## Waterford Glass Management Attacked For "Obnoxious" Announcement

The management of Waterford Crystal was strongly criticised and taken to task at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night for the confrontational and non-negotiable way in which their most recent announcement to source still further lines of crystal in Europe was made on tv and in the national media.

Cllr. B. Kyne who raised the matter said that there was now deep concern

about the future of the Company in Dungarvan where over 400 workers were employed in the local Crystal plant. He said that they should write to Mr. Galvin, the chief executive, condemning this strategy to site Waterford Crystal outside this country and the slick way in which the announcement was made. "This appears to be another part of Company strategy and it's up to this Council to make a stand against it," he said.

Cllr. R. Walsh agreed and said he objected particularly to the obnoxious way in which this announcement was made. He held that the Company should not be permitted to use the Waterford brand for any crystal manufactured outside of Waterford City or Dungarvan.

It was unanimously agreed to convey these views to the Taoiseach and to the Minister for Industry and Commerce.

## Plan To Sell Quay Car Park For £225,000 Approved

A proposal to sell the Council's car park at Davitt's Quay to the L&N Company for £225,000 was strongly recommended for approval by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley when the matter came before the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night.

However, doubts about the proposal were expressed by some members, one remarking that it was

like "selling the family silver" and another holding that in selling such a property the Council was not

being true to tradition. In the end the County Manager succeeded in allaying the fears and apprehensions expressed and finally the proposal was declared carried

## CAPPOQUIN FLY FISHING CLUB RE-STOCK LOCAL RIVERS

The restocking is phase one of a long-term plan by the club to bring good quality fishing back to Cappoquin, it is a long time since trout of the size and quality of those released were seen in the area.

Ironically, this restocking had to battle against major opposition from angling and other groups who prevent the restocking of the Blackwater. This restocking will complement the work of Lismore trout anglers who have been restocking for a number of years.

A convoy of cars ferried the helpers from place to place. They were joined by landowners and their families who all helped out. Mr. John Cashman and his family, Rockfield House, Cappagh, turned out in force, also on hand was Mr. Tom Moore, Aglish

House, Aglish. Tom and Terrie are amongst the major sponsors of Cappoquin Fly Fishing Club as are Breda and Michael Doherty, Glenview Guest House, Cappoquin and Emmet and Joan Nugent, The Castle Millstreet.

The club is running a competition for the heaviest trout for the season and it has created good natured rivalry amongst young and old.

It is heartening to see positive action being taken to halt the decline in fish stocks. It is hoped that the club will receive the whole hearted support of every sports man in the area, who will benefit from the clubs activities, this type of development will have spin off effects right through the economy of West Waterford and is a perfect example of team spirit and cooperation at grass roots level in the region.

## Traffic Hazards On Dungarvan By-Pass

At the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last week the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne asked for a report as to whether the Council's Road Traffic Section felt that the junction at the Youghal Road of the Dungarvan By-Pass should be improved so as to prevent traffic from the By-Pass going in the Cork direction from breaking the "yield" sign.

Cllr. Kyne also suggested that the junction at Coolagh Road, Abbeyside should be examined in regard to the difficulty which traffic com-

ing from the Waterford direction experienced in regard to the right of way over cars coming off the By-Pass towards Crotty's Corner.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, pointed out that the design of the Urban Road Traffic plan which indicated the roundabouts to be placed on the By-Pass was presently with the Department awaiting approval and when these roundabouts were placed in position he hoped that they would solve both of these problems.

## Know Your Rights

**Question:** My new pension book contains no pages beyond the end of July for the temporary additional payment which I have been getting since 1986. There was nothing about this in the Budget when it was announced that pensioners were to get a 4% increase. Does this mean this payment is finished? If this is true, then I will lose almost £10 per week.

**Answer:** Yes! I am afraid it is true. The temporary alleviation payments which were introduced in November 1986 to compensate the married men who lost their wives as dependents were only intended to last for 12 months. However, they have remained in payment but were reduced in July each year to coincide with the general increase in social welfare payments. The men who originally got £20 because their wives were receiving their own social welfare payments are presently getting £12 and men who received £10 because their wives were working and earning more than £50 are receiving £6. These payments will cease at the end of July.

The first phase of the arrears due to married women under the EC Equality Directive will begin to be made from August. Claim forms and information leaflets will be issued automatically over the next four weeks to all those identified as being eligible, inviting them to apply for their arrears. There will also be a nationwide advertising campaign.

# Co. Council Approves Higher Education Grants Scheme "In Anticipation"

Waterford Co. Council at their July monthly meeting unanimously agreed to formalise their Higher Education Grants Scheme for 1992/93 "in anticipation."

While nothing official was before the members they had a recent Department of Education Press Release which stated that Minister for Education, Mr. Seamus Brennan had approved a substantial increase in the income eligibility limits for families where these grants

were concerned and the introduction of more equitable, open and more rigorous procedures for assessing income, linked to the tax assessment process and with a greater involvement of the Revenue Commissioners.

Cllr. P. Kenneally welcomed the announcement by the Minister and said that the new proposals should prove very helpful to many families.

Cllr. Brian O'Shea, T.D., agreed that the progress

which was being made in regard to income limits should be acknowledged.

When the Co. Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally, pointed out that they had no scheme before them as yet to adopt, the Co. Manager, Mr. D. Hurley said that the Council could formalise a scheme in anticipation.

Cllr. P. Coffey then proposed and Cllr. Nora Flynn seconded that this course be adopted and the Council unanimously approved of it.

Patrick O'Healy became an Observant Franciscan. He was educated mostly in Spain. He was appointed Bishop of Mayo in 1576. On his way to Ireland he met up with Conn O'Rourke, another Franciscan priest, in Paris. Early in 1579 they got a boat to Ireland. Attempting to get in touch with the Earl of

Their bodies were swept in on a river bank just below the present churchyard and they are the first bodies to be interred there.

Tobin in his homily said it was an honour for him to celebrate Mass in such a place and to let the people see the conditions which the priests in Penal Days had to contend with. Many people who are now laid to rest in this holy place attended those Mass-



## Waterford Foods Has £720m. Turnover

Waterford Foods chief executive, Stephen O'Connor, told the annual general meeting in Dungarvan last week that the company plans to shed non-core and non-profit-making sections of the business.

Waterford's future focus, he said, would be on the integration of its acquisitions over the past three years and on capitalising on the various combined strengths of these, both in Ireland and overseas.

He also said that the projected operating profit for the current year was £40 million, that cash flow, at £60 million, was very strong and that interest payments were one-third of profits.

Pointing out that Waterford Foods was now Ireland's leading dairy company, with an annualised turnover of £720m., he said: "We are ge-

ographically diverse with major operations in Ireland, the UK and America, with huge scope and potential for substantial growth."

He added: "We have exceeded all our financial goals in recent years and I am confident the company has a very great future."

Kilmeaden Cheese Plant had been a spectacular success and it was hoped to expand next year, he said.

Criticism of milk prices being paid to suppliers was voiced by shareholder John Cashman of Cappagh, Dungarvan.

He said dairy farmers were

to a large extent subsidising the company's massive profits.

Another Co. Waterford supplier claimed that suppliers in the south of Ireland were getting one of the lowest prices in Europe for milk.

However, Waterford Foods Chairman, John Barry, dismissed the criticism, saying the price being paid by Waterford Foods was comparable with any being paid in the country.

#### OUR LOCALITY

**Ballinroad** — Baile an Róid which means "Home-stead of the Road." Bóthar is the ordinary word for road, the use of róid being largely confined to poetry. The word Róid seems to be not a borrowed, but a true Irish word and the English (road) a derivative thereof. The Celts were, in fact, the great road builders of pre-Roman Europe. The townland of Ballinroad consisted of an area of 66 acres and was a parish in its own right at one time. At Ballinroad Cross there was once a school which is marked on the Ordnance Survey Map as Garrynageragh School. It is at this point that the townlands of Garrynageragh West and Lisheenoonna meet. Both stretch northwards from here. The

townslands mentioned above translate as follows 'Garrynageragh' = "Garden of the Sheep" while 'Lisheenoonna' means "Una's Lios." "The Tóchar" means a raised way or embankment and was the name given to the raised stretch of road over the marshland on the road from Ballinroad Church northward to the Waterford Main Road. Ballinroad was also known as "Nugent's Parish." The Nugents along with the Humbles were large landowners in the Abbeyside and Ballinroad area.

#### ABBEYSIDE BEACHES

**Logh Marbh** — As a consequence of our articles on Abbeyside beaches our attention has been drawn to the old name of the bathing

place on Abbeyside Strand that we referred to as 'The Stone Seat'. Older Abbeyside people indeed always called that bathing place 'Logh Marbh' (The Dead Lake). The author can remember it being called by that name during childhood days.

**Thiar na Trá** — Another memory that has been aroused is that of Frankie and Gusto Leahy drawing sand for building and other purposes from Strandside North (northern section of 'Thiar na Trá') by horse and cart. One remembers the sand being piled up to dry on the far side by Mrs. Keegan's house (The Old Hospital) before being collected by the various builders. It is good to see that Frankie and Gusto are still out and about and that they have retained their love of horses.

## Call To Widen Footpath On Causeway Bridge

Well-known Abbeyside Councillor, Richie Walsh called, not for the first time, for the widening of the existing narrow footpath on the Causeway Bridge when he moved a motion on the matter at the recent monthly meeting of Waterford County Council. Cllr. Walsh called on his Council colleagues to urge, in the interest of safety, that the narrow footpath be extended.

Cllr. Walsh attempted unsuccessfully to have such a proposal passed some years ago when he raised it at meetings of Dungarvan Urban Council.

Replying to the case made by Cllr. Walsh at the Co. Council meeting, the County Engineer, Mr. O'Flynn pointed out that since the By-Pass road came into operation they did not have the same

amount of heavy traffic on the Causeway Bridge. He said that any widening of the footpath which would have to be carried out in accordance with recommendations of An Foras Forbartha would affect the camber of the road at the Bridge and would simply mean that in solving one problem they would be creating another.

Mr. O'Flynn also said that the matter was one on which the Garda Authorities should be asked to comment and he added that he felt that it would be premature to do anything at the Bridge until the roundabouts proposed in the new Urban Traffic Plan had been put into operation.

As on previous occasions the matter was again deferred to allow the County Engineer to discuss the position with the Garda Authorities.

## POINTING THE WAY TO ABBEYSIDE CHURCH

It has been brought to our notice, now that many holiday-makers and visitors are around, that many people are not aware of the location of Abbeyside Parish Church. True, it is picturesquely situated close to Abbeyside strand but being a little bit away from the Village centre it is understandable that strangers would not know where it is.

It has been suggested to us that for the benefit of those who might like to

visit the Church and its historic surrounds, a small finger-post sign pointing the way might be placed, say, at Minnies Corner

which is now the accepted hub-centre of the Village. Perhaps our Urban Council would take up the suggestion.

## Roundabouts Should Ease Traffic Problems In Dungarvan

Traffic problems in Dungarvan have again been the subject of recent public discussion and the one factor common to each of the discussions was the proposed roundabouts mentioned in the new traffic control plan for the urban area approved last year by Dungarvan Urban Council.

Hazard points referred to in the discussion include the junctions at both ends of the By-Pass road: at Coolagh Road, Abbeyside and at Youghal Road, and the Causeway Bridge which continues to be a major problem area for pedestrians and pedal-cyclists.

The problems involved at the extremities of the by-pass concern which streams of traffic should have the right of way while in regard to pedestrians on the Causeway Bridge we had the old chestnut of widening the existing narrow footpath without somehow interfering with the overall width of the roadway tossed up once again.

In regard to the roundabouts proposed in the Urban Traffic Plan, these are to be located at the Youghal Road Junction of the By-Pass, at the Shandon intersection near the Park Hotel, at Davitts Quay, near the Causeway Bridge and at the Crotty's Corner in Abbeyside. We are relying on memory in listing these as we do not have the Traffic Plan to hand as we write.

The Traffic experts are sure that these will adequately and efficiently control the flow of traffic at each of the flash-points referred to. In addition it is expected that traffic coming from the Waterford direction will be controlled so that it will enter the town

via the By-Pass road and up the Shandon Road to Davitt's Quay, thus easing the flow through Sexton Street, the Causeway and across the Bridge. If the plan succeeds in diverting heavy traffic such as articulated trucks and large vans on to this traffic lane it would un-

doubtedly solve the problems which pedestrians and cyclists at present experience in negotiating the bridge.

We understand that the Traffic Plan is at present with the Department of the environment awaiting sanction. It has, as we understand it, been with the Department for some considerable time now and it would be a good idea if someone could give it a push before it collects any more dust and cobwebs in whatever pigeon-hole where it now must be lying.

## Our Bathing Waters Are Best In Europe

Despite considerable progress in environmental control and in improving the quality of bathing waters, much remains to be done according to "Eurofocus", a newsheet issued by the Commission of the European Communities. However according to statistics for 1991, Ireland was far and away the best country which had the top quality bathing waters among all the States in the European Community.

According to the report in a current issue of "Eurofocus", you cannot really drink the water to be found in the coastal areas of the EC although you can swim in it. The fact is, the report goes on to point out, that last year 87% of coastal waters met the microbiological

standards set by the Community. And at the top of the league table was Ireland, with a magnificent 97%, followed closely by Denmark.

Near the bottom of the league table were France and Spain, only 69% and

68% respectively of their waters were in conformity with Community legislation, just ahead of Germany with 64%.

The fact that Ireland heads the list in such an important environmental matter must be a major bonus for us where tourism is concerned as most Europeans give very high priority to hygiene and having the best quality bathing waters in Europe must be a great attraction to this country for all Continental tourists.

## ARE MOVES AFOOT TO CLEAR BALLINACOURTY QUIGLEY SITE?

At last week's monthly meeting of Waterford County Council, the Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, released a letter which he had received from the Quigley Company of Europe with headquarters in Cork concerning their defunct magnesite plant at Ballinacourty. This stated that the Company did not envisage leaving the site as it is at present and was at present working on proposals which would eliminate the concern recently expressed by the Council about the derelict appearance of the plant.

Without doubt the passage of years, since thus one-time busy hive of industry ceased to operate, has done nothing to enhance its appearance as the metal superstructures have shown the effects of weathering and the place takes on a more ugly appearance by the month.

The Company letter to the Co. Council Chairman promised a further missive in the course of the coming month to inform him of the position as it stands. In the interim, whispers in the grapevine have referred to some Japanese gentlemen being seen inspecting the site while other indicators would seem to point to a September clearing of the place.

Whether or which, it is to be hoped that the Quigley Company are, at long last, about to take some positive steps to finally remove this ugly blot from the landscape.

## Take Care Warning To Dungarvan Housewives

It has come to our notice that a young handyman has been making the rounds recently in Dungarvan soliciting jobs and in at least one case, of which we have been made aware, of taking orders for the supply of pvc windows. As a reference of his bona fides he has, we have been informed, been using the name of a well-known local public man.

It all sounds very straightforward and honest and people might easily be taken in by such an approach but the fact of the matter is that where this gentleman is concerned one woman has been "jipped" out of £350. He made his usual approach

and threw in the name of the man he claimed as a reference who was incidentally well-known to the woman. Accepting the man's offer to supply and install pvc windows at her home she parted with a down payment of £350. She has not seen the man or the windows or her money since!

In the circumstances, people should be warned to take care where such casual handymen are concerned and to check their credentials especially before parting with any cash. By taking such an ordinary precaution you will then be ensuring that you will not be "conned" like the woman in Dungarvan!

## It's £375 A Day For Doctors Now

Following the recent revelations about £500,000 a year RTE television and radio presenters and £1,890 a day for senior counsel engaged in the Beef Industry Tribunal, we now find our doctors set to charge £375 a day to turn up as witnesses in court. In addition patients are to be asked for £110 for any medical report to be used in a court case.

The disclosure of the new scales which have been introduced unilaterally by the Irish Medical Organisation came last week following the criticism of doctors and the court fees they charge, made by a District Court Judge at a District Court Sitting in Co. Tipperary. The IMO have rejected suggestions that the new fees are exorbitant.

An IMO spokesman is on record as stating: "No doctor likes attending court because of the total disruption it causes. In the case of a GP, it can cost £100 a day to engage a locum and fees for the treatment of private patients also have to be considered".

Maybe so, maybe so, but all these huge fees and charges cannot but make the ordinary Joe Soaps think and perhaps ask the question 'why wasn't I a tv presenter or radio DJ, or one or other of these big league earners?' While every man and woman is entitled to a fair return on work effort, it is quite impossible to justify such fees as £500,000 a year and equally hard to understand fees of £1,890 and even £375 a day!

## Gosforth's Fair Demesne

Those people know them well.


It being on a cool September eve



# Unless Funding Procedures Are Changed Council Finances Will Continue To Deteriorate — Co. Manager

In the course of a report submitted to the July monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan on the Council's Abstract of Accounts for 1991, the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley stated that the Accounts showed a nett adverse balance of £681,000 for the year, and he commented that while funding by the Government remained as it is, the finances of Local Authorities, including Waterford Co. Council, would continue to deteriorate.

The report pointed out that part of the adverse balance was due to a number of items which arose during the year and which had not been provided for in the 1991 Estimate. A malicious injury action (£49,000) had been successfully appealed and the verdict given against the Council; agreements relating to fire service cover were entered into (£45,000) and the plan to streamline the refuse collection could not be brought into operation (£50,000). This had since been achieved.

In addition the Council decided to issue Polling Cards for the Local Elections which had not been included in the Estimate (£14,000) while the Council was also called upon to pay its share of the cost of repairs and improvements to the Dog Shelter in Waterford (£18,000) and the commitment by Central Government to remove the cost of maintenance on Courthouses (£5,000) was not honoured.

The County Manager went on to state that such adverse balances were always a disappointment and as they

could not have a similar position in 1992 he would ensure that no further slippage occurred. "Even within the financial constraints which we are experiencing our budgeting for the remaining six months of the year must be very tight and we will be hoping to redress some of the deficit which occurred in 1991," said Mr. Hurley.

The report also pointed out that there was a decrease of £55,000 on arrears of Domestic Water Charges during 1991.

Concluding his report the Co. Manager again highlighted the lack of working

capital on Revenue Account. "For some time," he said, "the very healthy position on Capital Account countered this problem and maintained a satisfactory liquidity level but this is no longer the position and has resulted in cash-flow problems. This is a position which we will have to address in the very near future." Mr. Hurley added that he would not invest any further in projects for which funding had not been allocated until funds were received for those already awaiting allocations.

On the proposal of Cllr. P. Coffey seconded by Cllr. J.

Quirke the Manager's report was unanimously approved.

## OVERDRAFT ACCOMMODATION UP BY £1 MILLION

The Council also agreed to increase overdraft accommodation for the year ending December 31, 1992 from £2 million as previously approved to £3 million.

Mr. Paul Clerkin, Finance Officer explained that in the first half of the year expenditure tends to run ahead of income and when loan charges fall due for payment in early June, the Council's cash-flow problems are at their worst. "The overdraft level reached almost £3 million in June but is now reduced to £2 million and we expect that this figure will not be exceeded again this year," said Mr. Clerkin.

## A Tasty Summer Stir-Fry

Here is a tasty recipe for the warm summer months. It is easy to prepare and deliciously different.

### ASPARAGUS AND TROUT STIR-FRY

#### Ingredients:

2 tsp (10ml) cornflour  
2 tsp (10ml) soy sauce  
3 1/2 tbs (55ml) oil  
14 oz (400g) trout fillets, cut into 1 in (2.5cm) wide strips  
1 clove of garlic, crushed  
1 in (2.5cm) piece of root ginger, very finely chopped  
1 lb 2 oz (500g) fresh asparagus, cut into thin diagonal slices  
2 small carrots, thinly sliced, cut into flowers  
2 courgettes, cut into matchsticks  
2 tbs (30ml) chicken stock



mix until evenly coated. Place wok or frying pan over medium-heat. When hot, add 2 tsp (30ml) oil then add trout and gently fry for about 2 mins. Remove trout from pan and set aside.

Add remaining oil to wok. When hot, add garlic and root ginger and stir-fry for about 30 seconds, then add asparagus, carrots and courgettes and stir-fry another 30 seconds. Add chicken stock and cook, stirring frequently, for 3-4 mins. Stir in beansprouts and cook a minute. Return trout to wok and stir-fry just enough to heat through. **Serves 4.**



6 oz (175g) fresh beansprouts

#### Method:

# Many Ways To Beat Weeds



Weeds will be giving gardeners their perennial headache and it's likely to be extra painful in these times when we are all trying to be 'greener.'

Unfortunately, the environmentalist approach — cutting out or using fewer chemical fertilisers, pesticides and so on — means we cannot fall back on the spray gun when the dreaded weeds threaten to overrun our borders.

The trusty hoe is, of course, a vital weapon if used regularly. When I had a job I found that 15 minutes wielding a hoe and a garden trowel every night was more than a match for the garden weeds.

With more erratic hours I find they are much more of a handful, though mulching has proved to be a useful aid — by covering spare ground between plants you can block light to weeds and keep moisture in the ground.

If you are not worried too much by the appearance, you can keep the cost down by using shredded newspaper, old sawdust, chippings or part-rotted garden compost. For a more polished job, buy pulverised bark.

Perhaps the best solution of all is to plant the garden with species which actually keep weeds down themselves by covering the ground so densely that weeds are starved of light.

Some of the species are not only practical they are also attractive, but you must give them a fair chance to do their job — weed the ground thoroughly while you

prepare it or the weeds may be established before the ground-huggers.

For sunny spots you would be hard-pressed to find something more popular than lavender or heather, thanks to their appearance and fragrance.

Other eye-catchers are Lavender Cotton, more properly known as Santolina, and Spanish Gorse, which is also a tough and impenetrable customer.

Other 'toughies' include ivy — a great all-round coverer of eyesores such as crumbly walls, concrete or tree stumps — and Pachysandra which comes in variegated forms like ivy and will thrive almost anywhere except on chalky soils. One of my favourites is Rose of Sharon or Hypericum because it likes shady and poor soil, quickly covers ground, and produces an abundance of lovely yellow delicate flowers.

The plant also comes in different forms ranging from a compact spreading type which will quickly cover an area with a be of green and yellow, up to bushy types ideal for giving depth to a rather dank and useless corner of the garden.

Another pretty bloomer and ground hugger that likes to hide its charms in shade is Lonicera Pileata, a form of honeysuckle.

Where shade goes with dampness, try ferns. They are particularly attractive in early season as the fronds uncurl.

For something more elegant, it is perhaps not surprising that a family known for liking damp underfoot, the willows, should supply the ideal compact candidate — the aptly-named Prostrate Willow.

If the shades goes with dry and sandy soil then ivy is a predictable if slightly boring option. Ornamental Bramble is a brighter looking alternative and the lovely yellow flowered Mahonia is arguably the best-looking candidate, although the latter will need regular watering to help it cope with such a site. — **Arthur Hines**

## ESPANOLE

### To Acknowledge The Help Given By The Business Community Of Dungarvan

The following has been contributed by two Spanish students currently in Dungarvan where they are learning English.

One of the most important things which we (the Spanish group) do is our projects. Without the co-operation of the Irish people we wouldn't be able to do this important work. Doing our language projects we learn a lot of English and we also learn about, the Gardai, the Fire Station, how a Farm works, it's a novel way of learning about Ireland and Irish people.

But the first contact with Irish culture was through our Irish families. Spanish and Irish way of life are very different and when they join funny things happen. They did a study of the drug business and while visiting Stephanie explained patiently about the process in the factory, it is something which is very difficult


to do with people who are not fluent in English. Our compliments to Stephanie and the staff.





Thousands of excited Waterford supporters rushed on to the pitch to greet the players who had fought the good fight and showed such skill, courage and fierce determination in winning back the title which we last claimed 28 years ago.

Having the piece of silverware which is called Corn na Casca, handed back to us after so long, was greeted like the return of the prodigal son. Everyone got caught up in the wave of euphoria that sparked off the moment when the game ended and the celebrations went on for fully an hour on the field before supporters began to find their way back to their cars. Included were very many young people who had never seen a Waterford team win a hurling trophy and a whole lot of others who had forgotten what it was like to be around on an occasion such as this. It was certainly a night to remember.

All that came in the aftermath of a splendid game of top class hurling — the likes of which had not been seen in the grade for many a long year. From the start it was exhilarating stuff with skill, courage, fitness and total commitment of players who performed as if their lives depended on the outcome.

The fluctuating pattern of the match made sure that the excitement was held at fever pitch all the way. I cannot recall a game when scores were level on no fewer than nine times over an hour which saw Waterford take the lead on five occasions and the Banner county men go in front also at five different times.

The neutrals who were able to sit back and look at the game objectively must have wondered at the many magnificent scores which were recorded from all angles and positions by both sides. Ten of the twelve forwards who lined out shared in the scoring. Ger Loughnane told Clare that they would not be functioning effectively until all six forwards could score. On the night all their six forwards did score, but yet it was not enough to see them through a game for which they had been made favourites after beating Limerick and Tipperary.

They were devastated and understandably shattered on losing. Their seniors and minors had been beaten by Waterford in this championship and now having done everything humanly possible to prepare the side for this final, they had suffered another crushing

blow. It was a pity that Clare had to be the team to be beaten in this final and this was told to them in the silence of their dressing room afterwards.

## THE PLAY

Within a minute Sean Daly was fouled and Noel Dalton pointed, but the teams were level in the second minute when Brian Quinn shot a point for Clare. Colin Lynch put Clare in front by a point in the third minute, but Johnny Brenner brought us back on level terms in the 5th minute. Paul O'Rourke and Noel Dalton exchanged points to maintain equality. Brenner sent a seventy yards shot inches wide, but Sean Daly made no mistake and Waterford were back in front 0-4 to 0-3 in the 11th minute.

Padraigh McNamara, who was Clare's top scorer, had his first point to bring them back level in the 12th minute and it was following this score that our top scorer, Noel Dalton, mis-hit a free from a scorable distance. It was cleared, sending Clare into attack from which Pat Minogue scored a point to give them the lead back. James O'Connor had another to put Clare two points in front and when McNamara pointed a 21 yards free to put his side three up, it looked ominous.

However, a great point by Tom Fives was followed by a converted free by Noel Dalton to leave just a point between the sides in the 24th minute. One of the outstanding scores of the game was hit over by Anthony Fitzgerald from an awkward angle and far out, to bring us level again in the 26th minute. In the following four minutes, Padraigh McNamara pointed two frees to give Clare an 0-9 to 0-7 lead at half time.

Clare had played with the slight breeze and also had sun advantage and had exerted enormous pressure on the Waterford defence in the opening fifteen minutes and for all this a two points lead was not very encouraging. Waterford had reason to feel reasonably happy about being only a couple of points adrift at this stage.

## REPULSED

When the teams came out for the second half, minor star forward Paul Flynn replaced Seamus Keating and

Anthony Fitzgerald was moved back into the half back-line to take over from Keating.

An early Clare attack was repulsed before a Noel Dalton free from near the side line was pointed and two minutes later the same player had another from a free to bring us back level again. In between those scores Fergal Hartley had a near miss for a score and we had an amazing escape when a James O'Connor shot struck the outside of the post and went wide. Clare were very unlucky here.

Now it was their turn to get into the lead and a fine score by O'Connor put them there. A 75 yards free taken by Johnnie Brenner sailed over the centre of the crossbar to put us on level terms again in the 40th minute. Within 30 seconds, Noel Dalton had pointed a free to put Waterford back in the driving seat again. Tony Brown soloed through for what looked like being the first goal of the match, but the Clare keeper had the shot covered. Tom Fives was fouled and Brenner put us two points in front in the 42nd minute. McNamara and Tony Browne swapped points.

Then came the Clare score which momentarily shattered Waterford. Padraigh McNamara cut a ball from the sideline into the 'square' which full forward Conor Clancy tapped into the net. That happened in the 47th minute and Clare were now in front by a point, but by the 48th minute we were back on level terms when Barry's long puck out was caught by Brown and passed to Daly who made no mistake.

Waterford were now piling on the pressure with Michael Hubbard, Dalton and Daly combining for the vital scores that would make the difference between victory and defeat. Sean Daly was on the mark with a great point, Tom Fives sent narrowly wide and a Johnnie Brenner 90 yards shot was at the outside of the

post.

The Munster final had reached the 58th minute when a free awarded to Clare was pointed by ace forward Padraigh McNamara and the sides were level and at this stage anyone would have settled for a draw. Waterford wouldn't settle for anything less than victory and came back attacking again and when Noel Dalton, under pressure, sent us back in front, a cautious sigh of relief was breathed all over the Waterford section of the stands and according to my stopwatch there were 24 seconds remaining when Lismore's Sean Daly scored the point of his life to give us two points to spare.

Only a goal would now beat us and the quick and lengthy puck-out by David Fitzgerald helped give them that chance and a foul in defence by Waterford when Ray Barry picked the ball off the ground in a dangerous situation. A 21 yards free was hit low and hard by McNamara and magnificently saved and cleared. The final whistle was sounded and thousands of high spirited Deise supporters rushed on to the field to envelop the players who were the heroes of the night.

## ALL HEROES

They were all heroes and while some people had ideas as to who should be awarded man-of-the-match, the majority felt that it would, on the occasion, be discriminatory to individualise as the result came about as a result of a full team effort.

Ray Barry in goal gave another exhibition and was coolness personified. He might have been a bit too cool for our liking on one occasion in the first half. Kieran O'Gorman, Owen Dunphy and Mark Sullivan got a pretty rough passage through the first fifteen or twenty minutes, but to their credit they weathered a storm that could have wrecked our chances. They got great support from Sea-

mus Keating, centre half back Pat Fanning and Fergal Hartley, who not only nipped several attacking movements in the bud, but on occasions they took on the role of attacking half-backs.

Tom Fives and Johnny Brenner in the middle of the field brought back memories of the great Grimes and Power partnership in the same position in the fifties. Their contribution to our win was of major importance and one got the feeling that they have even better days ahead.

All our forwards may not have got their names on the scoresheet, but every one of them contributed his share and did everything that was expected of them. Tony Brown played a captain's part and Michael Hubbard made scores (as was clearly seen on television) and was unlucky with a couple of near misses. Anthony Fitzgerald played well both in attack and defence when moved back in the second half. He is a top-class player. Noel Dalton and Sean Daly were our top scorers and who can quantify their contribution to this magnificent win? Kevin McGrath played very well in the inside positions in attack and set up a number of scores. The two Ballygunner men, Paul Flynn and Paul Power worked well when introduced. Very little of the ball came the way of star minor Flynn but all the time while he was on, he posed a threat.

## DESERVED TRIBUTE

I cannot end without paying a very well deserved tribute to the three back-room boys who masterminded the programme which brought us the title. Joey Carton and Peter Power who have worked very hard in the role of trainers/coach and of course Tony Mansfield who has years of experience in the business of

training/coaching was there as counsellor and team advisor. The trio can certainly feel justifiably pleased at a job very well done.

Munster Council Chairman, Tommy Boland presented the trophy to team captain, Tony Brown who made a short but very appropriate acceptance speech and then there was a lap of honour by the team.

It wasn't the first time that Michael Doyle (Tipperary) did a splendid job of refereeing and his handling was praised by both sides again on this occasion. The field was in excellent trim as usual and very many who trod on the sod in celebrations after the game agreed that it must be the best hurling venue in Ireland. A fine programme was on sale and was splendid value for 50p. There could have been a bench provided for the pre-match photographs and it would have been nice to have a band play the National Anthem.

# Minor Hurlers Fully Geared For Replay With Tipperary

## COUNTY HOPEFUL OF ACHIEVING UNIQUE HURLING DOUBLE

### INTERESTING CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES TO BE DECIDED

Needless to mention, the eagerly awaited replay of the provincial decider in minor hurling at Pairc Ui Caoimh on Friday evening overshadows everything else which is scheduled to take place in the county over the coming week-end. After days of savouring the glory of the wonderful victory at Thurles on Wednesday evening, supporters began to do a switch-off over the week-end in order to tune in to the minor game and focus their thoughts on the chances of witnessing a historical achievement at Cork on Friday.

In the aftermath of the drawn game three weeks ago, many people asked if the huge support which we had there, would have been as great if followers did not have the senior hurling Munster final to enjoy as well? I believe that this question was well and truly answered at Thurles on Wednesday when we had massive support for our under 21's and I feel safe in predicting that the support at Cork for the replay will exceed anything which we have experienced for a very long time. In a short three weeks our whole hurling outlook has changed and now we are a county ignited by the prospect of achieving the long overdue breakthrough that will reward us for having survived through years of frustration and disappointments.

Yes, we will have massive support up there on Friday night to give every possible encouragement to the players. Somehow a few people have made Tipperary favourites to win the replay.

I find no logical reason why this should be so. We were every bit as good as them, if not better in the drawn match. We controlled the flow of the game for longer periods than they did and we gave them two lucky goals - scores that might not come their way as easily again.

I do know that in Tipperary, their team are considered to be favourites. I was told by a friend who is involved in the county, that there was almost a panic reaction to their failure to win at the first go. When training resumed for the replay a panel of 40 players were told that all 15 positions were to be filled and were open to any player who proved his worth in the 16 days remaining before the replay. I was advised that when the Tipperary line-out appears in print, it will show changes and switches from the side which didn't win the first day. This could be the effect of a panic reaction and conceivably it could prove their undoing. On the

other hand it might prove to be a trump card for Tipperary. At this stage we just don't know. What we do know is that Tipperary believe that they almost own the minor hurling championship, and perhaps not without good reason. They sure have an almighty record having played in 44 Munster finals and winning 28 of these, as against our 10 appearances and 2 victories. Waterford wasted no time in getting back to very serious training only days after the drawn match and have played a couple of good challenges to keep the panel in tune and to satisfy themselves that players are holding their form. Team captain Barry Browne, Mount Sion was sent off in a minor championship game against Portlaoise and the offence was more serious than that which would merit the minimum suspension. So he is out as is Keith O'Neill of St. Saviours who is injured. When the selectors met to pick their team after training on Saturday, they named Raymond Ryan and Anthony Kirwan as the replacements and did not increase the size of the panel. The decision to keep the team as close to the line-out for the drawn match, was generally expected, so one might say that there are no surprises. With the good quality players on the substitute bench we have a splendid back-up should changes be required in the replay.

THE RESULT?

There is no point in denying that the players were very disappointed at not winning the game at the first go. The logic of this reaction is that they had considered themselves a better team than Tipperary, which they undoubtedly were, so if this disappointment exposes the confidence of the team, then there was no harm in their being feeling

down after the match.

We are not the underdogs in this one. Whatever the record and reputation of Tipperary in this grade at other times, they are not a better side than this present Waterford team and they are being presumptuous in being 'cocky' about the outcome of the replay. At best Tipperary cannot be given more than an equal chance and if we do then we are having less respect for the quality, skill, courage and determination of our side.



I am not unmindful of the role that a bit of luck can play in deciding an issue like this one, and who can deny that after a long time, she is not beginning to smile in our direction.

To take a second Munster hurling under-age title in the same year, would be a unique achievement for the county, and it was never so badly needed. The very best of good luck to all concerned in their efforts to bring this about.

# Senior Hurling Games

At the end of the fifth round of matches due to be played over the weekend, a lot of the sorting out will have been done and most teams in this championship will know where they are going as far as being involved at the finish is concerned. There are six matches fixed.

## MOUNT SION V. ROANMORE

The result of this game will decide Roanmore's fate as far as being involved in the closing stages are concerned. Their win over Dunhill, although not very impressive on Saturday evening last, gave them a temporary lifeline, but they must now beat Mount Sion on next Saturday if they are to remain with a chance of getting a quarter-final place.

The County champions of '89 and '90 had to play two of their early matches without Delahunty and Crowley, but won their next two to give themselves four points from four games, while Mount Sion have six from three games, — all of which were won very impressively.

With Brian Greene, Ger Fitzpatrick, Shane Ahearn, Pdraigh Fanning, Tony Browne, John Meaney, Peter Walsh and company in sparkling form at the moment, Mount Sion must be strongly fancied to stop their old rivals from getting any further.

## PASSAGE V. PORTLAW

Both are fighting for their lives in this one as the losers will be in serious trouble trying to get back into contention in a group where five of the teams are in with a chance. The result of this will reduce it to four. Passage seem to be the team with the best chance here, they having the three Cullinane brothers along with county under-21 players Ray Barry and Anthony and Paul Fitzgerald, James Connors, Seamus Keating, etc.

Portlaw are doing better than they did last year and a chance of getting to the knockout stages will motivate them into putting in a great effort here.

## ST. SAVIOURS V. DE LA SALLE

A win for De La Salle would keep their hopes alive as they have been beaten only once so far. Having played just one other match, which they won, they are behind all others and have a number of important matches left.

Saviours, who are last year's intermediate champions, are not enjoying the best of luck in their first run in the senior championship and have but one point from five matches. They are out of the running and can now concentrate on football which is their first love. A win for De La Salle is very likely here.

## BALLYDUFF V. FOURMILEWATER

With four points and three points respectively on the table after four matches each, both have everything to fight for here. This game could well decide the final placings in the group, unless there is an unexpected surprise around the corner. Both are taking the match very seriously and each team is confident of winning.

There is very little between them, the result can go either way, but I know that a defeat would be a shocking disappointment for Ballyduff. The fact that Fourmilewater are undoubtedly an improving side was proved when they beat Tallow by 0-15 to 2-7 in the first round. Tallow then beat Ballyduff. Things have changed since then and Ballyduff have organised themselves better and will be slight favourites to win this one, but it is not an open and shut case by any means.

## LISMORE V. DUNGARVAN

Supporters should check before travelling to see this very attractive clash at Cappoquin as there is a possibility that the date may change to facilitate Sean Daly who

will be on duty with the Shinty team in Scotland.

For both teams it will be their most important match of the championship so far. Lismore are the reigning county champions and played splendid hurling against Ballygunner (it was a draw) in the first round, but were not very impressive when losing to Passage, or when they beat Saviours.

They will need to be at their best to beat an improving Dungarvan who are slightly ahead of them with four points from three matches so far.

Big things are expected of Dungarvan this year if they are to reap the benefits of former county coach, Joe McGrath. They will have a real "go" at winning this one as a victory over the champions would do wonders for their morale and prestige. In fact if they win and it is certainly possible, they will be short-listed for the hurling and football double. The sides have not met in the championship since '89 when Lismore won on an 0-15 to 1-5 scoreline.

On the balance of things, Lismore must be named favourites for this one and given the vote to win.

## TALLOW V. DUNHILL

A win for Tallow will guarantee them a place in the quarter-finals and unless the struggling Dunhill produce a shock, the Western side will come through here. Tallow played their best hurling this year when scoring a goal win over Roanmore and a reproduction of this form should be enough to see them safely through. Dunhill have only a single point from four games so far.

## INTERMEDIATE HURLING GAMES

The Stradbally/Erin's Own clash in intermediate hurling at Dunhill on Sunday is vital for both sides. If Erin's Own win they will be back in contention and it will leave Stradbally and Ring needing to beat Colligan to have the group opened up again.

On present form, Stradbally might win over the weekend. We must adopt a "wait and see" policy before getting too much involved in further predictions.

## COLLIGAN V. RING

Whatever the outcome of this game, Ring are gone out of contention. Their glut of injuries put paid to their hopes of a hurling and football double, but the football leg is still a big prospect. Colligan will go all-out to

make sure of beating Ring as a defeat would put enormous pressure on them when they play Stradbally in their final game.

## JUNIOR HURLING

Four matches are listed, but because of the withdrawal of Geraldines only three will be played. This is the fifth round and I fear that the results will spell the end of the road for at least a couple of the teams involved.

## BALLYSGAGGART V. MODELIGO

There is no reason for supposing that Ballysaggart's unbeaten run will be halted by Modeligo who are now propping up the table after the withdrawal of the Gers. Ballysaggart look reasonably certain to qualify, but

at this stage a slip by any of the leading four or five teams could cause havoc with their prospects.

## KILGOBINET V. KILROSSANTY

With only a single point separating the teams in the league table after four rounds, this game will be vital to both and the attractive contest should provide us with one of the best games of this championship.

Kilrossanty have certainly come a long way since the days when they threw in their lot with Kilgobinet in hurling. Two years ago, when they were struggling in the 'B' grade, it was unthinkable that they would, in a short space of time, become strong contenders for the 'A' title.

Kilgobinet, who led up to the final minute against

Clashmore, had been unbeaten up to that stage and that shock will make them realise that they cannot afford to take chances again. The expectations are that both clubs will qualify, but they will have to make sure by winning here.

Kilgobinet are my choice to win, but I would not wager a lot on the outcome.

## ARDMORE V. BALLINAMEELA

I don't know what kind of a miracle it would take to bring either side back into having an outside chance of qualifying for the championship, but whatever slender hope Ardmore might have, Ballinameela are gone. Ardmore are not doing as well as was earlier expected and could suffer another defeat here.

# Councillors React To "Leader" Photos

Cllr. # Plan To Sell Quay Car Park For £225,000 Approved

by 6 votes to 2. The matter came before the meeting by way of a report by the County Manager which opened by referring to ongoing discussions which he was having with Mr. Carroll concerning proposals for pay parking at the Davitt's Quay Car Park on a £5,000 a year leasing arrangement.

The report then went on: "A very interesting development has happened in recent times also. The L&N Company have now completed their development in Dungarvan (Davitt's Quay) and to protect this investment it is absolutely necessary for them to have paid-parking on a long-term basis adjacent to their premises. With this in mind, they approached me with a view to buying the car park and leasing it back to the Council at a nominal rent on a long term lease with a view to protecting the interests mentioned. I have had discussions with the Company and I have agreed, subject to the Council's approval, that we would sell the car park in Davitt's Quay for £225,000 and lease back immediately for £1,000 p.a. on a 35 year lease . . ."

In addition to the price the proposal also to include the right to sub-lease the car park; that the Council proceed to having paid parking there licensed to Mr. Michael Carroll for a period of two years and nine months subject to six monthly reviews of its operation and that the rights of way to the three garages there be protected and that the designated area for casual trading remain.

Speaking in support of his report, Mr. Hurley explained that the L&N wished to protect their interest by ensuring that no competitor could build in Davitt's Quay. He said that the impact of the plan on the urban finances would be enormous and it would help to eliminate a lot of the costs on the capital account. "Seldom does such an offer arise where a local authority is concerned, it is an unique situation and I strongly recommend that the council accept it," the Co. Manager stated.

### A LITTLE APPREHENSIVE

Cllr. Austin Hallahan said that he would be a little apprehensive at selling as in a few years a similar situation could arise with a similar development proposed for Main Street leading on to the Scanlan's Yard car park. "If the same procedure were to be followed in that case, the Council would then have very little control over the town centre," said Cllr. Hallahan, who added that as possession was nine points of the law, the proposal now before them would give a decided advantage to the L&N concern. He asked what was to happen in regard to pay parking at Scanlan's Yard.

Mr. Hurley replied that his idea was to have pay parking introduced simultaneously in both car parks.

Cllr. B. Kyne said he would like to know what bills would be paid with the money involved and he asked would the L&N get sole ownership after 35 years, suggesting that he thought the lease back to the Council should be in perpetuity.

Mr. Hurley said that lease extensions were normally granted but Cllr. Kyne's suggestion could be written into the contract and he didn't think there would be any difficulty about that as the overall proposal was to copper-fasten the idea that the Davitt's Quay area would always be used as a car park.

Cllr. D. Goode asked "are we being true to tradition about this? I don't like giving any of the Council property away!"

Mr. Hurley assured him "you are not giving anything away and this is an enormous opportunity for the Council to offset the drain on the Council's finances."

Cllr. M. O'Riordan felt the proposal was too good to be true and asked "why should the L&N pay us £225,000 for the property and then lease it back to us for £1,000 per annum and we then sub-lease it to a man for £5,000 who will make much more money there?"

Mr. Hurley said that the L&N did not want free car

parking there as this was interfering with their business.

### SELLING THE FAMILY SILVER

Cllr. Tony Wright thought the Council should not make a rash decision in the matter. "I don't know what's behind the L&N thinking in this but for us it means selling the family silver," he said, adding that he would not oppose the sale and lease arrangement but he would be against the proposal to sub-lease. "I don't see what rush we should be in to let a third party make money on our car parks and I think it would be a vote of no confidence in the Council to give them away to someone else," he said.

Mr. Hurley then said the

proposal to sub-lease the car park could be dropped and discussed at a later date and this was agreed.


Cllr. Kyne then proposed and Cllr. R. Walsh seconded that the Council approve the Manager's recommendation to sell the car park to the L&N for £225,000 on condition that it be leased back to the Council at £1,000 per year for 35 years or in perpetuity.

Cllr. Hallahan proposed an amendment that the proposal be deferred to allow time to consider the matter further and to have it discussed with other organisations in the town. This was seconded by Cllr. O'Riordan.

On a vote the proposal was carried by 6 votes (Cllr. Kyne, Walsh, Ryan, Goode, Wright, Dixon) to 2 for the amendment (Cllrs. Hallahan and O'Riordan).
