Afforestation Causing Problems In Melleray And Nire Areas

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People who traditionally grazed sheep for generations past along the slopes of the Knockmeal-down Mountains now found themselves being pushed off to make room for tree planting in the drive initiated by the new forestry grants being made available.

This was stated by Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday when he proposed a motion calling on the Council to develop a policy on the use of upland areas in the County with a view to avoiding potential conflict of interest between different land uses such as afforestation, sheep rearing, tourism, amenity, water control and other individual developments in upland areas.

Cllr. Wilkinson speaking in support of his motion said that in the Melleray area families who had traditionally grazed sheep on the hills for generations were now being forced out to make room for a tree

Banks Should Provide Their Own Armed Security

— Co. Council Chairman

Speaking at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday, the Chairman, Cllr. Willie McDonnell referred to the fact that since the Council's last monthly meeting two serious Bank raids had taken place, one in Waterford City and the other in Lismore.

In regard to the Waterford raid, Cllr. McDonnell said that everyone knew about getting money from "the hole in the wall" at Banks but Waterford was the first occasion on which money

was got through a hole in the roof!

The Chairman then went on to criticise the commercial Banks for not providing adequate security to protect the public money

they handled as well as their staffs. "If this has to be armed security, so be it," he said.

Referring to the robbery in Lismore, Cllr. McDon-

Ideal Solution To Clonea-Ballinacourty Sewerage Problems

Arising from a discussion on possible public health difficulties which might arise from a proposal by Mr. Dan Casey to expand his Caravan Park at Clonea, Waterford Co. Council last year approved proposals submitted at the time by the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, to have a preliminary report prepared for a public sewerage scheme in the area.

As a result, M/s M. C. O'Sullivan and Co., Consulting Engineers, were appointed in June '91 to submit a report within 6 months on a brief which required them to consider the options available for sewage disposal in the Clonea and Ballinacourty areas and for the Friary College.

At the Council's monthly meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday, Mr. Hurley informed the members that this report had now been completed and it concluded that a single integrated scheme for the area was preferable to separate schemes for Clonea and Ballinacourty. It rejected on technical grounds pumping sewage from these areas to either the Ballinroad or Dungarvan Sewerage Schemes.

Mr. Hurley went on to state:

If the Clonea Beach area was dealt with in isolation from the Ballinacourty area the Consultant concludes that the treatment plant and outfall would be located

north of Clonea. In considering the entire Ballinacourty/Clonea area, however, the Consultant identifies the optimum location for the proposed

treatment plant to be in the south east of the area, and just north of the Magnesite Plant. This location is relatively remote from housing

County Safety Warden, Billy O'Sullivan delighted school children at the Presentation Convent, Lismore recently when he presented them with County Awards for their safety projects in the annual Church and General Children's Safety Awards.

Now in their eighth year, the Children's Safety Awards are one of the most popular and successful schools competitions in the country. This year in excess of 16,000 primary school children participated in the competition.

Open to third, fourth, fifth and sixth classes, the Awards are presented to individual children entering the 'Poster' or 'Safety Quiz' competitions, or to groups who enter the 'Project' competitions.

Explaining the basic objectives behind the Children's Safety Awards, Mr. Aidan Wims of Church and General said that the competition was designed

to encourage children to examine danger aspects in their homes, their community or their schools and to make recommendations on what steps could be taken to ensure a safer community for themselves, their families and their friends.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — Who decides whether I am entitled to a Medical Card and on what basis are they given?

Answer — Medical Cards are given to people who, in the opinion of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the Health Board are unable, without undue hardship, to afford medical services for themselves and their dependents.

The Health Boards in consultation with the Department of Health have laid down guidelines to assist the CEO in making her-his decision. These guidelines are not legally binding — they are for guidance only. In some cases Medical Cards can be given to people whose income is above the guidelines. This happens if the CEO is satisfied that the person has exceptionally high medical expenses.

The following are the guidelines in operation since 1st January, 1992:

Single Person (living alone)	£79.50	£86.50	£90.00
Single Person (living with family)	£69.50	£74.50	£77.50

Allowance for child under 16	£13.50	£13.50	£13.50
Allowance for other dependents	£15.00	£15.00	£15.00

FURTHER ALLOWANCES

Outgoings on house in excess of £13.50 per week, e.g. if you pay £30 per week rent, you will be allowed to deduct £16.50 per week in deciding whether you are eligible for a Medical Card.

Reasonable expenses in excess of £12.00 per week incurred in travelling to work may be taken into account. In general, no allowances are made for income tax or other expenses, other than those described here.

nell said that this had been the greatest raid ever to have taken place in the town in his memory and this again cried out for the Banks to provide more security for the public, for their staffs and for the members of the Garda Siochana who were doing a good job under very difficult circumstances.

The Chairman went on to say that he also took a grave view of the Banks for threatening to pass on to their customers the £2 million security levy imposed on them in the Budget. "Bank customers are already being caught for big Bank charges without having this passed on to them now," he said.

AFRAID TO LEAVE THEIR HOMES IN DUNGARVAN

Cllr. A. Flynn then referred to the big number of raids which had taken place on private houses in the Dungarvan area in recent weeks. He said that the position was now so bad that people were afraid to leave their houses unattended for fear that they would be broken into. "That," said Cllr. Flynn, "is a disgraceful situation and the Garda authorities should do everything possible to apprehend those responsible and have them brought before the court."

Both statements were fully supported by all the Council members.

YOUGHAL COURT

Suspended Prison Sentence For Assaulting Fishery Officer

The sole survivor of the Ballycotton drowning tragedy was the victim of a cowardly late night assault, Youghal District Court was told last Friday.

The court also heard that Southern Regional Fisheries Board Officer Michael Fanning jnr. had such taunts as "sh... floats", and "that bastards floated for four hours" directed at him after he had been head-butted in the face by a local fisherman.

Robert O'Sullivan, O'Brien's Terrace, Youghal, pleaded guilty to assaulting Fanning at North Main Street on July 2 last.

Supt. M. Murray said the assault was an unprovoked one by a man who had a number of previous convictions. The defendant has been bound to the peace on three previous occasions and is also presently bound to the peace.

The Supt. said the head-butting arose after a number of fishery officers left a chip shop and were confronted by local fishermen.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr., said O'Sullivan had involved himself in an argument involving the injured party and another person. What he did was wrong and he acknowledged that wrong.

Judge W. F. O'Connell said an assault on a fishery

officer is comparable to an assault on a garda. "Fishery officers have had a very difficult time in this district and their work is difficult and hazardous enough without being assaulted on the public street," he said.

However, after a very strong plea by Mr. Gordon, the Judge imposed a three month prison sentence on O'Sullivan but suspended it on his undertaking to pay £100 compensation to the fishery officer.

PRIVATE PROSECUTION

Arising from the same incident, Robert O'Sullivan brought a private prosecution against another officer of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board, Michael Faul.

O'Sullivan alleged that after he had head butted Michael Fanning, Fishery Officer Faul grabbed him, pinned him up against the wall, and then helped to drag him into a car before taking him to the garda station.

While O'Sullivan admitted to being "very drunk", he accused the fishery officers of looking for hassle

that night.

Another local fisherman, Anthony Hennessy, said he saw Inspector Faul grabbing O'Sullivan and pinning him against the wall as well as forcing his hands behind his back.

Michael Faul however said he only exercised a citizen's arrest with the help of a colleague after seeing O'Sullivan head-butting Michael Fanning in the face. He denied striking O'Sullivan at any time and insisted he had only used what force was necessary.

"Had we not taken the action we took, there would have been a free for all," he said.

With several more witnesses to be called on behalf of the fishery officer, Judge O'Connell decided to adjourn the further hearing of the prosecution until the next court with the consent of both sides.

Fears Loom Of More Problems At Crystal Plants

Fears of a strike by 24 maintenance fitters at the three Waterford Crystal factories loomed last week amid reports that the company is to implement the agreement of 1990 on revised pay and conditions on all employees including the fitters.

The workers involved in the latest dispute, members of National Engineering and Electrical Trade Union (NEETU) have written to management informing them "of a unanimous decision to enter into an official dispute with the company."

The dispute arises from management's insistence that the NEETU should sign the 1990 agreement on pay and conditions which was already agreed by the ATGWU, representing 90% of the work-force.

Following the 14-week strike in 1990 a comprehensive agreement was concluded with the ATGWU which would radically change the pre-strike situation, but despite Labour Court recommendations, the NEETU have failed to be party to the agreement.

A full Labour Court hearing determined that the general terms and conditions which were finally agreed between the parties, and which govern the employment of virtually all the company's workers, cannot be ignored.

"They must apply to the 24 fitters involved in this case," the recommendation stated.

When the union failed to comply management wrote to the union stating that the overwhelming majority of all employees "understood and

accepted the reality of the company's most serious and unprecedented difficulties.

"The company has no option but to give notice of implementation of the Labour Court proposals on February 17 in accordance with agreed procedures," the letter stated.

In a swift response the union has informed the company that it is entering into official dispute but it is not yet clear if this means strike action. Should strike action be taken and the NEETU place pickets at the three factories at Dungarvan, Kilbarry and Butlerstown, the other workers who have agreed to and accepted the Company's cost cutting plans might find it difficult to pass the pickets.

It looks likely that next Monday, February 17, will

be the crunch date when the Company plans to enforce the agreement.

SISTER M. CARMEL O'LEARY 1903 - 1992

Born in Cork (St. Finbarr's, South Parish) on July 17, 1903, Sr. Carmel O'Leary R.I.P. was one of a family of seven children, five boys and two girls. They were a family of which their saintly parents could be justly proud. Two of the boys became Christian Brothers and one a Capuchin, Fr. Valerian, who died in California just before Christmas.

Sr. Carmel entered the Presentation Convent, Lismore in 1932 and was professed in 1935. From 1935 until a couple of years before her death she spent herself generously at the task of teaching, using to the full her talents and gifts in the service of the young girls of Lismore. Her years of teaching were spent in the Secondary School where she taught Religion, French, Music and Commerce with great success. Indeed she was capable of teaching many subjects. She prepared both girls and boys for singing at the Entrance Exams for the Training Colleges.

Sr. Carmel was a very cultured lady and a born actress. This latter gift was used to the full as she prepared pupils for concerts, competitions (especially Scor) and entertainments.

For many years she was spiritual directress of the Sodality of Our Lady, and even when the Sodality ceased to exist she kept in touch by letter and otherwise with the members. Her interest in the Pioneers was known to many people in Waterford and elsewhere and she was always overjoyed when someone came to her looking for a pioneer pin.

In the Summer of 1971 she went on Peregri- natio to the Isle of Islay. Commenting on that

experiment she said — "One never knows where the seed will fall and how many are helped by our prayers and tiny efforts for God and His Church."

Sr. Carmel has written two booklets which will forever keep her memory fresh, "A History of Lismore" and "Nano Nagle," which is a short history of the Presentation Sisters and of the Lismore Foundation. She kept the Convent Annals for many years and was precise about every detail of information.

Sr. Carmel's interest in her pupils was not limited to their school years. She was a wonderful correspondent and followed her students at home and abroad with interest and love. In fact she kept a record of all examination results of pupils from 1936 onwards. Her ready wit and sense of humour made her a much loved person in her community. In her latter years she suffered much from arthritis but her love of Holy Mass and her spiritual duties would not allow her take the necessary rest she needed.

Her saddest day was when she had to leave Lismore on August 30, 1991. In her new home at the Presentation Convent, Thurles, she endeared herself to all whose lives she touched.

Her motto was "to look on all things as you will at the moment of death. Time is short."

As she gave back her gentle soul to God on February 3, 1992, one could only say "now cracks a noble heart." "May hosts of Angels guard thee to thy rest".

WHY NOT CALL IN THE ARMY?

Waterford County Council Chairman Willie McDonnell speaking at the Council's monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday criticised the Commercial Banks for failing to provide adequate security to counter the activities of such bank robbers as those who raided the Banks in Waterford City and Lismore in recent weeks. He said that it was the responsibility of the Banks to safeguard not only the public money deposited with them but also the lives of customers and Bank staffs who may become involved in Bank raids as well as those of members of the Garda Siochana.

Cllr. McDonnell was reiterating a call made last week by Fine Gael T.D. Austin Deasy who said that practically all Bank robbers were getting away scot free and the main Banks would have to seriously consider engaging their own armed security.

These attacks by armed criminals are things which our unarmed Garda Force is ill-equipped to deal with. Those involved in the Bank raids are men who would not hesitate to shoot and kill if they had to and it is too much to expect an unarmed garda to either hold up or go in pursuit of a raiders' getaway car following one of these Bank raids.

Rather would it be more appropriate that Army personnel be called in to search, find and apprehend those who carry out these Bank raids whenever and wherever they occur. Members of the armed forces are fully trained and fit to take on these duties and in the case of the recent Lismore raids, army personnel could have been on call from either Clonmel or Fermoy and could possibly have gone into immediate action.

After all, our Naval and Airforce personnel are used in dealing with illegal fisheries so why not use our Army personnel to counter the activities of armed criminals who are now targetting Banks throughout the country at an alarmingly increasing rate?

AN UPSURGE OF CRIME IN DUNGARVAN

It was revealed on Monday last that a shock upsurge of crime on a national basis will confront the new government when it takes office this week. The revelation is contained in confidential Garda statistics which show a rise of almost 8 per cent in offences committed during

the past year.

This recorded upsurge of crime at national level has also been reflected in the Dungarvan area where in recent weeks there has been a spate of house-breakings, burglaries and larcenies. The situation has become so bad that a local member of the County Council, Cllr. Austin Flynn, felt forced to raise it at the Council's monthly meeting last Monday when he stated that so many raids had been made on private houses that people in the town and district were now afraid to leave their homes unattended for fear of them being broken into.

We have been told that some of these house-breakers, as part of their modus operandi, use bogus 'phone calls to get people away from their houses, such as the parents who received a call purporting to come from Ardkreen Regional Hospital to say their son had been involved in a traffic accident. So people would be well advised to treat all phone calls with caution for the time being.

Whether these criminal acts are the work of locals or outsiders or involve individuals or gangs we do not know. We do know, however, that in a number of cases they have shown themselves to be rather selective as they appear to concentrate on antique furniture, brass and jewellery while videos have also disappeared. They also seem to be well organised with transport and the other implements used to pursue their nefarious deeds, while in at least two of the most recent cases which we have become aware of, they didn't even leave a finger-print behind which would indicate they are no amateurs. Ironically these two break-ins occurred in a Community Alert Area in Abbeyside which shows that these thieves are prepared to strike anywhere.

Without doubt it is true to say that people in the Dungarvan district are at pre-

sent afraid to leave their homes unattended lest they be broken into as apart from what the robbers steal they have also caused a great amount of material damage in many houses, breaking in strong doors and knocking down timber barriers.

As Cllr. Austin Flynn remarked at last Monday's County Council meeting it is a disgraceful situation as far as the people of Dungarvan are concerned and something which must be stopped without further delay.

WHAT IT MEANS TO BE IN — OR OUT

As this column is being compiled on Tuesday morning, no definite word has come through as to whom the new Taoiseach, Mr. Albert Reynolds will nominate to his Cabinet to be members of the new Government. That will all become clear later in the day but for those who will be named there will be more than the prestige of Cabinet position.

Promotion to or demotion from the Cabinet table can cost an individual T.D. as much as £30,000. A T.D.'s salary, euphemistically referred to as an "allowance" is £28,894 but this does not include the other expenses, such as travelling and secretarial, which T.D.'s are entitled to claim.

On his official appointment as Taoiseach, Mr. Reynolds will qualify for a pay packet of £75,000 and he can once again replace his sleek new Jaguar for a chauffeur-driven State car such as he enjoyed until he was sacked from his post as Finance Minister following his unsuccessful head-to-head clash with Mr. Haughey for the leadership of the Fianna Fail party a few months ago.

For the retiring Taoiseach there will be no money problems either. Already a man of immense wealth and a recognised millionaire, Mr. Haughey will find his income dropped from its present £75,000 by approximately £25,000. He will still have the ordinary salary of a T.D. as long as he continues as a member of the Dail plus a pension of about £21,000. He will also retain his State car and probably continue to have a Garda security presence on the grounds of his Kinsealy mansion.

Mr. Haughey's future plans are not at present known but while he is ex-

pected to retain his Dail seat in the short-term it is anticipated that he will not remain on the back benches very long and that in the meantime his son, Senator Sean Haughey, will be strengthening his claim to succeed his father as T.D. in the north Co. Dublin constituency.

For those who will be elevated to Ministerial rank this week the rise in their salaries will be as much as £30,000 while they will also be able to enjoy the prestige of touring around in a chauffeur-driven State car which will, without doubt, provide them with a major uplift in their political careers.

ARE THEY JUMPING THE GUN?

A Press Release handed into the "Leader" Office from the Oifigeach Poblaoichta of Comhairle Dail Ceanntair Phortlairge, Fianna Fail, Mr. P. J. Kenneally, P.C. on Monday informed us that the Waterford Fianna Fail Organisation will host a major function in Dungarvan on Friday night February 21 "to celebrate with Jackie Fahey T.D. 41 years on Waterford Co. Council and 27 years as a Dail Deputy."

The Press statement adds: "It is envisaged that five Ministers, several T.D.'s, Senators and M.E.P.'s will attend" and goes on: "This will be the largest gathering of members and friends of Fianna Fail to grace any function in the constituency for many years and is seen as the first gathering of party forces under the new Taoiseach. Albert Reynolds, Feb. 21 will mark the beginning of a new era for Fianna Fail in the Waterford Constituency."

While we join in congratulating Deputy Fahey on his great record of public service we were just wondering whether the Press Release was rather jumping the gun in claiming that five Ministers will attend at a time when no one as yet positively knew who the new Ministers of Mr. Reynolds' government would be!

TALLOW NOTES

WILLIAM (BILL) HENLEY, BRIDGE HOUSE, TALLOW R.I.P.
The recent death of Bill Henley, has removed from us one of the most colourful figures in the realms of sport for many years. In his youth he was engaged in the transport business in his native town with his late brothers Peter and Jack and with their own lorries they gave a great and committed service to the public over a wide area in West Waterford and East Cork. Their chief work then was conveying milk to the local creameries and as well bringing goods from the boats berthed in Cork Quay for distribution to shopkeepers and merchants in the area.

Bill's first introduction to sport was in hurling with the then up and coming senior hurling Tallow team in the early 1930's, and his sterling defensive play proved a great asset to his team mates. A hurler with courage as well as skill in the mould of Limerick's Paddy Clohessy, of whom it was said "he would put his head where another wouldn't put a hurley" he often won the plaudits of the spectators for his spectacular displays against famous rivals Erin's Own in hectic county finals in Waterford. A long puck specialist too, he won trophies in the event, especially when representing his native county in Croke Park, and one of his highlights was the winning of an All-Ireland junior hurling medal with Waterford in jubilee year 1934.

His abiding love of horses brought him much success; he owned "Conn Hurley" a winner of a couple of Point-to-Point races, and others that he put through his hands and had several wins to their credit across the water where "Henegain" in flat racing and in national hunt events "Canasta Lad", "Chesapeake Bay" and "Faunder Sidan Travel", bought by Geoff Gifford for George Sloane, who brought off a great triumph with him when he won the British Amateur Championship. Bill's entrepreneurial ambitions were further enhanced in his acquisition of premises at Tallow Bridge and becoming the founder of The Bridge Stud and later a similar enterprise at Marl Hill, New Inn, Co. Tipperary. Some famous sires stood at these places particularly at the Bridge Stud which had, Archive (father of the famous Arkle), Beau Chapeau, Straight Lad, Sir Unique, Whitsuntide, Anthony, etc. Incidentally those two studs are flourishing still.

Greyhounds too claimed both Bill's and son Peadar's attention and they tracked many of the longtails at Cork, Waterford, Youghal and Clonmel tracks, and anecdotes abound, relating to Bill's sporting endeavours — just two years ago he left Galway Race Course by car at 5.30 p.m. to sail into Youghal Track for a 7.30 p.m. race. He gained many honours during his lifetime, but despite all those acco-

lades showered on him, he remained a very humane and unassuming man and was charitable in many unseen ways, and although he rests now behind the Immaculate Conception Church, where he was laid in the family burial plot after Requiem Mass celebrated by Fr. Walsh, P.P. and assisted by Fr. Clancy, we will find it very difficult to ever forget Bill, this great son of Tallow. I bParrathas na nGrast go raibh se.

He was predeceased by his wife Maureen 13 years ago and our sympathy is extended to his sons Peadar, Liam, Noel, Bertie and James, daughters Eileen, Ann, Patty, Breeda, Clare, Jo, brother Neilus, sisters Maggie, Tess (Australia), grandchildren, great-grandchildren, brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, sons-in-law, daughters-in-law, relatives and friends.

Now's the time to plan a rockery

GARDEN project of the month is the creation of a rockery.

It's different when most February gardening tasks are rather routine and the physical exercise will keep you warm even if it's chilly outside - and you will end up with a nice feature for the garden.

It is a great way to use a small amount of space to break up a featureless garden and can also become an eye-catching border to your property - we've all admired houses with rockery cum front walls, awash with cascading aubrietia.

It is actually a sloping well-drained site that you want and preferably one facing as near to south as possible, but in the process of avoiding low and soggy ground don't pick an area exposed to prevailing winds.

Shade is also a problem as rockery plants tend to be natives of open, sunny and well-drained mountain sites.



Once the site is selected, you then need to ration your rocks. Alpines love to hug the ground and crevices, so they will be best packed into openings between a tightly-knit rock display.

If you aim to display conifers or showy flowering types then you need the opposite rock array - a more open pattern, perhaps on a larger site too, so that the greater size of the plants is better balanced.

Once this is decided then use pegs and lines to mark

out the plot before digging out to a depth of about six inches and refilling with this mixture:

1 part grit and gravel - to help drainage

3 parts rich garden soil, free of weeds and blended with well-rotted compost.

Any poorly drained areas should be dug to a greater depth and drainage improved by adding a layer of hard core before refilling.

Then comes the hard part, the design. Look at the way others have done it both in private and public gardens and be bold in the choice and creation of craggy features using bigger rocks.

When arranging the rocks in a terrace style, either for feature purposes or as a boundary wall, always angle the rocks backward so that they ease water run off and are more stable. Firm them in well.

When planting disturb the soil and rocks as little as possible. Then top all exposed soil with an inch of grit or light gravel to give an authentic 'mountain' look to the landscape as well as mulch to keep weeds at bay.

Failing that, shredded bark makes a pleasing alternative, but either should be carefully replaced or renewed when planting or working on the rockery to ensure that weeds do not get a grip - they can be more of a nuisance in a rockery.

But moss is one welcome 'outsider' so paint new-looking rocks with fertiliser or milk to encourage a weathered and established look.

Providing you weed promptly and hose or water with a fine spray in summer, your rockery should then be a lot easier to manage than the digging and shifting that went into it.

All parents are welcome to attend the seminar and there will be no admission fee.


Different, but simple

THIS delicious recipe for Poussin with Stilton and Port is very simple to cook. You can even prepare the dish in advance and store it overnight in the fridge. This will allow the flavour of the stilton to mingle with the poussin.

POUSSIN WITH STILTON & PORT

Ingredients:

2 poussin
50g (2oz) blue stilton
40g (1½ oz) low fat soft cheese
25g (1oz) butter
salt and freshly ground black pepper
75g (3oz) button mushrooms, trimmed
4fl oz chicken stock
1 tbsp redcurrant jelly
1 tsp ruby port
1 tsp cornflour
croustion of bread, to garnish



Method:

Put the stilton cheese in a bowl with the soft cheese and mash together. Carefully separate the skin from the breast meat of the poussin and push the cheese mixture between the flesh and the skin trying to spread it evenly on each. Secure the small flap of skin with a wooden cocktail stick. Heat the oven to

200°C/400°F/gas mark 6. Place the poussin in an ovenproof dish, melt half of the butter and brush over the birds. Cook for 40 minutes basting the poussin twice during cooking.

Meanwhile, heat the rest of the butter in a saucepan, add the mushrooms and cook for 3-4 minutes, pour in the chicken stock and simmer until the mushrooms are ten-



der, remove with a slotted spoon and set aside. Pour the port over the poussin and continue to cook for a further 10-15 minutes until golden and cooked.

To finish the sauce, stir the redcurrant jelly into the chicken stock, strain in the port juices from the poussin and bring to simmer for 2-3 minutes. Blend the cornflour with a tablespoon of water, stir into the sauce with mushrooms and heat until the sauce thickens and the mushrooms are hot.

Lift the poussin onto hot serving plates arrange the mushrooms around and pour over the sauce. Garnish with croustions.



Possible replacements for McCarthy get their chance against Denmark. Pat Scully (Southend) and Scott Fitzgerald (Wimbledon) seem the likely centre back pairing now that Liam Daish (Cambridge) has been moved to the senior panel for the Welsh game.

The 'B' international could see the welcome return of Mark Kelly (Portsmouth) who has been out of football for a year due to injury. Let's hope that Kelly hailed as a great prospect when he made his international debut against Yugoslavia in April 88 makes the most of a rare second chance in international football.

TRACEY — WILL HE, WON'T HE?

Jack Charlton's biggest worry could well be Packie Bonner's demotion at Parkhead which was complicated by a hip injury on his recall to first team football in a friendly last week.

The question now is will Sheffield United's goalkeeper Simon Tracey declare for the Republic or not. It's no secret that Tracey who qualifies under the parentage rule has been approached — there has been conflicting reports on the outcome but a decision seems imminent, he would be a welcome addition to the Irish selection.

The games against Denmark and Wales can throw up new players to strengthen a now almost veteran Ireland panel that has 5 of its 18 players playing reserve football.

F.I.F.A. DIRECTIVE CAUSES PROBLEMS

The problems on the field fade into insignificance compared to those that face the Irish supporters and F.A.I. administrators alike.

Notwithstanding the logistic problems of travelling to Latvia, Lithuania and Albania — the F.I.F.A. directive on all seater stadia can cause serious complications.

There may be some hope that F.I.F.A. may relent because of the good behaviour of Irish fans in the past.

Despite this, discussions have taken place between the F.A.I. and the I.R.F.U. that could see the North East and South Terraces seated with a hoped for capacity of 30,000 for Lansdowne Road.

Windsor Park has greater problems with only seated accommodation for 12,000 fans. The reduction in numbers at Lansdowne and the cost of the temporary seating is a serious problem for the F.A.I. that has a knock on effect for the Irish supporter.

The problem of getting tickets will be increased by any reduction in capacity at Lansdowne Road and the cost of a block booking for 6 home games will also have to be considered. For the European Championships block booking cost £15 x 3 and £20 x 3 for the Upper and Lower Stands respectively. Allowing for a minimum increase of £5 the resultant block booking for the Upper Stand would be £120 and £150 for the Lower Stands, and it could well be more.

The next two weeks could see progress on the field for Ireland — off it for Simon Tracey and who he plays for — for the F.A.I. on the F.I.F.A. directive on seating. For the supporters the quest and the cost of tickets won't be so easy to resolve. — B.K.

NATIONAL HURLING LEAGUE RESUMES

Waterford Play Cork In Exciting Clash At Cork

Cork were the reigning All-Ireland champions when we lost out to them in a thrilling Munster semi-final clash at Thurles on the first Sunday in June last year and now our next meeting with the side who lost to Tipperary in a tremendously exciting provincial final several weeks later, is sure to arouse great interest for us and for them.

The possibilities which lay before us, had we won that game, were the subject of animated discussion and speculation for several weeks afterwards. This league clash at Pairc Ui Caoimh on next Sunday is sure to rekindle the speculation about our ability to beat our old rivals and a big crowd of our supporters will travel to see it being put to the test.

Our prospects of advancement in the current league will depend on the result here as to-date we have won and lost a game in this five team section of the competition. With a relatively under-strength team we lost to favourites Galway (0-17 to 0-14) at the favourite Galway venue in October, before defeating Wexford by 2-13 to 2-11 in a thriller at Fraher Field two weeks later.

A win here will boost our morale and our chances of making it to the knock-out stages when we play Dublin at Walsh Park on March 1, and Clare at Ennis on March 22.

Three weeks ago we were trounced by All-Ireland finalists, Kilkenny, in the AIB Tournament at Walsh Park and this very poor display left players with their heads down coming back into the dressing room, but new team coach, George Leahy was philosophical about the result, even though disappointed and told the players not to be dismayed. We all know from past experience a heavy defeat can sometimes prove a motivating factor and we can recall instances where a team badly beaten in a game can come out and play a "blinder" in their

next assignment. We will hope that this will happen here. Reports from the training camp confirm that the spirit among the players is splendid and with very good attendance records at the weekly training sessions, there is obvious commitment. The selectors feel that the players, realising the magnitude of the challenge facing them at Cork will rise to the occasion and beat the home team in this very important clash.

The Waterford team which was selected after training on Sunday afternoon shows no fewer than six changes in personnel from the side which played Cork in the Munster semi-final last June in Thurles. The replacements are Shane Ahearne, Ray Sheridan who takes over as goalkeeper from Pat Curran, Paul Prendergast, Michael

Hubbard, Pat Ryan and John Meaney. Only five of the players remain in the positions occupied by them in the Thurles match. Noel Crowley will not be available as he is getting married on Saturday, Jimmy Beresford is still not available, and Seamus Prendergast is injured.

The Cork team is not yet announced but this side will also show changes in personnel and there will be positional changes.

They played a challenge against Limerick at Charleville on Sunday and performed very promisingly with an experimental team which saw former full back Denis Mulcahy return to the side and play well enough to be included in the line-out against us on Sunday. Other Cork players sure to make their first fifteen will be Jim Cashman, Mark

this year. Their six points win over Limerick will help to restore confidence and having been almost caught by Waterford at Thurles last year our challenge will worry them enough to bring out their very best effort.

WESTERN BOARD MEETING

Mr. Jimmy O'Gorman, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Western Board and at which there was a full attendance of delegates.

REFEREEING

The extremely serious situation about the small number of referees who are presently serving the Board, was highlighted by County Referees Committee Chairman, Pat Moore, when he addressed the meeting on this matter. He said that the total number who were currently making themselves available was inadequate and unless something positive was done immediately the Board could find themselves in difficulties before the present season ends. Pat said it was time for all clubs to realise that the small number of referees who were presently serving the Boards, could not go on forever and as time goes by the situation will become more and more serious.

He appealed to every club delegate to take home the message and to have it discussed by their clubs. It was proposed to hold a referee's seminar on the week-end of March 6 and 7 and it was hoped and expected that the response would be far better than when the last such seminar was held. Pat said that clubs should notify the Board Secretary by March 1 of their interest and this would indicate how interested they were and how successful the seminar would be. The Board Chairman

also spoke on the subject and he also emphasised the seriousness of the matter and appealed for club support.

Jimmy O'Gorman hit out very strongly on the matter of abuse to referees from the sideline and the lack of co-operation from clubs when this was happening. He also said that the matter of paying referees was something that should be taken on board.

CHAMPIONSHIP STRUCTURES

This was discussed for quite some time at the meeting and many delegates spoke on the subject. It would appear from the mood of the delegates that the proposals involved too many games and concern was also expressed about having to switch from one code to another on alternative weeks. Many members favoured the idea of a scaling down of the proposals, but overall the impression was given that the proposals would not be supported at County Board level.

INSURANCE SCHEME

Munster Council delegate, Greg Fives introduced speakers from a Waterford firm of Insurance Brokers who outlined a personal accident scheme for players. This scheme was intended to supplement the accident scheme which was presently in operation and which was compulsory. A brochure

which detailed the benefits etc., was issued to all clubs afterwards and the representative of the firm undertook to come back to the Board, if required, after clubs had an opportunity to examine the document.

NEXT MEETING

Because the Board were required to await the outcome of the County Board deliberation on the proposed new championship structures, it was not possible to determine the format the divisional championships would take and therefore it would be necessary to hold a further meeting of the Western Board and this was fixed for this Thursday evening at Dungarvan.

The Secretary of the Board read a list of the proposed gradings and a few clubs said they were not satisfied in relation to the gradings of some of their underage teams. These may be re-examined before presentation to the resumed meeting on to-morrow night.

MATCH REGULATIONS

The rules relating to the presentation of our games in the league and championship and the need to abide by these instructions were recently communicated to the county selectors in both codes. In recent times several counties have been fined for various breaches of the regulations, such as jersey swapping, incursions

on the field of play, pucking around during the interval, not being numbered according to the match programme, etc.

The Chairman of the County Board appealed to the selectors to co-operate to the full in ensuring that these regulations would be complied with.

AFFILIATIONS

According to the document issued by the Board Secretary, Anthony Walsh, a total of 81 teams have entered for the various championships in the adult grades this year and there are 61 teams entered for the under-age championships in minor and under-21.

When the Board reconvenes to decide on the format of the divisional championships, there is a possibility that the intermediate football championship may revert to a league-style competition. Last year this championship was run on a knock-out system, with a losers group and the opinion has been expressed that this style of competition did not guarantee enough matches for the participating clubs. The point has also been made that last year this was one of our most competitive championships.

Proposed New Championship Structures Rejected

The County Board at their meeting on Monday night rejected by 34 votes to 8, the proposed new championship structures. This means that the senior football championship will be run exactly the same as last year.

The senior hurling will have two groups of 6 and 7 teams, the 7 team group to start before the other so that both groups finish together; quarter finals, semi-finals and finals.

The intermediate hurling will be run exactly as last year.

Full details next week.

POC FADA

A recent announcement that the organisers of this annual competition for long strikers intend to campaign for greater national interest in this competition, which is held annually over the Cooley mountains on Whit Week-End, should not be ignored by players here

who may be interested in participating. We do not seem to have shown a lot of interest since the competition was revived some years ago by a group who see this as an important and exciting aspect of G.A.A. activity. We did once hold the title when Shamrocks Billy Tobin won the trophy for Waterford.

I feel sure that if some club here took on the responsibility of organising a competition to select a competitor, that several clubs would want to co-operate.

John Moore On Duty

County referee John Moore will be the man in charge of the National Hurling League game between All-Ireland champions, Tipperary and their neighbours, Offaly at Birr on next Sunday.

Bord Na nOg Meeting

Jimmy McGrath, Chairman, presided at the first open Board meeting of the juvenile committee, which was held at Dungarvan last week.

Having congratulated John Kiely on his unanimous election to the post of County Board Chairman, he welcomed Tony Morrissey as a new member of the Juvenile Board. The chairman stated that he was beginning his full year in office and appealed to the delegates for their full support throughout the season.

planting drive. He was aware that one large Cap-poquin estate was planting 600 acres on the mountain and some local families who for generations grazed sheep there were now being pushed off. "I'm not an expert in these matters," said Cllr. Wilkinson, "but I feel that it is not right that these families can be pushed out to make room for grant-aided tree planting."

Cllr. Wilkinson also felt that this afforestation would affect tourism amenity in the area as drainage would be involved and on one area a mountain road had been swept away as a result. He wanted to make it clear that he was not against afforestation but he said the Co. Council should start to develop a policy in this regard and the Minister concerned should be made aware of what was happening. "We hear a lot about the decline in the rural population and I feel a start must now be made to stop this in this country," he added.

He concluded by calling for a report on the position by the Co. Manager.

Cllr. C. O Riain supporting the motion said that a similar situation was arising in the Nire area.

A LOT OF PROBLEM AREAS

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer said that afforestation caused a lot of problems where roads, bridges, river pollution and water supplies were concerned. It also affected archaeological sites and fisheries. Up to now the main problems arose because forestry development was exempt from planning permission but the Department had recently issued two discussion documents on the matter at issue.

Stating that a lot of problem areas were involved, Mr. O'Flynn suggested that the matter could be discussed in detail at the next Council meeting when the revised County Development Plan would be considered.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager said that a prepared statement on the matter would be got from the Council's Planning Officers and this could then also be discussed at next meeting.

and the bathing area, and has easy access to a suitable outfall to deep water for treated effluent.

"The Report proposes the provision of a secondary treatment plant which would be designed to cater for wide fluctuations in population between winter and the summer tourist season. This would be done by constructing the plant on a modular basis with only portion of same being needed during winter. Provision is included for future removal of nitrates and phosphates.

"The proposed Scheme will eliminate existing discharges from the Friary College and the Gold Coast and eliminate existing septic tanks serving the Caravan Parks, Clonea Strand Hotel, the present Public Toilets and individual houses. It will provide a modern sewerage system for the area and eliminate existing public health and water quality problems."

The Co. Manager said that the estimated total capital cost of the proposed scheme which would qualify for 100% State or EC grants was £1.78 million.

IMPORTANT STIMULUS FOR TOURISM

In conclusion, Mr. Hurley told the Council members:

"Having regard to the importance of Dungarvan Bay for angling, boating, aquaculture, bathing and other leisure and amenity activities, the proposed Scheme is necessary for the protection and improvement of water quality in the area. It will also provide an important stimulus to enhancement of the area for tourism and job creation, and will allow for the proper planning and development of the area. Clonea's status as a Blue Flag beach must be protected.

"I am satisfied that the Consultant's Report sets out the optimum strategy for sewerage the Clonea/Ballinacourty area, and recommend that it be adopted and forwarded to the Department of the Environment for approval."

Cllr. Tom Cunningham thanked the Co. Manager for his report and said that the Consultants' proposals looked an ideal solution for the whole Clonea and Ballinacourty area. He proposed the adoption of the report and that it be forwarded to the Department of the Environment.

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. Pat Coffey and passed unanimously.

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
