A member of Waterford County Council launched a scathing attack on the pay and salary increases being demanded by the public sector and medical profession at the resumed estimates meeting of the Council held in Dungaryan last Friday. Cllr. Ciaran O'Ryan said that the country could not bear this kind of squandermania at a time when it was heading for financial disaster.

At the outset, the Co. Manager Mr. Dan Hurley told the Council that if anything, they were in a worse position now than they were when they first met to consider the esti-

mates two weeks ago, as the rate support grant since notified showed no increase on last year and as a result this created a further cash shortfall of £114,932. The Estimates as presented

provided for a total gross expenditure of £17.19 million and called for a commercial rate of £30.03, up 3.5% on last year. In addition it called for a 5% in-**CONTINUED ON PAGE 3**

# **Employment Under Pressure States Union**

At the Biennial Meeting of the 11/87 Dungarvan Branch of the ATGWU held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Wednesday 27th November, 1991, District Office, Tony Mansfield stated that employment was under pressure on virtually all fronts, especially when one took into account that the number of persons registered as unemployed last October was a staggering 256,950, and when one recalled that Mr. Jack Lynch when Taoiseach had stated on one occasion that if unemployment levels exceeded 100,000 that the Government would have to resign.

There could be no re-negotiation of the "Programme for Economic and Social Progress," he stated as their members employed in the Local Authorities, Health Boards and Vocational Education Committees should not be penalised for the Government's failure to tackle the tax equity position.

amounts ranging from £10,000 to £790,000 and placed them in interestearning deposit accounts on a total of 29 occasions in

The Revenue Commissioner's Examination of 1,324 self assessment Income Tax Returns since 1988 showed, he said, that extra tax owing in 80% of cases at an average of £11,143.00 per case. The figures suggest that an extra £1.9(bn.) is owed in self-as-

sessment income tax. By May 1991 £2.7 (Bn.) in outstanding taxes and PRSI remained unpaid although a large proportion of these debts were under appeal. Of that total the Revenue Commissioners expect to collect just £426 million leaving almost £2.3 (bn.) lost forever.

It was obvious that the Government lacked the political will to provide the country with "Tax Equity," he stated.

crease in domestic water charges from £98 to 103; the disengagement from public refuse collection as from July 1 next year and an increase from 25p to 50p in the bag charge until then.

Mr. Hurley said that the latest situation with the added deficit of £115,000 meant that the gap would have to be bridged either by a further increase in other revenue sources or further reductions in expenditure. "Because of the cutbacks in the rate support grants, the maneuverability of Councils has been limited and that of Waterford Co. Council is, in the circumstances, very, very small," said the Co. Manager who added that the doomsday situation for Waterford started when rates on agricultural property were abolished.

Cllr. P. Coffey proposed that a rate increase of 3.5% be approved but said he would be slow to go any further as it was the small shopkeepers throughout the county who would have to bear the burden.

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. M. Queally and **CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1** 

passed without a division. WATER CHARGES

The proposal to increase water charges from £98 to £103 with a 10% rebate for early payment and a waiver scheme was next consid-

Cllr. P. Coffey said that in the circumstances he would be prepared to accept this and proposed its adoption.

Cllr. Con Casey seconded. Cllr. T. Wright proposed that water charges be completely eliminated but this was not seconded.

A vote was then taken and resulted in approval by 17 votes to 6; all 10 F.F. members with 7 F.G. voted in favour while the 3 Labour, 2 F.G. (Cllrs. O'Halloran and Walsh) and 1 W.P. member voted against.

Mr. Hurley at this stage pointed out that they were still £115,000 on the wrong side because of the deficit in the rate support grant.

Pointing out that water charges had gone up from £29 in 1982 to £103. Cllr. B. Kyne said that it was the Government which had forced Councils into

putting these charges in position, charges which the Councils could not collect. "If we are going to be closed down it will not be the fault of the Council but of the Department of the Environment," said Cllr.

#### REFUSE COLLECTION

The Manager told Cllr. P. Kenneally that if the refuse collection was to be maintained for the full year it would cost £160,000 more than was included in the estimates. It was proposed to disengage from the service next June.

Cllr. Kyne strongly opposed this measure and said that it was not the Co. Manager's fault but the Dept. of the Environment who had cut the support grant. There was a deafening silence at Government level about all this he said but he warned that if the scavenging service went, the Council's machinery yard would also come under risk. "If the Council has come to this stage," he said, "people must ask questions.

Cllr. Jackie Fahey T.D. was at once on his feet stating that it was a Labour Minister for the Environment who first introduced water charges and what they were now getting in the rate support grant far exceeded what they got when there was a Labour Minister in power. "If we all voted against water charges as the Labour members did it would be the end of the scavenging services as there would be no money to pay for it," said Cllr. Fahey.

Cllr. Fahey then proposed that the Manager's proposal on the refuse collection be approved provided meaningful negotiations were held immediately with the Union.

Cllr. C. O Riain seconding said that undue criticism of the Minister for the Environment and of the Government in general had been voiced. Referring to the pay proposals under the PESP, he asked if the country could bear this kind of squandermania under which the government must find a further £340 million for special pay increases in the public sector. He said the country was heading for financial disaster but the Council had to face up to its responsibility.

Cllr. O Riain was also strongly critical of the medical profession who were seeking a whopping 40% increase on their £50,000 a year salaries. "They're supposed to be caring people but all they are looking for is more, more and more,' he said.

Cllr. Fahey's proposal was then put and declared carried by 14 votes to 9. An

amendment by Cllr. B. O'Shea T.D. seconded by Cllr. L. Hart to adjourn the matter to allow the Manager to meet the Union for discussions was defeated

Finally to close the gap of £80,000, the Manager proposed that certain works on regional and county roads and water schemes be deferred for the present. He assured the members that employment in this sector would be kept up and that with discretion and following consultation with the Engineer the cuts proposed would not be even missed.

Cllr. P. Coffey then pro-posed and Cllr. Casey seconded that this proposal of the Co. Manager be also approved and this was

Finally, on the proposal of Cllr. Fahey seconded by Cllr. P. Coffey a proposal adopting the Estimates as submitted by the Manager, approving a rate increase of 3.5% at £30.03, an increase of 5% from £98 to £103 and the other proposals as submitted by the Manager was carried by 17 votes to 6.

they would be opposed to any such proposal.

Cllr. B. Kyne (Lab.) said that during his terms in the chair he always resented the fact that no office or secretarial back-up was available and felt that the position of Chairman deserved to be treated better than it was. In the circumstances he thought a reasonable allowance for the year would be in the £500 to £1,000 region. Cllr. T. Wright (W.P.)

supported the idea of providing an office and phone allowance but thought it would be wrong to make a financial allocation in view of the Council's financial position.

Cllr. P. Coffey (F.G.) said that now that the legislation permitted it, an allowance should be made so that the occupier of the Chair would not be out of pocket.

When Cllr. Kyne proposed an allowance of £500, his Labour Party Colleague, Cllr. Lar Hart, declared that he was totally opposed to this and Cllr. P. Coffey said he thought it would not be enough.

Cllr. J. Carey (F.G.) then proposed that the matter be adjourned and that they carry on as they were. "It will only become a political football for the Press' he said.

Cllr. M. Queally (F.G.) endorsed this view stating that as they had done without such an allowance for so long he thought it better to defer it for the present.

The discussion ended with no action on the proposal being taken.

# Latest Publications From Blackwater Press

Latest books published by Blackwater Press include "Gillian" by Veronica Staunton and "From Parnell to de Valera" by Marie O'Neill.

"Gillian" — This is the heart-rending story of the fight made by a courageous mother to save her daughter from the dreaded fatal disease of Cystic Fibrosis and the way in which the family coped and triumphed in the end.

In 1982 Veronica Staunton was told that her youngest daughter was suffering from cystic fibrosis, for which to date, there is no known cure. The story tells of the hardships endured by the family in coping with the physical and emotional de-

mands inflicted on them by this illness.

Receiving constant encouragement from her family, Gillian survived using infected lungs until in 1990 she became the first cystic fibrosis sufferer to receive a life-saving heart and lung transplant in the Irish Republic. The operation took place successfully in the Great Ormond Street's Children Hospital in London.

Gillian, as a result, now enjoys a quality of life she never ever thought possible for herself. The story is one which should give hope to anyone suffering from serious illness but stresses the great need for the setting up of a heart/lung programme

in Ireland

"From Parnell To de Valera" — Mrs. Marie O'Neill, the author of this biography of Jennie Wyse Power (1858 - 1941) is a solicitor and a history graduate of U.C.D. who has been writing and lecturing for 30 years, both in Ireland and the U.S. on women's role in history.

Born in Baltinglass, Co. Wicklow in May 1858, Jennie Wyse Power was part of three revolutions in Irish life, the abolition of landlordism, the establishment of self-government and the achievement of a place in political life for women. She was one of the first women to sit in the Senate and she knew all the major figures from Charles Stuart Parnell to Eamonn de Valera. She worked with them and for them and was part of the revolution which they created.

The biography tells of the Wyse Power family's connection with the Co. Waterford Gaeltacht of Ring where in the early years of the century, they began to spend summer holidays; and the establishment of Colaiste na Rinne of which Jennie later was a member of the Board of Management.

It is only right and proper that the life story of this remarkable Irish woman should be published this year, the 50th anniversary of her death.

### Dungarvan Is Losing Shoppers

Dear Editor,

Mr. Jim Ryan, President of the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce has quite rightly pointed out that a substantial amount of shopping revenue is leaving Dungarvan to competitors.

His suggestion that night courses or workshops on selling Dungarvan is unlikely to be effective. Shop staff in Dungarvan are extremely courteous and friendly.

If Dungarvan is to prosper as a retail centre and create local jobs in services a number of relevant objectives need to be recognised.

1 — Dungarvan is a market town, good and easy access by car and bus is essential.

2 — Shopping must be a pleasant experience and a visit to Dungarvan must be enjoyable. This requires that the Historic Town Centre be environmentally preserved and upgraded and that the Old Town Centre be a living town with a strong sense of community identity. This uniqueness of

living town centres is directly related to the prosperity of towns.

3 — The authorities must attend to the level of security which is unsatisfactory. There is little evidence that the local authority has any coherent co-ordinated plan for security, environmental development, deliveries, off street car parking for visitors or residents or the encouragement of a truly living Historic Town Centre.

Local elected political representatives ought to face up to the fact that unless they take effective remedial action within an adequate time frame, and ensure that local public servants are accountable, it is unlikely Dungarvan will compete effectively and the consequences will be a continuing failure to create jobs in the service sector for local people.

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
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

# Crystal Workers Query **Management On Redundancies And Future Plans**

Waterford Crystal management was warned last Thursday night that a refusal to openly discuss the company's future plans would be taken as an intention to end crystal making in Ireland.

The ATGWU, which represents 2,300 glass workers in Waterford and Dungarvan, said in an open letter to company chief executive Paddy Galvin that workers were suffering severe financial hardship from pro-

They felt a deep sense of anger, resentment and concern as to their future with Waterford Crystal.

longed short-time working.

Information concerning the company's plans for the industry and their future had not been forthcoming since the end of the 14-week strike in 1991. Instead, the practice had been for workers to get information concerning company affairs from the media.

The letter stated: "Information to the media, despite company denials, is widely believed by the workforce to come directly from company sources. "This is insulting to the workforce and damaging to prospects of future industri-

al harmony. It was therefore imperative that the chief executive sat down with the union to discuss plans for the three crystal factories.

It was important to outline the nature and extent of redundancies, in view of the chief executive's public statement that workers were to be made redundant.

**FUTURE PLANS** 

The workers also wanted to know the company's plans for future sourcing of cheaper Marquis Crystal in Germany, Portugal and Yugoslavia.

The workforce were not mere observers of the industry, but represented a living part of the company and its assets. It was the right of the workers to know, and the duty of the company to fully inform them, of all plans affecting their future and that of their families.

A spokesman for the company said management was willing to meet the union at any time to discuss redundancies and future plans.



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#### TALLOW CREDIT **UNION MEMBERS** EARN UP TO 7%

A return of almost £84,000 to the members approved at the Annual General Meeting on Thursday night last, gave each member a return of 5% on Shares and 7% on Deposits. "This," according to Chairman, Kathleen Barry, "represented a very satisfactory return to the members. One of the highlights of the year was the opening of a new sub-office in Ballyduff. Ms. Barry congratulated the Ballyduff Community who worked so hard to provide this service for their area. She also congratulated the Conna Volunteers who have been providing a similar service to their community for over six years. The visit of Registrar of Friendly Societies, Mr. Martin Sisk, was welcomed by the Directors and such visits are encouraged for the future.

Mrs. Nora O'Brien on behalf of the Credit Committee reported 772 loans totalling almost 11/4 million were granted during the year.

On behalf of the Supervisory Committee Mr. Michael Cunningham stated that all the books of the Credit Union were checked on a regular basis and at all times were found to be correct. "The Supervisors", Mr. Cun-ningham stated, "are satisfied that the overall administration and all decisions taken are correct and in accordance with Credit Union Rules and the Credit Union Act.

### **CHRISTIAN BROTHERS** TO LEAVE DUNGARVAN **AFTER 185 YEARS**

As an old Christian Brothers boy it is sad for us to write this week about the impending departure of the Christian Brothers from Dungarvan after an association with the town and its environs stretching back to 1807. It is indeed a very sad occasion for everyone as the 'Brothers' have been part and parcel of the lives of most families in Dungarvan and surrounding countryside for many generations.

The sad news was disclosed in a letter from Canon Gregory Power P.P. sent last week-end to the parents of all the primary school pupils which informed them that the management of the school was about to be handed over and that in future it would be run as a parish school.

There has been no Brother on the teaching staff of the primary school for the past two years and at present there are only two retired inembers of the great teaching Order in Dungarvan. The secondary section of the school has also had an all lay teaching staff for the past twelve months.

The Christian Brothers came to Dungarvan in 1807 when they founded the third school of the Order established by Edmund Ignatius Rice. This school was originally located at Main Street and then at Shandon Road on the site now occupied by the new Park Hotel and this is marked by a plaque on one of the original walls on the roadside which reads: "Tar eis doibh an triu scoil riamh san Ord a oscailt sa tSraid Mhoir, Dungarbhan, 1807, do thog na Braithre Criostai an tig scoile seo 1811 mar a rabhadar ag muineadh go dti 1835. Moladh go deo le Dia.'

For so many of us it has indeed been a case of moladh go deo le Dia agus le na mBraithre Criostai. They educated the boys of Dungarvan and taught them how to play hurling and football and to love athletics for longer than anyone can now remember. To use a worn out old cliche it is certainly the end of an era. an end that must surely be learned with the greatest of regret by all.

We can only endorse the tribute paid to the Brothers by Canon Power when he stated in his letter that since they came to Dungarvan in 1807 they had served the parish and surrounding area with distinction in the education of their pupils. Stating that the departure of the Brothers from the town would be marked in a fitting way at a future date, Canon Power very correctly remarked "we have many

good reasons to thank them." How true!

#### "THE DUNGARVAN **GAZETTE"** OF 1872

During the week we were afforded an opportunity of looking over a copy of what must now be one of Dungarvan's oldest newspapers, The Dungarvan Gazette, under date "Saturday Morning, January 13, 1872.

It contains four pages, priced at two pence and was printed and published by the proprietor, Joseph Hansard "at his machine printing office, Main Street, Dungarvan.'

The front page was filled with advertisements from local shops and business houses then operating in Dungarvan and on the back page there were detailed reports of meetings of the Board of Guardians and of the Town Commissioners. However the two centre pages were filled with all sorts of "foreign" news, mostly from Britain but none of which appeared to have any relevance locally.

A notice on the back page read: "Wanted - By a steady respectable married couple, without encumbrance, a situation as Lodge Keeper or Caretaker. The man is handy about cattle, and would make himself generally useful. Can be highly recommended. Application to be made to Mrs. Beverly Keily, Lisfennel, Dungarvan.'

Principal advertisers on the front page were White, Budd and Co. who had all types of agricultural implements, with special emphasis on "Their Champion Furze Cutters at £3-12s-6d" for sale at their Agricultural Stores at Main Street, Dungarvan. Thomas McCarthy, General Woollen, Linen and Drapery at Blackpool were lauding their ladies Silks, Shawls and Mantels while John Griffin's Drapery Warehouse, The Square was offering a supply of Winter goods, Irish friezes and "repellent cloths" for overcoats.

Others included George Stokes, Plumber and Gas Fitter, Main Street; William Orr who had waterproof mantles for sale from 6/6 and upwards and black cloth jackets for 2/6 and upwards. Hansards offered "Purdon's Farmers' Almanack for 1872" at 1s, while Smiths History of the

County Waterford (illustrated) published 1740 could be bought for £1 and "The History of the Irish Rebellion of 1798 by the late Sir Richard Musgrave, Bart., of Cappoquin" was offered for 17/6.

Prices listed for Dungarvan Markets in the Gazette included table potatoes 41/2d per stone by the sack; butter from 112/- to 126/- per cwt and home coals 24/= per ton.

And before leaving this very interesting subject we cannot but note that the tax man was also busy in those far away years as a notice headed with the royal coat of arms and the initials V.R. (Victoria Regina) read: "To all whom it may concern: Income and Property Tax for 1871-72. I hereby give Notice that I attend daily at my office, Post Office, Dungarvan, to receive the Income Tax now over due, and all outstanding Rate-payers will please take Notice of same to void costs. Signed Richard Edward Brenan, Collector of Income Tax."

We are much indebted to Deputy Austin Deasy who has a great interest in the history of Dungarvan for his continued search for such old memorabilia as this old copy of "The Dungarvan Gazette" and for letting us have a look over it.

#### The Fair Of Kinsale

Nowadays, apart from the few annual horsefairs which are still being held around Ireland, fairs are not anything like as important or so big an event for the farming community as they were. The livestock marts have now taken their place and farmers can now dispose of their stock more efficiently and in more comfortable surroundings than their predecessors who had to endure great hardships, especially throughout the cold, wet and dreary months of Winter in attending the monthly fairs.

Years ago these fairs, which were nearly always held on the streets of a town, were usually the big event of the month for the farming community and apart from the sale of livestock and other produce, they also attracted "trick-of-the-loop" men and "three-card-trick" merchants who were ever ready to mesmerize with their sleight of hand antics. These, like so many other old customs have now almost faded and have become forgotten. In many respects this, indeed, is no harm but at the same time it is nice to recall these old customs from time to time.

Our choice for the ballad corner this week "The Fair Of Kinsale" tells about the more romantic aspects of an old-time fair and of the celebrations and matchmaking that were also so much part of those gather-

'Twas the first of September, Tis well I remember, I had two handsome pigs For the fair of Kinsale. I was going quite cooly Til passing Belgooly When who do you think That accosted me there.

'Twas Mary O'Leary Beyond from Liscleary: At the sight of her sure me heart Struck me heart like a flail, And she says to me, 'Danny, Sure 'tis you're cute and canny With your two purty pigs For the fair of Kinsale.'

IT'S easy to grumble about the cost of new garden tools but we can all make our old ones last a bit longer by taking some care now.

December is a bad month for them. No, it's not the blunting and the strain upon spades and forks caused by digging but the idleness after it's done.

For we are now into a lengthy period when there is little to do in most gardens, but too often we put away our equipment without cleaning or doing that little piece of maintenance which could prolong its life.

First of all, make sure tools are clean and dry before storage and that includes basic gardening tools. Just because spades and forks are a rugged design it does not mean they won't benefit from checking and maintenance.

Always try to hang such tools off the ground away from damp and so that they don't fall over as people brush past. The metal should always be clean and dry before putting away and regular oiling will prevent rust.

Many now have coated or metal handles but wooden ones need occasional light sanding and rubbing with linseed oil to prolong their life

However, if one has broken then replace it now while things are quiet. Take out the retaining screws and yank out the remains of the broken shaft – don't discard fork or spade handles because these can be cut down and sharpened for use as a dibber.

If the shaft has broken close to the tool head and is being stubborn then drive a screw into the wood and grip the head in a vice so they can be pulled apart.

Use the old shaft to mark the length needed to fit the new one snugly into the tool socket, perhaps rasping or planing to make the fine adjustments.

# TAKE CARE OF YOUR TOOLS

Finally, use retaining screws to eliminate any movement – you'll soon be repairing another broken handle if you allow too much play and strain on the new handle!

December is also a good time to shop for new additions or replacements – perhaps a hint or two can be dropped for Christmas. The basic needs are a space, fork, rake, hoe, mower, trowel and watering can.

Consider whether you want to spend extra on stainless steel tools. For those implements you don't use often, it probably isn't worth it but anyone should appreciate the way a stainless steel spade resists rust and slices through sticky clay.

Of course, the shops will also be trying to sell mowers, hedge trimmers and the many other power tools which many of us already have hanging in sheds and garages.

They too need some care now. Scrub rust away with wire wool and clean and oil all moving parts, but always check that power tools are unplugged before touching any moving parts or you risk a shock or serious injury.

Clean, oil and grease garden shears and check that they work efficiently with the two blades bowing apart between the bolt and the tips – loosen or tighten the bolt accordingly.

If they need sharpening then undo the bolt so that each blade can be properly sharpened in a vice using a fine file to get a good edge. Use the same method on the blades of rotary mowers or buy an attachment for your electric drill which will hone the edge at the appropriate angle.

# Ireland has Most Highly Centralised Bureaucratic System

Mr. Michael Lynch, President of Muintir na Tire stated at a meeting in Tipperary last week that organisations like Muintir were now meeting a level of apathy and cynicism which was alarming and the Government would be well advised not to ignore the seriousness of the present position where voluntary organisations were concerned, otherwise community effort, a unique feature of Irish life, could surely die.

Mr. Lynch went on to say that what must now be very seriously considered is the setting up of a Rural Development Authority which could have full responsibility for regional and local development.

He continued: "There has never been a national policy on local Community Development. The absence of such a policy is, of course, consistent with the regrettable fact that Ireland has the distinction of being the most highly centralised bureaucratic system of administration in the twelve Member States of the EC. The reform of local government, as Muintir has pointed out so often, is long overdue."

- 1 198g/7oz can tuna fish
- 1 198g/7oz can sweet corn 1 can condensed cream of
- mushroom soup
- 1 tablespoon dry sherry
- 1 medium sized onion 4 good handfuls of ribbon
- noodles salt and pepper (30z grated cheese for the top)

Serves 4


#### Method:


Add a pinch of salt and a teaspoon of oil to a saucepan of water, then bring to the boil. The olive oil will prevent the pasta from sticking. Finely chop the onion and add this to the water as soon as you have put in the pasta, stir well and leave to cook.

Drain the tuna then place it with all the remaining ingredients (except the cheese) in a large bowl, and stir together.

When the pasta is cooked, drain it and then stir the pasta and onions into the mixture in the bowl.



From the top of a passing bus you can glimpse over the Palace wall at one of the oldest trees in the city.

It is the gnarled mulberry, the last survivor of many planted by James I over 380 vears ago to help establish a silk industry in Britain.

The idea wasn't a success. The king imported the wrong species of mulberry, not the one sought by silkworms. Even so, the royal chef always makes a point of sending the Queen a dish of the deep red, firm mulberries from King James' tree when the fruit are at their best.

But the real mystery of the Queen's garden is still waiting to be solved.

In the grounds is a 65ft tree, a giant among the others.

It has a bark like that of the laburnum, leaves resembling those of the wisteria. and flowers like a privet's, but far more lovely.

Nobody has been able to identify what species of tree it belongs to - not even the most experienced botanists from Kew Gardens.

The Queen is a keen bird watcher. When she chats with her head gardener, she often enthusiastically tells him of the unusual varieties seen.

Among the royal residents of the lake are the Queen's 12 pink flamingoes. They are fed twice a day on, among other things, shrimps and cockles and have thrived in the Palace gardens for many years.

This diet, incidentally, keeps them pink. Without it they would revert to white plumage.

They used to be housed in the London Zoo during the winter months, but it has been found they can stand British cold weather quite well. So now they add their exotic charms to the lake all the year round.

A young friend of Prince Andrew once claimed to have seen an otter when he went fishing with the prince in the lake. Sceptical gardeners, however, believe that what he had really seen was a water vole.



# **West Waterford Farmer Returned For Trial**





Alarming facts and figures about the ever increasing social and welfare problems of Irish men and women in London came to light this week.

They are published in the Annual Report of the Irish Support and Advice Centre. The Hammersmith based Centre is the only frontline Irish Agency operating in West London. It offers advice and information to its clients on many subjects including accommodation, welfare benefits and employment. The Centre also provides an on-going social work and counselling service to individuals and fam-

The shock figures reveal a huge number of problems ranging from homelessness and unemployment to depression, poverty and AIDS. The Hammersmith based Centre conducted 6,789 interviews mainly with Irish people, young and old, in the 15-month period ended March 31, 1991.

The Director of the Centre is Father Jim Kiely an Augustinian Priest who hails from Touraneena and in a 56-page report he stressed that the recession, which has hit London badly, is one of the key factors adding to the

# Western Board Had Co. Under-21 Satisfactory Year

- Secretary Tells Delegates

In his well scripted report to this Thursday night's Western G.A.A. Convention to be held at the Park Hotel, Dungarvan, Secretary Anthony Walsh tells the delegates that the year under review was a satisfactory one, in so far as West Waterford was concerned, and he says, he is sincerely hopeful that the progress can be maintained or indeed improved in the coming year.

The report goes on: "A degree of goodwill, co-operation and some outstanding achievements during 1991 by some clubs brings credit to all concerned, yet we cannot turn a blind eye to the fact that there still exists a number of clubs who are only just a name i.e. without participation. Thankfully, the number is decreasing each passing year. Our clubs must strive more diligently towards perfection and be seen to be putting their efforts into all activities of C.L.C.G.

CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE Referring to conduct and

discipline the Secretary says that no report would be complete without reference to the entire question of conduct and discipline both on and off the field. While it might be contended with some justification that a lack of clarity in the playing rules themselves were a reason for some acts of indiscipline on the field of play, the major cause however he says in the most instances could be found in lack of self control and a failure of club officials to chastise those offenders. There was, he said, a need at all levels in fact to show that indiscipline must be punished with consistency. The player who does not hold respect for his fellow player, or the Official who attempts to surpass the truth for a short term gain, was he says, doing a grave injustice to himself, his club and the Association.

Continuing the reports says: "Considering the fact that what must constitute a record number of games played under the auspices of the Board during the year under review the number of breaches of good conduct were in the main non existent. However, sad to relate unsavoury inci-

Board action did take place. I was sometimes saddened by Bord delegates who tried to argue that the referees report was incorrect or that the people involved were entirely blameless. On occasions, propositions for even the minimum suspension were not forthcoming. Playing rules are there for the protection of all participants. I believe that we must be prepared to see to it that our games are absolutely safe without injury. There were deplorable incidents where referees were abused saulted after games. We must take it upon ourselves Through our players and mentors we must show that we have no place for "hard men." Sideline mentors too must remain controlled and give referees every support and encouragement."

CRISIS SITUATION In thanking the Board's referees for their work during the year the Secretary says that with just under 200 games played during the year the dedication and commitment of their small band of referees was never more in evidence and once again emphasised the necessity for a sufficient panel to meet any emergency. What was not appreciated by most people he said is that many if not all of their referees were actively involved in some way with their clubs and their availability was determined by the clubs programme on any given day. Continuing he said: "I feel compelled however, to report that we are reaching a crisis situation as far as referees or to be more precise, lack of referees now existing. No Longer can we expect to be service by a mere handful of the most dedicated officials one is likely to find anywhere in the land. The recruiting of referees who will provide us with improved standards and look after the annual increasing load is a priority. Despite the best efforts of the Referees Association, sad to relate, the vast majority of clubs including most of the really successful ones fail to provide or encourage the services of one referee for the Association. It many represent a long term task but it has to be tackled sooner rather than later and will require patience, goodwill and a will to succeed."

A record number of

Cappoquin venue was the biggest money-spinner and their 42 fixtures yielded a total of £5,417. Dungarvan came next with 26 fixtures and the total gate receipts here were £2,508. The overall gate receipts were £9,198, and of this about £3,000 was paid out to the venues in rent for matches. The cost of trophies came to almost two and half thousand pounds. This matter was recently debated at a meeting of the Board when members decided to stick to the standard medals, at least

for the time being.

Treasurer, James Walsh like his predecessor, Paddy Fitzgerald presented the financial statement in excellent form and the secretary in his report paid James a well deserved tribute.

**ELECTIONS** 

The situation in relation to members standing for election is unclear at the time of writing and I have heard of no withdrawals from the list of nominees, even though there have been rumours.

All the officers are unopposed and the two big battles will be for the position of assistant secretary - the post being vacated by John Moore — and for County Board Representatives.

The Ardmore motion about the introduction of a grade (C) championship is for the County Board, but has been listed here merely for discussion and to elicit support from the clubs in the division when it goes to County Convention.

The only motion dealing with administration comes from the Ring Club and they want minutes of all Western Board meetings sent to all clubs in the division. In the same motion Ring seek to have agenda for meetings circulated to clubs in the division, as well.

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
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
