## Over £2¼ M Taken In Waterford Bank Heist

It was stated on Tuesday evening that the 5-man machine gun gang who robbed the AIB Cash Distribution Centre located at Paddy Brown's Road in Lisduggan on the outskirts of Waterford City on Monday evening may have got away with in excess of

£2.25 million and not £1.5m. to £2m. as at first estimated.

## Colleen Power, Dungarvan, Was First Irish Baby Of New Year

The Friary Church in Dungarvan was fairly well packed on the evening of New Year's Day when at 7.30 p.m. a special Mass was concelebrated by Very Rev. Liam Ryan, OSA, Prior and Very Rev. Canon G. Power, P.P., St. Mary's, to call down God's blessing on all the local industries and enterprises in the town and district in the coming year.

In the congregation were Cllr. M. O'Riordan, Chairman and members of Dungarvan Urban Council and people involved in local business in the town as well as members of the general public.

At the outset Fr. Ryan extended a welcome to all who had come to begin the New Year in hope and prayer and extended a special welcome to the Urban

Council members.

Recalling that New Year's Day was also the World Day of Peace, the Prior then lit the Peace Candle of Amnesty International on the altar and asked for prayers for all prisoners of conscience and those who were held hostage and tortured throughout the world.

The liturgy of the Mass focussed on local community development and included a blessing on all local enterprises.

The Lessons were read by Cllrs. Mary Dixon and Richie Walsh and the Offer-tory Gifts were presented by Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Early and Cllr. and Mrs. Tony Wright.

In his homily, Fr. Ryan thanked Canon Power for all the help he was affording to the Augustinian Community and continued

to speak with nostalgia of a visit to his home district of Aherlow, Co. Tipperary to spend New Year's Eve with family relatives and friends. On his return journey that morning he noted the many changes in the area since he was a boy there and adverted to the decline and almost total disappearance in some of the rural areas of the old community centres such as the local creameries and schools where people met on a regular basis to discuss their problems and current affairs in olden days.

## Newly-formed Waterford Association Faults National Media

Clearly, the news media exercises a major influence on society in shaping public opinion and in many other ways.

In Ireland, that power has grown, if anything. Sadly, however, people in provincial Ireland feel that the national print media does not give the kind of consideration to the provinces that would be regarded as wholly satisfactory. Reporting of fatal accidents, strikes, factory closures and certain court cases and local authority meetings and the like, is "alright" in itself but it is generally contended in the provinces that the focus should go much deeper than that — there should be a more positive and serious focus.

The perception of being somewhat neglected in that regard, is a widespread one. And, it applies in the case of Waterford as much as elsewhere — some would say much more, in fact, than in most other cases.

"The Waterford Association" a group of local people set up this week to

redress the trend) wants to be fair in this matter as in its attitude and approach to matters generally in pursuit of its objectives. It therefore invites the national Press to devote editorials on this specific issue, setting out the position (viz the treatment of provincial Ireland) as far as they are concerned and indicating whether or not, in their opinion, there is any justification for such a perception, and if not, why they believe that the perception exists.

It is acknowledged by "The Waterford Association" that the national media in Ireland, generally, acts in a responsible manner, and if there is one area in which some fault could be found, it is on this question of coverage of provincial Ireland.

We are thinking here mainly (but not exclusively) in terms of editorials. In the case of Waterford, for example, no national newspaper, to our knowledge, has devoted an editorial supporting the city's case for a university; or an edi-

torial highlighting Waterford's shabby treatment by successive governments on the question of decentralisation; or an editorial deploring the scandalous condition of the greater part of the main Waterford/Dublin road (a major element in the country's infrastructure); or an editorial appreciating the sense of grievance felt for so long by the south east region at the failure of the Taoiseach to appoint any TD from the region to the cabinet until very recently.

These represent just a few examples of the kind of coverage and consideration that we have in mind.

In a nutshell, what we are saying is: provincial Ireland needs a wider and deeper focus in the national Press and wholehearted backing (in editorials and other ways) in its major issues of the day.

## IFA Leader To Visit Libya

The IFA leader, Alan Gillis who last weekend travelled to Libya for a five-day visit, said the IFA initiative was a positive gesture aimed at renewing the long-standing cattle trade links with the Libyans.

Mr. Gillis is undertaking the trip following direct invitations from the interested Libyan groups involved and will be accompanied by IFA General Secretary, Michael Berkery. The top IFA officials will hold talks during their five-day visit with representatives of the Libyan Government, the national meat importing agency and the country's farming organisations.

The IFA leader said he hoped his visit would help to translate the evident goodwill that exists on both sides into real possi-

bilities for the reopening of the Irish cattle and beef trade with Libya. Mr. Gillis said he would use the opportunity of the talks to emphasise the message that Ireland does not have an indigenous BSE problem.

Mr. Gillis pointed out that the export trade with Libya had in the recent past been a vital outlet for non-Inter-vention grade cattle and beef, adding that he would do everything in his power to create the conditions that would see the resumption of that trade as soon as possible.

# SIPTU Warns Health Board — No Closures Or Changes Without Consultation

The South East Regional Executive Committee of SIPTU at its recent meeting expressed full support for its members employed by the South Eastern Health Board in their efforts to prevent job losses and reductions in services arising from the shortfall of £2.5 million in income over expenditure.

The Union notes that the Health allocation announced by the Minister for Finance in the Book of Estimates has been increased and that specific provision has been made for the completion of Wexford and Ardkeen hospitals and for the commencement of work on St. Lukes. It remains to be seen whether this increased allocation will be reflected in the Budget of the South Eastern Health Board and whether it will be sufficient to make up the deficit and to allow for at least the maintenance of the current level of services and employment.

Health Board staff in all categories have borne the brunt of the cutbacks of the past number of years and have reached the limit of their patience and endurance in trying to sustain a reasonable level of service to patients under very severe conditions.

### WILL RESIST ALL JOB LOSS CHANGES

Staff have demonstrated in the past that they are prepared to make sacrifices and to co-operate in reasonable change but it must be stressed that such co-operation is conditional on proper consultations and full recognition of the rights of the workers.

SIPTU is not prepared to

accept any changes decided by the Board and presented to the Union as a fait accompli, and will certainly resist any further hospital

closures or the contracting out of services or other proposals which would result in job losses and reduced service to patients.

## Know Your Rights

**Question** — I am the main income earner in our family and I am due to go on Maternity Leave in March. My gross salary is £18,000 and my nett take home pay is £240 per week. It seems that the maximum Maternity Allowance is £154 per week. Can you tell me if this is correct?

**Answer** — When the Maternity Allowance Scheme for Women in Employment was first introduced in 1981, the intention was to more or less ensure an amount equivalent to her nett take home pay when tax rebates were taken into account. There was no upper limit on the amount of the Allowance. However, in 1984, the 80% was reduced to 70% and a ceiling of £11,000 was put on the amount of earnings taken into account. As a result the maximum allowance was limited to £154. The ceiling of £11,000 has not been increased and account has not been taken of the increases in salaries/wages which have occurred since 1984. So, I am afraid your correct rate will be £154 per week.



## Drastic Impact Of CAP Reform

The CAP reform proposals, as set out by the EC Commission in July last, would result in a fall in Irish farm income of £114m, according to a Teagasc report issued recently. The cattle sector would bear over two-thirds of the income decline. The dairying and the sheep sectors will also be adversely affected.

The report, which follows on the preliminary analysis published by Teagasc in July 1991, assesses the implications of the proposals on agricultural output and incomes, exports and the overall Irish economy.

### OUTPUT

The value of Gross Agricultural Output would be down by about £510m, a 16% fall on the 1990 level, says the report. Savings on farm inputs would amount to about £140m and compensation to farmers, paid by the EC, could be as high as £256m.

### EXPORTS

The value of Ireland's agricultural exports could fall by over £300m, according to the Teagasc report. Since over 90% of the value of agrifood exports stays within the Irish economy, the fall in exports will hurt our earnings of foreign exchange. Job losses could be substantial in the processing and agri-service sector.

### FARM LEVEL

Overall, about 44% of farms would stand to gain from the proposals, while

the income of the remaining 56% would fall. However, size of gain or loss will vary substantially. In summary, redistribution of the CAP benefits will be spread over a large number of unintensive producers, while incomes in the intensive sector of farming will be severely hit.

● The biggest losers would be the 30,000 most intensive farmers in the country. These would suffer an average of £4,000 loss in income per annum. They produce 60% of national agricultural output and are located across every county. They also account for the bulk of the £2.0 billion borrowed by farmers.

● Only 5,000 farmers would gain to any appreciable extent. Their average income increase would be about £1,800 per annum. These include some of the larger intensive livestock farms and cereal producers with less than average yields.

● The remaining 150,000 would lose or gain to a marginal extent; 73,000 would lose an average of £270 per year while 77,000 would gain an average of £240 per year.

### DISADVANTAGED AREAS

The major factor affecting Irish agriculture is the EC Commission proposal to set more severe limits on stocking rates in the Disadvantaged Areas. This will restrict eligibility for compensation and the impact of this proposal alone will cost farmers in the Disadvantaged areas up to £47m, compared to 1990. Of the total number of farms whose income can be expected to decline as a result of the proposals, about 70% are in the Disadvantaged Areas.

It is to be hoped that the final settlement will see a major relaxation of the stocking rate restrictions which, at present, envisage that only unintensive farming would be compensated for the farm-gate price cuts in the propos-

als, says the report. As things stand, nearly 22% of total livestock units would be excluded from compensation. This would include 40% of dairy cows, 20% of beef animals and 10% of suckler cows.

### TRANSFER

The reduction in farm output prices arising from the proposals amount to IR£357m. This is, in effect, a transfer from Irish farmers to the remainder of the economy within Ireland and other countries. Since Ireland exports such a high proportion of its agricultural production, about IR£234m of this transfer would be exported outside Ireland, while the remaining IR£123m would be distributed within the Irish economy.

The calculations in the report are based on the specific proposals in relation to the major farm products. Other proposals, according to the EC Commission, could bridge the gap in farm incomes, if properly used. However, they remain vague, says the Teagasc report, as does the commitment to pay compensation to farmers in the medium to long term.

## Air Corps Operations — 1991

The National Emergency Services provided by the Air Corps had another busy and successful year in 1991. Since the service was inaugurated in 1964 the Air Corps have saved a total of 593 lives.

In 1991 a total of 56 people were rescued by the Air Corps, at sea and on land, following 122 call-outs. In addition, 145 Air Ambulance and 22 organ transplant missions were successfully completed by the helicopter and Beech King Air Fleet. The transporting of medical teams between Dublin and Provincial locations for organ transplant purposes has made a significant contribution to the Transplant Programme, at Beaumont Hospital in particular.

In its Primary role of security, the Air Corps car-

ried out 1,247 Operational Missions in support of the Army, Naval Service and Garda Síochána. These included troop transport, security escorts for Prisons and Cash Reconnaissance, surveillance and search operations. Helicopters were used in most of these Missions. The Ministerial air transport service continued in its 13th year of operation with the British Aerospace HS125 and Gulfstream 111 being operated at a rate equivalent to one and a half times the world average for the aircraft types and role. Destinations were principally to EC capitals.

## POOR ROADS NOW BLAMED FOR MANY FATALITIES

Last week we referred to the fact that although the Christmas drink-driving clampdown had proved a pronounced success, the death toll on our roads soared to three times the previous year's level. Pointing out that drink-driving had been the factor most frequently blamed for these road fatalities in the past we suggested that perhaps there was now some new but as yet hidden reason responsible for the continuing rise in road slaughter figures.

Now a new study of the situation claims that as many road fatalities may result from poor road conditions as from drunk driving. The announcement came last week-end as the Department of the Environment, the gardai and the National Safety Council sought to explain why so many people died on Irish roads over the holiday period.

In all fourteen people died in the peak period of Christmas week while a further seven died on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day.

In holding that poor roads are now one of the major reasons for so many road deaths, the Department of the Environment can only be pointing the finger of accusation at itself as it is the cut-backs in road grant allocations to local authorities made by the Department which are mainly responsible for the sorry state in which most of our roads are to-day. And unfortunately, from the look of things, matters are set to get worse rather than to improve as the financial cutbacks will bite deeper in the coming year.

In the meantime the Environment Department confirmed that it is to introduce new regulations concerning drinking and driving which will further reduce the level

of alcohol under which drivers will be permitted to drive.

Experts are now also claiming that in addition to drink and poor roads, the poor training of motorists was a further contributory factor in the matter of road traffic fatalities. Some are claiming that errors by drivers or bikers are responsible for almost half of all road deaths while one commentator referred to the fact that a majority of drivers in the Christmas - New Year death toll were female but asked not to be quoted on that as it might be rejected as sexist.

While all the foregoing may be accepted as the collective reason for so many tragic road fatalities, the main concern of all must centre on what can or must be done to reduce road deaths to a minimum. If, as has now been claimed by the latest study carried out on behalf of the Government, that the evidence seemed to suggest that as many deaths are due to poor road conditions as to drunk driving, then until such time as adequate funds are provided by the Government to properly repair our roads and stop their further deterioration, a full and proper solution to this terrible problem will not be possible.

## THE WREN BOYS OF YORE

A rather absent feature of the Christmas festivities just past in most areas was the groups of Wren Boys who in past times made the rounds on St. Stephen's Day chanting the traditional roundelay "The wren, the wren, the king of all birds" and playing various instruments and collecting cash to bury the little bird which had been caught in the furze during a hunt organised for the purpose on St. Stephen's Day.

The only area of which we are aware where this old custom was observed this year was in Leamybrien where a special championship for Wren Boys took place but even here it was held on the day after St. Stephen's Day so it did not really abide by the tradition as expressed in the old chant.

A letter from Mr. James Power, formerly from Dungarvan who now resides in London just before Christmas recalled times past at Christmas in Dungarvan when the Power brothers played around the town on St. Stephen's Day regularly in the mid-30's. "The band was made up of my father Geoff, my uncles Jack, Tom, Ned and Stephen, their cousin Nicholas from Fairlane (now Wolfe Tone Road), Mick Connery from Ballylemon and one of the Crotty boys at the top of Fairlane, near Power's orchard who played flute with them," he wrote.

Mr. Power's letter went on to recall that having played around the entire town, the group finished at the Square where on one occasion Bandmaster Mr. Michael Clancy is reported to have said "I wish I had men like these playing for me (in the Brass and Reed

Band) as their timing is perfect."


## LATE MR. THOMAS KENNEDY

## CHOCOLATE DROP PUDDING

### Ingredients:


6oz self-raising flour  
½ level teaspoon baking powder  
3oz fresh white breadcrumbs  
4oz suet  
4oz caster sugar  
4oz chocolate drops  
2 eggs  
½ pint milk

### Method:

Grease a two pint pudding basin. Sift flour and baking powder into another basin. Add breadcrumbs, suet, sugar and chocolate drops. Beat eggs and stir into the dry ingredients. Add the milk and mix to a soft consistency. Put into the prepared basin, cover with foil and steam 1½ - 1¾ hours. Turn onto a serving dish. Serve with chocolate sauce.

# THE PUDDING CLUB



## GREAT GRANDMA'S CHERRY CRUMBLE

English cherries have a short season so never waste an opportunity to sample them. The British Food Information Service has provided a recipe that was known by our great grandmothers and which is still worth making today.

### Ingredients:

675g (½ lb) English cherries  
50g (2oz) soft brown sugar (or to taste), to sweeten the fruit

4-5 tablespoons cold water  
75g (3oz) home-produced butter  
150g (6oz) plain flour  
75g (3oz) sugar for crumble

### Method:

Put cherries, soft brown sugar and water into an ovenproof dish. Rub butter into flour until mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the sugar. Sprinkle mixture over the fruit. Bake in centre of oven at 200C, 400F. Mark 6 for 35-40 minutes or until fruit is cooked and crumble lightly browned. Serve hot with custard or ice cream.

Serves 4-6.

## BLACKBERRY & APPLE FOOL

This is a refreshing and cooling dessert made with eating apples, blackberries and cold custard. The British Food Information Service says the fruit should not be sweetened until it has been cooked because then it is easier to judge how much sugar, if any, is required.

### Ingredients:

450g (1lb) English eating apples  
225g (8oz) blackberries  
3 tablespoons cold water.

### Method:

Reserve 4 blackberries for decoration. Prepare the fruit. Chop, but do not peel or core, the apples. Put berries and apples in a pan with the water, cover and simmer until tender. When ready, rub through a sieve to make a puree. Add sugar to taste and stir until it has dissolved, then mix in the custard. Stir until mixture is smooth. Divide between 4 serving bowls. Decorate each with a reserved berry. Serve Chilled.

Serves 4.

# Bring the garden indoors

IT is in the bleak months like January that we most appreciate houseplants.

While the garden seems lifeless, some indoor greenery and even some blooms can make all the difference.

Most require little attention if they have the right situation and temperature. Many dislike draughts and the stuffy conditions of modern centrally-heated homes, but reputable nurseries or stores usually sell houseplants with a tag showing how best to care for them.

Humidity can be increased by regular misting with a sprayer, or grouping plants on a tray lined with gravel with water lapping the top of the gravel — the water creates a humid envelope around the plants without saturating their roots.

Feeding and pest control can be made easy by buying special pellets, which can be inserted into the soil to handle both roles. All you need



do then is water and even this can be simplified by investing in 'self-watering' pots — double-skinned pots with a reservoir allowing water to the plant as required.

By far the most popular houseplants and the usual starting point for a houseplant collection are cacti and succulents because they tolerate bad treatment.

The two groups are related but we tend to see cacti as spiny and succulents as fleshy with hard leaves — though the latter can come in such strange forms as lithops, nicknamed 'living

rocks'.

Cacti and succulents should be kept cool at this time of year and watered rarely. Too much water and they can easily go rotten.

These varieties are also a little too boring to make good feature plants, with the notable exception of Sansevieria or Mother-in-Law's Tongue — a tall, striking plant with leathery blade-like leaves.

So which are the most rewarding for that dramatic specimen plant to brighten up the room in winter?

PALMS — a traditional favourite, slow growing and pricy yet rewarding. Traditional favourites such as the Parlour, Areca and Kentia are now being rivalled by Date, Sago and the spectacular Coconut varieties.

FATSIA — often known as Aralia or Castor Oil Plant, this is a tough plant which can stand temperatures up to 70F but will require mist-

ing. Buy a small one — they are cheap and Fatsia is a fast grower.

RUBBER PLANT — a Victorian favourite. Sturdy is rather dull unless you opt for the variegated types. Over-watering is the biggest risk.

FATSHEDEREA — a hybrid of Fatsia and Ivy (Hedera) which is rugged and fast-growing. Its mixed parentage means it can be kept as a bushy specimen plant or trained over a trellis or canes.

WEEPING FIG — surprisingly from the same family as the Rubber Plant, this graceful, and expensive, plant makes a superb specimen plant but is fussy about conditions.

MONSTERA — more commonly known as Swiss Cheese Plant. It is spectacular and easy to grow but likes humidity and needs training against a moss stick to prevent straggling into a mess.

# Referees And Refereeing

In the coming months the matter of recruiting and training referees will be talked about quite a lot (as it always is at this time) and without wanting to sound negative about the subject, I expect that by the end of another season we will all be complaining about standards and shortages. That is the way it has been here in this county for almost as long as I can remember as it never seems to change. With so few referees available to the Boards, it is a mystery to very many people how we manage to get through our huge programme of championship and league matches year after year.

Here in West Waterford a few clubs provide about a dozen referees for service to the Board and it is no different in the East. Early last year seminars were organised in both divisions and there were not a dozen present at either. But still the full programme went ahead. It went ahead because the men who served are amazingly dedicated and never let down the Boards despite personal inconveniences and domestic problems. This cannot go

on forever and sooner or later the bubble will burst and it will only be then that clubs will begin to realise the real seriousness of their situation. Unless some new scheme of recruitment is introduced and all clubs in both divisions look to their responsibilities in the matter this problem will be ongoing and worsening. Now is the time to act and to do something positive in setting up a substantial panel of referees.

All clubs should be

compelled to interest themselves in the matter of supplying men to be trained and coached in the business of refereeing and clubs who fail to respond should be penalised in some way. Week after week we hear complaints and criticism of referees, and these comments almost invariably come from clubs who do not have a referee. Referees either lose or break even. They never win and are very often the object of unfair abuse, mainly by people who have no knowledge of the rules. They are the unrewarded supermen of the association and without them our games would go out of business overnight.

Having written the above, it would be very naive of me to try to convey the notion that refereeing standards in the county are perfect and that sometimes complaints are not justified. Referees do make misjudgments (particularly in relation to applying the advantage rule) and when the gamble does not work out to the satisfaction of the player concerned, the unfortunate referee is the loser. There are other areas too where some referees might tidy-up their style in handling games, such as strictly applying the misconduct rules, etc., and I would like to see the rule about incursions on to the playing area, being reported by the referees when they submit their reports to the Board.

Board. Details of this have yet to be worked out, but on the basis of the figures being mentioned at the moment, we could expect a sizeable amount from this scheme. Unless the weaker counties are going to be granted a sum of at least £10,000 to £15,000 each at the initial stage of the championship, I cannot imagine the members of Central Council agreeing to accept such sponsorship.

A mid-February dateline have been put on applications from the many interested companies and this means that the details will be known to the County Boards well in advance of the commencement of the provincial championships.

## FINANCE

The reduction of the huge county debt will be treated as a priority by the new Board within the next few months when, it is expected that a major fundraising drive will be organised countywide.

This will mean organising a new finance committee and club involvement in the drive to bring the debt down to manageable proportions, so as to avoid paying big interest on our overdraft at the moment.

A fifteen thousand pounds special grant from the Munster Council is to be paid over for a start and it is expected that further sponsorship (particularly for our championships), will be sought.

The recent announcement from Croke Park that the All-Ireland series will be sponsored this year, could mean a bonanza for the


