A letter from the Dept. of the Environment under date January 8 intimated that the revised capital allocation for the Council's housing programme for 1991 was £452,000 which was up £50,000 on the sum originally allocated. The letter was circulated to members of Waterford Co. Council at their January monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

A progress report on housing for the month of December submitted to the Council stated that 13 houses were at present under construction (4 each in Tramore and Dunmore East, 2 each in Ballinagoul and Portlaw and 1 at Shanbally.)

Cllr. B. Kyne commented that the housing situation in the county was very critical for many families and he felt that in not coming to grips with it, the Council

was making social problems for themselves for the future. He expressed himself as being very concerned at the position as he felt that they were facing in to a very serious problem. He suggested as a solution that some of the money under the social housing scheme might be allowed go to mortgage relief to enable people who could to house themselves.

Residents Object To Proposed New Employment Exchange In Dungarvan

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council were informed at their monthly meeting held last Monday night that residents in Friary Street in the town were raising objections to the proposed new Employment Exchange to be located in the street.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White informed the meet-

ing that a planning application for the reconstruction of one of the old unoccupied houses in St. Augustine's Street had been received and this had given rise to representations from residents in the street objecting to the proposal. As a result the planning officials had asked for further

information as to the number of people who would be using the office.

Mr. White added that in the circumstances, the County Manager (who was unavoidably absent from the meeting) had asked for the views of the Council on the application before any

Call For Chiropody Services For OAPs

Cllr. R. Walsh at the January monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday proposed that the Council call on the South Eastern Health Board to provide chiropody services for old age pensioners and other needy people in the area.

Cllr. Walsh pointed out that he had a similar resolution passed by Dungarvan Urban Council 12 months ago but while the Health Board operated the scheme in Carlow and Kilkenny, nothing was done about Dungarvan or West Waterford and unless the people here had money to pay for the service they just had to suffer on. "Here in West Waterford we're on the back burner as usual," he said.

Cllr. G. O'Halloran who was recently elected Chairman of the Health Board said that up to 4 years ago there was a chiropody service in operation in all the Board's areas but then the first financial cutbacks took effect. He said that he would look further into the matter and find out what

the position now was. Cllr. O'Halloran then said that as Chairman of the Health Board he had met the Minister for Health last week and had raised with her the matter of the proposed new 100-bed hospital for Dungarvan. "I invited her to come to Dungarvan to see the position there for herself and she has taken up the invitation and she told me that she would be in Dungarvan next month at a function that I won't be attending," said Cllr. O'Halloran amid laughter.

On the proposal of Cllr. Walsh seconded by Cllr. Kyne, the members joined on congratulating Cllr. O'Halloran on his election as Chairman of the Health Board.

Health Board Seeking Additional Funds For Adult Dental Scheme

Deputy Brian O'Shea has been informed in a letter from Mr. M. Lynch, Community Care Programme Manager, South Eastern Health Board that emergency services are provided for adults by the Board's dental team. In addition, an allocation of money was made available in 1990 to the Board by the Department of Health for an adult dental scheme and it was operated mainly by private dental practitioners who would take persons referred to them by the Principal Dental Officer of the Community Care dental team. In addition, some of the Board's own dentists also provided a service to adults under this scheme in an out of hours arrangement.

Mr. Lynch's letter added: "The Board, for this scheme, had received approximately £280,000 per annum in total, this was divided equally between the four community care areas. The allocation to the Waterford community care area was heavily overspent in 1991, and new referrals for treatment are not to be made at present. The Board has advised the Department of Health of the need for additional monies for the ad hoc dental scheme for adults, and awaits the response."

In the meantime Deputy O'Shea has intimated that he has made strong representations to the Department seeking the additional monies required by the Board for the scheme.

Industrial Sabotage Suspected At Dungarvan Crystal Plant

A case of suspected industrial sabotage at the Dungarvan Crystal plant is at present being investigated and has resulted in the laying off of 115 workers at the plant since Monday.

The matter involves the contamination of an entire crystal batch which had to be discarded and an investigation into what contami-

nant was involved and how it got into the crystal batch. Work at the plant had only been resumed on Monday following an extended Christmas holiday.

It has been stated that failure by the Management investigation to solve the issue could result in the Garda authorities being called in to unravel the matter.

Midleton Request On Directional Sign-Posting Marked "Read"

Midleton Urban Council submitted the following resolution to Waterford Co. Council for consideration at its January monthly meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday: "That we request Waterford County Council to provide alternative directional sign-posting to Killarney from Dungarvan via Cork as requested by Midleton Area Tourism, Ardmore Enterprise Co-op, Youghal Tourism, Development Ltd, and Blarney Tourism."

Cllr. Con Casey asked whether Midleton U.D.C. would pay for such signs if they were erected and Cllr. W. McDonnell, Chairman replied "No."

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, said that the Department of the Environment would not approve of such a move as it would not conform to existing policy on directional sign-posting.

Cllr. R. Walsh said what Midleton wanted was to have the Killarney sign at Tarr's Bridge removed or another one erected indicating Killarney via the coast road which would take in Cork.

Cllr. W. McDonnell,

Chairman said that Cappoquin and Lismore and places in West Waterford were also lovely areas for tourists and he asked "where these places are concerned do we get the same co-operation from Kerry and Cork as we give to them?"

Cllr. Patsy Kenneally said that if the Midleton resolution was passed they would have deputations from Cappoquin and Lismore down to the next meeting of the Co. Council complaining about it.

Cllr. Nora Flynn said that she would object to the resolution as Cappoquin and Lismore got a lot of tourist traffic during the summer months as visitors were going that way to Killarney.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager then suggested that the Council neither adopt nor reject the resolution and said that it could be considered when they came to consider the whole question of directional signs within the county including the signs at Tarr's Bridge.

It was then unanimously agreed to mark the resolution "read".



that he was aware of a very increased demand for housing in Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow and knew of four new applicants looking for houses in Lismore prior to Christmas while 2 houses which were up for letting there lately had a total of 12 applicants. "The problem is getting steadily

worse," he said.

Cllr. Nora Flynn said that the position was now so bad that people had just given up hope of ever getting a house. "They are not even applying to the Council for houses now as they think the Council is not building any more," she said.



PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

MORE INTIMIDATION BY REVENUE COMMISSIONERS AND SOCIAL WELFARE

Were it not such a serious matter it would really be funny. We refer to the manner in which the Revenue Commissioners and the Department of Social Welfare continue to intimidate small employers as they have done in the matter of self assessment tax and the payment of pay related social insurance (PRSI) on behalf of anyone they may have employed. This is the serious part.

The funny part is how so many of the so-called giants in the business world are given such a long rein by these same Commissioners and Department Inspectors in the matter of their tax payments as evidenced in the lists of bankrupts published from time to time which almost invariably show the Commissioners as main creditors due to tax evasions under one heading or another running into hundreds of thousands of pounds.

With 1 in every 20 of the workforce in the country now unemployed, the photo elsewhere on this page takes on a sinister significance. It was that of a huge sign erected near the railway bridge on the Killarney road just outside Mallow which attracted the attention of a reader of the "Leader" who passed there during the Christmas holidays. What a Christmas greeting from the Social Welfare Dept. and what a put-off for anyone who might be thinking of providing a few jobs for the country's army of unemployed!

SHELLFISH PROCESSING PLANT

Last week an application was published, as required under the Planning and Development Act, seeking full planning permission for the erection of a shellfish pro-

cessing plant in the Ring Gaeltacht. Published in Irish and signed by An t-Uasal Ian Breathnach as Runai, the application was set out as follows: "Ta se i gceist ag Meitheal Tra Na Rinne cead plannala iomlan a lorg ar Chomhairle Condae Phortlairge chun lath-air proiseala sliogeisc thogaint ag an Mota, Rinn o gCuanach."

Curious to find out more about the proposal contained in the planning application we made some inquiries during the week and learned that a number of local oyster growers and fishermen in the Dungarvan Harbour area have now combined to form the new company to be known as "Meitheal Tra Na Rinne."

For some considerable time past oyster farming has been successfully carried on fairly extensively in the harbour and this has been the principal deciding factor for the establishment of the shellfish processing plant which is now proposed by the Meitheal Tra company.

While fishing has always been an important aspect of the economic life of the Ring and Helvick areas, the success which has attended the establishment of the oyster beds in the harbour — incidentally the product is stated to be the very best on the market — has added greatly to the economy of the Gaeltacht district. It is hoped that the establish-

ment of the proposed processing plant will further enhance the prosperity of the area by providing local employment. An advertisement elsewhere in this issue of the "Leader" indicates this.

We understand that the planning application will be lodged with the County Council this week and that all things going well that the new plant will be up and going in the course of the next few months.

CHRISTMAS SHUT DOWN IS TOO LONG

Last year we referred to the ever lengthening period which features the business shut down in Ireland for Christmas and expressed the view that this was a luxury which the country could ill afford especially at a time when it is beset with such serious financial problems.

We experienced very little response to this view from readers at the time so we just didn't bother to pursue it any further. However last week we noted a letter published in one of the national daily papers from a Mr. Charles R. Parker which reactivated the matter. This gentleman stated that as an American living in Dublin he was amazed at the way the Irish celebrate the Christmas season.

"It seems to me," Mr. Parker wrote, "that the country shuts down on December 23 and the people stay drunk until January 3."

While we would not totally agree with this as far as staying drunk is concerned, we must accept that there is an almost total close down from Christmas Eve until January 2 while in many cases in the past Christmas,

firms closed on Friday, December 20 and remained closed until January 2.

We have discussed this matter with a number of people in small private business enterprises and most lay the blame for these long lay-offs from work on the public services. When these services decide to shut down it just means that the entire country becomes paralysed and those who may even want to get back to work find that it is just impossible to do so as none of the normal services operate.

We have said before and we make no apology for repeating that a total shut-down of business for almost fourteen days to celebrate Christmas is just something that the country cannot afford. The effect of the long lay-off and the costs involved in the Christmas and New Year celebrations this year were very evident immediately on the resumption of activities. Not only Dungarvan but all of the towns around the county took quite a long time to recover. Business went dead, many people found their cash supplies exhausted while those who still had some money left hung on to it because of the uncertain outlook for the year ahead.

Nobody wants to be a spoil-sport and it is indeed only right and proper that Christmas and New Year should be celebrated. But is it necessary in doing this that the entire business rhythm of the country should be thrown out of gear?

It's something we should think seriously about.

IT IS VITAL TO BE HEARD

We were glad to note that at last Monday's monthly meeting of Waterford County Council it was agreed to have improvements in the lighting arrangements and more importantly in the acoustics of the room in the Courthouse in Dungarvan where meetings of the Council take place. One of the biggest problems which press reporters covering these meetings have had to contend with is the difficulty, more often than not, of hearing the speakers.

It was pleasing then at last Monday's meeting to hear the Chairman, Cllr. Willie McDonnell urge the members to speak up to enable themselves to be heard and also so that they would be heard from the press bench.

Cllr. McDonnell agreed that the acoustics were bad at times (we never

found them good at any time) and said that a number of improvements to existing facilities were urgently needed. "I know we are short of cash but these improvements will have to be carried out," he said.

Cllr. C. O Riain fully supported this as he claimed, and not for the first time, that he found it impossible

to hear what was being said at times.

County Manager Dan Hurley agreed that the signs that such improvements were needed were obvious and he said that these and the whole question of proper accommodation for the Chairman and members would be looked into and put in hands in the coming year.

YOUGHAL IN THE GOOD OLD DAYS

A reader who wishes to remain anonymous has submitted some old poems which he suggests might be suitable material for inclusion in our ballad corner. One of these, "Youghal In The Good Old Days," recalls Youghal in the days when many of the leading merchants of the town were also shipowners who owned vessels which traded regularly between Youghal and ports in England and Wales and indeed further away. It is good to note that in recent times Youghal has again begun to enjoy a revival in its portal trade with many ships, several of quite large capacity, being discharged at the quay.

This is how the great days of sail are recalled in "Youghal In The Good Old Days"—

When day is past at night I rest
Old memories come to me
Of Youghal town with its barques and brigs
That sailed the briny sea.

To name them all I needn't recall,
But just give here a few,
Ringdove, George Peak and Altee,
All manned by a Youghal crew.

They sailed the oceans far and wide,
Braved many a stormy day,
Till they came back with the flowing tide.
To Farrells at Green's Quay.

The sawmills and the brickyards
Were working in full swing,
And vessels sailing outwards
Their orders to fulfil.

The Flemings and the Murrays
Great merchants of that day
Made many a family happy
And kept the wolf at bay.

The corn stores were all packed high
Each loft up to the brim,
God rest the souls that are gone by
The Orureys and the Pims.

The Market Square has done a share
With spuds and stocks of fish,
And little boys cast longing eyes

The Garden Now Can Be A Big Draw

JANUARY is a great month for planning — there is not much to be done in the garden and who really wants to brave the bitter weather.

Instead, many of us sit down and sketch garden plans and planting schemes, but while our horizontal vision is often good we tend to forget the verticals.

And good use of height, either in choice of plants or creating features, can make a major difference even to a small garden.

One traditional and simple answer is to build a pergola, a timber framework to go over a pathway, patio or act as a 'door' between two sections of the garden.

Pergola

It can be the support for a climbing rose, other climbers or even a vine if your garden is well-protected from icy blasts or you live in the warmer South.

If your pergola has several legs, why not have a different shrub climbing up each?

Building a pergola is even easier nowadays thanks to modern steel post supports. These can be simply driven into the ground, avoiding the need to dig holes and then concrete posts into the ground.

For rigidity, use at least three-inch square timber and treat it with a non-toxic preservative — you don't want the structure breaking up after a couple of years, just as the plants themselves have become established.

If a pergola is a little grand for your high-rise ambitions then consider fixing up ready-made trellises.

These simple frameworks can be attached to a wall, fence or side of a house to act as the support for attractive plants such as clematis, rose, or honeysuckle.

For real simplicity how



about using a single post, perhaps with a couple of crosspieces for extra support? This would be the ideal support for a climbing rose flanked by a standard flower border.

Or you can try wire supports. A framework of wires and eyes can be fixed onto a wall or fence to support climbers or fruit trees and shrubs.

This method is particularly popular for specially training fruit trees into flat espalier or fan shapes to save space.

Cane fruits such as blackberries, raspberries and loganberries can also be grown using this method.

Support

Wires and other support are also important for such plants as wisteria when grown against the wall of the house. The delicate mauve flowers make it a favourite to decorate the front of a cottage but, unlike more robust and clinging climbers such as ivy, it does need help.

But you can also be a little 'off the wall' in your vertical thinking — existing shrubs and trees can be natural supports for climbers. The delicate clematis, for instance, can entwine itself in a tree.

Such a partnership will provide the clematis roots with the water-retaining shaded ground they love while the tree or shrub will be brightened up by the clematis blooms.

Mary's climb to international status has conquered with peace rather than panic. She works smoothly and organically due to her insistence on a 'family' feel both in her music and her working relationships. She has retained strong artistic control and makes certain that every song she sings and every step she takes

gives a true representation of herself.

Mary returned from a critically acclaimed U.S. tour last April to put the finishing touches to her latest album 'Babes In The Wood.' Released in Ireland in July, it went straight to No. 1 in the Irish album charts and stayed at No. 1 for five weeks. It is Mary's fastest selling Album to date and was released world-wide in October.





Like It Hot.





tors and supporters who helped bring so much joy and excitement, to strive for new and greater goals in 1992 and stated that no effort must be spared in retaining the senior hurling county title this year. He also appealed to many of the club's ex-players to return to the fold and to offer their underage players the benefits of their vast experience.

Club chairman, Michael O'Leary who was returned unopposed, in a wide ranging address to the members said that Lismore have got to prove now that winning the hurling championship, was no 'flash in the pan.'

In paying tribute to the very many people, sponsors, players, selectors and the local community in general, he particularly mentioned Jimmy O'Gorman who had taken over the role of county hurling selector and chairman of that committee and wished him and the other selectors success in their efforts to bring Wa-

terford back towards, or to the top. He also referred to county matters and expressed the earnest wish that peace and harmony would soon be restored to the county.

The great success of the weekly draw and the tremendous dedications of the members who operated this successful fund-raiser on behalf of the club were among the many matters not forgotten in his address.

On behalf of the gathering, Michael wished a very speedy recovery to team captain, Seamus Prendergast.

Development Meeting In Limerick

A special meeting, dealing with development in every county in the province is due to take place on to-night at Limerick. The meeting will be addressed by the Director General, Liam Mulvihill and Waterford will be represented by the chairman, secretary, treasurer, P.R.O. and County Youth Officer.

At the County Board meeting last week, the Fraher Field Committee were given the all-clear to apply for planning permission for the proposed development. The raising of the necessary finance to carry out this work will be discussed shortly by the Board.

Another County Board Meeting

The above was a special meeting and no ordinary business was transacted. The first ordinary meeting of the Board will take place on Monday, January 28 at Dungarvan, when an amount of business will be dealt with. At this time the full list of affiliations will be known and work on the organisation of the 1992 championships can

begin.

I understand that the chairman of the Munster Council Michael Maher, will briefly address this first meeting. He will be present on the night to present the cheque for £15,000 grant to the Board. This grant arose from a surplus at provincial level, resulting from a great season and a big draw in the Munster hurling final.

Hurling Coach Approved

The appointment of George Leahy, Kilkenny as County Hurling Coach for the season, was given unanimous approval at a special meeting of the Senior Board at Dungarvan last week.

The chairman, Eamon Murphy presided and a letter from the three members of the selection committee was read, giving details of their efforts to secure a good coach. They also recommended the co-option of Pat O'Grady as a fifth selector (George Leahy also to be a selector). Pat, who is an experienced Mount Sion

player and coach, was also accepted unanimously.

The coach will be paid expenses in accordance with official rules. The coach and committee will engage a P/T man if they consider this desirable. The term of appointment of the coach will be until the end of our interest in the championships. It was pointed out that this is an exceptionally short term and some people consider it unfair to George Leahy, that he is given so little time to work with the panel. Deciding that he will be retained if successful is surely putting on the pressure.

AFFILIATION SYSTEMS

In the upcoming Croke Park development and the allocation of seats in the new Cusack Stand, it is proposed that all clubs in every county will be given the opportunity of purchasing four ten year term tickets. It may be a costly facility but if an easy payment facility arrangement is worked out, as is intended, clubs will be given a chance to consider purchasing. Because of the extraordinary system of affiliation in operation from county to county some counties can lose out in the allocation.

Here in Waterford our system is more in line with general rule, than several other counties (we have a total of 57 clubs while Limerick, for instance have approximately 145 clubs) Kilkenny have only 43 clubs. In order to do something about eliminating this anomaly Waterford raised the matter at last year's Munster convention and as

a result a special committee was set up at national level to have the matter examined.

The end result is that a new form of affiliation (and registration of players and members) is likely to be presented to Congress this year and there will be a proper levelling-out of affiliations. This could mean a change in our system as well.

V.A.T.

The payment of V.A.T. on hurleys which was a major issue in the association for several years is still mandatory on all purchasers, but for the past year or two, the controversy that it aroused, seemed to have died away.

I refer to the subject now because the imposition was referred to again this year at a number of club annual general meetings. One club, that I know of paid a total of more than £800 in value added tax for hurleys last year and this is even more outrageous now than it was some years ago as the amounts continue to increase with the increase in the price of hurleys. This was referred to in a big way by the chairman of the Lismore club at their A.G.M. last Sunday when Michael O'Leary criticised the levy, which is a tax on the promotion of cultural activities. Based on figures that were made available three years ago by Croke Park the amount being paid nationally every year is well in excess of a quarter of a million pounds.

G.A.A. NOTES

The R.D.S. Controversy

This has been raging for some time since that failure of the Clann na Gael Fontonoy/Shamrocks to materialise as published and it is interesting to note that the matter has been given mention in county secretaries reports and chairmen's addresses around the country in the past several weeks. At the Waterford Convention, Kilmacthomas delegate Seamus Casey asked to have standing orders suspended in order to have the matter debated.

As we were ourselves involved in controversy in recent times it was decided more prudent not to have the subject discussed. Some of the media, outside this county got great mileage out of the row and much of the comment by ill informed writers was unfair and unjustified, but on the other side, the failure to get the facts across to our units in time was not altogether to our credit.

This meant that all the relevant facts in the case did not come out and maybe if both sides of the story were told more clearly, then very many of our units would see things a bit differently.

Clann na Gael's displeasure has been well highlighted in the national press and it is understandable that Shamrocks Rovers, having failed to get their £16,000 net from the agreement,

were also angry. Central Council have rules to uphold — rules that are made by clubs and county conventions and congress — and if they failed to do this, they would be the ones in the witness-box and under severe pressure from the units throughout the country.

The controversy seems to have dissipated for the moment at least, but it is likely to have some kind of airing when Congress comes round in April and motions related to this are being debated.

The decision of the Kerry County Board to pass a motion which seeks to allow other sports like rugby and soccer to be played in our major stadia would seem to

be the first shots in a policy revolution for the GAA.

Many people will express understandable surprise at such a proposition coming from a county who are perceived as being very traditional in their outlook on such matters.

This is the most major policy change proposed since the removal of Rule 27 which took away the ban almost 20 years ago. As I see it, there is a lot more involved in this, than the mere granting of permission to play other sports in our major stadia as such policy cannot apply to a venue in one part of the country and not to all the others. I have no doubt but that a lot more will be written on the subject in the very near future.

Western Board Meeting

The first open meeting of the year will be held at Dungarvan on Thursday of next week to accept affiliations, regrading and transfer applications and to elect a disciplinary committee. This will be the only meeting at which transfers and regradings will be dealt with as these will require to be finalised before the Senior Board meets on the following week.

The format of the 1992 championships is unlikely

to be discussed as the County Board will not have met to discuss the recommendations of the special committee who are now believed to have finalised these recommendations. The Board secretary, Anthony Walsh, has advised clubs who intend applying for inter-divisional transfers to have their applications submitted in time for the Eastern Board meeting, which is due to take place on the previous evening.

Waterford Hurlers Beat Laois

Waterford 1-10 Laois 2-5

Waterford had a narrow but deserving win over Laois at Mountrath on Sunday last and it will be hailed, among other things, as a good start for new coach George Leahy, who formerly trained our opponents here.

Both sides used the challenge to try out players for the positions on the upcoming league teams and for this reason alone the trial was satisfactory.

We dominated at mid-field where Noel Crowley and Johnnie Brenner were dominant and apart

from one or two mistakes our defence was good. A misjudgment accounted for one of Laois's goals.

They won on an impressive final scoreline of 2-17 to 0-10.

On Sunday next they play Laois in a challenge, which is scheduled for Walsh Park, but may have to be transferred to another venue because of the condition of the pitch, which is being overused.

SPONSORSHIP

Although certain Sunday newspapers speculation on the sponsorship of the All-Ireland hurling and football championships, could have been very wide of the mark, there is a distinct possibility that sponsorship will be accepted within the four or five weeks from interested companies and that counties like ours will benefit substantially from participation. Unless a very substantial figure is agreed upon, it is most unlikely that Central Council will give the idea the green light.

A separate sponsorship of

our inter-county teams may also be negotiated provided that the particular sponsor is not in competition with the main national sponsor. Up to now very many generous firms and business people have given sponsorship to branches of our activities, notably at under-age grades in recent times. According to reliable information, very many counties have already obtained sponsorship for their teams playing in the provincial championships and the logo of these companies will earn badly needed cash for the counties concerned.

objection was based, Mr. White replied that these included that the area was residential with elderly

people mostly, including 5 widows, living there; that queuing outside the premises would not be in accordance with proper planning as the area was residential; that such a development would create traffic hazards for pedestrians and motorists using the street and that it would not be in keeping with the character and amenity of the street.

Cllr. Hallahan said that he also understood that the residents feared that there would be a devaluation of their houses if such a development was permitted.

DIPLOMATIC MANAGER

Cllr. T. Wright who welcomed the Manager's request for the Council's views which he described as unusual in these matters said that he thought the new development would be too small and this would still require people "signing on" to queue in the street outside. "That's no good and it is something we should want to get away

from", he said.

Cllrs. B. Kyne and P. Power both also thought that the proposed development would be too small and Cllr. Kyne thought the Manager was just being diplomatic in asking for the Council's views on the application.

Cllr. Kyne then said that before expressing any view he would like to see the plans for the place and the names of the objectors. "I would advise the members not to offer any views until we got all this information," he said.

Cllr. Dec Goode — I wonder is this just a small group of people who are objecting to having the Labour Exchange located in Friary Street as I see nothing wrong in that.

Finally it was agreed that a copy of the letter signed by the objectors together with an outline of the plans for the proposed development in Friary Street showing its size comparison with the existing premises be circulated to the members and that the matter be then again discussed at the next Council meeting.
