Dungarvan Is Cheaper Than Clonmel or Waterford

The results of an independent shopping survey carried our recently by the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce has shown that Dungarvan is a cheaper place to shop than Waterford or Clonmel.

The survey, carried out was concluded that: between Thursday, November 21 and Saturday, November 23 in the three towns, included a standard shopping basket of 40 essential food/drink items. From the result it

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their annual Estimates meeting last Monday night following a discussion which lasted two hours, finally approved a Book of Estimates for 1992 which calls for an increase in the town rate and in the domestic and metred water charges.

The estimates as presented by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, provided for a total expenditure of £1,321,163 and called for a rate of £28.23.

Mr. Hurley told the Council that he had based his calculations on an inflation rate of 3.5%; an increase of £1 per annum in domestic water charges; a 5% increase in metred charges and a rate increase of 3.5% from £27.27 to £28.23.

The Co. Manager pointed out that they had been notified by the Dept. only that day that there would be no increase in the rate support grant but fortunately he had prepared the estimates on that premise so it would not make any difference to the figures now submitted to the Council. He added that due to the good husbandry of the Council in recent years, they were in a strong enough financial position to insulate themselves and of the 44 urbans, 33 have

Know Your Rights

Question - A friend of mine in her late 70s wants to sell her house and move to a nursing home as she is no longer able to look after herself. She doesn't want to lose her Non-Contributory Old Age Pension as she will be relying on the proceeds from the sale of her house to cover the nursing home fees, which will cost about £180 per week. Was there some change recently about pensioners selling their homes?

Answer — Yes! New regulations came into effect on October 18,1991 which will allow certain pensioners, who have to sell their homes to move into accommodation more suited to their needs, to retain their pension. They must be aged 66 or over, and in receipt of means-tested payments such as Non-Contributory Old Age or Widows' Pension.

This change means that income of up to £75,000 received from the sale of a principal residence will be exempted from the means-test in the following circumstances:

 When a pensioner sells her/his own home and buys accommodation more suited to their needs.

The Other Lismores

In the 6th century the Christian Missionary St. Moluagh following in the footsteps of St. Columba established a monastery on an Island in Loch Linnhe on the West Coast of Scotland near the mouth of the Great Glen. He named the Island Lismore. With this foundations as his base Moluagh took Christianity and learning to many parts of Scotland and Iceland. The Island became the Seat of the Bishops of Argyle and a large Cathedral was built there during the 13th century. The Island is just 12 miles by 11/2 and at the end of the last century supported a population of over 2,000 but only about 150 people now live there.

William Wilson and his named Michael O'Nines bride spent their honeymoon there about 1830, they later emigrated to Australia and established a settlement on the Richmond River in Northern New South Wales. The natural beauty of their new home reminded the Wilsons of the Scottish Island and they named the station Lismore. One hundred and fifty years on Lismore has become an important regional city with a population of almost 40,000 and is called the Queen City of the North. 

The judge ruled that the management committee of the GAA which imposed the suspension in May of this year had acted contrary to the rules of natural justice and the suspension therefore was invalid.

The suspension resulted from an investigation into an agreement to "pay" £15,000 to the coach of the Waterford hurling team, Joseph McGrath, Shrewsbury Downs, Ballinlough, Cork, the GAA contending that such payment was in breach of the amateur status role of the official guide (rule 12).

In his reserved judgment, Mr. Justice Murphy held that members of the sub committee of the management committee of the GAA who investigated the matter had subsequently sat on the management committee which decided to suspend Mr. O Murchú.

The judge also found that the same members of the investigating committee were also present at the central council meeting in June which heard Mr. O Murchú's appeal against his suspension, and upheld the management committee's decision.

Mr. Justice Murphy said the rules of natural justice or of fair play were not just there to achieve some academic exercise of excellence.

During the hearing of the case, GAA director general Liam O Maolmhicil denied that Mr. O Murchú was singled out for victimisation.


He said the chairman of the county board was suspended under rule 136 of the association for acquiescing in regard to payments of £15,000 to the coach of the Waterford hurling team in breach of rule 12.

The director general said the entire matter hinged around the payment to the coach, Joseph McGrath, on foot of an agreement made between Mr. O Murchú and the finance and development committee and was quite clearly a breach of rule 12.

It was claimed on behalf of Mr. O Murchú that the payment was not in breach of rule 12. The agreement with the coach was for payment of 50p per mile and the sum of £15,000 reflected a figure to cover travelling expenses and some promotional work.

Costs were awarded against the GAA, but the judge put a stay on his order in the event of an appeal to the Supreme Court.

We send Ailis our good wishes in this great charitable work in which she is presently engaged and hope to see her safe and well when she returns home.

MORESBY MEMORIAL WRECKED

A casualty of one of the recent storms which have been causing quite a good deal of damage in recent weeks was the memorial marking the mass grave of the crew of the ill-fated sailing ship "Moresby" which foundered and sank off Ballinacourty Point in Dungarvan Harbour during a storm of similar ferocity on Christmas Eve 1895.

The memorial in the form of a simple inscribed limestone headstone stood at the spot where the victims were buried in St. Mary's Church of Ireland graveyard in Dungarvan, and which was unmarked until Abbeyside Pattern Committee under Dr. Jimmy Stacey had the headstone erected a couple of years ago.

However when we visited the scene last week we noted that the damage consisted of a clean break across the base of the stone which may not be too difficult to repair. The Shoals Of Herring

We have had a very special request for the words of the very rousing ballad, "The Shoals Of Herring" and although we have in the past included it in our column we think the information which we have gleaned about it since is worth a mention. For most of us "The Shoals Of Herring" or a revised version of it was one of the top ballads which brought the Clancy Brothers to the top of the international ballad scene in the '60's but it is not an old ballad as ballads go and is not even Irish in origin.

In fact it was one of the "radio" ballads written by Ewan McColl, author of such other well-known songs as "Dirty Old Town," "The First Time I Saw Your Face," "Free Born Man" and many more. "The Shoals Of Herring" was conceived for a radio programme on herring fishing entitled. "Singing The Fishing," the in-spiration being provided by interviews with East Anglia and Aberdeenshire fishermen.

Ewan McColl together with Seamus Ennis and others brought about a momentous change in the act of folksinging in the clubs of the 50's and 60's. They started to encourage singers to adhere to their own musical heritage if they were aware of having one. It seems likely that without the dedication of Mc-Coll, Ennis and O Riada in Ireland and Pete Seeger in the US, the national folk scenes as we know them to-day would have had to wait a little longer.

CATHERINE MCAULEY, FOUNDRESS OF THE SISTERS OF

MERCY Catherine McAuley, who

died 150 years ago on November 11, 1841, still at the comparatively young age of 54, had seen the great work which she had commenced with other women come to fruition, with Sisters working in several centres in England, Ireland and America. She was born in Dublin in 1787 during one of the worst periods of the Penal Laws in Ireland. Then, as a child, she was orphaned, but was very lucky to have been adopted by a good Protestant family, who encouraged her solicitude. When the couple died shortly after becoming Catholics she inherited a considerable fortune from them and was immediately determined to use it on charitable projects. At Baggot Street, Dublin, she bought a site which became a source of refuge for the poor, and she was joined by a group of women who, like herself, were preoccupied by a desire to help the underprivileged, the sick and the dying. They called themselves "Sisters" first, but eventually were officially known as The Sisters of Mercy. That great work of Catherine McAuley's Sisters has touched the whole world



The fifth annual London Irish Christmas Youth Rescue of homeless and jobless young Irish teenagers off the streets of London will take place this year on Tuesday, December 17 next. With the economic recession biting very hard at present in Britain there are no jobs available for young, unskilled people, and young Irish boys and girls going over to London seeking work are in for a sharp shock. Many of them are still ending up homeless and jobless and having to sleep rough in biting cold weather conditions on the streets. The "Youth-in-Need" Organisation, based in Thurles, Co. Tipperary last Christmas brought home an unprecedented number of sixty young homeless Irish kids from almost every county in Ireland. This Christmas we are once again hoping to bring home as many young people as possible from the cold, damp, and often unfriendly streets of London.

We are relying very heavi-ly on concerned parents and business people for sponsorship to cover the costs of the rescue which are increasing each year. No welcome **For Visitors To ICMSA** Farms

In a message to the Chair-man of ICMSA County Executives throughout the country, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, President of the ICMSA has called for the suspension of public access on the properties of all ICMSA members until such a time as current legislation, which places liability on the farmer for injury or damage to farm visitors or trespassers, is changed.

"The legal liabilities attached to farmers arising from accidents to either trespassers or invited persons while on the farmers property, are so great that I must advise all farmers to suspend all public access for riding, walking or hunting over their properties, until we get a satisfactory resolution to this present problem.

"Under current legislation the farmer can be liable for accidental damage to an individual such as a hunter or the hunters property, while on the farmers land.

INTENTION TO

INCREASE ACCESS TO THE COUNTRYSIDE

"The ICMSA has no wish to interfere with healthy country sports, in fact our intention is not to reduce, but to increase access to the countryside. However the present rights of persons entering farmers' properties cannot continue to put an unbearable burden on the farmers.

"We require that the present liabilities attached to farmers be moved and that the right to seek damage accident be removed from persons who have not been invited on to farmers property," said Mr. O'Dwyer. 



A Good Time To Install A **Garden Pond**

THERE will be many gardeners who look forward to December as a chance to put their feet up or cope with the Christmas rush.

Similarly, there are those who hate the inactivity and chance to get stuck into something. Well, here is a project made for the fidgets amongst us - a garden pond.

They are relatively cheap if you do the labour yourself and ponds can be cited anywhere but beneath large trees. Once completed, they will give pleasure and enhance the garden for a long time.

Most preparation and heavy work can be done now with a view to planting and stocking the pond from next April through to September, but remember the risk and need for precautions if you have small children.

Large Ponds

Having decided to proceed, work out the best size and shape for your new garden feature. Don't be afraid to think big, because large ponds are more effective visually and easier to main-



one to your design. The hole is then simply dug and lined with sand to pack and sup-port the liner, but it is sometimes difficult to get this

right. If you have opted for a really quirky shape then a flexible plastic liner might be better. They come in several grades and can be guar-anteed to last up to 15 years. First dig the pond shape

and line with sand, carefully checking for sharp points that might puncture the liner, then stretch the membrane across the hole, holding it at the sides with bricks and rocks.

You can then gently fill the pond with water allowing the liner to mould to the desired shape and the side overlap to be trimmed off.

Concrete allows similar flexibility in design and will last for decades, but must be



FISH DISHES FOR BIG APPETITES



FEW people tire of fish, whatever the time of year, providing it's



tablespoons (30ml) water and stir into the mixture.

Cook until thickened, stirring continuously, Season to taste. Remove from the heat. Stir in the fish and prawns (if used).

Meanwhile make up the scone mixture following the packet instructions or use your own recipe.

You can get a good idea of what you want by laying out the shape with a garden hosepipe.

Once you've settled on shape then excavate to a minimum depth in the centre of 18 inches so that you can grow lily pads - surely what everyone expects to see in a garden pond?

The edges should then be stepped at around nine inches so that a marginal pond plants can grow properly.

The next step is to decide on the building material. It is easiest to buy a fibreglass pond liner and there are so many shapes and sizes that you should be able to find

used carefully to avoid cracking and contamination of the pond, so consult a specialist book before using this method.

Once the pond is complete you can tidy the edge with paving stones to also provide a secure path around the water.

Try adding a rockery along part of the edge to break up the pond outline and, if you are really ambitious, install a pump and waterfall from this into the pond.

A waterfall, or a fountain, will not only add visual life to the pond but also provide extra oxygen for the fish.

FISH COBBLER Ingredients:

1-1% lb (450-675g) huss, fresh or defrosted, cubed

1 tablespoon (15ml) sunflower

1 medium onion, chopped 1 clove garlic crushed 4oz (125g) small button mushrooms

8oz (225g) courgettes, sliced 1x7oz (220g) can chopped tomatoes

a pint (140ml) cider a pint (140ml) fish stock 1-2 tablespoons (15-30ml) cornflour 4oz (125g) peeled prawns, fresh or defrosted (optional) Salt and pepper

Method:

Preheat oven to 220C/ 425F, Gas Mark 7.

Heat the oil in a pan. Cook onion and garlic until soft and transparent. Add the mushrooms, courgettes and chopped tomatoes.

Stir in the cider and fish stock. Bring to the boil. Blend the cornflour with 2 triangles.

Transfer the fish mixture into a large ovenproof dish. Arrange the scone triangles on top, overlapping slightly. Brush with milk and bake for 30-35 minutes at 220C/ 425F, Gas Mark 7.

Serve with a selection of vegetables such as peas and sweetcorn.

Tip

For a home-made scone mixture sift 8oz self-raising flour, pinch salt, together. Rub in 2oz (50g) butter or margarine. Add ¼ pint (140ml) milk, knead together. Used as outlined above.

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
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



Vienna at the end of the 18th century. A city of culture and ignorance of grandeur and despair, of genius and of fools, a city of intrigue. Here, presided over by the all-glorious hand of Emperor Joseph, II, sat the court of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. More Financial Shocks As Board Fail To Settle McGrath Issue

No decision has as yet been reached about the future of Joe McGrath as the Waterford senior hurling coach. A special meeting of the G.A.A County Board on Monday night at Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan, discussed the problem but after 2 hours no final decision was taken, and another meeting will now be held within the next few weeks to try and resolve the issue.

However there were a few more financial shocks when it was announced to the meeting by County Treasurer Gary Cunningham that the Revenue Commissioners were now pursuing the County Board for payments relating directly to Joe Mc-Grath's appointment as coach over a year ago.

The Treasurer told the meeting on Monday night that the cost of preparing the county senior hurling team in 1991 topped £61,300 and of that amount payments totalling £18,500 had been made to McGrath. They now, he said, had received a bill from the Revenue Commissioners (figure not disclosed), in relation to his appointment.

The meeting was presided over at the outset by Frankie Cullinane who had been acting County Chairman until Thursday last when Eamon Murphy was reinstated as Chairman of the County Board following his successful High Court appeal (see report elsewhere).

Cullinane informed the delegates of the full details of a recent meeting between the county executive and 19 members of the county senior hurling panel. The acting chairman said there had been renewed calls by some of the players for the resignations of all the outgoing selectors, including Joe Mc-Grath. They were also, he said, very critical of the way the whole management team had operated during the year.

It was at this stage that Eamon Murphy took over again as Chairman for the first time in six months. **PREPARED TO ACT**

PREPARED TO ACT AGAIN

Senan Cooke, Dunhill and Danny Murphy, Roanmore, two of the selectors who had been re-appointed at the previous meeting of the Board despite calls for their resignation from the players signified that they were prepared to act again in the coming year as they were heartened by the unanimous support of the Board delegates. proposed that they reappoint McGrath. In doing so he said that money should not be a factor.

Michael Brophy, St. Saviours, thought that in the interest of unity they should forget about Joe Mc-Grath. "Rather than voting Joe McGrath down here tonight, let's appoint someone else as coach," he said. **REFUSED**

The Lismore Club had earlier refused a County Board request to nominate a third selector in addition to Senan Cooke and Danny Murphy until all the present

difficulties had been resolved.

Following a renewed request from the Board however Bro. Dormer, Lismore Secretary, intimated that they would do so by next week-end.

Munster Council Delegate Greg Fives then proposed a compromise that they defer the appointment of a coach and any additional selectors until Cooke, Murphy and the Lismore nominee meet to consider making recommendations on the matter to the Board. This was passed by 30 votes to 22.





In atrocious weather conditions at Fraher Field on Sunday last, Western champions, Sliabh gCua staged a second half resurrection to edge out Newtown in a gruelling and very exciting intermediate county football final in some of the worst conditions ever experienced at the Dungarvan venue.

For some time before Jim Landers got the game underway, there were doubts about the final going ahead because of the heavy rain and strong wind that made conditions unpleasant for players and patrons. In the end, and having inspected the ground, the referee decided that the underfoot conditions were not bad enough to call off the game.

Some days earlier the shelter on the sideline which is provided for the substitutes and members of the press, had completely blown away in a storm and this made conditions even more difficult for those of us who were trying to take notes, etc.

It was the opinion of practically everyone at the game, that had conditions been more suitable, this would have been a much different game, but whether or not the outcome would have been different, remains a matter of speculation. In any circumstances, the final would hardly have been more exciting for the fair sized crowd who braved the elements and soaked up the drenching rain until the last whistle was blown seven minutes after normal time. The time added on was necessary because of a long stoppage while the injured Newtown goalkeeper Billy Walsh was being attended to before he was removed on a stretcher to the ambulance with a broken leg.

THE PLAY

The wind, more than the heavy rain effected the 12th minute of this half



van. "In the circumstances" said Mr. Hurley, "I am very optimistic about 1992 being another year of progress for Dungarvan."

ALLOWANCE FOR CHAIRMAN

When Cllr. Tony Wright referred to the inclusion in the Estimates of a sum of £500 as an allowance to cover "out-of-pocket" expenses incurred by the Council Chairman, the Manager said that this was a notional figure which he had included but it was a matter for the Council to decide on the matter.

Cllr. Wright pointed out that a sum of £6,100 was already included to cover members expenses. "I think this is a damn bad practice to become involved in," he said.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan thought such an allowance was necessary as the Chairman was involved in many more functions than the ordinary members.

When Cllr. Ryan further asked whether the allowance would cover the Vice-Chair and if it would be paid over as a lump sum, the Co. Manager replied that there was no provision in the law for an allowance for Vice-Chairman.

On the proposal of Cllr. R. Walsh seconded by Cllr. Ryan, the Council then approved the inclusion of the £500 as the Chairman's allowance. Cllr. Wright proposed an amendment that the taxpayers be not asked to provide this money as the principle was all wrong but this was not seconded. DOMESTIC WATER CHARGES On the matter of the

water charges, Cllr. D. Goode proposed and Cllr. Walsh seconded that the £1 a year increase be approved.

Cllr. Wright proposed an amendment that water charges be completely deleted as they represented double taxation and Cllr. P. Power seconded.

Cllr. B. Kyne thought that these charges might be phased out over a number of years rather than in one go.

Cllrs. Walsh, Ryan, Goode and Hallahan (4) voted for the proposal and Cllrs. Wright, Power, Dixon and Kyne (4) voted for the amendment. The Chairman, Cllr. M. O'Riordan did not vote in this but then declared he was giving his casting vote in favour of Cllr. Goode's proposal.

TRAFFIC WARDENS Cllr. A. Hallahan then referred to the Manager's proposal to continue the employment of two Traffic Wardens and said that the employment of one rather than two could reduce the expenditure but the Co. Manager rejected this stating "I'm not in the business of reducing jobs."

Finally when the Co. Manager agreed to reduce the rate increase from 3.5% to 2.6% which would give a figure of a rate of £28, the Council on the proposal of Cllr. Walsh seconded by Cllr. Ryan agreed by 5 votes to 4 to approve the Estimates as amended which provide for a rate of £28, a domestic water charge of £48 with a 5% increase in metred water supplies.
