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Ring Girl Dies Tragically In Saudi Arabia

News of the tragic death in Saudi Arabia of Dearbhla Ni Mhuiri has cast a widespread gloom over Helvick and Ring in the Gaeltacht area since it became known last week-end.

Youngest daughter of Department of Education Inspector, Sylvester O Muiri and Mrs. Caitlin O Muiri, Helvick she was an air hostess with Saudi Arabian Airlines based in Jeddah having successfully completed her training period just a couple of months ago.

While details of the accident in which Dearbhla lost her life are still rather vague we have learned that she and two of her girl friends were being driven either to or from the beach in Jeddah by an American gentleman acquaintance (women are not permitted to drive cars in Saudi Arabia) on last Friday. While driving along the highway a Bedouin suddenly came out in front of them and in an effort to avoid the man the car skidded and crashed into a metal stanchion on the roadside killing Dearbhla and one other of the car's occupants.

Her tragic death has come as a stunning blow not only to her parents, family and relatives but to the entire community of the Ring

Gaeltacht where Dearbhla was known and loved by everyone. Like her parents and the other members of her family she was a fluent Irish speaker and used it on

Celtworld - The Abbeyside Connection

Celtworld, the spectacular new visitor attraction depicting Irish Celtic myths and legends in Tramore has, according to figures released last week, attracted some 33,000 visitors during the first month of operation.

In the wealth of publicity concerning the project which has been released in recent months little mention has been made that the concept which gave birth to Celtworld was the brainchild of Dermot Wade and his Scottish born wife

Anna.

A building contractor in London, Dermot is son of former Urban Councillor Tommy Wade and Mrs. Wade, Murphy Place, Abbeyside and is a past pupil of Abbeyside National School and St. Augustine's College.

Mr. and Mrs. Wade were in Dungarvan last week-end and despite a busy schedule found time to talk to us at the "Leader" and put us in the picture in regard to Celtworld and how it came about that the concept of this so far very successful venture was born.

In fact it transpired that it was Mrs. Wade who hails from Glasgow, who first came up with the idea which was at once taken up and developed by husband Dermot. Having gone over the preliminaries and following a number of meetings to discuss the storyline and sequencing presentation a Dublin firm of Planners and Landscape Architects were commissioned in September 1989 to prepare a preliminary lay-out. The advice of well-known folklorist, Daithi O h-Ogain, U.C.D. was also availed of in regard to the accuracy of the storyline.

Just as Euro-Disney has generated a fresh tourist influx to France, the intention behind Celtworld is to cre-

500 'Glass' Jobs Hang In Balance

The management of Waterford Glass announced last week that it would be seeking up to 500 redundancies in the workforce before the end of the year, a cut of 25 per cent in wage rates and the possibility, ultimately, of the closure of one of their three plants, two of which are located in Waterford City and the third in Dungarvan. These measures, Management has stated, are needed to bring production into profitability.

The latest announcement has created yet a further crisis in the much troubled industry as it is feared that if the targets set by management are not achieved the entire production process would cease in Waterford and be transferred outside the country.

Talks have taken place with the Taoiseach, Mr. Reynolds who was in Waterford City on Monday to open the new Waterford Airport Terminal Building and also with Mr. Brian

Cowan, Minister for Labour, and Mr. Des O'Malley, Minister for Industry and Commerce about the jobs crisis.

Without doubt the loss of so many jobs would be a devastating blow for Waterford and for Dungarvan and would also have devastating consequences nationally. This latest crisis in the industry must be treated by the Government as a national issue.

Attempt To Raise Matter In Dail

On the Order of Business in the Dail on Tuesday morning, Deputy Austin

Deasy tried unsuccessfully to raise the matter. Addressing the Ceann Comhairle, he said: May I beg your indulgence for one minute, Sir. I noticed that yesterday the Minister for Labour met the unions in Waterford Glass and that the Minister for Industry and Commerce will meet management today. We all welcome those actions. But may I say at this point that the position is so serious it requires a meeting between the Taoiseach and the Board of Waterford Glass.

Celtworld — A Unique Indoor Attraction Was Abbeyside Man's Idea

Junior tourism Minister Brendan Kenneally last week performed the official opening of Celtworld, the Disney-style project depicting Celtic myth and legends, which since it opened its doors a month previously has attracted 33,000 visitors to the seaside resort of Tramore. Based on an idea conceived by London property developer Dermot Wade who incidentally is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Wade, Murphy Place, Abbeyside, it is part of a £20 million long-term development programme for the resort. In his address Minister Kenneally described Celtworld as the most remarkable thing that had ever happened to Tramore and said that the project was a significant addition to the national inventory of major tourism attractions and in terms of modern technology, fibre optics, lasers and serial visual images there was nothing in Ireland to compare with it.

Present at the official

opening was Bord Failte chief Mr. Martin Dully and Mr. Jim Hally, Chairman, Celtworld.

BOOK OF KELLS FACSIMILE

Visitors to Celtworld will have a special treat during July when a special facsimile of "The Book of Kells" will be on view. This special "Book of Kells" is the first unique and complete Fine Art Facsimile Edition of "The Book of Kells."

"The Book of Kells," which is Ireland's greatest national treasure and has survived 1200 years of warfare, pillaging and fires, was written in the 8th century — the Age of Saints and Scholars — to glorify the life of Christ.

Monks completed the mammoth task transcribing and illustrating the Gospels of the New Testament giving the world one of the greatest pieces of Western Art. The facsimile copy on show in Celtworld has been created by Fine Art Publishers of Switzerland.

David Howarth, General Manager of Celtworld, commented, "Celtworld is very happy to play host to this facsimile of "The Book of Kells."

This special manuscript has helped scholars to understand something of the society in which it was produced. In a similar way, we hope that Celtworld gives people an insight into how the Celts lived."

The facsimile of the Book of Kells will be on display in Celtworld until 23rd July and viewing is free of charge.

Bathing Water Around County Being Monitored

New regulations applying to national standards for bathing waters and the associated sampling and pollution control requirements to a further 30 bathing areas around the country were announced last week by Minister for Environmental Protection Mary Harney. The regulations bring to 94 the number of areas for which local authorities are responsible for ensuring compliance with water quality standards designed to protect the health of swimmers and other users of waters for recreational purposes.

Already covered by the regulations are the follow-

ing beaches in Co. Waterford where the monitoring is being carried out by officials of Waterford Co. Council:— Ardmore; Clonea; Bonmahon; Dunmore East Strand and Counsellors Strand, Tramore. In Co. Cork, Cork Co. Council are responsible for the main beach at Youghal.

The regulations require the local authority to have the results of water sampling displayed or otherwise made available at bathing areas. Up to now results have only to be held at Council offices and to be available for inspection by the public during the working day.



Mickey Landers' Pub Is Now Clancy's Corner

A chart topping pop song made "The Pub With No Beer" popularly known some years ago but now we are to have in Dungarvan a pub which will sell no cigarettes or tobacco which is sure to make it the first of its kind in Ireland.

Formerly known as Mickey Landers' licensed premises at the corner of Grattan Square and Davitt's Quay, it has now been purchased by Mr. John Clancy who has decided to christen it "Clancy's Corner."

John Clancy, a native of Co. Cavan, is a man who has had a varied and exciting career, travelling along the sea-lanes of the world as a seaman and working in two of New York's most famous dining establishments being just two of the vocations he followed.

Before deciding to come to Dungarvan, John was proprietor of the award-winning Derragarra Inn in Butlersbridge, Co. Cavan. It was while on a tour of Australia in 1988 that the idea of coming to Dungarvan resulted from a chance meeting he had with two Dungarvan people in Cairns in Queensland.

He plans to run his new premises in Dungarvan as a small, intimate, personal bar where in due course teas,

coffees and light snacks will be available. His immediate plan is to install modern toilets at the premises. Asked why he decided to sell no cigs or tobacco, John, who had a triple by-pass a few years ago, said that he was heavily involved in the Conquer Cancer Campaign and for that reason could not see his way to sell items which are such a contributory cause of cancer!

Mr. Clancy told us that he has renamed the premises

"Clancy's Corner" and declared that this would be a name known throughout the length and breadth of Ireland inside a year.

We understand that the purchase price of the premises was £212,500. Mr. Clancy took formal possession of the premises last Friday. We extend a hearty *cead mile failte* to him and hope that he and the members of his family will enjoy further prosperity in Dungarvan.

Youghal Publican Assaulted By Most Violent Woman

One of Co. Cork's longest serving and best-known public representatives, told a District Court Judge last Friday that he was assaulted in his own public house by the most violent woman he had ever met.

Patrick Linehan, licensee of Moby Dick's, Market Square, Youghal, who is also the present Chairman of Youghal Urban Council, was giving evidence in a case in which Mary Ryan, 4 Woodland View, Western Road, Cork, was charged with assaulting him on May 17 last.

There was no appearance in court by the defendant, but in her absence she was sent to prison for two months.

Mr. Linehan told Judge Terence Finn that he was having his tea on May 7, when he was called to the bar where the defendant was annoying some of the customers. He asked her to leave and she refused and a customer had to come to his assistance to get her out.

"She bit me and struck me and I had to go to the doctor for an injection," Mr. Linehan went on. "I had scratches on my face, she cause a huge furore, and I have never encounter such a violent woman in all my life," he said.

Garda G. O'Donovan said he saw the defendant staggering as she walked along the street and she was shouting abuse at passers-by. She refused to give him her name and address and tried to kick and bite him when she was being put into the patrol car. In the garda station, she continued to be most uncooperative.

When told that Ryan had

several previous assault convictions, Judge Finn said he had very little sympathy for her.

Sentencing Ryan to two months imprisonment, the Judge also bound her to the

peace for two years and made it a condition of the bond that she does not enter any licensed premises in Youghal during that time.

Inspector Padraig Hyde prosecuted.



WATER SKIING ACTIVITIES

Dear Editor,

On behalf of the recently formed "Dungarvan Water Skiing and Power Boat Club" I wish to comment on the current debate regarding water skiing activities as reported on local and provincial newspapers as well as on radio.

Due to the one sided publicity to date, we now unfortunately find that the boat owners have been unjustly castigated and stereotyped for participating in what is recognised as being the fastest growing legitimate family sport in Europe. There are in Dungarvan 12 ski boats and over 60 persons involved in water skiing.

Is Ireland Heading For Bankruptcy?

Rising unemployment — according to official figures released last week the number out of work in June was 280,300 although in reality the number must be around the 300,000 mark — is driving up the cost of Social Welfare which is now stated to be £9 million daily. And the frightening fact is that the out of work numbers are set to increase monthly until the end of the year and this

begs the question how will the colossal Welfare bill continue to be met.

Social Welfare Minister Charles McCreevy announced during the week that increased PRSI contributions and taxation of child benefits were among a number of radical options which he was considering to curb spiralling Welfare costs.

We think that it is a crazy idea for the Minister to place

a further burden on workers and employers by increasing PRSI contributions which most already consider as just another form of taxation. It is tantamount to increasing the already heavy impact on those still working to subsidise the cost of the lengthening dole queues and simply means that the goose which lays the golden egg will eventually be strangled.

The stark, plain fact is that

the country can no longer afford to maintain the huge army of unemployed who, we hasten to add are out of a job through no fault of their own. Taxing further, those who still work cannot be the solution as such a move will certainly not encourage further job creation. Our financial situation certainly sees the country in dire straits with worse to come!

Another Huge Radley Cylinder On The Move

Almost exactly a month after the dramatic events which marked the transport of two huge stainless steel cylinders from the Radley Engineering Plant at Kiladangan outside Dungarvan, where they were made, to Ringaskiddy on the outskirts of Cork City, another even larger cylinder made the same but less eventful journey on last Friday and Saturday.

In the first instance one of the cylinders became jammed in the wall adjoining Cook Street, Cappoquin as the low-loader transporting it attempted to get through. Part of the top of the wall had to be dislodged to allow the massive load through. This operation however caused a traffic jam necessitating a detour for

other through traffic which lasted some considerable time.

Last Friday a giant cone shaped stainless steel evaporator measuring 18 feet in diameter and about 30 feet in length, bound for ADM (former Pfizer Corporation) in Ringaskiddy left the Radley Works where it has been fabricated. It was brought to the outskirts of Cork City (Glanmire) on Friday evening and as in the former case, the final phase of the journey through the city started at first light at 5 a.m. on Saturday morning and was successfully concluded in a further few hours.

Again congratulations to the Radley brothers on this outstanding achievement.

MINISTER'S NOMINEE — CHARGE AND DENIAL

The Minister for Health Dr. John O'Connell, T.D. has named the following to be appointed to fill the three positions for Ministerial nominees on the South Eastern Health Board for the next five years:— Mr. J. Fahey, Lyre House, Lyreanearla, Clonmel; Mr. M. Fitzpatrick, Borrismore, Johnstown, Co. Kilkenny and Mr. J. Murphy, Pearse Lodge, Morriscastle, Kilmuckridge, Gorey, Co. Wexford.

Following the announcement of the appointments last week, Cllr. Patsy Kenneally, Aglish, a Fianna Fail party colleague of Deputy Fahey on Waterford County Council claimed that he had been "shafted" out of the seat as a result of "internal party influences." We understand this to mean that because of his influence as a Dail Deputy, Mr. Fahey was in a position to tilt the scales in his own favour where the Minister's choice was concerned to the exclu-

sion of Cllr. Kenneally. Whether Cllr. Kenneally would have received the appointment had Deputy Fahey not shown interest in it we cannot say.

Cllr. Kenneally went public last week to air his grievance and claimed that Deputy Fahey had gone so far as to threaten to resign his Dail seat unless he received the Minister's nomination to the Board. Deputy Fahey reacted by accusing the Aglish Councillor of uttering an unfounded and downright harmful lie adding that there was not a grain of truth in the resignation allegation. It is, of course of interest to note that Deputy Fahey is one of the Government's two delegates to the Council of Europe to which post, much coveted for the travelling "perks" it provides, he was recently appointed, with Deputy Terry Leyden, by Taoiseach Albert Reynolds.

So it can be seen that Deputy Fahey is indeed a

most busy public representative for besides his duties as Dail Deputy, he is a member of Waterford County Council, a member of the Council of Europe

and now a member of the South Eastern Health. He will surely need to be like Boyle Roche's Bird if he is to fill all the calls on his time!

about waiting to be collected by playing children. Having walked thus far one comes to 'the White Strand' and this by any standards is a lovely section of beach. It is safe for swimming and very clean. There is an entrance by way of concrete path to the strand from the path which was once the railway line. One walks through attractive little sand dunes before reaching the strand proper.

Barnawee Bridge — One could continue a walk by way of the railway track path to the iron red bridge. At full tide the strong current from the river and the movement of the sea-water is a special attraction and has a sound and power of its own. An about turn means one can walk along the old railway track back to Sea Park Housing Estate. With a nice sea breeze blowing this is a refreshing experience. One notices the nice timber seat at the entrance to the 'White Strand.' The path is suitable for cycling and many young children and teenagers can use it safely. As one approaches Sea Park one notices the reclaimed area on the right hand side and one envisages trees and colourful shrubs planted there in the not too distant future.

Heritage — The beaches of Abbeyside are part of our heritage and it is our duty and privilege to hand them on to our children and to future generations after them.

McGrath's Castle, Abbeyside as it stood during the 19th century


Abbeyside Castle — The Castle was built by Donal McGrath in co-operation with the O'Brien's of Comeragh in the 12th century. These are the same families who donated land nearby to the Augustinian's for the building of the Abbey. McGrath's Castle as it was called is now completely demolished, but some photographs remain as

illustrations of the structure in its varying stages of decay. The Castle was built as a family residence and not as a structure for defence. The building was a lofty square one and judging from its great height it must have been intended by its owners to be a landmark in the locality. Certainly the people who lived in this prominent structure regarded them-

selves as being people of great importance. At the time the Castle and the Abbey were built it is known that the surrounding area was heavily wooded. In 1746 the castle was in perfect condition and this fact is recorded by Charles Smith in his book "The Ancient and Present State of the County and City of Waterford". [More next week]

MACRA BEEF QUOTA PLAN FOR YOUNG FARMERS

A Meeting took place recently in the Department of Agriculture between officials of the department and a top level delegation from Macra Na Feirme to discuss Macra Na Feirme's plan for a regional based quota for beef as the only suitable means of allowing young farmers and new entrants access to the beef industry.

Introducing a single beef quota region for Ireland which would have no monetary value attached to it, would alleviate the present binding bureaucracy which ties buying, selling and ownership of premia rights up in confusing red tape and adds to the Lock-out of young farmers.

The National Beef Quota system would mean that any transfer of quota will go through a national reserve, and Quota from this pool would be allocated to new entrants and young farmers.

Chernobyl Children To Holiday In Lismore

The Presentation Sisters who will shortly close down their Convent in Lismore have agreed to participate in a plan to play host to a group of Russian children who were afflicted by radiation from the disastrous fire at the Chernobyl nuclear power plant which took place in 1986. As a farewell gesture the good Sisters have agreed to provide accommodation for some of the 70 strong group (boys and girls from 10-14 years) which will arrive from Russia to-day (Wednesday) July 8. Many of these children are in remission from leukaemia which they suffered as a direct result of the nuclear fall out in the Kiev district of Russia where the ill-fated power plant is located.

The children will be in Ireland for 3 weeks and apart from the group coming to Lismore, others will be cared for by families in Cork city and county and in Kerry and Leitrim. The holiday has been organised by the Irish Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament (CND) and Ogra Chorcaí who have launched an appeal for funding for this humanitarian project as the children will be arriving with little or no clothing, footwear or toiletries.

We are sure that our little Russian visitors will receive a cead míle fáilte when they arrive in Lismore to-day and that they will be afforded every hospitality throughout their 3 weeks stay among us.

A HOLIDAY FISH DISH

SOMETHING light and nourishing for the youngsters (or harassed mums and dad!) during the long school holidays can often be a problem. You don't want junk food; you want something quick and easy to make but food of nutrition. One of the answers could be a scrumptious little fish dish. You can use fresh fish, of course, although perhaps for ease and convenience, by suggesting frozen fish portions that come with a ready-made sauce, will make life easier for the cook.

CAPTAINS FISH BAKE

Ingredients:

- 4 frozen fish steaks in parsley sauce
- 8 oz (225g) frozen stewpack or mixed vegetables
- 1/2 small onion, chopped
- 4 slices bread, brown and white
- 1 oz (25g) butter or margarine, softened
- 1 oz (25g) cheese, grated

Method

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F. Gas Mark 6
Place the unopened bags of fish and

sauce into a pan of boiling water. Bring back to the boil and cook for just five minutes.

Meanwhile, place the vegetables in the bottom of a shallow ovenproof dish. Transfer the partially cooked fish portions to a plate, cut open the bags and pour the contents on top of the vegetables.

Butter the bread, cut into triangles and arrange over the fish portions, buttered side up.

Sprinkle over the grated cheese and bake for 30-35 minutes until the bread is golden browned and the fish is cooked.

Serves 4.

● To adjust the recipe for fresh fillets, arrange 4 pieces of white fish fillets in a dish, add the vegetables and pour over 1/2 pint parsley sauce. Continue with the recipe.



The Hard Working Month



JULY is a month when gardeners need to do a little of a lot despite a temptation to sit back and enjoy the fruits of labour. There will be an abundance of clippings and mowings to create and dispose of, but most can go on the compost heap providing they are free from weeds and non-woody.

They will soon rot down in the warm weather, particularly if you keep the heap well-wetted and stewing nicely. You can help further by adding a proprietary compost maker to each layer and regularly turning the sides inwards so that the heap rots evenly.

Some of your mowings can be used as mulch, albeit a rather scruffy one, to keep weeds down and soil moisture in around less glamorous areas of the garden such as the vegetable patch.

With the lawn growing fast there is a temptation to mow it short, but it will quickly scorch and brown in bright sunshine, so ease off with the blades and keep it as well-watered as possible. If there is a hosepipe ban in your area then invest in a rain butt — it's good water, doesn't cost anything if your water supply is metered and it may help to avoid water shortages later in the season.

Watering from a butt or tap will also allow you to add the occasional liquid feed to keep the lawn in good condition. Try to water plants at cool times of the day to:

- minimise evaporation
- ensure that water reaches roots

● avoid shock to plants

Watch out in particular for any drying out of 'squashy' crops such as marrows, courgettes, cucumbers and tomatoes.

Your roses will be coming into their prime and a few minutes now and then dead-heading spent or wilting blooms will ensure a vigorous supply of colour. Non-hybrid tea varieties will also yield some healthy cuttings about now. Pick out some strong shoots about nine inches long and plant them in good firm soil.

As you work, check your roses for pests such as aphids/greenfly and signs of mildew or black spot. If infection can be cut away early then do so, but be ready to spray if necessary — use sparingly, protect your skin and never spray in a breeze. Strawberries need picking as soon as they ripen and don't leave any on the crop which are over-ripe, mouldy or diseased as they may spoil others about to ripen. Be ruthless with any strawberry plants which are about four years old as they will not crop well from now on and you are better using the space and care for fresh plants.

Replacements need not cost anything. You can acquire new plants by tying down some healthy runners into pots of compost set in the ground. Once rooted, they can be cut away, dug up and brought on, ready for planting in August.

The business which he operated with his wife, Rose, was highly successful, so much so that it became necessary to construct a modern workshop and showroom which greatly enhanced the customer service. A most friendly and helpful person he was always ready with a word of advice especially in matters related to the motor business in which he was an acknowledged expert.

A great all round sportsman his main hobby was motor-cycle sport in which up to a few years ago, he was a keen and respected competitor. In his earlier years he took part in Grasstrack Racing which was popular at that time. In more recent times he turned his attention to motor-cycle trials both as a competitor and an official. Many of his Sunday afternoons were spent organising and supervising events all around the country. His interest also stretched to Vintage bikes which he took great pleasure in restoring to their former glory. He took a great interest in the Annual Vintage Rally organised by Youghal Motor Cycle Club of which he was an esteemed officer. His input into this Rally has made it the leading event of its kind in the country. Like many other bike-men he was a

regular attender at the Annual T. T. races in the Isle of Man and always made an in-depth study of the form of the riders and of the features of the various machines.

Apart from bikes, Austin had many other pastimes including photography and had in his possession many old and valuable prints many of which were the product of his own camera and dark-room. He had a great interest also in music especially Jazz, and was a great fan of the Annual Cork Festival.

The death of Austin Sargent has left a great void in the town of Cappoquin. People like him are rare indeed. He conducted his business in a fair and friendly manner and he always found time to discuss other people's problems. A man of deep religious beliefs from which he never wavered in the least, those of us who knew him well will always remember his great kindness and will be ever grateful for his words of advice and encouragement. Sincere sympathy is extended to his wife Rose, sisters, nephews, nieces and other relatives. May God rest his noble soul.





OLYMPIANS FOR KERRYGOLD DUBLIN HORSE SHOW

Britain and Ireland will be fielding their full Olympic teams as part of the 7 nation Kerrygold Dublin Horse Show which started on Tuesday next, July 14. Joining them will be strong sides from Belgium, France, Spain, Germany and Switzerland, who were the first ever winners of the Aga Khan Trophy in 1926 and the first to win it outright.

The British squad, aiming at their second win in a row and an outright win of the current golden Aga Khan trophy in 1993, is considered to be one of the best ever assembled in the history of team showjumping and is highly tipped to win the gold medal in Barcelona next month. Included on Ronnie Massarella's team are dual Olympic medalist David Broome, Michael Whitaker with his recent King's Cup winner at Hickstead, Midnight Madness; four times Kerrygold Grand Prix winner Nick Skelton with both of his Olympic hopefuls, Dollar Girl and Limited Edition; John Whitaker, who heads the current World Jumping Rankings and Tim Grubb, who this year gets his second Olympic cap, having jumped on the silver medal side in Los Angeles.

Barcelona will be the seventh Games at which Ireland has entered for showjumping and on this occasion we have named our strongest side yet. All of the squad are part of the official six for the Kerrygold Dublin Horse Show. Francis Connors, James Kernan and Eddie Macken, all of whom will be preparing for their first chance at Olympic competition, along with Paul Darragh, who is looking

forward to his second Games. Comdt. Gerry Mullins competed at both Seoul and Los Angeles, where he had the honour of being Ireland's flag bearer in the parade.

Named to the Irish side for the first time is former British international Peter Charles. He has 17 Nations Cup starts with Britain and several major wins to his credit in their colours, including the Brussels World Cup and the Royal International Grand Prix, prior to opting for the green jacket on the strength of Irish parentage.



MUNSTER MINOR HURLING FINAL

Waterford And Tipperary Finish Level In Thriller

WATERFORD 4-7 TIPPERARY 3-10

It must be a very long time since 50,000 hurling fans were treated to such a splendid exhibition of minor hurling as that which we saw at sun-drenched Pairc Ui Caoimh on Sunday when Waterford came back from the jaws of defeat to snatch an equaliser to share the spoils with lucky Tipperary. It was no wonder that the teams won a standing ovation from the crowd in the wake of the final whistle, as they as much as the teams were relieved when the heart-stopper was brought to an end after a grand stand finish.

A couple of Tipperary people to whom I spoke after the match agreed that they were the lucky ones and might, on the run of play, have been beaten by a couple of goals. There were understandable fears that the occasion might get to the Waterford players who are less conditioned to the big-time than the champions, Tipperary and the fears were

compounded by a shocking start which left us a goal down within a minute of the throw-in. Our goalkeeper was unsighted and although the ball was half caught, it rolled into the net to give the champions a dream start. The next ten minutes showed that our players were undaunted by this and gradually settled down to playing the style of hurling that has marked all their displays in championship and challenge so far.

We were playing against the slight breeze and were trailing by five points at half time. Within seven minutes of the restart we were a point down and at the 12th minute we were in front. We went two in front and Tipperary brought back a point and this tit-for-tat pattern continued all the way to the finish, with Waterford going behind in turn and coming back again.

It has been a long, long time since a Waterford minor hurling team played

with so much determination, skill and courage but the feature of their game which aroused feelings of admiration most of all was the absolute contempt they showed for the reputation of their high profile opponents who came into the game as champions. It was a game too, that made the age-old Cork /Tipperary rivalry surface in a big way, as every time a Waterford score was recorded about 10,000 red and white flags waved in acclamation and thousands of other unidentifiable fans also made it known by their cheering, that they wanted Waterford to win.

It is a pity that we won't have the same huge support when the replay goes on at Pairc Ui Caoimh on Friday, July 24.

FIRST GOAL

Tipperary's first goal came within a minute and they were four points up when Tomlinson sent over. Three minutes later our brilliant corner forward Paul Flynn, who contributed a total of 3-6 of our score, pointed from play to open our account. A long drive by Tom Kiely was caught by Paul Foley who was brought down going through and Paul Flynn took a point from the resultant penalty. Tom Dunne who was the biggest thorn in our side throughout the game, had a point and full forward Tomlinson had another. Dunne had two more points in the 17th and 20th minutes and Tipperary seemed to be moving away for a decisive win. In the 22nd minute with Kiely and O'Shea getting on top at centrefield, Waterford's forwards were getting a better supply of the ball and Paul Flynn shot home the first of his three splendid goals. Tom Kiely sent in a long ball that was lashed on by Derek McGrath and rebounded off the upright to the delight of the unsighted keeper. Dunne and Wade added points for Tipperary to leave the half time score 1-7 to 1-2 in their favour.

Within 25 seconds of the restart, Paul Flynn pointed and just 90 seconds later came Derek McGrath's rasper to the Tipperary net and we were now within a point of the champions (1-7 to 2-3). Dunne and Paul Flynn exchanged points. It was at this juncture that Waterford took over and out-hurled the champions, but could not fully capitalise on the scoreboard. A magnificent defence and our com-

manding midfield kept Tipperary scoreless for 17 minutes of the second half (4th to 21st.) Flynn made a great run at goal in the 10th minute, but a marvellous save by Kevin Sullivan denied us what looked like being a sure goal. A minute later Flynn's point had the teams level and the deadly accurate Ballygunnerman had us in front with another in the 17th. Then followed three awful Waterford wides before Flynn, taking a pass from Foley, put us two up in the 20th minute. Waterford now looked to be on course for a resounding win until Ray Killeen got a point which was followed by a scrambled Tipperary goal in

the 22nd minute. A minute later, a further Tipperary point left them a clear three points in front in the 25th minute.

LEVEL

There were signs now that the favourites would win but likewise there was no sign of a Waterford surrender. Paul Flynn's 25th minute goal had us level and two great chances of regaining the lead were lost through wides in the 26th and 27th minutes. Disaster struck again when Tipperary forced a '65' metre free which Keith Slevin sent all the way to the net after a melee in the Waterford square. That was in the 29th min. and it looked all over until the puck out sent Waterford into attack and grabbing the ball almost 50 metres out Flynn broke through for the great equaliser which came only seconds before the final whistle.

While Paul Flynn was brilliant and unquestionably the man of the match, this was primarily a team achievement and every one of the seventeen players deserve full credit for a magnificent display.

The full backline of Tom Morrissey, Paddy O'Donnell (outstanding) and James O'Connor played splendid hurling and denied Tipperary several good scoring chances. The half-line of Ger Harris, Keith O'Neill (who was forced to retire early with a head wound and was replaced by Anthony Kirwan) and Tom Feeney, who cleared some very dangerous balls, were brilliant and the manner in which the entire defence combined to keep Tipperary scoreless for 17 minutes in the second half, made a major contribution to the result. Tom Kiely and Fintan O'Shea did everything that could be expected of them at centrefield and their getting on top in the sector that Tipperary depended on to win them control had a major bearing on Waterford's display. The tenacity and skill of this duo was a big factor in shaping the trend of the game in our favour for most of the second half.

Paul Flynn was our hero in attack, but Derek McGrath, John Joe Ronayne, Barry Browne, Paul Foley and J. P. Fitzpatrick, who was replaced in the second half by Raymond Ryan, all contributed their share to a splendid Waterford performance and a result which gives us a well deserved second chance.

Under 21 Munster Hurling Final v. Clare

Waterford are certain of having huge support at Thurles on Wednesday evening of next week when we play Clare in the provincial final. Our unexpected, but fully deserved win over hot favourites, Cork has aroused tremendous interest in our prospects of taking the title in Munster-something which we last achieved eighteen years ago in 1974.

For some strange reason, the notion seems to have gone about the county, that Clare should be easy to beat, we having scored against the minor and senior this year. Their under 21 team is a much different proposition and we will be doing alright to consider ourselves having a fifty-fifty chance against them. Three years ago, in 1989, Clare defeated Cork by a huge score before going on to take the provincial title and then qualified for the All-Ireland final in which they were beaten by Offaly. Eleven of that same team are now on their first fifteen in under 21 and trained by Ger Loughnane are concentrating on winning this championship. No stone has been left unturned by their County Board and selectors in gearing them for the championship and a decisive win over Tipperary (1-14 to 0-13), was proof enough that their championship plans are paying off. Recently the full panel spent a weekend in Killarney and the group have travelled far and wide to play good challenge games against proven opposition. We would only fool ourselves if we take this challenge lightly. It will be as tough an assignment as we have faced for a long number of years.

It would be wrong too, to create the notion that we have not got much of a chance. We have as good a team in this grade, as we have had in the best of times and while there are a few injury worries, the selectors are hopeful that Patrick Fanning, Owen Dunphy and John Walsh will be passed fit enough to field. John Walsh did not play against Cork (the De La Salle player was one of our best against Cork in Pairc Ui Caoimh last year).

Since the Cork game, challenge matches have been played and several training sessions held and things seem to be coming along nicely.

When the team to do duty is named on Monday night next, it is not expected to show many changes from the team which played in the semi-final.

Ray Barry, of passage who was the minor goalkeeper

with the county three years ago, will again be the net minder. Either Ger Lowry or Seamus Keating may have to make way for Johnnie Walsh, if he reports fit, but it is most unlikely that Owen Dunphy, full-back, Mark Sullivan in the left corner and halfbacks Pat Fanning and Fergal Hartley will be moved. Tom Fives and Johnnie Brenner will again be in the middle of the field and in attack we have Anthony Fitzgerald, Sean Daly, Noel Dalton, Tony Browne, Kevin McGrath, Michael Hubbard all hoping to hold their places against strong competition from several top players who are on the 27 man panel.

Clare will field eleven, and maybe more of the team which brought them to the minor All-Ireland final three years ago. They will include names like Ger Moroney, Ger Canny, Pat Markham, Christy Chaplin, Paul O'Rourke, Brendan McNamara, Pat Minogue, Conor Clancy, etc. etc.

Records

In 1974 we beat Clare in the Munster Final by 2-5 to 1-3; In 1980 Clare beat us by 6-13 to 5-1; In 1976 Clare won by 2-17 to 4-7 against Waterford. Clare played in the Munster finals of 1976 and 1980 and lost on both occasions.

Our best performances in this grade in recent times were in 1983 when we drew with Cork at 1-11 each and lost the replay in Pairc Ui Caoimh by 1-14 to 1-10. Last year Cork were very flattered in beating a splendid Waterford team by 3-12 to 0-13.

It is worthy of note (and not very encouraging news) that after Waterford had been beaten recently by Galway in a challenge in Thurles, the same Galway team were given an eleven points hammering by Clare a week later.

Remember the Team:

The last occasion on which Waterford played in an All-Ireland final was in Thurles in 1974 (September 13th.) when we lost by a single point to Kilkenny in a thriller. We lost by 3-8 to 3-7, having led into the final five minutes.
