With the failure of the last ditch talks between the IBOA and the representatives of the Big Four Banks late on Sunday night, pickets were mounted on Monday morning and what could turn out to be a long and bitter dispute got under way throughout the country.

This is a dispute which no one wanted, least of all the general public who are bound to be discommoded while it can do nothing but harm to the economy and further damage the country's international image abroad. And because of the divisions within the Bank staffs themselves, with some inside working while others are outside pounding the pavements on picket duty, it will create a bitterness that will linger long after the dispute is resolved, as resolved it must be sooner or later.

New Terminal Building For Waterford Airport

Work on the development of the new terminal building at Waterford Regional Airport is scheduled for completion within the next two months and will be opened for public use by the beginning of June.

This was announced by Mr. Tom Sheridan, Chairman, Waterford Regional Airport plc at a preview of the development attended by local journalists on Monday, April 6.

The new two-storey terminal building, for which the foundation stone was laid by former Minister for Tourism, Transport and Communication, Mr. Seamus Brennan T.D. last December, is being developed at a cost of IR£ 1 million.

When completed, the new terminal will be one of the most advanced structures of its kind in Ireland. Designed as an attractive and prestigious facility, it constitutes one of the major elements in the overall development plan proposed for Waterford Regional Airport.

Bed Problem For Big Cycle Race

As the South East's biggest annual sporting event, the John Hearn Memorial Festival Cycle Race, gets bigger and better, so does the problems for Accommodation Officer and Secretary of Carrick-on-Suir Development Association, Mrs. Chris Bartley.

The John Hearn Memorial Race poses big problems this year for Chris and her team. "I just about coped last year with enough beds, as the field last year amounted to about eighty-five riders not to mention team managers, masseurs, mechanics, P.R. people, press, radio, television people, etc., but this year entries are expected to rise to about one hundred and forty."

This predicament leaves Chris in a situation where she is looking for people to

volunteer beds in their homes for the cyclists.

"Not only has the level of entries for the race gone up this year, but so has the amount of spectators who are already phoning for accommodation, and not to forget also that the commercial aspect of the event has risen, to launch the race into massive proportions these days, it costs more to run than the Dublin City Marathon."

"It's a problem I enjoy, the John Hearn Memorial is

more than a bike race now, it is a weekend for all the family, with entertainment for the weekend being provided at Carrick by the whole R.T.E. 2 F.M. team of Simon Young, the crazy Gareth O'Callaghan, Larry Gogan, Ian Dempsey, etc., not to mention the excitement of the race being roared on by Jimmy Magee and George Hamilton," says Mrs. Bartley who says the benefits will also spill over into Waterford and Clonmel where the race also takes place.

Prison Sentence On Speeding Driver Quashed On Appeal

An English company director who had been sentenced to a month in jail and banned from driving for ten years in the District Court after failing to stop for a garda while travelling at 116 miles an hour, had the prison sentence quashed on appeal to Youghal Circuit Court last week.

Conrad George Hawkins (53), of Little Thurlow, Suffolk, appealed against the severity of the District Court penalties.

Garda Ted Cotter of the Traffic Corps told the court that when signalled to stop, the appellant kept going. Witness radioed the gardai in Dungarvan where the defendant was subsequently apprehended.

Judge A. G. Murphy affirmed the dangerous driving conviction and a £500 fine but reduced the driving ban from ten years to one year and also quashed the

prison sentence.

He also affirmed a £100 fine on the speeding charge

but reduced a second concurrent 10-year driving ban to one year.

Abbeyside Scout Notes


PRESENTATIONS

150,000 Visitors Expected To Generate £7 Million For Clonmel During Fleadh Cheoil

Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Eireann are proud to announce the holding of Fleadh Cheoil na hEireann for the very first time in Clonmel, Co. Tipperary's capital town, on August 28/30 next.

Over that weekend the hills of Tipperary will ring to the sounds of 10,000 traditional Irish musicians and performers, including 3,000 competitors. The three-day event, run in association with Guinness, is expected to draw crowds of up to 150,000 from all over Ireland and throughout the rest of the world.

There is intense interest overseas in Fleadh '92 with large contingents expected to travel from North America, Britain, Europe and elsewhere — recently the Fleadh office in Clonmel

had a telephone call from a man in Chile asking to reserve accommodation for him during Fleadh weekend.

From its humble beginnings back in 1951 when the first Fleadh brought a modest handful of hand-core traditional Irish music enthusiasts to Mullingar, Fleadh Cheoil na hEireann has grown into one of Europe's biggest music and cultural festivals. A total of 20,000 bed nights will be needed to accommodate this year's influx to Clonmel.

At a press reception held in Clonmel last Thursday Comhaltas Ceoltoiri director general Labhras O Murchu said that a new feature of the 42nd Fleadh Cheoil this year would be a specially constructed "Fleadh Village" — a cluster of domes

where all competitions will be centred for the convenience of competitor and visitor alike.

Fleadh '92 is expected to generate revenue in the order of £7 million for the local Co. Tipperary economy. This comes as a timely boost, especially since Clonmel's flagship Digital computer industry is preparing to move out of the area in July with the loss of 350 jobs an annual payroll roughly equivalent to the total revenue from the Fleadh.

According to local businessman and Fleadh chairman Des Delahunty, the people of Clonmel are pulling out all the stops and the town is tuning up to make this "the Fleadh to beat all Fleadhanna."

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have some savings in the post office which I would like to leave to a very good friend. Aside from putting this in my Will, is there any other way I can arrange for this?

Answer — Yes! You can arrange to nominate your friend to receive all or whatever amount you wish from your post office account when you die. This is a very simple procedure, it is very effective and there is no cost involved.

You should request a nomination form from the Post Office Savings Bank, College Road, Dublin 2. Specify that you want to nominate one person as there are different forms, depending on whether you want to nominate: (a) one person only, (b) more than one person in equal shares, (c) more than one person in unequal shares.

As this will become a legal document you must have your signature witnessed and the witness cannot be the person you are nominating.

The form should be returned to the Post Office Bank who will issue you with a special receipt with a registered number. You should keep this carefully so that it can be found easily when required.

This nomination takes precedence over a Will and can only be revoked by:

- (1) Notice in writing signed by you in the presence of a witness.
- (2) If you subsequently marry.
- (3) If you make a later nomination.
- (4) If the person you nominated dies.

It is also possible to make a nomination in respect of Savings Certificates but not for Savings Bonds.

Question — Due to an ongoing medical

condition I am disabled and have had to give up my job. It has been suggested that if I refrain I may be able to take up more suitable employment. The problem is that I can not use public transport and would need a car to undertake this retraining. Can you give me details about the Health Board Grant for Disabled People?

Answer — Health Boards can make grants of up to £1,500 to disabled persons to enable them buy or adapt a motor vehicle. Normally these grants are only made available where you actually need a car to hold a job.

Sometimes the grant may be made to a self-employed person or to a person who has not already taken up employment but would be able to do so if transport difficulties were overcome. A grant can sometimes be made to a person living in very isolated circumstances, even though the matter of holding a job does not arise.

There is a means test for this grant and you also require a full driving licence, or be undergoing driving instruction at the Irish Wheelchair Association Driving School.

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

"The employers' argument against the minimum wage is that it will cost jobs but there is not the slightest evidence of this in the other countries where the minimum wage has been established for some time," said Mr. Douglas.



PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

A TRIAL OF STRENGTH THE COUNTRY CAN DO WITHOUT

What can only be described as a trial of strength between the four major commercial banks and their staffs represented by the Irish Bank Officials Association (IBOA) came to a head on Monday last when the IBOA initiated industrial action and placed pickets on bank premises throughout the country. Both sides to the dispute have been jousting at each other for some considerable time on the issues which finally have culminated in the strike action as neither side was prepared to knuckle under or show the flexibility required to reach a settlement.

Judging by the serious consequences experienced by the entire community in 1965 and again in 1976 when similar situations closed the banks there is now once more grave concern across the country. It is a serious situation for the public and especially the business community that such a disruption should now again be taking place.

On Monday night, following the first day of the strike, we had claims and counter-claims being made by the protagonists as to the support each side had received in the opening round. Were the situation

not so serious it might be said to the childishly funny. This is not a time when the banks and their staffs should be involved in such a trial of strength.

They must realise how their action will hit the public if the strike continues. They should also realise that in Ireland, Banks and Bank staffs occupy a most privileged position and that for this they owe a duty of service to the public for the support they receive. Certainly they should not have got themselves involved in a struggle that looks like a fight to the finish and should remember that at present there are 300,000

people in the dole queues up and down the country, representing 1 in 3 of the entire workforce without a job and little or no hope of one.

Apart from the damage a bank strike can do to the economy by placing business concerns, especially the smaller ones in jeopardy, it can do irreparable damage to our reputation abroad also. In all the circumstances then, one thing is for certain, Ireland does not want nor is it geared for a protracted bank strike. We already have enough financial and social problems without adding this to the pile.

THOSE CHAIN LETTERS

Some while back we wrote that the practice of chain letter writing had again reared its ugly head in the Dungarvan area and advised people who may have got one not to be taken in by the dire threats of bad luck which would befall them if they broke the chain by not indulging in the silly practice of making 20 copies of the letter to send on to their friends and acquaintances.

We were surprised and rather perturbed by the reaction to our reference to this practice to learn that it was so widespread throughout the county. Readers from Kilmacthomas, Lismore and Youghal districts contacted us to inform us that they had received one of these letters all signed "St. Jude."

Well last Friday morning we found one ourselves which had been popped in our letter box at the "Leader" Office by some misguided person who had obviously succumbed to the bad luck threats and attempted to send the fool farther. It was a similar copy to the one which we first saw when we referred to it some weeks back

signed "St. Jude." All we can say is that we certainly this one to the waste paper basket, a practice which we are not going to send on would again advise anyone copies and have consigned else so involved to follow.

HEALTH BOARD AFFAIRS

Members of the South Eastern Health Board at their March monthly meeting which was held at the Board headquarters in Kilkenny learned with regret of the impending retirement from office of Mr. P. G. McQuillan who has been Chief Executive Officer of the Board since 1970.

Mr. McQuillan gave notice that he intends to retire from the post as and from the end of June. The Chairman, Cllr. Garry O'Halloran was joined by other members of the Board in paying well deserved tributes to the retiring CEO.

We notice in the schedule of maintenance works for which grants are being provided by the Department of Health to clear up the maintenance backlog that a grant of £40,000 is provided for the upgrading of the kitchen at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan and a grant of £10,000 is listed to upgrade Kilmacthomas Health Centre.

We also note that at the invitation of Cllr. O'Halloran, Chairman of the Board, the new Minister for Health, Dr. John O'Connell has agreed to pay a visit to the Board's hospitals in Waterford City and Dungarvan on Saturday,

April 25.

A full day's schedule has been planned for the Minister's visit which will start at 11 a.m. when Dr. O'Connell will be at the Board's Head Office in Kilkenny to formally launch the "Life-wise" Programme which the Board's Health Education staff are promoting in the south-east.

At 12.45 p.m. the Minister will visit the Regional Hospital in Ardkeen, Waterford where he will lunch in the hospital restaurant and this will be followed by a visit to the Community Care premises in New-

gate Street and the Mall timed for 2.30 p.m.

This will be followed at 3.15 p.m. by the launch by the Minister of two new research booklets published by the Board on mental illness and mental handicap.

The Minister will then conclude his busy day-long programme of appointments when he comes to Dungarvan at 4.30 p.m. to visit St. Joseph's Hospital where he will see for himself the many necessary improvements required and perhaps have something to say about the new hospital proposed for the site.

£52,500 FOR 2.8 ACRE SITE!

The going rate for development sites in the Dungarvan area really looks like going through the roof if the price being sought by the Regional Health Board for land in the Springmount district of the town is anything to go by.

It appears that almost four years ago in October 1988, the Board agreed to sell a 2.8 acre site at Dunabbey House to Dungarvan Urban Council but at the time the Council did not take up the offer. However, the Council has now decided that they are again interested and have so informed the Board.

The matter was discussed at the Board's Special Hospitals Committee meeting in March when it was recommended that the site be sold to the Council at the Valuation Office price of £52,500 subject to a few other provisions.

According to our reckoning this works out at a price per acre of £18,750!

We are aware that when patients were being collected at home that the system was being abused, with people deciding at the last



Forestry In Ireland

In reply to questions asked by Deputy Austin Deasy in the Dail, Minister for Energy, Mr. Molloy stated that the effective forest area of the country on December 31, 1991 represented about 6.7% of all land in the State. Within the EC countries 24% of all land was classified as forest.

Mr. Molloy also told Deputy Deasy that there were 1,772 permanent employees in Coillte Teoranta on January 1, 1992 compared to 1,966 for 1991.

The Minister added that under the national planting programme it was hoped to raise the forest cover in the country to about 10% by the turn of the century.

RE FAMINE GRAVE MONUMENT REILIG A' tSLEIGHE OUTSIDE DUNGARVAN

Sir,
During August 1991, I took my family to visit Reilig a' tSleighe Famine Grave outside Dungarvan town. On arrival we found the Monument to the Famine in a very poor state, so bad that it could qualify as one of the worst kept monuments in the country. The beautiful granite cross was over-grown with briars, furs bushes and nettles. I observed the ladies in the group caught with the briars and stung with nettles, as there was no way through to the cross. It was no place for a lady tourist.

In contrast I visited the graves of the Royal Irish Regiment at Loos, Flanders, France, during 1990, where I saw the graves of the young men who were recruited from the Dungarvan, Fermoy, Waterford and Wexford areas for 1914-1918 war and were killed in the trenches. The graves are laid out in green lawns with rose bushes, and if and when the tomb stones are weather-beaten they are replaced with new ones.

I respectfully suggest that some group, active retirement or tourist body take on the task of having a sculpture modelled depict-

ing the famine, erected at the junction of the main road, with a history of the effect it had on the local community, and what was done to relieve the starving people, inscribed in several languages, so that pilgrims, tourists and passers-by could pay their respects.

I am sure there is money available for a project such as this. There are all kind of statues coming on the streets of Dublin such as Molly Malone, and the Bag Ladies at the Half-Penny Bridge, including heritage Villages in Wexford and all over the north. I believe the Dungarvan people could do better for Reilig a' tSleighe.

I would not like you to think I am intruding, but just as a fresh pair of eyes see it, I make this suggestion.

President Hears Suicide Facts

"There are nearly fifty per cent more suicides among younger people in Ireland than among the middle-aged or elderly, and more proportionally in some rural areas than in the cities," said the Chairman of the Samaritans movement, Mrs. Sheila Coggrave, when representatives of the Irish branches were received by the President, Mrs. Robinson, at Aras an Uachtairin last Friday.

Mrs. Coggrave, from Sunderland, was in Ireland to meet fellow volunteers at the Irish Samaritans conference hosted last weekend in Killarney by the Tralee branch.

The fallacies that suicide is

more common among older people and is a mainly urban problem are not the only ones contradicted by the facts, Mrs. Coggrave said. The belief that "people who talk about ending their lives don't do it" is as dangerous as it is untrue. Conversely it is better to discuss suicide with people at risk, or who have made an attempt, than to avoid the subject.

The 311 deaths by suicide in the Republic in 1990 represented a 23 per cent increase over the 1989 figures, Mrs. Coggrave said. They are now as many as the deaths by accident in the home and are rapidly approaching the road death figures.



Ginger up your lamb with zest

Ginger and Orange Lamb Steaks


Ingredients:
4 New Zealand lamb leg bone steaks, trimmed.
150 ml (1/4 pint) ginger wine



grated zest and juice of 1 orange
4 cloves
1 tbsp chopped crystallised ginger
1 tbsp chopped fresh mint
2 tsp cornflour
Garnish:
fresh mint leaves
orange slices
strips of crystallised ginger
Method:

Fry the steaks quickly in a large ungreased frying-pan until sealed on both sides.

Add the ginger wine, orange, zest and juice, cloves, crystallised ginger and mint. Bring the sauce to the boil, then lower the heat, cover the pan and simmer for 20 minutes until the lamb is tender.



Transfer the lamb steaks to a heated serving dish and keep warm.

In a cup, blend the cornflour with a little water to make a smooth paste. Stir the paste into the sauce. Stirring constantly, bring to the

boil, then lower the heat and simmer until the sauce thickens.

Spoon the sauce over the lamb steaks. Garnish with mint leaves, orange slices and ginger and serve at once. Serves 4.

light. If not, then consider building it at the side of the house or even at the bottom of the garden.

A 'sun deck' away from the house could actually be a lot quieter as well and there's no need to feel cut off if the phone rings — invest in a cordless phone to take with you while sunbathing.

If you want to make the patio secluded by erecting trellises or fencing you should also ensure that you don't block out sunshine as well as prying eyes.

Don't worry if you are overlooked though, because judiciously placed overhead rafters to carry grape vines and creepers can screen out views down onto your patio, while still allowing the best of the sun to the paved area.

Another point in finalising plans is the view from the patio, not just the part of the

garden you would like to see but any views such as the river, the sea, fields or landmarks like churches or castle.

Likewise you should screen out any eyesores such as a belching factory chimney!

If you already have a wall or fence bounding the site then make the most of it by putting up brackets for hanging baskets.

Rather than simply enclosing the rest of the site then make the most of it by putting up brackets for hanging baskets.

Such features can be planted up with cheap but spectacular blooms such as petunias and geraniums flanked by the cascading colours of alyssum and lobelia.

The wall could also have a cut out to take a wide varnished plank serving as a useful seat when lots of peo-

ple are using the patio.

The choice of patio floor is another matter to consider. Concrete is hardwearing but slabs look neater and more attractive, although both will suffer from algae and mess if your patio is too close to a leaf or berry-shedding tree.

It is also worth installing lighting at the outset so that cabling conduits can be hidden in the construction, far easier on the eye and safer than flexes trailed around the patio when lighting is installed as an afterthought.

You then have the option from Day 1 to use the patio for entertaining such as barbecues, and a brick-built 'barbie' is another feature you may wish to build into the patio.

If you thought there wasn't much to do in garden at this time, you were wrong...



Further to Timmy O'Keefe's recent letter concerning the number of G.A.A. games being played in Cork at this time of the year, compared with Waterford's inactivity, I have to hand this week's issue of the "Leinster Leader" which shows side by side the results from last weekend's (March 29) G.A.A. games in Kildare and the fixtures for the coming week.

Last weekend there were 24 games in the senior football league (three divisions), plus nine games in the various underage competitions.

For the coming week, there are no less than 112 (one hundred and twelve) games listed. In football, there are league games at under-10, under-13, under-16 and minor, as well as a series of special competitions at adult level. In hurling there are league games at under-12, under-14, under-16 and senior (two divisions). There are also league games in under-13 camogie (two divisions).

Allowing for dual players, I reckon that well over a thousand players will have fielded out in Gaelic games in the county over the two

weeks. The above list does not include the leagues in junior football and hurling, adult camogie and minor hurling, which are due to begin shortly. Most of these players will be playing regular competitive matches at least until September (much longer in the case of the senior football league).

It just shows you what can be done.

WATERFORD v. CORK

Cork hurlers will come to Dungarvan on Sunday evening next to play a game against Waterford in aid of development funds for Fraher Field at 6.30 p.m. Cork are very keen on playing

the game and are treating it as a trial before meeting Limerick in the league semi-final in two weeks time. They have promised to field a full team and are anxious that Waterford would do likewise.

Many of our supporters who have been unable to travel to see Waterford in action against Cork in two 'away' matches this year, will be given an opportunity here of seeing the sides in action. If the game is nearly as good as the game at Thurles two weeks ago, it will certainly be a cracker and very well worth seeing.

A big attendance will help our field development fund.

CONGRESS

Annual Congress which was held in Dublin over the weekend, brought about no big changes and generally it was a quiet affair and was finished in record time. For the first time in over 40 years, we had no Sunday session and all the business was completed on Saturday.

NEED FOR REGULAR GAMES

This was a subject which is of interest to our county, in view of the recent debate on the structuring of the championships. It was dealt with in the annual report and was also clearly emphasised by the President in his address. Liam Mulvihill could have had counties like Waterford in mind when he wrote: "It was disappointing during the year to learn that a lot of

counties still don't have proper league structures in place to guarantee the average player a good series of regular games. In fact some of the counties have still got a deplorable structure from the point of view of organisation of regular games and it is little wonder that other games are gaining ground in such areas.

"In other counties where there is good competition structures, pressure from county team management often leads to postponements of domestic club competitions for several weeks in some cases because of the involvement of one or two players. We are bound to lose players to other codes as long as we adopt such a cavalier attitude towards the

vast majority of our players i.e. those playing the game at club level.

"All our attempts to continue to support the nurseries of our games (the schools) and to improve the quality of coaching structures and of playing facilities will be a failure unless we organise regular games for our players and that we ensure that they are carried out as planned. Each Provincial Council should investigate this aspect as a matter of urgency and see that remedial action is taken where required." In saying this, he was re-echoing what many speakers said here during the big debate.

DECISIONS
The size of logos to be worn on team jerseys may

now be doubled in size as a result of the success of a Wexford motion.

Dublin based or born players may now declare for the county in which either of his parents were born. This can help counties with declining populations and it will prove a benefit to Dublin players who because of the huge numbers playing there, would stand little chance of making the Dublin county teams.

Croke Park and other G.A.A. pitches will not be available to other sports as a result of the complete failure of the motions from Sligo and London. These motions got less than ten per cent of the Congress vote.

The motion seeking to have a games ban imposed in addition to the normal suspension was given great support, but there were flaws in the wording that would make it very difficult to implement. The motion was referred to Central Council for examination and will be reintroduced next year.

Only nine of the 30 listed motions were passed.

At the Congress Waterford were represented by Eamon Murphy, Chairman, Jimmy O'Gorman, Western Board Chairman, Anthony Walsh, secretary do., James Tobin, former county chairman, Tommy Hennessy, Munster Council Rep. and Tommy Mooney, Kill.



Intermediate Championships

We are certain of seeing some very exciting fare in the six intermediate hurling championship games and forecasting the results of some of these is not an easy task.

SHAMROCKS V. MOLLERANS

This is one I have in mind when predicting a very close contest. The sides gave us one of the most exciting clashes of last year's championships when they played an exciting draw (Mollerans 3-3, Shamrocks 2-6) at the Fraher Field.

This time they meet on strange ground (Stradbally) and this is unlikely to make a big difference, so no one will be very surprised if there is not another sharing of the points.

ERIN'S OWN V. RING

Ring could have picked a better one than Erin's Own for their baptism of fire in the intermediate championships, but it won't surprise me if we see the Gaeltacht side holding their own here. Many people believe that without county full back Damien Byrne,

Erin's Own would be a very moderate intermediate side and I could go along with this opinion. Just now Byrne is not playing as well as he did last season and if he is not at his very best, Ring could cause a surprise here.

ABBEYSIDE V. STRADBALLY

Last year when the sides met in a first round tie in this championship, Abbeyside won very decisively on a scoreline of 5-7 to 2-3, but only after Stradbally conceded a couple of soft goals.

The county champions, Dungarvan were well held and enjoyed but a slender lead at half-time, but they turned on the style in a great second half to win decisively and prove to all and sundry that there will be no surrendering of their title this year. Clashmore fielded a young team and played some very good football in the second half. They will win matches this season and may even qualify for the knock-out stages.

Ballinacourty, with the aid of the light wind, led by 0-6 to 0-3 at half-time and looked as if they might manage to win, but were overpowered in the second half when the Passage East based side got into their stride. Anthony Fitzgerald, who was player of the year at county level two years ago, was in tremendous form and scored a total of 1-7. Clubmate Mossy O'Keefe also had a good game for the winners, scoring 0-3. Ballinacourty scored only once in the second half and will need a lot of improvement if they are to be serious contenders later on.

Dunhill put up a good show in this one at Portlaw, but as predicted they found Rathgormack to be too much of a handful, as will several others before the championship is decided. Four very well taken goals made the difference and to some extent showed the dif-
