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Co. Council Has No Money To Hedge Cut County Roads

During a discussion on the County Engineer's progress report on road-works carried out during the month of June at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday, Cllr. O. Coffey asked what the position was in regard to hedge cutting on County Roads some of which he said were now in a state of wilderness.

Mr. John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer said that because the money allocated for road repairs and maintenance had been cut back, hedge cutting on County roads also had to be cut back. He went on to say that the hedge cutting which was being carried out was concentrated on main roads and on access

roads to tourist resorts and beaches.

"We would like to do some hedge cutting on the County roads," Mr. O'Flynn said, "but we just can't do it because of lack of money."

Cllr. R. Walsh said that some of the roads in the Old Parish area were so bad that people were not able to walk along them not to mind drive over them.

Cllr. P. Coffey stressed the danger which overgrown hedges presented

This, among other things stated: "Be assured we don't envisage leaving the site as it is at present. We are currently working on proposals which will eliminate the concern expressed in your letter. I will write to you in the next four to six weeks to let you know of the position as it stands."

suspended in 1987 in the light of the declining demographic trend and its implication for future post-primary enrolments in Dungarvan.

An application for the provision of temporary accommodation to meet short-term needs at this school is currently being processed within my Department.

West Waterford Hospice Association To Present £11,000 Cheque



McGrath's Castle — Around 1900 much of the ancient castle of the McGrath's had collapsed and by 1924 Edmond Keohan in his 'History of Dungarvan' states that the castle had almost entirely fallen away. In the late 1960's portion of one of the walls still stood erect but this ruin was declared dangerous and was completely demolished by the appropriate authorities.

Donal McGrath the first owner of the castle is buried inside the ruins of

the old Abbey located nearby and his tomb can be seen under the north window with his name inscribed on it.

Little is known of the McGrath's except that they had large estates in the Parish of Modeligo. The castle of Sledy was built by Philip McGrath in 1628. The McGrath's were always very helpful towards religious orders and the family helped to establish many monasteries throughout the County. There is a highly ornamented tomb in Lismore Cathed-

ral of which only part of the Latin inscription round it can be deciphered. However this shows it to be the tomb of John McGrath and his wife Katherine Thorne 1548.

New RTE West Waterford Transmitter To Improve FM Radio Coverage

Members of Waterford Co. Council, Dungarvan Urban Council, Lismore Town Commissioners, together with representatives of several West Waterford development organisations and of local radio and television dealers attended a reception at the Park Hotel, Dungarvan, hosted by RTE last Thursday night to mark the on-air improved FM radio coverage provided by the new RTE West Waterford Transmitter.

The new transmitter with a 116ft high mast has been located at the 838ft high Knockaunabouchala Hill, 5 miles south west of Dungarvan, and operates on the following frequencies: 88.5 MHz (Radio 1); 90.7 MHz (2 FM) and 92.9 MHz (RnaG/FM3).

Ms. Valerie McCormack (RTE Publicity) proved a most courteous, helpful and efficient Mistress of Ceremonies as she opened the formal proceedings following the hospitality reception and having welcomed all who had responded to the invitation, she explained that RTE had come to Dungarvan for this reception to mark the coming on air of the new FM Coverage which marked another stage in RTE's ongoing policy of coverage extension and improved reception of its services.

Mr. Colm Curley, Director of Engineering, RTE, stated that they had become aware of the radio reception problems which existed in certain areas around the county and they had, as a result, decided to accelerate the programme which they had planned to bring about the necessary improvements. He said that FM reception provided quality sound reproduction because of the way the signal was transmitted from studio to receiver.

In order to receive the best reception from the new transmitter he advised listen-

ers to contact their local dealer who would advise on the correct aerial installation and tuning.

Mr. John McGrath, Head of Network RTE said that when people's new awareness of FM reception increased they had planned a very serious campaign to improve reception around the country and that campaign had peaked this year. The West Waterford transmitter was now fully commissioned and later in the year they would be dealing with this improved coverage in the Clonmel and East Cork districts while the very extensive campaign would continue next year.

Mr. Kevin Healy, Director of Radio Programming RTE prefaced his remarks by stating that as a Corkman he maintained a great interest in the provincial areas and for that reason always catered for local programmes. In regard to the new FM coverage he admitted that it was the competition from local radio stations which had made them move faster in this campaign than they might otherwise have done. "We are getting a hell of a run from them, but we do not mind the competition," he said.

Cllr. Tony Wright, Vice-Chairman, Dungarvan Urban Council, on behalf of all the guests and on his own behalf thanked RTE for hosting the

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

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

Will Costly Beef Tribunal Eventually Be Aborted?

The long-running Beef Tribunal has come to a halt and all further sittings have been postponed until September 2 to await the outcome of the Supreme Court hearing of the Attorney General's appeal against the High Court ruling on Cabinet secrecy in regard to Government decisions concerning export credit insurance for the beef industry.

Last week it was revealed in the Dail by Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh that to date the Tribunal had cost the taxpayers of the country £2.6 million for the State involvement. The bill includes £1.6 million paid in legal fees up to mid-April with four Senior Counsel for the State and the Tribunal each being paid £1,890 a day and four Junior Counsel each receiving £1,260 a day.

The Minister also dis-

closed that his Department had paid £1,800 a day to management consultants but did not explain why these were required for the 10-day period they were employed from March 2.

The Tribunal Chairman, Mr. Justice Liam Hamilton has been allocated £10,000 in addition to his annual salary of £67,786 for expenses during the Tribunal.

In addition to the State costs there are the costs of the other parties involved in the hearings and these, as of now, could well run into a further £3 million, making the total cost of the Tribunal to date something in the region of £6 million and there's a long way to go yet — it is certainly proving very costly to find out who did what and when where all these Beef shenanigans were concerned. In the long run it is more than likely that the taxpayers will have

to take up the tab for all the costs but this is an issue which will be finally decided by the Tribunal Chairman, whenever it concludes.

But apart from the total cost, we are again quite appalled by the huge daily fees being paid to the Senior and Junior barristers engaged at the Tribunal. It is difficult to understand in a country which is finding itself in such dire financial straits that such huge sums of money must be doled out to individuals on a daily basis. There can be no doubt but that the wigs which these people perch upon their heads are worth a gold mine and this must surely be one of the prime reasons why they are so loathe to part with them!

Then again how the payment of these big sums of money, not only to barris-

ters, but to other individuals as has been revealed in many cases recently can be justified is beyond comprehension. Ireland is a poor country — in the 12-State European Community we are rated among the four poorest — but despite the fact that we are at present travelling around Europe with a begging bowl, it is a rich place for a select group of professionals who can expect a daily pay-packet of almost up to £2,000. It certainly makes one wonder and even more so when we take on board that there are now in excess of 300,000 in the dole queues around the country!

But to get back to the Tribunal, now that all sittings have been suspended until September 2, fears are being entertained that it might eventually be aborted. We can only wait and see.

Kenneally said that were it not for this, he would in all probability have won a nomination as he showed us a letter dated June 12 from the Taoiseach's Private Secretary which stated that Mr. Reynolds had made very strong representations on Cllr. Kenneally's behalf to his colleague, the Minister for Health concerning the nomination. The letter concluded by stating, "and I would like to take this opportunity in wishing you every success with your nomination."

The New 5p — A Miserable Sprat Of A Coin

A few weeks ago, actually in the last week of June, the new 5p coin made its appearance when with something of a publicity flourish it was presented to Finance Minister Bertie Ahern by the Governor of the Bank of Ireland. The publicity hype made great play in describing the harp and the bull which were to be the distinguishing marks of the new cupro-nickel alloy coin and it told us that the 193 million existing 5p coins at present in circulation and worth £9.65 million would lose their value as legal tender

next New Year's Day.

All that took place some three weeks ago and the new 5p's have since gone into general circulation and people are beginning to see them for the first time. Generally speaking the reaction has been one of utter disappointment, mainly at the size of the coin.

It measures less than 2 cms in diameter or something in the region of 3-4th of an inch which makes it extremely small and consequently very impractical. It is in fact a miserable sprat of a coin

which elderly people, especially, will find most difficult to handle. Being so small and light, it can be very easily lost and that alone will make this new 5p a dead loss. No bonus marks then for the brains that thought up of this miserable looking old type three-penny bit!

We believe that it would now be far better for the Banks to retain the old style (existing) 5p coins in circulation and to withdraw the miserable little new coins instead of doing what they now propose to do.

Hello, we are a group of Spanish students coming from Valencia, many people in Dungarvan know some things about it, because some of us have been coming here for a few years and we have told them about Valencia and its customs.

Valencia is a big city situated in the East Spanish coast in the Mediterranean Sea, it is very famous because of its culinary practices including the paella, the most popular meal, in which the rice is the main ingredient, and also because the nice weather and beautiful beaches make the Valencian coast one of the most important ones among the touristic coasts.

But if Valencia is very popular all over the Spanish country is because of the Fallas, celebrated once a year, they are a kind of monument made of cardboard, that represent a scene of the most remarkable events which happened during the year, and in most cases they criticise political or social aspects. These Fallas are settled in the streets and so people can go around Valencia to see them, they can be

sometimes really huge, quite a few metres in height. The best one is kept in a museum but the rest of them are burnt while people sing, drink and dance around the burning Fallas. — *Carmen Galvez.*

I choose Dungarvan because it is in the South of Ireland and there are a lot of interesting places to visit.


CHILDREN FROM AFAR

So Easy To Turn Green



It amazes me that some gardeners have not cottoned on to the financial benefits of being 'green.' It seems natural to pursue our hobby in a way which conserves and harmonises with nature anyway, but some need convincing that they should cut down on chemical aids and recycle garden materials.

They often say 'what difference will my little garden make!' Quite a lot, I say, if we all took more care over what chemicals we use in our 'little gardens.'

But if you aren't swayed by the environmentalist line, weigh up the costs of chemical gardening — pesticides, weedkillers and artificial fertilisers cost money and some are risky to use.

Of course, artificial aids can help at times when pest infestation is particularly bad or you want to fertilise houseplants using a little Baby Bio in their water. But it is amazing what you can do without and here are a few tips towards gardening and saving money: **GARDEN COMPOST HEAP** — with everything growing like mad during July and deadheading and lawnmowing top of the jobs list there is never a better time to start a heap if you haven't already.

Better still, start two so that one can be 'stewing' while the other is taking fresh material — the first have produced a nice crop of free organic compost by winter, ready for digging into borders for excellent results next year. The golden rules are:

- Never pack the heap too tightly — it needs air to work well
- Water go get moisture to the centre of the pile and assist rotting

- be ready to add tea leaves, shredded newspapers and vegetable peelings to the pile but other household scraps could attract vermin.

- do not add weeds — the seeds often survive the rotting process and germinate when you add the compost to your flower border!

HOEING — the hoe has been around a long time but is still the most cost-effective method of controlling weeds. Many people buy cheap and cheerful but a stouter and sharper one, possibly of stainless steel, will slice through soil and weed stems far more effectively. You will also find that hoeing for a few minutes each day is more efficient than a weekend blitz. In July weeds establish quickly and need urgent attention.

PLANT CONTAINERS — been spending pounds buying new flower pots and seed trays? Why bother when you throw away so many every week — the used baked bean, yogurt, margarine, microwave meal containers and all the other debris from our supermarket society.

Normally, they will at best have a useless burial at the local refuse tip. At worst they end up polluting the roadside, the beach, picnic sites or floating in rivers, ponds and sea.

I prefer to poke holes in the plastic ones using a hot poker or even a lighted match and then fill them with seeds, seedlings or plants. Tins can be punched with a hammer and large nail. Jars can be inverted over pots and used to generate warmth to germinate seeds.

Look indoors at decorative planters and think how many are lined with a flower pot which could serve elsewhere if replaced with a liner made from an old plastic bottle.

THE KIDS WILL LOVE THESE STRIPS WITH A DIP

Continuing our summer holiday theme, while the kids are out and about in the garden or in the park, we've got a delicious and simple dish to satisfy their taste buds when they return.

It's fish again — not just because most children adore it if it's done in a 'different' way, but it is also simple for mum to prepare. You can use any type of fish such as whiting, dab, plaice or megrim for this dish. Your local fishmonger will be able to advise you on which fish to choose and they are also happy to skin and fillet it for you.

The following recipe tastes great with relished or dips such as cucumber, sweetcorn or tomato. To complete the meal, serve with some sticks of crunchy vegetables and pieces of fruit.

The oil should be so hot that the fish sizzles every time you put a piece in the pan.

The batter used for this recipe is based on a light Japanese Tempura batter. It needs hardly any mixing and don't worry if it looks lumpy — it's supposed to!

BATTERED FISH STRIPS

Ingredients:

1 lb (450g) fish, fresh or defrosted,

skinned seasoned flour, for dusting
1 egg yolk
8 fl oz (225ml) iced water

4 oz (125g) self-raising flour
sunflower oil, for frying
selection of relishes or dips, to serve

Method:
Preheat oil to 170°C/340°F
Slice the fish into strips and dust in seasoned flour.

Place the egg yolk into a bowl and pour in the iced water, mix together.

Add all the flour and stir for about 10 seconds, the batter does not need to be smooth.

Pour the oil into a shallow pan or wok to a depth of about 2" (5cm), heat until a cube of bread browns in 30 seconds.

Dip the fish into the batter, shake off the excess and fry in the hot oil, one or two pieces at a time, until golden brown.

Drain on absorbent kitchen paper, serve immediately with a selection of relishes. Makes 18 - 24 fingers.







Coach Pete Barry of the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, college player Megan Pattysen from the University of Connecticut, Gilbert Croix and Alain Jardel complete the foreign listing.

Vinny Baker is one of the American coaches about whom we may hear a lot in the future. At 6'9" Baker plays for the University of Hartford and was also a member of the U.S.A. Junior Men's Team. This year he has spent some time at the Boston Celtics Rookie Camp and he is widely re-

When I spoke to them on their arrival they all commented on how intensive the course was, with coaching sessions, gym work, talks, kick competitions, and matches packed into each day from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. However, in spite of the busy schedule, the general consensus among the players and the mentors was that the week was not only very educational but also thoroughly enjoyable. The players commented that after the week they had not only got to know everyone on their own panel extremely well, but that they had all made many friends from the other five counties as well.

COACHING

There were sixteen coaches in all involved every day. These worked in pairs and the county groups were assigned a new pair of coaches for each course section, thereby giving the players a flavour of all the different coaching approaches. They dealt in detail with all the many skills in the game — catching, kicking, lifting, solo-running, passing, evading and tackling. There were also sessions on health related fitness and Dr. Brian Spillane gave a very informative, illustrated talk on how to prevent and treat sports-related injuries. Right throughout the course great emphasis was placed by all the coaches on the need for proper warm-up and stretching before and after strenuous effort.

their contributions praised by the coaches but, it was an eye-opener for many as they had their mistakes pointed out to them.

MENTORS

The Waterford group was accompanied by five mentors — Fr. Pat Moran, Pat Curran, Declan Barron, Gerry O'Connell and Eamon Martin. For these men the course was also an opportunity to share ideas with their counterparts from the other counties and a chance to pick up a few new coaching tricks. Pat Curran, Waterford's County Football Coach, was, of course, one of the coaches who was employed for the week. For him each day was a busy working one; he was very popular with all the groups and he acquitted himself extremely well as a coach. Waterford referee Pat Moore officiated at the Kerry v. Limerick and the Cork v. Tipperary matches and was admired by all for his authority on the field and his strict but fair handling of these two very competitive games.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

On Friday morning, the last day of the course, the President of the G.A.A., Mr. Peter Quinn, addressed players, mentors and officers of Coiste Oiliúna Na Mumhan. In a wide ranging speech, in which he was lavish in his praise for the organisers of the camp, he singled out the Munster Council for special mention. He noted that they were 'way ahead' of all the other provincial councils in the amount of financial resources they were allocating to coaching at underage level. To date, he said, the Munster Council's financial input into the provision of coaches has been in excess of £200,000.

SYMPATHY

I was very sorry to learn of the awful drowning tragedy which cost the life of young Colm Geary who is the only son of Tommy and Una Geary who reside in Dundalk. Colm was holidaying in Greece when the tragedy happened.

Tommy Geary played his hurling and football with the Shamrocks Club and was one-time club secretary who thought little of cycling to Cappoquin or Dungarvan to Board meetings in the early sixties. I met him some years ago in Dundalk and found that his interest in the Shamrocks and in the county teams was as keen as ever. We offer Tommy and Una our very sincere sympathy.

DEARBHLA NI MHUIRÍ R.I.P.

News of the tragic death of this very popular young lady cast a great gloom over the area when news of the accident reached her family last week. She was the youngest daughter of Sylvester and Caitlín Ó Muirí of Helvick who are very well known in GAA circles in the county.

Sylvester was one of the best known personalities in the Ring Club, both as a player and club officer over a long number of years and his labours in promoting the games at juvenile level are well known.

We offer our heartfelt sympathy to the family on this very sad occasion.


MICKEY MURRAY R.I.P.

It was through the Cappoquin Notes that I learned of the passing of this old hurling warrior who helped his club, Tourin, to fame and renown over 40 years ago. He was a member of the Tourin team which won the 1949 junior hurling county championship in the first year of their existence and figured very prominently in their win over the champions, Mount Sion, in the senior hurling final of the following year.

Older followers of the game will recall his great point which was followed by a goal in the closing minutes to give the club a remarkable victory in their first year in senior ranks. The title had been out of the West for nine years at the time, it not having been won since Dungarvan took the 1941 title.

WEEKEND FIXTURES

Hurling Championships In Senior, Junior And Intermediate Down For Decision

Under-21 Hurlers Face Stiff Challenge In Thurles Tonight

The feeling that we are on the verge of a breakthrough in hurling, has sent a buzz around the county in recent weeks and the upcoming under-21 and minor games in the respective finals, seem to have overshadowed

the club championships, at least for the time being. With a number of cancellations, which were requested by the minor hurling selectors, the programme for the weekend is greatly curtailed and some of the crunch matches are off.

WATERFORD V. CLARE

There is far greater interest in the Waterford v. Clare under-21 Munster hurling final than there was on July 14, 1974, and by all accounts we will have a huge following at Semple Stadium tonight when the final gets underway at 7.45 p.m. Beating mighty Cork for the first time since the championship in 1964, has aroused tremendous interest in the game and despite Clare's very high profile and tag of favourites, there is great hope within the county that this team of ours will take their second championship in the grade.

A few of our players have been nursing injuries, but there were hopes after a splendid final training session at Fraher Field on Sunday morning that all the members of the panel would report fit in time for the selectors to make a judgment when they sat down to pick the team on Monday night.

Clare have defeated both Limerick and Tipperary and this, in itself, is quite an achievement and something which entitles them to the tag of favourites. They will be very difficult to beat, but with our team striking their best form we will travel with hopes of bringing back the cup tonight. It is a year of major surprises.

I.H.C. — CLONEA V. ST. MOLLERANS

This will be a very important match for St. Mollerans who have five points from two wins and a draw. Their best display so far was when sharing the points with Cappoquin. A defeat here would leave them in a very worrying situation and I expect that this is what is going to happen as unbeaten Clonea appear to be just a cut above the others and look like getting to the final unbeaten.

RING V. BALLYDURN

Everyone who remembers the three tremendous matches between these clubs in the junior county final and replays in 1990 will not wish to miss this meeting between the junior champions of '90 and '91. Both are still without a win in the championship so far but

Ring do have a point from their drawn match with Stradbally.

Ring have been plagued with injuries of late and I don't have news on the fitness of those who were out for their last couple of matches. Ballydurn have no point so far, but their display against Erin's Own was a very good show from a side who have lost their three matches.

Ring will be favourites here, but I would not rule out a surprise either. This is the Saturday evening game in Dungarvan.

S.H.C. ROANMORE V. DUNHILL

Dunhill, following their defeat last Sunday, are now out of the running and all they can hope for is to avoid relegation. A long range forecast might tell that they will meet St. Saviours in the relegation game.

Roanmore have two points and may get two more here, but this could be their lot as I don't fancy them getting any from their meeting with Mount Sion on next Sunday week. It does look as if Roanmore have left it too late to recover. All the same, they should win here.

J.H.C. — CLASHMORE V. BALLINAMEELA

If Ballinameela don't win this one, their chances of qualifying are gone for another year. It does not seem they are going to win against a Clashmore team who are playing very good hurling at the moment and having beaten Kilgobinet last weekend, are now strongly in contention for

inclusion in the qualifying group of three. It is now a battle between Kilgobinet, Ballysaggart, Kilrossanty and Clashmore, unless there are major upsets to come and this does not seem to be on the cards. Clashmore should win here.

County Board Meeting

County hurling coach, Georgie Leahy, has been given a further two seasons in charge of training/coaching the senior hurling team, but the county selectors will not be appointed until clubs have had an opportunity of discussing the matter and submitting nominations to a special meeting to be held on Monday, July 27.

Eamon O Murchú, Chairman, presided and said that he felt that the matter should be on the agenda before a decision could be taken, but if the meeting wanted to appoint a selection committee, it could be done.

James Tobin proposed that the coach and the outgoing four selectors be reappointed for a two year period. He said they had done a very fine job with the team and should be left with them for a further period. He believed such a decision would prove rewarding for the county. Other members supported the proposition.

Phil Fanning felt it was wrong to proceed in this way as clubs did not have an opportunity of considering the matter and this was their right. There was, he said, the question of the number of selectors to be appointed, whether the county champions should have a representative and other factors to be considered. He saw no need for haste and proposed that a decision be deferred until the next meeting, or if the Board wished, a special meeting.

Other speakers agreed and at this juncture Jimmy O'Gorman who is Chairman of the Selection Committee, agreed that it might be better to wait until the next meeting.

The matter arose when the report from the outgoing committee stated that the outgoing members were available to serve for a further term if this was acceptable to the County Board. Nominations may be submitted at the meeting.

COISDE NA PEIL

In their report to the meeting, they stated that Paddy Fitzgerald, Dungarvan, had been unanimously elected Chairman of the committee and Eamon Martin, Brickey Rangers, was appointed as delegate to the County Board.

They requested audience with An Coisde Gnotha to discuss matters related to the National League and the 'B' All-Ireland championship. This was agreed.

Other reports were from the senior hurling selection committee, who referred to the early appointment or reappointment of selectors in order to prepare the team for the National League.

Reports from the U-21 hurling and minor hurling committees told how they fared against Cork and Tipperary respectively in their

recent championship games. The chairman, on behalf of the Board, congratulated both committees on their achievements and wished them success in the finals. Eddie Cunningham responded suitably.

The serious problems relating to the Under-21 football game with Kerry at Milltown, Co. Kerry, were outlined in their report and team manager Paddy Fitzgerald elaborated on the account already given. He said some members of the panel were on the bus from 1 p.m. until they arrived at the venue, shortly before the scheduled starting time of 8 p.m. and did not have a chance to exercise themselves before the game. It was after 2 a.m. when they got back home. Delegates agreed that there was need to review this 'home and away' arrangement with some counties and the matter will be looked at by the executive committee.

FRAHER FIELD

Nioclás MacCraith, who was welcomed back, having been hospitalised for a couple of weeks, gave an update on the situation in relation to the development programme at Fraher Field. Having given an outline of the plans which had been approved by County Board, he gave a progress report on the work carried out. He said that planning permission had now been granted with slight modifications and arrangements are now being made to invite tenders for the next stage of development which will include a stand to accommodate approximately 3,000 on the Show Ground side of the field. It will be possible to carry out an amount of the work without interfering with the championships. He said that money is a big factor in the whole development plans and the field committee were keeping in touch with the county finance committee. The kind of finance required would not be known until tenders had been received. Permission was given by the Board to proceed and to report back to the Board when tenders had been received. OTHER MATTERS

Paddy Fitzgerald, Dungarvan, complained about the absence of names of Waterford referees from the list which was recently published. He said it was a sad situation to find that we were the only county who had no referee considered good enough to handle

Munster championship games.

Tom Hennessey stated that the reason given to him was that the Waterford referees who had been called to a training session, had not completed the course, they having had to return home to referee championship games here.

St. Mary's and Fourmilewater clubs were granted permission to have a 'replay' of their famous 1979 championship hurling clash at Fraher Field. They were also given approval for the appointment of Eddie Cunningham who was the man in the middle in the game thirteen years ago.

Application forms for the purchase of the ten year Cusack Stand tickets were issued during the meeting and delegates were informed that July 31 is the closing date.

Kill and Tramore clubs were given permission to stage tournaments in hurling and football respectively.

APPEALS

An appeal against the Eastern Board by Ferrybank Club, was ruled out of order by the chairman as it did not comply with Rule 149d.

A personal appeal by Sammy O'Reilly of the Ferrybank Club against the Eastern Board was upheld as the Board did not follow the proper procedures when dealing with the recommendations of their disciplinary committee.

WATER ON THE FIELD!

The match regulations which were introduced fairly recently, forbid mentors from entering the field of play to supply water, or other thirst quenching juices to players during the course of the game.

To their cost a number of counties have ignored the restriction, but with the heavy penalties being doubled each next time that such a regulation is breached, County Boards have stepped in and instructed their mentors to desist from the practice in future.

Now an alternative practice has been introduced to circumvent the regulation as 50,000 people saw when watching the Munster senior hurling final at Cork on Sunday week. Small plastic bottles of water were thrown on to the field and picked up by the player who had been targetted. Having partaken of the contents, (and shared it with his opponent), he threw the bottle back to the line where it was duly collected and put into a bag with other empties. In all cases this happened during a stoppage in play and there was no interference with the progress of the match.

This unsightly practice is

obviously the brainchild of the Cork or Limerick mentors and while we may sympathise with them and understand their concern for the players performing in such high temperatures, we are sure that steps will be taken to stop it from being adopted nationally.

I can see difficulties in having it stopped. A new regulation to outlaw the practice can again be circumvented by having the bottles thrown in from the terraces and stands, which is a simple exercise. The alternative to the whole problem may be to allow a player to come to the sideline, should he require a drink of water.

At last week's meeting of the County Board, James Tobin referred to this new development and said it was a serious one for the association and asked that our Munster Council delegates have the matter raised at the next meeting. Other members agreed. It will be interesting to see if the practice is to be continued in the remaining matches in the championships.

GARDAI

COMPLIMENTED

The control of crowd and traffic movement for the Munster finals by the Gardai was praised by several members of the County Board at their meeting on Monday and the chairman referred to the wonderful co-operation received by the team party from Chief Superintendent O'Loughlin. He said that without the assistance of the Garda motorcycle escort it would not have been possible to get to the venue in good time. I understand that the compliments of the Board were conveyed to the Garda authorities in Cork by our county P.R.O. John Jackson.

COMPLAINTS

The chairman said that the issue of only 800 stand tickets for distribution among clubs, with a team in the final, was most unfair and it is something that should be looked into by the Council with a view to substantially increasing the allocation for minors, regardless of which county was engaged.

P. S. O'Ryan, Fourmilewater, said that delegates should be told of the number of tickets which came into the county and how they were distributed, for all finals.

John Lyons, Western Board, said that the stadium was overfilled for the finals and the yellow passageways were also taken up with patrons. Reference was also made to the very many patrons who took up positions on top of pillars on the perimeter walls and who were a very serious public liability risk for the association.


Delegates were not very pleased with the standard of refereeing of the minor final and a number spoke on the matter. Eddie Cunningham told the meeting that the referee had complained about the Waterford minors being huddled in a group for a final team talk, before the sides were called in for the start. 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
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Co. Council Has No Money To Hedge Cut County Roads

especially at road junctions and said that something should be done in the interest of safety to keep the hedges trimmed back at these points.

Cllr. O. Wilkinson thought we had been extremely fortunate to have had such a mild winter last year as otherwise the surfaces of the County roads would be in a much worse state than they now were. In some cases in his area the position in regard to hedge cutting was so bad that the briars were meeting in the middle of the road. "It's just another blow at rural Ireland," he said.

Cllr. Nora Flynn referred to a motion on the subject which she had put down for discussion at the meeting. This called on the Minister for the Environment to provide sufficient funds for the maintenance of local County Roads as the inadequate funding has caused serious deterioration and an increasing risk of accidents.

Cllr. Flynn went on to say that on some of the roads in the Cappoquin area, grass had grown to a length of four feet. "We can boast about our main roads but we cannot boast about our County roads and that's where people live," she said, adding that in many instances postmen were refusing to use them and neither would creamery lorries. "The position is that unless something is done soon we won't have any of these roads in usable condition," said Cllr. Flynn.

The Co. Engineer said that in real terms the amount of money allocated for the upkeep of County roads was only about half of what it had been 4 years ago. As a result they could now only

surface dress the roads once every four years. "I see no light at the end of the tunnel unless additional funding is made available for this purpose and quite frankly as things stand our County roads are bound to get worse," he said.

Cllr. B. Kyne, Chairman said that he thought it was impossible with the demand and shrinking of cash being made on Co. Councils to carry out what was being demanded. The only solution he saw was that they would have to up their collective approach to deal with the services which the Councils were expected to provide.

Cllr. N. Flynn's motion was passed unanimously.

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Fish Kill In Tributary Of River Bride

Furious anglers discovered a fourth fish kill within a fortnight on a tributary of the River Blackwater last Thursday.

Fishery Board officers are investigating the cause of the latest kill on a river near Tallow.

Last Thursday night an-

glers said they believed the trout kill, on the Mill Stream, an important spawning nursery for the River Bride, which feeds into the Blackwater, may have been caused by sheep dip entering the river.

Dan Quill, the Fermoy-based president of the Munster Regional Trout Anglers Council, said that his members were very concerned about the matter.

"This is an important river, and incidents like this shouldn't happen." Within the past three weeks, thousands of fish have been wiped out in three other kills on tributaries of the Blackwater, one of Ireland's premier salmon fisheries.
