Drug Swoop By Gardai In Dungarvan

When Gardai stopped a car at the Burgery, Dungarvan, early on last Tuesday morning, they took the occupants, three men and a woman, into custody. In a follow-up search of the vehicle a quantity of cannabis resin was seized.

The four, all stated to be in their twenties and believed to be from the Dungarvan

area, had crossed on the night sailing from Fishguard to Rosslare. After being detained for a number of hours they were released without charge but a Garda spokesman said that once their investigations had been completed, the nature and extent of possible charges to be preferred against the four would be decided upon.

Dungarvan's Farewell Tributes To Departing Christian Brothers

On last Friday evening the people of Dungarvan bade a sad farewell to the Christian Brothers who are set to leave the town after 185 years.

Brothers who formerly taught in Dungarvan journeyed from many areas of the country to be a part of the occasion when the Urban Council accorded the Order a Civic Reception — the highest singular honour the local authority could bestow on the Brothers.

The Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, was present and later celebrated a special Mass of Thanksgiving before a packed congregation in St. Mary's Parish Church, which included a large number of clergy from all over the diocese, where he spoke of the Brothers "total commitment to an ideal."

"They are leaving Dungarvan through no fault of their own and through no lack of dedication," said Bishop Russell.

CIVIC RECEPTION
Earlier at the Sports Centre where 1,000 people attended the Civic Reception, U.D.C. Chairman Cllr. Michael O'Riordan described as "immeasurable" the contribution of the C.B.S. to education and to the social fabric of Dungarvan since

the Order set up only its third Foundation there in 1807.

Mr. Brian J. McNally, Deputy Waterford County Manager, said that while

Vandals On Rampage In Kilmac'

A vandalistic rampage last weekend in the village of Kilmacthomas was condemned at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Cllr. Oliver Coffey disclosed that youths from outside the Kilmacthomas area had vandalised a number of cars parked in the village. "It was," said Cllr. Coffey, "an outrageous act of vandalism which has angered the local community."

He called on the Minister for Justice to substantially increase the numerical strength of the gardai in rural areas, and warned that if this is not done rural Ireland will eventually become a "wasteland."

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally said areas of West Waterford are also being "invaded" by Cork city-based criminal gangs who cross over Youghal Bridge to rob and plunder homes and business premises.

Moves To Have Links With Historic Past Returned To Lismore

Delicate negotiations are presently taking place to try and have the Book of Lismore and the Lismore Crozier returned to Lismore now that it had acquired the official status of a Heritage Town.


Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson moved a notice of motion at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council calling on the Council to look at the possibility of achieving this.

Cllr. Wilkinson said the importance of the Lismore Heritage Town project to the West Waterford region could not be overstressed and every effort the Coun-

cil can make must be made to ensure it becomes an outstanding success.

"The Book of Lismore and the Lismore Crozier are historic links with Lismore's Christian past and are of national importance," said Cllr. Wilkinson. "They should come back to where they belong and where they would be a major attraction."

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said the possibility of getting both back to Lismore had not been lost and "delicate negotiations" are presently taking place about the matter.

ICMSA Welcomes Quota Buy-Up Scheme

"The ICMSA welcomes the re-introduction of the Community Quota Buy-Up Scheme as it provides an opportunity for people in the Munster area to sell their quota," said the Chairman of the ICMSA Dairy Committee, Mr. Con Scully.

"More importantly, further quota acquired under this Scheme will be used to reduce the compulsory cuts

which all dairy farmers now face. In other words all the quota will be reallocated to dairy farmers who are still producing milk. The ICMSA will encourage farmers who are not using their quota to avail of the Scheme. The ICMSA is encouraging Co-ops to promote the Scheme in the interest of dairy farmers," said Mr. Scully.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have retired here from the UK and have pension from the D.S.S. Although I am now getting the Free Travel, Free Electricity Allowance, B/W TV Licence and Free Telephone Rental, I have not been granted the Living Alone Allowance. I am very grateful for all these benefits, but wonder why I cannot get the Living Alone Allowance. Can you explain this?

Answer — The Living Alone Allowance is simply an increase in the rate of their payment which is paid to Social Welfare Pensioners aged 66 if they are living entirely alone. In the same way that the Age 80 Allowance is also just an increase in the rate of pension. Since these are just increases in the rate of Irish Social Welfare pensions, you would not be eligible for them as you do not have an Irish Social Welfare Pension.

Urban TD's Have Lost Their Rural Roots

— ICMSA

Speaking at the 153rd RDS Spring Show, the President of the ICMSA, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, said that urban TD's and Ministers have lost their rural roots if the policies they implement are any indicator of their familiarity with the realities of rural Ireland.

Mr. O'Dwyer called on rural TD's to find some mechanism across party lines to formulate long term, caring and constructive policies for the agricul-

tural industry. "From recent events, such as the 1992 Budget and in particular the imposition of a tax on Co-ops, it appears that many of our urban TD's have no idea of the needs of rural dwellers and farm families," he said.

TRIBUTE TO SOME RURAL TD'S

"I must however pay tribute to those among the rural TD's — across the political spectrum — who have illustrated a clear understanding

of what is required to develop our agricultural industry in the present climate and who have spoken out in favour of policies which will help rural communities, often without much support. However, regrettably, these TD's are in

the minority. "It is essential that these rural TD's find some way across party lines to try and bring all TD's together to formulate an agreed approach to this vital national industry," said Mr. O'Dwyer.

MILK QUOTA SYSTEM ANOTHER CHANCE TO SELL YOUR QUOTA!

Notice to purchasers, suppliers and direct sellers of milk

Had you considered joining the Milk Quota Buy-up Scheme which closed for applications in January last?

Perhaps you did not hear about it in time to meet the deadline?

Or maybe you felt you should wait until the beginning of the new quota year on 1 April before making any decision about your quota?

Or you may simply have been one of those unfortunate applicants whose applications were refused because they arrived in the Department after the closing date.

In any event the good news is that now you have another opportunity to consider your situation again. The Buy-up Scheme has been re-opened for applications.

Because this is an extension of the last Buy-up Scheme, applications will be accepted only if they are received in an office of the Department of Agriculture and Food (either at Head Office in Kildare Street, Dublin 2 or any local Department Office) by **29th May 1992**. Payment will again be made at the rate of £2.05 per gallon (payable in instalments of 41 pence per gallon each year for 5 years).

BASED ON THE LEVEL OF PARTICIPATION WITHIN CO-OP/DAIRY AREAS IN THE JANUARY SCHEME, APPLICATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED ONLY FROM PRODUCERS WHOSE QUOTAS ARE ATTACHED TO CO-OPERATIVES WHOSE OPERATIONAL HEADQUARTERS ARE SITUATED IN MUNSTER. THE DEPARTMENT HAS PREPARED AN EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM WHICH WILL CLARIFY YOUR SITUATION IN THIS REGARD.

County Road Grant Should Be 6/7 Times Greater

Co. Waterford's total allocation to maintain its 1,568 miles road network in the current year is £6.48m. County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn disclosed when he presented the 1992 Road Works Scheme to Monday's County Council meeting in Lismore.

Mr. O'Flynn said the £6.48m. allocation represents an increase of 13.5% on 1991 but that is exclu-

sively down to the major road re-alignment programme presently under way on the main Waterford-

Cork road outside Dungarvan.

Mr. O'Flynn said that in real terms they are now getting only 59% of what they were getting in road grants back in 1978 and they cannot work as efficiently as they would like because of the overall financial situation.

He said they cannot hire the amount of plant they would like to, while the money available to them for the maintenance of their 1,298 miles of County Roads is only between 50% and 60% of what it was five

years ago.

"We could do with six or seven times the amount we have been allocated for county roads this year, but we have distributed it as best we can," said Mr. O'Flynn.

Cllr. Pat Coffey said the public should be made aware of the situation the Council is in, while Cllr. Billy Kyne strongly criticised Environment Minister Michael Smith whom he accused of being forceful in laying the blame in the areas of roads and housing on the Local Authorities.

Helvick Trawler In Rescue Drama

When the Scottish registered trawler "Amaryllis" was trawling nets about 10 miles off Helvick Head shortly after 7 a.m. last Monday morning, the vessel suddenly went under when her nets got snared in some underwater object. Her crew of three fired flares before taking off in a life raft.

The Helvick based "Ros

Cairbre" skippered by Liam Ronayne responded when crewman David Condon spotted the flare and steamed to the rescue. They took the 3 fishermen, believed to be from Northern Ireland, aboard and brought them back to Helvick.

Speculation that a submarine was involved in the sinking of the "Amaryllis" has been discounted.

Lismore Heritage Centre Opens On Friday

This Friday, May 15, will see Lismore become the first Heritage Town to present its wealth of history and heritage to the public when Martin Dully, Director General of Bord Fáilte, opens a new interpretive centre in the town at 6 p.m.

Housed in Lismore's old Courthouse, the heritage interpretive centre will seek to give the visitor an informative and entertaining view of the history of Lismore and its surroundings. Within the centre, the visitors will hear the strange story of the Book of Lismore, that dates back a thousand years, and of the Lismore Crozier from 1116, both found in the Castle walls. "The Lismore Ex-

perience" is an exciting cinematic multi-media presentation which tells the story of the town since the arrival of St. Carthage in 636. And there's an exhibition and video about the design and workmanship that goes into the making of Waterford Crystal's most famous suite, The Lismore Suite. A Tourist Information Office is the final element in the Centre.

As a token of their appreciation of the support and co-operation shown by the town, the Lismore Heritage Company has invited the people of Lismore to visit the Centre free of charge from Monday, May 18 to Friday, May 22 inclusive.

No Toilets For Mahon Falls Tourists

The absence of toilet facilities at one of Co. Waterford's most scenic and popular tourist locations was slammed by several members at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham said the Mahon Falls have become a major tourist attraction and on Sundays in excess of 1,000 visitors can be seen there. "It is disgraceful that there are no toilet facilities and I ask myself should we be advertising the place at all when we don't have toilets," he said.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, asked if Cllr. Cunningham is suggesting that they should no longer advertise the existence of the Mahon Falls. They had

tried everywhere they possibly could for grants to provide the facility, but without success.

The Manager went on to say that toilets provided by the Council had in the past been vandalised all over the county. In 1990 a total of ninety-seven toilet bowls had been smashed in Tramore alone.

"We aren't getting the money from Central Government so we cannot provide toilets everywhere we would like to," Mr. Hurley added.

Cllr. Oliver Coffey however urged that in the event of finance becoming available from "whatever source" the provision of toilets at Mahon Falls should be a top priority.



TROOP HIKE



Replace Retiring Outdoor Workers Or County Will Be Potholed

Members of Waterford County Council have slated what they describe as the Council's "stupid policy" of not replacing retiring members of the outdoor staff.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally led the chorus of criticism at Monday's Council meeting in Lismore, and warned that they will be left with a "potholed county" if they are to persevere with the present policy relating to outdoor workers.

The matter arose after the meeting unanimously approved of the proposal of Dep. Brian O'Shea, T.D., seconded by Cllr. Billy Kyne, of the creation of two clerical officer posts and one of library assistant.

Cllr. Kenneally said it was crass stupidity not to replace retiring members of the outdoor staff. He warned that

the inevitable consequences of such a policy will be a potholed county and a massive deterioration of services generally.

Cllr. Jimmy Quirke agreed and said that all future retirements within the outdoor staff should be filled. If the present policy is maintained they will end up without an outdoor staff and he didn't have to spell out the consequences of that.

Cllr. Billy Kyne also said that retiring workers should be replaced while Cllr. Richard A. Walsh insisted it was unproductive to be undermanned.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said however that it gave him no pleasure not to replace retiring staff. If the Government gave the Council an adequate Rate Support Grant they could not only maintain existing staff levels but could take on extra workers.

"We would create more jobs if we had the money to pay for them but we cannot ask people to work for us for nothing," the Manager said.

Cllr. Kyne said that if they cannot now replace retiring staff they have a major problem which they must confront the Government with.

Minister To Prohibit Parking Near School Entrances

Last month the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith announced that he would shortly be making regulations which will prohibit the stopping or parking of vehicles close to school entrances. Speaking at the presentation of awards for the School Warden of the Year Competition the Minister said that the prohibition would help

school wardens in the discharge of their duty. "Parking of cars at school entrances when children are going into or coming out of school is a dangerous practice and I would urge parents delivering or collection children to observe the new rule," the Minister said.

Mr. Smith said that the accident rates amongst children are far too high.

Accident figures for 1990 reveal that out of a total of 150 of all pedestrians killed for the year, 23 were children in the 0-14 age group while in the same category there were 11 of the total of 46 cyclists killed.

The practice referred to by the Minister is widespread, and outside most schools, especially in the afternoons, parents can be seen jockey-

ing for positions as they attempt to park cars as near to the school entrances as possible when they go to collect their children.

Now that the dangers of this practice have been stressed by the Minister, it is to be hoped that parents will observe the new rule when the regulations to give it the force of law are introduced.

BLUE FLAG AWARDS AT RISK

A change in the standards set under EC regulations for the award of Blue Flags may see the awards won by Ardmore and Dunmore East last year at risk. Blue Flag awards are made to beaches and strands which attain high standards of water cleanliness and general management and are much coveted as prestigious tourism assets.

In a report to Waterford County Council this week, Mr. Eamonn Mansfield, Senior Executive Engineer in charge of water standards has pointed out that there has been a major change in the criteria for the award of Blue Flags in 1992 and based on the new requirements he feels that the Blue Flags awarded to Dunmore East and Ardmore in 1991 could be at risk. However he adds that both would probably comply with the requirements for a National Award for Managed Beaches which is a lesser award than the prestigious Blue Flag.

Mr. Mansfield's report concludes as follows: "I would however emphasise that both Dunmore East and Ardmore conformed with all the requirements of the Irish standards for bathing waters and with the values required by the EC Directive."

ACCIDENTS NEAR SIR THOMAS'S BRIDGE

One of the items listed on the agenda for the May monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held at the Teagasc Offices in Lismore last Monday was a request by Cllr. Ciaran O Riain for a report from County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn as to what plans, if any, he has to improve the visibility on the structure of Sir Thomas's Bridge. Cllr. O Riain's request was prompted by the number of serious traffic accidents which he stated have taken place close to the bridge in recent times.

We are fairly certain that many readers, like ourselves, may know little or nothing about Sir Thomas's Bridge. The fact of the matter is that we had never heard about it until we came across Cllr. O Riain's request on the Council agenda for last Monday's meeting — a very black mark against us we must concede. However a sur-

mise that it could be referred to in the "History and Heritage of Irish Stone Bridges," compiled by Peter O'Keeffe and Tom Simington, a most interesting book published by the Irish Academic Press proved correct.

This records that Sir Thomas's Bridge spans the river Suir a few miles downriver from Clonmel. Described as an asymmetrical bridge of six arches, it is located on a county road linking the townlands of Twomilebridge in Co. Tipperary and Tickincor Lower in Co. Waterford. The local tradition is that the bridge was built by Sir Thomas Osborne, the fourth baronet, who died in 1713.

In a history written by Lyons it is called Sir Thomas Osborne's Bridge at Kincur and was stated to have been built on the site of a weir formerly held by the Franciscans.

Other historical references

confirm to some extent that the bridge does not predate the last quarter of the 17th century. Maps of the period have marked Tickincor as "Kincur" on the south bank of the Suir and the Bridge is not shown on a map of Ireland attributed to a Mr. Rocque and drawn in or about 1774 but the assumption is that it may have been a private bridge on the Osborne estate at that time.

According to O'Keeffe and Simington's history, the present Sir Thomas's Bridge has a most unusual array of arches. Starting from the Tipperary or north end there is a small 10ft span semi-circular arch like a supplementary flood arch but within the overall normal flood channel of the river. This is followed by a large 55ft span with

an arch with a rise of 15ft. The succeeding four arches are all segmental consisting of a 40ft span, a 36ft, a 32ft and an 18ft 6in at the Waterford bank. The bridge is 15ft wide inclusive of parapet walls and is now load restricted because of defects in the 18th century arch.

The authors also point out that the deduction from the map evidence outlined is confirmed by a note in Canon Power's "Place Names of Decies" which states that Tickincor (Tig Cinn Coradh), the house at the head of the weir, refers to Osborne's mansion and that Sir Thomas erected the bridge, also known as Two-Mile-Bridge, in 1690. He adds that it was a private bridge with a gate in the middle until the mid 19th century.

PROVERBS AND OLD SAYINGS

Proverbs and old sayings have been having a fresh airing during the past week and one in particular has won almost worldwide publicity — it could happen to a bishop!

Seriously, though, with the type of weather which we have been having, the old saying which carries the most meaning for me is that which advises to "ne'er cast a clout till May is out."

An ornithologist friend of mine tells me that the cuckoo should have arrived by April 21. All the way from

Africa this wonderful bird flies over the Mediterranean and on until it reaches Ireland. But has anyone heard a cuckoo as yet? The saying about this strange harbinger of summer goes as follows:

"The cuckoo comes in April
And sings his song in May,
In leafy June he changes his tune
And in July he flies away!
'Twould be interesting hear whether, in fact, any cuckoo has so far reached our shores!

The Road To Dundee

Our choice for the ballad corner this week is "The Road To Dundee" which is the Scottish original of "Sweet Carnloch Bay." The latter was composed by the northern poet Mackay, who lived around the Glens of Antrim in the 19th century. Both have the same tune and general gist but the Irish version never found the same popularity as "The Road To Dundee."

Cauld winter was howling o'er muir and o'er mountains

And wild was the surge on the dark rolling sea,
As I met about daybreak a bonnie young lassie,
Wha asked me the road and the miles tae Dundee.

Said I, my young lassie, I canna weel tell ye
The road and the distance I canna weel gie,
But if you'll permit me tae gang a wee bittie
I'll show ye the road and the miles tae Dundee.

At once she consented and gave me her arm
Ne'er a word did I speir wha the lassie might be
She appeared like an angel in feature and form
As she walked by my side on the road tae Dundee.

They then transferred to the Shandon Road where they continued to teach until 1835 before moving on to the Youghal Road, now Rice's Street.



A quick snack so easy to prepare



IF you're ever caught on the hop when a friend turns up and you want to serve up a quick snack that's easy to prepare and only has a couple of basic, ready-to-hand ingredients, then you should consider:

Potato Pancakes

Ingredients:

- 4 medium-sized potatoes
- 1 medium-sized onion
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 1 tsp salt
- ¼ tsp nutmeg (optional)
- ¼ tsp white pepper
- ¼ tsp baking soda
- butter as needed



Method:

Peel the spuds and, if there's time, let them stand for an hour or so. Take them out of the water, dab them dry and grate them with a fine grater and press them to squeeze out any excess water.

Next peel and grate (or chop finely) the onion into the potatoes.

Add the salt, seasonings and soda. Mix thoroughly.

Heat 1½ tablespoons of butter (or cooking marger) in a large frying pan (or skillet) and add a spoonful of the spud/onion mixture for each pancake. They shouldn't be too thick; push them gently into a nice shape.

Cook gently until they are golden brown on the bottoms, then flip over and golden brown the other side.

Keep hot in the oven and add more butter to the pan and continue cooking the

pancakes until all the mixture is used.

Serve with ketchup, or any sauce of your choice, or with peas or salad.

Persevere with rhododendrons

BRIEF though it may be, the azalea and rhododendron season is one of the favourites with gardeners and non-gardeners alike.

For a few weeks around May they produce a riot of rich colours. Public gardens with a decent display attract droves of visitors.

Many leave vowing that, in their own small way, they will try to recreate the same splashes of colour against rich green foliage — sadly, many such efforts are doomed to failure.

Rhododendrons and azaleas are closely related although the former are generally larger and can reach 20 feet when not confined to the boundaries of a garden. Even the largest azalea varieties will not grow beyond 10 feet.

The other main difference between the two species is that some azaleas will bloom at other times of the year.



However, they do share one major preference which causes problems for the 'amateur' grower — their love of acid soils and an equally strong hatred for lime soil, which causes yellowing and spindly growth.

But all is not lost if your soil is not ideal. You simply need to create their own mini environment either by growing them in tubs filled with the right soil or by excavating a complete bed for their own use.

You will be investing a fair amount of money if you buy azaleas or rhododendrons so it is worth buying a proprietary brand of soil or

compost to ensure they thrive — the results are worth it.

Choose the site carefully as well. It needs some sun but these trees are shallow rooted and like a lot of moisture at their base.

Use a mulch to retain water and keep weeds down but always be alert and ready to water before the soil dries out. Avoid tap water, particularly in hard water areas — better to have a rain butt or even use water from the defrosted fridge.

Having chosen the site, the problem then is to sift through the many varieties on show in the shops and garden centres.

This is not just from a colour point of view but also due to the space available to you. If it is tight then you should stick to azaleas, which are more delicate and less overpowering in size and colour.

Popular varieties include

the pink Cecile, Orange Beauty and Koster's Brilliant Red.

But you needn't give up on rhododendrons entirely in a small garden. There are dwarf varieties such as Red Elizabeth and Blue Tit which grow to no more than three feet.

Once established in a well-prepared site they should bloom freely but you must break off dead blooms promptly to keep the trees flowering freely during their short season.

On the care side, prune rhododendrons when they start to straggle and lose their bushy profile.

Look to increase stock by pegging down or 'layering' low branches in summer. Once these have taken, cut them free and re-plant.

Azaleas can also be raised from seed in greenhouses though it may be a few years before you have any good specimens.







HISTORY OF CLASHMORE

This history of Clashmore by Samuel Lewis, was kindly given to us by

Gerald Fitzgerald—

Clashmore, a post-town and parish, in the barony of Decies-Within-Drum, County of Waterford and province of Munster, 12 miles (S.W.) from Dungarvan; containing 3772 inhabitants, of which number, 387 are in the town. Glaismor Abbey was founded here, according to Archdall, by Caunhear, at the command of St. Mochuda of Lismore, who died in the year 655; it subsisted till the general suppression, when its possessions were granted to Sir Walter Raleigh.

The town is situated on the mail coach road from Waterford through Youghal to Cork (to each of which a sub-post office has been lately established), and near the navigable river Blackwater, from which a navigable pill runs up within half a mile of the town, and in its course receives the waters of the Greague rivulet; it is

navigable for lighters of 20 tons burden, and might be greatly improved at a trifling expense. Over the river Blackwater is a handsome and very long wooden bridge, which leads towards Youghal.

The total number of houses, in 1831, was 50. A distillery is carried on, producing nearly 20,000 gallons of whiskey annually; and there is a large boulting-mill. Fairs are held on February 8th, May 20th, August 20th and December 16th. A constabulary police force is stationed here; and petty sessions are held every alternate week.

The small village of Ballinamultina, in this parish, is about half a mile to the north-east of the town, on the road to Dungarvan, and contains the handsome residence of F. Kennedy, Esq. The parish is bounded on the west by the river Blackwater, and comprises 7068 statute acres, as apportioned under the tithe act; the lands near the river are fertile, but towards the east are mountainous and of inferior quality. About one-half of the parish is under tillage, and the remainder is pasture.

Clashmore House, the seat of R. Power, Esq., is pleasantly situated in a fine demense, near the confluence of the Greague stream with

the Blackwater; the grounds are embellished with some remarkably fine trees; and near the mansion is a well of excellent water, called St. Mochuda's Well.

The living is a rectory and vicarage, in the diocese of Lismore, partly inappropriate in the Duke of Devonshire, and partly constituting the corps of the prebend of Clashmore in the cathedral of Lismore, to which the vicarage, with cure of souls, is united, and in the patronage of the Archbishop of Cashel.

The tithes amount to £705-2-8, of which £382-16-8 is payable to the improprator, and £322-6-0 to the prebendary.

The church is a neat modern edifice with a spire. The glebe-house, the residence of the prebendary, is pleasantly situated; the glebe comprises 10 acres, subject to a rent of £3 per acre.

In the R.C. divisions this parish is the head of a union or district, including also the parish of Kinsalebeg, in each of which is a chapel; that of Clashmore is a neat and commodious edifice, recently erected. A schoolhouse was built by the Kildare-Place Society, but it is not now used as such. There are two pay schools, in which are about 220 children, and a dispensary.


The club intends to stay for a long time yet and with the dedication of its members there is no doubt it will.

SUNDAY NEXT

Waterford Footballers Face Tipperary In Senior And Junior Football In Clonmel

Sunday next marks the start of the All-Ireland football championships and one game in the senior grade for the provinces of Leinster, Ulster and Munster where Waterford and Tipperary will renew rivalry in a game that is expected to be very close and exciting as have been many of their clashes over the years. The Ulster game involving Tyrone and Derry will be televised live by Channel Four and our game at Clonmel will be televised and shown on the Sunday Game programme on Sunday night.

Waterford and Tipperary also meet in junior football and this should provide a very entertaining curtain-raiser to the senior match.

A place in the Munster semi-final against Clare is at stake in both matches and this gives one or other of the trio a place in the Munster final against Cork/Kerry or Limerick. It is an opportunity that may not come our way for many years to come and I have no doubt that both counties will press this home as a motivating factor in the lead up to Sunday.

In all our meetings over the past fifteen seasons we have enjoyed an equal share of the results and we have played a couple of drawn games and a couple have been won by a very slender margin. An examination of the record which we publish hereunder will show what 'home' ground advantage has meant to the counties.

We have never beaten them in Clonmel or Thurles and they have beaten us only once in Dungarvan, over the past fifteen years. Our most recent meeting with Tipperary was in the National League at Ardfinnan and here they beat us very decisively, but we were without a few key players on the day. League and championship are very different competitions and traditionally teams perform differently in both, for some unexplained reason. I'm sure that our approach to the game will not be effected by the beating at Ardfinnan and that a little extra effort can make a lot of difference between teams whose standards are comparable. They will be asked for that extra effort when they finish training at Fraher Field on Thursday evening and before lining out on Sunday. Since the league campaign ended Waterford have played several challenge games and finished with a game against Carlow in

Carlow on Sunday evening.

After this game, it was intended to select the team for Sunday's match at Clonmel, but disappointingly, this was not done. One of the selectors was on duty playing championship with his club and a number of players were also not available for this final trial for similar reasons. The selectors, I understand had requested that games involving members of the team party, be played on Friday or Saturday. The selection was then deferred until Monday night after the County Board Meeting. In the expectation that it will not show many changes from the teams who have been on duty over the winter in the League we will see Tom Brennan in goal and the full line will have the Nire's Tom Walsh in the centre and flanked by Alan Power of Saviours and Peter Queally of Newtown. Dermot Callaghan, Dan Casey and Fintan O'Brien will be the strong contenders for the half back line positions with the selectors having an option on Ger Power, Ian Kiely and David Power. Martin Power and Johnnie Byrne (Modeligo) have been playing well as mid-field partners and may be retained. Forwards on the short list for selection are, Jim Maher (now back in good form), Liam Daniels, John Power, Kilmac', Peter Ferncombe, Pierre White, Ger Walsh, Derry Kiely, Kilmac', Derek Lyons and Derek Wyse.

As every member of the panel have been playing championship for the past several weeks, there can be no worries about the fitness of any player, so we can have no excuses of this side of things.

I have no doubt but that we are in with a great chance of beating Tipp., despite our record at Clonmel and if all our players give it their very best I would almost feel confident of winning.

The team will be published if available after selection on Monday night.

The 1978 saga will be remembered as one of the most exciting in the series of meetings between the counties as after a draw in Clonmel the sides again drew a week later at Fraher Field and after a hectic 30 minutes we emerged worthy winners but were subsequently devoured by Kerry (4-27 to 2-8) at Killarney.

What is generally regarded as the best every display of football between the counties, took place at Dungarvan in 1969. This was after the teams had drawn (Waterford 1-7 Tipperary 0-10) at Clonmel on the previous Sunday. The replay drew a huge crowd to Fraher Field and after a tremendous contest Waterford won on the scoreline of 0-15 to 0-14.

At the time of writing the junior team had not been picked and this too, I understand, will be named on Monday night.

Our record in junior football in the province is much better in recent years, than that of our seniors; even though I can recall at least a couple of agonising defeats after we had looked certain winners.

Last year was one of our best seasons in junior and with a little bit of luck we would have beaten Kerry in Dungarvan in August and gone straight through to the All-Ireland in which Kerry hammered Meath.

That game at Fraher Field will be recalled by many as we prepare to see them meet and hopefully beat Tipperary in the curtain-raiser on Sunday. Both counties are allowed to field their second best teams and

this is why the standards are so good in this grade in recent times.

Last year our juniors defeated Tipperary in the curtain-raiser to the senior semi-final against Limerick and with just a couple of changes the team went within an ace of beating the Kingdom side.

Most of the panel are available to us for selection and most of them were played in challenge matches with the county over the past couple of months. These include goalkeeper Kieran Heffernan, who was the senior county keeper for several years, Darrell Donnelly and Martin Sheehan, Dungarvan, Joe Salmon, Sean Phobal, Brendan Curry and Joe Murray, Rathgormack, Noel Whelan and Joe Roche, Bonmahon, Ned Power and Derry Kiely, Kilmac', Gerry Casey and Tony Geynes (sub-goalie), Faha, Pat Curran, Stradbally, Eddie Burke, Dungarvan, Michael Fraher, Nire, etc., etc. Practically all those players have senior experience and many have inter-county experience as well.

They could get us off to a winning start and bring off the first leg of what might be a great double on Sunday.




