Road Conditions Blamed For Young Dungarvan Couple's Tragic Deaths

Road conditions have been blamed for the fatal accident at Raheenvarren, Newbawn, Co. Wexford which claimed the lives of a young man and woman on November 15, 1991.

Both Eamonn McCarthy, Deelish, Dungarvan and Michelle O'Riordan, 36 Mary Street, Dungarvan, who were in their twenties, were killed instantly when the Ford Sierra in which

they were travelling was in collision with a car coming in the opposite direction.

Local Garda Sergeant, John Halpin, told an inquest in New Ross last week that

Ahern Welcomes Youghal Technical College Promotional Video

At a recent function held at the College, a promotional video was launched by the Electronics Department. Present was Michael Ahern T.D., Minister for Science and Technology. Also in attendance was Cllr. Denis Murphy, Youghal U.D.C.'s representative on the County Cork Vocational Education Committee.

The Minister, Mr. Ahern, praised the staff of the College for providing a worthwhile Post-Leaving Certificate Course in the East Cork region, leading to an International Qualification in the field of electronics, which is now one of the world's fastest growth industries. The Minister wished the staff of the Electronics Department every success with their production.

The promotional video was produced and directed by Mr. Declan O'Keeffe, a staff member of the College and was filmed on location in Youghal during the early weeks of 1992. The video is

a fifteen minute presentation which gives full details of the 'City & Guild' 224 Control System Technology Electronic Course run by the College. It is available free of charge to all second level schools, particularly those in the Cork-Waterford region. This offer also extends to an individual who may require information on a career in Electronics. Persons seeking such information should contact the College where they may obtain a copy of the video on a loan basis.

The video was filmed by Willie O'Mahoney and edited by college staff members, Martin Ryan, Teresa Boyce and James Mansell. The narrator was Mr. Liam O Laochdha and original soundtrack by John Ryan.

Language Scholarship For Lismore Student

Aer Rianta and Kingspan Veha have combined to provide a total of 30 scholarships for students to attend Euro Languages College residential French and German courses this summer. The Waterford winner is Melanie O'Reilly, a student of the C.B.S., Lismore. The scholarships have been awarded on a county basis. The Minister for Tourism and Communications Maire Geoghegan-Quinn presented the winners with their scholarships recently at the Great Southern Hotel, Eyre Square, Galway.

The three-week residential courses are based on the same idea as the tradi-

tional Irish College and provide an enjoyable environment where students can prepare for examinations and "live" French and German with native speakers without having to leave the country. Locations are St. Peter's College in Wexford, Wilson's Hospital School and The Franciscan Friary in Multyfarnham, Co. Westmeath where Melanie will be attending the senior French course in July/August and St. Nathy's College, Bal-laghaderreen, Co. Roscommon.

Sponsorship by Aer Rianta/Kingspan Veha covers the total cost (£399) of the three week course.

Know Your Rights

Question — I work in the health care area and have to work very long hours. My job has become very stressful and my doctor has advised me to give it up and look for lighter work. If I give up my work will I be able to claim my Unemployment Benefit while I am looking for other work?

Answer — When a person gives up a job without just cause, the exchange can refuse to pay them their Unemployment Benefit for six weeks. It would be up to you to show that you had just cause on the grounds that the work was so stressful that it was affecting your health. A letter from your doctor would help to support your case.

If you are actually unfit for work on medical grounds, you should claim Disability Benefit rather than Unemployment Benefit.

Deasy Fears Shattering Boardroom Announcement On Waterford Crystal

Deputy Austin Deasy speaking on the adjournment debate in the Dail last Thursday on the problems at present affecting Waterford Glass said that he was raising the matter because of the disturbing statements by both the Chairman and Chief Executive of Waterford Crystal, Mr. Don Brennan and Dr. Paddy Galvin, respectively, who both had expressed doubts about the continuation of the Glass

manufacturing enterprise at Waterford and Dungarvan.

"It is not my intention to be scare-mongering," said Mr. Deasy "but the threat of closure must be addressed by the Government and the relevant State Agency, the I.D.A."

"Closure would mean a loss of 2,500 jobs and devastation to the economies of Waterford and Dungarvan" the Deputy went on "and I am aware, that presently, a study into the viability of the

operation is taking place and I am extremely concerned, that as a result of the findings of this study, that we may have a shattering announcement from a Boardroom in New York. The Company is now effectively controlled by the American Bank, Morgan Stanley, in conjunction with Mr. Tony O'Reilly. Sentiment does not appear to be a consideration in their deliberations, as they have shown by their manufacturing of the new Mar-

quis range in mainland Europe. It has to be admitted that the technology in the Waterford plant is out-dated, and I am asking that the Government together with the I.D.A. give every assistance to up-date the equipment so that the Company can compete effectively in the market place."

Deputy Deasy added that he wanted the Government to monitor the Company's problems and intentions closely.


KINSALEBEG WIN BASKETBALL COUNTY FINAL

FARM LEADER CALLS FOR "NO"

Mr. Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, President of the United Farmers Association says that a NO vote from a majority of farmers would be the first jolt their complacent politicians needed to make them sit up and take notice of the crisis situation in rural Ireland. Mr. Phelan says that United Farmers Association are calling on all Irish farmers who feel that they were not being treated as equal citizens with equal rights to vote NO to the Maastricht Treaty. Under the E.C. regime 80% of mon ies from CAP have gone to 20% of farmers, leaving the remaining 80% of farmers to share the crumbs.

IMPROVEMENT TO BOOSTER

Improvements are at present being carried out to the R.T.E. Booster which was erected in October 1987 on Deerpark Mountain overlooking the Nire Valley and Ballymacarbry. R.T.E. engineers discovered recently that the steel mast causing an interference with the signal and must be replaced by a timber mast. This has now been done and we are awaiting R.T.E. engineers to transfer the ariels on the timber mast. Up to 1987 many homes in the district had no R.T.E. reception, but since the erection of this Booster, the reception is perfect. From now on a larger area will benefit from this improvement. CUCKOO

During the past week the call of the Cuckoo has been heard in the Nire Valley and Ballymacarbry Districts. Old people claimed that it was unlucky to hear the Cuckoo before April 6 the feast day of St. Celestine (Pope), but if you heard him

for the first time on April 28 they claim you would have a prosperous year. It is said that to hear the bird after August is an evil omen. More superstitions about the Cuckoo are that what ever state your health is when you hear him, it will remain that way till you hear him the following year. Another one is that if you are in a Churchyard when you hear him for the first time, you will be buried before he comes the following year.

GROUSE SHOOTING

Attempts to begin a grouse shooting operation for tourists in the area are being strongly opposed by local game organisations. They are opposed to what they describe as the commercial exploitation of grouse and say that such an operation would be a disaster for the dwindling grouse population. Game councils are expressing strong and total opposition to any attempts by tourist shooters and their promoters to commence a grouse shooting operation. They believe that the very small grouse population could not cope with the high and sustained levels of shooting practiced by tourist shooters. This form of commercial exploitation would be nothing short of a disaster for the local grouse population. It would lead to the extinction of the species. SACRED HEART DEVOTION IN 18th CENTURY DUNGARVAN

An unpublished note in Fr. McErlean's historical records of life in Munster records that a Jesuit, Fr. Edward Lisward (1715 - 1791), was director of a Confraternity of the Sacred Heart in Dungarvan between the years 1750 and 1761. There can scarcely be any doubt that it was as a member of the Confraternity that the Irish poet Tadhg Gaolach O Suilleabhain imbibed the devotion which he expressed in his poem Gile

mo Chroi. The book in which his poem was published went into almost forty editions and the poem itself had an untold influence in making the devotion to the Heart of Jesus a cherished part of Irish spirituality, first in Munster and then farther afield.

To all intents and purposes the Brothers have ceased to function at the school for some time now but it was decided, and rightly so, that the public should be afforded an opportunity to openly express to those representatives of the Order who may attend, the wholehearted thanks and deepest appreciation felt by all for the devoted and dedicated service which the Christian Brothers have rendered to the people since their advent to the town in 1807.

The Dungarvan Urban Council on behalf of the people of the town have decided to designate next Friday, May 8 "C.B.S. Day"

and have invited the townspeople to join in a number of ceremonies planned to mark the official departure of the Brothers from the town. Details of the programme are set out elsewhere in this issue of the "Leader" and we know only too well that the general public will join wholeheartedly in this public demonstration of thanks to the 'Brothers' for their dedication to the youth of the town for almost two centuries.

A request has gone out that in order to mark the occasion as the very special day of celebration which it is, having been called, "C.B.S. Day", that all

homes and business premises in the town be decorated in an extra special manner.

It is such an occasion that will not occur again and although there is bound to be sadness and sorrow at the fact that the 'Brothers' have finally left, let us all join in showing our appreciation by a great public demonstration of thanksgiving for the wonderful work and the outstanding results achieved by this great Irish Teaching Order, Na Braithre Criostai. They may have gone but they leave behind memories that will never be forgotten and forever cherished by the people of Dungarvan.

A Good Day For Tourism Launch

May Day, Friday, May 1, was indeed an appropriate day chosen by the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op to launch their Tourism Programme for 1992 and despite the fact that the weather was anything but what the first day of summer should be, those present at the conference were snug and warm in the comfortable ambience of the Round Tower Hotel.

The energetic Ardmore group richly deserved the accolades voiced by several of the speakers which in the main correctly described the Enterprise Co-op as now being the leader of tourism in Co. Waterford.

Principal speaker at the conference was Minister of State at the Department of Tourism, Deputy Brendan Kenneally who is indeed no

stranger to the historic seaside village of Ardmore and who promised that the interest which he always had in the area since he first entered public life would be maintained now that he was Junior Minister at the Department of Tourism.

Minister Kenneally in the course of his speech pointed out that the creation of 25,000 new jobs in tourism between 1988 and 1992 was the true indicator of how virtually important the industry was to the economic life of the nation.

However speaking the previous day, Thursday, April 30, at the A.G.M. of the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation held in Dundrum House Hotel, Dundrum, Co. Tipperary, the Chairman of the Organisation, Mr. Austin Crowe,

warned against what he detected as a growing euphoria about Irish tourism.

Mr. Crowe who incidentally is owner of Dundrum House Hotel is on record in a supplied script of his speech as saying: "Our industry has to an extent become the flavour of the times. There is a feeling that tourism can provide the panacea for Ireland's economic ills. That simply isn't true. Tourism will play its rightful part in building a better Ireland. It can help but cannot solve the problems of agriculture especially by providing an outfit for Irish agricultural produce. It can continue to contribute to job creation in a significant way. Those of us who, like myself, derive our livelihoods from tourism share a concern about unreal expectations of just how much tourism can deliver."

We refer to Mr. Crowe's speech simply because we believe that there has been a good deal of euphoria about tourism projects and it can only lead to disillusionment amongst local people when the rosy promises which so often are so easily made fail to materialise.

Certainly all the local efforts which are presently under way, especially in centres such as Ardmore and Lismore, cannot be too highly lauded but the expectations must and should be kept within realistic limits.

Why Was Robert Power Omitted?

The omission from the Irish Olympic cycling team of Dungarvan's Robert Power has, to say the least, come as a major surprise not only to his hundreds of fans but to many of the top sports commentators who have been following the fortunes of the young Dungarvan cyclist over the past few years.

Power who has been described as a cycling dynamo in the mould of the great Sean Kelly has registered all the victories at home and abroad required to qualify him for selection as a member of the Irish team and why this young very much in-form cyclist's claim for inclusion has been ignored by the national team director is beyond comprehension.

The Ballyvoile Ambush

The holding of the annual Easter Commemoration Parade in Stradbally on Easter Sunday last reminded us of the engagement which took place at Ballyvoile on June 6, 1921 when members of B Company Stradbally under Coy. Capt. John Joe Cummins, Carrigahilla, engaged units of the Crown Forces at the old railway bridge at Ballyvoile.

This engagement during the War of Independence is recalled in the ballad "The Ballyvoile Ambush" which was composed by the late John Daly of The Cove, Ballyvoile and which we think is an appropriate choice for our ballad corner this week when our thoughts are turned to the brave men and women who fought in those times for the freedom which we enjoy to-day.

It was on a Sunday morning our volunteers did go
With rifles on their shoulders to meet the coming foe,
From Stradbally, Thomas and his men they marched
in single file,
It's little they thought they'd have to halt when they
came to Ballyvoile.

When the rebels saw them coming in numbers they
were great,
By the railway slopes and cornfields for them our
boys did wait,
And when the firing started no soldiers could be seen
They all had run for shelter down Tobin's old boreen.

Now to our young dispatch boy great praise to him is
due,
In the midst of all the firing across the bridge he
flew,
With a message to his comrades, it was either fight or
die
As the bullets fell around him like the hailstones
from the sky.

If this great bridge could only speak, great stories it
would tell,
As its limestone arches echoed to the rifle shot and
shell,
The jackdaw from his lofty perch that day he had to
go
And leave that lovely valley where the Dalligan river
flows.

Our men they were outnumbered and their ammunition
low,
For fear of being surrounded up to Knock they had to
go,
They swore that Sunday evening if they should fight
again
They'd have plenty ammunition and likewise a few
more men.

And when this war is over and we'll have our liberty
We'll drink a health to Ballyvoile and the boys who
set it free.
We'll have Sinn Fein banners floating from the
mountain to the sea
And we'll wave the flag of freedom on Pats Longan's
big ash tree.

Now to conclude and finish up I've a few more
words to say
For the soul of Jackie Cummins let all his comrades
pray
And always be remembered by everyone of them
That he died a brave young Volunteer on the slopes
of Quealy's Glen.

P.S. — The Thomas referred to in the opening
verse was the notorious Capt. Thomas who had been
involved in the Burgery Ambush on March 19,
1921, just three months earlier. He was captured in
that engagement but left off on condition that there
would be no reprisals, a promise he broke when a
number of houses were subsequently burned down
in Abbeyside.

It's The Second Not The First Ever!

The decision to hold the May monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Lismore on Monday next has been hailed as the first occasion on which the parent Local Authority of the County ever convened in the Cathedral town.

This is not so. Following publication of the report of the Council's last meeting at which it was decided to hold the May meeting in Lismore and at which it was claimed that this would be an historic first for Lismore, a whisper in the grapevine sent us checking the records of the County Council.

These now verify that a special meeting of Waterford County Council was, in fact, held in the Teagasc Office in Lismore on September 14, 1981 with Cllr. Patsy Kenneally in the Chair. The purpose of the meeting was to enable the Council members to pay a special tribute by attending Mass in Lismore that morning for their late colleague Cllr. George Armstrong of Ballymartin, Glencairn whose regretted death occurred a month earlier in August, 1981.





"We in the Co. Council," said Mr. Hurley, "will do our best to help you out but the rest is up to the people of Ardmore and I wish you every success for '92."

Bringing the conference to a conclusion, Mr. Lincoln, on behalf of all present, thanked Mr. and Mrs. Michael Ronayne, owners of the hotel, for the beautiful buffet reception they had provided in such a beautiful setting. He thanked all who helped and especially the sponsors and supporters of Ardmore Enterprise Co-op. Pointing out that last year a total of 6,500 inquiries had been recorded at the local Tourist Office he said that their efforts had put Ardmore back on the tourist map and for the coming year he felt that things were looking up rather than looking down.

Friday next, May 8, 1992 has been designated "CBS Day" in Dúngarbháin for on that day Dungarvan Urban Council on behalf of the people of the town and district will accord a Civic Reception to officially mark the departure of the Christian Brothers from Dungarvan after rendering 185 years of dedicated service to the community in educating the young boys in accordance with the aims of their founder, Rev. Bro. Edmund Ignatius Rice — do chum gloire Dé agus onora na h-Eireann.

The farewell programme will commence on Friday evening with a recital by Dungarvan Pipe Band at the Sports Centre at Quann's while at the same time a parade will assemble at Arus Brughá and led by Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band will proceed to the Sports Centre where the Civic Reception will take place.

Following the formal procedures, a commemorative plaque will be unveiled and dedicated and at 7.15 p.m. the scene will switch to St. Mary's Parish Church where Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, will be the chief celebrant of a special Mass of Thanksgiving.

And so after 185 years, we say slán agus beannacht to the Bráithre Críostaí who throughout all that time have been so much part and parcel of the life of the town, of the families that have lived in the town and of the lives of the thousands of young boys which they helped to mould and whom they educated in the solid manner that enabled so many of them to reach the top of the many professions which they chose to pursue in life throughout the long years of their association with Dungarvan.

We have been favoured with a selection of old photos which tell better than any words what the members of the great Christian Brothers Order have meant to the people of the town and the dedicated service they have so unselfishly ren-

dered to us for close on two centuries. They represent to a great extent the happenings of the various generations that have passed through the portals of the CBS since the Brothers first came to Dungarvan in 1827.



Prune and Cinnamon Buns

A sweet, sticky treat to eat on days when you are feeling like indulging yourself.

Ingredients:

- 225 g (8 oz) strong plain white flour
- 2.5 ml (½ tsp) easy-blend dried yeast
- 2.5 ml (½ tsp) salt
- 15 ml (½ oz) ground cinnamon
- 15 g (½ oz) butter or margarine
- about 175 ml (6 fl oz) tepid semi-skimmed milk
- 175 g (6 oz) stoned prunes, roughly chopped
- finely grated rind of 1 lemon
- 50 g (2 oz) soft light brown sugar
- 15 ml (1 tbsp) clear honey
- 15 ml (1 tbsp) lemon juice

Method:

Lightly grease and base-line an 18 cm (7 inch) square shallow cake tin. Mix together the flour, dried yeast, salt and cinnamon. Rub in the butter or margarine, then beat in enough milk to mix to a soft dough. Turn the dough on to a lightly floured surface and knead for about 5 minutes

or until smooth. Place in a bowl, cover with a clean cloth and leave to rise in a warm place for about 1 hour

or until doubled in size. Knock back the dough and roll out to a 30 x 22.5 cm (12 x 9 inch) rectangle.

Cover with the prunes and sprinkle over the lemon rind and sugar.

Roll up the dough from the longest edge like a Swiss roll and press down well to seal the edge. Cut into six thick slices and halve each slice diagonally. Place the slices, cut-side uppermost, in the prepared tin. Cover lightly with a clean cloth and leave to rise in a warm place for about 30 minutes or until the dough feels springy.

Bake the buns in a preheated oven at 190°C (375°F) mark 5 for about 30 minutes or until well risen and golden. Turn out of the tin on to a wire rack which is placed over a baking sheet. Gently remove the lining paper.

Mix the honey with the lemon juice and brush over the buns while still warm. Serve warm or cool or wrap loosely in aluminium foil and store in an airtight container for up to 2 days.

Makes 12 (125 Kcals per bun).

Bark — a pretty weed-stopper

MULCHING should be more common than it is with the string of dry years we have had recently.

To be fair, there are probably a lot of people who are not too sure what it is and what the benefits are although it is now common practice in public gardens as a labour saver and promoter of good plant health.

Mulching is simply the creation of a barrier of natural material across the top of the soil, which will allow rain and nutrients to sink through while keeping moisture in.

It will also help keep weeds down by denying them heat, light and any easy growth to both those benefits. So, as the days warm up and the weeds start to run riot, the benefits of mulching become more obvious and they need not cost a lot.

Favourites which are also



pleasing on the eye are pulverised bark and peat — although there is an argument going on about whether it is ecologically correct to use the latter.

And both are relatively expensive, so you may prefer to use old grass clippings and sawdust, chopped straw or even shredded newspaper as practical and cost effective alternatives. Certainly these cheaper mediums will be fine for the vegetable patch.

You may also wish to apply stone or gravel chippings in the case of rockeries or alpine collections. They are effective, tidy and

above all, look authentic. Once you have decided what to use then wait for a good downpour or, if there is no hosepipe ban in force, give the area a good watering. If you mulch after that then you will retain the maximum amount of moisture before you start.

Mulching will then help you effectively manage what little rainfall we seem to get nowadays.

Other good tips for ensuring that your plants do not get too parched are:

- always try to water before plants show signs of wilting
- try to re-create the effect of light rain by using a fine rose on the watering can or hose — you don't want to batter the plants or wash away goodness
- if you have the time and need the exercise, a watering can is worth the effort. You tend to be more thoughtful about where to water, thereby wasting less.

You can also add small amounts of soluble fertiliser in the right places.

- give the water a chance to get to the roots by soaking yet not creating puddles on the soil
- never water in the heat of the day — all your efforts will be evaporating into the atmosphere

If you are happy to use a watering can it is also worth setting up a water butt to collect run-off from a gutter on your house, or an outbuilding such as a greenhouse or garage.

If you buy a butt fitted with a tap make sure there is enough room to get a bucket or water can underneath it — be ready to set the butt on a brick or stout wooden plinth if necessary.

The extra work is well worth it to conserve some of the all-too-rare rainfall which your plants will prefer to tap water.



To mark the occasion of the departure of the Irish Christian Brothers from Dungarvan and the UDC Civic Reception on next Friday, the current Dungarvan Museum Exhibition "Dungarvan Through The Ages" now features a special display commemorating the 185 years of service to education in Dungarvan by the Order.

Established in 1807, the Dungarvan school and monastery was the first CBS Foundation in Ireland by Edmund Rice after Waterford City. The collection includes photographs, maps, press cuttings and of particular interest is the "Report of the Commissioners of Public Instruction 1835" which details 17 schools in Dungarvan, Public and Private, with 400 pupils on CBS Rolls under Bros. James Broderick and John Cronin. Subjects listed for the school were Read-

ing, Writing, Grammar, Arithmetic, and reflecting Dungarvan's maritime importance, Geometry and Navigation.

The report also details an Endowment by Mr. Pierce Barron of Shandon for the building of a residence at the then school at Shandon for the Brothers, prior to the move to Mitchel Street.

A rare photo of the interior of the Mitchel Street Monastery Oratory, a Subscription List of 1922 and a Commemorative Plaque of Edmond Rice presented to the Museum by the CBS Museum, Waterford in 1991 are also featuring amongst the interesting memorabilia. The Museum opens daily, 2 to 5 p.m., Monday to Friday.





Charlton Celebrates Three Results

At a time when football throws up the unexpected on the field to the despair of Manchester United supporters, a famous Leeds old boy had cause to celebrate last week.

Even the return of the 1st Div. championship to Elland Road could not have prepared Jack Charlton for the Windsor Park result on Tuesday night. A 2 goal lead thrown away by Northern Ireland against so called no-hopers Lithuania was rounded off by a comprehensive 4-1 defeat of the U.S.A. at Lansdowne Road.

The U.S.A. had already played 8 times in 1992 and saw this game against Ireland as part of their preparation for the 1994 World Cup finals to which they have automatic qualification as host nation.

The results of these 8 matches give an indication of the U.S.A.'s progress in international football and puts Ireland's result into perspective.

Jan 25, 1992 — C.I.S. beat them 1-0 in Miami, Florida; On Feb. 2 1992 they beat C.I.S. 2-1 in Pontiac, Michigan; On Feb. 12 they drew with Costa Rica in Costa Rica; On Feb. 18 El Salvador beat them 2-0 in San Salvador; On Feb. 26 Brazil beat them 3-0 in Brazil; On March 11 Spain beat them 2-0 in Spain; On March 18 Morocco beat them 3-1 in Casablanca and on April 4 they beat China 5-0 in California.

Ireland made several changes to accommodate injuries and next week's F.A. Cup final with Paul McGrath staying in defence in front of Gerry Peyton who got a recall to keep in touch with the demands of international football. In direct contrast to Ireland the U.S.A. play a slick quick close passing game. Some may find it attractive but I think it was over done, and it was clear Ireland would wear them down in time.

To be fair to the Americans they almost took a shock lead but a combination of good saves by Tony Meola, poor finishing and a great goal line clearance saw the sides scoreless at half time.

Andy Townsend got the second half off to a great start with a great goal from Quinn's knock on. Denis Irwin got his first international goal with a free-kick after man of the match Townsend had been fouled by American defender Marcelo Balboa (no relation to Rocky). As the visitors wilted Niall Quinn, who to me looked laboured, availed of poor defending to score off the far upright. Ireland's fourth came from substitute Tony Cascarino who has now scored an impressive 5 goals in his last six appearances. Erich Wynalda embarrassed Gerry Peyton with a well struck shot having made a good run through a static Irish defence.

It was a good second half performance which saw Townsend and McGrath adding to their recent Irish form. Alan McLoughlin got through an amount of work quietly but efficiently and did his cause no harm. Of the rest, Eddie McGoldrick has a way to go yet to be a regular in Charlton's plans. Tommy Coyne had a quieter game and does suggest a shortage of pace, especially important when Irish forwards are asked to close down on their opponents defenders.

But there is no doubt but Charlton has what he wants, a big panel of players. Some like Staunton and McGrath can be switched from midfield to defence. What remains to be

seen is will Roy Keane and Ronnie Whelan return to midfield. Whelan's fitness is still in doubt and a full 90 minutes against Sunderland in the FA cup final will surely be a pre-requisite to him having a chance of facing the Albanians on Tuesday, May 26.

SEATS, TICKETS AND T.V. RATINGS

Off the field the FAI administrators are also doing well with 27,000 spectators turning up for a friendly at a time when soccer is getting blanket



coverage on television. Contrast this to Northern Ireland's poor gates and indeed friendlies in Wales and Scotland.

This was Lansdowne Road's first all-seater game with portable seating giving a capacity of 33,000. This temporary seating which costs £10 for the North and South terraces and £12 for the East reserved side will remain for the FAI Cup final and the World cup game. After that it's across the Irish sea for the Wimbledon Tennis Championship and the British Open Golf championships where the prices are sure to be higher.

The FAI also gave some interesting information on ticket prices in last week's match programme.

TICKET PRICES

Approximately 25% of the capacity 8000 tickets will cost £20 — the main price of stand tickets for the European Championship qualifiers. A further 10,000 or 32% of the capacity will cost £25 up £5. A small number of prime seats, 9% of the capacity (or 2,900) will cost £30.

The new ticket prices will bring us in line with most major stadia which have a variety of prices throughout the ground and the stands in particular.

Despite the potential loss of income from the reduced attendance, we have kept prices as low as possible. This means that 90% of the seats will cost £25 or less. The premium seats at £30 enables us to keep the new terrace seats to an absolute minimum (£10-12).



SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

First Defeat For County Champions

This was one game that certainly lived up to expectations and the big crowd at the Stradbally venue got great value from what can only be described as a top-class contest from start to finish.

Rathgormack went out to expose the vulnerability of the reigning champions who had one of the longest match winning sequences on record since the league system was introduced some years ago. The challengers set out what they pledged to do after their meeting at Leamybrien last year and their plan was to prevent Dungarvan from settling down to their usual style of game. The extent to which they succeeded was recorded on the scoreboard.

It was an exhibition too, that rewarded the big Waterford crowd who went to Fermoy to watch the game on a bitterly cold evening. It was an overpowering display by Waterford who never looked to be in any trouble after recovering from a rather shaky start when they missed a couple of scores.

The pitch, on which many a Waterford team has played was well manicured and looked beautiful

as the sides took the field and we elected to play into the very strong wind, having won the toss.

EARLY LEAD

In the 1st minute a Tom Kiely free landed deep in the Kerry defence and John Fitzpatrick pointed to give Waterford an early lead. Two minutes later we were awarded a 21 yards free and from which Paul Flynn shot for a goal and failed. County Minor Footballers In Action against Clare To-night

Huge Programme Of Week-End Championship Fixtures

Waterford minor football selectors have named a strong side to play Clare at Tipperary Town to-night, Wednesday and hopes are high that they will emulate the achievements of their hurling counterparts by inflicting another defeat on the Banner County.

On the home front, the week-end is packed with attractive hurling fixtures in the three adult grades and with the results liable to shape the destiny of some clubs as far as the championships are concerned, we can expect the matches to be contested with great earnestness.

SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP:

LISMORE V. PASSAGE

Lismore were stretched to the limit when playing a first round draw with Ballygunner three weeks ago and when they take the field here on Saturday evening they will, no doubt, be reminded of their lucky escape against Passage when they met in the second round here last year. Only a point separated Lismore (1-12 to 3-5) from their unconsidered challengers on the day and while Lismore went on to win the title, Passage did not do too badly in their other matches. Lismore will have a fight on their hands and the loss of the points would see them struggling later to qualify. At full strength and playing at full stretch, they just might get by.

ST. SAVIOURS V. BALLYGUNNER

Form points to a Ballygunner win and if repeating their performance against Lismore they must continue to confirm their rating as championship contenders. Saviours drew with Portlaw, but a contest with Ballygunner is a much bigger and more serious assignment for the new intermediate county champions. The 'Gunners should win this one.

Fixed for Lismore on Friday evening, this very attractive local derby will bring a big gathering to Lismore. All their meetings have been occasions of excitement and they have seldom failed to produce good quality club championship stuff. When they clashed last year, Tallow came out on top on a tight scoreline of 1-14 to 2-9 and that was one of the many occasions when just a puck of the ball separated the teams, whose players know each other "inside out." Present form suggests that Ballyduff will win and unless Tallow can improve on their display against Fourmilewater, the Mocollop side will take the points.

DUNGARVAN V. PORTLAW

Because they are being coached by Joe McGrath, there is more than usual interest in their progress on the hurling scene this year. They defeated De La Salle in the first round, as they did in the previous season and they should also collect the points here as Portlaw who had to survive a relegation battle to stay senior after a very poor 1991 season, have shown themselves to be nothing more a mediocre side when playing a draw with St. Saviours in the first round.

they beat star-laden Mount Sion who qualified for the county final after a splendid 1991 season. This is the Friday evening game at Fraher Field.



Road Conditions Blamed For Young Dungarvan Couple's Tragic Deaths

he found a second car embedded in the Ford Sierra at Eustace's Corner. He said he later spoke to the driver of that vehicle, Andy Woolrich, Miltown, England, at Wexford Co. Hospital.

Witness said that this driver was rendered unconscious in the accident, that he received cuts and bruises and that he was detained in hospital for a few days after the accident. He added that Mr. Woolrich told him he has no recollection of the accident other than that he was aware that he had been involved in a road traffic accident.

Mr. Woolrich was returning to England when the accident happened, while the two young people who died were on their way home to Dungarvan from England. The roads were in an icy condition after heavy frost.

A verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that death was due to multiple injuries consistent with being involved in a road accident, was returned by the jury. The inquest was conducted by the Coroner for South Wexford, Mr. Jimmy Murphy, solicitor.


