

Bord Fáilte's Chief Opens Lismore's Heritage Centre

The Director General of Bord Failte, Mr. Martin Dully, has confidently predicted that British tourists will return to this country in increasing numbers in the coming years.

Mr. Dully accepted that for a variety of reasons many of them directly related to the Northern troubles and a lack of knowledge about Ireland generally - this country doesn't come readily to the British mind as a holiday destination.

"But all that is changing gradually," the Bord Fáilte chief said, "and I believe we can confidently look forward to significantly increasing numbers from our neighbouring country coming to Ireland in the years

Mr. Dully said competition in every sector of the tourism industry is "fierce," but Ireland has done reasonably well against such competition over the years.

"Even last year, when travel and tourism shrank because of the Gulf War, and when most European countries recorded large dips in visitor numbers, Ireland fared comparatively well. I believe we can continue to do so in the years ahead.'



CALL TO RESIST POST OFFICE CLOSURES

The President of the United Farmers Association, Mr. Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry speaking last week said that any attempt to put into effect the recommendations of the Foley & McKeown report in connection with sub-post offices should be strongly resisted by all rural organisations.

This report, he said, advises that more than the originally suggested number of 554 sub post offices should be closed. The report acknowledged that much sweeping closures would cause hardship to 5,000 Social Welfare recipients.

The report, Mr. Phelan

said, also advised that 200,000 roadside letterboxes should be installed for more efficient delivery of mail. This is an outright denial of the right of everybody in the country to be treated equally in the matter of mail delivery which is the only contact that many isolated, old people have with the outside world. Walking to one of those mailboxes, he said, inevitably becomes a physical impossibility for people as they become old and in-

Continuing Mr. Phelan said: "Instead of accepting further roadside mailboxes, the rural community should demand the removal of existing roadside mailboxes and insist that people be treated as humans and not as computer numbers.

Our government and politicians should be maintaining all existing services in rural Ireland with a view to preserving the population of the countryside. Reducing the dignity and self esteem of ordinary, decent people by removing essential services from them should not be acceptable to any straight thinking politician. People should now stand up and be counted on this issue.

Why the postal system is disrupted.

The country has suffered postal disruption for over two weeks. An Post believes you are entitled to a clear explanation of why this has happened.

An Post is losing money. It has been for three years. Accumulated losses are close to £14 million. This year we face a further loss of £8.5 million. This can't go on. Cost savings have to be made. There are no alternatives.

We have been talking with the Unions, particularly the Communications Workers' Union (CWU) for well over a year without any agreement on change. As part of these discussions

- the Company has delivered on pay. Between October 1991 and May 1992 An Post will have paid a 10% increase in pay to staff.
- the Unions have not delivered on <u>any</u> cost savings.

An Post has been demonstrably reasonable and patient, however, the process of trying to get agreement on change has gone on long enough.

Our overtime bill is £21 million a year. It is unnecessarily high and we have taken action to reduce it. As recommended by an independent Tribunal we have introduced temporary/part-time staff into Sheriff Street Sorting Office in Dublin to reduce exceptionally high levels of overtime.

Exploitative?

Not at all. An Post already has over 300 temporary/part-time staff in the Provinces with pay and conditions agreed by the CWU. Temporary and part-time staff are employed by post offices across the world because it is the most cost effective means of matching staff to work levels.

An Post cannot continue losing money. We cannot ask the customer to pay more now. The Government, the Company, and the Unions have all ruled out a subsidy. We must implement cost saving measures.

We are sorry that this means continued serious inconvenience to you our customers.

Our aim is to provide a better more cost efficient postal service for the future.



15 months, 41 meetings, the assistance of Government, ICTU, LRC and Tribunal have produced no cost savings from the Unions.

The History of this dispute.

- <u>February 1991</u> Facing financial crisis An Post publishes a cost saving plan.
- March/July 1991 Discussions with Unions under formula worked out by Government and Irish Congress of Trade Unions. Direct talks last until July. Then the issues are referred to the Labour Relations Commission (LRC).
- October 1991 Whilst talks are still going on the Communications Workers's Union (CWU) strikes for two days and then bans overtime. However, a three stage agreement is made between the Unions and the Company with the help of the LRC under which
 - Stage 1. The Company pays all outstanding "special" pay awards. Cost: £11.5m.
 - Stage 2. The Unions agree to negotiate cost saving measures with the assistance of an independent Tribunal. Priority items by 15 November 1991.

 Balance by 31 January 1992.
- Stage 3. The first phase of PESP, due on 1 November 1991, is deferred to 1 February 1992.

The agreement also says that in the event of any difficulties the LRC will rule on the issue involved.

- November/December 1991 Discussions on cost savings begin again under an LRC chairman. No agreement on the priority items. Both sides call on the Tribunal to make recommendations on these. Talks begin on the remaining items.
- 14 January 1992 The Tribunal issues its unanimous recommendations.
- 31 January 1992 Union breaks off all negotiations because the Company won't pay PESP. The Company reminds them that Stage 2 – cost saving negotiations – were to be completed before paying PESP – Stage 3.
- 26 February 1992 The LRC states that the Union demands for the payment of PESP are not in accordance with the three stage October agreement; cost savings should be agreed before payment of PESP.
- 27 March 1992 Unions return to negotiations and repeat demand for payment of PESP despite the LRC decision of 26 February. This is precisely the same position that they adopted on 31 January. Not a single change has been conceded to date and negotiations are clearly going nowhere. The meeting is adjourned.
- 16 April 1992 Cost savings are the issue not PESP so the Company decides to pay PESP and to get on with the cost saving recommendations made by the Tribunal. Temporary full-time and part-time staff are recruited in order to cut costs.
- 11 May 1992 LRC invites both sides for discussions.
 Unions refuse to accept independent Tribunal cost saving recommendations. Company continues to be available for negotiations.

What Beatification Means And Its Procedures

The beatification by Pope John Paul II in St. Peter's Square last Sunday of Monsignor Josemaria Escriva, the Spanish priest who founded Opus Dei, has not taken place without controversy, not the least of which has been the claim that the financial resources of the Opus Dei postulation office has been a major factor in the process.

Beatification is the second last step in the canonisation of a saint. A declaration of heroic virtue is the first step, conferring the title Venerable, meaning that the person practiced all the Christian virtues to a heroic degree. For a cause to go further, official recognition of a miracle by the church is required. For canonisation, a further miracle by the church is required, which must take place after the decision to beatify the candi-

With beatification, the Pope grants the newly Blessed a Mass and feast day in the church calendar to be celebrated in the places related to the person's life as well as in the institution or diocese of origin. Moreover, if the Blessed is of particular importance to the Church, he or she can be venerated universally.

In 1983 Pope John Paul II streamlined the procedures for the canonisation of saints. This was done in order to present contemporary models of holiness to the faithful. The need to speed up the procedures had surfaced during the Second Vatican Council and Pope Paul VI set the reforms in motion.

The changes introduced under the new procedures included: The time limit of 50 years which the 1917 Canon Law decided should transpire between the death of the Servant of God and the declaration of heroic virtue was abolished. Some decades used to have to pass before beginning the judicial proceeding on the life of virtue. Today, that part can begin shortly after the death of the Servant of God, with the immense advantage of having to hand the eyewitness testimony of those who knew him during his lifetime. And finally, only one fully authenticated miracle is now needed for beatification, whereas under the old regulations two were required.

The fact that Monsignor Escriva died in 1975, only seventeen years ago has given rise to doubts as to the many requirements to be carried out under the process. Questions have been raised as to whether money has been a factor in the pace with which the cause has been advanced. This has been vehemently denied al-

though it must be admitted that Opus Dei is a very powerful and opulent organisation.

It has also been strongly denied that the brisk pace of the presentation of evidence in the cause of the Founder of Opus Dei was due to a lack of rigour or failure to adhere to certain formal requirements of the process while it has equally been denied that corners were cut in the provision of the proper documentation required at each stage.

Whatever about these, the fact is that since his death, the fame and sanctity of Opus Dei's Founder has spread throughout the world. This is reflected in the thousands of spiritual and material favours attributed to his intercession, among them some medically inexplicable cures.

He never had to raise his voice, when he spoke you were compelled to listen.

Jack proved that he has not lost this gift. At the reception he held everybody riveted as he reminisced on the years he spent at the College from 1924 to this retirement in 1967. 

ICMSA Calls For Research Into Non-Food **Crop Production**

A call for EC funding for a national feasibility study into crop growing for nonfood uses was made on Friday by the Chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee, Mr. Donal Hynes.

Mr. Hynes said that with the proposed restrictions on traditional food production post CAP Reform, the feasibility of producing nonfood crops for bio-fuels and medicinal purposes must be at least thoroughly evaluated.

"When we consider that in the next twenty years the world oil supply may run dangerously low and when we consider our dependence on oil and therefore our vulnerability in relation to oil prices, it is essential that more resources be devoted to researching and developing bio-fuel crops. Add to these economic factors the environmentally friendly fuels and there is a strong case for research into alternative fuel sources," said Mr. Hynes.

Tallow Man Given "Final Chance" To **Redeem Himself**

A 21-year-old labourer, whose solicitor acknowledged that his client's record is an appalling one, was given a "final chance" after he handed £800 towards compensation into

Jerry Murphy, Woodview Park, Tallow, pleaded guilty at Tallow court to a total of nine charges including the larceny of £848 in cash from the Catholic Boy Scout Centre at Mount Melleray; causing malicious damage to a garda motor cycle, and taking without consent a truck which was then driven to Dublin for the purpose of selling it.

Other charges related to the uttering of forged cheques and obtaining cash in return from a butcher's shop and a branch of Allied Irish Banks in Co. Cork.

LONG LIST Supt. Ray McAndrew said most of the crimes were committed last August and subsequently Murphy went to

England. He returned two weeks ago, however, and surrendered himself to the gardai.

The Supt. said the defendant had a long list of previous convictions.

Mr. Jerry Healy, solr., told Judge William F. O'Connell there was no point in beating about the bush, "Murphy has an appalling

record," he admitted.
Mr. Healy, however, handed £800 into court on the defendant's behalf to pay compensation in full and asked that he be given a final chance to mend his ways. "He is genuinely trying to make one last effort to redeem himself," Mr. Healy added.

After deliberating at length and having acknowledged that the payment of the £800 had influenced the decision, Judge O'Connell imposed a number of concurrent three and six month suspended sentences on Murphy. He also bound him to the peace for two years.

May — a busy garden month

MAY can be a pulling, tugging, bending and back-breaking month.

Everything seems to be growing at once so there is planting to be done quickly, trimming or pruning of existplant stock and, abov all, a major assault to be made on weeds and pests.

It is probably best to start with the plants that have already had their day this

Tulips, for instance will need lifting if you want their beds for summer blooms they can be replanted elsewhere to allow the greenery to whither naturally, before finally lifting the bulbs for storage.

Any indoor bulbs can also go outside for 'finishing' before storage, but remember they must now become outdoor bulbs and be replanted in autumn - they can only be forced for indoors once.

Find time too to lift your



primroses. They will be healthier and add more blooms for next year but don't be tempted to use sites prone to dryness and direct

Despite the risk of frost, particularly on the east side of the country, you can then boldly plant biennials such as Sweet William, wallflowers and Canterbury Bells.

But you will need to stand by with cloches or newspaper to protect half-hardy annuals and dahlias on potentially frosty nights.

If you are caught out then remember that it is a good idea to water them with

tepid water first thing in the morning, using a fine rose on the watering can. This prevents them suffering from the contrasting heat of the sun so soon after the touch of frost.

It is also not too late to establish conifers and evergreens. Simply soak the root ball overnight before planting in soil enriched with moist peat or good well-rotted garden compost. Then make sure they are well-watered every day if the weather is dry.

Turning to chores, get a grip on your roses - yank up sucker shoots. These are the pale and extra thorny ones which sap the strength of the tree.

Then check and wipe out pests such as greenfly or aphids, and leaf-rolling sawfly. You will have to use an insecticide, so spray on a calm day, keep pets and children away, and cover all bare skin.

Some hedges such a privet will be starting to grow quickly and will need gentle trimming and shaping and the lawn may also be starting to look patchy and in need of a cut.

But avoid trimming new lawns until the blades are about two inches high.

Attack any weeds by hand at first or dab them with a paintbrush dipped in weedkiller. The last resort is a selective weedkiller that should help you keep them at bay for the rest of the summer.

You will need to use something potent as well to stop weeds and grass growing up between paving slabs and through paths, but always use a hoe elsewhere if you possibly can.

It's amazing how much vou can achieve if you simply wield the hoe for a few minutes every night after



Spratt won the race in 1986 but he will surely treasure this year's victory carved out dramatically in the final and controversial criterium stage around the streets of Dunlaoire on Sun-

day evening.
Spratt took the yellow jersey on Tuesday on the stage into Killorglin and defended it successfully until the penultimate stage from Gorey to Naas on Saturday when he relinquished the lead to Italian Giuseppi Giorini who went into Sun-day's final stage with an eight second advantage.

The signs were ominous on Friday when the Italian attacked on the category 1 climb on the stage from Dungarvan to Gorey and

The short stage from Gorey to Naas on Saturday had four category 1 climbs and here the Italians who are superb mountain climbers again attacked and despite a tremendous effort from Spratt helped by fellow Dungarvan rider Robert Power, the jersey changed hands and with the disappointment showing, Spratt had all but conceded victory going into the final stage eight seconds down.

REJUVENATED

It was a different story on Sunday as a rejuvenated Spratt rode superbly in the crit. to take on the Italians for the valuable bonus seconds available for the five primes.

He came off second best in the first when forced into a barrier by the Italians but fought back to get away in a break and by the end of the stage was back in yellow for a magnificent victory with a 22 second advantage.



"She jabbed me with something sharp in the ribs and I struck her with the handle of the telephone as I was making a call at the time," Murray said. Walter Power, a barman

Walter Power, a barman employed at the pub, said he saw the O'Leary's make for Murray with a hatchet and a knife in different incidents. The weapons were taken from them.

Judge O'Connell said he believed Murray acted in self defence on both instances and dismissed the assault charges against him.

He convicted both O'Leary's of assault and fined Patrick £25 and his wife £20. Patrick was also fined £25 on a charge of having an offensive weapon in his possession (a hatchet), but a similar charge against Mrs. O'Leary was dismissed because the charge made reference to a hatchet instead of a knife.

Inspector Michael Blake prosecuted.

Friday night at the official opening of Lismore's magnificent new Heritage Centre — an interpretive centre housed in the town's historic old courthouse — in conjunction with Lismore's designation by the National Tourism organisation as a Heritage Town.

Mr. Dully spoke of "the wealth of heritage" in Lismore; the town's magnificent preservation and conservation; the many God given endowments, and the numerous man-made assets of which everyone could be proud.

pean Regional Development Fund, and private investors with the advice and support of Bord Fáilte and South East Tourism. Thirteen new jobs have been created todate with additional jobs during the construction of the interpretive centre.

The new Centre contains

The new Centre contains the "Lismore Experience"
— a multi media presentation which tells the story of the town since St. Carthage's arrival in 636. There is narration by Niall Toibín.

There is also a historical display room which introduces the visitor to Lismore's Celtic origins and its flowering as a major seat of learning. In addition it incorporates an exhibition and video about the design and workmanship that goes into the making of Waterford Crystal's most famous range — the Lismore Suite, while a tourist information office is the final element in the Centre.

A family ticket is available which allows 2 adults and up to 4 children for £5.
