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Commerce Chamber To Probe Shoppers' Attitudes To Dungarvan

In November last year a survey of grocery prices carried out by the Chamber of Commerce in Dungarvan, showed Dungarvan to be the cheapest place to shop when compared with Clonmel and Waterford.

The Chamber now plans a further survey, this time of shoppers' attitudes to a range of issues about Dungarvan as a shopping town. Chamber P.R.O., Paddy McMahon, explained that the survey will be carried out over the coming weeks by the students of the post-leaving certificate course in the Technical College, Dungarvan. "The questionnaire was drawn up by a sub-committee and was ratified by the Chamber Council and Paudie Geary of the Technical College has agreed to let his students carry out the survey as part of their Marketing Course," he said.

The survey will be carried out in the town and also in selected towns and villages around Dungarvan, for ex-

ample Lismore, Ardmore, Leamybrien, Bonmahon, etc. The intention is to get some feedback from people who do not choose Dungarvan for shopping in addition to those who do shop in the town. Full results of the survey will be published in the local press when they become available.

£100 SHOPPING VOUCHER

As an incentive for people to spend time answering the questions on the short questionnaire, a draw will take place for a £100 shopping voucher to be spent in any Dungarvan Shop that is a current member of the Chamber of Commerce.

Paddy McMahon added that he would urge the general public to co-operate fully with the survey as the information collected would be used to develop the town further and establish Dungarvan as the number one shopping town in West Waterford.

Minister Announces Grants For Roads And Sanitary Services

The Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith T.D., announced last Thursday allocations totalling £63.4 million to local authorities for major water and sewerage schemes throughout the country. These allocations will ensure that construction work on schemes is maintained at a high level and confirms the Government's commitment to this important programme.

The Minister said that he had been anxious to allocate funds to local authorities as early as possible in 1992 in order to make the wide ranging benefits of these schemes available to communities without delay. In the case of Waterford Co. Council the following are the allocations which total £431,700:

Ballinroad Sewerage Scheme £29,700; East Waterford Water Supply, Phase 2, Portlaw Pumps £33,200; Portlaw Sewerage (sewers) £368,800.

Dungarvan Urban Council has been allocated £27,600 for the Shandon Sewerage Scheme (Pumphouse Refurbishment).

ROAD GRANTS

Also on Thursday last, the Minister announced details of the 1992 grants to local authorities for public roads and Local Improvement Scheme works. The allocations for National Roads amount to £188.18 million and the Minister pointed out that this was another all-time record provision for these roads which was designed to ensure that the full amount of EC Structural Funds available for roads under Operational Programme on Peripherality will be drawn down.

The 1992 provision for National Roads includes £131.65 million for major road improvement schemes on the primary routes and £21.03 million for other improvement works on these routes. £12.9 million will be spent on improvements to national secondary roads and grants totalling £20.7 million are being provided for maintenance

works on National Roads. The balance of £1.9 million will be spent on Technical Assistance measures.

Among the nine major schemes around the coun-

try listed for completion this year is the N25 Sweep outside Dungarvan.

The Road Grant allocated to Waterford Co. Council for 1992 is £5,488,000

with £50,000 to cover Local Improvement Scheme works; the 1992 Road Grant allocated to Dungarvan Urban Council is £56,000.

Grange Girl Sees Friend Swept To Her Death

The tragic drowning in which a girl who had just been celebrating her 21st birthday lost her life in Tramore last Sunday morning has been the source of widespread regret.

Gillian Fitzgerald, 1, Meadow Court, Lauradell, Waterford had celebrated her 21st birthday with a party at her home on Saturday night and early on Sun-

day morning she and two of her friends, 16 years old Olivia O'Brien from Grange, Youghal and James Farrelly, Dublin decided to go for a walk along the promenade in Tramore. The tide was in and there was a very rough sea.

The tragedy happened around 7.45 a.m. when a huge wave crashed on to them as they stood on a

slipway and Gillian was swept into the sea. James Farrelly immediately dived in to rescue her and despite his most courageous efforts which almost succeeded, the raging sea plucked Gillian from his grasp and swept her away.

Meanwhile young Olivia O'Brien raised the alarm and rescuers came to Mr. Farrelly's assistance and pulled him to safety. Within half an hour Gillian's body was washed up a few hundred metres from where she had been swept to her death.

The tragic end to such a happy occasion has devastated her parents, family and wide circle of friends and has been the source of widespread regret.

Bruton And Deasy Ask Crystal Firm For Statement Of Intent

During a visit to Waterford City last Thursday, Fine Gael leader, John Bruton referred to the current situation at the Waterford Crystal plants in Waterford and Dungarvan and said that it was totally unacceptable that the 2,000 workers involved should be kept in the dark about their futures in the industry.

With the workforce now into their second year of short-time working, Mr. Bruton called on the management to clarify their intentions with regard to the continuation of short-time working and further possible redundancies.

Dungarvan Deputy Austin Deasy, Fine Gael Spokesman on Agriculture who was with the Party leader also called on the management of Waterford Crystal to put its cards on the table. He pointed out that the workforce knew very little of what might happen in the future and said that this was an intoler-

able position for them.

"The company should come clean and put their cards on the table where the workers are concerned and if there are to be redundancies the company must come out and tell the work-

ers what they have in mind," he said.

Deputy Deasy urged the company to make a clear statement of intent rather than allowing the situation as it is at present to continue.

One Applicant Only For Woodwork Teacher's Post

Having failed in previous attempts to appoint a whole-time woodwork teacher, the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee has finally succeeded in filling the post. But only just.

Mr. Donal Kelleher CEO, told the monthly meeting of the Committee in Dungarvan last week that they had finally succeeded in getting one applicant from their advertising of the vacant post.

Mr. Kelleher said that without interview the applicant had been appointed on a temporary basis and was presently on the staff. He would be interviewed at a later stage with a view to filling the post permanently.

Cllr. D. Goode commented that with so many people out of work it was extraordinary that there has been such a lack of interest in this particular job.

P.L. and A.P.L.'s are reminded to take note of a meeting to be held at 3 o'clock this Saturday.


REGIONAL HIKE

Late Jane McGrath

The death of Jenny McGrath, "Seefeld," New Line, Abbeyside and Ballycullane on St. Patrick's Day was

heralded with widespread grief over a wide area where this gentle and sincere person was held in high and deserved esteem by everyone. She was the second eldest daughter of the late Michael and Theresa McGrath, Ballycullane, Ballynoe, a family of great renown particularly in sporting circles. The family home was an open house always, and a special house for the then local Kilcronat hurling club. Jenny's brother Tom, was the first to bring an All-Ireland hurling medal to the parish, winning it with the Cork minor team in 1939, styled as the thunder and lightning All-Ireland. He also figured in the Munster Colleges team of that year, being a student of Lismore Christian Brothers School and he also played with Kilcronat.

Jenny attended the parish school of Glengoura in her early years, and emigrating to England in the late thirties she embarked on a nursing career, particularly during World War II. Returning again to her native county she spent several years nursing at Lismore District Hospital and with her genial and caring manner she endeared herself to patients and staff alike. One of her outstanding characteristics was her deep interest in people both young and old.

She was predeceased by a brother and sister Katherine (Cathy) who became Countess Peel in her marriage to Earl Peel in the mid-forties. Returning to "New Line" Abbeyside in later years she carried on a B & B business there and was extremely popular in the place of her adoption.

In her illness a short time ago she was hospitalised in Ardkeen, but then the family decided to bring her back to her "Seefeld" residence, where with the aid of a nurse, she was deservedly cared for in her final months, and this gesture received the appraisal of Fr. Ahern, C.C. in his homily at Abbeyside Church where her remains were brought before her final journey to Lismore Cemetery for interment.

Jenny ignited a flame of warmth and love and cheerfulness wherever she went, which will never be extin-



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
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TALLOW NOTES

The organisers must have been particularly pleased with the support which units and bands from Youghal and Fermoy gave to the parade, in all there were nine band took part, while all the local contributors also again turned out in force.

The Committee of the Dungarvan Pipe Band are to be congratulated for once again organising such a magnificent parade, one which could indeed compare with any held elsewhere in Ireland, even in the city areas. Without doubt 'twas a great day for Dungarvan.

What a pity then that Radio Telefis Eireann did not see fit to include it among the many parades up and down the country which were televised in their six o'clock news bulletin that evening. We're obviously very much "outside the Pale" down here in Dungarvan as far as R.T.E. is concerned!

EVEN JUSTICE MINISTER'S APARTMENT IS A TARGET

When listing the overseas engagements of our many Ministers and Ministers of State for St. Patrick's Day and the week-end in general in last week's column we overlooked including the assignment of Minister for Justice Pdraig Flynn. We did so simply because it was not included in the official list which we received from the Government Information Service in the previous week.

We were only reminded of Mr. Flynn's absence from the country when we read in a daily paper last Saturday that his apartment in Dublin had been broken into and a video recorder stolen. It happened while the Minister was on a St. Patrick's week-end trip to Australia visiting Sydney, Melbourne and Canberra.

As Minister for Justice, Mr. Flynn is given personal protection and Garda security both at his Dublin apartment and where he normally lives during the week and his home in Castlebar, Co. Mayo to which he usually returns at week-ends.

Senior gardai were investigating the security breach at the Minister's Dublin apartment over the week-end and have been trying to establish how a thief got in and how he evaded the Garda security which is normally provided on a round-the-clock basis.

We mention the matter here merely to further highlight the spate of burglaries and break-ins which have taken place in recent months in Dungarvan and Lismore. It shows to what ends thieves are prepared to go at times and the risks they will take when even the apartment of the Minister for Justice with a round-the-clock surveillance is not immune from attack.

However, in the long run, the culprits are nearly always caught as has happened here in Dungarvan as was reported last week in our news columns. The gardai investigations here eventually resulted in the rounding up of a gang of young criminals and following questioning the gardai are now satisfied that they have caught those responsible for the robberies which had people in Dungarvan terrified to leave their homes in case they would be broken into in their absence as had happened in so many cases.

Elsewhere in this issue we carry a report of last week's monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council at which Garda Supt. Ray McAndrew and his team were congratulated for succeeding in rounding up the gang responsible for the spate of robberies in the

town and district. We are pleased to endorse this vote of congratulations as we are sure do all of our readers also.

IWC CALLS FOR HALT TO BIRD TRAPPING

Dominic Clancy, Secretary, West Waterford Branch, Irish Wildlife Conservancy (058/43312) has drawn our attention to the fact that despite being outlawed under the 1976 Wildlife Act the trapping, sale and keeping of Irish wild songbirds, particularly finches and buntings, continues to be a widespread problem.

The IWC has now launched a national campaign to oppose illegal bird trapping and has called on the Government to address the issue as a matter of urgency. It is also asking the members of the public to assist in putting an end to this cruel and damaging practice.

Should you come across an incident of birds being trapped or held in captivity the IWC recommends that you should report it to your nearest Garda Station or you could contact the local Branch Secretary with details of the incident and he will then look into it.

A PARADISE FOR PROFESSIONALS

In recent years Ireland has become a Paradise for professionals especially those in the legal and accountancy professions with the procession of public tribunals and inquiries which have been following one after another. In many of these the fees which are mentioned are absolutely outrageous.

We read that, in what has come to be commonly known as the 'Beef Tribunal,' conservative estimates of the costs when it rose last Friday, its 56th day, were then stated to be in excess of £5 million. Some experts believe the Tribunal will not conclude until the end of June while others are forecasting that it will continue until September. So what will the costs be by then?

In all there are some 63 lawyers engaged at the Tribunal, 11 of these acting for the Tribunal and the Attorney-General and the remainder acting for the many interested groups and individuals involved. Among these, the senior lawyers are stated to have

been paid huge retainers ranging from £50,000 to £75,000 while in addition they are paid fees ranging from £1,500 to £3,000 per day and Junior Counsel can pick up £1,000 each day.

In the Greencore Investigations we read of fees charged by two of the Inspectors of £1,750 each per day with a total bill for their investigation coming to £1.1 million while in the other investigation, the total cost "only" reached £160,000!

Then we had the consultant medical people looking for a further £50 million in fees from the Government to pay for their expertise while the ordinary General Practitioners are threatening to go on strike if their demands for increased fees under the General Medical Service are not met.

All this is just one side of the coin in this country. The other side is typified by the following heading which was splashed across one of our morning news-

papers last Monday: "Region Gripped By Depression." It referred to an address by Cork Bishop, Dr. Michael Murphy, in which he referred to the atmosphere of despair which he recently encountered in West Cork, part of which he claimed had been decimated by emigration and gripped by depression because of the widespread unemployment in the area.

There are many such areas now suffering from the same depression as the effects of the recession are biting deeper and causing more and more businesses to go to the wall with a consequent increase in the army of unemployed.

It is ludicrous then to see so many costly tribunals and inquiries proceeding with more in the pipeline paying fees which are positively obscene. Those involved in them will, of course disagree, but they are luxuries which the country cannot afford especially now at a time when one in five of the workforce is jobless and on the dole!

Murphy of Booavogue, the 1798 Rebellion and Co. Waterford's Strategic Importance," in Lawlor's Hotel, starting time 8 p.m.

The ballad which recalls the Rising of '98 in Co. Wexford is "Booavogue," composed by P. J. McCall, and so it should prove an appropriate choice for our ballad corner this week.

At Booavogue as the sun was setting
O'er the bright May meadows of Shelmalier,
A rebel hand set the heather blazing
And brought the neighbours from far and near.
Then Father Murphy from old Kilcormack,
Spurred up the rocks with a warning cry:

It was not until young Richie Moloney, Kilkenny rode a perfect round on "Flow Flight" in 41.40 to score a first leg of a double at these finals. His friend and neighbour Aoife O'Dwyer came closest with "Thatch Flight" scoring 42.29.

The Glenpatrick 128 Open had been dominated by the Tipperary Crystal leading Open Rider Paul Beecher, Tallow and he had 2 ponies into the final round. Going first of 5 in the jump-off

with "Lobster" he had a very fast time of 35.26. Next in Conor Quinlivan, Kanturk and "Tia Marie" and the time on the clock changed to 34.97. This seemed unbeatable but Richie Moloney full of confidence after his earlier win took "Jacko" round every corner fast and with ease to record a great double in 32.57. Sarah Hogan, Cork riding in only her third open competition took fifth with "Spotted Snowball" and left all the pressure on Paul Beecher going last with the leading pony of the league "Loughnatousa Champ." Despite his best efforts Champ did not respond fast enough for Paul and he took third in 35.06.

The first Cork win of the day was recorded in the Bank of Ireland/ICS 138 Open Final when pathfinders of 8 in the jump-off Niamh Murphy and "Nalif" set the unbeatable time of 37.85.

A repeat situation arose in the Bank of Ireland/ICS 148 Open Final when the first of 9 in this jump-off Joseph Daly also from Cork with "Harperstown" set a fast target of 40.92 and once again they all failed in their bid to catch the time. Eddie Moloney almost made it a family treble when "Twilight Flight" last of the nine tried her utmost but in the end had to settle for runner-up spot. A very worthy third was Dian Beecher, Tallow with "Loughnatousa Thunderclap" the only other clear of the jump-off showing the versatility of this partnership who were working hunter champions in Millstreet last

season.

Like last year some of the best jumping of the day came in the last final, the 148 Novice League. A maximum height course proved no barrier for these young ponies and 15 went into the third and final round. Tholm Keane, Aghlish and "Kereen Dodger" were first out and showed remarkable skill, as so many of the others did also for novices, to clock 40.14. Next in was current European silver medalist Brian Sheehan this time riding "Cuffesgrange Country Girl" and he had a copy book round of 36.15 which was to provide Kilkenny with their third final.

GAIN LEAGUE FINALS

The finals were a fitting end to a wonderful indoor winter season of pony jumping, and still to look forward to is the Gain League Finals for horses next Sunday when all the top riders will compete.

Olympic hopefuls Francis Connors and "Spring Elegance" are qualified for the Gain Open in which Robert Splaine has Big Ed, Marion Hughes has her big winners from last season Marble City, Flo Jo and Carnival Bouncer. Francis also rides The Queen's King, Navan Champions and who helped him win the Irish Field Rider of the Year title and of course his well known Diamond Express. 20 horses have qualified for this final and in all 150 horses will compete in the four Gain finals next Sunday.

Good Vegetable Bedmates

MORE and more people are growing vegetables because they know that not only is the taste better when picked fresh from the soil, but home-grown are much cheaper than shop bought.

Being able to pick at the peak of tenderness and serve within an hour or two of picking is a revolution for the tastebuds.

Even those people who, hitherto, have much preferred to grow flowers and shrubs in their gardens rather than vegetables, are resorting to popping a few tomatoes, spuds, cabbage, beetroot, and carrots in their flower beds.

You really should have thought about what vegetables you would grow back in late autumn or early winter, and we will assume that's when you started to



dig your beds ready for spring sowing.

The winter frosts will have produced a nice crumbly surface and round about now, the soil will be very workable.

Its essential to sow when the soil is moist but NOT wet or waterlogged. It pays to buy top quality seeds and plants. Sow seeds in drills, and never forget the old well-proven saying: don't sow too early, too deeply or too thickly.

Some folk might tell you

you shouldn't plant vegetables side by side because you won't get a good yield. Take that - as you would your vegetables - with a pinch of salt.

But one thing is certain: some vegetables make better bedmates than others, and for what its worth, here's my list of "compatible bedmates". It works marvelously for me.

ASPARAGUS: basil, parsley, tomatoes.

BEANS: marigolds, celery, potatoes.

BEETS: carrots, onions, kohlrabi, cauliflower, kale, broccoli, brussels sprouts, turnips, cabbage.

CARROTS: onions and parsley (which repel carrot fly), beets, peas, sage.

CORN: beans, cucumbers, lettuce, soybeans, spinach.

CUCUMBERS: corn, radishes.

LETTUCE: cabbage,

onions, radishes.

NASTURTIUMS: potatoes.
ONIONS: carrots, lettuce, radishes.

PEAS: beans, carrots, corn, potatoes, turnips.

PEPPERS: carrots, eggplants, peas.

RADISHES: carrots, lettuce, spinach.

STRAWBERRIES: borage, lettuce, basil, nasturtiums.

TURNIPS: peas.

Finally, during this month of March (and April), here's a list of vegetables (or plant) I recommend you sow (or plant) immediately (if you haven't already done so):

Broad bean, brussels sprouts, sprouting broccoli, cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, celery, leek, lettuce, onion, (from seed) and onion from sets, parsnip, peas, potatoes, radish, spinach, tomato seed (under glass).

Sample Newman's steak and Wogan's chips



Paul Newman has given his name to a delicious steak recipe.

Blue-eyed superstar PAUL NEWMAN may have his name on his own brand of salad dressing, but he has also given his name to a delicious steak recipe — Steak a la Newman.

You'll need: 1 large sirloin steak about 1 1/2 inches thick, 1 large onion, 2 garlic cloves, 4 fl oz of home-made vinaigrette, salt and pepper.

Method: Put the dressing in a shallow glass dish. Crush the garlic, chop the onion and add to the dressing with seasoning. Add steak and turn many times to coat it thoroughly in the marinade. Cover and leave in the fridge for four hours, turning occasionally. Drain the steak and grill until done to your taste, rare, medium or well. Slice and serve.

RICHARD BRIERE likes his sprouts served up with a bit more oomph than normal, which is why he loves preparing this simple little French recipe:

You'll need: 10 sweet chestnuts, 1 lb Brussel sprouts, 4 oz cooked ham, 4 tablespoons yoghurt, ground pepper.

Method: Preheat oven to 175°C. Skin and cook chestnuts in boiling water until tender, then chop into small pieces. Cook the sprouts till tender and drain. Chop ham into little squares and mix everything including the yoghurt into an ovenproof casserole, season with pepper. Cover and cook for 10 minutes.

TERRY WOGAN doesn't have the time to prepare lavish meals these days, but he was good enough to give us his favourite supper dish which he often throws together when he gets home

from the TV studio.

You'll need: 2 slices of fresh white bread, 1/2 oz butter, 8 to 10 french fries, salt and pepper.

Method: Pile the butter on the bread, fill with piping hot French fries, season — and devour quickly!

RICHARD O'SULLIVAN ran a restaurant in the TV series *Robin's Nest* and is a great cook in real life. Among his many favourites is the garlicky, chilled soup Gazpacho. Here's how he does it.

You'll need: 1 clove garlic, 2 slices white bread, 1/2 cup pimento, vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon each of chopped cucumber, onion and hard boiled egg.

Method: Crush garlic in a bowl, add the oil, bread and marinade for two hours. Add the tomatoes, onion, pimento. Put in electric blender for 10 seconds and then chill in the fridge. It's concentrated at this stage, so when you want to eat, dilute with water and a little vinegar, drop in the cucumber, onion and hard boiled egg.

GEORGE MICHAEL enjoys making spreads and dips, especially mayonnaise-type things, which is why he's a dab hand at taramasalata. "It's nice and fishy, a delicious spread or dip," he says. "I love it on toast or pitta bread."

You'll need: 8 oz smoked cod roes, juice from one

lemon, 3 crushed cloves garlic, 1/2 pint olive oil, 4 oz cream cheese, freshly ground black pepper.

Method: Pour boiling water over and leave for short while. The skin should then peel easily. If it doesn't, scrape roe off the skin. Put roe into a blender and add the juice and the garlic. Pour in oil slowly. Then add the cream cheese and the pepper. When blended, serve on toast, pitta bread or as a dip.

VALERIE SINGLETON like sauted kidneys "simply because it's quick and no trouble."

You'll need: 3 lamb's kidneys per person, 1/2 lb mushrooms, 1 green pepper, 4 rashers bacon, 1 tin condensed tomato soup, 2 tablespoons red wine, 1 carton soured cream, seasoning.

Method: Chop and saute lightly in butter. Add chopped kidneys, chopped pepper and mushrooms. Saute mixture quickly until kidneys almost cooked. Add wine and tin of soup. Season, turn down heat and mix in sour cream just before serving. Serve with plain boiled rice and green salad.

Finally, you can eat like a princess. **PRINCESS DIANA** loves cooking, but has little time for it these days. But all her family enjoy her leeks and noodle casserole when she gets round to preparing it.

You'll need: 360 grams wholemeal noodles, five leeks, grated cheese, teaspoon curry powder, stock.

Method: Chop and saute the leeks in oil. Put noodles in the bottom of an ovenproof dish, add the leeks and vegetable stock just to cover. Sprinkle in curry powder and then top with grated cheese.

Bake in moderate oven till cheese is nicely browned.



Dungarvan Athletic Club Notes

DOWN MEMORY LANE

The road racing scene and athletics in general have spanned the decades in Dungarvan and this sporting tradition reaches a special milestone on Sunday week, April 5 when the club holds its tenth Annual Road Race in its present series.

While road racing holds centre stage locally at present, in "olden" days it was squashed between the Cross Country Season and the Summer Sports Days. After a brief absence the athletic club reappeared in the mid-1950's and when Neil Hurley won the County Novice Cross Country championship in Aghish in 1955 it encouraged others to take up athletics which bore fruit in the 1960's with a number of county titles being won by local runners.

In 1963 the County Novice championship was held in Dunhill, always a true test of cross country running, where a youthful Jim Sheehan won the title supported by his winning St. Mary's team mates Eddie Moore, Joe Power, Vinny Mahoney, Arthur Sheehan, Jackie Sandford and Tony Mansfield. The sixties saw the emergence of international athletes such as Junior Cummins, Tom Power and Mick Farrell, while sprinter John Morrissey won All-Ireland Colleges titles.

Con Roche was a most popular administrator and apart from his athletic endeavours he was also responsible for bringing the Ras Tailteann to Dungarvan as well as promoting Go Karting racing.

In the late sixties juvenile athletics within the club was given a great boost by the dedication of Eddie Moore and the foundations of the organisation and successes of the 70's was due mainly to him. Ladies athletics was introduced and promoted successfully by Fr. O'Donnell O.S.A. and G. Slammon which apart from the competitive element it served also as a youth club for the girls at the time. Liz Mountain proved to be the leading lady going on to win a National 800 metre title and to compete internationally for Ireland.

When road races were promoted by Dungarvan A.C., the usual circuit was O'Connell Street, Wolf Tone Road, Mitchel Street, Mary Street and finishing in the Square. Before the present series the last road race to be organised by the club was the New Year's Eve



Round the Houses 4 mile event in 1969. The following report appeared in the "Dungarvan Leader" at the time:

"Despite the arctic weather conditions, a field of 35, representing most clubs in the county turned up for the Round the Houses road race on New Year's Eve. The race started about five minutes before midnight and runners ran the old year out and the new year in, in style. Winner of the major trophy, the Master McGrath, Pet Foods Cup, was Dunhill runner, Dan Cowman who was first man home. In second and third places were Jimmy Costin (Ring) and Dave Browne (Tramore) while Joe Sheehan (Dungarvan) was fourth. First novice home in the race was the young Dungarvan runner, Tony Ryan with James Flynn, Tramore, in second place. Dunhill won the team prize. After the event Rev. Fr. Cooney O.S.A. presented the cup and other trophies which were sponsored by a number of local sporting businessmen to the winners at the Friary Hall. Great credit is due to Mr. Eddie Moore, Secretary of the club, who organised the race."

In the previous year, 1968, the race was generously sponsored by local businessmen Joe Power and the late Liam Morrissey, butcher, and was won by Jimmy Costin (Deise A.C.) which at that time was an amalgamation of Dungarvan A.C., Ring A.C. and Friary A.C. The team prize was won by Deise A.C. and the winning team was Jimmy Costin (1st), Joe Sheehan (4th),

Seamus Fitzgerald (6th) and Eddie Moore (15th).

In the same year the County Novice Cross Country championship was convincingly won by Joe Sheehan who recently spanned a twenty four year gap by competing in the club's fourth annual Collihan Cup event. The '68 championship was held in Killosera, a venue which though not nowadays generally known was always kindly made available to the club by the landowners at the time.

The Annual General Meeting of Deise A.C. was held in the C.Y.M.S. Hall in November 1968 and the election of officers resulted as follows:

President — Con Roche; Chairman — Michael Nagle; Vice-Chairman — Rory Wyley; Joint Treasurers — Eddie Moore and Jim Sheehan; Secretary — Eddie Moore. Also present at the meeting were G. Slammon, Jimmy Gough R.I.P., Joe Gough (Juvenile Secretary), Neil Hurley, Liam Meehan, Tony Mansfield, Jimmy Costin, Joe Sheehan, John Harty, Charlie McAllister, Tony Ryan, Tom Meehan, Paddy Murphy, Sean Meehan, Michael O'Brien and John O'Mahoney. Pride of place was given to the Tour of Ireland cycle race in August, the open sports meeting in June and the introduction of ladies athletics in Dungarvan. In those days the majority of the juvenile athletes travelled to athletic events in the back of Jim Sheehan's Hales Cakes Van upon which the result of many a race was decided. In retrospect the athletic club was a valuable sporting option for the youth of the area and it gave a tremendous amount of enjoyment to those involved in it at the time.

Next Sunday week's road race helps to keep the athletic tradition alive in Dungarvan and by all accounts it will be a race not to be missed.

CO. BOARD CHAIRMAN REFUTES CENTRAL COUNCIL STATEMENT

This statement contains a number of inaccuracies, and untruths regarding the decision of the High Court in the case. I enclose herewith a copy of the relevant ex-

tract of the Perfected Order of the High Court in the matter, dated and issued 23rd December 1991. I would refer you in particular to paragraph 2 of page 3 of same, which speaks for itself. Equally, for the record, the time allowed for an appeal against an order of the High Court, is 21 days from the date of perfection of that order.

Having clarified this matter, and corrected this erroneous statement of last Saturday, I sincerely hope that you will correct this

report in your next issue. Having so clarified this, I hope that this will be the last occasion I will have to make public comment in the media on this affair, and that we can all get on with the most important job on hand, i.e. the advancement of the fortunes of our Association, both on and off the field of play.

Encl. — Paragraph 2 Page 3 of High Court Order as enclosed reads as follows:

"The Court doth declare that the suspension of the Plaintiff for twelve months

from all activities connected with the Gaelic Athletic Association by the Management Committee of the Association on the 29th day of May 1991 was in breach of the rules of the Association and the rules of natural justice and is invalid and wrong in law."



Price Hikes

Admission prices continue to rise and during the past week it was announced tickets for Munster matches and All-Ireland semi-finals, will increase this year. A decision will be taken soon on the extent of the price rise for the semi-finals and these will be announced in May. The revenue from this increase will go towards replacing the sponsorship of the Vocational and Third Level Colleges.

In Munster the new pricing was decided on at a meeting on Friday last and are as follows: Football: Cork v. Kerry first round game, £9 for covered seating, £7 for uncovered seating and £5 for terraces. There will be a reduction in price for the double-header semi-finals as follows: £8, £6 and £5.

In hurling, prices for the first round game between Waterford and Clare will be £6, £5 and £4. The winners of that game will meet Limerick and the admission prices there will be £8, £6 and £5. If Cork and Tipperary meet in the other semi-final (and I have no doubt but that they will) the prices of tickets will be £10, £8 and £5. Prices for the provincial finals were not decided upon.

COSTS AT CROKE PARK

At the recent Tyrone/Dublin National League game where a "gate" of £13,000 was taken, the expenses were a colossal £10,000, leaving only £3,000 for division between the two participating counties.

In a statement issued last week, the financial controller, Frank Tierney gave an outline of the costs, as follows: Gardai £1,000, Security £1,000, Stiles £700, Workers £500, Professional Stewards £1,000, Country Stewards £200, PAYE £1,200, other costs £400. In addition to the above 20% rent was deducted as was 5% for players injury fund and 5% for public liability. The PAYE has to be paid to the Inspector of Taxes for the employment of stylesmen.

When a game is fixed for Croke Park the attendance must be estimated and provision made for security, Gardai etc., and if the attendance does not measure up to expectations, the costs cannot be reduced. The costs do not increase significantly for larger crowds.

The entire matter is now being examined and steps will be taken, if possible to reduce the costs of staging a game at headquarters, without lowering the standards of security and safety.


