# **Civic Reception For Departing Christian Brothers**

On Monday, December 2 an aura of sincere and profound grief was cast over the Nire Valley with the news of the untimely demise of Mr. John (Johnny) McGrath, Glenalaughlin, Ballymacarbry.

Deceased was found dead in his car after it had crashed at Keane's Bridge on the Nire/Clonmel Mountain Road. In his eighties, the late Mr. Mcgrath was a deservedly popular member of a well-known and highly respected Nire Valley family. HIs exceptional thoroughness, integrity, joviality, kindness, courtesy, sincere and utterly unassuming nature were truly appreciated by all who were indeed privileged to make his acquaintance. A man who was always welcome in whatever company he found himself, Johnny was a caring and thoughtful neighbour who never counted the cost when a helping hand was required. He was a friend to all and accordingly his sad demise is deeply and justifiably mourned.

It is as a Gaelic footballer he will be best remembered. An outstanding player with the Nire team he was a member of the team that took the junior title to the Valley some fifty years ago. On the field of play his greatest asset was his leadership qualities, being an expert at instigating a move, always a fair player. At the time of his death he was President of the Nire Football Club.

Many sincere tributes have been paid to him, but perhaps the finest tribute to him was when his remains were 0'removed from Donoghue's Funeral Home, Clonmel draped in the Blue and Gold colours of the club he was so much part of to St. Helena's Church, Nire Valley. A Guard of Honour of past and present players was provided. On Wednesday morning Requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of his gentle soul after which he was laid to rest. His jersey, number 8, which he wore with such distinction was buried with him in the little church he loved so well. # Where Have All The Hawkers Gone?


Affectionately known as the "Hawkers" to the local population, this band of casual traders still come to Dungarvan on the 3rd Wednesday of each month.

In the past, the street traders would arrive into the town on the night before setting up their stalls in the town square in order to claim their "pitch" for the following day.

What some describe as progress led to the Traders being moved to the Car Park at Davitt's Quay and the fact that each operator must have a license and permit for their space means that they no longer need to set up on the night before.

The Traders have experienced a dramatic reduction in business as a result of this move. This is borne out by the fact that fewer Traders come to the fair each month.

Some local business people also say that their trade on that day has dropped off. Despite all that, up to 30 "Hawkers" brave the elements each month to display their range of good value items ranging from radios to carpets to fancy goods. The Traders themselves feel that many people, especially those from the outlying areas have forgotten that the market is still held each month and perhaps take themselves into Cork or Waterford to get Shopping Variety.




# Late Margaret O'Keeffe





# **MORE THAN ONE IN SIX** UNEMPLOYED

The number of people out of work in Ireland now is 264,800 and this is set to rise by 15,000 to 280,000 next year according to economic analysts. And even this pessimistic expectation could fall short of the actual outcome with the eventual figure hitting the 300,000 mark in 1992.

At present our unemployed rate according to these figures stands at 17.9% or more than one in six and is about double the E.C. average of 9.1%. These statistics put us



Ingredients: 1 ready-to-cook chicken, about 3½lb (1.75kg) cut into 8 serving pieces salt and freshly ground pepper



#### Method:

Sprinkle the chicken pieces with salt and pepper. Heat the peanut oil in a 10¼ inch (26cm) non-stick sauté pan and add one tablespoon of the butter. As soon as it melts, add the chicken pieces and cook for 10 minutes, until golden. Set them aside on a plate. Add the chopped vegetables and



cook, stirring constantly, until brown. Return the chicken pieces to the pan. Sprinkle on the Cognac and ignite. Add the wine and ignite it also. Boil until reduced by half. Pour in the broth and the cream; cover and cook for 45 minutes over low heat.

Meanwhile, prepare the crayfish. Pull on the central tail fin and turn it until the dark gut comes away. Heat the olive oil in an 8½ inch (22cm) sauté pan and add the crayfish. Cook for three minutes, turning all the time.

soil preparation for the coming year.

Of course, it's all too easy to be deterred by wintry weather but, with digging at least, you soon work up a healthy sweat.

And the cold conditions will actually help, because once sods are turned over they can be left for frost and wind to break down ready for raking and hoeing before the planting season.

Work in plenty of well-notted garden compost or manure to condition and feed the soil. If the ground is soggy then use a plank to support your weight to avoid compacting the soil and mining drainage - compressed clay can dry into a

solid mass that is difficult to break up and plant.

Plant life in the December garden is fairly dormant so the gardener should be able to stay on top of what are largely clearing and tidying

It's worth raking up leaves promptly because they are more useful and tidier on the compost heap and cause yellowing if left on the lawn for too long.

And if you delay raking them up on the bulb beds you risk damaging the builb heads when they start to poke through.

Those plants that haven't battened down for the winter and are vulnerable to cold

taining experience during the winter months, especially for the kids, but don't stop feeding the birds once you've started or you will cause them hardship.

If you have any deciduous trees which need lopping or pruning then now is a good time to get out the saw, cutting flush at the junction with the joining branch, thereby allowing the bark to quickly close the cut.

Fruit trees can also be pruned during the month and washed down with tar oil to deter pests such as aphids and scale insects in the summer to come, but do not prune stone fruits like plums and cherries as they are inclined to bleed too much sap.

the others. If a few are going bad then conditions are not right and they may need better ventilation to stop them ripening quickly.

There is some planting that can be done in the December garden and one of the favourites is the vine.

We have had several mild years in a row now and the success of English wines underlines the fact so, if you want to grow a vine for either fruit or wine then do it now. You can insure against bad

weather anyway by establishing the vine in a cool greenhouse where it can be trained outside as necessary, but gardeners in the South may grow vines in any warm sheltered spot.

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

# More Memories Of Growing **Up In West Waterford** - THE CHRISTMAS FAIR AT YOUGHAL

Long before there were Cattle Marts and indeed before Larry number of animals and the price in-Goodman was born, it was the custom to sell most cattle, sheep and pigs at the monthly fairs held in all the main towns. A very important fair for the farmers of West Waterford was the December Fair at Youghal - known as "The Christmas Fair." Getting out of bed at 3 a.m. on a cold December morning is never a pleasant prospect. That is what we had to do in our part of the county because we were about 10 miles from Youghal.

Whether driving cattle on foot or conveying other animals by creel it took about three hours to get there. Most of the stock for that particular fair would be fat cattle or fleshed lambs aimed for the domestic market in Cork. This type of animal could not be driven at a fast pace so the journey had to be leisurely. Sometimes we took cattle as far as Glendine or Templemichael the evening before the fair and by prior arrangement left them in a well fenced field.

On arrival at the field on fair morning it was sometimes difficult to segregate the animals from other stock. It was often pitch dark then and as country folk well know, animals can look much different in the dark. Having got them out on the road, the rest was easy. As we wended our way along the Strand Road we could see droves of cattle and lines of horse-drawn carts crossing the old metal bridge from the Kinsalebeg, Ardmore and Dromore side of the river Blackwater.

## **MEETING THE** "JOBBERS"

Approaching the town, near the old steam laundry, it was usual to meet the "jobbers." These were men who worked on a commission basis for the main buyers and they were on the look out for suitable animals. They would in fact purchase some if they got them at the right price. It was always a good sign of demand

and a lively market to meet the "jobbers" and the further they came outside the town the better the prospects were of selling at a satisfactory price.

There was no fair-field in Youghal so that sales took place on the public street - on Green's Quay for the cattle and on North Main Street/Tallow Street for creeled animals. The sales were completed after a lot of haggling. The vendor would ask a price and the potential buyer would make an offer ---often a derisory offer. So it might go on for a long time.

The "jobbers" were very active and after making an offer they would swear that if they went away they would not come back but of course they would come back in five minutes and raise the offer. If suitable animals were scarce the prices could be very good. Shrewd farmers would make an early assessment of the fair by taking a walk through the animals to see the quality and the quantity on offer. This would be a great guide to the asking price.

Farmers were always anxious to make a sale at this particular fair because the stock had been specially prepared in most cases and at the time of year fodder would be scarce and anyway they needed the cash. When a sale was agreed the buyer would put his own private mark on the animals and give a purchase docket to the vendor indicating the volved.

This done the obligation was usually on the vendor to deliver the animals to the railway station which was at the opposite side of the town. There they would be received by a representative who would endorse the ticket. Then, by prior arrangement, the vendor would take the ticket to one of the banks where the purchaser would pay in cash. "Luck Money" was always deduct-ed from the gross price at the rate of one shilling or so per animal.

When this was all done a hearty breakfast was welcome and we used to get that at Mrs. Long's Restaurant. Breakfast consisted of fried steak and onions with plenty of bread and butter and pots of hot tea. The cost was two shillings.

# **BUYING THE** CHRISTMAS GOODIES.

Women folk usually came to town on that particular fair day. They would arrive at about 10 a.m. and meet with their men-folk at a prearranged place, usually a public house. The shops did a lively trade on a fair day. Most of the Christmas goodies were purchased on that day. For groceries the main shops were Fleming's, Paisley's, Dan Mc-Carthy's and Tommy Murphy's. For drapery the shops much frequented were Merrick's, Broderick's and one that my parents usually went to, McGuane's. Footwear was purchased at Reaburn & Clarkes - always packed with people fitting on shoes and boots. The men folk went to the hardware shops, Fouke's and Walshe's, while the women folk had a quiet drink in a snug in one of the public houses. As a youngster the Christmas fair was always a highlight for me. - M.M.



Money worries, unemployment, family break-up, depression, bereavement and sheer loneliness hit people hardest at holiday times, says a Samaritans volunteer.

Suicide is sometimes seen as an urban problem, but the feelings that can lead to it are the same wherever you live; it is a very real fact of life everywhere, as the Samaritans know all too well.

The Samaritans' lines are open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. More than a thousand volunteers in Ireland - ordinary people who want to reach out in friendship to share other people's worries or pain and to show they really care — will be giving up their time to answer these calls over the holiday season. They know that the smallest problem can seem unbearable; that even where things are outwardly going well, feelings of inadequacy and fear may need an understanding and non-judgmental ear. Above all, in an impatient world, they give their callers time - time to talk and time to learn that someone cares very much whether they live or die.

# 'Drunk Driver, A Public Enemy' Says O'Hanlon

Dr. Rory O'Hanlon, T.D., Minister for the Environment described the drunk driver as a public enemy. The Minister was speaking last Thursday when he launched the "1991 Christmas Anti-Drink Driving Campaign."

The Minister said that the tide was beginning to turn in the battle against drunk driving. "We're rapidly reaching the stage where there will be no hiding place on Irish roads for the drunk or recklessly fast driver. Let's not mince our words; this type of driver is

a public enemy." The Minister expressed the hope that the publicity campaign this Christmas would be as successful as last year's which he said had "caught the public's attention like no other." As evidence of the success achieved last year, the Minister stated that, in the first

9 months of this year, there were 302 deaths on our roads compared to 348 in the same period in the previous year. A total of 46 lives were saved. "Of course this is not enough but it does mean that, in large measure due to the success of the Road Safety Campaign launched in 1990, 45 people are alive to enjoy Christmas who otherwise wouldn't have been. That's something to build on.

Mr. O'Hanlon added that he hopes to introduce a new Road Traffic Bill shortly, which will not only deal with drink driv-

**KNOW YOUR RIGHTS** 

Question - I have been receiving the Widows' Pension for the past 6 years and have received the Fuel Allowance each winter. My son returned to live with me recently and I lost the Living Alone Allowance. However, they have also taken back the Fuel Allowance, which I received under the old Urban Fuel Scheme. I thought I would be entitled to this for life. Can you clarify the position?

Answer — When the Urban Fuel Scheme, which was operated by the Local Authorities in 17 designated cities and towns, was abolished in 1988, a clear underaking was given that all those who were receiving the Fuel Vouchers under that Scheme would continue to receive the Vouchers for as long as they satisfied the requirements of that particular Scheme. Under the Scheme certain pensioners had automatic entitlement regardless of their means and irrespective of who else was in the household, provided they were receiving the following pensions:

tory disqualification periods and in the case of drink driving and certain dangerous driving offences a requirement to repeat the driving test before a driv-

limits,

ing licence is returned. "I will also propose re-

quirements to carry a driv-ing licence at all times when driving a vehicle and to introduce a radical new power for the Gardaí to impound unregistered, untaxed and uninsured vehicles.

"These legislative proposals will in time further reduce road accidents. They'll save lives. I believe they will have widespread support throughout the community, particularly the support of families of innocent victims of road traffic accidents which have been caused by drunk driving and dangerous driving." "Let's make Christmas 1991 an even better holiday - let's keep even more people alive and well this year. The success of last Christmas can serve as a tremendous incentive and encouragement for our efforts this year. We must continue to "Keep drink out of the driving seat," which was the National Safety Council's theme last year. This year they are saying (and I am saying), "Drink driving, forget it or you never will," he concluded.



# FINANCE

Our total income from gate receipts for the year amounted to approximately £62,000 and we got £21,852 from the national leagues. Our overall income was £158,814 (including transfers of money from different funds, etc.) and our expenditure was £169,574, thus leaving a deficit of £10,760. The overall financial position of the Board leaves us about £65/70,000 in debt, despite all efforts by the County Treasurer and the Board to keep spending under control.

The second part of the payment to the hurling coach and payment of the Ash Project amounted to approximately £13,000. The Ash Project land is listed as an asset with a £15/16000 value.



Only five of the seven candidates nominated allowed their names to go forward and the quota was 23 votes; In the first count, Tom Cunningham, Stradbally, received 23 and was declared elected; John Lyons, Tallow, got 20 votes, Paddy Walsh received 17, Brendan Tobin got 16 votes and Tomas Kiely, An Rinn got 14. When Tomas Kiely was eliminated Tobin got nine of his transfers which brought him to 25 (2 over the quota), Lyons got 3 which took him to the quota and Walsh got 2 which took him to 19 (2 short of a quota). "There is no longer any point in the officers talking about it and later on being criticised by participating clubs at the standard of the referees on the day, because the problem lies frirly and squarely on the clubs, the units of the Association, to provide the personnel for this thankless service."

Another serious matter was, the Chairman said, the lack of neutral umpires and linesmen, and while there was no ready made solution to the problem, it was a matter that would have to be addressed immediately and he would recommend to the incoming Board to examine the matter urgently.


