## DUNGARVAN U.D.C.

### £374,000 Allocated For 1992 Housing Programme

The Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith has informed Dungarvan Urban Council that he has allocated a sum of £374,000 to cover the Council's housing programme in 1992.

Of the total, £124,000 is to cover 4 new "starts" and £250,000 is for remedial works to the Council's houses at Cathal Brugha Place. The allocated amount is to be financed by £118,000 from the Council's housing capital receipts augmented by a grant of up to £256,000.

At the Council's monthly meeting held last Monday night, the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White informed the

members that the £124,000 would be used to finish the 4 houses at present being built by the Council with £10,000 going to refurbish a house for a person on the Council's Housing List and the £30,000 remaining would be used for 4 new "starts" which would then be completed under next year's allocation.

In regard to the £250,000 allocated for reconstructing the houses at Cathal

Brugha Place, Mr. White said that in accordance with instructions from the Department's Inspector dealing with this, new plans had to be prepared and it was hoped to have this documentation completed by next week to submit to the Department. As soon as this had been approved they would then advertise the contract.

## Chronic Accommodation Shortage At Dungarvan Technical College

The chronic shortage of student accommodation at Dungarvan Technical College was referred to at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan last Monday during a discussion on a proposal to the Department of Education for approval for a prefabricated building to house one of the Committee's Adult Education Courses in Dungarvan.

When the CEO, Mr. Donal O Ceilleachair told the Committee that accommodation in the college was already overtaxed and that the only way to house those attending the proposed course was in the prefabricated building to be placed on the grounds, Cllr. D. Goode asked "will we ever get out of our minds

## FIRE AT DUNGARVAN TANNERY STORE

Two units of Dungarvan Fire Brigade assisted by units from Cappoquin and Kilmacthomas fought a blaze in an old unused store, part of the Dungarvan Tannery factory at the Look-Out, Dungarvan, on last Thursday night.

The Dungarvan brigade was alerted at 7.23 p.m. and was at the scene within minutes. Fanned by the gale force winds at the time the fire looked rather menacing and additional help was summoned from the Cappoquin and Kilmacthomas units to ensure that

it would not spread to other areas of the extensive factory complex.

Sparks flew high into the air and there were fears for a while that the thatched roof of the Tierney home just across the water in Abbeyside might be in

danger. However the firemen with their usual efficiency got the fire under control in about an hour.

Gardai in Dungarvan are investigating the cause of the fire to ascertain whether there was any malicious intent involved.

# Dungarvan Tannery Convicted On Harbour Pollution Charges

At Dungarvan District Court last week International Hide and Skin Co., with an address at the Industrial Estate, Hebron Road, Kilkenny, pleaded guilty to four charges of being in breach of the conditions of a licence granted to it for the discharge of trade effluent into Dungarvan Harbour on four successive days, August 19-22.

Mr. Joe Curran Solr. prosecuting on behalf of Waterford County Council, said that on one of the occasions the company had very excessively exceeded the discharge limits laid down in the licence.

harmful to the quality of the water in the harbour and to the marine life, and could have been harmful also to human life if the fish had consumed the discharge in sufficient quantities," said Mr. Curran.

defendant company had been prosecuted on several previous occasions in the district court and once in the Circuit Court.

For the company, Mr. Michael Hogan, Solr., said there had been a tannery in Dungarvan since 1936 and the defendant company took it over in 1985. Since then they had made considerable efforts to try to comply with all the conditions attaching to their discharge licence. They had engaged a consultant and in the past 18 months had spent £50,000 on an effluent treatment plant.

"The only alternative may be for the company to close its Dungarvan tannery and move elsewhere," Mr. Hogan went on.

Judge W. F. O'Connell said it was serious pollution that was harmful to fish life and human life, and being told that the company may have to move elsewhere was a kind of blackmail of his court.

Mr. Hogan immediately interjected to say that was not so. If the company does move it will be by agreement with the County Council to try and resolve the matter.

"Moving elsewhere does not depend on what happens here today," said Mr. Hogan.

For the County Council, Mr. Curran said the local authority was not aware that the company was to move. "We have asked them where they are moving to but as yet they haven't told us," he said.

Convicting the company, Judge O'Connell imposed a fine of £100 on each of the four charges and also directed that £607 expenses and £200 costs be paid.

He went on to say that the

## Closure Of Ballyduff Public Library

At the March monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last week, the Chairman, Cllr. W. McDonnell referred to complaints he had received

about the closure of the public library in Ballyduff where membership totals 12 adults and 20 children.

The Chairman said that he understood that the book stock at the library had not been changed for a long time. "As the closure is a big loss I would like to see the library reopened and I hope that the Council will reconsider the matter in that light," he said.

Cllr. J. Quirke said he was also about to raise the same matter as there had always been a library in

Ballyduff Village and he asked the County Manager to have it re-opened.

Mr. D. Hurley, County Manager, said that he did not close the library but he pointed out that an industrial relations problem existed which affected the opening of branch libraries. He would be meeting the people concerned and he would discuss the matter with them. As regards the book stock he said that this had to be curtailed because of the cutbacks necessitated in the Council's estimates for the service in the current year.

# New Medical Wards Opened At Waterford Regional Hospital

Details as to the opening of new medical wards at Waterford Regional Hospital, Ardkeen, Waterford, as from to-day, Wednesday, March 18, and arrangements covering the admission of patients and traffic control at the hospital are contained in a press release issued by Mr. J. E. Creagh, Project Manager, South Eastern Health Board.

The following is the text of the press release:

We wish to inform the public that the Coronary Care Ward and the new Medical Ward is now complete and all the medical

and coronary care patients from St. Brigid's Unit will be transferring to the new hospital building on to-day, March 18. The new wards will be on Floor 3. The Cardiac/Respiratory Department will also be transferring to Floor 2 of the new building.

The Assessment and Day Unit for the Elderly will then open in the existing St. Bridget's Unit (see sign (S1) on accompanying diagram.

The present procedure for patients coming for admission is to come directly into St. Bridget's Unit. The

new procedure will be that all patients coming for admission to the Medical Ward will come in via the Accident and Emergency entrance (see sign (S2). They should produce their doctor's letter to the receptionist or nurse. They will then be directed to the appropriate wards and assistance given when required.

The visitors entrance to the Medical Unit will be via the temporary entrance (see sign (S3)

which is currently the entrance for visitors to the Paediatric and General Surgical Wards. With the transfer of the Medical Ward to the new hospital, car parking facilities adjacent to the temporary entrance and the Accident and Emergency Department

will be restricted. A traffic roundabout has been erected in this area to help control the traffic flow as it is most important that this area is left free for ambulances and other traffic entering the hospital with very ill patients. We would very much appreciate if the public would use the large parking area provided at the left side

of the main driveway and thus reduce the traffic congestion at the Accident and Emergency and temporary entrance to the hospital.

As a consequence of the phased development of the hospital it is necessary to implement these interim arrangements. These arrangements will apply until the opening of the main hospital entrance and notification of this will be given.

We regret any inconvenience that may be caused and we thank you for your co-operation in this matter.



## Dungarvan Burglaries — Gardai Question Juveniles

A Garda spokesman in Dungarvan has informed the "Leader" that arising from the spate of burglaries which has taken place in the town and district in the past few months, a gang of up to 10 juveniles whose ages range from 13 to 15 years were taken into custody and questioned last week-end about the robberies.

We understand that several of the juveniles admitted to their involvement in the crimes and also to others which have remained unsolved for some time. Among the former are burglaries at Dungarvan CBS where a computer and several hundred pounds in cash were stolen and break-ins at Garranbane and Glenbeg national schools.

Also under investigation are robberies from shop

premises in the town and a number of incidents involving malicious damage.

Investigating Gardai are now satisfied that the juveniles operated in small gangs, stealing cash, electrical and sports equipment and many other items in their rampage of crime which extended over a time span of several months and which created a situation in which many people, especially el-

derly people and women living alone, feared to leave their houses unoccupied.

The Gardai state that while their inquiries are still continuing, considerable progress into the solving of the crimes has been achieved and they expressed confidence that the juvenile crime ring which has been operating all over the area has now been smashed.

singing her favourite ballad "The Little Village School-room of Kilbrien."


Throughout a prolonged final illness she endured her suffering with courage and dignity. Her warmth and

## Housing Needs In County Are Beyond Crisis Point

A letter from the Department of the Environment informed members of Waterford County Council at their March monthly meeting in Dungarvan last week that a capital allocation of £420,000 had been made by the Minister to cover the Council's expenditure on their housing programme in 1992.

Commenting on the allocation, the County Manager, Mr. D. Hurley said that it represented a reduction of £32,000 on last year while to complete last year's housing start-ups would also require approximately £200,000 of the amount now allocated. This left £220,000 which would only be sufficient to cover the building of 12 houses and what he had in mind was the building of nine 3-bedroom and three 2-bedroom houses.

Cllr. Oliver Coffey said that the Council had gone back an awful long way since the mid-80's when they were building on average 50 houses annually compared to 12 which they could only build this year.

"Going back to the early 80's when things were bad," said Cllr. Coffey, "we

had mobile houses on every acre in the county but if things are to go on as at present we will have black spots all over the county again in the 90's."

Cllr. J. Quirke spoke of the great need for houses in Lismore where no houses had been built for a long time. He expressed the hope that some of the 12 to be built this year would go there.

Mr. Hurley said that Lismore was not on the immediate list but he assured Cllr. Quirke that if a further allocation was received from the Department they could then look at the Lismore situation again.

### SHAMEFUL NEGLECT

Cllr. B. Kyne at this point said that with over 300 people waiting for houses, the situation in the county had

gone beyond crisis point. The cost of mortgages for private building was beyond the ordinary people to pay and he said that the neglect of the housing crisis by Fianna Fail in the county was shameful. He then went on to suggest that the Fianna Fail party representatives should increase their lobby to secure more money so that the Council could tackle what has now become an unprecedented crisis in the county.

Cllr. B. O'Shea, T.D., said that the Council's present housing allocation was totally unacceptable and he warned that things were going to get worse and worse unless something was done. "Any Government that turns its back on people in the matter of providing housing shelter will pay for it later on when the time comes," he said.

# PENSMAN Takes You . . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

## WHERE OUR MINISTERS WERE ON ST. PATRICK'S DAY

Our Government Ministers travelled far and wide to attend St. Patrick's Day parades and ceremonies in many parts of the world but, as was to be expected because of the great numbers of Irish and the descendants of Irish emigrants, the major cities of the U.S. were the principal centres visited. However the other great base of the emigrant Irish, London, was also well catered for with visits by two Ministers.

Minister for Foreign Affairs David Andrews was in Washington while Minister for the Marine Michael Woods attended the ceremonies in St. Louis. In Florida, Minister for Energy Bobby Molloy was honoured as International Grand Marshall for the Fort Lauderdale Parade which was held on Sunday, March 15 and he was also Guest of Honour at the Parade in Miami on St. Patrick's Day.

Across in London, new Minister for Labour Brian Cowen was Guest of Honour at the Irish Club's Patrick's Day Dinner which took place on Saturday night while over the wide Atlantic again Minister for the Environment, Michael Smith attended a number of St. Patrick's Day functions in New York.

Minister for Education Seamus Brennan attended the functions held in Chicago while down in the South in Atlanta, Georgia, Finance Minister, Bertie Ahern did the honours when he attended a number of ceremonies held to mark the occasion there.

Back to London again where Minister of State at the Department of Foreign Affairs, Brendan Daly was the second Government representative for the ceremonies in England's capital city where he attended Mass at Westminster Cathedral and the subsequent parade on St. Patrick's Day.

Mrs. Maire Geoghegan-Quinn, Minister for Tourism, Transport and Communications was Ireland's representative at the St. Patrick's Day functions in Boston while Tanaiste and Minister for Defence and the Gaeltacht John Wilson was in the Middle East on an Official Visit to Irish Troops serving with the United Nations Peace-Keeping Forces.

So it can be seen that most of our Government were on high-flying missions to celebrate the feast of the National Apostle in many parts of the world.

### NO BIG DEAL BY TELECOM

The song and dance staged by Telecom Eireann recently in trying to put across that they were doing all their telephone customers a good turn in reducing the cost of phone charges was found to be somewhat out of tune a couple of weeks ago.

In Dublin to attend a con-

ference of CII, Sir Leon Brittan, European Commission Vice-President slammed the monopoly enjoyed by Telecom resulting in very costly telephone charges, especially in the international sphere.

Pointing out that he was surprised to learn that a 'phone call from Bonn to Dublin cost just one-third of a call in the opposite direction, Sir Leon said that Ireland and Spain were guilty of having the costliest international calls in the EC. He went on to call for a break up of telecommunications monopolies right across Europe to enable cheaper charges to be introduced.

Sir Leon added that it was clearly in the interest of Ireland that the monopoly enjoyed by Telecom Eireann was broken as such monopolies tended to result in excessive charges.

We need hardly point out that Telecom Eireann is the next State Company to be privatised and there could be some truth in the accusation levelled by a Union leader that the price structure is aimed at keeping Telecom profits high to make it attractive for privatisation.

### UNEMPLOYMENT — A WIDESPREAD PHENOMENON

Further to our reference in last week's column about the frightening rise to 278,400 in the number of people now out of work in Ireland, we were reminded that the crisis is not peculiar to Ireland when we read a paragraph in the current issue of Eurofocus, the newsletter supplied to journalists by the European Commission.

Briefly this stated that there were 13 million unemployed in the E.C. at the end of last year. It then goes on to point out that according to Eurostat, the E.C.'s statistical office, the level of unemployment in the 12-nation European Community at the end of December, 1991 was unchanged at 9.2% of the workforce as compared to the previous month.

During the year 1991, the number of unemployed in the E.C. rose by 880,000. Unemployment in member States showed the rise in Ireland and Luxembourg at 10% to be the highest while in Belgium, Italy, France and

Denmark the numbers out of work rose by from 6% to 9%. However, the numbers fell by 7% in the Netherlands, 10% in Germany (West) and 14% in Portugal.

While unemployment is now a widespread phenomenon, the fact that 23% of the workforce in Ireland is now jobless cannot be seen other than as a major crisis.

### FANCY FEES IN A POOR COUNTRY

The Department of Industry and Commerce confirmed last week that the cost of the report prepared by Greencore Inspector Maurice Curran, managing partner of Mason, Hayes and Curran, Solicitors and commissioned by Minister for Industry and Commerce,

Des O'Malley, came to £160,000.

This was the initial report on the Greencore controversy and it was subsequently followed by another report, this time prepared by inspectors Aidan Barry and Ciaran Foley who were appointed to inquire into the transactions of Greencore by the High Court.

Both reports came forward with different conclusions on a number of the outstanding issues but this was not the only aspect in which the two reports differed. While the Curran report cost "only" £160,000, the Barry-Foley report threw up bills totalling £1.1 million based mainly on daily fees of £1,750 for each of the two appointed inspectors. Yes, the inspectors each charged a fee of £1,750 per

day for the period they were engaged in the inquiry.

While a whole lot of noise was not made about the cost of the Curran effort, the £1 million plus cost of the other has since been the subject of much heated debate. As matters stand the fees charged for both inquiries are payable by the State and politicians have now started to express serious concern at the level of the fees. The Chairman of the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party, Deputy Jim Tunney has gone on record as saying that it was very hard to justify a charge of £1,750-a-day to Inspectors Barry and Foley for their five month investigation.

Ireland is a poor country — we are listed among the four poorest in the Euro-

pean Community — but how can this fact be reconciled with this £1,750-a-day fee which the citizens of this poor country are expected to fork out to pay for an inspection into the scandalous activities which has won Greencore (formerly the Irish Sugar Co.) headlines in the press around the world — headlines which have done nothing for the honesty and integrity of Irish business standards abroad.

The Greencore scandal was not created by the people but by some of those involved in the running of the Company. It is those who have been responsible for the entire sorry mess who should be made pay the costs of cleaning it up and not the Joe Soaps who are citizens of one of Europe's four poorest countries.

## Remembering The Historic Ambush At Crossbarry

On Thursday of this week, March 19, the 91st anniversary occurs of the historic ambush at Crossbarry in West Cork when 104 officers and men of the West Cork Brigade Flying Column under Comdt. General Tom Barry attacked and smashed the encircling British Force composed of 1200 men of the Essex and Hampshire Regiment and Black and Tans on Saturday, March 19, 1921.

One of the last surviving members of Barry's Flying Column who took part in the ambush was the late Mick Deasy of Abbeyside, former Garda Sergeant in Dungarvan and father of Deputy Austin Deasy, Fine Gael Front Bench Spokesman on Agriculture.

The historic ambush is recalled vividly in the ballad "The Men Of Barry's Column" which should prove a most appropriate choice for our ballad corner this week.

When British Terror failed to win  
Allegiance from our people then  
The Black and Tans they were brought in,  
They thought they'd teach us manners;  
Instead of teaching they they were taught  
A lesson which they dearly bought,  
For when Kilmichael's day was fought,  
Low was their bloody banner.


They sought to wipe the column out  
From East to West, from North to South,  
Till at Crossbarry's bloody rout,  
They woke from their day dreaming.  
Though ten to one they were that day,  
Our boys were victors in the fray,  
And over the hills we marched away  
With bagpipes merrily screaming.

The Essex brutes who tortured Hales,  
They scoured the land to fill the jails,  
Though their ugly deeds would pale  
The cheeks of Irish mothers.  
Paid dearly for their deeds were they  
When passing by Toureen one day,

When Barry saw the Tans efface  
The spirit of his fighting race,  
Right through his soul did madly chase,

## 1957 EAST CORK JUNIOR 'A' HURLING FINAL

St. Catherine's and Killeagh contested the above final on the traditional last Sunday of August in the year '57. Jack Hogan and his men, after coming through a tough campaign in the Division overcoming Sarsfield's, who had many potential senior players in

the squad then, and the penultimate round being confronted by a fast and stylish bunch from the 'Holy Ground', came face to face with the might of Killeagh, spearheaded by "Patchum" Neill, at Clonmult Memorial Park, Middleton. They marched round the field to the strains of the Middleton Holy Rosary Band and Paddy Crotty of the Magpies Club who had charge of the whistle set them in motion.

The tension of a final is always something different. Close marking excluded much of the spectacular play produced by these teams in earlier games and the contest developed into a dour struggle with both sides determined to wrest the title for their respective parish. Scores were hard to come by and spectators were kept on tenterhooks for the most of the hour. Their hard passage to the final stood to Catherine's in the final analysis and they emerged to take the honours and the Jamesy Kelleher Cup to the North.

Scenes of great jubilation were witnessed as the late Ben Purcell of Cobh, Chairman of the East Cork Board, accompanied by Seamus O Floinn, Ladysbridge, came forward to present the cup to the winning captain Jack Hogan. It was a reward too for Catherine's great resilience and determination over the years, since the club's foundation, and two tough and vigorous finals in '55 against, neighbours Castlelyons and Carrigtwohill in '56 losing them by small margins did not deter them.

Here is the roll of honour who did duty that day: In goal was Philly Buckner, Billy Barry, Billy Casey, Billy Walsh, Joss Morrisson, Declan Flaherty, Paddy Murphy, Philip O'Keeffe, Richard Morrisson, Ollie Flaherty, Michael O'Brien,

Tommie Dineen, Donal O'Keeffe, John Flynn R.I.P., Jack Hogan (capt.), and the only sub. called in was Mossie Flaherty. They were trained that year by Eugene Roach having been trained the previous year by Pa Sheehan. The Chairman was Mick Hegarty, father of present Chairman Dick Hegarty and the long serving Secretary was Paddy Hartnett with the late Moss Sullivan as Board Delegate.

Pick-up lorries, vans, bicycles as well as some cars were modes of conveyance in those years and hurleys and sliotars were only costing a shilling in contrast to the respective £9 and £6 today.

The quarter final of the county championship was played at the Cork Athletic Grounds then and in a close tussle with the eventual county championship winners they had to concede victory to them, probably

due to stylish player Ollie Flaherty sustaining a serious knee injury which necessitated his departure from the pitch. Three 'B' grade divisional titles were won in the intervening first 9 years and two junior 'A' divisional titles and one county junior 'A' title has been won along with three county U-16 hurling titles and football divisional titles and minor hurling honours, and the 35 years since '57, apart from the ups and downs, has earned the club much prestige and Catherine's club in the 35 years has grown in stature with its fine spacious Gaelic Field and adjoining Clubrooms in Ballynoe and as well, its crowning glory, four county players.

All of those on the playing panel during 1957 were the recipients of plaques at the commemorative Dinner Dance at Garryvoe Hotel on Monday night last, March 16. Details next week.

## OUR SPECIAL CELEBRITY RECIPES

## Eat like the stars



You'd be surprised the number of celebrities who are excellent cooks. Paul Newman, Sue Ley, George Michael, Madonna, Howard Keel - even Terry Wogan; the list is as endless as *Coronation Street*.

We've asked some of the stars to give us their favourite recipe so that you too can serve up what your idols like to eat.

**MADONNA** is a keen cook. "I love making popcorn, it's my favourite snack," she says. "But that's cheating really - so I'll tell you about my hamburger speciality."

**You'll need:** 1 lb minced beef, ½ cup dry bread-crumbs, ½ cup milk, salt and pepper, 1 small onion minced.

**Method:** Mix together all the ingredients. Form mixture into six patties, brown quickly on both sides in hot fat, reduce heat and cook more slowly until done, turning occasionally.

Madonna serves it up with dollops of relish between soft (or toasted) sesame seeded hamburger rolls.

**Dallas star HOWARD KEEL** likes colourful, tangy foods that are nice and easy to prepare. "One of my favourites is this Mexican-style casserole," he says. "It's ideal when guests turn up unexpectedly."

**You'll need:** 1 tablespoon salad oil, ½ lb minced beef, chilli seasoning, 1 can red



kidney beans undrained, one 8 oz can chopped tomatoes, about 10 stoned black olives, tortilla chips, grated mature Cheddar cheese.

**Method:** Preheat oven to 180°C. Heat oil in large skillet and add minced beef and saute until browned. Stir in chilli (to taste), kidney beans, chopped tomatoes and bring to boil, stirring all the time. Pour into two-quart casserole. Sprinkle olives on top of meat mixture and arrange the tortilla chips around the edge of the casserole dish. Then sprinkle cheese on the top. Bake

for 10 minutes or until the cheese is melted.

**SUE LAWLEY** doesn't like the cheesecake you get in delicatessens. "Much too rich for me," she says. "I prefer to make my own less heavy, less sickly one."

**You'll need:** 20 oz processed cream cheese, 3 egg yolks, ½ pint soured cream, 1 fruit yoghurt, ½ pint water, 3 egg whites, 4 oz caster sugar. For the crunchy base: 8 oz digestive biscuits, 3 oz caster sugar, 4 oz melted butter.

**Method:** Turn the biscuits into crumbs by putting them

in a polythene bag and hitting them. Melt butter in saucepan and mix in biscuits and sugar. Press mixture down hard into a shaped bowl, tin or dish. Now cream the cheese, egg yolks, soured cream and fruit yoghurt together, using a mixer. Whip the egg whites until stiff and fold sugar into them, then add the gelatine. Fold this mixture into the creamed ingredients and pile the lot on top of the crunchy base. Sue uses an 8 in diameter, 3 in deep pie dish. Pop the lot into the fridge and chill overnight.

Serve in slices.

## It's Time To Mow The Lawn Once More

IN the excitement of buying seedling and planting don't neglect the mainstays of your garden such as the lawn, roses and other specimen bushes.

Perhaps surprisingly, you can start mowing the lawn this month when the surface is dry, but to set the blades about an inch higher than ground level to avoid 'scalping' early growth.

It is a time when the old-style cylinder also comes into its own as the grass will benefit from a light rolling but don't do it just after rain or frost.

You can pick out areas of lawn requiring repairs and be ready to seed them as the soil warms up towards the end of March.

The finishing touch to your March lawn treatment



is a good feed with a proprietary lawn fertiliser.

Turning to the roses, aim to complete all pruning of established roses by the end of March and ensure that you cut away any dead, blighted, frost-damaged or deformed growth.

Cut spindly shoots facing to a healthy outward-facing bud, before routinely pruning the rest of last year's growth and establishing a balanced look.

The amount of pruning

does depend on the rose variety. Specimen HT varieties need cutting back hard - up to two-thirds of last season's growth.

But free-blooming Floribundas need less drastic treatment, while hedge roses need lopping only by a quarter - more is likely to cause a surge of growth lower down and spoil the look of the hedge.

Once pruned, your roses should then be fed with a rose fertiliser raked into the soil in a circle just above the roots circle and then mulched to keep weeds at bay.

Or you can plant a carpet of yellow alyssum or another handsome ground cover variety such as lavender.

While you have the pruners out, check on the

growth of other bushes and shrubs - March is the time for cutting back and tidying most varieties.

If you have a greenhouse or want one, this is the month when a cool type starts to come in handy for starting varieties of flowers and vegetables.

It is particularly useful for trays of seeds for half-hardy flowers such as: alyssum, asters, begonias, helichrysum, lobelia, marigolds, nemesia, petunias, stocks, salvia and zinnias.

Even if you have no greenhouse, these can be grown under glass or on a window-sill.

The resulting seedlings are strong and keen to establish themselves when planted out in May after all risk of frost is past.





This year there was an added attraction in that ten of England's best professionals were invited to take part.

Robert Power (Cidona Carrick Wheelers) travelled a long distance to get to Halstead. He had made the journey the two previous years and figured very prominently each year. This year he was hoping that his third trip might prove the lucky one.

The English cycling fraternity always keep a close eye on the rider that wins this race. They know that any previous winners have gone on to bigger and better success. Riders like Sean Yeats, Paul Curran and Ben Luckwell were previous winners as was Matthew Stephens, who this year joined the professional ranks on the continent.

The race covered a total distance of ninety miles over undulating countryside.

Breakway groups began going way and getting hauled back again from the start. This is a top class race with every rider as good as the next. The speed never drops. It was raining and the wind was fierce. It was going to be very hard for a group to stay away from this super bunch.

The pressure told — a group got clear. A time check of 4 mins. came through. Immediately there was a reaction, Steve Far-

rell, England's top amateur, and previous winner of this event, attacked viciously on one of the climbs. Over the top a group had formed and Power was in it. They joined the leading group and Power knew that this was the opportune moment, he attacked. Riders looked at one another, they hesitated, he had a 100 metre gap. He opened it to 200 metres — he felt really strong. He put down his head and drilled it. He was half afraid to look back in case he

would lose any time.

The trailing riders looked at one another and made a pact — "bring him back." There was now twenty riders in this group. They rode their hearts out for the next four miles but could not make any impression on this Irishman. He was riding like a man possessed.

Eventually greed set in and the riders in the group began to think of second place. So the chase was over. Power however never relented and came home in front of a huge crowd to win on Saint Patrick's week-end.

This is a big boost for Robert Power who is chasing selection for the Olympics later this year. The G.B. cycling team are quietly confident about doing well at this summer's Olympics. Their racing manager Doug Daily will have a few questions to put to them after this event. Surely this result must go a long way in securing a place for the Dungarvan lad to go to Barcelona.

### Gold Cup Winner Was Bred In Dungarvan

On a day when it was expected that the "unbeatable" Carvill's Hill would finally fulfill his potential by winning the Tote Gold Cup in a canter at Cheltenham last Thursday, it was on the young 20-years-old jockey from Kilmessan, Co. Meath, Adrian Maguire, and his mount, Cool Ground, that fame and fortune smiled.

Unknown outside the Irish scene before Cheltenham '91, Adrian underlined one of the great success stories in the sport when becoming the first claiming jockey to partner a Gold Cup Winner in the most dramatic fashion aboard his brave Irish bred winner, Cool Ground.

Cool Ground which started as a 25/1 outsider was bred by well-known Dungarvan Veterinary Surgeon, Mr. Nickey Connors, Springmount, and was sold to England after winning a point-to-point and two chases for John Brassil. He is now owned by property developer, Peter Bolton, who owns the Whitcombe Manor Estate in Dorset where Toby Balding trains. He had only £25 each way

on the winner which is now a top-priced 8/1 to win the Grand National.

What turned out to be a rather disastrous Cheltenham Festival for the Irish brigade was somewhat sweetened when Carrick trainer Pat Flynn won the bumper with the 8/1 Monte-

lado ridden by Richard Dunwoody to a rousing chorus of "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling."

Two winners may be meagre reward for the numerically strong Irish contingent but this win in the final race of the '92 Festival raised a cheer even among the losing punters on a day when the big winners were the bookies.



## G.A.A. HAS DISGRACED ITSELF AGAIN

A Chara,  
The G.A.A. in County Waterford has disgraced itself once again. By rejecting, without trial, and by an overwhelming majority, the carefully thought-out proposals for league competitions in both football and hurling, the county has confirmed its position as a muddy backwater in Gaelic Games organisation in Ireland.

The only reason for its rejection which I have seen mentioned in the local press is that the proposals would have involved too many games. This is hilarious. Were the views of the players themselves sought on this, or was this perhaps the view of officials, frightened of the financial implications of additional fixtures, or perhaps of having to seek the commitment of players for a competition which would, of necessity, have to overlap with the soccer and rugby season?

Here in Kildare, the traditional four-division Senior Football League, involving 48 clubs, was this year reorganised into three divisions of 16 clubs each. This was done because the clubs were demanding more competitive games. Each club will now have 15 league games, beginning on the first weekend in March and running through to November. Many of the players involved will also be playing a full complement of hurling league games. There is also, of course, a knock-out championship which generates great interest.

In addition to the above, there is also a multi-divisional Junior Football League, mainly for second and even third string sides. I would suggest that a football club in Kildare, fielding three adult teams in regular league competition throughout most of the year, is a real sports club. The same cannot be said for a club in Waterford which fields a single adult team for five or six competitive games in summer.

The stuck-in-the-mud attitude of the Waterford G.A.A. is also reflected in their out-of-hand rejection of a single application for a group team in this year's Senior Hurling Championship. A number of similar applications in Kildare this year, some involving weird geographical alliances, were openly welcomed as adding variety and extra competitiveness. Group teams (as shown clearly in Cork and Kerry) can raise the standard of championships, while providing good players with weaker clubs an opportunity to display their skills on a superior platform.

The recent RDS fiasco exposed the G.A.A.'s continued perception of soccer as some kind of threat. In Waterford it is not soccer which is a threat to the G.A.A. It is the G.A.A. itself which is the threat. The Waterford G.A.A. clearly lacks vision, direction and leadership. But then, what else would one expect from an organisation which, at the recent National Hurling League game against Dublin in Walsh Park, couldn't provide either a public address system or a National Anthem, and couldn't even manage to open both main gates to let the crowd out in comfort afterwards?



If Cork lose then a draw at Ennis would see Clare and Waterford playing again to decide which side advances to the quarter-finals.

At this point no one is too concerned about the arithmetic of the situation and nothing less than a decisive win will satisfy our supporters. With the Banner County's footballers having achieved promotion, their hurlers will no doubt be attempting to keep pace and enjoy their share of the euphoria that has hit the county at the moment.

In the hurling league, Clare scored a lucky win against Dublin in their first match of the present season, but two weeks later went under to Galway by a clear ten points after battling well against the hot

favourites for fully 50 minutes. By comparison, our display against Dublin was much better and this twelve points winning margin must surely give confidence to the side travelling to the Ennis Road grounds on Sunday.

The news from the camp here is good and according to a report, all 26 members of the panel in training will be available. This will pose a problem for the selectors who will want to include Liam O'Connor on the team. If O'Connor is not fit enough to play, it is likely that the Waterford team will be similar to that

which fielded against Dublin.

In our last two league meetings we played a draw with Clare. ## COUNTY BOARD MEETING

Eamon O Murchu, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Senior Board held at Dungarvan.

### TOURNAMENTS

Under the heading of correspondence, there were quite a number of club applications for permission to play in tournaments over the coming months and all were approved subject to the normal conditions being adhered to.

### REGISTRATION

County Development Officer, John Fraher gave an up-date on the position in regard to registration of players and members. He informed the meeting that a total of seventeen clubs still remain unregistered. These were named and informed that unless this matter was attended to, they could not take part in the championships.

### REPORTS

There were reports from all the selection committees, all giving an up-date on their preparation for the various championships. The football committee expressed their disappointment at the result of the game against Clare, but felt that things can be different when they clash in the McGrath Cup in six weeks time. Jimmy O'Gorman, gave a verbal report on the progress of the hurling panel and said the selectors were hopeful of doing very well against Clare at Ennis on Sunday next in the League. A feature of all the

six reports submitted was the reference to attendance at training. In most cases it is almost one hundred per cent.

### FITZGIBBON CUP FINAL

The splendid victory of the Waterford Regional Technical College in the final of this championship was referred to by the chairman who congratulated all concerned with the historic win. A complaint was made that the final got very scant attention from W.L.R. Delegates felt that with such widespread interest in this event in this county, that the match would have been given better treatment by the 'home' station.

It was agreed that a function to honour the players would be organised within the next few weeks.

### DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

The submissions by the County Disciplinary Committee in relation to the incidents which took place in the senior football county final in October, were put before the meeting and discussed before being approved on a vote.

The secretary of the committee, Denis McGrath in his report stated that two meetings had been held and that officials of both clubs as well as players named in the referee's report attended their second meeting. The report said that much of what happened was not ob-

served by those who attended the hearing. They recommended that both clubs be fined £500 each and that both be severely cautioned. The report made observations in relation to the number of people who had gained access to the sideline on the day in question. A figure of 300 was mentioned, but it was pointed out by the committee that spectators did not become involved in the row. It was also stated that no doctor was on duty in the field on that day.

Tom Cunningham, Stradbally said that his club would agree with the findings, but under no circumstances would they agree with a fine, which was outrageous in this case. He said that a penalty of this kind was out of proportion to what happened. Paddy Fitzgerald, Dungarvan chairman, objected very strongly to the imposition of the fine of £500. He also described the amount as being outrageous and unfair. He said it was only weeks ago since his club had paid £1,200 for Affiliation/Public Liability and Accident Scheme and were involved in a grounds development costing in the region of £250,000. Several other speakers contributed to the discussion, including Western Board Secretary Anthony Walsh who said he was in charge of the field arrangements on the day and had checked with the doctor on call for that day and was assured that he would be available during and after the game, should he be re-

quired. This information was conveyed to both clubs. The chairman stated that it had never been the practice to have a doctor present at club matches.

The matter was eventually put to a vote and was carried by a big majority.

In accordance with a recent High Court decision, the six members of the Disciplinary Committee were required to leave the meeting while the affair was being discussed. The clubs indicated that an appeal to Munster Council would be considered.

### JUNIOR HURLING SELECTORS

The following were recommended by an Coisde Gnotha as members of the junior hurling selection committee for 92 — Greg Fives, Abbeyside/Ballinacourty, Paddy Walsh, Colligan/Emmetts, Pat McCarthy, Ballygunner, John O'Brien, Portlaw and Nicky Jacobs, St. Saviours. Waterford, who are allowed to field their second best team, will play Clare at Thurles on Sunday, May 24.

### MOTION NOT MOVED

P. J. Ryan, Fourmilewater said he would not be moving the motion in relation to the term of office of the Ard Stiurathoir as he had heard through the 'grapevine' that the Clare motion would not appear on the Congress agenda.

The chairman said that there could possibly be

other motions on the Congress clar that would be of interest to us and that should be discussed. He complained that the agenda for Congress had not yet been issued (and it should be in accordance with rule). He said that it may be necessary to call a special meeting to discuss the motions in order that delegates to Congress could be instructed about voting.

### AWARDS NOT PRESENTED

Joe Byrne, Erin's Own, complained that some of the members who had been named as winners of the awards, had not yet received their trophies. Nioclas Mac Craith stated that these were ready at the time of convention, but because of an error of inscription, were not presented.

Regarding future presentation of annual awards, the chairman referred to the minutes of Coisde Gnotha, which had been adopted by the Board and which proposed that in future a special presentation night would be held annually and this would involve referees, umpires, players of the year and other presentation recipients. A log of matches would be kept and this could only be done on receipt of a report of all games.

### FUND RAISING

Permission was obtained from the meeting, for An Coisde Gnotha to proceed with the examination of a proposed scheme which

would involve and benefit all clubs in the county. It was hoped to have the scheme up and running by early summer.

Permission was also given to have the matter of season tickets for all games under the auspices of the County Board, examined and a report ready for the next meeting of the Board which is due to take place on April 13.

### GOLDEN GOAL

Permission was given to Bord na nOg to run a golden goal lottery on the Waterford versus Clare Munster championship match. This Bord, in the report of secretary Seamus Alyward, asked that monies due from the County Board be paid over as soon as possible.

### ACCIDENT SCHEME PAYMENTS

John Lyons complained that monies due to players who had claimed under the injury scheme, had not been paid out on receipt by the County Board and in many cases this created hardships for those concerned. It was decided that these payments would be paid out as soon as possible after receipt in future. The meeting were also informed that a national scheme (insurance) that will supplement the present Players Injury Scheme, is expected to be launched in June and ready to be implemented on January 1, next year.

# End Of The Saga

What has been described as the end of the Eamon Murphy High Court saga, was announced on Saturday last when Central Council were told that the Management Committee were recommending that the case be not appealed to the Supreme Court as no rules of the G.A.A. were found to be at fault. The statement to Central Council said that the G.A.A. did not lose the case and no fault was found with the decision taken, but the procedures adopted were deemed to be defective.

The High Court judge had pointed out that the G.A.A. were entitled to re-hear the case, but it was decided not to take any further action as it was acknowledged that a period of suspension from May to November was served.

The charges alleging breach of the amateur status rule by county team coach Joe McGrath are not being proceeded with on the basis that the evidence which was publicly presented at the hearing of the recent case in the High Court, might be construed as prejudicing the case against him.

The fine of £2,000 which was imposed on the Water-

ford County Board for an alleged infringement of the amateur status rule, was cancelled.

After the forthcoming Congress a special committee will be set up to consider what procedural changes will be necessary following the High Court decision.

## NO SPONSORSHIP YET

The proposed national sponsorship of the All-Ireland hurling and football championship will not be completed in time for the commencement of the provincial championships and may not be in place until the All-Ireland final stage. Three of the many

companies who showed a keen interest are still in the race for the sponsorship and all three are Irish. This sponsorship does not and

will not effect counties from obtaining their own sponsorship or from wearing the logo of their home sponsor.

## Munster Convention

At the recent Munster Convention details of payments under the Players Injury Scheme were given to the delegates in the Secretary's Report. These should be of particular interest to members in this county as the accident scheme has received quite a battering in recent times.

The figures show that in Medical Payments a total of £58,797 was paid out. £42,670 was paid over to players for dental injuries, and for loss of earnings the Council paid out £145,711 as well as £31,500 in capital benefits. The total amount paid out over the year was £278,678.

Of the sums paid out, only 55% was subscribed by the six counties in the province. Waterford paid in £11,973 and received back £25,041. Cork paid in £49,000 and received back £86,000 in benefits. Limerick subscribed £25,000 and got back £49,000 and the "ins and outs" for the other counties were on a similar scale. Were it not for the contribution of £69,000 from Munster Council gates and £67,000 from

Central Council, the scheme would certainly be in serious trouble. The secretary complained about the big number of incomplete or badly filled application forms that were sent in last year and this held up payments in many cases.

## New Trustees

The following members have been appointed Trustees of the Ash Plantation at Eagle Rock which is the property of the County Board: Chairman and Secretary of County Board, Secretary of Munster Council and both Divisional Secretaries.

## Peter Quinn In Politics?

The announcement over the weekend that G.A.A. President Peter Quinn had agreed to allow his name to go forward as an agreed candidate on the Nationalist ticket in the Fermanagh/South Tyrone constituency against the sitting Ken McGinnis (Unionist), came as a big surprise to many people and particularly to those in the higher circles of the association.

The announcement stated that his acceptance of the nomination would depend on the withdrawal of the S.D.L.P. and Sinn Fein candidates.

It was subsequently announced that the other parties would not agree to give

Peter Quinn a free run, and this probably means that he will not be in the race for a seat in the Commons. I'm sure that a lot more will be written about this unwise decision on his part, to become involved in the politics of the North.

this idea of prefabricated buildings."

Pointing out the need for a proper new school for Dungarvan, Cllr. Goode said that he always felt that the accommodation across the road known as "The Beeches" should be purchased by the Vocational Committee as the site for a new school. "But," he said, "despite that we still seem to want to build old places with fish boxes."

The Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne asked whether every pre-fab placed on the grounds tied the Committee to the existing building, obviously referring to the refusal of the Department to sanction the go-ahead for the building of a new school for the Committee on a site provided by the Urban Council at Quann's.

Stating that it was time for the Committee to get their strategy together for the future, the Chairman suggested that they should request their architect to come and discuss the position with them.

Mr. P. Geary, TUI, said that the introduction of another pre-fab would further interfere with the playing area of the students, an area which already had been badly eroded. He pointed out that the school numbers had increased by 40% in the

past ten years and were still rising and in the circumstances he thought the matter was one which would have to be looked at in the long term.

The Chairman then said that they could arrange to have a meeting with the Architect in the near future to discuss the full implications of the problem.

### HEATING PROBLEM AT KILMAC' SCHOOL

The CEO Mr. O Ceilleachair informed the Committee that a serious leak in the central heating system had occurred in the school in Kilmacthomas and the cost of repairs could be substantial.

On the proposal of Cllr. Tom Cunningham seconded by Cllr. Con Casey it was agreed to apply to the Dept. for a grant to cover the repairs.

Town Clerk said that 61 houses at Cathal Bruga were involved in the scheme of which 7 had already been completed. Of the 54 left, he said that they would only be able to compete a certain number as by the time the contract was approved, only about six months would be left in the year.

To a question by Cllr. B. Kyne, the Town Clerk said

that the start on the work would depend on when sanction was received for the go ahead from the Department. They hoped to be able to advertise the entire scheme together when this was obtained but he thought that it would take the remainder of this year and all next year to complete the remaining 54 houses in the scheme.
