Contract For Construction Of New Dungarvan Golf Clubhouse Placed

The contract for the construction of the clubhouse at Dungarvan Golf Club's new headquarters at Knocknagrannagh, Dungarvan has been awarded to Messrs. Cyril Healy & Sons Ltd., Dungarvan at a fixed sum

cost of £211,000 plus VAT. The completion date for the building is March 1993. The fittings and fixtures in the new clubhouse will be extra to this contract but the Golf Club Committee have decided that the total all-in

cost must not exceed £277,000 (excluding VAT). Building has now commenced and will continue through the autumn and winter.

Additional Lotto Prizes To Be Won

3 More Numbers To Play

The National Lottery has announced changes to Lotto which involves adding additional prizes and numbers to the existing game. New playslips will be introduced on this Thursday, August 20 and the first draw for the new game will take place on next Saturday, 22 August.

There will be a new prize category introduced for players who match three numbers, plus special "Bonus Number." In every Lotto draw there will now be a seventh number drawn, which is the Bonus Number.

When players match any three of the first six numbers drawn and, on the same line, also match the Bonus Number, then they will win a new, guaranteed £8 prize. The National Lottery expects that this new prize will be won by approximately 18,000 players every week.

As well as introducing a new prize category, the National Lottery is also adding three new numbers to the Lotto game. Players can now pick six numbers from 39 instead of from the existing 36.

I.F.A. Chief On Waterford Co-op Milk Price

Mr. Pat Murphy, Chairman Waterford Co. Executive I.F.A. in the course of a statement issued on Monday said:

"At present Waterford Foods insist that Supplier milk price benefits by the 1.8p as a result of going from the Co-op's Investment Unit Scheme. As this 1.8p is included in the attainable milk price, but not included in our cheques, I must assume that the Supplier has paid that money towards something as in

other milk cheque deductions. Therefore, if we are allowed one unit per 50 gallons, the cost to the farmer is then 1.8p multiplied by 50, plus 10p (as per the .2p deduction) which totals 100p. If we must wait 4 years to be paid £1 per unit, which has already cost £1, I suggest that that is a very poor deal.

"In conclusion, I urge farmers to lobby their Board members to insist that the Co-op does not include the 1.8p in our milk price."

VILLAGE TOPICS

DUNGARVAN BRIDGE

Last week in our article about the building of a bridge between Abbeyside and Dungarvan (and remember there was no mention of a Causeway in these early discussions) we pointed out that the whole issue was really a political one with the Beresford family engaging in a vote gathering exercise in opposition to the Duke of Devonshire. History teaches us that basically life does not change much over the centuries.

Before the bridge was constructed some people travelled by Ferry from a slipway opposite the Dungarvan Leathers' Factory. Horses and carriages also crossed by this ford and had been doing so from time immemorial.

The ferry was owned by a

Mr. Grogan who hailed from either Co. Wexford or Co. Wicklow. He received a yearly rent of £70 for the use of it by his tenant who could make up to £200 a year.

OLYMPIC AFTERMATH

Wayne McCullough's Anger At Michael Carruth Snub

The troubled streets of Belfast have borne witness to the All-Ireland brotherhood of boxing which no sectarian divide can defeat.

Olympic boxing silver medallist Wayne McCullough — angry at the snub to Dublin gold medal winner Michael Carruth — held up a huge placard bearing the name of his team-mate during his open-top victory parade in Belfast.

Angry that Carruth had not been invited to the civic reception in Belfast City Hall, McCullough from the strongly loyalist area of Belfast, reserved a space on

the coach in which he put a placard with the message "Michael Carruth — Gold Medal Winner."

McCullough said he was disappointed that his native city refused to honour Carruth.

"Both religions were at the reception last night. Some of the officials were Catholic. I cannot see why they did not invite Michael there. No one recognised his victory.

"I made sure he had a look-in today. I put his name up in front of me. I am in sport, not in politics."

McCullough's father Drew was even more angry:

"They're trying to bring politics into sport. When I went to the city hall my son had to coax me to go down.


"I went with one intention: Michael Carruth is going to be there.

"When I sat down for dinner my name said Andrew McCullough. I scored that out and put in Michael Carruth.

"When they brought the dinner round I refused to eat. I just sat there. I went to the Lord Mayor and he tried to soft soap me.

"He tried to tell me it was not his fault. I told him he was a liar," McCullough explained.

Another old practice of couples tying a ribbon or a piece of cloth on the Wishing Tree at the Ragwell on the mountain road leading to the Nire Valley out of Clonmel was also captured by the cameras. A local boy and his girlfriend, dressed in period costumes from the last century, strolled on the path to the Well to do the honours. Many people from Poulavanogue and the surrounding districts claim that the spot was long associated with romance and young lovers. Traditionally they would take a stroll up the mountain path to the Well, make three wishes and tie a ribbon or some piece of a garment to the tree, and their wishes were said to come true. If you told the wish to anybody your wish would be lost.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

300,000 Plus And Rising

As the job crisis deepens, a call was made last week by Most Rev. Dr. Michael Murphy for new strategies to fight unemployment. The jobless spiral has risen steadily by over 10,000 during each of the past three months until it reached the all-time high figure of 290,700 last month. And not included in that figure is a further 40,000 engaged in short-term unemployment schemes conducted by FAS.

Bishop Murphy warned against any fatalistic accep-

ance of unemployment and called for plans as the government announced it would hold a top-level meeting of the social partners in September to review job creation and investment. While he agreed that the government was making efforts he thought that it was time to introduce new strategies.

While rising jobless numbers is not peculiar to Ireland, it is a common phenomenon in all countries in the European Community in recent years with some being more badly hit than others — Ireland being in the latter category.

Unemployment is also a serious problem in the U.S. and is one of the biggest

bones of contention in the present Presidential campaign.

Apart from the anger and frustration that is being experienced by those who are unable to secure a job, the most frightening aspect of the situation is that the numbers unemployed will continue to soar until the social welfare burden can no longer be sustained. Let us hope that before that point is reached some situation to this terrible problem will have been found.

Could This Be A First Step?

Speaking at the McGill Summer School in Glenties, Co. Donegal last week, Liam Connellan, Director General, Confederation of Irish Industry came up with a suggestion that a single market on this island could lead, through important replacement, to 75,000 extra jobs.

Mr. Connellan said that the completion of the Single Market in the European Community on December

31 will result in a Single Market on the island of Ireland for the first time in living memory. This would provide an opportunity for substantially increasing trade between the Republic and Northern Ireland.

He pointed out that manufacturers in the Republic sell only a quarter as much in Northern Ireland as they do in the Republic while on the basis of the relative populations they should be

able to sell half as much. The comparisons for Northern manufacturers are even more dramatic as they sell only a third as much in the Republic as they do in Northern Ireland although the population of the Republic is twice as great.

Mr. Connellan believes that if similar penetration of markets could be achieved by manufacturers from each part of the island in the other part, this would result

in increased business for manufacturers, North and South, through import replacement, of £3 billion and at least 75,000 additional jobs on the island.

In the light of the existing job crisis we believe that this is a proposal to which serious thought should be given when the social partners meet next month to discuss this very serious situation. It could be a first step in the right direction.

It's Still 1690 For Belfast Loyalist Councillors

The decision of the Loyalist Lord Mayor and Councillors of Belfast City to exclude Ireland's Olympic gold medal boxer, Michael Carruth, Dublin, from a civic reception they planned for his colleague and friend, silver medal winner Wayne McCullough, Belfast, has deservedly been condemned by everyone barring the most bigoted members of the Orange Order in the Six Counties.

Last week in this column we referred to the wonderful boost it was for Ireland that a north-south combination had made Barcelona '92 a gold and silver Olympics for

Ireland. Michael Carruth and Wayne McCullough were both members of the Irish boxing team which competed at the Games and both were treated equally in the heroes' welcome which was accorded them when the plane bringing the Irish contingent home from Barcelona landed at Dublin Airport in the early hours of Tuesday morning of last week.

Equally, both occupied places of honour in the triumphant tour on an open top bus through Dublin on Tuesday morning en route to the Mansion House where they were accorded a

civic reception by the Lord Mayor and members of Dublin City Corporation and presentations were made to both in appreciation of their outstanding performances for Ireland and for themselves. The occasion was one of unbounded joy and happiness as up to 20,000 applauded both boxers for their wonderful achievements in bringing back gold and silver medals to Ireland. Throughout the celebrations the Carruth and McCullough families who had travelled down specially from Belfast mingled with each other in the most friendly fashion. It was only as it should be.

Then it was the turn of Belfast but as so often has happened in the past the bigotry always displayed by those who dub themselves Loyal members of the Orange Order turned everything sour. The Mayor who is named Ditty in announcing that Michael Carruth was to be excluded from their celebrations bluntly declared "he doesn't belong to here" and this narrow-minded view was then fully supported by his loyalist

colleagues on Belfast Corporation.

The McCullough family reacted to this decision in a manner which showed them to be the sensible and reasonable people that they are, when they expressed themselves as being mystified and deeply disappointed that Michael Carruth had not been invited. "We thought we were going along to meet Michael and his family again there and enjoy the same kind of reception we had in Dublin," Wayne McCullough's dad is on record as saying.

However the widespread anger and condemnation which has been expressed throughout the North shows that there are a great many decent people there who do not subscribe to the entrenched bigotry displayed by the Lord Mayor and Loyalist members of Belfast City Council. Thank God for that. The City Hall bigots in Ireland's second city should realise that this is the year 1992 and now far removed from 1690 and the Battle of the Boyne which seems to be the time wrap in which they want to remain.

College Head Says This Linguistic Neglect Must Be Tackled

Speaking recently in Thurles at the annual dinner of St. Joseph's College, Borrisoleigh, the Principal, Mr. Pdraig O'Shea strongly criticised R.T.E. and the daily newspapers over their totally indefensible standard of spelling. He said that the spelling in many newspapers and in summaries of the news on R.T.E. was dreadful.

Mr. O'Shea said that the problem was becoming more acute as there was an increasing dependence on the spell-checking facility in computers and he charged that "what was incorrect ten years ago is now accepted as being correct through repeated misuse," adding that "it behoves all involved in education and in particular the Department of Education to tackle this linguistic neglect as a matter of urgency."

"We couldn't agree more and we fully support Mr. O'Shea's call to the Department of Education in the matter as we believe that if there is not a proper foundation laid in the primary schools where spelling and grammar are concerned, the weakness will never be overcome."

YORK TRIANGLES

Ingredients:
 4 oz smoked back bacon, diced
 1/2 oz butter
 1 small onion, finely chopped
 2 oz Cheddar cheese, grated
 freshly ground black pepper
 8 oz puff pastry
 English mustard
 1 egg

Method:
 Saute onion and bacon in butter. Remove from heat, cool slightly, stir in cheese and season with black pepper. Roll out pastry and cut into 10-12 7cm (3 in) rounds. Spread a little made mustard on each circle. Spoon on a small amount of filling and form pastry into tricorn shapes. Brush with beaten egg and bake at gas mark 6, 400°F, for 10-15 mins., until golden brown. Serve hot or cold.



BEATING THE LACK OF WATER

Talk to a gardener about using a hosepipe nowadays and he will surely ask — "What's a hosepipe?"

In these days of summer drought and hosepipe bans, they have become a useless artifact — something our descendants may well dig up in years to come and wonder what on earth we did with them.

Not a lot at the moment! Even if August does buck a few downpours, much water quickly runs off the parched ground, concrete and rooftops, giving little hope of higher reservoirs and an end to hose bans.

So we need ingenuity to keep the garden watered. The best investment is a water butt and stout plastic ones are widely available at DIY centres or by mail order. Most are barrels used to import fruit juices or other bulk products and seem little expensive at around £30, though I thoroughly approve of recycling containers which would be difficult to dump or burn without causing severe environmental problems.

Try to buy one with a cover or be ready to make one out of wooden



slats, both for childrens safety and to keep the water clean and from algae and leaves.

You then need to find a gutter or downpipe to tap into — even a garage or shed will collect enough during a good downpour to keep an average garden well-watered.

Once the site is chosen, be ready to fit a tap on the butt if it does not have one already, as it will make life a lot easier. Then check that you will be able to get a bucket or watering can under the tap.

If not, you need to build a solid plinth able to bear the weight of many gallons of water. A wooden one is easier but will need a sturdy frame of two-inch square timber, with tough slatting to match.

Better to make it of bricks on hard core and filled with solid garden debris — pebbles, broken concrete and

so on — topped by an old paving slab.

You must also consider what will happen if the butt overfills. First, if not fitted with an overflow, you need to cut a hole near the top and fit an exit pipe.

Then run the pipe into a nearby drain, downpipe or a garden soak-away — a pit filled with gravel or pebbles. At a pinch you could also disperse it into a well-drained lawn. Once the butt is in place you will find that the watering can is hard work, so make the most of the water you carry:

- never water in the heat of the day, as it quickly evaporates and may also soak the plants
- the end of the day is best as it is cooler and the water has all night to work down to the roots
- use a watering can with a rose to imitate the effect of rainfall
- if water in the butt gets low and there is no prospect of rain, you can also use waste water if it is reasonably free from muck and detergents. If in doubt, just let it stand for a while and draw clearer water near the top before pouring the rest down the drain.

Know Your Rights

Question — Are Health Boards entitled to claim back repayment of Disabled Person's Maintenance Allowance where compensation or damages have been awarded?

Answer — Disabled Person's Maintenance Allowance or Supplementary Welfare Allowance cannot be paid by way of a loan. So there is no legal basis which would allow Health Boards to claim back DPMA or SWA in the event of compensation being awarded.

The Health Boards would be correct in reassessing the DPMA after the compensation was received but the DPMA should only be affected from that point onwards.

Poor Public Transport Service

Twenty-five years ago in 1967 the Waterford - Mallow Railway closed leaving the town without a rail passenger service for the first time for a hundred years.

This was, at the time, a traumatic blow to the area but assurances were given that an alternative road passenger service would be provided. Now twenty-five years on the service is still there but on a greatly reduced scale. At the same time the potential number

of users has greatly increased with the introduction of Free Travel for Old Age Pensioners. This excellent concession is of little use to our senior citizens. If they wish to travel to say Dungarvan they can only get there and back on a Saturday. To travel to Cork and back would require two days.

All of this was brought home to us one day recently when we met a foreign couple who wished to get to

Waterford. They weren't in any particular hurry but needed to get there that evening. Unfortunately for them it was on a day which there was no bus service whatsoever so they were compelled to hire a taxi to Dungarvan and travel on from there.

Surely during the holiday period it should be possible to have at least one service daily serving the town. There is little point in spending time and money trying to attract tourists to an area almost totally devoid of so many essential services.

AFFANE ROAD HEDGE CUTTING

We commented in these notes last week on the need for hedge cutting on this road. We have since been told by Councillor Mrs. Nora Flynn that she had been in touch with the proper authorities about the matter ever before last week's item was written. She has now put down a notice of motion to be dealt with at the next meeting of the Council. This notice of motion also asks that the Car Park beside Affane Church be tidied up. Cllr. Nora Flynn is very concerned about the neglected state of many other roads in her area and perhaps she can use her influence to have as many as possible of them looked after as soon as possible. We mentioned some time ago the overgrown state of the milestones on the main Dungarvan road, so no doubt Cllr. Flynn will take this matter on board also.







The next summer Olympics take place in Atlanta in four years time, and for a mascot, the organisers have chosen a catfish.

U-21 Hurlers Play Antrim In Semi-final At Parnell Park

Caution The Keynote As Hurlers Prepare

Thousands of Waterford hurling supporters will see Parnell Park for the first time on Saturday next and will travel up in the hope of returning home with happy memories of the venue where our under-21 hurlers will have played the Ulster champions Antrim in the All-Ireland semi-final.

On the home front the senior and intermediate football championships resume

with a big number of very attractive and important games listed for decision.

Eighteen years ago when we last played Antrim in an All-Ireland semi-final we were so sure of winning that we did not hesitate when asked to travel up to Belfast to take on the Ulster champions.

Now the scene has changed and Antrim have progressed from being a

struggling hurling county into a strong hurling force with justifiable ambitions of being able to challenge the big names in the game.

They have qualified for many, many more All-Ireland semi-finals that we have and have lots more experience of what is required to make a break at this level. I was told by an acquaintance from Belfast that Antrim played brilliant

hurling in the Ulster final and that they will be very difficult to beat at the penultimate stage.

They have played many times in Parnell Park and prefer playing there to playing in Croke Park in the semi-final. They have a number of players who have height and strength and not very easy manageable on a hurling field, so what Waterford might lack in this regard, they must make up for in skill.

After the Munster final in Thurles five of our team travelled over to Scotland to play in the Shinty International and some have been nursing injuries since then. Noel Dalton is recovered and Johnnie Brennar is almost recovered from a hurtful foot injury, but the selectors were not one hundred per cent sure over the weekend about full-forward Sean Daly who is still having treatment for his injured knee. The panel and selectors could certainly do without these worries on the eve of a vital game.

At full strength and all players fielding fit, we should expect to be able to beat Antrim. The high quality of the hurling played by Waterford against Cork at Walsh Park and against Clare in the Munster final at Thurles should at least be good enough to see us through to the All-Ireland, if we can reproduce that

form again at Parnell Park. Our minors did not play as well in Dublin as they did in Munster and if the same happens on next Saturday evening we can expect a very uncomfortable hour.

The team was not available at the time of writing and was due to be selected on Monday night and will appear hereunder.

I doubt very much if the selectors will depart very much from the team named to play Clare in the Munster final except that half-forward Tony Browne will be missing, he having fractured a finger in training last week.

Ray Barry will be in goal and can be relied upon to play his usual confident game behind the full line of Kieran O'Gorman, Owen Dunphy and Mark Sullivan. Outside in the half line Seamus Keating, Pat Fanning and Fergal Hartley are sure to be retained, all having performed so very well in Thurles in July.

There were worries about Johnnie Brennar but these have been dispelled and he will partner Tom Fives who had a splendid second half against Clare. It will be interesting to see who replaces Tony Browne and many will wonder if Paul Flynn, who was introduced in Thurles and was again our top scorer last Sunday, will be brought on again. There are other good for-

wards on the substitute bench. However, Michael Hubbard, Anthony Fitzgerald, Noel Dalton, Kevin McGrath and Sean Daly are all sure of being named also.

As I wrote last week, over-confidence on the part of our supporters can inadvertently transmit to the players and with serious consequences. There is absolutely no room or reason for complacency. It is a season of shocks and hardly a week goes by without some major surprise being worked somewhere.

We are good enough to win, but only if the team can be motivated into believing that they are facing a very serious challenge and that it will take a display equal to what we produced in Munster to make reasonably sure of winning a place in our second All-Ireland this year.

NO TICKETS FOR SATURDAY

Tickets will not be required for Saturday's game at Parnell Park. Tickets for the All-Ireland minor final will all be distributed through the clubs and details of the allocations will be published next week.

The train from Waterford to Dublin on Saturday will leave Waterford at 1.10 p.m. and tickets are available in advance.

ALL-IRELAND MINOR HURLING SEMI FINAL

Relief In Waterford As Munster Champions Qualify For All-Ireland After 44 Years Wait

Because we were so confident of winning and well able to achieve what we set out to do at Croke Park on Sunday last there was no wave of emotion or scenes of jubilation as were experienced in the immediate aftermath of the Munster final at Cork last month, but all around among the thousands of delighted and proud Waterford people, one could clearly feel the sense of great relief when the match ended.

Viewing the scene from the stands our supporters could clearly see the expressions of joy and relief on the faces of the smiling players and officials as they ambled back to their dressing room after the game. There were periods during the match when players and officials as well as supporters felt quite uncomfortable and concerned as while all the time, we were the better team, there was the possibility that a couple of fast goals from Antrim, might change the trend of the game against us. Oddly enough, this did happen, but fortunately for Waterford it came too late for Antrim.

It was not as good a game as was the Munster final drawn match or replay and the feeling was general that we did not play as well either as we did in Cork. I suppose it would be almost extraordinary if the big occasion did not affect the players in some way. Going out on Croke Park for their first time and knowing nothing about the quality of their opponents, was in itself a challenge. These factors affected their game in the first fifteen or twenty minutes and it was not until after this that they began to show the thousands of neutral people in the stadium, that they are the worthy Munster champions.

Many Waterford people told me after the game that they felt confident at half-time when we had a six points lead (even though we had played with the breeze). I was not confident at that point and didn't begin to feel happy until Paul Foley crashed home our second goal from a rebounded penalty in the 33rd minute.

THE PLAY

Both teams lined out as named on the expensive Croke Park programme and the match was underway a full minute ahead of time.

Immediately after the throw-in, Waterford went into attack and within 20

seconds Paul Flynn had the ball in the Antrim net for what seemed a splendid score and a real tonic start for us. Apparently the whistle had blown for a free for a foul on Paul Flynn who made no mistake with the free and gave us a first minute lead. This score should have been allowed as it was a deliberate foul by corner back Bateson who was obviously given a special briefing about handling a player whose scoring record was well known. He fouled Paul Flynn on a number of occasions before being moved and eventually replaced.

Waterford had two wides and Antrim a couple as well before Flynn was again fouled by the same player and scored from a free to put us two points up after eleven minutes. Antrim full forward Donal Gallagher blasted a shot which Pat Harnan saved but we got caught on the rebound and from a melee Aidan Mort hit it to the net to give Antrim the lead in the 13th minutes. We drew level when Flynn pointed a seventeenth minute free but the challengers came back to recover the lead again in the 19th when Donal Gallagher tapped the ball over the bar. Raymond Ryan had a beauty of a score in the 20th minute — this was our first score from play. John Joe Ronayne's fine point in the 21st minute gave us a further boost and a minute later the accurate and brilliant Paul Flynn, again from a free, put Waterford two points in front.

At this point I noted that players from both sides were bunching much more than they should have been and this was a greater impediment to us than it was to Antrim.

Tom Kiely hit the ball in, it was snatched by John Fitzpatrick who broke through and sent an unstoppable shot past Antrim's keeper in the 24th minute. This score had a great motivating effect and Waterford kept up the pressure for several minutes after, but all this yielded was two wides. John Fitzpatrick had a point in the 25th minute and we then looked to be on our way to a big win, but Antrim had other ideas and came back with a splendid point by Colum McGurkin and this was followed by another Antrim wide before Paul Flynn ended the first half scoring with a pointed free to leave it 1-8 to 1-2 at the break.

WATERFORD 3-16 ANTRIM 3-7

The Waterford team resumed unchanged, but Flynn was now operating in the half forward line. Antrim had made three switches.

ISSUE BEYOND DOUBT

Minutes after the restart Waterford were awarded a penalty which Paul Flynn shot for goal, but was saved and not cleared sufficiently and held in around the goal area long enough for Paul Foley to get clearance for a shot that finished in the Antrim net and put us nine points clear. Paul Flynn and Paul Graham exchanged points in the 34th and 35th minutes before P. J. Mullan reduced the gap slightly for Antrim when he pointed a 36th minute free. Our mid-field pair, Tom Kiely and Fintan O'Shea, were gradually getting on top of Antrim's Robert Laverty and Colum McGurkin and more of the ball was being distributed to our attack. Flynn snatched a pass from somewhere and laid on Paul Foley for the big Stradbally man's second goal in the 37th minute. Joe Doyle had a very fine score from out on the sideline for Antrim and John J. Ronayne brought one back four minutes later. In the 44th minute Paul Flynn had the best of his eight points to make the score 3-11 to 1-5 and put the issue beyond doubt.

Shortly after this the selectors, obviously happy about the state of play decided on a number of changes that were designed to give others on the panel the 'feel' of Croke Park. In the final ten minute when Tom Morrissey had been replaced by John Cleere, goalkeeper Patrick Harnan by Brendan Ormond and Paul Flynn by Colin Fanning, Antrim came back strongly into the game and added two goals and a point to their tally.

Some supporters regarded this decision as an ill advised gamble, not because the replacements were not top-class players, but because the feeling of over-confidence was transmitted to the players and this resulted in some relaxation for which we were punished. If there was some unwarranted relaxation, the team showed their recovery qualities and came back for the final two scores. Derek McGrath had a point under pressure in the 56th minute just before Antrim's third goal and in the final minutes after the

Ulster champions onslaught, J. J. Ronayne and Ray Ryan had our final points to leave us nine points clear on the scoreline of 3-16 to 3-7.

A SATISFACTORY PERFORMANCE

As I have written at the outset, it was not as good a display as was given in the Munster final, but it was nevertheless a satisfactory performance by a team playing for their first time in Croke Park.

Pat Harnan made some really good saves under pressure and while the full back line of Tom Morrissey, Paddy O'Donnell and James O'Connor gave us cause to worry at times, they played with confidence when they eventually recovered their composure.

There were occasions when our half back line were run ragged, but all three players, Anthony Kirwan, Ger Harris and Tom Feeney, had moments of brilliance and like the inside line, they played well all through the second half.

Fintan O'Shea and Tom Kiely had a tougher task than they had obviously expected from Antrim's mid-field pair. Both our men acquitted themselves very well over the hour and contributed their share to our win.

All but a point of our 3-16 was scored by our forwards and it was good to see all six get their names on the score sheet. John Fitzpatrick, Derek McGrath and John Joe Ronayne all played well and had some delightful scores and the inside line of Raymond Ryan, Paul Foley and Paul Flynn, all further embellished their reputations by contributing a total of 2-10 of our total score.

The three substitutes also played well and goalkeeper Brendan Ormond brought off two super saves and could not be blamed for the two goals which went in during his brief term between the posts.

Because of the strict regulations in Croke Park and patrons not being allowed on to the pitch until after the final game, there were no scenes of jubilation after the final whistle like we had in other places, but hundreds of supporters left their seats in the stand to meet the players when they came back in under the stand. Hundreds of our supporters did not return

to their seats for the remainder of the programme, as having come up to support 'our own people' as one patron commented, their mission was accomplished.

WONDERFUL SUPPORTERS

It is now back to the training ground for the panel of players and selectors and the long hard drag of getting the team into perfect shape for the All-Ireland final against Kilkenny or Galway at Croke Park on the first Sunday in September. It is a time for keeping our feet firmly on the ground and not getting involved in fancifulising about having a super team playing in the final — yet anyway. The county is on a high at the moment and we like to savour every moment of it, because we don't get reason to enjoy this kind of sensation very often and the euphoria which has gripped the county is a wonderful feeling, but hopefully we will learn to cope with success in the same way that we have coped with failure in other years. So far we have no worries in this regard and our supporters have, like the team, been wonderful.

I don't know the number of people who were packed into the 6.30 a.m. train

which left Waterford but there were no complaints from the huge crowd who were compelled to stand all the way for the three and a quarter hour journey. The happy mood of the travellers was also revealed in the fact that a mechanical problem delayed the train for about half an hour at Kilkenny. The vast majority of our supporters who came out of Connolly Station wore some Waterford emblems, either jerseys, scarfs, neckties or hats to establish their identity. Because of the time factor the crowd had to head straight for Croke Park, about a mile away and believe me it looked quite a sight, worth remembering.

There have been complaints that patrons going to the Cusack Stand side of the grounds found the turnstiles locked on arrival and that the delay resulted in some supporters not getting in for the throw-in. This complaint is being pursued.

The homecoming was even more enjoyable and thanks to the efficiency of Iarnrod Eireann everything happened on schedule.

A big contingent of supporters who arrived on the first train back, waited for the arrival of the regular service train, which had the team on board and needless to say there were scenes of great excitement when the players came off. A huge crowd also travelled up by bus and car and from a very early hour on Sunday morning there was a great buzz about the county.

On Friday and Saturday the Supporters' Club caravans were kept busy in Waterford and Dungarvan, selling colours, emblems and the like and enrolling supporters as members.

There was an air of excitement around Bridge Street in Dungarvan on Saturday as the players from this end of the county assembled for the take-off from Lawlors Hotel for Plunket Station, Waterford, where they joined the others before en-training for Dublin where they stayed overnight in the Airport Hotel.

BROADCAST

By courtesy of Tom Murphy Motors, the entire game was broadcast live from Croke Park, by commentators Jim Joe Landers and Sean Organ and by all accounts they did a fine job on this historic broadcast. It was listened to by tens of thousands of Waterford people who could not travel up.

Full Programme Of Matches At Week-end

S.F.C.—KILROSSANTY V. TRAMORE

Tramore footballers have now gone beyond the point of no return as far as being involved in the knock-out stages of the championships are concerned and on their present form, it would take a small miracle to take the points from strong championship contenders, Kilrossanty. The Comeragh club are certain of making it to the knockout stage and at worst will be still involved at the semi-final stage.

S.F.C. — SLIABH gCUA V. BUTLERSTOWN

Both these clubs are still without a point on the league table and now find themselves in competition for the second last place on the table. That is the position which will save them from involvement in a relegation battle later on.

Butlerstown, although without a single win, the same as their opponents, have played some good football without being rewarded and will be slight favourites to win. Sliabh gCua began in tremendous style and almost denied hotly fancied Stradbally the points in their first game, but then seemed to lose interest.

This will be the first of three matches at the Fraher Field on Sunday.

STRADBALLY v. NIRE

One of the choice matches of the entire championship. Both these high profile teams are still unbeaten and both are showing very good form so far. They have met three times over the past three years and Stradbally have emerged winners on each occasion. Last year the winning margin was just two points and I recall writing at the time that one of Stradbally's two goals was a lucky score. The Nire always seem to be unlucky

against Stradbally and this ill-luck stretches back to a county final about four years ago.

With Kilrossanty and Kilmachthomas still to meet, the Nire would need to win this one as their group have four teams fighting for three places and anything can happen. They have 6 points from three games while Stradbally who are already safe, have 8 from four matches.

I have no doubt but that it will be a very, very close affair and the result can favour either side, if there is a result. But if it is not a draw, Stradbally might just shade it.

I.F.C. — FAHA V. ARDMORE

It is quite on the cards that Faha will win this and probably their next and final game as well on the following Sunday to stay in second place on the league table which is due to be completed before the end of the month.

Ardmore's form has been somewhat disappointing and erratic. Having shown splendid form when defeating Shamrocks and Geraldines, they suffered a crushing defeat by Affane. They are a team who are not easy to "fathom" and it would be foolish to discount their chances against any other side, but they don't seem to me to be a team that will measure up to this present Faha side.

SHAMROCKS v. GERALDINES

Shamrocks must win this one if they are to retain any hope of qualifying for the knock-out stages. Even a win here may not be sufficient to keep their hopes alive as they have a tough assignment on the following Sunday when they play Affane. They are odds-on favourites to win against Geraldines who are still

pointless after five matches. They should win this one.

BALLINAMEELA v. AFFANE

Probably the most attractive intermediate football game of the week-end and apart altogether from the entertainment aspect of the tie, the fate of one or both teams could hinge on the result. Both have five games played and as they stand at the moment, Affane have seven and Ballinameela have six points. Affane are third from the top of the table and Ballinameela share fifth place with Ardmore. The top four will qualify and they each will have one more game to play on the following week-end.

Affane's best form to-date was when playing a very exciting draw with Faha on the last Sunday in June. Ballinameela showed very good form when playing Ring only two weeks ago and they now seem to be approaching their best.

It will be a cliff hanger and one that will be decided by the narrowest of margins. It is a game that Ballinameela just might win.

RING V. BRICKEYS

This game at the Old Parish venue should result in a decisive win for Ring who are heading the league table at the moment with just one defeat after five matches. They have already qualified so they have no worries in this regard. A win will keep them in front of all others at the top. Geraldines have shown poor form all the season and it would be a major shock if they were to beat Ring here.

S.F.C. — BALLINACOURTY V. DUNGARVAN

Ballinacourty's challenge to the champions, Dungarvan, will be described as a local derby and no doubt but that supporters on both sides

will get worked up about the game, but I cannot honestly see it as being anything other than a very ordinary game with the chances of it producing a surprise being very slim.

Dungarvan had to prove themselves a powerful side to win the last two county championships and during the same period Ballinacourty stayed midway between qualifying for the knockout stages and being involved in a relegation battle. No one can deny that there is a gap in standards and it will be a big surprise if this does not expose itself on the scoreboard.

Ballinacourty won their three titles ten or twelve years ago, but have not mounted a very serious challenge in the meantime. Four years ago they were hot favourite to beat Dungarvan in the 1988 championships, but were surprisingly beaten by 1-9 to 0-9 in a very mediocre game at Fraher

Field. The sides have since met in the senior championship.

One thing is certain and that is Dungarvan will bring out the best in Ballinacourty and there will be a great eagerness on the part of the challengers to push their local rivals all the way. Both teams are likely to field at full strength and the champions will have David Burke back in action following his return to the senior hurling side, a factor that will strengthen their bid to achieve a hat-trick of county titles.

The county champions showed their best form this year when beating St. Saviours here six weeks ago and Ballinacourty's best display was against Rathgormack with whom they drew at Stradbally, also about six weeks ago. Since losing to Rathgormack in the championships, Dungarvan have gone at it 'hammer and tongs' and have played many challenge games against some of the better football teams outside the county. Ballinacourty too, have played a few challenge

games as part of their preparation, but unless they show a complete transformation of form, I cannot see them winning here.

S.F.C — ST. SAVIOURS V. DUNHILL

Saviours who were regarded as strong contenders at the start of the season don't seem to be doing all that well and are now struggling to win a place in the top three. Still they should not encounter much difficulty here as defeat by pointless Dunhill looks to be out of the question.

GAULTIER v. CLASHMORE

Gaultier are in a similar position as are Saviours and they need to win points to keep them in with a chance. They are not likely to be beaten by Clashmore, who have no points after five matches and are now fighting for the couple of points that will avoid a relegation play-off against Dunhill who have been keeping them company at the bottom of the table.
