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Major Boost For South East Tourism

Tourism in the South East received a major boost last Monday as Minister for Tourism, Transport and Communications, Mr. Seamus Brennan, T.D., laid the foundation stone of Celtworld, a new visitor centre depicting the myth and lore of the Celt in Tramore. Celtworld will open in May 1992 and expects to attract 270,000 visitors in its first year.

Celtworld is a unique entertainment and educational attraction that brings alive the world of Celtic myth and legend. During construction over 100 people will be directly employed and, on comple-

tion, Celtworld will provide 28 long term jobs. The capital cost of the project is £4,057 million, financed by EC Structural Funds of £1.52 million with the balance being provided by the private sector. Private sector investors in

Celtworld are: Tramore Failte Ltd.; M. F. Kent & Co. Ltd. of Clonmel; Vectovision and Mr. and Mrs. Dermot Wade of London and formerly of Dungarvan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Wade, Murphy

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Waterford Foods MD Nominated As "Man of the Week"

The acquisition of Express Foods by Waterford Foods, formally announced last week, has been well received in business circles.

As the new acquisition is consolidated with existing business, Waterford's turnover will advance to more than £700 million, making it a very significant food processor in both Irish and European terms.



Stephen O'Connor, managing director of the Dungarvan based company, has been nominated as "Man of the Week" by the very influential magazine "Business and Finance." It says that the acquisition "has now catapulted Waterford into the number one slot of the quoted food companies."

Waterford Foods £24.3M. Rights Issue

Waterford Foods is to raise £24.3M. in a two-for-nine rights issue to help fund their £100m. takeover of Express Foods from Grand Metropolitan, the UK drinks and leisure multinational, it was announced on Monday.


At 74p per share the rights issue is being offered at a modest discount to the current share price which stood at 77p on Monday. (See P.10 inside).

WARNING FROM U.F.A.

Mr. Patrick Phelan (Ballymacarbry) National President of the United Farmers Association issued a warning during the past week, that a violent agrarian revolution will ensue if the current trend of pushing small farmers off their holdings is allowed to continue unchecked. He said that the U.F.A. will support any farmer who is threatened with eviction from his farm. The most important contribution that farmers can make to the future of rural Ireland is to retain their holdings intact for the coming generations. The President said the recent statement by the Irish Bishops that the ordinary people of rural Ireland should unite in order to hold on to their right to continue to live with dignity in their own places is warmly welcomed by the U.F.A. "Our Association was formed with this aim in mind," said Mr. Phelan who added that under the C.A.P. regime up to the present, 80% of money due to farmers has gone to the top 20%. He said that, in line with this "positive discrimination" against the weaker section of farming, a subtle campaign of brainwashing has also been carried on. Small farmers are consistently being told that their enterprise is too small for the big league and that

their sons won't be content to live on a smaller wage than their industrial counterparts.

The President said a "quiet revolution" was needed in rural Ireland to maintain the existing sparse population. Mr. Phelan added that small farmers, indeed all farmers, who are now in financial difficulties will have to give the deaf ear to the "status quo sell brigade" and will have to relearn the survival techniques, the first step of which is to realise that everybody has an equal right to live.

BOVINE TB ERADICATION SCHEME

Current interim testing arrangements

ERAD wishes to remind herdowners of the current arrangements for TB testing, whereby herdowners, whose herds have not been tested within the last 12 months, may apply to their local District Veterinary Office for permission to have their herds tested. Application forms (ER103) are also available from Livestock Marts.

Herdowners planning to dispose of stock following a herd test under these arrangements should give at least three weeks notice to their Veterinary Practitioner and to the District Veterinary Office.

Herdowners should note that permission for a private test will continue to be given if the herd has been tested within the previous 12 months - otherwise a full herd test will be necessary.

Private Development Causing Problems For Abbeyside AFC

Cllr. Tony Wright proposed a motion at the January monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council calling for some action to be taken to restore some privacy to Abbeyside Soccer Club following recent private development work adjoining their playing pitch at Abbeyside.

Cllr. Wright said that the new development was causing a lot of problems and hassle in retrieving balls which were kicked into the adjoining property and he felt the Council should start a process to try to have something done to solve these problems. He did not know where they could start and whether it should be the landowner, the developer that should be approached or whether something could be done under the Social Employment Scheme by the Council to erect something to stop the balls going into the adjoining property.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan said that it was the houses which had been built there that would suffer and not the soccer club as windows could be broken. It could then be a case of who would be held responsible for any damage. The Town Clerk, Mr. B.

White pointed out that it was the Bord Pleanala which had granted permission for the new development following an appeal.

Cllr. B. Kyne asked what the Council could usefully do in the circumstances and the Town Clerk pointed out that the field was leased under a Sports lease to the club by the Council and he pointed out that the club should have expressed their reservations when the development was initially proposed.

Mr. White went on to say that all he could suggest was that the Club officials sit down with the residents to discuss a possible solution or else consider a relocation. He felt that it was not his place to become personally involved in the problem.

Finally it was agreed, on the suggestion of Cllr. Kyne, that the Town Clerk

write to the Soccer Club and the developer that they should meet to discuss how the problem might be solved.

Judges Should Show Good Example In Parking Cars

Cllr. B. Kyne speaking at the January monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council referred to the illegal parking of cars at Bridge Street in the vicinity of the Courthouse on the days of court sittings in Dungarvan.

He said that cars owned by the judges and certain members of the legal profession attending these court sessions were allowed to park in prohibited areas in the street and no action was taken against the offenders. It looked as if these people thought they were above the laws that applied to all others in the town.

Cllr. Kyne then proposed

that the Town Clerk should write to the District Court Clerk and to the County Registrar pointing out that there was a free public car park just to the rear of the Courthouse and asking that the judges, members of the legal profession and court officials use it during court sittings. "It is very bad example for these people to be parking their cars in the street as they have been

doing," he said.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan in supporting the proposal agreed with the points made by Cllr. Kyne and said that it was not fair that this type of parking should be allowed.

The proposal was passed unanimously and the Town Clerk was accordingly directed to write to the District Court Clerk and the County Registrar.

Tourism — Growth Maintained In "Sunny South East"

The tourism industry in the 'Sunny South East' maintained growth in 1991 — in spite of the difficult international economic and political climate — and further expansion is forecast this year, according to South East Regional Tourism Manager, Joe Palmer.

In a summary of 1991 results, Mr. Palmer said close on 325,000 visitors called to Tourist Information Offices throughout the South East during the year, a marginal increase on the 1990 level. Bookings and bednights both showed a drop but were nevertheless substantially ahead of all previous figures.

Commenting on the results, Mr. Palmer said the Continental European market had become one of the great success stories of Irish tourism. Since 1987, it had grown in volume by 115%, more than doubling over the five years from 390,000 visitors to an expected outturn of 840,000 last year.

For the fourth year in succession, the pattern of

growth in the 'holidaymaker' segment of the British market had also shown growth — by as much as 40% in 1991. However, overall visitor numbers among business and Irish-related visitors from Britain were down last year, reflecting the recessionary climate in that market.

Overall results from North America in 1991 would show a decline of some 22%, largely due to the Gulf War and recession, but on the positive side, the strong growth in home holidays of recent times continued last year to the point where, in overall terms, the number of incoming holidaymakers to Ireland was now more than twice the

number of Irish people going abroad on holiday.

JOB CREATION

Looked at from the job-creation point of view, Mr. Palmer said the growth in tourism had been matched with significant successes on the employment front. Estimates put the number of new tourism-supported jobs created in the economy since 1987 at 17,500, or 37% of new employment during that period.

Calling on the industry for an increase in the level of marketing and promotion for the South East, Mr. Palmer said the 1992 target for growth of 15% could only be achieved with the full commitment and support of all the economic partners in the region.

£15m Investment In The Food Industry And 160 New Jobs

The Minister for Agriculture and Food, Dr. Michael Woods, last Wednesday announced details of 11 major investment projects to the Food Industry which have been recommended for grant aid under the E.C.'s Feoga scheme for the processing and marketing of agricultural products.

The selected projects involve total investment in the agri-food sector of £15m. Over £5.5m is being sought in grant-aid from the EC. The projects will also receive assistance from the State of over £1m.

The projects will lead to the creation of some 160 new jobs directly with further employment in ancillary services.

The Minister, made the announcement in Kilmeaden, when he visited the Waterford Foods (Co-op) plant there last Wednesday. Two of the projects selected are being carried out by subsidiaries of Waterford Co-op Society Ltd — Waterford

Foods (Ireland) Ltd., is to provide facilities for the production of fresh cheese dessert (fromage frais) at Inch, Gorey, Co. Wexford, Waterford Co-operative Dairy and Trading Society Ltd., will provide new facilities for the production of

industrial cheese as a food ingredient at Kilmeaden.

The Minister underlined the importance of this scheme in promoting the development of the food industry and, in particular, in furthering added value production within the industry.

Irish Lifeboats Save 90 Lives In 1991

Lifeboats of the Irish fleet of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution launched on 414 services and saves 90 lives during 1991. The modernisation of the RNLI fleet continues.

New lifeboats will be placed on station at Kilmore Quay, Clogherhead, Kilkeel and Newcastle towards the end of 1992.

Voluntary fundraisers continued to raise funds so necessary to run the lifeboat service. The total raised in 1991 was £681,191.

Mr. Clayton Love Jnr. was elected Deputy Chairman of the RNLI, the first Irishman to hold this position in the Institution's 167 year history.

The Committee of Management have recognised the valuable service of voluntary officials in the Annual Presentation of Awards.

The RNLI announced provisional figures for the number of services and lives saved by lifeboatmen and women in 1991 (last year's provisional figures in brackets):

Service Launches 414 (380)

Lives Saved 90 (96)

Mr. F. P. Mongey who is Deputy Launching Authority of Tramore Lifeboat Station has been awarded the Bar to the Gold Badge in recognition of his outstanding service to the RNLI over many years.

Gain Mares Championships Underway In Waterford

A very strong feature of the Southern Point-to-Point meetings over the past number of years has been the Gain Mare Championships. As this season gets underway, the meeting of Dungarvan Harriers, East Cork on Sunday, January 26, should provide some top quality racing.

To add to the enjoyment on the day, the WLR Outside Broadcast Unit will be present in Dungarvan.

Qualification to run in the final is achieved by any mare who is a maiden on January 1 and placed in any type of Point-to-Point race. In previous seasons a mare had to be placed in a Mares Maiden of any type and had to win any other type of

point-to-point race.

This very open approach to qualification should ensure fuller fields for the finals in Ballynoe, Co. Cork, early in April.

This year the Gain Mares Championship, sponsored by Waterford Foods plc. through the Gain range of animal feeds has been extended to Northern Ireland.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — Can you tell me if Disability Benefit or Maternity Allowance can be paid to a woman who is on the Lone Parent's Allowance?

Answer — In general, you cannot be paid two Social Welfare payments at the same time. However, there are some exceptions to this rule and it is possible for Disability Benefit, Unemployment Benefit, Maternity Allowance and Unemployability Supplement to be paid at half the normal rate to women who are receiving the Lone Parent's Allowance, Deserted Wife's Benefit/Allowance and Widow's Pension. If they are receiving a reduced rate of Lone Parent allowance, Deserted Wife's Allowance etc., then they can be paid more than half rate of the second payment to ensure that between the two payments they will receive the

maximum rate of Disability Benefit, Maternity Allowance etc.

As they are already being paid for their child dependents they will not be paid for them a second time.

In addition, they will be paid whatever Pay Related Benefit they may be entitled to.

The half-rate Disability Benefit, Unemployment Benefit, Maternity Allowance, will not be counted as means against the Lone parent Allowance/Deserted Wife's Allowance.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

LORD FITT STRONGLY CRITICISES LATE, LATE SHOW BLUNDER

Speaking of the "Morning Ireland" programme on R.T.E. radio on Tuesday morning former Belfast M.P. and now member of the British House of Lords, Lord Jerry Fitt mounted a scathing attack on all associated with the unfortunate blunder created when presenter Gay Byrne manoeuvred Northern Ireland Secretary Peter Brooke who was making a guest appearance on the Late Late Show last Friday night into singing a few fragmentary snatches of "Oh, My Darling Clementine."

The incident has caused a furore among Unionists and Protestants in the North and has placed Mr. Brooke in the position that he felt obliged to offer to resign from the position he has so ably graced for the past several years, an offer which his Prime Minister has refused to accept.

Lord Fitt spoke of the insensitivity displayed in the circumstances (seven Protestant workers had been blown to their deaths by an I.R.A. bomb earlier that evening) not only by Mr. Byrne and Mr. Brooke but also by the audience at the Late, Late Show.

R.T.E. has issued an apology for the incident but Mr. Byrne has expressed no regret. All we can say is that it is a great pity that the career of Mr. Brooke is now in jeopardy and the unfortunate incident which should never have been allowed to happen can do nothing but harm to the cause of peace and harmony not only in the North but in the whole Island of Ireland.

THE NIGHT OF THE BIG WIND

According to the "Dublin Evening Post" of January 8, 1839, "the annals of Ireland do not furnish anything in the remotest degree parallel to this hurricane — nor has there ever been a visitation in this country attended with more tremendous, extensive and calamitous consequences." The report referred to Oiche na Gaoithe Moire — the Night of the Big Wind — and it is quoted at the outset of the opening chapter of "The Big Wind," the story of the legendary Big Wind of 1939 written by Peter Carr and published by The White Row Press, Belfast.

The author describes what has so far been accepted as Ireland's greatest natural disaster as follows: "The night of Sunday, the sixth of January 1839 was a night of madness. On this night, the Twelfth Night, the night of the Epiphany, Ireland was hit by what was perhaps the most cataclysmic storm to strike the country in the last six hun-

dred years. It killed, maimed and ruined, threatening to sweep every obstacle before it from the centre of the earth."

An eerie calm throughout the day was innocently disturbed around 9 p.m. by a light westerly breeze but this grew in fury until after midnight it blew a most fearful and destructive storm. What followed was a nightmare for all who experienced it.

Because of the wind direction, it was the counties around and along the western seaboard which suffered most and consequently Waterford was one of the counties which got off with the least amount of damage.

Nevertheless the Waterford City paper, "The Mail," carried the following report that week: "On Sunday night last, we were visited with the most terrific storm we ever remember to have experienced. There was but little rain and no thunder or lightening — nothing indeed but the wind blowing tremendously and furiously and continuously from midnight till after five o'clock The scene which presented itself on Monday morning exceeds any we have ever witnessed in this locality . . . all presented an appearance of the utmost desolation."

The story of "The Big Wind" is a very good read and apart from the harrowing descriptions of the effects of the great storm it reflects on the social habits and the lifestyles of the people who lived in Ireland at that time.

After reading "The Big Wind" we were reminded of another "Oiche na Gaoithe Moire." This was a poem written in Irish by the late Tomas de Bhial o'n Sean-Phobal who was one of the most beloved teachers attached to Colaiste Na Rinne and in which he related how the French ship "Marechal de Noailles" was wrecked off Old Parish on that other night of a big wind in 1913 and how a brave Lifeboat crew coxed by Sean O Turraoin set out from Ring and Helvick to brave the raging seas in a

gallant rescue bid. With the help of the Coast Lifesaving Crew from Ardmore under the then local Parish Priest, Fr. O'Shea, twenty-four members of the crew of the ill-fated French vessel were saved.

WHAT DOES PRSI MEAN?

The photo about the huge warning notice erected by the Department of Social Welfare near Mallow which we published last week declaring that "Christmas is coming and for another 6,000 employers, so is the PRSI Inspector" with a postscript warning that "PRSI dodgers will be prosecuted and named," has prompted a far greater response than we expected.

All agreed that the emphasis where tax collections are concerned falls on the small man and the self employed while the "big fish" and those in the so-called golden circle get nothing like the same hassle.

One reader pointed out that at one time if an insured person or dependant needed hospital care it was available and they would get it. Now there's a charge of £12.50 per night even for those on a wage of £120 per week. She goes on to say that if you work you are insured for nothing. On the other hand if you are unemployed you will qualify for low rent, free hospital and medical care and other special allowances. In the circumstances she claims that it is no longer a privilege to work but an expense and these PRSI contributions are just another form of taxation.

CLOSURES AND RUMOURS OF CLOSURES

For the first time since World War II Dungarvan is presently feeling the full effects of the recession which has been rife throughout the country and in Britain for more than a year now.

On past occasions when other areas suffered from these economic downturns, Dungarvan always was lucky enough to escape without any ill-effects. Unfortunately not so, for the first time on this occasion.

We can never remember any time in the past when business in the town was so slack and money so scarce. A number of shops have closed and rumours are rife that further closures are on the way. The grapevine reports that one of the principal causes for these closures is the excessively high rents which are being charged and which were a

feature which was first introduced when Dungarvan was on the crest of a wave.

Short-time working and growing unemployment are other reasons cited for the downturn in the economy. The overall position spells out a rather depressing picture and calls for some steps to be taken to dispel this air of doom and gloom which has been hanging around since Christmas and even before that.

Perhaps the town's Cham-

ber of Commerce would initiate some move to revive the economy and help to restore the prosperity which the Old Boro' always enjoyed even when so many other areas were wilting under recessions of the past.

Combat Ageing With Collagen Replacement Therapy

New Book On The Night Of The Big Wind

On the night of January 6 1839 the legendary "Big Wind" struck Ireland. This freak storm occasioned the greatest natural disaster in modern Irish history.

A new, popular study of the Wind has just been published. It is the first book length treatment of the subject.

The Wind was a most extraordinary climatic and social event. Its impact was all the greater because it occurred completely without warning, and took place entirely at night, striking the country with unprecedented ferocity. Those who lived through it counted it to be the most terrifying experience of their lives.

The events of that awesome night read like something from the world of science fiction. Chimneys, roofs and even turf-stacks took flight. People had to creep on all fours to avoid being blown over, men and women standing beside one another had to resort to sign language in order to communicate, so great was the roar of the wind. In places a kind of "madness" is said to have prevailed, and along the western seaboard people thought that the end of the world was at hand.

But the extremities of the night itself were if anything exceeded by the strangeness of the world that greeted them at dawn on the following morning.

Dublin looked like "a sacked city" and Belfast appeared "as if it had been reduced by artillery". The whole island of Ireland was devastated, from Rathlin to Valencia, the countryside looked "as if it had been swept clean by a great broom."

Several hundred died, hundreds of thousands were left homeless, their houses flattened or uprooted, or burned in fire storms or carried off by floods, for both the Shannon and the Grand Canal burst their banks. Many farmers were ruined by the death of their livestock through falling outhouses, and the scattering of their fodder.

Fish were found in the hills, seaweed on mountainsides, and salt was tasted off trees and gateposts more than forty miles inland.

A SUPERNATURAL EVENT

The Wind also had a tremendous psychological impact. It shook people to

the core, and in some cases, challenged their whole way of looking at the world. Many saw the storm not as a natural, but as a supernatural event.

The fact that it took place on the 6th of January, the night of Epiphany, the celebrated "Twelfth Night", was also seen as immensely significant, and one of the storms's consequences was a revival of religion and a renewal of faith. Others were just as certain that it was the work of the fairies. The book looks at these competing explanations, and what they tell us about the Ireland of that time.

In addition it includes a fascinating A-Z of storm damage to the towns and (where possible) villages of Ireland, drawn from the newspapers of the time.

Bishop To Launch Book On Early Church

Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore will launch "Called to be Saints, Christian Living in First Century Rome," a new book by Fr. Michael Mullins.

The launch will take place on Monday, January 27 in St. John's College, Waterford.

Fr. Mullins lectures in Modern and Ecclesiastical History at St. John's. His book draws classical, historical, theological and Biblical learning together to show how the early Church took root in an alien environment.

"Called to be Saints" is a casebound volume, published by Veritas Publications. It retails at £19.95.

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AS winter grips the garden, get some grip yourself - repair paths and think about laying new ones.

It's a good time to warm yourself with such work, while there is little else for the organised gardener to do outside. At times like this you can also appreciate how a decent path avoids churning up the ground and helps keep mud from indoors.

One of the most common problems is the damage done to the grass if you use a washing line and this can be cured by a few round paving stones carefully, let into the lawn at intervals.

Attractive

Avoid laying them in a straight line. They make a much more attractive as well as practical feature if they curve or snake through the grass, but ensure they don't stand proud of the grass or you will seriously damage the mower.

Paving stones can also be useful in deep borders or you may prefer to lay gravel which is cheap, easy to lay and lends itself to imaginative designs around garden features.

But it does tend to allow weeds to break through and these can be difficult to eradicate unless you use a powerful herbicide.

A much 'greener' approach, even if it negates the normally easy laying of the material, is to dig out enough soil for a three-inch layer of coarse gravel to be packed down by roller to form a hard core which weeds cannot penetrate. This can be topped with one of several attractive finishing gravels available.

The gravel surface should not stand proud of the surrounding area or the material will begin to scatter as feet pass by.

MEND OR MAKE THAT PATH

Alternatively, use something to edge the path and contain the gravel, such as old bricks stood at an angle, split logs, fencing lathes or a proprietary edging material.

If the path is a main route and likely to bear the weight of wheelbarrows then you may be better off laying something more substantial than gravel, and making it at least two feet wide.

If you want it to meander then avoid paving slabs - they may be attractive and durable but they are hard to cut and shape. Concrete is cheap, durable and easy to lay but rather dull and easily marred by algae.

The best compromises are crazy paving or an attractive herringbone of brick blocks but, whichever you choose, you will need to dig out at least five inches below where the path material will sit.

Crazy Paving

This allows a well-packed three-inch layer of hard core to be set down before a two-inch layer of sand and cement. With crazy paving you then lay the large lumps first, fitting the smaller around them like a jig saw and seating the lot with mortar before a final brush with dry sand and cement to fill the gaps.

Check and make good any crumbling areas on existing paths and wash down algae covered areas with a tar oil solution.

Shelter For Young Boys Sleeping Rough In Dungarvan

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their January monthly meeting unanimously approved a proposal by the County Manager to provide a site at the Council's Industrial Site at Shandon to Cuan Garbhain Teo.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan who has been associated closely with the development of Cuan Garbhain said that the primary aim was to provide a shelter for young boys from the ages of 13 to 21 years in Dungarvan who were sleeping rough. He said that the group had been dealing with the problem in the town since 1967 and they had now got a capital grant from the Department for a building subject to the granting of planning permission.

Cllr. Hallahan went on to say that he had discussed the matter with the Manager who had promised every support and had now offered them this site for which the group was indeed very grateful. They now had

rough plans drawn for the proposed shelter and were ready to go ahead to do something for these young boys.

Cllr. Hallahan then told the Council that a survey carried out in the town in the period December 16 to

January 6 last revealed that a total of 17 persons, aged from 13 to 27 years, were found in difficulty in regard to insecure accommodation.

On the proposal of Cllr. B. Kyne seconded by Cllr. R. Walsh the Council unanimously agreed to approve

the granting of the site as proposed.

The Council also joined in unanimously congratulating Cllr. Hallahan and the members of the Cuan Garbhain group for the great work they were doing in this regard.

Call To Resurface Tallow Streets

At the January monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan, the Chairman Cllr. W. McDonnell asked that the main streets in Tallow be re-surfaced. "I would like that the streets in Tallow should be as good as those in Lismore and Cappoquin and I'd ask the County Engineer to give an assurance about that," he said.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer replied that any assurance he'd give could only be as good as the money which they received from the Department to carry out this work. However he promised that they would do as much as possible where this was concerned.

Waterford Foods Make Further Major Acquisitions

Waterford Foods plc. announced on Wednesday last January 15 that an agreement in principle has been reached with Grand Metropolitan plc. for Waterford to acquire the business and assets of the Express Group in the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland, except for the 80% interest in Carbery Milk Products Limited, which is to be acquired by Carbery Creameries Limited.

The principal businesses to be acquired by Waterford are:

— Virginia group, the supplier of cream for Baileys Original Irish Cream Liqueur. Virginia also man-

ufactures the Millac brand range of milk powders.

— Express's 50% interest in Waterford Express Dairies, the owner of Premier Tir Laighean. Premier is the principal supplier to the Dublin liquid milk market and sells an extensive range of associated dairy products under the Premier brand. Premier milk is sold to Virginia for the manufacture of Baileys Original Irish Cream.

— Express Foods Northern Ireland, which is based at Magheralin, near Lurgan, and manufactures cheddar, mozzarella cheese and whey protein concentrate, for sale in U.K. and Irish markets.

Waterford also announces that it proposes to exercise its option to acquire the 50% interest in Waterford Express Dairies owned by Waterford Co-operative Society Limited, thus taking 100% ownership of Waterford Express Dairies.

Waterford, advised by Chase Investment Bank, is pleased to announce these developments, which will underline Waterford's position as the major Irish processor of consumer dairy products. As part of the arrangements Virginia will

continue to supply the cream for the production of Grand Met's leading liqueur brand, Baileys Original Irish Cream.

WATERFORD LINK WITH GERMAN FOOD PROCESSOR

An important move towards maintaining its relationship with Britain's retail food industry was also announced last week by Waterford Foods.

Through its UK subsidiary, Waterford Foods International, the company will distribute branded and own label dairy products, acting for the large German dairy co-op Nordmilch. The products include yogurts, desserts, fromage frais and cottage cheese.

Waterford Foods International have been active in short life dairy products in England since 1983, developing both the fromage frais and drinking yogurt markets.

This new agreement is in line with Waterford Foods' objective to build a strong presence in the UK dairy industry. Other Waterford group companies in the UK include Healds (milk and juice) Waterford Corsham (cheese packing) and the recently acquired UCD in Manchester.

Leg of Lamb Pureed Garlic



Ingredients:

20 large young garlic cloves
¼ tablespoon rosemary leaves
½ tablespoon thyme leaves
salt and freshly ground pepper
1 trimmed leg of lamb, about 3½ (1.7 kg)
2 tablespoons peanut (groundnut) oil.

Method:

Preheat the oven to 475F/240°C/Gas 9.

Peel the outer layers of the garlic cloves, but leave the last layer so you have garlic cloves in jackets. Peel one of these cloves and cut it into six strips. In a bowl, combine the rosemary, thyme,

half a teaspoon fine salt and milled pepper. Roll the strips of garlic in this mixture.

Pierce the leg of lamb in six places with the point of a knife and slide the spiced garlic strip in each slit. Lightly oil the leg and season it with the rest of the seasoning mixture in the bowl.

Oil a big enamel plate or roasting pan, place a rack inside and put the lamb, flat side up, on the rack. Oil the garlic cloves in the jackets and slide them onto the plate, under the lamb.

Put the plate in the oven and cook for 25 minutes. Turn the leg, reduce the temperature to 475F (240C/GAS 9) and cook for 25 minutes. Watch the garlic cloves and turn them. Be sure that their juices do not burn; they must only caramelize. If the garlic begins to brown too much, add a few tablespoons of hot water from time to time.

After 50 minutes of cooking, a leg of this weight is



cooked rare. Turn it and let stand for 10 minutes in the turned-off oven.

At serving time, discard the cooking fat in the plate. Add two to three tablespoons of water to the plate if the juice is caramelized, then pour this sauce in a sauceboat. Add the mashed pulp of two of

the roasted garlic cloves.

Put the leg on a serving platter and surround it with garlic cloves in jackets: each guest will lightly mash the cloves to recover the pulp and eat it with the meat or spread it on slices of toasted bread.

Serves 6.

Here are 12 things you didn't know about Cunard's 67,000-ton black and red flagship:

SINCE her maiden voyage in May 1969, she has done almost two million miles in 604 voyages, more miles than the two previous Queens put together.

SHE can take on 1,850 passengers 1,000 crew. Her 20 lifeboats can hold 2,244 people and there are 56 life-rafts for a further 1,400.

THERE are 1,350 portholes and 577 windows. Three-quarters of the cabins have portholes out to sea and every cabin has a private toilet, bath or shower, direct-dial satellite telephone, bilingual speaking clocks. First class cabins also have TV, video, stereo system and a safe.

IN April 1984, the QE2 hit the Rock of Gibraltar when her engines failed to go astern and she crashed into the quay when berthing. Only slight damage was done.

IT costs around £250,000 for a penthouse on a world cruise.



Place, Abbeyside. Speaking at a Press Conference on Monday, Mr. Jim Hally, former County Engineer, and Chairman Celtworld and Tramore Faite, announced a capital investment of £7 million in Tramore's tourism product in 1992. In addition to the Celtworld project, a £2.3 million leisure complex incorporating a "waterworld" swimming pool will commence construction in March. It will be funded by EC Structural Funds of £1.4 million with the balance being provided by Waterford Co. Council, Tramore Faite and community investment.

"The philosophy of the Tramore plan is to reduce dependence on weather and seasonal tourism, to expand into the shoulder periods and to get year round use out of the facilities," said Mr. Hally. "I am confident that with the advent of Celtworld and the Leisure complex, Tramore can become the leading resort of the '90's. There will be significant job creation during the construction stage and in the day to day running of the various projects and the subsequent spin-offs to the local supply and service industries will benefit Tramore and the region as a whole," he predicted.

Must Raise £2,000 Before Next Friday

A 33-year-old Dungarvan fisherman has been given until Friday next to raise £2,000 part compensation for four stolen articulated trailers which were found by gardai being dismantled at a Swords, Co. Dublin farmyard.

Brian McGuinness, a father of three of Springmount, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty at Dublin Circuit Criminal Court to damaging the four trailers, worth a total of £12,500 on dates between January and March last year.

Judge Dominic Lynch was told by Detective Garda William Redmond, Swords, that he set up a surveillance after finding the trailers at the yard. The accused man came along with oxy-acetylene cutting equipment, which was used to break up trailers, leaving the axles for re-sale.

He admitted to defence solicitor, Mr. Declan Fahy, that McGuinness was not the prime mover in the operation and that a warrant was in existence for another man who was at the head of the operation.

Told by Mr. Fahy that McGuinness had owned his own trailer for a period and was owed money which he hoped to put forward by way of part compensation to the owners of the trailers, Judge Lynch

adjourned the case to Friday next.

Judge Lynch warned McGuinness that he considered the offences very serious ones and had been contemplating sending him to jail pending the production of some of the compensation.

day's fishing. According to Mr. Traill Withuhn, skipper and boat owner, from Struis Bay, divers spotted a marlyn at the "five myle bank" close to Agulhas on Friday.

"Mr. O'Donoghue and two friends rented my boat for the day to catch marlyn," Mr. Withuhn said.

Mr. O'Donoghue used a live Yellowtail which was doctored, as bait. "It took only 40 minutes to bring the marlyn to the boat with a soft 800m. long line with a 50 kg. breakage and a long steeltrace to it." Because of the size of the

fish they had to tie the marlyn to the side of the boat.

"No human can think what it feels like to have such a big marlyn on your hook," said Mr. O'Donoghue.
