Bollard Blockade To Stop Unauthorised Camping At Quann's

Proposing a motion at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night that the Council take steps to prevent a reoccurrence of unauthorised camping at Quann's, Cllr. B. Kyne said that there was no point in going back over recent happenings arising from the influx of the huge number of travelling traders who had invaded Quann's. However he said that he

welcomed the publicity which the situation had been given and now that these traders had moved on, he felt that every effort should be made to protect the entire area from further such invasions for the future because it was possible that these travellers could again target the place.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White said that having con-

No Interest In V.E.C. Irish Scholarships

At the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan last Monday it was revealed as a result of the report of the examiner that only four students from Dungarvan applied for Irish scholarships to Ring College this year and that none of the four qualified. On the other hand there were 17 applicants from St. Declan's in Kilmacthomas.

The Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne remarking that there appeared to be no interest in Irish scholarships among the students in Dungarvan suggested that a query be sent to the school principal for his comments as to why only four students had en-

tered for this Irish exam. "Was there any reason for this," he asked.

Cllr. Kyne also commented on the imbalance shown by the number of entries from Kilmacthomas.

Mr. M. Geary (T.U.I.) pointed out that a sports meeting had been held at the school on the same day as the announcement was made about the Irish scholarships and it seemed the students showed more interest in the sports.

On the proposal of Cllr. P. Power seconded by Cllr. M. O'Riordan it was then decided to allocate two scholarships each to Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas with one going to the student with the highest overall mark.

Dungarvan Doctors Elected To Health Board

Dr. Jim Stacey, Abbey-side, Dungarvan has been elected as one of the Medical Doctors representatives on the South Eastern Health Board.

A series of elections for various medical disciplines in the region have taken place recently and Dr. Stacey was successful in being elected to one of the six positions which were contested by twelve candidates.

Formerly on the now de-

funct Waterford Local Health Committee, Dr. Stacey should prove a most able representative whose election to the Board has been welcomed by sitting member Cllr. Billy Kyne.

Also elected to the Board was Dungarvan born Dr. Michael Kelleher of St. Otteran's Hospital, Waterford who replaces Dr. J. Morrison, Clonmel, by agreement, as the representative of the regional psychiatric services.

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

“Play Truck” Presented To St. John's School

The presentation of a “Play Truck” was made by Mr. Jim Hewison, Manager of External Training, FAS, Waterford to Mr. Noel Brennan, Principal of St. John's Special School, Dungarvan.

The presentation was the result of one of a number of projects carried out by trainees on a FAS Training Course.

In November 1991, Jim Taffe was appointed Manager of West Waterford Development Partnership Ltd., an area based response to long term unemployment set up by the Department of the Taoiseach, subsequently a building on experience training course started in Dungarvan in December 1991.

This course provided an opportunity for trainees to

enhance their existing skills, thus enabling them to improve their employment prospects. St. John's Special School was very pleased to be associated with the FAS Course.

The trainees planned and constructed a “play truck” for the school, especially for the use of the younger pupils.

“A very fine gift for the school” was the comment of Noel Brennan, Principal of St. John's. He felt that the quality of the workmanship, obvious from the finished “truck” was a good indication of the skills acquired by the trainees.

Apart from the “play truck” project, St. John's also provided a suitable place for a trainee to experience working with children in an educational setting.

Local girl, Rebecca Wright, spent two days each week in the classroom, working under the direction of a teacher. The benefits were mutual, with Rebecca making a huge contribution to the work of the school, while gaining valuable experience which will surely help her when she begins to look for secure employment.

“A worth while association” was Mr. Brennan's comment when the course finally closed.

Seven participants have secured jobs, four have opted for further training/education and seven plan to set up in various businesses with assistance of the new enterprise scheme being introduced by the West Waterford Development Partnership.

The result of the training received was the completion of various individual and group projects, exhibited in St. John's on Thursday, June 11.

Council Query On Removal Of Lemybrien Chip Van

At the June monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last week Cllr. Pat Coffey raised the matter of the removal of a locally owned and operated chip van from the village of Lemybrien recently. He asked whether the Gardai had lodged any complaint with the Council alleging that the van had been a traffic hazard.

Cllr. Coffey said that the removal of the van had taken away the livelihood of the family who had operated it for a long number of years.

The complaint raised by Cllr. Coffey was supported by Cllr. Tom Cunningham who said that he had also been asked to raise the matter.

Mr. Brian McNally, County Secretary said that the Gardai were always concerned about chip vans when they were illegally parked or were illegally trading in an area other than a designated casual trading area which this was not.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer said that there was

no doubt about the van being a traffic hazard and he added that it had also tended to create litter in the vicinity.

Cllr. B. Kyne thought that having a public debate about the matter would not

help to solve the problem which might be better handled privately.

Cllr. Coffey continued to insist that a report on the removal of the van be obtained from the Gardai and this was agreed.

Farmer Was Barely Over The Limit

Patrick Hickey, Steady Castle, Ballinamult pleaded guilty at Dungarvan District Court last week to a charge of driving with excess alcohol but Judge M. Patwell was told that on the occasion the defendant exceeded the legal limit by only eight milligrammes.

Imposing the mandatory suspension from driving for twelve months together with a fine of £150 and an endorsement on his licence, Judge Patwell remarked that the defendant had been in tough luck.

Fined £100 For Possessing Cannabis

A 21 year old unemployed labourer was found by gardai to be in possession of more than two grammes of cannabis resin, Judge Michael Patwell was told at Dungarvan District Court last week.

Danny Wade, King Street Upper, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to having unlawful possession of the cannabis at Mitchel Street on October 1 last year.

The defendant, who told the court he had bought it for £10, said he had it for his personal use only.

Convicting Wade, Judge Patwell fined him £100.

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LISMORE TOWN COMMISSIONERS

Mr. J. Roche presided at the monthly meeting of Lismore Town Commissioners and also present were Mrs. M. Morrissey, Mrs. M. Ryan, Miss M. O'Connell, Mr. P. Dowd, Mr. F. Geoghegan, Mr. N. Hickey and Mr. Owen Madden. The Town Clerk, Mr. E. Flynn, Mr. B. McNally, Deputy County Manager and Mr. M. Geary, Chairman IRD, were in attendance.

REFUSE SYSTEM

In reply to a query from Mrs. M. Morrissey, Mr. B. McNally stated that smaller bins would be available where required. However, the fee of £1.50 would apply. In addition he stated that the scheme would be reviewed in October. Mrs. M. Morrissey stated that some reduction for old age pensioners should be made.

CIVIC

AMENITY SITE

Mrs. M. Ryan complimented the Council on the provision of this wonderful amenity.

LABOUR EXCHANGE

The Clerk reported that he had received a verbal report from Ms. Alice Howley, regarding the Exchange in

Lismore. It now appears that the problem with a premises in the town has been resolved and it was hoped to commence the promised service in approximately two months.

OTHER MATTERS

Mrs. M. Morrissey again referred to the small area in the Bank field which was left undeveloped by the building contractor.

Miss M. O'Connell referred to the lack of public lighting in West Street. It was agreed to leave this matter until September.

Mr. O. Madden highlighted the problem of shrubs etc., being vandalised at the weekends. It was agreed that not all the missing plants were the result of vandals as the culprits seem to be selective in what is being taken and that the situation be highlighted in the press.

Mr. P. Dowd requested that the footpath in the Bridge be repaired. In addition he requested that the Vee road be hedge cut as trucks especially, were having difficulties with protruding branches. The Clerk in reply stated that this road had been hedge cut that day. Mr.

Dowd requested that Church Lane be resurfaced. The Clerk stated that this road would be tarred as part of the surface dressing programme this year.

At the outset of the meeting Mr. M. Geary, Chairman of IRD addressed the meeting outlining the progress being made.

LISMORE CROZIER

Before the meeting concluded, Mrs. M. Morrissey, on a point of information, referred to the crozier on the current 28p stamp. She stated that with Lismore being declared a Heritage Town, they should highlight the fact that it is the Lismore Crozier that is depicted on the stamp. It was felt a pity that such recognition was not included on the actual stamp itself.

V.E.C. CONGRATULATIONS

On the proposal of Mr. J. Byrne seconded by Cllr. B. Kyne, Chairman, the members of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last

V.E.C. To Advertise For Six Teachers

Mr. D. O Ceilleachair CEO stated at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan last Monday that an increased number of pupils would be enrolled at Kilmacthomas for the coming session while an increase was also expected in Dungarvan.

As a result of consultation which he had with the schools Principals and Vice-Principals he estimated that at least 8 extra teachers would be required between the two schools.

Referring to the circular from the Department of Education on the removal of restrictions on permanent appointments in respect of

enrolments under the Vocational Preparation Training Programme (VPTP), the CEO said that this provided authority for the Committee to convert temporary whole-time positions to permanent whole-time without them having to be advertised. It also provided that where a VPTP course was in place for 2 consecutive years a permanent whole-time position could be created.

The removal of these restrictions would mean that no extra staff would be needed in Dungarvan beyond one whole-time teacher of Irish while 5 teachers would be needed for Kilmacthomas. It was agreed that these 6 posts be advertised.

On the suggestion of the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne it was agreed that Mr. M. Geary (T.U.I.) liaise with the CEO before the Committee's next meeting to enable a proposal to be put in place to maximise the position in regard to the teaching appointments to be made for Dungarvan.

Monday joined in extending congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. John Creed, Grattan Square, Dungarvan and family on the recent ordination to the priesthood of their son Rev. Fr. David Creed.

Court Sequel To Serious Crash At Affane Cross

A two-vehicle crash between a van and a car which occurred at Affane Cross, Cappoquin on Friday, August 2 last year had a sequel at Cappoquin District Court last Friday when the driver of the van, David Granleese (43), Fivemilebridge, Ballinhassig, Co. Cork pleaded guilty to a charge of careless driving on the occasion.

In the course of the evidence tendered, Judge M. Patwell was told that the defendant was driving in the direction of Cappoquin and at Affane Cross he turned his van into the path of a car driven by Mr. Maurice Kiely, proprietor of Bridgie Terrie's Lounge Bar and Restaurant, The Pike, Killineen, Dungarvan, who was driving towards Dungarvan. A collision occurred as a result of which Mr. Kiely sustained very serious injuries.

Convicting the defendant Judge Patwell fined him £100 with £50 expenses and directed that the conviction be endorsed.

OUR LOCALITY

Coolagh Road — The Irish name for this road is registered as "An Bóthar Cúlach." The Irish word cúl means 'back' as in gáirdín cúl (back garden). One explanation given is that Coolagh Road was once part of the back road to Waterford. However if one looks up Dineen's Irish-English dictionary one finds

that the word Cúlach is the Irish for 'Nook'. The cottage that preceded Tommy Moloney's house in the Burgery was named the 'Nook' so it is possible that Coolagh Road means the 'Road to the Nook.' The word nook itself means a corner of a field and hence the nook must have had a special significance for

Abbeyside people.

Home Rule Street — Last week we mentioned that it was known as Cúil a' tSáilín. There was a ferry across the river at the point before the building of the Bridge and Causeway. The river could be forded from the back of the sea pond at low tide. [More next week].



Yellow Lines And Parking Problems

Traffic regulations in the town were again subject to debate at a recent meeting of Waterford Co. Council, in fact the debate made headlines in last week's issue of this paper.

Members were discussing a report submitted to them by County Engineer Mr. John O'Flynn. The report was a comprehensive one setting out the problems and some suggested solutions. It is admitted that the yellow lines will reduce the number

of parking spaces available but to offset this it is proposed to provide off-street parking. One location suggested is at Lower Main Street which is within easy reach of the shops. Two others are at Twig Bog both are convenient but might not be so popular due to the severe gradient on the Main Street.

In the course of the report, Mr. O'Flynn took into consideration the problems for through traffic, i.e. people

using the streets to get somewhere else. He also mentioned elderly pedestrians who have to cross the junction sometimes several times a day. In short he accepts that there are problems and sets out to find solutions in the fairest possible way.

He is to be complimented on his report and we believe that the recommendations contained in it should at least be given a fair trial.

Lawyers Won't Part With Wigs

A group of High Court judges in Britain met in secret recently to discuss whether the centuries-old tradition of wearing wigs in British courts should be ended. After about an hour's debate on the issue the ten Commercial Court judges decided to pass their undisclosed findings to the new Lord Chief Justice, Lord Taylor for wider discussion.

Lord Taylor later said that he believed lawyers should shed their wigs and robes, projecting as they do, an old fashioned "out of touch image." There is, we understand, pressure for change from some sections of the legal profession who feel that dressing up in wigs and robes is, to say the least, uncomfortable. Traditionalists, however, are still opposed to any such move as they feel that the garb gives them additional status and distinguishes barristers from

solicitors.

Here in Ireland, Minister of State at the Department of Justice, Mr. Willie O'Dea T.D. has been recently spearheading a drive to bring the archaic court system into the 20th century. He has written to the Bar Council and has asked them to consider ending the practice of wearing wigs in court.

However the Ministerial request was met with the frosty answer that "any move which detracted from this formality would be seen as a retrograde step." We believe that the Minister who is, himself, a barrister was not amused and we understand that he is going ahead with a proposal in the new Criminal Evidence Bill which would make it easier for young people to give evidence. Courtrooms are places where people do not ordinarily find themselves at

ease and being faced by people dressed up in these old time wigs and gowns makes the situation all the more frightening. In this regard, Minister O'Dea is attempting to remove the atmosphere of fear, especially where young people are concerned, by allowing them to give evidence through a monitor with the counsel and judge (both wigless) sitting in another room.

We have referred to this subject a few times previously as we feel that it is beyond time to scrap this old-time fashion of insisting, as the Bar Council does, that barristers appearing in courts should don wigs and wear a gown. Indeed in hot and humid weather such as we have been having in recent weeks, we have seen judges giving permission in their courts on a number of such occasions to "off wigs." And then just for their own comfort off the wigs do come and the atmosphere immediately becomes more relaxed.

When it appears to be in order to discard the horsehair head-dress on such occasions and still continue with the business of the courts we can see no reason why this practice should be generally adopted in the future and as suggested by Minister O'Dea.

Amhran na bhFiann — A Soldiers Song

In a way we are amazed that so many of our readers, and this applies especially to the younger ones, do not know or at least have only a hazy notion of the words of Ireland's National Anthem. Composed by Peadar Kearney, its Irish version is "Amhran na bhFiann" while in English it has the title of "A Soldier's Song."

This fact was brought home to us when, because of the postal strike, a reader (obviously an exile from some part of Co. Waterford), now living in Birmingham phoned in seeking the words of the National Anthem. For his benefit and indeed for the benefit of all who may wish to learn it or keep it on file we accordingly make "A Soldier's Song" our choice for the ballad corner this week. It's the English version although we feel sure that many would prefer the Irish one —

We'll sing a song, a soldier's song, with cheering rousing chorus,
As round our blazing fires we throng, the starry heavens o'er us;
Impatiently for the coming fight
And as we wait the morning light,
Here in the silence of the night,
We'll chant a soldier's song.

NEW FISHERIES BODY LAUNCHED

A new development for trout and coarse fishing in the Southern region was launched in Clonmel last week by the Minister for the Marine, Dr. Michael Woods. The Southern Trout and Coarse Fisheries Development Society covers a large geographical area to include the rivers Suir, Nore, Barrow and Blackwater. This is one of seven set up around the country to give the angler a say in the development of trout and coarse fisheries in their own areas.

Dr. Woods, Minister for the Marine, launched the society at the Minella Hotel, Clonmel, on Tuesday, June 9 and there he presented a cheque for £10,000 to Mrs. Eileen Ryan, Clonnav, Ballymacarbry who is Chairperson of the Society.

The Minister appealed to

all those involved in angling, both directly and indirectly to give support to the new co-operative to ensure its success for the benefit of all. He asked the co-op members to come up with a plan for their region which he could then put forward at government level, to secure funding.

Membership of the new co-op is open to all. Anglers can participate by becoming shareholders, and angling clubs and other organisations can become corporate members. The Co-op will be run by a Management Committee of seven members, five elected by members and two nominated by the Minister, the elections to be held in December. An Annual Share Certificate will cost £12, while a 21-day certificate costs £5, a three-day certificate will cost £3. Angling clubs can become corporate members by contributing £120.

Eileen Ryan, the Society's Chairperson, welcomed the Minister. She hoped that the trustees would work well together until the end of the year to help to promote the new co-operative. She thanked the Regional Fisheries Board who had pledged their support. Chairperson Ryan said she looked forward to a new era in angling. Up to now she said it had been seen as a closed shop for special people and she wanted to see it opened up. It could be very useful in development work for native anglers and tourists.

She would like to see a greater involvement from young people. There were a lot of young people who would like to learn to fish and this should be looked into.

Deputy Noel Davern, South Tipperary/North Waterford, was also present at the launch. He wished everyone involved every success with the co-op and hoped that people would enjoy increased benefits from the rivers.

RESCUED FROM RIVER

Three teenagers had a lucky escape from drowning when they were rescued

from a flooded River Suir at Cahir on Thursday, June 11. The drama began when a schoolgirl fell into the River Suir at the Mall, Cahir and was swept down stream by the fast current of the flooded river. Two boys who jumped into the river to save her got into difficulties and they, too, had to be rescued.

Local Gardai and Cahir Fire Brigade were called to the scene as fears for the safety of the three people grew. It all happened as the local schools were breaking up for the summer holidays.

Around lunch time Siobhán Quinn from St. Finians Ave., Ardfinnan, a fifth year student at Scoil Críost Rí, Cahir, whose mother hails from Ballymacarbry (the former Bernie Doocey, Curtiswood), fell into the river and was quickly swept down river towards Cahir Bridge. Two boys, Raymond Conway, Raheen, Cahir and Mark Haide, Clonmore, Cahir, tried to save her but they were also swept down stream. Firemen extended a ladder into the river and brought all three to safety. Garda Sergeant O'Connor, Cahir, described it as a lucky escape for the three young people.

TELEVISION RECEPTION

During the past week Telecom Eireann engineers have been engaged in erecting a complete new Booster Station on Deerpark Mountain overlooking the Nire Valley and Ballymacarbry. The new reception in the district will be improved by at least 75% one of the engineers informed us. Lismore Health Centre


At the May monthly meeting of the South Eastern Health Board, the Programme Manager, Mr. Martin Hynes, said that the Board was considering purchasing a house at Parks Road for use as a combined health centre and psychiatric clinic. This would replace the existing clinic facilities now located at the former district hospital and which has become run down.

At the Board's monthly meeting held in Kilkenny last week, Cllr. Billy Kyne who is one of the Co. Council representatives on the Board, was informed by Mr. Hynes that progress on the project has been made and this now confirmed that the services available in Lismore in the past would not be discontinued as was feared some months ago.

Cllr. Kyne praised the various Health Board officials for all the work they had done to maintain the services provided for Lismore and is now obtaining the sanction of the Valuation Office in Dublin for the new project.

As we go to press on Tuesday we understand that a planning application has in fact been lodged with the Co. Council to have the house at Parks Road converted to a health centre.

A Good Pud For Diabetics



DIABETICS like pudding too, but there aren't too many they can safely eat. Here's a great exception made from that good old Irish standby, rhubarb.

Sugarfree Rhuberry Mould

Ingredients:

450g (1lb) rhubarb, trimmed and cut into 2.5cm (1 inch) pieces
2 tbsps cold water
1 pkt sugarfree (diabetic) raspberry jelly crystals
250g (1/2lb approx) carton fromage frais (extra sweetener, if required).

Method:

Simmer rhubarb with the cold water over gentle heat until very soft. Pour into a measuring jug. There should be a minimum of half a pint. If necessary top up with boiling water. Dissolve the jelly crystals in the boiling rhubarb, for those with a very sweet tooth, a little extra permitted sweetener can be added at the same time as the jelly crystals. Leave to cool in the jug. When cold and just barely starting to set add sufficient fromage frais to make up to 568ml (1 pint). Whisk well until fromage frais has blended in smoothly. Transfer to a serving bowl or individual

moulds. Leave in a cold place to set.
Serves 4-5

For the rest of us rhubarb lovers, here's a traditional favourite:

Rhubarb Crumble

Ingredients:

450g (1lb) rhubarb, trimmed and cut into 2.5cm (1 inch) pieces
2 tbsps golden syrup
1 tbsps water
Grated rind and juice of 1 orange
50g (2oz) brown sugar
Topping:
175g (6oz) breadcrumbs
50g (2oz) butter, melted
50g (2oz) soft brown sugar.

Method:

Place rhubarb in a 1-litre (2-pint) oven-proof dish. Mix together syrup, water, orange rind and juice and the brown sugar. Pour over rhubarb. Blend the breadcrumbs, butter and soft brown sugar and arrange on top of Rhubarb. Bake at 180°C, 350°F, mark 4, for about 40 minutes.

Serves 4.

Youth Sentenced To Detention For Ten Months

A 19 year old youth was sentenced to a total of ten months detention in St. Patrick's Institution when he pleaded guilty to a number of indictable offences before Judge Michael Pattwell

at Dungarvan District Court last week.

Edward Cash, with a current address at Bailick, Middleton, pleaded guilty to stealing cheques and cash to the total amount of £565 from his father Andy Cash; fraudulently obtaining a total of £185 from A.I.B. branches in Clonmel and Youghal by uttering forged cheques, and taking a van from Middleton E.S.B. depot on May 25 last without consent.

The court was told that no compensation had been paid and there was little likelihood of the defendant doing so. He had stolen a van in Middleton and driven to Tip-

perary town to meet his girlfriend and he then abandoned the vehicle.

"There is only one penalty for anyone who takes a vehicle without consent and that is a sentence of imprisonment," said Judge Pattwell.

Sentences of two, six and ten months were imposed, some running concurrently, making the total sentence ten months.

Dungarvan Rape Case — Man Charged

A young man made a brief appearance in custody before Judge Michael Pattwell at Dungarvan District Court last week charged with rape.

The accused, an unemployed labourer, is charged with raping a 19 year old girl at O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, in the early hours of May 11 last.

The accused was remanded, by consent, in continuing custody to the next sitting of Dungarvan Court on June 24. His solicitor, Mr. J. P. Gordon, however asked that the State make every effort to have the book of evidence prepared as soon as possible.

Waterford Co. Council Chairman, Cllr. Willie McDonnell at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan stated that there was now a lot of traffic in Lismore especially on Sundays and Bank Holidays. Many people tended to stop and park on the bridge and as this created obstruction he asked that a no parking line be laid along the bridge to prohibit such parking.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn agreed to discuss the matter with the Garda authorities and to report to the Council on the outcome.

Are Your Plants Good In Bed?

EARLY June is the end of the period favoured for bedding plants and the really green-fingered will probably have raised their own and planted them out by now.

But what if you never seem to have enough time and prefer to trundle down to the local nursery or garden centre and load the hatchback with trays of this and that? What should you be looking for?

It's largely common sense. Look for strong and green growth and beware of any yellowing or wilting — a sign that watering and care has been lax.

The plants should be starting to flower about now with many more buds forming.

But beware of any looking too succulent, as they may have just come from the greenhouse and not been hardened off in the open, meaning that they will get a shock when you plant them out and take longer to establish.

Once you have made your choice and taken the plants home then try to plant them as quickly as possible unless our fickle weather hits back with a cold snap.

If you have to keep them back for a while then ensure they are well watered and sheltered — a



makeshift cold frame would be ideal.

However, the loss of a few bedding plants can be tolerated in the end even if we all wish they were a little cheaper.

But what if you aim to buy something special — a specimen plant to fit into your garden display? Then it becomes harder to make the right choice though there are sensible guidelines to avoid wasting what can amount to several pounds on a poorly-reared specimen.

- try to spot any weedy or lanky growth — a sign of poor feeding, light and general care

- check for pests or diseases — curled or bitten leaves are a give away but look underneath too for aphids, red spider mite, the little brown "bumps" indicating scale insect, or white dust which is sure to be whitefly

- dry soil or compost and any weeds and moss are a sign of poor care at the nursery

- loose soil shows that the plant has not long been potted and become established enough to take the further shock of being replanted in your garden

- the sign which *does* indicate that the plant is established and well prepared for the move is a little bit of root showing through the drain-holes.

When you get the specimen home, do try to plant as soon as possible. Keep it well-watered until you do and after you have put it into the ground.

A word of warning about pre-packaged plants such as roses which are sold from the supermarket shelves or by mail order. Though they are often cheaper and prove to be effective, it is difficult to know or check exactly what you are buying.

Stick to reputable makes and shops chains — some have date stamping to guide you — and do try to plant these as quickly as possible in case they have been lying on a shelf for some time.

Waterford ICMSA News

John Cusack, County Waterford ICMSA Chairman, said that ICMSA are seeking to change the standard yield per cow used to calculate a small scale dairy farmer entitlement to suckler cow premia.

Mr. Cusack said that the present figure of 712 gallons is far too low and that the standard should be at least 823 gallons.

"The net effect of this would mean that while at present a dairy farmer with a quota of 12,819 gallons is deemed to require 18 cows to fill his quota, using the figure calculated by ICMSA (based on CSO data) only 15 cows (rounding down to the nearest cow) would be required in future. This would mean a gain of 3 extra suckler cows at this level of quota — a gain of £450 per annum

through extra suckler cow premia.

"The figure of 823 gallons is an average figure and can be contrasted to the milk recorded figure for herds of less than 30 cows, or 1095 gallons per cow per annum. The Department should seek an amendment to the relevant Commission Regulation to change this criteria immediately," said Mr. Cusack.

He concluded that in addition the ICMSA is calling on the Minister to seek a doubling in the 12,819 gallons ceiling so that an increased number of dairy producers can apply for the suckler cow premium on qualifying cows thereby establishing an individual right to suckler cow premium and an increase in the overall national quota for suckler cows.

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



COUNTY BOARD MEETING

Eamon O Murchu, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the County Board which was held at Dungarvan. The attendance was the smallest for the season so far and a number of officials and clubs were not in attendance.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

FINDINGS CANCELLED
The Chairman informed the meeting that the Dungarvan Club appeal to the Munster Council, had been successful, because the wrong procedures were followed by the Board in dealing with the matter. He outlined the procedures to be followed in future when dealing with such matters.

Because of the success of the Dungarvan Club and the cancellation of the £500 fine imposed on them, it was unanimously agreed to cancel the £500 fine imposed by the disciplinary committee on the Stradbally Club also.

REPORTS

There were reports from all the selection committees. The senior football report told about the championship defeat at Clonmel and offered no excuses for the disappointing display by the team, but reference was made to the failure of the county fixture committee to alter a few games when requested to do so on the Sunday prior to the championship match.

Michael Brophy said that the club games had been adjusted to facilitate the minors and seniors and the same should have been done for football. Arising out of that report the Chairman said he was very disappointed to find that the players had refused to return their jerseys after the game, having been specifically instructed to do so in the week before the game. he said that the jerseys had been sponsored by Bridge Hotel, Waterford and the sponsors name was imprinted in accordance with sponsorship regulations. The sponsor has been given an assurance that these jerseys would be worn for the National League as well as the Championship. He said the sponsors were entitled to this in return for their generosity. Michael

Brophy told the meeting that players on the senior panel were allowed to retain their jerseys after being beaten in the championship last year. Following a long discussion it was agreed that the players be requested to return the jerseys until the end of the season, after which time they could be handed back to those who had worn them.

The report from the senior hurling selectors told of the progress being made, the good response to training and their hopes for their semi-final game with Limerick.

The minor hurling and under-21 hurling reports also told of progress and their preparation for their coming games. The minors told of weekly challenge games in preparation for the Munster final on July 5.

The junior hurling report told of the problems related to their preparation for their match with Clare and in which they were beaten. Selectors not being appointed until a couple of months before the championship and the delay in finalising the senior panel, were among the reasons given for the teams unreadiness for the game. The report recommended that the junior hurling selectors be appointed at the July meeting of the Board, for next year's championship. The outgoing members are all prepared to allow their names to go forward for re-election. The Chairman said that while the senior and junior games were played at the same venue on the same day, there were bound to be problems. S. O'Brien said that the junior championships as presently constituted, were serving no useful purpose and should be discontinued.

Joe Byrne, Erin's Own, complained about a player from his club who had been injured in the junior game against Clare, not being properly looked after when it was decided that he should be taken to Ardkeen Hospital. The Chairman said that when the player was escorted to the ambulance by a uniformed ambulanceman, the selectors could not be

blamed for believing that he was being professionally cared for. The meeting were told that the Munster Council were investigating the failure of the ambulance staff, to take the injured player to Ardkeen.

REFEREE'S REPORT

The report of the Mount Sion/Dunhill senior hurling match, in which three were sent off and a Dunhill player was reported for interference with the referee, was again before the meeting. This matter was before the May meeting of the Board, but was referred to have an aspect of the report clarified. The report was voiced over the phone to the County Secretary, who in turn typed a copy which he handed to the Dunhill club, in order that the player involved in the more serious part of the report might be aware of the charge made against him. The Co. Secretary felt that the report was ambiguous and with the Chairman's permission referred it to the referee for clarification. In the clarified report the referee stated that the player jabbed him with the butt of the hurley. Both reports from referee John Kelly were before the meeting, as was a covering letter which stated that Paddy Lyons of Dunhill had approached him at a game in Cappoquin and suggested that the report should be watered down.

Con Murphy, Dunhill, stated that the first report was the only report as far as his club were concerned. This was the report given to the club and he submitted that it was the report which had been adopted at the previous meeting. Other members contended that it had not been adopted and there was some confusion and argument as to how the previous meeting decided to dispose of the report.

There was disagreement as to which of the reports should be accepted and when a vote was finally taken ten voted in favour of the more serious report and nine voted for the first report. The Chairman then ruled that as the first report was adopted, as far as he was concerned, it would

take a two-thirds majority to change this. Accordingly he ruled that the first report stood and the player was suspended for two months.

As the meeting was almost four hours in session at this stage, the other items on the agenda were not dealt with.

MUNSTER SENIOR HURLING SEMI-FINAL AT THURLES

Waterford Just Fail In Epic Encounter

LIMERICK 2-13 WATERFORD 1-13

To-day, games and sport are all about winning and when you lose, no matter how well you have performed or how much you have contributed to a mighty contest, it matters nothing. The loser is left alone to lick his wounds and wait for another time and another day. We have great experience of these situations and should be well conditioned for it. But no matter how often it happens you feel down in the dumps until eventually you get over it and begin to build your hopes on the next time.

Maybe we didn't have reason for feeling like this on Sunday as our opponents, Limerick, who had beaten All-Ireland champions, Tipperary and Cork quite recently in the National League, were the hottest of favourites and we were rank outsiders going into the semi-final at Semple Stadium. We were very much alone in hoping for a win, as outside the county very few gave us any chance of beating the recently crowned league champions.

It was a mighty game and with a little bit of luck we could have won and there was a stage in the game when it appeared that we might even canter home. We were denied a draw by a miracle last minute save by Limerick's goalkeeper Tommy Quaid when we had the hot favourites under very severe pressure.

ENORMOUS PRESSURE

Limerick exerted enormous pressure in the opening minutes and their strategy was obviously to kill off our challenge from the start. It looked like succeeding as by the 4th minute they had 1-2 on the scoreboard while playing against the breeze. They extended the lead to six points and by the 16th minute we were still without a score, but we had succeeded in slowing down the opposition. In the 17th minute having had seven wides, Waterford forced a '65' and from which John Meaney opened our account. It was followed two minutes later by a Paul Prendergast point. Twenty one minutes elapsed before Waterford were awarded the first of their six frees, despite some glaring fouls by the Limerick defenders. The over use of the advantage rule certainly was not to our advantage.

Houlihan and John Meaney exchanged points and then Meaney had another to leave it 1-4 to 0-4 in the 26th minute and with Waterford playing the better hurling. In fact we looked to have Limerick on the run in the final ten minutes of this half and should have had at least a couple of more scores that went astray. In this period we had three wides and three well scored points per John Fitzpatrick,

Sean Daly and John Meaney to leave the state of play level at the break. During this half, Waterford had ten wides and Limerick had seven while we had been awarded three frees as against five for Limerick.

For the restart, Waterford were on the field in good time, but Limerick did not appear from their dressing room until four minutes after the allotted ten minutes had elapsed and after the referee had dispatched a linesman to call them out.

WHIRLWIND START

Waterford had a whirlwind start and immediately set about successfully doing what Limerick had done in the first half. Within seconds Billy O'Sullivan had a point and a minute after this Andy Garvey made things level again for Limerick. When John Meaney whipped a ball all the way to the net in the 3rd minute there was wild excitement in the Waterford sections of the field and when Billy O'Sullivan extended our lead to four in the 4th minute things looked good for us. John Meaney put Waterford five points ahead when he sent over a free in the 6th minute and the roar from our thousands of supporters exposed their belief that the dream was about to come true.

Garry Kirby brought back a point and shortly afterwards Ray Sheridan made a fantastic save but the short clearance gave Kirby the chance and he made no mistake and had their second goal of the game. A minute later Limerick substitute Anthony Carmody had the first of his two points to leave the sides level. Full forward Joe O'Connor put Limerick ahead, but in less than a minute the full forward at the other end, Waterford's Sean Daly had things level again.

At this stage the hurling reached a blistering pace and both had it all to play for. Players hurled as if their very lives depended on every stroke. With just fifteen minutes remaining, team captain Paul Prendergast, with a great point, shot Waterford back into the driving seat and clubmate Sean Daly put us two up. Now there was just about

nine minutes remaining and a Waterford win looked to be on, but unfortunately we were not to score again and Limerick were able to add five, three from frees conceded inside the scoring area. In the 32nd minute with Limerick leading by 2-13 to 1-13, Waterford exerted tremendous pressure and forced two '65s' and a sideline cut-in, all of which brought play in around the Limerick square. The shot from Fitzpatrick which Quaid amazingly saved, was the last straw as far as we were concerned and very close to the last puck of the game.

All the way this was a game that lived up to the best traditions of good Munster championship hurling and while Waterford did not deserve to lose and certainly deserved a draw, we can attribute our defeat mostly to our very slow start and leaving more than a quarter of an hour to pass before we had our first point of the match, when we had the slight wind advantage.

Over the hour we had 14 wides each and we got six of the eighteen frees awarded during the match.

NO RECRIMINATIONS

Waterford players and our thousands of supporters accepted defeat graciously and it was nice to find that among our own people there were no recriminations or complaints, only praise and admiration for all concerned. They put up a mighty challenge and gave us reason to feel proud of how they played and hopeful for the future of hurling in the county.

The team was changed about quite a bit during the game, the major move being the switching of Damien Byrne and Jimmy Beresford. Brian Greene who partnered the improving Ger Fitzpatrick at centre field where Ger Hegarty and Mike Neale were rampant in the first quarter of the game, had to retire with an injury in the second half and was replaced by Kieran Delahunty after ten minutes. Delahunty, who missed the replay against Clare because of injury, was obviously not fully fit and played below his best.

Ray Sheridan made some very good saves and our

full-back line was very effective after the initial Limerick onslaught. Jimmy Beresford made some splendid clearances and Stephen Frampton and Dathai Foran both had good first halves. Dathai Foran obviously tired in the closing stages.

In the attack, Paul Prendergast, Billy O'Sullivan and Sean Daly all had fine games and Liam O'Connor who was pitted against man of the match Ciaran Carey, did well in patches of the game and Shane Ahearne distributed the ball well but did not figure among the scorers.

After the game, Limerick goalkeeper, Tommy Quaid, who had served his county in the same position for

fourteen years, admitted that he was very lucky to get to the ball in the last minute, that saved Limerick from a draw.

A draw would have been a very fair result, but we just did not have the luck and that is how it goes. With this team and coaching and the wonderful support from our loyal following we will certainly have another day.

With no further involvement at senior or junior level in either code on the inter-county scene it will be a case of full steam ahead with our club games and every date and venue will be taken up by all the Boards to make up for lost time and ensure that we finish in good time before the National Leagues begin. Since I was given the programme for the week-end, there have been some changes and in case there are others, it will be as well for patrons to check with the local club before travelling.

SENIOR GAMES

The pairings for the six senior hurling championship games are probably the best since the start of this year's competitions. There must

be some splendid contests, so much so in fact, that one cannot predict with any confidence what the result will be in any of the games.

MOUNT SION v. BALLYDUFF

Mount Sion had thirteen points to spare over Ballyduff when they met in the championship last year, but this was one of the few occasions on which there has been a scoring gap of this magnitude between them. Some of their games have been among the best of the championship series as the records will recall.

For this one, however, Mount Sion must be looked upon as clear favourites because of their form so far. Beating Dunhill and Fourmilewater might not be classed as great achievements, but the manner in which both victories were gained, is what counts. With John Meaney, Shane Ahearne, Ger Fitzpatrick, Brian Greene, Tony Browne, Pdraigh Fanning and company who are on the present county panel, they must be fancied to win.

Ballyduff showed courage, determination and some class when surprisingly beating Roanmore here in the first round, but then fell down on the job when faced with Tallow some weeks later. Ballyduff need to win this one to make sure of staying in the hunt. Unless they show a lot of improvement, they won't win.

LISMORE

v. ST. SAVIOURS

This is a clash between the senior and intermediate county champions of 1991 and it will be major shock if the senior champions are beaten. So far Lismore have only a single point from their two matches. In their favour is that both their matches (against Ballygunner and Passage) were the best contests of the championship so far. They drew with the 'Gunners and lost by a couple of points to Passage, when finishing with only fourteen men.

Saviours also played a draw in their first match when they finished level with Portlaw, but were well and truly hammered by Ballygunner. On the basis of this form, the champions will win this. It is the first game at Fraher Field on Sunday and as the programme is presently organised there will be four

matches there on the afternoon/evening.

Roanmore did not have a second game because of the controversial postponement of their game with Dunhill. I believe that a repeat of their good form against Ballyduff will see Tallow in front at the finish, but it will be a tight squeeze.

PORTLAW

v. DE LA SALLE

Two very evenly matched sides will provide some excitement at Dunhill venue and victory can go to either side. De La Salle are by far the younger side and with Johnnie Brenner, Noel Dalton and company to lead them they may scrape through. Portlaw who drew with Saviours, played good hurling when beating Dungarvan in the second round.

PASSAGE

v. BALLYGUNNER

Being previewed as one of the outstanding matches of the championship, this local derby between rival clubs is expected to produce a winner who will be very short listed for the county title. It is confidently expected that both will qualify for the

knockout stages. Using county champions Lismore as a yardstick, it will be a very close affair. Passage beat Lismore while the 'Gunners and the champions played a draw.

Led by the Cullinane's, Sean and Seamus, Ray Whitty, etc., Passage may have a slight edge on their neighbours who will have Fergal Hartley, Billy O'Sullivan, Noelle Crowley, etc., etc., in the attempt to set back their neighbours a bit. It may be regarded as an upset if Passage win, but I for one, won't be in the least surprised if this happens.

High Admission Prices
