at present being carried out, should, when completed, greatly help to improve the general appearance of the Dungarvan town centre.

104 NOT OUT!

On Friday last, November 15, Miss Elsie Power who has long been the star patient at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan reached another milestone in her long life when she celebrated her 104th birthday.

Elsie, who for years, was the popular proprietress of the licensed premises at Wolfe Tone Road (Fair Lane), Dungarvan which bore her name and from which she retired at the age of 85! She must now be the oldest resident in the entire county.

On Friday last there was an extra special buzz at the hospital as staff prepared the sprightly centenarian to celebrate the great occasion. Still enjoying remarkably good health, she had a special hair-do by local hairdresser Ann Coffey, and was showered with congratulations and gifts throughout the day by a great number of well-wishers.

Still with a twinkle in her eye and as always a witty tongue she told those around her last Friday that she hopes "to stick around for a few more years yet!" We hope her wish is fulfilled.

MASTER McGRATH

It's the coursing time of the year again and as we have received a request for the words of the ballad that commemorates the greatest coursing greyhound of all time we make the ballad of "Master McGrath" our choice for this week.

To re-cap briefly, Master McGrath was whelped at Colligan Lodge just outside Dungarvan in 1866, the owner and breeder being James Galwey of Colligan Lodge who was the land agent for the Earl of Dartry. The dog was one of a litter of seven by Dervock out of the brood bitch Lady Sarah.

Galwey was himself a close friend of Lord Lurgan who was a regular visitor to Colligan and that was how his association with the great Master McGrath came about.

There are many fables about the wonder dog but when he eventually died his "memoriam" which was published in a Dublin periodical a few days after his death concluded as follows: "For generations to come, coursing men will narrate his history and when the men of the present day have passed away, his achievements will remain green and unfaded midst the chronicles of The Leash."

And so indeed it has proved. His memory is perpetuated by his huge tombstone which stands in Lurgan Park in Hampshire in England and the big marble monument at the road junction on the Dungarvan Clonmel road at Ballymacmague which was badly damaged by vandals in 1985 but lovingly restored by a committee under the late Michael Fives and unveiled in 1988.

Eighteen-sixty-eight being the date of the year,
Those Waterloo sportsmen did grandly appear,
To gain the great prizes and bear them awa'—
Never counting on Ireland and Master McGrath.

On the 12th of December, that day of renown,
McGrath and his trainer they left Lurgan town;
A gale in the channel it soon they got o'er,
For the very next day they touched great England's shore.

And when they arrived there in big London town,
Those great English sportsman they all gathered roun'—
And one of those gentlemen gave a "ha! ha!"
With, "Is that the great dog you call Master McGrath?"

And one of those gentlemen standing around
Says, "I don't care a damn for your Irish greyhound;"
And another, he laughs with a great "ha! ha! ha!"
We'll soon humble the pride of your Master McGrath."

Then Lord Lurgan steps forward and says, "Gentlemen,
Is there any among ye has money to spen'—
For ye nobles of England I don't give a straw—
Here's five thousand to one on my Master McGrath."

Then McGrath he looked up and he wagged his old tail
Informing his Lordship, "I know what you mane,
Don't fear noble Brownlow, don't fear them agrá,
For I'll tarnish their laurels," says Master McGrath.

And Rose stood uncovered, the great English pride
Her master and keeper were close by her side;
They have let her away and the crowd cried "hurrah,"
For the pride of all England — and Master McGrath.

As Rose and the Master they both ran along,
"Now I wonder," says Rose, "what took you from your home,
You should have stopped there in your Irish demense
And not come to gain laurels on Albion's plain."

"Well, I know," says McGrath, "we have wild heather bogs
But you'll find in old Ireland there's good men and dogs,
Lead on bold Britannia, give none of your jaw,
Snuff that up your nostrils," says Master McGrath.

Then the hare she went on just as swift as the wind
He was sometimes before her and sometimes behind,
Rose gave the first turn according to law,
But the second was given by Master McGrath.

The hare she led on with a wonderful view
And swift as the wind o'er the green field she flew,
But he jumped on her back and he held up his paw
"Three cheers for old Ireland," says Master McGrath.

We've seen many greyhounds that filled us with pride
In the days that are gone, but it can't be denied
That the greatest and gamest the world ever saw,
Was the champion of champions, old Master McGrath.

DUNGARVAN U.D.C.

Is Provision Of New Graveyard A Matter For Parish Or Urban Council?

Whether the provision of land for a new burial ground for Dungarvan should be the responsibility of the parochial authorities or the Urban Council was a question which came up at last week's monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council. It arose when the Council once again grappled with this old problem arising from a motion proposed by Cllr. T. Wright calling on the Co. Manager to acquire, maintain and control the management of a burial ground for the benefit of all the people.

Cllr. Wright stressed the pressing need for a new graveyard, pointing out that a well-known local businessman had to be buried in Ardmore recently because no grave could be got in Dungarvan or Abbeyside.

In the course of the discussion which ensued the questions as to whether a new graveyard should be municipal or religious or whether the necessary land should be purchased by the parish authorities and then developed by the Council were referred to.

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that as far as this matter was concerned he had no ideological hang-ups as to whether a graveyard should be municipal or religious. He said that he had pointed out 10 years ago that a new graveyard was needed and in the meantime they had been seeking a suitable site. Last year a 4 acre site which would accommodate 3,200 graves had been identified but objections had been made by some of the Council members on behalf of the local people concerned.

Mr. Hurley went on to say that Dungarvan was the only place in the county where this problem arises and he just could not understand it. He thought the only way to acquire a site would be by Compulsory Purchase. "We will," said the manager, "reactivate the report made on the subject last year and identify some land if the Council wishes and we can then report progress."

The Council agreed to update the report on the problem prepared by the Manager last year and to dis-

cuss the matter again at the December meeting.

Cllr. Wright agreed to defer his motion until then and it was further agreed to discuss the matter again with the Parish Priest to obtain his final decision.

CONGRATULATIONS

On the proposal of Cllr. A. Hallahan, the Council members joined in extending congratulations to Very Rev. Canon Power, P.P. on the recent very successful Mission conducted in the parish by the Redemptorist Fathers.

Kids will love these smokies

When choosing your fish

try some of the less expensive varieties like coley or whiting.

CHEESE SMOKIES

Ingredients:

- 12oz (350g) white fish fillets, fresh or defrosted, skinned
- 6oz (175g) smoked fish fillets, fresh or defrosted skinned and finely cubed
- 2oz (50g) frozen peas, defrosted
- 2oz (50g) cheese, grated
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 tablespoons (30ml) flour

Method:

Roughly chop white fish fillets and purée in a food



processor for 1-2 minutes.

Mix white fish purée with smoked fish, peas and cheese. Add the beaten egg and the flour and mix well.

Divide mixture into 6-8 portions. Dust hands well with flour and shape into rounds and then flatten to a

'burger' shape.

Place on a greased grill pan and grill under a moderate heat for 4-5 minutes on either side, until golden brown.

Serve with baked beans and toast sticks.

Serves 4-6.

Watch your back, it's digging time

IT'S quite amusing to note that there is a popular new gardening programme by the name of 'Dig'.

For the word is probably the biggest deterrent to any gardener or would-be gardener pulling on the wellies and getting stuck in.

I have yet to find someone who actually enjoys bending over a fork and spade and working up a lather but, like it or not, this month is the time to face up to it, particularly if you have a vegetable patch.

There are two related reasons for digging now. Firstly, the weather will soon be an even greater deterrent and, secondly, the bad weather to come can do a lot of your planting preparation work for you by breaking down and drying roughly turned sods into a workable texture.

Vegetable plots must be



double dug - down twice the depth of the spade - every three years to open up the soil so that it is well-drained and plants can root easily to a good depth.

As you work along the trenches you are digging, spread a generous layer of organic waste such as rotted garden compost, mushroom compost, leaf mould or shredded bark to improve drainage and soil condition.

Make sure that any weeds are either removed or properly turned over and buried under a depth of soil.

The technique is the same

for single digging - to one depth of the spade - which is required in most of the garden every year. Again, work in compost to improve the soil condition, but if your soil is sandy or heavy clay you may need a special conditioner.

The garden centres can help with material such as gypsum to modify clay soils, although many gardeners improvise by working in some sand to improve drainage.

For more confined areas such as flower borders, where shrubs and bushes give little room for manoeuvre, you may need to invest in a border fork and spade.

When buying your tools you should also try them for size. It was pointed out to me that we in Britain don't do our backs any good by favouring a short handle on our digging tools.

Americans and Continen-

tals opt for long handles to give better leverage and I've found that they have a point.

Some fledgling gardeners may also have heard of the deep bed system, which they could adopt if they are going into vegetable cultivation seriously but don't have much space.

The method is to double dig four feet wide parallel beds divided by narrow paths as little as a foot wide.

The depth of the beds and loose workable soil is then further increased by generous helpings of compost and other organic material to raise the soil level some six inches above the paths.

Vegetables can then be grown more closely and intensively and be tended from the paths so that soil is not compacted and can be single dug for the next two years.

Sr. Leonora originally from Abbeyside has just re-

turned from Romania and had this to say:

As is to be expected, the children have come a long way in the nine months since Mr. and Mrs. Carson from Comber in Co. Down, visited the orphanage in Videle, 80 kms from Bucharest. When they first went there, there were 140 children in the orphanage, ranging in age from 3 to 16 years. These children were totally neglected, both physically and mentally. On their return home, Mr. and Mrs. Carson started the Romanian Orphanage Appeal of Ireland.

In response to their appeal, a large number of volunteers came forward (almost 200 in all). They came from North and South, East and West, from all backgrounds and religions, with the sole purpose of helping these unfortunate children.

The first few months were spent getting the children to trust us, and even to allow

us to touch them. They were so afraid, they used to put their hands on their heads and run under the tables and the cots, to avoid being beaten. Now, so much has changed for them. They have responded to love and care — most of the little ones from 3-7 are now able to climb in and out of their cots, they interact with each other, and sit at the table and eat from plates with their spoons. Many of them are now able to dress and undress themselves.

We are now working on the special needs of the children. Some are blind and deaf and many have orthopaedic problems. Within the last month, four children had eye operations, and more are for surgery shortly.

We still have not managed to get the children to speak. We are hoping to get a Romanian Speech Therapist, also a Social Worker, full-time in the Orphanage.

For me, Romania was a great experience and a gift from God. It was wonderful to be part of this work with these neglected children. I am reminded of the words of the Gospel — "The blind see, the deaf hear, the lame walk and the downtrodden are being set free."

EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIP

A Tale Of Two Managers' Success And Disappointment

**POLAND 1 ENGLAND 1
TURKEY 1 IRELAND 3**

The sense of disappointment at Gary Lineker's equaliser against Poland is a reflection on Ireland's progress under Jack Charlton and his approach to international football.

Graham Taylor having seen his team qualify for Sweden and having lost only 1 game in 15 against Germany, admits he is feeling the pressure. Having accepted the England job without hesitation 16 months ago he said this weekend: "If I was offered the job today, I would have to sit down and give it serious consideration."

Taylor who chops and changes his teams at will, rued the loss of Paul Gascoigne against the Poles yet he would not pick him when he was fit to play against Ireland in Lansdowne Road. For all his faults he and England have muddled through, enjoying large slices of luck along the way. Denis Wise's goal in Turkey and the crossbar in Wembley are 2 examples — 2 goals scored, 4 points won.

It's onto Sweden for Taylor and his team, further glory and financial pay-off, somehow it reminds me of Germany '88 and Bobby Robson.

Writing on this week's Sunday Express, Richard Bolt puts this question to the English manager: "Taylor says he knows his best team but never had a chance to name it in 15 internationals. It begs the question, in that case how does he know it is the best? I would love to find out."

By contrast Charlton is a man of few words who despite being short 7 players said "that's football" and saw his team win a significant victory in very intimidating surroundings. When you consider that 4 of his team are 2nd division players with 2 of these not playing regularly — 3 of the remaining 7 1st division players are again not 1st team players. This shows Charlton's ability to stick to his system and of course the players responded, none better than John Byrne, recently signed by Sunderland and Tony Cascarino, still struggling at Glasgow Celtic.

What went wrong — Ray Houghton's miss at Wembley still hurts, the draw in Dublin was costly but we didn't score — a fair result — it was lost in Poland, 2 late goals and those large helpings of English luck. Ireland 8-1 against Turkey, 4 points; England 2-0 and 4 points. As Charlton says — "that's football."

FOUR MORE YEARS

The good news for the F.A.I. is that Jack Charlton has committed himself to Ireland for 4 more years. It's a hard act to follow even for Charlton — the 1994 World Cup in America being the target now.

There are questions to be answered — his 3 centre backs — O'Leary (33), Moran (35) and McCarthy (32) — a hundred years young under Charlton at international level, surely they all can't go on?

Bonner (31) and Peyton in the reserves at Everton could continue, but form is vital for goalkeepers. A 3-1 defeat for Celtic this weekend continues the pressure on Bonner and his club manager Liam Brady.

If time isn't on the side of some of his players a series of friendlies in the Spring in Dublin against Denmark, Switzerland and the U.S.A. will give Charlton time to try new players.

A four nation tournament next June in the U.S.A. between Ireland, Italy, Denmark and the U.S.A. will be another test for Ireland and America's ability to sell the World Cup in 1994.

WORLD CUP DRAW

Sunday, December 8 is the date for the World Cup draw from America — the seeding of African countries could cause complications — could we draw England again.

VINNY JONES

The debate on the merits of finding the Irish connection will always be with us but the antics of Vinny Jones last week didn't add anything to it. Jones, to his credit has dragged himself literally by his football boot laces — his attempts to find an Irish grandmother is proving more difficult. Rumour has it he has 2 more names to try for the Dublin/Irish connection, Molly Malone and Biddy Mulligan.

EURO GROUP ROUND-UP

France, U.S.S.R., Yugoslavia join England and host nation Sweden with Group 2 being between Scotland and Romania — a 2-1 win for Romania away to Bulgaria would edge out the Scots.

Holland look certain to qualify from Group 6 although technically Greece could help Portugal through — it all depends on Dec. 4 Greece v. Holland.

Wales, thanks to a penalty, continue to hope in Group 5 — Wednesday's game, November 20, Belgium v. Germany is the big one. A defeat for Germany will put Wales through. New Caledonia Stage Win For Power

Cidona Carrick Wheelers rider, Robert Power, Abbeyside, rounded off the 1991 season with a sensational win in the sixth stage of the Tour of New Caledonia. Power came to the finish line at the top of the Col de Kanike with a 1 min. 19 secs. advantage over French rider Michel Dubreuil with his Ireland team mate Declan Lonergan from Waterford taking third place at 1.51. The overall winner of the race, Slavimir Krawczyk (Poland), came in in the main group at 4.12.

Power went away on his own in this mountain stage shortly after the start and held a lead of 20 seconds for 15 kilometres where he took the prime on the first climb. Shortly after the descent he was joined by fellow Waterford man Declan Lonergan and Frenchman Michel Dubreuil. The three rode with great fluency and stretched their lead on the chasing pack which included international teams from no less than 15 countries. As they climbed the 12km Col de Kanike, Power proved too strong for his two companions on the tortuous ascent, and was first over the line for a spectacular mountain top finish.

This was the perfect ending to a very successful season in a career that is only maturing for Power. He carried the form that he had in the Nissan Classic — where he wore the Irish jersey with pride and took on the world's best professionals — to this race off the coast of Australia. You would be proud to see the newspapers in New Caledonia the following morning, the green jersey of Power in full colour crossing the line.

He began the season on March 3 with a win in the Kiely Cup in Blarney. From there he won the O'Leary Cup in Kanturk the following week and two weeks later beat the cream of Irish cyclists in the Newbridge G.P. At Easter he rode on the Irish team in the "Northern Ireland International Milk Race." Here he was again on the winner's podium with a fine victory on stage 3. He did trojan work during the remainder of the race which ensured an Irish victory for team mate Mark Kane. In doing so he also secured third place overall for himself.

In April he was victorious in the Willie Slattery, Tour of the Mournes and the A.I.B. in Carrick-on-Suir. In May he won the Kevin McInerney Memorial Classic, one of the biggest races of the season in this country. Also in this month he won the second stage of the F.B.D. Ras Tailteann into Midleton, where he and Dungarvan man Stephen Spratt came home together.

BLASTED BACK

He took a break in June, but blasted back in July to win the Sean Lackey Memorial in the Wicklow Moun-

tains. The following week he travelled to Cork where he won a stage and the overall prize in the Paddy Buckley stage race in Blarney.

He had numerous placings in August, among them a fine third place in an international stage race in Germany. He was riding in Germany and Italy with the Irish squad in preparation for the World Championships in Stuttgart.

In the World Championships he again wore, with pride, the green jersey of Ireland. He was one of a squad of six, the other members of the team were — Paul Slane (who was later to wear the mountains jersey in the Nissan), Mark Kane, David Hourigan, Kevin Kimmage and Ian Chivers. Slane showed in this race that he intends making a future in cycling as he was in the front group for most of the race. Power, although he was not amongst the medals, showed that he too was in the same class as the world's best. He finished in the main group which had dwindled down to about 50 riders from a field of 250 at the start line. The savage course had taken its toll.

In September he returned to the winning rostrum again to win the South East Regional Championship in Nenagh. His team mate Larry Power was second and Bobby Power came in 8th to secure the team prize for Cidona Carrick Wheelers.

NISSAN INTERNATIONAL

At the end of September he was again wearing the green jersey in Merrion Square in Dublin. This time he was riding in the Nissan International and he was up against the best the world had to offer in professional cycling. He could be seen on R.T.E. each night attacking as though he had no respect for the opposition. The whole Irish team were inspired by his bravery. He led out Paul Slane for the first King of the Mountains prime which Slane duly won. Slane went on to hold the jersey for three days and was unfortunate to have to relinquish it to Adri Van de Pol in Cork on a wet Saturday. Power could be seen guarding Slane's polka dot jersey as if it was his own. Everytime Slane was in trouble Power was by his side to help him out.

Some people commented "why does Power do this for Slane." But cycling at this level is very hard and nobody



will win without a good team to back them. The Irish boys decided that Slane was the one to win the polka dot jersey of King of the Mountains. Once the decision was made, Power was only thinking of the reputation of the Irish amateur squad and the green jerseys of Ireland — so he was committed to the task.

1992 is Olympic year — Barcelona is the venue. As we said earlier Power's career is only beginning to mature. Olympic year will be very important for this young rider. Next year he will be as good as the best in international competition. We must wait in anticipation.

Judgment Next Thursday On O Murchú Action Against GAA

The suspended chairman of a G.A.A. County Board was singled out for victimisation and as a scapegoat, he told the High Court in Dublin on Thursday last when his action against the G.A.A. Central Council Management Committee opened.

Eamonn O Murchú, Dunhill, Co. Waterford, is seeking a declaration that his one-year suspension from the Waterford County Board is contrary both to GAA rules and of natural justice, since he was denied a proper hearing.

GAA director general Liam O Maolmhuilic denied this in affidavit. Mr. O Murchú was suspended under rule 136 of the Association's rules for acquiescing in regard to payments of £15,000 to the coach of the Waterford hurling team, he said.

Mr. O Murchú claims the GAA's management committee which imposed the suspension, and the central council which confirmed it, had acted as "judges in their own cause" by having people who investigated the complaints present at the meetings of the two bodies which imposed the sanctions.

The GAA says Mr. O Murchú was made aware of charges preferred against him in a letter of May 8, 1991, when he was summoned to a meeting of the management committee and the charges were clearly set out.

Edward Comyn, SC, for Mr. O Murchú, said the difficulties arose from the employment of a coach — Joseph McGrath — for the county hurling team. It was alleged by some GAA members that it was a breach of the amateur status of the GAA to have a salary paid to the coach.

Mr. O Murchú, said counsel, denied there was a breach because the agreement with the coach was for the payment of 50p a mile, and the sum of £15,000 reflected a figure to cover travelling expenses and some promotional work.

In his affidavit, the GAA director general said the payment of £15,000 was, in effect, a fee over and above the coach's expenses.

NOMINATION

PAPERS PRESENTED

When the hearing resumed on Friday it was stated that Mr. O Murchú would be presenting his nomination papers on Saturday morning for selection as in-coming chairman at the Co. Board Convention fixed for December 16 next.

Last Saturday was the last day for receiving Co. Board nominations and it was understood that the Board had accepted that Mr. O Murchú would submit his nomination papers as he was still a member of the Association

but the outcome of the judgment would decide whether his papers were valid or not.

Mr. O Murchú stated that the urgency of the court proceedings was that the Co. Board, for reasons best known to itself, had brought forward the Annual Convention by six weeks and Saturday was the last day for receiving nominations.

Mr. W. McKechnie, SC for the GAA said that this was the first challenge in the High Court to the rules of the Association concerning disciplinary procedures which were 100 years in existence.

When the hearing ended, Mr. Justice Murphy announced that he would reserve his judgment on the issue until Thursday next.

With Mr. McKechnie was Mr. Paul O'Neill, BL (instr. by Reddy, Charlton and McKnight) while with Mr. Comyn was Mr. David Kennedy, BL (instr. by Joseph P. Gordon & Co.)

Unless the county intermediate football final ends in a draw, this will be the final fixture of the season and the last match at Fraher Field until next March. Newtown's record of drawn championship matches, will no doubt condition us against being very surprised if this final ends all square and another date having to be named for a replay.

What makes this final a little more interesting is the fact that the divisions represented by the contestants, played out their championships under a different system. The Eastern division played the intermediate football under a league system and here in this division it was played on a knock-out system. Sliabh gCua, might be considered luck to have won out in the West and this view will be supported by all who saw them beat Shamrocks in the final. A forty metres free deflected to the net gave the Touraneena based team the only goal of the game and the title as well. Despite this, Shamrocks are one of our better intermediate sides and beating them was no mean achievement. However, they may be called upon to do a little more to win this one. David Whelan who has been out for three months will be back on the team and this can be a boost to Sliabh gCua. COUNTY BOARD MEETING

A special meeting will take place at Dungarvan on next Monday night to hear a report from the executive committee on their meeting with the members of the county hurling panel, which was held as a result of a very long discussion on the county hurling scene, at last week's meeting.

The meeting which was briefly reported last week, attracted a full attendance and as many as 30 members spoke on the main item, which was the appointment of hurling selectors and a coach/trainer.

Frankie Cullinane, Chairman, presided and there was quite an amount of business transacted in the three-hour session.

REFEREES' REPORTS

Arising out of the report of the abandoned Rathgormack/Dunhill senior football championship game, the chairman reported that the disciplinary committee had investigated the matter and as a result were recommending the Dunhill Club be fined £100 and that Willie Moore, Dunhill be suspended for two months. This was carried unanimously.

Arising out of the report of the county senior football final between Dungarvan and Stradbally, the referee stated that after the fracas involving six or seven players from both sides, he called the captains together and warned that if there was a repeat, he would send off as many as he considered necessary for him to keep control of the game. He sent off Owen Phelan, Stradbally and J. J. Ferncombe, Dungarvan, for dangerous play.

This report will be dealt with by the disciplinary committee.

On the report of the Shamrocks versus Erin's Own intermediate semi-final, James Tobin praised the actions of their opponents, Erin's Own, for their kindness and co-operation with Pat Murphy, Shamrocks, who unfortunately sustained a fractured leg early in the game. He further commended the prompt actions of Anthony

Walsh and Paddy Fitzgerald, Colligan in getting a stretcher and ambulance to the scene.

SATURDAY GAMES

Fixing important championship games for rural clubs where very many of the players are engaged in farming, for Saturday afternoons was placing a burden on clubs, many of whom were already hit with emigration. This was a submission by James Tobin, Shamrocks and supported by James Walsh, Kilgobinet. James Tobin stated that only one of their seven matches had been fixed for a Sunday this year. The football report said there was an improved attendance at training sessions and that a full panel will be available for training early in the new year.

A report from the Under-21 hurling committee stated that a panel of 45 had been drawn up and this would be scaled down as they went on. They are hoping to do some work on this before Christmas.

FIELD DEVELOPMENT

The chairman gave a brief report on a meeting with the Fraher Field and Walsh Park committees and the County Finance Group.

It was proposed to develop both county grounds to an affordable point. Terracing, some of which will be covered and a small stand are included in the plans for Dungarvan and an extension of the present stand and the provision of proper toilets are among the priorities at the city ground. The estimated overall cost of this development will be in the region of £400,000 to £500,000. Plans for each stage of this development will require County Board approval. The

finance committee are presently examining a number of fund-raising schemes and they hope to announce details of these shortly.

OTHER MATTERS

County P.R.O. John Jackson gave a detailed account of the programme sales at all our big games this year and was complimented by the Board for the excellent and efficient manner in which this whole matter had been handled.

The chairman expressed regret at the decision of Coisde Na Peil chairman, P. J. Coleman, to retire from his position. The chairman explained that this was for health reasons and expressed the wish on behalf of the board, that he would be able to return to the ranks in the not too distant future.

Denis McGrath, Affane/Cappoquin raised the matter of field rents and reminded the Board that convention had directed that they be examined with a view to having them increased. Denis was told that they would be looked at before County Convention.

Paddy Fitzgerald, Dungarvan, asked about the position relating to the five clubs co-op draw. Paddy said he understood that the Finance Committee were contemplating running a similar type fundraising effort. The chairman had no up to date information on the matter, but said that the finance group were in session in another room in the hotel and he was expecting that they might be finished in time to address this meeting.

A letter was read from the Limerick County Board, apologising for their withdrawal from an organised challenge match against Waterford.

Nire Golden Jubilee

Next year, 1992, will mark the centenary of the Nire's first ever championship victory and they will very likely hold a celebratory function to mark the 1942 county junior football championship victory. I don't know how many survivors there are, but in the near future I will be in a position to publish the line-out of that team.

The corresponding junior hurling title in 1942 was won by Erin's Hope. Perhaps some reader might be able to throw some light on the identity of this club?

discharged from Wexford General Hospital. Gardai from New Ross stated that at the time, driving conditions were hazardous as the result of heavy overnight frost.

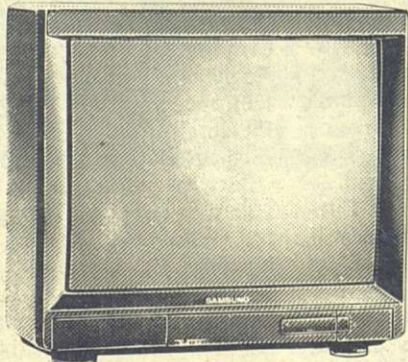
