## Co. Manager Praises Courage Of Elected Public Representatives

There were too many unelected minorities around telling them how to do their job said Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager when he performed the official opening of a special exhibition of the "Minutes and Records of Dungarvan Town Commissioners/Urban District Council, 1855-1950" at Dungarvan Museum on last Monday night.

The exhibition mounted by Museum members, Jack English and William Fraher and compiled by the latter from records made available by Town Clerk Mr. Bertie White which were located at the Town Hall, provides details of meetings of the local authority in Dungarvan going back to the first meeting of Town Commissioners held at the Courthouse in January 1855.

Mr. Matt Connolly, President Museum Society in the course of his address informed the attendance that the Society had been short-

listed for a Gulbenkian Award under a scheme sponsored by the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation to recognise outstanding achievement and encourage improvement in Ireland's Museums and Galleries. The awards would be presented by President Robinson at a reception in Dublin Castle on September 30 to which Dungarvan Museum representatives had been invited, he said.

Mr. Fraher spoke at length on the compilation of the records and read details from the minutes of various meetings held over the close

on a century and half period covered by the exhibition.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan, Chairwoman Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. Billy Kyne, Chairman Waterford County Council and Mr. B. White, Town Clerk, also spoke.

In declaring the exhibition open, the Co. Manager, Mr. Hurley referred to the marvellous work done by the Museum in the 10 years since it was founded. He said that the message which should go out to the people

## To Compete For Ireland At Barcelona Paralympic Games

A young man with strong family connections with Abbeyside, Dungarvan will be member of the team to represent Ireland in the Paralympic Games which will take place in Barcelona from September 3 to September 14. He is David Fraughen (22) son of Mr.

and Mrs. Tom Fraughen, Chanel Road, Artane, Dublin. His mother is the former Joan Clancy and his grandmother is Mrs. Annie Clancy, Home Rule Street, Abbeyside who, now at the grand age of 92 years, must be one of the oldest if not the oldest resident in the Vil-

lage.

David who suffers from cerebral palsy in the CP8 grade Irish record holder over distances from 100 to 400 metres and will be competing in similar events in Barcelona. Although not born in Abbeyside, David's dad, Tom told us that his heart has always been in Abbeyside.

The Paralympic Games was first held in 1960 and has been held every four years since, whenever possible in the same country and location as the Olympic Games. Irish teams have participated since the Games began.

This year the Paralympics has been designated a division of the Olympic Games and coverage of the games will be broadcast on R.T.E. Radio 1. A special programme featuring all members of the Irish team together with their coaches, escorts and supporters who are travelling to Barcelona will be broadcast in a "Sports Around 7 Special" from R.T.E. Radio 1 at 7 p.m. on Friday, August 21.

David Fraughen has already made his mark in international competition as he competed in the last Paralympics held in Seoul in 1988 after the Olympics of that year and qualified for the finals in the 200, 400 and 800 metres while he was a member of the bronze winning 4 x 100 metres

relay team.

The members of the Irish team will leave for Barcelona on Thursday, August 27 and while David already is the proud processor of a bronze medal as a member of the Irish relay team in 1988 we wish him every success and hope that we will have the pleasure of recording further successes for him on his return from Barcelona.

## Successful Launch In Bushy Park Of Dungarvan Multiple Sclerosis Sponsored Cycle



On Sunday morning, July 19 we launched, in Bushy Park, what we hope will be a very successful sponsored cycle. Our last sponsored cycle in 1989 was run by the Brickey Rangers G.A.A. Club and was a tremendous success and we have no reason to think this will be any different. We have 16 cyclist going to Dublin on September 19 leaving the Square in Dungarvan on Saturday morning and hopefully arriving in Dublin on the same evening.

The cyclists, as you can see from the picture above, are from a wide area of Waterford County, starting in the Brickey Valley and stretching far and wide taking in East and West Waterford. These cyclists are giving a great commitment to our Branch in terms of time and hopefully financial reward, and we know that you the public of County Waterford will not be found wanting when you are approached for sponsorship. Sponsorship cards are now in circulation, among the cyclists and branch committee members and we will keep you up to date on how the sponsorship is going. The monies that will be generated from this cycle will go 100% towards the continuation and improving of services and facilities for our M.S. members.

In the next few lines I will give you a brief run down on the branch and its activities:

We are now one of the most active and strongest branches in Ireland. We send 2 to 3 people to Lourdes each year, we also try and send as many of our members as possible to the M.S. Care Centre in Dublin, which provides physiotherapy, counselling and most of the modern techniques of caring for the M.S. person along with providing a holiday as well. We are also big in our attendance and input into the Trabolgan Weekend, which provides workshops for the M.S. person and their family and also

has yoga and reflexology. We have a mobile home in Clonea, which is available to all branches of M.S. in Ireland. This type of facility was pioneered by our branch and has become an overwhelming success. One committee member commits, him/herself for 1 week of the summer to the care of the mobile home. We also provide water therapy for our members on a weekly basis, we have Carriglea to thank for this facility. During the summer we also arrange day trips and weekends away for our members. We also have a few social nights out, the big one being our Christmas Social which attracted 200 people last year. Allied to this we have a case committee which looks after any social or financial need of any member, this committee is sworn to secrecy and confidentiality.

There is one area in which the branch is deficient, and that area is that of a Community Worker. We hope to bridge that gap somewhat in September. We fully realise in this branch the trauma and upset and doubt of the newly diagnosed M.S. person and we realise that the person may not want, or feel able to, join our branch, but we would hope that you would contact one of these two phone numbers (058) 44063 or (024) 96193 and we will put you in touch with someone who could help and talk to you, without you being involved in the branch, if that is what you wish. Of course we will always welcome new member as that was one of the main reasons we were formed. To put it in a nutshell, if you suffer from M.S. there is no need to suffer alone, there is help out there, all it takes is one phone call.

# Melleray Grotto Celebrates 7th Anniversary

Melleray Grotto celebrates its 7th Anniversary on Sunday, August 16 with a 9-day Novena of prayer and thanksgiving. It is a milestone in the history of this little shrine. When it all started 7 years ago, many wise men predicted it would be a nine day wonder. The daily apparitions of Our Lady to chosen souls drew thousands of people who created huge traffic jams. Many were unable to get near the grotto. Many never heard the message of Our Lady, or got a garbled version from the news media.

The leaflet containing the full message, now available free of charge at the grotto, was not yet printed. Bill Deevy's book: "Mary Speaks at Melleray Grotto: Are You Listening," was not available to counterbalance the mockery of Press comments. The big crowds disappeared, convinced it was just another hoax, a collective hallucination. In fact a phrase was coined that was supposed to bury Melleray and the many apparition sites. The year 1985 was declared to be "The Year of the Moving Statues."

But Melleray Grotto refused to die, and many of the other centres are also alive and well. On Wednesday, July 29, a priest from England stopped at Melleray Grotto when he saw all the cars there. The question he asked spoke volumes: "Is that thing still going here?" "Better than ever," was the answer he got. He had only to look around. There were cars and people there from Belfast, Lurgan, Australia, etc. and a bus load of Americans led by a Cleveland priest. Last year several coachloads of pilgrims came from America and more are expected this year.

Why do they come? Is it due to advertising? Is it due to the energetic committee? The simplest answer could be it is all due to Our Lady. She did appear here for one glorious week in Irish history, and she continues to give special graces here to prove this point. The very dedicated Committee set up at Our Lady's request ("I want ye to spread my message"), does its best to service the grotto and send thousands of leaflets all over the world. But its lowly best could never account for the many

thousands that come to the grotto every year.

Innumerable are the many stories of personal visions and experiences at this grotto. If connected with a message or healing, they are more credible. We are more impressed by reports of spiritual healing. Last month one organiser reported many returns to the Sacraments after years away. "Adding up the years absent from Confession in my bus, I reached a total of 54 years." Tears of joy are often reported in these conversion stories.

On any Saturday Vigil night (and vigils occur practically every Saturday night, winter or summer), it is a religious experience in itself, to witness the weary pilgrims pour out of the many buses from all parts of Ireland, as they hurry to

visit this marvellous shrine of Our Lady at the foot of Melleray Hill. Cappoquin and Clogheen must see them passing through, but the rest of Ireland would be unaware of this regular demonstration of faith.

Make a date with fate. Come to this 7th Anniversary Novena from August 16-24 (afternoon and night) and discover Mary's Hidden Ireland. — An tAthair Pádraig Ó h-Ailigheanáin.

There will be a special "Theme For Prayer" as follows throughout the week: August 16 — Peace and Prayer; August 17 — Youth of the World; August 18 — Conversion of Sinners; August 19 — Justice in the World; August 20 — Vocations to the Religious Life; August 21 — The Sick and the Suffering; August 22 — The Holy Souls; August 23 — Preserve Sunday Prayers; August 24 — Thanksgiving.

### Abbeyside Man Leads Victory Ole's For Irish Boxers

As the Irish boxers Michael Carruth from Dublin and Wayne McCullough from Belfast were writing themselves into Olympic history by winning gold and silver medals for Ireland they were cheered to the echo by an over-the-moon group of Irish supporters who had gathered for the boxing finals in the Pavello Club Juventut in Barcelona last Saturday morning.

As the inter-round counts came up in the Carruth-Her-

nandez welterweight bout and showed the Irishman to be more than holding his own, he received great support from the loyal Irish fans who kept up a chant of "Ireland, Ireland, Ireland" and as the referee raised Michael Carruth's hand in final victory the cheering Irish broke into the victory chant of "Ole-Ole-Ole" so reminiscent of "Italia 90" and the European Soccer Cup Championship.

And it was a man from Abbeyside who was in the front centre as the tv cameras zoomed into the group who led the victory chant on his bodhran. He was Jerome Kiely who has been working in Barcelona for the last four months but who took time off to be part of these great Olympic victories for Ireland. Jerome, now 28, has already become a


world-wide traveller having been in such countries as Thailand, Australia and Russia.

Son of Mrs. Jenny Kiely and the late Maurice Kiely, "Sweetbriar," New Line, Abbeyside, Jerome went to Barcelona about four months ago where he is engaged in the civil engineering end of the building of a super hotel for which the Clonmel based firm of M. F. Kent & Co. Ltd. are the contractors.

Indeed for him it was a case of being in the right place at the right time as with those other Irish fans who were privileged to be there to see Michael Carruth and Wayne McCullough win their gold and silver he will have a memory which he can recall and speak about with pride and joy forever.

### Our Locality — The Bridge and the Causeway

The first reference we have concerning the building of a bridge between Abbeyside and Dungarvan is a letter by Sir John Newport of Waterford to the 5th Duke of Devonshire in October 1808. In the letter he urges the Duke to build a bridge to prevent J. C. Beresford from turning it into a political issue.

"The electors and inhabitants of that borough have been for some time given to understand that it was not only his Grace's intention to lay out a considerable sum of money in building houses there but also and more particularly to alleviate the difficulties they experience from the ferry by erecting a bridge near the river — this your lordship will excuse me for saying has been too long delayed; in consequence of the jealousy conceived on that head by Mr. J. C. Beresford apprehending he might turn the popular discontent to good account in promoting the interest of his family in that borough. At the last assizes for the County of Waterford he sent in to the Grand Jury a presentment for building the bridge at the charge of the county, which may be done under an Act of Parliament of this Kingdom everywhere there is an established church."



# PENSMAN Takes You . . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

## North And South Combine To Make It A Gold and Silver Olympics For Ireland

What a wonderful boost it was for Ireland to see the national flag hoisted aloft and the Irish National Anthem played in an Olympics arena on Saturday last for the first time in thirty-six years as one of our boxers stood on the rostrum to receive the coveted gold medal which he so gallantly won and richly deserved.

Barcelona '92 has now become part of history but the victories of young Michael Carruth from Dublin and of young Wayne McCullough from Belfast will be recalled with pride forever. And what a wonderful lift for Irish people everywhere both at home and abroad as

they saw the North and South of our country combine to make the Olympics of 1992 in Barcelona an occasion of gold and silver for Ireland.

And while we cannot praise our boxers too highly for their courage and expertise, we cannot be unmindful either of the marvellous manner in which those Irish supporters privileged to be in Barcelona to see these historic victories behaved themselves. They surely lived up to the great name which the Irish soccer fans who followed Jack Charlton and the Ireland team during the World Cup series won for themselves in 1990

as the greatest and most sporting in the world.

Even the BBC in their coverage of the occasion took their hats off to the Irish when Desmond Lynam their principal anchor man remarked that seldom if ever had such scenes of jubilation been witnessed as those seen in the boxing arena as Dublin man Carruth had his hand lifted in victory after his great win over world champion, Cuban Juan Hernandez, in a hard fought final and the Irish supporters there gave vent to their feelings.

For people who never before displayed any interest

in boxing, the names of Michael Carruth and Wayne McCullough have already become household names. They are, and rightly so, the heroes of the hour. We are compiling this column on Monday evening, several hours before the flight bringing our Olympic team members, officials and supporters is due to touch down at Dublin Airport with an ETA some time after midnight.

Their homecoming is bound to be a fantastic event as will also the civic reception to be accorded them on Tuesday by the Mayor of Dublin when the people will be afforded an

opportunity to acclaim the man from Dublin and the man from Belfast.

P.S. — Before concluding, we feel that where the matter of congratulations and plaudits are concerned in

regard to Barcelona '92 and the Olympic events over the entire fortnight, the coverage of RTE tv deserves bouquets for one of their best jobs ever for a major sporting occasion.

## Drastic Slump In Tourism Season

Hoteliers and guesthouse owners throughout the country and more particularly in the west and south-west of Ireland have reported a dramatic fall-off in tourist numbers so far this year due, it is claimed, to one of the worst tourism slumps since 1970.

But last week Bórd Fáilte strongly rejected these claims and blamed the apparent downturn for individual businesses on the huge expansion of the industry in recent years. A

spokesman for BF pointed out that Ireland was on course to attract 3.1 million tourists this year which would equal the number for 1990 — one of the most successful years for the industry but he said it was now a question of more people chasing the same sized cake.

Bórd Fáilte also noted that according to figures released by the Central Statistics Office, the official number of non-residents visiting Ireland between

April and June was 4 p.c. greater than the number for the same period last year. However those involved in tourism will find little comfort in these official figures nor indeed in the fact that Ireland is not unique where this slump in tourism is concerned as the UK and other European countries are showing similar, if not worse, returns.

Without doubt there has been a rapid growth in the number of guesthouses and B&B's in all areas and many

of these have invested heavily in improvements in anticipation of a growth in the industry. Now that this growth has not materialised many are facing considerable losses with little or no hope of a recovery before the season ends.

Perhaps more attention should have been paid to the warning sounded by the Taoiseach Albert Reynolds when, during a visit to Co. Kerry last month, he warned tourism bosses there to "get your marketing strategies right."

While we do have some of the finest scenery in the world in Ireland we must begin to realise that this, no longer, is enough to attract visitors. We must offer other attractions, especially for the younger tourists and above all we must keep prices right. Those involved in the industry must already know that if they are to survive they must maintain their tariffs at reasonable and competitive levels and those entering the industry for the first time must accept that it is not a get rich quick business.

Some consolation concerning the small numbers coming in from North America may be found in the fact that in a Presidential election year, Americans normally do not travel so perhaps next year will see an improvement from this source. It is also hoped that by then the recession in the UK and Europe will be over. In the meantime let us, as the Taoiseach has warned, get our marketing strategies right.

## Recalling Times When The Century Was Young

Our articles about the late Dr. Michael Moloney who lived at Youghal Road, Dungarvan, in the early days of the present century has prompted Mrs. Anne Keane who now resides at 20 State Road, Revere, Massachusetts, USA to write a letter to a family friend, Nicholas Graves, of Seaview, Ring, recalling those times of the early 1900's as she remembers them.

In her letter, Mrs. Keane relates how, as young Anne Shanahan from Helvick, she worked at the residence of Dr. and Mrs. Moloney. The doctor, she describes as a very nice looking man while she recalls Mrs. Moloney as a very beautiful woman with long brown hair, commenting that the photograph we published "didn't do her justice."

Having described the Moloney menage at length, Mrs. Keane then goes on to recall other aspects of those early years in Dungarvan. She tells of a Mrs. Dunlea who had a big bakery at the Square and who owned the houses now known as Western Terrace. She recalls a fair day in Dungarvan in 1916 "around the time of the 1916 Rebellion in

Dublin" and describes how there were green, white and yellow ribbons everywhere and on the doors of many houses.

Her letter then says that the Moloney family in Dungarvan were very rich at one time, owning several ships that traded with other countries and a few of which sank (for unstated reasons) with the loss of all hands. She then refers to a Capt. Dorsey who lived at Boreenatra and who "left us on the Catherine Ellen when she came to Ballinagoul quay with a load of coal." The "Catherine Ellen" was a schooner and one of the best known sailing vessels trading out of Dungarvan in those days of sail. Mrs. Keane recalls that the coal brought in this way to Ballinagoul was sold by a

Maurice Ryan to the local residents.

This Maurice Ryan had, she says, a large shed where the coal was stored while his sister Mary kept many bees up in Killinoreing and sent the honey in for sale in the town.

Mrs. Keane also mentions Eddie Delany who in her young days at home in the Gaeltacht taught in Ring school and also his brother Paddy who taught in the school in Old Parish.

We feel sure that there are not many still surviving who can remember with such clarity those times to which Mrs. Keane refers in her letters and which she describes in much detail in a letter of six closely written pages in clear legible handwriting.



Hoteliers and guesthouse owners throughout the country and more particularly in the west and southwest of Ireland have reported a dramatic fall-off in tourist numbers so far this year due, it is claimed, to one of the worst tourism slumps since 1970.

But last week Bórd Fáilte strongly rejected these claims and blamed the apparent downturn for individual businesses on the huge expansion of the industry in recent years. A

spokesman for BF pointed out that Ireland was on course to attract 3.1 million tourists this year which would equal the number for 1990 — one of the most successful years for the industry but he said it was now a question of more people chasing the same sized cake.

## "ASYA & CHRISTINA" RECALLS OLD CAPPOQUIN

Tom McCarthy a native to the locality has written a second novel, a fact which we mentioned briefly a couple of weeks ago. The story is set in Cappoquin, the period being the summer of 1943. Though a work of fiction, Tom has mixed in the names of real people most of whom sadly are no longer with us. Well-known characters such as Mick Sargent, Ned Lonergan, Tom Lincoln, Jack Kelleher (Station Master at that time) and Sir John Keane are mentioned several times. There is also a good description of the local streets and of the Railway Station. Boat races are also referred to as well as the soldiers who were stationed here at that time.

Apart from the main plot he gives a good insight into what life was like during the Emergency with food rationing and controlled prices which apparently were more honoured in the breach.

The story itself deals with a T.D. and his family and the late P. J. Little and we are shown that, in fact, he was a man of many interests including poetry. Senator Sean Goulding figures prominently throughout the book. One chapter deals with an interview which the hero had with Mr. De Valera himself. In this we see Tom McCarthy at his best as he sets out to demonstrate the futility of going unprepared to debate an issue with men of Dev's calibre.

Even though the main character — Mr. Glenville — is obviously fictional we feel that Tom drew his in-

spiration from events which actually took place though not necessarily in 1943, the reader will have to judge this for himself. The reader will also have to judge the books merits, as this writer would not feel competent to do so. It should, of course, be of

great interest to Cappoquin readers, most of whom will remember the people mentioned. They will also find one or two points in relation to those people which are not strictly accurate but it would spoil the pleasure of the reader if we were to say anymore.

We would like to thank the Editor of this paper for letting us have the book to read and we would wish Thomas McCarthy the best of luck with his venture.

## Plan Next Year's Lawn Now

August is a warm month so it's just as well that gardeners can be a little easy on themselves and sneak time on the sun lounger.

However, there are one or two priority jobs and particularly if you intend to create a new lawn this year.

If the ground was overgrown or uneven then you need to have it broken up and raked into a crumbling texture by now, ready to sow later this month.

As you rake, mix in fine and well-rotted garden compost to give the seeds a good and healthy start.

At sowing time, spread the seeds to the density recommended for the particular mixture — choose a ryegrass blend for a lawn likely to be roughed up by small feet and paws, or a fescues and bents mix for a showcase lawn.


Whatever the mix though, you should then rake a light coating of soil over the sown seeds and then keep birds away by hanging foil or plastic strips in the wind, and/or covering the whole area with netting.

Unfortunately, cats like to scuff up a newly-raked area so make it awkward for them too by laying a few thin strips of wood across any exposed areas.

You will find that they won't want to pick their way across or around these, so they will leave your lawn to grow in peace.

But remember to keep up with watering during hot weather — a good sprinkling at the end of the day is best to ensure that the moisture has maximum effect.

The other job which may require a little digging and raking is to prepare for



planting winter brassicas such as sprouts, sprouting broccoli and cabbage. If you have any summer bulbs, corns and so on for plants such as begonias, hippeastrum and lilies then these will also need lifting soon and the ground prepared for

spring bulbs.

But by and large, August is an easy month — relax and enjoy it and just pick off the few chores that need to be done on your travels to and from the deck chair:

- *dead heading, and especially chrysanthemums and dahlias, to ensure that the supply of blooms keeps on coming.*
- *Keeping up watering — hosepipe bans or not.*
- *picking peas and beans while still young and tasty*
- *noting any shrubs which will need moving in the autumn*
- *a final clipping for hedges before the autumn*
- *sowing the last lettuce and radish crops for this year.*
- *plait and hang onions — a practical and attractive way to look after your harvest.*
- *take and pot up plenty of geranium cuttings for next year — a great money saver — but be careful not to overwater and cause rot in the hot August conditions.*


## Cappoquin Author Survives Computer Disaster In Latest Novel

ASYA and CHRISTINE by Thomas McCarthy; paperback original published by Poolbeg Press; price £5.99.

It is the summer of 1943. The world is at war, but at home in Cappoquin, Deputy Glenville serves his constituents and prepares for an election campaign. It is also a crucial year in the lives of his wife and children: the imminent execution of an IRA man threatens to open old wounds and expose a well kept secret from the Deputy's past. Relationships between his daughter Christine and a young Army lieutenant and between Asya, the Jewish girl entrusted to his care and his son Bobby, all have the potential to alter the Glenville household irrevocably.

Thomas McCarthy's lyrical and poetic recreation of a lost summer in Irish politics, his "informed but lucid" skill of storytelling, unites the worlds of love and politics.

Thomas McCarthy was born in 1954 and reared in Cappoquin. He was educated locally and at University

College, Cork, where he helped found the poetry workshop. He is one of the most respected and widely reviewed of the new generation of Southern Irish poets, with several notable collections of poetry to his credit, among them *The First Convention* which received the Patrick Kavanagh award in 1977. In 1978/79 McCarthy was a member of the Inter-

national Writing Programme at the University of Iowa. *The Sorrow Garden* was joint winner of the Poetry Society's Alice Hunt-Bartlett Award for 1981. In 1984 McCarthy received the literary award of the American-Irish Foundation. In 1991 his first novel *Without Power* was published to critical acclaim by Poolbeg Press. He lives in Cork where he is a librarian with Cork Corporation. He is married to short story writer Catherine Coakley and they have two children, Kate and Neil. His two favourite hobbies are cooking and gossiping.

He feels lucky to have survived the writing of this novel without a nervous breakdown because at Christmas one of his children pressed a button on his computer that wiped out 20,000 words — about six months work.

forward to.



## Different Way To Do A Leg



### Ingredients:

1.5kg/3 1/2 lb leg of Lamb  
2 x 376g cans red wine sauce  
1 onion, finely chopped  
1 clove garlic, crushed  
350g/12oz carrot, cut into sticks  
1 tbsp fresh chopped parsley  
salt and ground black pepper  
100g/4oz mushrooms,  
sliced Sprigs of fresh  
rosemary to garnish


### Method

Preheat the oven to 220°C, 450°F, Gas 7. Place the lamb in a deep casserole dish and bake for 30 minutes, until sealed.

Reduce oven temperature to 180°C, 350°F, Gas 4. Remove joint from the oven and pour over the wine sauce, onion, garlic, carrots, parsley and sea-

soning. Cover and return to the oven; cook for 45 minutes.

Add the mushrooms to the casserole and cook for a further 30 minutes. Remove the casserole from the oven and transfer the leg of lamb to a warmed serving plate. Spoon over the sauce and pour any excess into a serving jug. Garnish with fresh rosemary.



## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I am a single mother and I want to have my daughter aged 5 included on my Passport. Do I need her father's consent for this?

Answer — If the father has not been appointed a joint guardian by the Court, then his consent is not required. In this event as the mother is the sole guardian, she must swear an affidavit stating that she is the sole guardian.

If the father's name is entered on the Birth Register, then he can sign the Passport application Form M and in this case the mother does not have to swear the affidavit stating that she is the sole guardian.

Where a single mother is applying for a Passport it is important to state that she is not married to the child's father. This will avoid the Passport Office mistakenly requesting the father's consent where it is not required.

The affidavit form is available from the Passport office.





**UNDER AGE BREAK-THROUGH**

A Chara,

Just a few months ago, my good friend, Séamus Fitzgerald, told me that he expected Waterford to win a Munster hurling title at under-age level within the next five years. This, he said, was because of the great coaching work which was being done among the youth of the county. However, I don't think that Séamus expected that his prediction would be borne out twice over within such a short space of time!

So, in congratulating both the players and the management teams associated with our two wonderful victories, we should also acknowledge the contribution of the Bórd na nÓg officials, the professional coaches, and all those operating at club level whose steadfast work in recent years laid the foundation for the eventual breakthrough.

It is worth noting that similar work is currently going on throughout Northern Ireland, and is generously funded by the authorities who are anxious to keep as many youngsters as possible "out of mischief." It is not surprising, therefore, that we have seen a marked recent improvement in hurling standards in the North, as shown in Antrim's excellent performances in hurling semi-finals and in the emergence of Down and Derry (the latter so far only at under-age level) as hurling forces. Antrim, who ruled the roost unchallenged in Ulster for so long, are finding that they are having to pull up their socks to meet the new challenge.

It is therefore worth sounding a warning to those Waterford folk who may assume, because we are meeting Northern oppo-

sition in both semi-finals, that the way is clear for two All-Ireland final appearances. In particular, because hurling followers have had so many matches to go already, they may be inclined to save themselves on this occasion for the "big one." The great vocal support which our minors and under-21s have been getting has been a big factor in their success. It will be needed again for the games, a long way from home, against Antrim.

For a change, I myself will not have to travel too far for these games. I look forward to having a lot of company in Dublin on August 16 and 22.

# No Joy For John Treacy In Olympic Marathon

John Treacy collapsed and was stretchered away within a few minutes of finishing well behind the leaders in 51st place at the end of the Olympic marathon last Sunday night.

"I just felt myself going and I was glad to see help arriving," said Treacy after he emerged from the recovery room about 45 minutes later.

"It was an unbelievable struggle over the last few miles but I have never felt like this before at the end of a marathon."

Treacy finished more than 10 minutes behind the gal-

lant winner, Yong-Cho Hwang, a 22-year-old Korean, who finally broke the resistance of Japan's Koichi Morishita at the concluding stages of the hill into the Olympic Stadium to win in 2:13:23.

These two virtual unknowns were followed over the line by yet another unfancied runner, Stephan Freigang of Germany, after one favourite after another fell by the wayside and the athletes from Africa were decimated.

Andy Ronan, the number two Irish hope, dropped out after 19 miles with a very

severe pain in the groin which puzzled him totally. He was sitting on the side of the road when Treacy passed him. Tommy Hughes, the third Irish challenger, finished 72nd in 2:32:55.

Treacy was totally baffled by his poor performance, even allowing for the fact that he was nursing a slight hamstring injury.

He was dropped at the first water station after only 5k and said: "I just can't explain what happened. It was probably my worst marathon ever but I was never going well but it was just pride which kept me going."

"I thought about dropping out but I wanted to finish. It was such an awful feeling to find myself struggling so early. All year long I've not had an ache or pain but then I slightly damaged my hamstring in the States a few weeks ago.

"I had physiotherapy for it and was not all that concerned but it was still on my mind. But that is no excuse for running 2:24, I could do that in training with no trouble."

**GALLANT SONIA**

The only member of the Irish athletics team to display real class in Barcelona was Sonia O'Sullivan. The 22-year-old Cobh girl qualified in style in her opening heat of the 3,000 metres and was edged out of a bronze medal in the final only in the last stride of the race. This was a great pity as she really showed top-class form among the world's best and most experienced 3,000 metre runners. Sonia again showed her wonderful potential when she ran in the 1,500m. event but failed to qualify after being impeded coming round the last bend. No doubt she will be Ireland's greatest prospect for gold at the next Olympics which will be held in Atlanta, USA in 1996.

# OLYMPIC DIARY

## — Barcelona '92

SUNDAY, AUGUST 2 (DAY 9)

Sonia O'Sullivan from Cobh became the indoor world record holder for the women's 5000m in January 1991; in July she won gold in the World Student Games

1500m; and on day 9 of the Olympics, Ireland's hopes were pinned on her. With 50m left in the 3000m final and with Yvonne Murray beaten, Sonia was in the lead with the finishing line in sight. But Elena Romanona and Tatyana Dorovskikh attacked and passed her.

As the two EUN athletes battled for the gold, Canada's Angela Chalmers out-paced Sonia and the 22-year-old Cobh girl had to be content with fourth. It was a magnificent run from Sonia O'Sullivan but it proves that 50 metres is a long, long way in athletics.

Elsewhere the US basketball "dream team" have now been dubbed "the bullies of Barcelona." They beat Spain 122-81 in a match which took place at 11 p.m. to facilitate the American TV networks.

MONDAY, AUGUST 3 (DAY 10)

Everybody who makes it to the semi-finals in Olympic boxing gets a medal, so with three boxers through to the quarter-finals, Ireland was one step away from medals. Wayne McCullough secured the first of these medals by beating bantamweight Mohammed Sabo of Nigeria 31-13. Then Michael Carruth doubled the tally in his welterweight bout where he actually drew with Germany's Andres Otto, but won on the countback system. Paul Douglas though, lost his heavy-weight fight.


There was controversy in the men's 10,000m final when the two leaders, Skah (Morocco) and Chelimo (Kenya) were joined with 1000m left by a lapped runner, Boutayeb, who was a team-mate of Skah. Boutayeb appeared to be helping Skah by staying with the leaders. Just before the bell, an official raced onto the track to warn Boutayeb who then dropped back. Skah won it but was then stripped of his gold medal. Meanwhile Paul Griffin's boxing ban was reduced from a year to 3 months.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 4 (DAY 11)

A day off for athletes but the 10,000m controversy continued. Moroccan Khalid Skah was re-instated as Olympic champion after an appeal; the Kenyans were angry at this and threatened to pull out, but they didn't carry out the threat. At 26 stone weight-lifter Mark Hentry (USA) set a new record by becoming the heaviest person ever to take part in the Olympics. In the basket-ball quarter-finals the USA predictably, beat Puerto Rica by 38 points.

WEDNESDAY, AUG. 5 (DAY 12)

Sally Gunnell won for Britain their fifth ever woman's gold medal in athletics by winning the 400m hurdles, while the USA's Quincy Watts won the men's 400m in a new Olympic record time. Another record was broken in the men's 200m semis when Mike March of the USA set the new Olympic standard.



The hosts Spain had something to shout about on day 12 because in the football semi-finals they beat Ghana 2-0.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 6 (DAY 13)

Wayne McCullough and Michael Carruth had fought brilliantly to get to the semi-finals in boxing and now they were three rounds away from the final. In his bantamweight semi-final Wayne McCullough beat North Korea's Gwang-Li Sik by 21 points to 16 to secure Ireland's first silver medal since John Treacy.

Michael Carruth led his welterweight semi-final from the start and the judges voted him an 11-4 winner against Akron Chenlai of Thailand. It all happened in the space of an hour and it meant that for the first time ever, Ireland had two boxers in the Olympic finals.

On the track Sonia O'Sullivan failed to progress in the 1500m and finished 11th in her semi-final. Kevin Young won the men's 400m hurdles in world record time and Gail Dovers-Roberts hope to become the first 110m sprint and hurdles medallist since 1948 came crashing down as she fell over the last hurdle. This gave Parasken Patoulidou the chance to become Greece's first ever female gold medallist.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 7 (DAY 13)

At the age of 16, Jennifer Capriate (USA) became the youngest ever Olympic tennis champion when she beat Steffi Graf. In the men's 3000m steeplechase, Kenya did a clean sweep. Mathew Birir took the gold after falling earlier in the race and fellow Kenyans Sarg and Mutwol took silver and bronze. Spain continued their successful run by winning the women's hockey.

SATURDAY, AUGUST 8 (DAY 15)

John Pius Boland did it twice in 1896. Pat O'Callaghan did it in 1928 and 1932, the same year as Bob Tisdall did it. Ronnie Delany did it in 1956, and now Michael Carruth has done it in 1992. By beating Cuban Juan Hernandez, the welterweight boxer from Drimnagh has won Ireland's seventh ever gold medal. The final points tally at the end of the fight showed that he won by 13-10, but it would have been a six points win for Carruth had he not been given a public warning and docked three points by the strict referee in the second round. Carruth's win came after the defeat of bantamweight Wayne McCullagh, who lost to another Cuban, Joel Casamayor. McCullagh wins a silver. Strange to think that the Irish Olympic boxing coach is yet another Cuban, Nicolas "Paddy" Cruz.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 9 (DAY 16)

Unfortunately there was no success in the marathon for Ireland, but John Treacy and Tommy Hughes did finish, which was a great achievement in the sweltering heat of Barcelona. In a fiery and memorable closing ceremony involving 750 people, a dragon, a serpent and a pretty large bird, Barcelona waved goodbye to the Olympic Games, which move to Atlanta in readiness for 1996.

# All-Ireland Minor Hurling Semi Final At Croke Park

## Waterford Minors Cautiously Confident Of Beating Antrim

Overconfidence almost to the point of complacency among supporters all over the county is a source of worry to the minor hurling selectors as they endeavour to mentally prepare the players for what can be a very tough assignment when they play Ulster champions, Antrim at Croke Park on Sunday next.

In the aftermath of the celebration of our two victories in Munster, the notion seems to have got around that our semi-finals are mere formalities and that qualifying for both All-Irelands will pose no problems, just because Antrim are our opponents. I hope we don't suffer because of a reckless attitude on the part of many supporters, who though well meaning, are being a little irresponsible at this stage. The selectors have been at pains to dispel this notion and to point out to the players that there is absolutely no reason for overconfidence. This is the year of shocks and surprises and Croke Park has often proved to be a land of pitfalls, especially to young players who trod the famous ground for the first time.

I see the attitude of an overconfident public as our biggest worry in this vital game at headquarters on Sunday.

Approached with the right attitude and playing the kind of hurling which saw them beat Tipperary in the provincial final, we should win.

By the time these notes appear, the panel will have finished training and I'm sure that their final briefing on match strategy will be given at their final session. They have watched a video of the replay of the final and examined the reasons for whatever mistakes were made, etc., they are fully turned and

there is no news of injuries. The full panel that were in Pairc Ui Caoimh have been present at training and all were available for selection when the side was being named over the week-end.

**NO CHANGE**

As was generally expected, the selectors decided to stay with a winning team and named the side which won us our third Munster title. They felt that the team which finished against Tipperary in the drawn final and lined out again for the replay, had been well and truly tested.

All twenty-five players from the thirteen clubs represented on the panel, have come up through the 'ranks' so to speak, and each player at some time or other has distinguished himself with his club or divisional team in the inter-divisional or Tony Forrester Tournament. Very many of the panel hold county championship medals in the under-14, under-16 and minor grades and the fifteen named on the actual team have all played in the adult grades with their respective clubs.

**SUPPORT**

Support is again very important and it is imperative that our people make their presence known when the team come on to the field at about 12.20 p.m. on Sunday. Croke Park can be a lonely spot for a team playing out there for the first time and a rousing reception from their 'own people' can have an inspiring and motivating effect on the players.

**OVERNIGHT**

The team party will travel on Saturday for the game. The county under-21 panel will travel to Croke Park on Sunday morning and watch the minor match from the Hogan Stand. Immediately the minor game finishes, they will travel over to Parnell Park for a bout of training for their semi-final match on the following Saturday. The members of the minor panel will take the seats occupied by the under-21 group during their game for the other semi-final matches at Croke Park on Sunday.

The minor team will travel by train on Saturday and return by train on Sunday evening to Plunkett Station, Waterford.

**MINOR MATCH BROADCAST**

W.L.R. have arranged to have the full minor game

broadcast live from Croke Park on Sunday. The broadcast which is sponsored by Tom Murphy Motors, will commence at 12 noon and continue until 2 p.m. Jim Landers and Sean Organ will give the commentaries and the broadcast will also include interviews. This will be the first ever broadcast of a minor game in which Waterford has been involved.

**TRAVEL**

A special train is being laid on for the minor game next Sunday and will leave Waterford at 8.30 p.m. and will arrive at Connolly Station at approximately 11 a.m. The return train will be at 5.35 p.m. and will be back in Waterford at around 8 p.m. A special train is also being laid on for the under-21 game on the following Saturday and details
