Council Approves New Plan For Dungarvan Car Parks

Dungarvan Urban Council's two non-pay car parks at Davitt's Quay and Friary Street are to be operated under licence by a private company on a "pay-as-you-park" basis and under an initial one-year agreement.

The decision was taken at last Monday night's meeting of the Council after a lengthy discussion during which Cllr. Tony Wright said that if the UDC had decided to take over the operation of the car parks on a commercial basis

much needed additional jobs would be created.

In a report to the meeting, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that there had been only one reply received to an advertisement seeking tenders to operate the two car parks on a "pay-as-you-park" basis.

The Manager disclosed that the sole tenderer was Mr. Michael Carroll of King Street, Abbeyside, trading as Dungarvan Car Parks Ltd.

Mr. Hurley said that fol-

lowing discussions with Mr. Carroll, general terms had been agreed for the operating of the car parks under licence from the UDC for a one-year period — subject to a review by either party after six months.

The Manager also disclosed that the Company will pay an annual rent of £5,000, in addition to rates, to the UDC in respect of each car park, while the Company will also provide the necessary equipment and staff to control and run the operation.

Mr. Hurley went on to state that Dungarvan Car Parks Ltd. would be responsible for the maintenance and cleanliness of the car parks to the satisfaction of the UDC, while persons who presently have rights of access to them for business purposes will be accommodated by the company. He added that the parking charge will be determined by the Company.

Cllr. Wright expressed

Green Light For New Shopping Complex In Dungarvan?

The closure of the well-known licensed premises which has been in the ownership of the Ducey family at Main Street, Dungarvan for several decades during the past couple of weeks marks the end of an era associated with old Dungarvan.

In those days Main Street was the principal centre of commercial activity in the town with Mulchay's Drapery business among the leading concerns employ-

ing quite a large staff in the various departments incorporated within the spacious premises.

The passage of time and the passing of the senior members of the Mulcahy family took its toll on the business which eventually and to the great regret of most of the older generation of the town closed its doors. Since then the premises has continued to fall into disrepair to the extent that it had become an eyesore.

Then some years ago — we are unable to say how many off the record — news in the grapevine told

of a new outside interest in the premises and of some other adjoining and nearby shops on the same side of the street to be purchased for the development of a new shopping complex to extend from the Main Street back on to the car park at the rear.

The developers were The Irish Nationwide Building Society, who, we understand, were interested in establishing their own permanent offices in the town as part of the development. Negotiations were opened and options signed in the case of most of the con-

Civic Reception To Mark Departure Of Christian Brothers From Dungarvan

Dungarvan Urban Council will mark the impending departure of the Christian Brothers after 185 years in the town with a Civic Reception in the Sports Centre on Friday, May 8, it was disclosed at the Council's monthly meeting held last Monday night.

The Civic Reception, which will be open to the general public, will be followed by a special Mass of Thanksgiving in St. Mary's Parish Church which will be celebrated by Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.

Mr. Bertie White, Town Clerk, also disclosed that the Civic Reception will be preceded by a parade from the County Council's administrative offices to the Sports Centre headed by Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band. There will also be a recital by the local Pipe Band.

Mr. White said a commemorative plaque will be unveiled and will later be put on permanent display at

the C.B.S. There will be addresses by Civic and Church leaders, and a presentation will be made to the departing Brothers "as a gesture of appreciation of their unceasing and untiring work in the education of the children of Dungarvan."

"We are asking the townspeople to observe May 8 as "C.B.S. Day" and we are also asking that business premises be decorated as for other occasions of celebration," he said.

Mr. White added that all the local social and sports organisations are being asked to join in the expression of thanks and appreciation to the departing Brothers.

Europe Day In Gibraltar

[May 5]

Tuesday, May 5 will be "Europe Day" and in Gibraltar it is the Patronal Feast of Our Lady of Europa, when pilgrims will flock to the famous Shrine to Our Lady of Europa at the southern end of the Rock — a Shrine with a stormy history. It was originally a Mosque turned "guardroom" "storeroom" "derelict building" and then — a Christian place of worship after a lapse of 276 years.

In the centuries gone by, a light from the Christian shrine shone out to sea and passing ships would fire a salvo in salute. The shrine often received costly gifts, especially lamps. The great Juan Andreas Doria, son of the famous Genoese sailor, a commander of a Christian fleet, presented the shrine with large silver oil lamps, which was the only treasure saved from pillage in 1704. In times of danger, the shrine was a place of refuge for the old, the infirm, women and their children.

In later times, the shrine was stripped of its treasures and its venerated statue of the Virgin and Child flung on to the rocks below. This famous statue is a small, carved in wood, only two feet high polychromed in red, blue and gold. The Virgin is seated on a simple chair, the Child on her lap. Both wear crowns. In Mary's right hand is a sceptre with three flowers at the top, denoting — Love, Truth and Justice.

As the statue was made of wood it floated out to sea, later to be rescued by a Spanish fisherman who took it to a local padre. The Child was destroyed and fearing further mutilation the padre had the statue removed to Algeris where it remained for 160 years. The shrine then ceased to be a place of prayer.

Over a century ago, at the first Vatican Council, the Pope-Pius IX took an interest in the Shrine, offering help and a temporary shrine was completed in May 1866. The statue — with a new Child, carved in Seville was brought in a triumphal

procession to the grounds of the Convent of Mount Alvernia. In 1939, it was transferred to the Cathedral of St. Mary. In 1954, it was moved to the Church at Europa Point and in 1961, through the good offices of the Bishop, the old mosque building was returned to the Church and the statue now holds pride of place in the beautiful shrine of Europa Point, lovingly cared for by Mgr. Louis Orfila under the guiding hand of the present Bishop of Gibraltar, Youghal born, Bishop Bernard Devlin.

Europe Day in Gibraltar brings great celebrations, both at the famous Shrine - but - also in the port. Gibraltar is more than a massive rock guarding the entrance to the Mediterranean. It is also the gateway to two continents. In a matter of minutes — you can be in Africa or Europe — and now that the "curtain" between Spain and Gibraltar has been removed — the crowds coming to celebrate will be bigger and more colourful than ever.

The "Rock" is a city in miniature, offering the holiday maker a little of everything. It is a place to relax in-too, far from the rush of "so much to see."

For me, there is no more peaceful haven — than in quiet contemplation — in the Cathedral of St. Mary, the Crowned, right in the heart of the Main Street. The Cathedral — originally built as a mosque by the Moors in the 13th century and dramatically converted into a church by the Spaniards in 1462.

The Cathedral is under the care of genial Mgr. Caruna.

Last November, I visited Gibraltar with my friend, Kathleen Barron (who hails from down Touraneena way). We were guests of Bishop Bernard Devlin and Monsignor Caruna — delightful hosts who treated us in true Irish and Spanish style.

Later we attended Holy Mass at the Shrine of Our

Lady of Europa at Europa Point — celebrated by my good friend, Monsignor Louis Orfila — who tends the Shrine with loving care. During the Mass — a treasured surprise — my Hymn To Our Lady of Europa was sung.

We had a very happy day — with golden memories as we sailed away in the golden evening to far-away places.



Prestigious Award For Cappoquin Artist

Local Cappoquin artist, Arthur Maderson has won the coveted 'Abbey Studio Award,' at this year's prestigious Royal Hibernian Academy, Dublin. The award was for "work of outstanding distinction in any medium," the painting was a large oil entitled 'At Lismore Bridge.'

The annual Royal Hibernian Academy exhibition is the highlight of the artistic calendar, and this year nearly 5,000 works from Ireland, U.K. and Europe were submitted for consideration. This total was eventually whittled down to 613 who are actually accepted for hanging.

Arthur's success at the Academy, closely follows a recent invitation by Cork's

Arts Society for him to contribute work towards an all Ireland travelling exhibition by major artists, to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the Society. This exhibition will take place in 1993 and will be opened by the Irish President, Mrs. Mary Robinson.

Some friends of the late George Plant from Ballymacarbry attended the commemoration ceremony to mark the 50th anniversary of the execution of the Tipperary I.R.A. Protestant Leader, in Portlaoise Prison. The commemoration took place at St. Johnstown Churchyard, Fethard.

The oration was given by Malachy McCresh whose brother Raymond sacrificed his life in the Long Kesh hunger strike in 1981.

In the course of his address he paid tribute to George Plant who faced the firing squad some fifty years ago after a mockery of a trial.

The organising committee have published a special booklet to mark the occasion. It is an attractive, well produced publication and it contains some material and photos of the period. The controversial legal proceedings surrounding George Plant's trial before the special Military Tribunal in 1942 are referred to, and it is also interesting to note that he was defended by the

late Sean McBride S.C. The proceedings were jointly Chaired by Mr. Enda O'Riordan, Clonmel and formerly of Newcastle and by Mr. Patrick O'Donnell, Kilconnell. The proceedings ended with the Colour Party standing to attention as a lone piper played the National Anthem.

Further Moves To Provide New Cemetery For Dungarvan

Cllr. Tony Wright told last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council that there will be "massive opposition" to any move to acquire by Compulsory Purchase Order a strip of C.B.S. owned land for additional burial ground space adjoining the existing parish cemetery.

In a report to the meeting the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, disclosed details of his ongoing efforts to acquire land for a new burial ground in Dungar-

van parish. He listed eight sites which had been investigated and for various reasons were not available or were deemed to be unsuitable.

The eight included — (1) Reilig A tSle, (2) Sheridan's land at Kilrush, (3) Declan Foley's land at Ballinamuck, (4) Vincent Morrissey's land at Ballinamuck Middle, (5) C.B.S. land at Youghal Road; (6) Dan Foley's land at Kilrush, (7) Dungarvan G.A.A. land at Clogherane and (8) land at Kilossera.

Mr. Hurley went on to disclose that in the last number of months he has had negotiations with the Presentation Sisters concerning the availability of a portion of their land fronting on to the

Youghal Road and incorporating the present Convent burial ground. The Presentation Sisters however were not disposed to release the land.

Mr. Hurley went on to say that he had also met with representatives of the Parish Council and following a very fruitful meeting it was decided that the amount of grave space required to accommodate burials for the next twenty to twenty-five years would be somewhere in the region of 250 to 300.

"The annual requirement for new grave spaces is less than ten, and allowing for an initial purchase of 20 or 30 grave spaces the above requirement should not entail a large land acquisition," said Mr. Hurley.

ACQUIRE BY AGREEMENT

Mr. Hurley said that to this end it was decided to again approach the C.B.S. with a view to acquiring by agreement a strip of land about 12 metres wide parallel to the western boundary wall of the present graveyard attached to the Parish Church. This, he said, would provide a total of 327 grave spaces.

The Manager went on to say that as a second option he is about to appoint a consultant to carry out a hydrological survey of the Dungarvan G.A.A. Club lands at Clogherane (with the club's permission) to establish if any of the lands at present on the market would be deemed to be suitable for use as a burial ground without having an effect on the Council's water supply scheme at nearby Springmount.

The Manager concluded by saying that in the event of not being able to conclude any of these proposals by agreement he will be recommending that the Council nominate the most suitable land for acquisition by Compulsory Purchase Order.

"This procedure," Mr. Hurley added, "is totally acceptable to the representatives of the Parish Council."

Cllr. Wright warned however that there will be "massive opposition" against any Council move to acquire the C.B.S. land by Compulsory Purchase Order.

He said the land is the only green belt the C.B.S. has and the school is presently catering for 700 students and needs every square foot of the land it has. There were a number of possible alternative sites that he could support acquiring but definitely not the C.B.S. land.

Cllr. R. Walsh agreed and said his fear would be that the strip of land they were hoping to acquire could mean that the school's second playing field would be ruined. "If that is so then I won't go along with the proposal," he added.

The Manager reminded the Councillors that they had been seeking land for a new burial ground in Dungarvan for eight years. If they could acquire it by agreement fine, but if not the nettle would then have to be grasped and that could mean a CPO.

Cllr. Billy Kyne proposed that the Manager activate discussions with the C.B.S. representatives and report back on the outcome to a future meeting.

Cllr. Paddy Power seconded this proposal which was then unanimously agreed to.

Paddy McMahon, Dungarvan Chamber PRO explained, "it's an opportunity for business people within the county to get business from each other and to support Waterford by retaining and/or creating new jobs at home."

Mr. Stephen O'Connor, Managing Director, Waterford Foods plc., will deliver the main address during the evening while Mr. Jim Ryan, President, Dungarvan Chamber, Mr. Peter Hudson, President Waterford Chamber and Mr. Jim Taaffe, Manager, West Waterford Partnership Ltd. will also speak.

1991 Was Year of Considerable Progress For Waterford Foods plc

In the preliminary announcement of results for the year ended December 31, 1991, Waterford Foods plc stated on Tuesday that the year was one of considerable progress with record profits and continued expansion of the group.

Profits before taxation increased by 40% to £15.8 million as compared to £11.30 million in 1990 while earnings per share rose to 9.37p, an increase of 48% on the previous year.

Proposal To Honour Cycling Feats Of Robert Power

The father of ace County Waterford cyclist Robert Power of Dungarvan has opposed a move to have his son commemorated in bronze in perpetuity.

Cllr. Paddy Power told last Monday night's meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council that while his son's day may yet come to be so honoured, now is not that time.

The members were considering a communique from a P.R. company acting on behalf of I.C.I. Ireland Ltd. who have challenged the general public to nominate someone or some event to be commemorated in bronze in perpetuity.

Cllr. Mary Dixon said she had no hesitation in nomi-

nating Cllr. Power's son Robert, whose cycling exploits have brought him to the forefront of Irish amateur cycling and had earned great distinction for his home town, county and country.

Cllr. Power, however, said that while he appreciated Cllr. Dixon's proposal he could not go along with it.

He said his son's day may yet come but he believed the Council should nominate another cyclist, Sean Kelly, for the honour. "Sean Kelly is a Waterford man whose name is revered

throughout the sporting world and I know of no one more deserving to be honoured in this way than he" said Cllr. Power.

When Cllr. Billy Kyne proposed that they nominate Sean Kelly, Cllr. Power said he was very glad to second it.

Cllr. Dixon then withdrew her proposal to allow Sean Kelly's nomination to be unanimous, but she reiterated that the Council should, at sometime in the future, seek to gain for Robert Power the recognition that is his due.


TALENT SHOW

The Maastricht Treaty is essentially a political matter and must be dealt with as such and those efforts to confuse the issues at stake by the introduction of moral problems which can be otherwise dealt with at an other time should be ignored.

In these times when there is so much talk about what is termed 'productivity' it came as rather a surprise to us that there is still an area where old fashioned, out-moded practices are still in vogue and demanded as a right by those to whom it pertains.

Abbeyside To Have Its Own Pharmacy

The manner in which Abbeyside has developed in recent years is now further high-lighted by the news that the well-known Kellys Pharmacy of Dungarvan is to extend to the Causeway, Abbeyside.

News to hand is that an upmarket store is planned to open there shortly offering a service which would seem to be long overdue in this fast expanding suburb of Dungarvan.

We have no doubt but that the people of Abbeyside will extend a cordial welcome to such a welcome venture.

Holiday Week-end which saw many offices closed for business from Friday until Tuesday morning, there were still a much more privileged group who had an additional day to extend the holiday period.

This privilege extends to the country's civil servants who have an extra day off work after a long week-end such as we had over the recent Easter Bank Holiday. Thus, Government offices were all again empty on the Tuesday after the Bank Holiday and even the telephone switchboards went unmanned.

It appears that what is known as a "privilege day" in civil service language dates to the early part of the century when it was reckoned to take a full day's travel for many civil servants to get back to the capital, the seat of government, from their homes in the country.

Never ones to give up a precedent, the civil service still maintains the privilege even in an era when it is possible to travel half way round the world within a day. A somewhat similar situation applies where local authority employees, in this county at any rate, maintain another similar old privilege

of not working on Church Holydays although the church, moving with the times and making provision for those who do have to work on Church Holydays now discharge the obligation of attending Mass on Church Holydays

as on Sundays by the facility of a Vigil Mass.

But don't these privileges for civil servants and local authority employees in these times when there is such stress placed on the need for more productivity really take the biscuit?

ILLEGAL USE OF DAIL PRE-PAID ENVELOPES

We were pleased to note during the past week that the Dail Committee on Procedures and Privileges is to launch an investigation into the use of over 2,000 Oireachtas pre-paid envelopes by what has been described as the Pro-Life Campaign in Waterford City. At the time one of these pre-paid envelopes reached us at the "Leader" Office and we at once realised that this was an abuse of privilege.

Since then it has transpired that a total of 2,000 of these envelopes containing literature from the Pro-Life Campaign people were sent through the post and

naturally there has been widespread criticism of this blatant abuse of taxpayers' money for it is the taxpayer who has and does foot the bill for the printing and the posting costs of these envelopes — nothing is for free!

It has not as yet come to light where all these envelopes have come from. Newly appointed Minister of State, Brendan Kenneally T.D. has admitted that he was approached to give some envelopes but said that he refused to give any as "it would be illegal" for him to do so. Senator Martin Cullen concurred with the Minister's view while Senator Donie Ormonde described such an approach as "most serious in view of the Treaty Referendum." Likewise similar views were expressed on behalf of Deputy Jackie Fahey and Deputy Brian O'Shea while Deputy Austin Deasy has stated that he had no idea where the envelopes had come from and considered the entire affair as a very serious abuse of privilege.

In the circumstances we believe that it is only right and proper that these envelopes should be sourced out to see who is behind this abuse of privilege and we trust that the investigation to be carried out by the Dail Committee on Procedures and Privileges within the next few weeks will reveal this.

AN UNEXPECTED TURN ABOUT

A planned schedule for our Easter Week-end took a sudden and unexpected turnabout when yours truly experienced a rather serious epistaxis early on Easter Saturday. So, instead of watching some stages of the Circuit of Ireland locally we found ourselves being ferried at speed to the E.N.T. Unit at the Waterford Regional Hospital, at Ardkeen, Waterford, for emergency treatment.

We want to say that what had to be done was done and in due course after a few days we were discharged and returned home. Boxes, tubs and baskets

WHETHER you are a keen gardener or merely want to brighten up your small piece of yard, now is the time to act.

With just a little preparation you can create riots of colour and foliage using window boxes, tubs and hanging baskets.

The simple yet clever trick is to group plants of different heights - tall ones to give the display depth, shorter ones to hide any bare compost, and trailing ones to cascade down the sides.

Here are a few suggestions for the various roles:

Tall or specimen plants - bushy fuchsias, smaller varieties of African Marigold, zonal-type pelargoniums, or tuberous begonias - fragile, but stunning to look at.

Space fillers - French Marigolds and tagetes, salvia, fibrous-rooted begonias, bush varieties of lobelia, alyssum, ageratum, Busy Lizzie or impatiens, and petunias.

Trailers - lobelia, fuchsia, ivy, ivy leafed geraniums,



petunias and trailing begonias.

Not that you have to go for flowers - variegated ivy, Spider Plant, coleus, Flame Nettle and other colourful variegated varieties can give a stunning display.

And many people create miniature herb gardens in tubs and containers, which give pleasure to look at as well as a supply of fresh herbs.

Of course, cramming all these plants into compact spaces requires good preparation followed by good care, because the inmates will be highly competitive over water and nutrients.

Choose a rich compost that will hold moisture,

such as John Innes No. 2 or one which is specifically advertised for container growing.

It is worth spending the money if you are also spending out on a lot of plants for your display. In the case of tubs, punch out or clear drain holes and then lay broken crocks or pieces of pot over them to prevent soil spilling through, while still allowing water to escape.

Top those with at least an inch of coarse material such as sand, shingle or gravel to further enhance drainage and prevent water gathering and rotting your display.

Then fill and firm down a layer of compost to within 3-4 inches of the rim before planting, starting with the larger specimen type plants before filling in at the edges with the likes of lobelia.

As you go, firm the plants in place using fresh compost to build up around them so that the rim ends up being just an inch or so above the soil.

Hanging baskets need different treatment to prevent them drying out in air above ground level, so they are traditionally lined with Sphagnum Moss.

But the moss is sometimes hard to come by and expensive, so many people improvise using black polythene sheet with holes cut for drainage and to allow trailing plants to be poked through.

Some gardeners also prefer to buy one of the new style plastic hanging tubs with built-in water drip tray - not so easy on the eye or convenient for trailers, but definitely easy to start and keep watered.

Despite all your precautions, keep a close watch on the soil moisture in your containers and especially hanging baskets. If you go away then arrange for someone reliable to take over the duties - it only takes a few hours on a scorching summer day to ruin your displays.

A Devonshire treat

THINK of summer and you might very well think of afternoon teas, maybe even on the lawn. And think of summer afternoon teas and you might very well think of:

Devonshire Splits

Ingredients:

for the ferment:
1 large egg, beaten
7½ fl oz. (25g) fresh yeast
4 oz (100/125g) strong white flour
½ oz (15g) sugar

for the dough:
14 oz (400g) strong white flour
¼ tsp salt
3 oz (75g) sugar
2 oz (50g) soft butter



Method:

THE FERMENT: Mix the egg and enough warm water to make about ½ pint (275/300ml) of liquid.

Now mix the yeast into a smooth paste using 3 tablespoons of the liquid, and whisk in the flour and sugar to make a smooth batter. Cover and put it somewhere warm (maybe the airing cupboard, or in the sunlight in the kitchen) for about 30

minutes, until it has risen.

THE DOUGH: Sieve the flour and salt into a large bowl, and make a well in the middle. Put the sugar in this well and carefully pour the ferment onto the sugar. Stir gently making sure the sugar is dissolved and then draw in the flour and mix to make a sticky dough.

Now knead in the butter until you've got a nice smooth dough. Shape into a ball and place in a warmed, greased bowl. Cover and leave to rise in a warm place for about 45 minutes.

Divide into 18 equal lumps and mould these lumps individually into small balls, which you then roll into about 3in (8cm) discs. Fold

the discs in half and place on a warmed, greased baking dish, well spaced out.

Cover with greased polythene and put into a warm place for 40 minutes to rise.

When all that's done you're ready for the baking. Preheat the oven to 230°C (450°F), Gas Mark 8, then bake them for 10 mins.

Locally, in the West Country where they originate, they're left to cool and then broken open and filled with local cream and home-made strawberry jam.

You can use any good cream and jam and, after dusting with icing sugar, they're ready.





Well Holy God! Tá 'Soap' Nua Ag Teach

Devotees of television 'soaps' are in for a treat early next year when RTE brings a new pilot programme to the screens. Set in the west of Ireland and in a Dublin suburb, it will chart the lives of two related groups of people in their early twenties. If the pilot is well received, it will lead later in 1993 to a series that will broadcast in quarter-hourly programmes at prime time viewing, five nights a week.

But there will be an added bonus for viewers of this series because they will also have an opportunity to brush up on their Irish. In a joint venture with Údarás na Gaeltachta, the new series will be the first original Irish language 'soap' to be produced by RTE.

Few details of the plot are available at present, except that it will be based mainly on the lives of two groups of people in their early twenties, "living" in a Gaeltacht area in the West of Ireland and a Dublin suburb that has a Gaelscoil, or all-Irish school.

Welcoming the initiative, Údarás na Gaeltachta chief executive Ruán O Bric stated, "the pilot and the series itself will provide valuable employment opportunities for a substantial number of Gaeltacht people who have been trained in audio-skills. This will underpin the continuing development of a strong audio-visual infrastructure in the Gaeltacht, which in turn is paving the way for the eventual appearance of an Irish language tv service."

The census returns show that over one million people can speak Irish and it is these that are the core target group for the new series.



Huge Football Programme Listed For Decision

WESTERN BOARD ADULT CHAMPIONSHIPS BEGIN

With the senior football championships resuming and the intermediate and junior football championships getting underway, it is going to be a very busy week-end for most clubs and particularly for those who are doubly engaged in senior and junior.

A look at the programme will tempt many into predicting that some of the best and most attractive matches of the entire senior football championship are in prospect over the coming days.

DUNGARVAN v. RATHGORMACK

This is one of the matches that I had in mind when writing the above and if it is as exciting as was last season's clash between them at Leamybrien, I can advise with justification that it is a match not to be missed on Saturday evening at Kilmacthomas.

In their last meeting, Rathgormack who had won four out of their five matches up to this, were well in front at half time and looked to be cruising to a deserved victory, before Dungarvan's two second half goals, both resulting from amazing defensive blunders by the goalkeeper and full-back. The final score was 3-4 to 0-9.

Dungarvan had a very impressive second half against Clashmore in their first round match and Rathgormack impressed their supporters when beating Dunhill by a four goal margin on the same day.

Dungarvan, the county champions, will be favourites and at full strength must be given the vote to win, but Rathgormack, who won the under 21 football title in 1989 are an improving team and a very ambitious one to boot. They will have Martin, Ger and David Power, Tom and Denis Hassett, Brendan Curry, Denis Crotty and co. to make things difficult for the champions. This is not a pressure game since the losers will have ample opportunity of qualifying later in the season.

NIRE v. SLIABH gCUA

This is the lone game listed for the Fraher Field on Sunday afternoon and it is a pity that there is not a curtain-raiser to the clash between these adjoining sides who hail from the same parish. In previewing the 1989 senior and intermediate county finals in which

the Nire and Sliabh gCua were pitted against Kilrossanty and Portlaw respectively, I wrote that Sliabh gCua and the Nire were from neighbouring parishes, but on the programme of that game, club secretary Pat Hearne went to great lengths to point out that the clubs were from the same parish. It is therefore very interesting to find that two senior football clubs from the same base are in opposition here.

Sliabh gCua played in the senior championship when it was a knockout competition back in '82, '83 and '84 and met the Nire in one of those seasons. They are now back in senior ranks as a result of their hectic win over Newtown in last year's intermediate final which was played in a rainstorm at Fraher Field.

They began well enough this year in senior grade and with a bit of luck might have surprised Stradbally. In Tom Condon, John Hallinan, Sean Kerins, Roger McGrath, Brendan Tobin, John Fitzpatrick, Kieran Hallahan, Pa Hallinan, Pat Hearne, Gerard Butler and Michael Butler, etc., they have a very dedicated group of experienced players who will go all out to stretch the Nire to the limits.

The Nire are probably the most popular of the championship underdogs because of their record of hard luck in recent times, but being wise enough to appreciate that hard luck or popularity don't count on the scoreboards, the Nire intend this to be a season of no mistakes. This is their first one of '92 as they had a bye in the first round, but they have played a number of challenge and tournament games in preparation for the season. With players of the high calibre of Tom and the two Pat Walshes, Tony Condon, Tom and Michael Guiry, Sean Guiry (goal), Owen Wall, Kevin Mulcahy, Ian Walsh, Ger Coffey, Jackie Hogan, Ger Walsh, etc., the more experienced Nire are likely to prove too good for the new intermediate champions here.

BALLINACOURTY v. DUNHILL

I expected to be writing a match report on this one which was scheduled to be played on Sunday last. Some problem or other brought the fixture forward to Saturday, but then something else happened and the

game was postponed until this weekend and will now go ahead as a curtain-raiser to the very attractive Kilrossanty v. Kilmacthomas game at Stradbally.

In previewing the game last week I wrote that there was very little between them on their most recent form and nothing has happened to change this. Both teams play well on the Stradbally ground, so hopefully both will be able to give of their best. Ballinacourty full back Joe Riordan is still not fit enough to resume and this will have its effect on the team's chances, but nevertheless with some improvement on their form against Gaultier, they may just about get by.

KILMACTHOMAS v. KILROSSANTY

This is another match that may be remembered as one of the highlights of the 1992 football championship and I feel sure that it will if both produce their best form. Each had a decisive win in first round matches and while Kilrossanty may have looked the more impressive of the two when scoring an eight points win over Butlerstown than were Kilmac' in beating Tramore by four points in a goal-less game on the same day, I would not rely too much on these games as a guide to what the sides can produce when in opposition.

Kilrossanty who are believed to be making an all-out attempt to regain the title, which they last won when beating the Nire in '89 led by the experienced Jim Maher, Pierre White, Roger Power, Tom Behan, Pat Prendergast, Greg Fitzgerald, Tom Veale, Roger Kirwan, Ray Hallissey, Pat Hayes and company will be very difficult to beat but they will find Kilmacthomas quite a handful if they strike the same kind of form which saw them take Stradbally by storm in Leamybrien late last year (and when it was too late for Kilmac' to recover lost ground in the championship.) They will have John Power, Eddie and Michael Rockett, Derry Kiely, Tom Joe Power, Nick Power, Jessie Whelan, John Browne, Derry Casey and other skilled men to back-bone a side that certainly looked very promising at the back end of last year. If Kilmac' can continue this rate of improvement they can be strongly in contention this year. This will

be their big test and it will be most interesting to see how they fare in what promises to be a splendid contest.

STRADBALLY v. BUTLERSTOWN

This goes on at Leamybrien on Friday evening and it looks to be one of the weekend matches that might produce a surprise. I know that those who saw Stradbally struggle to beat Sliabh gCua at Fraher Field three weeks ago will not strongly fancy the chances of Stradbally here. Last year the sides met at the same stage and Stradbally came off the field counting their blessings after their great escape and good luck which saw them come off winners on a 1-12 to 1-11 scoreline.

Butlerstown who finished way ahead of Stradbally in the scoring chart last year (83 as against 72 in the league section) will see this game as their big chance of getting back into championship contention and if they take all their chances, they may surprise Stradbally. Butlerstown lost their first match to Kilrossanty.

ST. SAVIOURS v. GAULTIER

This game between those Eastern rivals will bring a big crowd to Tramore on Friday evening and there will be all-round disappointment if it is not a cracker of a match. When they last met in the 1990 championship, Gaultier surprised their more favoured opponents when beating them by 1-7 to 0-6 in what was described as a tremendous game of football.

Saviours had a bye in round one in which Gaultier showed good form in beating Ballinacourty. Both teams in next Sunday's clash have players who have won football championships in all underage grades. Saviours will have Tony Corcoran, Alan Green, Liam Daniels, Derek Wyse, Brendan Brophy, Alan Power, Paul O'Keefe, Michael O'Brien, Mark Boyle, all of whom have worn the county jersey and Gaultier will have a younger team with Anthony and Paul Fitzgerald, Liam Power, Fergal Hartley, David Frampton, Nial Warren, John Flynn, Liam Power, Cormack Sweeney, etc. and will fancy their chances of winning their second match on the trot at the expense of their rivals. I believe that this can happen.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The divisional intermediate battle for this title begins in earnest over the week-end with four attractive

games down for decision. The championship this year and for the first time, is being played in a one section league and with four qualifying for the knockout stages there will be no great pressure on teams at this stage. I know quite well that this is a dangerous attitude to adopt, but it is a fact of life with most clubs when they know that they have each to play seven matches.

At Tallow, Shamrocks, who defeated Brickeys by 2-13 to 2-5 in their first round meeting last year, will be strongly fancied to beat Ardmore.

Brickeys and Ballinameela clash at the Old Parish venue and this could be a close encounter. Ballinameela had two early draws last year, before losing by a couple of points to Faha in the third round. They could take this one.

Ring will be looking forward to celebrating their return to intermediate ranks by beating Affane in the evening game at Fraher Field. It will take a lot of improving on last year's form if Affane are going to win this. On all known recent form, the Gaeltacht team, again trained by David Kiely, must be fancied.

Faha suffered a number of losses at the transfers meeting this year, but it is not likely to weaken their team as much as was first believed. Their experience in senior ranks before their relegation this year, will be an advantage to them against the Geraldines at Bushy Park on Saturday evening.

As will be seen from our fixtures list, many clubs will have their second best teams in action in this championship and the decision to have clubs play in different championships on the same day or same week-end must be commenced. With such a huge fixtures programme to deal with, the Divisional Boards have little option but to adopt this policy.

Council Approves New Plan For Dungarvan Car Parks

disappointment with the Manager's report, describing it as "another privatisation bandwagon." He said that the Council could have created many new jobs and generated additional finance without involving any "middle man."

"I am advocating that we run the car parks ourselves and create some of the many jobs this town needs," Cllr. Wright added.

The Manager said however that if the UDC was to commercially operate the car parks, new by-laws would have to be created and these would take a long time to implement.

"What we are proposing is purely an experiment," said Mr. Hurley. "Presently we have two very valuable assets that aren't generating one penny for the UDC and we want to change that," he added.

A PROHIBITIVE CHARGE

Cllr. Austin Hallahan said his main worry is that it is proposed to allow the company to determine the charge for using the car parks. If a prohibitive charge was introduced it could result in many shoppers going elsewhere and

that would be seriously detrimental to business in the town.

"There is no way we should give the Company an open cheque on charges," Cllr. Hallahan said.

Cllr. Billy Kyne also expressed a fear about having a charge over which the Council would have no control, and the Manager replied that it was a fair point. "The Council presently charges 20 pence an hour for parking in the central streets and that should be the maximum in the car parks too," said Mr. Hurley.

Cllr. R. Walsh agreed that the deal seemed to be a very good one for the UDC, but Cllr. Paddy Power considered the annual rental of £5,000 per car park "too little."

Finally on the proposal of Cllr. Mary Dixon, seconded by Cllr. Walsh, the terms of the agreement recommended by the Manager were accepted — subject to a maximum parking charge of 20 pence an hour.

Cllr. Wright however dissented, saying that "the common good" was not being looked after.
