Serious Injuries For Kilmac' Group In Savage Dungarvan Attack

Three young men were removed to Cork and Waterford hospitals after they and about 15 of their friends were set upon and viciously beaten outside a Dungarvan hotel in the early hours of last Saturday morning.

One man sustained a fractured jaw, others received multiple stitches in head and facial wounds, and it is feared that another may have to undergo plastic surgery.

Gardai are carrying out a full-scale investigation into the vicious incident which one officer later described as "savage in intensity."

What started out as a "benefit" social evening organised by the Kilmac-

thomas GAA Club for a clubman who recently received a serious knee injury ended in the horror attacks, which it is believed were orchestrated by a local Dungarvan gang.

When members of the Kilmacthomas party left the hotel in the Shandon area to get their coaches home they were set upon by a gang wielding sticks and other instruments, including the luminous timber road re-

flectors which are a feature of the main roads around the County.

About 17 members of the Kilmacthomas group were injured and had to be medically treated.

One, Trevor Whelan, was detained in Waterford Regional Hospital where he received multiple stitches in a severe wound that stretched from the top of his head all down the side of his face.

Another of the injured received 33 stitches in a neck wound, while Ned Power

Council Moves To Control Speed Boats In Dungarvan Harbour

Arising from a complaint by the Abbeyside Shore Angling Club on the use of speed boats in the harbour area discussed at a previous meeting, a letter on the subject was considered at the June monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council from the Council's legal advisers, Messrs Lanigan and Curran.

This stated that there was no provision under the Dungarvan Harbour Markets and Improvement Act of 1863 and the By-Laws made under that Act on January 6, 1864 to deal with this type of complaint and it added "It may well be the position, in view of the fact that much of the By-Laws in question are out-dated, the Council should consider making an entirely new set of By-Laws but whether or not this is done, the law of negligence would apply in the type of situation outlined in the Angling Club's letter."

Commenting on the letter, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that when he raised the matter at the previous meeting all he was seeking was for an orderly use of the inner harbour and he did not contemplate the reaction that followed. He went on to say that he had never used the term "aqua hogs" as

had been reported in the press and which understandably caused annoy-

ance to the group he was referring to.

Over One Million Say "Yes" For Europe

The scale of the 'Yes' victory in the Maastricht referendum held on Thursday, June 18, surprised even the most optimistic of those who favoured the treaty. By a clear 2 to 1 majority the people of Ireland showed their maturity and common-sense in refusing to be stampeded by fundamentalists of either right-wing or

left-wing vintage.

In a total poll of 1,457,243 representing a countrywide turnout of 57.25% of the electorate, 1,001,076 voted 'Yes' while 448,655 voted 'No,' giving a 69.05% — 30.95% split.

Here in the Waterford Constituency the total poll was 36,964 (a turn-out of 58.04%) of which 26,923

voted 'Yes' and 9,850 voted 'No' or 73.21% compared to 26.79%, a resounding result in favour of the Treaty of European Union by the people of Waterford.

In the Munster Region as a whole, of a total poll of 426,121 (a 58.50% turnout), 295,723 (69.79%) voted 'Yes' and 128,030

To her husband and family, her father and brother and sisters and many other relatives we convey our heartfelt sympathy on their sad


loss. May the earth of Kilrossanty rest lightly on her grave.

Further Threat To More Crystal Jobs

Several hundred more jobs are on the line at Waterford Crystal as the Waterford Wedgwood group strives to bring the lossmaker back into the "black."

Waterford Wedgwood Chairman, Don Brennan told the A.G.M. in Dublin on Wednesday of last week that a cost rationalisation programme now underway at the plants in Kilbarry and Dungarvan would contain "staff reductions at all levels." And following the meeting, the man who heads the Crystal division, Dr. Paddy Galvin went further when he said that cost-cutting could result in shedding "several hundred jobs."

But with 2,000 still employed, Waterford Crystal is the largest industrial employer in the South-East and a business which is crucial to the whole economy of Waterford.

A study of the whole operation in Waterford by Brian Paterson, a former executive of Guinness, the Investment Bank of Ireland and the management consultants Somers & Associates has been going on for some months. It is expected that the outcome of that review will determine the number of jobs which management want to shed.

OTHER COST-CUTTING ELEMENTS

In addition, Mr. Brennan

told shareholders that other cost-cutting elements will include "changes in product lines to reflect demands of today's and tomorrow's markets, as well as equally profound changes in methods of procurement, distribution and customer service."

Procurement means sourcing crystal from outside the country, such as with the new "Marquis" range, which is being made in the former Yugoslavia. He stressed to shareholders that the group could not wait for market recovery but had to take action now. Waterford Crystal Senior ATGWU Convenor Jimmy Kelly said that the union was now awaiting the comprehensive study of the industry commissioned by the company.

The threat to jobs had led to a lot of worry and concern among workers and rumours were rife.

ICTU TO SEEK TALKS

On Thursday the Irish Congress of Trade Unions announced that it was seeking a series of top-level meetings to discuss this latest crisis at Waterford Crystal.

It has suggested that the

IDA take an equity share of the company in order to save jobs and general secretary Peter Cassells said that an all-out effort must be made to save the estimated 700 jobs which are threatened.

Dept. Inspectors Accused Of Harassment In Dungarvan

Cllr. Mary Dixon accused Inspectors of the Department of Social Welfare of harassing some long-term unemployed people living in the town when she spoke at the June monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last week.

Cllr. Dixon said that Inspectors had cut off weekly benefits in several of these cases on the pretext that the unemployed people concerned had not tried sufficiently hard to find work. She said that in following this course the Minister for Social Welfare, Mr. Charlie McCreevey and the Inspectors of his Department were trying to make savings off the worst hit sections of the community.

Cllr. Dixon instanced the case of one person who had successfully appealed an Inspector's decision to cut her benefit but it had taken her twelve months to do so. She said that it was a disgrace to treat people in such a callous and inhuman manner making them get letters from this and that employer to prove that there was no work available for them. "This", said Cllr. Dixon, "is harassment of the worst kind on unfortunate people who simply cannot find work."

In support of the points made by Cllr. Dixon, Cllr. Paddy Power reminded the Minister that it was the State's function to provide jobs instead of cutting the already paltry allowances paid to those unfortunate enough to be out of work.

A CROCK OF GOLD

The difficulty of finding a job in Dungarvan nowadays was likened by the Chairman, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, to finding a crock of gold at the end of a rainbow.

Pointing out that there was now no job recruitment by

even the major concerns in Dungarvan in recent times, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that a letter should go to the Minister expressing the Council's concern at the manner

in which benefits had recently been cut to a number of people who were genuinely unemployed in the town. "We should let him know that the Council won't

support any attacks on those who are dependant on the social welfare system," said Cllr. Kyne.

The Council agreed unanimously to this suggestion.

National Radon Survey Includes Co. Waterford

The Radiological Protection Institute has announced details of a geographically-based national survey of radon in Irish homes. The survey, which will extend over a number of years, will involve measurements in approximately 6,000 homes nationwide. Once completed, the results obtained will allow identification of areas at particular risk of elevated indoor radon levels.

Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas. It is formed in the ground by the radioactive decay of uranium, which is present in small amounts in rocks and soils. Because it is a gas, radon can move freely through the soil. Radon which surfaces in open air is quickly diluted to harmless concentrations in the atmosphere, but if it enters an enclosed space it can build up to unacceptably high concentrations. Lifetime exposure to elevated levels of radon is believed to increase the risk of contracting lung cancer.

Letters of invitation to participate in the survey are now being sent to householders in selected parts of South County Dublin and County Wicklow. Measurements in parts of counties Waterford, Kilkenny, South Tipperary, Sligo and Leitrim are also planned for 1992. Names and addresses

have been randomly selected from the Register of Electors.

The measurement process involves placing radon detectors in a well-used living area and in a bedroom for a period of twelve months. Each detector is about the size of a matchbox and is completely harmless. The

survey will be conducted entirely by post. At the end of the measurement period the householder will be sent the results of the measurements and a recommendation.

For householders not included in the survey, the Institute offers a radon measurement service at a cost of £15 per detector.

ABBEYSIDE FOOTPATH SUGGESTION

At the June monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last week, Cllr. B. Kyne referred to the fact that the Co. Council were to carry out remedial work at the roadway between Murphy Place and McCarthyville in Abbeyside. He thought that this might be a unique opportunity to

ask the Co. Council to redesign the footpath there to encourage residents and especially children to keep on the footpath further up into Murphy Place before crossing the road on to the railway bridge.

It was agreed to refer the suggestion to the Co. Council.





The term "the Bridge" was used by many of the old generation when talking of Sexton Street. Mr. Sexton M.P. after whom the street is named had no direct connection with the local area, as far as we can ascertain. Can any of our readers locate "Thiar na Tra"?

were minus a beret. After subs were collected the S.L. gave a talk on this year's camp to Roscrea explaining roughly what would




Travelling Traders And The Law

As decided at the last meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, the first steps to ensure that there would be no reoccurrence of the invasion of travelling traders to the Quann's seafront area of the town have now been taken. A 'goal post' barrier has been erected at the Quann's entrance to the area which will effectively prohibit the entry of caravans from that end while at the Childers Estate end it is planned to erect a number of bollards to stop vehicular traffic getting on to the area from that side.

So far so good but these steps are only effective as far as the area of Quann's is concerned. There are other areas in the town and adjoining districts which may form a target for some future incursions by these traders to the locality and these will continue to remain vulnerable.

As Councillor Dec Goode very rightly pointed out during the discussion on the problem at the Urban Council meeting these travelling traders could take over the green area to the front of the houses at Boreenatra on finding their entry to Quann's blocked off. They would be brazen enough to do just that as they have no respect for law or order, he is on record as saying.

Equally so they could swoop on the wide green area which has been developed along the upper reaches of the Sweep on the Youghal Road where such a massive, magnificent job has been in progress removing the hairpin bends, and in so doing destroy the panoramic view of Dungarvan Bay for locals and tourists alike who approach the town from that direction. That is, of course, unless, as one with old experience where these

problems are concerned pointed out to us, the County Council doesn't safeguard the area by placing some boulders along the roadside as quickly as they possibly can!

While all these suggestions are, at best, only temporary measures they still leave the Local Authorities more or less powerless where the law is concerned. As Dungarvan Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie While, pointed out during the Urban Council discussion, the procedure in securing a Court injunction to shift the travellers once they have occupied an area is both complicated and very expensive and in the long run almost ineffective.

This is a nationwide problem as these travellers move in convoy from one area to another. Last week Laois County Council was grappling with it as 300 of them in more than 80 caravans

descended on Portlaoise, as they had done in Dungarvan some weeks ago. The same group or groups of a similar kind have been the centre of controversy in centres all over the country in recent years.

As the Secretary of Laois County Council pointed out: "they create a fierce mess and nuisance with no sanitation. No local authority is equipped to deal with this and we should have some effective legislation to control this type of indiscriminate parking."

Why has such effective legislation not so far been enacted and why has the Government, despite repeated requests from Local Authorities all over the country, failed so far to introduce laws to adequately control this growing hazard to health and environment? These are good questions.

COULD SEIZURE BE THE SOLUTION?

We understand that the hard core of these travelling traders come from Rathkeale in Co. Limerick where they are reputed to own some fine houses to which they retire when they are not travelling around 'creating the fierce mess and nuisance' referred to by the Laois County Secretary. This is in the Constituency

of former Foreign Affairs Minister Collins and one cannot be blamed for wondering whether this has anything to do with the failure of the Government up to this to introduce legislation to grant the necessary powers to local councils to curb these roadside encampments.

What is required is a law

which would declare it illegal for these caravan traders to park in certain non-designated areas and which would enable the Gardai and/or officials of Local Councils to legally impound caravans and vehicles found so illegally parked which would be released only on the payment of a penalty of, say, £1,000

or £2,000.

This fear of seizure of their valuable properties to be released only on the payment of hefty penalties should prove the necessary deterrent to keep these people within the parameters of the law. This is the advice which has come to us from a man who has a vast experience in this and similar matters and we wholeheartedly concur with it.

So now we add our call to the Ministers of Justice and Environment to combine their energies to see to it that the required legislation to enable local authorities to deal with this problem in a straightforward manner is introduced without further delay.

P.S. — Since we started compiling this column we have learned that a move has been initiated to raise this controversial subject in the Dail. Fine Gael Chief Whip, Charles Flanagan stated on Sunday last that he would be proposing an amendment to the Roads Bill, presently before the Dail, seeking to curb large convoys of travelling traders on the road and to outlaw the practice of indiscriminate caravan parking.

It will be interesting to note what the reaction of the Government will be to this move.

Company secretary John Morgan disclosed that, with the exception of the former chairman Howard Kilroy, the scheme (under which the executives hold redeemable preference shares in Dungarvan Crystal at the behest of the parent company Waterford/Wedgwood) is exclusively for the executives and is part of their total remuneration package.

The IFA man added that Mulder farmers had contacted the Association in large numbers over the last week following the appearance of advertisements from professional advisors in relation to the preparation of compensation claims.

Mr. Curran pointed out that Mulder quota alloca-

tions have been made to over 12,000 milk producers in the EC, 1,800 of which are in Ireland. Over the coming weeks the EC Commission will issue a notice admitting liability in relation to the case.

He added that following this the Commission legal services will meet Mr. Mulder and the other people involved with him in the case after which a further notice outlining details on the Mulder quota compensation claims will be issued.

LOW FAT FLAN

THERE was a time when we only saw turkeys as Christmas drew near. Not any more, of course. Turkey is now available all year round, fresh or frozen.

It's become increasingly popular too, thanks to the nationwide shift to healthier eating. More and more of us are eating a diet which is lower in fat and higher in fibre rich starchy foods such as pasta, bread and potatoes, to help prevent heart disease.

Turkey is high in protein and has one of the lowest fat contents of all meats once the skin has been removed.


For a turkey meal that's different — and healthy — and uses a low fat equivalent to pastry in the form of chestnut puree and porridge oats, try this:

Oaty Chestnut Flan

Ingredients:

The Pastry

- 439g (15.5oz) can of chestnut puree
- 50g (2oz) polyunsaturated



- margarine
- 150g (5oz) porridge oats
- 2 tsp dried mixed herbs.

The Filling

- 450g (1lb) stir fry turkey strips or turkey fillet, cut into strips, thoroughly thawed if frozen, and skin removed
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 100g (4oz) button mushrooms, sliced
- 225g (8oz) frozen mixed vegetablesthawed
- 300ml (1/2 pint) chicken or vegetable stock
- 2 tbsps cornflour
- 150ml (5fl oz) plain low fat yogurt

Method:

Heat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. In a bowl mix the chestnut puree with the margarine until smooth,

then fork in the porridge oats and herbs. Press the mixture into a 25cm/10" flan dish. Place in the oven and bake for 25-30 minutes until crisp.

Meanwhile make the filling. Pour 3 tablespoons of the stock into a non-stick frying pan, add onion and cook until all the liquid has evaporated and the onion begins to soften. Add the turkey and stir fry until golden for 4-5 minutes. Stir in the mushrooms and cook for 2 minutes. Add the vegetables and stock and simmer for 2 minutes. Blend cornflour with 1 tablespoon of water, add to mixture and cook until sauce is quite thick, stir in yogurt, heat through then pour into flan case and serve. Serve with baked of boiled potatoes and green salad.

Serves 6.

Beating The Current Drought

As the sun heats up and the summer days become drier, don't turn your lawn into a dust bowl.

Of course, it's harder to keep it well-watered when hosepipe bans are a fact of life, but there are ways of stopping your lawn going brown and dusty.

And a little effort each week is far preferable to breaking your back with patching, raking and reseeding or even laying an expensive and time-consuming new lawn. So try these tips for a greener and happier-looking lawn:—

- mow frequently by all means if the lawn is growing fast, but never cut close so that the grass is easily scorched
- fork, spike or slit the lawn so that rain and watering has a chance to get moisture to the roots before the summer heat evaporates it away
- water at sensible times — early morning or dusk — to prevent evaporation
- install a rain butt fed from a downpipe on your house or an outbuilding — if it's the garden shed or another outhouse it should be closer to where you need the water
- be sensible about wear and tear on the lawn during hot

weather. If it is dry then lots of running feet or laden wheelbarrows are not going to help.

Don't forget other potentially crucial garden chores while you are watching the lawn. There is lots more watering to be done elsewhere and if you do have to use a watering can then a garden butt really is a boon. Use a fine rose on the can to emulate the effect of summer rain and avoid battering down the growing plants. Again, water at the ends of the day to make the most of the water and your work. Use just enough to wet the surface of the soil without causing puddles. If you want to lessen the burden then use a mulch such as pulverised bark, chopped straw or — plentiful now — lawn clippings. This will keep the dampness in the soil although, admittedly, it doesn't always make for a beautiful-looking garden. Attack weeds as soon as they appear, preferably by hoeing or catch-



ing them early and yanking them out by hand.

However, if they have become established and you risk leaving part in the ground — a problem with dock and dandelion — then

'paint' on weedkiller using a paintbrush to minimise any risk to surrounding flowers. In the case of the lawn, you could also water in a selective weedkiller.

Another strong grower now is likely to be the hedge, especially if it is a privet — and it is likely to need another 'haircut' in a month's time.

If you think your watering arm can handle looking after seedlings you could also think about sowing some vegetables this month. French and runner beans, and spring onions for the summer salads are options. And you could think about planting carrots for autumn and broccoli and sprouts for winter, and cabbage for the spring.

Who says there's nothing like relaxing in the garden during summer?

Guide To Safe Boating

The recent spell of fine weather has encouraged many people to go boating. The National Safety Council is anxious to ensure that people are aware of the dangers involved in boating activities and has issued the following guidelines:

1 — Ensure the craft is seaworthy — check your boat, sails, oars, oarlocks, engine, fuel on board.

2 — Inform a responsible person of your intentions, duration of your trip, number and names of persons you have on board, and when you expect to be back. If you do not return on time the rescue services should be notified at once by dialling 999.

3 — Check the weather forecast for the areas in which you intend to operate.

4 — Check that you have lifejackets or buoyancy aids for everyone on board and also at least one lifebuoy with line attached.

5 — If you are undertaking a voyage outside your local areas check that you have a properly corrected compass

and charts on board for the voyage, and you know how to use them correctly.

6 — Any small boat going to sea should have at least two parachute distress flares, two red hand-flares, and two smoke signals on board. Instructions for their use are on the sides of the signals. They should be stowed in a clearly marked water tight container.

7 — Boats with engines should have all necessary spares including fuel, engine tool kit, spare plugs and a small fire extinguisher.

8 — All small boats should carry in watertight containers some fresh drinking water, water resistant torch, small first aid kit and a knife.

9 — All boats irrespective of size should have a small boiler on board. Larger size boats should carry a bucket with lanyard attached.

Remember Your Medication

Arthritis, Ireland's most prevalent disease, is a serious national health problem, affecting nearly half a million people — men, women and children.

Thousands of Irish people with arthritis must take medication every day for their disease. Taking your medication at the right time and in the right quantity is absolutely essential to get the maximum benefit.

Arthritis and arthritis medications have several special characteristics. For example, the disease has periods of remission when it is less active and symptoms disappear for a few days or even a few months. When experiencing a remission, a person can be tempted to stop taking medication, but this should be always discussed with a doctor first. An important reason for this is that most arthritis drugs are effective only after they build up in the body. Most will remain effective for a few days even after a person stops taking them, but when the person re-starts a medicine, even after missing just one dose, it can take many hours or days to build effectiveness back up to desirable level, during which time the person may suffer severe pain.

The Arthritis Foundation of Ireland offers some simple suggestions to sufferers on regular medication.

★ Take medication at the same time each day.

★ If possible use a special pillbox which has seven compartments, this will allow you to keep a week's supply of pills handy, arranged into daily doses.

★ Keep a monthly calendar next to your medicine container and check off each date as you take the medication that day.

★ Keep your medication in an obvious spot, such as in a visible place in the kitchen or bathroom but always well out of reach of young children.

IFA Warns Waterford Farmers Against Use Of Angel Dust

IFA Waterford Chairman, Pat Murphy has called on farmers not to be complacent about the use of Angel Dust with beef cattle.

Mr. Murphy identified the feeding of "Angel Dust" to cattle as a major threat to meat marketing, both at home and abroad. He said that Waterford I.F.A. would take a dim view of "Angel Dust" or beta-agonist use, and he called on farmers who knew of others using the product to approach them and ask them to cease this practice.

"The beef industry is of vital national interest to all of us," said Mr. Murphy, "and we cannot afford to see it jeopardised by a few cowboy operators."

Waterford Team Poorly Prepared

A Chara,

The scribes have written eloquently and at length about the Waterford hurlers "gallant" but "unlucky" display in the Munster semi-final against Limerick. The good name of Waterford hurling has been upheld, they say, and we can feel proud of the team.

My own feeling after the game was one of annoyance that not only had Waterford, once more, come so near and yet so far, but that they lost a game they should have been capable of winning. The general reaction in the pubs after the game was very critical of many aspects of the way the game was handled on the Waterford side. However, one never reads similar criticisms in the coverage of games in the local press in Waterford. This is because all the correspondents are themselves too deeply immersed in the GAA organisation in the county. This lack of constructive criticism leads to a lowering of expectations and a readiness to accept defeat.

The fact is that the Waterford team which took the field against Limerick was poorly prepared, both mentally and physically. Lack of mental preparation was apparent in how long it took the team to settle down. Thus twenty minutes of playing with the wind were wasted. This poor attitude was most easily seen in the shambles surrounding Waterford's first sixty-five metre free, after only five minutes. Either nobody wanted to take it, or nobody had been assigned to the task. When Ger Fitzpatrick was eventually prevailed upon to take it, it was clear that he didn't want to know, and an inevitable wide resulted. Fitzpatrick was to repeat this act before John Meaney was eventually brought out to take our third sixty-five and give Waterford their first score. Thus went abegging two point opportunities which could have proved vital by the end of the game.

Poor physical preparation was apparent in the way that Waterford faded when Limerick stepped up their game in the last twenty minutes. It must be remembered that Limerick scored five points without reply in the closing ten minutes, and were deserving winners in the end.

Two dreadful errors on the part of the selectors only served to make matters worse. The introduction of Kieran Delahunty for the injured Brian Greene produced a groan among Waterford supporters around me that was only surpassed by that which greeted the introduction of Stephen Burns in the replay against Clare (an act of un-

believable folly). Not only did this upset the Waterford attack, but it also meant that an unfit player who has, it must be admitted, rarely delivered in general play for Waterford was preferred to Johnny Brenner, the finest talent to emerge in the county in nearly twenty years. Watching Brenner put in a terrific performance in the Under-21 semi-final against Cork the following Wednesday was enough to make one cry that such a wonderful opportunity to have three Waterford teams in Munster finals this year was thrown away.

Delahunty's introduction meant that the great work which was done by Stephen Frampton on the right side of defence right to the end came to nothing, as the stream of ball he sent up to the right corner invariably came straight back again. Meanwhile, on the other wing, it was apparent halfway through the second half that the supply of ball to our most dangerous forwards, Paul Prendergast and John Meaney, had all but dried up. This coincided with the switch of Gary Kirby onto Daithi Foran. Although Foran had a marvellous first half, he was clearly struggling in the last twenty minutes. This meant that not only was the supply to the forwards cut off, but Foran gave away three frees in quick succession which proved vital to Limerick's success.

When the Waterford selectors finally moved, it was far too late. In addition,

it was an injustice to Pat Tobin that it was he, rather than Foran, who was made give way. Once he began to struggle, Foran should have been taken off, Beresford should have been switched to the wing, Fitzpatrick should have been brought back to centre half back and Brenner should have been brought on in midfield. Decisive and ruthless action is needed on the sideline if big matches are to be won.

There is widespread feeling among Waterford supporters that the overall welfare of the team is not always the primary objective of the team selectors. There have been too many cases in inter-county games at different levels in recent years where it appeared that it was a player's club rather than his ability which determined his selection. As in so many areas of G.A.A. activity in the county, we need to update the way we do things in this respect. The team coach should be allowed nominate his own selectors, of which there should be only two. As long as selectors are elected by the County Board, they will be under pressure to represent the constituency that elected them. If Waterford are to be serious about winning something, this must stop.





The McCarthy Cup

The famous trophy which was won on only two occasions by Waterford is now to be replaced because of its condition after 71 years of wear and tear. The McCarthy Cup was first presented in 1921 and was first won by Limerick (1921). A new McCarthy Cup is being made and will be ready for the 1992 All-Ireland and what an extraordinary co-incidence it would be if Limerick were to be the first winners of the replacement, which holds 71 names.

The McCarthy Cup is not, as many believe, the first All-Ireland trophy. The first was the Croke Cup and was presented to the champions up until 1909. Then the Great Southern and Western Railway Company presented a cup which was first won by Kilkenny. It was presented in 1913. This trophy was to become the property of the county which won it twice in succession or three times in all. No county managed to perform either feat before the McCarthy Cup made its appearance in 1921.

Whenever we are fixed to play a Kerry team in championship football everyone regards the result as being inevitable and we just go along to fulfil the fixture and hoping to do well. With some other counties, like ourselves, it is the same story and like us too, they keep on hoping that one day soon things will change and we will be able to come up to their standards rather than they coming down to ours.

We travel to Milltown on next Tuesday evening to play Kerry and while a lot of work has gone into organising our team, I understand that there are worries about the availability of players who may find it very difficult to get off work

to travel the very long journey on Tuesday. We don't seem to have much going for us in this one and to beat Kerry in that "neck of the woods" would certainly be a major shock, but despite the long odds against us we can be sure that our players will do their utmost to overpower the red hot favourites.

Football Championships In All Grades Resume

After the week-end round of senior football championships, most clubs will know their fate as far as qualifying for the knockout stages are concerned. Others will find that the results put them out of contention for yet another year. The neutrals who have no worries in this regard, will be hoping for an improvement in standards as up to now the fare, for the most part, has been disappointing. With players switching from hurling to football in successive weeks, it is difficult to expect the standards to be good and while we have the present league style systems going, there is no alternative to having to switch codes every week.

DUNGARVAN v. ST. SAVIOURS

This will be the crunch game of the weekend and will attract a big crowd to Fraher Field on Sunday evening.

The sides have not met for a couple of years and many will recall their last clash, which was at Kilmacthomas two seasons ago, when Dungarvan were the surprise winners of a game that put them into the semi-final for their first time in many years. They went on to take the title and have only lost one game since then. That was their defeat by Rathgormack four weeks ago and subsequent to this they were considered lucky to escape against Dunhill. Now some football people are asking, if the champions are beginning to slip? Most people will feel that this question will be answered on Sunday evening after they have played their first 'home' game since winning their second title. St. Saviours, now with the role of favourites reversed are the team to test Dungarvan and while many believe that the Ballybeg team are not as good as they were three years ago, their recent displays disprove any notions about them being a spent force. Saviours had a good game against neighbours and rivals Gaultier, which ended in a draw, but then went on to beat Clashmore by thirteen points whereas Dungarvan had beaten the same opponents by ten points.

In the expectation that Dungarvan will play to their very best form here, I give them the vote to win, but there is nothing very sure about the outcome here.

BALLINACOURTY v. CLASHMORE

This is more a crunch game for Ballinacourty than it is for Clashmore, as a win for Ballinacourty would keep them in the running, while a win for Clashmore apart from giving them a prestige boost, would do them no good as far as being involved at the finish is concerned. 'Courty have three points from three games while Clashmore have no points from their two games so far.

Ballinacourty lost to Gaultier before beating Dunhill and playing a draw with Rathgormack. Their display against Rathgormack showed them to be bang in form even though having to field without Joe Riordan, Mark Reynolds and Bernard O'Gorman. The latter may be fit enough to field against Clashmore, but the other two players are certain non-starters.

Clashmore invariably play well in Fraher Field and in recent years have played some splendid football there. Their great win over the strongly fancied St. Saviours last year, is one of the game that I have in mind when writing this. When they are at full strength and getting it all together Clashmore can worry the best. In their clash in the championship last year, Ballinacourty emerged decisive winners by nine points, but it was not until the closing stages that they got on top.

BUTLERSTOWN v. TRAMORE

The way these teams have been playing so far, I don't believe that it matters a lot which side wins. Neither have a point yet and the side which comes away without the points from this one, will certainly have relegation worries.

NIRE v. KILMACTHOMAS

These sides each have four points but Kilmacthomas have lost a game. This was when they went under to Kilrossanty at Stradbally, when they scored only five points, having squandered many scoring chances.

The Nire have played only twice, beating Sliabh gCua and Tramore. They were not over impressive in either, perhaps because they did not need to be.

When the teams met in the very first match of the 1991 championship at Dungarvan, the Nire came out winners on a 1-4 to 0-4

scoreline. This turned out to be the lowest scoring match of the entire championship. Close marking and very poor shooting on both sides was partly responsible for the lack of flag waving around the goals in this one.

It will probably be very close again with maybe the Nire, who must start slight favourites, coming through at the end of an exciting encounter.

KILROSSANTY v. SLIABH gCUA

Sliabh gCua have lost their three matches played so far and it will be a major shock if they manage to win here against a very much in-form Kilrossanty side who recently ran Stradbally very close, when fielding an under-strength team. Kilrossanty may have Ger Walsh and Pierre Whyte back for this one, but even without these two talented players, they should win.

RATHGORMACK v. GAULTIER

This, by all accounts will be a very close contest between clubs who are both playing very well so far in the championship. They have each dropped only one point and both look to be heading for involvement in the closing stages. I suppose Rathgormack's win over the county champions recently should put them into this one as favourites. They may win by a small margin, but Gaultier are well capable of creating a surprise here.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

We are now at round three and it is approaching 'make your mind up' time for some clubs who have yet to record a win.

Faha featured in the extraordinary low scoring game with Ballinameela recently and their forwards will need to do a good bit better against Affane at Bushy Park this week-end, if they hope to gain the points. Affane had a good win over the Brickeys and if they show the same useful form, they can be fancied here.

Shamrocks, who have fared so well in this championship in recent years are still without a point after two matches. The Brickeys are in the same situation having lost both their first round matches. They would have fared better against Affane, had Jim McGrath been available. With the dynamic

forward on duty for the club in this one, they might do better, but Shamrocks must be given the vote.

Ring and Geraldines is an attractive contest. It is a very long time since the sides faced each other on the football field. Ring played a good game when accounting for Shamrocks by a seven points margin two weeks ago and on the same day, Geraldines went under by two goals to Ardmore. This form puts Ring in with a favourites chance of getting a further two points.

Ardmore have two respectable wins under their belts and the band of football they played when beating Shamrocks and Geraldines may be good enough to beat Ballinameela who managed only two points against Faha (who had only 3).

JUNIOR FOOTBALL (SECOND STRING)

This championship is just about as interesting as the junior inter-county grades, only that clubs very often get much enjoyment from participating. It is the competition through which very many veteran players ease themselves into oblivion and younger players serve their apprenticeship before graduating to senior grade. It is a championship that is not taken too seriously and this is one reason why it is enjoyed.

Ballinacourty got a hammering from the Nire in this championship at Ballymac' recently and on the same evening, Stradbally were unexpectedly beaten by Dungarvan. Now Ballinacourty and Stradbally meet each other and it looks like being a win for Stradbally.

The game between the Brickeys and the Nire should result in a resounding win for the Ballymac' based side. By all accounts they have a well stocked panel of reserve players at the moment.

Clashmore's second string had a mighty big win over Affane in this championship last month so unless they have lost a number of players since, they can be strongly fancied to beat Shamrocks here.

Affane and Ring are both very week in this grade and neither are destined to go very far, regardless of which side survives here. Still it will be enjoyable for the players and really in this competition, that it what counts.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL PROPER

Giving the championship a name like this suggests that there is something improper about the other one. In some other counties they call one the junior and the other the reserve team championship.

SEANA PHOBAL v. EMMETTS

I haven't seen Old Parish play this year but I have been told that they are a well organised outfit playing great stuff. Their best to date was a win over Kilgobinet. They also had a big win over Ballinwillin. Colligan/Emmetts had a six point win over Ballinwillin in their only game so far, so on this basis it gives Old Parish a big chance of adding on another two points here.

LISMORE v. BALLINWILLIN

Whatever rivalry might exist between these neigh-

bours does not extend beyond the hurling fields, so this should be a tame enough affair between teams both of whom are far away from being world beaters in the big ball game. Ballinwillin, alias Tourin, should have felt quite pleased with their display against Emmetts which was better than Lismore's performance against Kilgobinet. It will be a little surprise if Ballinwillin win, but it can happen.

MUNSTER UNDER-21 HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

Shock For Cork As Waterford Qualify

WATERFORD 1-10 CORK 0-11

Coming in the wake of our defeat by Limerick at Thurles three days previously, this unexpected win over a highly fancied Cork team in the Munster semi-final at Walsh Park on Wednesday last, this resounding win over our illustrious opponents was as big a boost as the county could possibly hope for.

To beat Cork in any grade in hurling is an achievement to be savoured, and our very big support at the game really lapped it up, and certainly did not miss out on the chance and a large portion of the attendance waited around to greet and congratulate all concerned with a win which qualifies Waterford for a place in the Munster final against Clare at Thurles next month. Clare qualified by beating Tipperary at Ennis on the same evening, by a four points margin.

The standard of hurling was good and the game was brimful of excitement almost from the start and there were some delightful performances by several players on both sides. Waterford who held the visitors to a draw at half time held territorial advantage for most of the second half, but missed a number of scores through inaccuracy. Over the hour we had 16 wides as against 5 for Cork and these figures give a fair idea of the extent to which Waterford controlled the game. The sides were level at 0-6 apiece at half time and four minutes into the second half, Waterford held a five point lead when Noel Dalton had the only goal of the game. In the closing stages

when our lead was reduced to two points and when Cork's outstanding senior player Brian Corcoran shot for goal from about 25 metres out the alarm bells rang out, but luckily the low hard drive was blasted out of the danger zone and following a last fruitless attack by Waterford the game ended to the relief of our supporters.

SCORING

Kevin Murray gave Cork the lead with a third minute point and a minute later Anthony Fitzgerald laid the ball on for Kevin McGrath who equalised for us. Anthony Fitzgerald added a sixth minute point for Waterford and we had two very lucky escapes as Ray Barry, Own Dunphy and Mark O'Sullivan combined to keep the eager Cork forwards at bay.

Barry Egan, who gave an outstanding display for Cork put his side in front with a well taken point, but when our top scorer Noel Dalton hit a 12th minute free we were level again. David Fleming and Barry Egan put Cork two in front, but two points from Noel Dalton in the 17th and 25th minutes levelled the scoring again. Ray O'Connell had a 36th minute point for Cork and within seconds Dalton was wide, but made no mistake with the last puck of the first half to leave the sides level going into the break.

IN FRONT

Neither side showed changes coming out for the second half and two fine scores by Michael Hubbard and Tom Fives put Waterford two in front by the 3rd minute. Tom Browne and Anthony Fitzgerald were

both wide with scoreable shots, but Noel Dalton made no mistake when he whipped the ball goalwards and into the net to the obvious dismay of the surprised Cork keeper Donal O'Mahony, who saved splendidly under pressure on occasions later.

From a free Barry Egan had a point and Waterford responded with two wides before full forward Brendan Walsh had another for Cork to reduce their leeway to a goal. Fergal McCormack reduced it to 2 points just before the game was held up to have the injured Noel Dalton treated for a head wound. Sean Daly had a point and Fitzgerald another to restore our lead to four points in the 15th minute of the half, but we did not score again, having had some terrible misses. Two points by Barry Egan ended the scoring for Cork, who failed with the goal attempt in the final minute.

From our point of view it was a tremendous result and one that will bring hope to the county, now that we have a second underage team in a provincial final.

For Waterford Fergal Hartley, Johnnie Brenner, Mark Sullivan, Owen Dunphy, Pat Fanning, Tom Fives, Sean Daly, Noel Dalton and Kevin McGrath, were most prominent while Cork were very well served by Barry Egan, Brian Corcoran, Tony Doolan, Fergal McCormack and Fergal Ryan.

and John Bowdren were transferred to the Cork Regional Hospital.

Power received a fractured jaw and young Bowdren may have to undergo plastic surgery, although he had returned home on Monday.

A young girl was also among the injured. She received stitches to a facial wound after being struck with a timber object.

At Masses in the Kilmacthomas parish over the weekend, Fr. David McGuinness, C.C., condemned the "senseless attack" on innocent people who had simply gone out to enjoy themselves and at the same time lend support to an injured GAA colleague and friend.

Fr. McGuinness urged the people of Kilmacthomas to co-operate in every possible way with the garda investigation.

Gardai have already interviewed several of the Kilmacthomas people who attended the function and also spoke with a number of the injured. In Dungarvan, too, a fullscale garda investigation is continuing.

In Kilmacthomas, the entire local community was shocked at the attacks and the savagery of them.

"The whole village is numbed," local photographer John Kiely said and

added "We can only hope that those responsible will be brought to justice."

GARDA APPEAL FOR INFORMATION

On Monday last Garda Supt. Ray McAndrew, Dungarvan, who is leading the investigation into the vicious attacks issued an appeal for maximum public co-operation in their efforts to bring the assailants to justice.

"We would ask anyone who can help our enquiries to come forward and we would particularly like to hear from anyone who was in the Shandon area around 2.15 a.m. last Saturday morning," Supt. McAndrew said.

From investigations carried out it has emerged that the Kilmacthomas group who were so savagely attacked, walked into a carefully orchestrated trap laid for them by what gardai believe was a local Dungarvan gang.

FOUR DETAINED

In a further development in the Garda investigations four men from the locality were arrested in Dungarvan early on Tuesday morning and taken to Dungarvan Garda Station where they were detained for questioning in connection with the assaults.

Cllr. Calls For Report On Sea Wall At Abbeyside

Speaking at the June monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last week, Cllr. B. Kyne referred to a motion proposed by him last November concerning the construction of the sea wall at Sea Park in Abbeyside as a result of which the County Manager was to obtain a report from Consulting Engineers, M/s Pettit of Cork. He had taken this action because the Sea Park Residents Association had expressed concern about the wall.

"Since then," said Cllr. Kyne, "there have been many promises for the release of this report and I was given to understand some time ago that the report was imminent but to be honest I am now forced to ask publicly why there has been this further delay about it."

Cllr. Kyne said that in the interim since the report was first mooted last November, he had been in contact with all concerned with this matter but the long delay had now become unacceptable. "It's unacceptable to

the residents generally and to the Sea Park Residents' Association and once and for all I am asking to have this report submitted and if not I must ask is there something about it to hide?"

It was agreed to ask that the report sought be submitted before the next meeting of the Council.

Council Moves To Control Speed Boats In Dungarvan Harbour

Cllr. Kyne then went on to say that an Angling Club letter was on file stating that a fishing rod had been pulled into the sea from Abbeyside Pond by a speed boat early last year. He said that he had also referred to the concern expressed following an incident at Ballinacourty when people swimming there were placed in danger by speeding craft. These were facts, he said.

Cllr. Kyne then added that he made no apology for making these comments but he resented the subsequent response made on local radio by County Councillor Austin Flynn who attempted to paint the Urban Council as irresponsible and that it should be more concerned with the condition of the harbour than trying to introduce by laws that could not be enforced.

"I never suggested anything of the sort," said Cllr. Kyne, "but what I did say was that the orderly use of the harbour should be considered with a speed limit on the inner harbour." He added that while he welcomed constructive criticism he did not feel that the comments made by Cllr. Flynn against the

Urban Council were justified. "While everyone is entitled to the right of reply, this Council is doing its best to meet all situations and it has to be remembered that we are the Harbour Authority," he said.

Cllr. Paddy Power supported all the points put forward by Cllr. Kyne and asked whether there was now any control over the berthing of craft in the inner harbour. "The sooner we get by-laws to control all these matters the better," he said.

Cllr. Mary Dixon agreed that there was a need for new by-laws as speed boats were a danger in the inner harbour. "I saw them myself near the Pond at Abbeyside travelling at dangerous speeds," she said.

On the suggestion of the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White, it was unanimously agreed to write to Abbeyside Angling Club informing them that the Council now proposed to make a new set of by-laws to control the harbour and asking them to submit any suggestions they might have for consideration by the Council's legal advisers.
