EC Structural Fund Priority Sought For West Waterford Regional Water Scheme

Minister To Open Dungarvan's New Major Roadway

At the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday, the Chairman Cllr. B. Kyne announced that the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith would visit Dungarvan on Monday, October 5 where he will officially open the new major roadway incorporating the realignment of the Sweep at Pulla.

On the occasion, the Minister will also meet and have separate discussions with members of Dungarvan Urban Council and of the County Council.

The County Secretary Mr. B. J. McNally submitted a report to the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday on proposals and projects which would be deemed suitable to qualify for EC Structural Funds for the 1993-1997 period and which might be submitted to the South East Regional Committee set up to monitor such proposals.

Included in the draft proposals were a number of schemes for improvements to roads, water and sewerage schemes, portal and coast development, coast erosion and tourism.

Calling for priority for the proposed West Waterford Regional Water Scheme included in the list, Cllr. Nora

Flynn pointed out that this would serve the entire Western end of the county and would replace and augment small local schemes which were unreliable. She said that such a scheme was very badly needed.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer said that if this was to happen within the period stated, a consultant would need to be appointed soon to prepare a report on the scheme. He agreed that this would be a major scheme to service the entire region and it would have major spin-offs with developments in agriculture and tourism. "But" Mr. O'Flynn added, "unless the Council is prepared to move now the scheme is going nowhere".

Last Saturday evening's win by the Waterford U-21 hurlers in their All-Ireland semi-final clash against Antrim coupled with the great win by the minor hurlers in their All-Ireland semi-final match on the previous Sunday has set all Waterford alight and recalls the heady days of 1948 and 1957-59 when the Deise hurlers were among the best in the land.

These great victories and the anticipation of greater things to come in the weeks ahead have created a great buzz and have helped people to overcome the otherwise ongoing depressing economic news.

Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday, all the members joined in extending heartiest congratulations to the members of the minor and U-21 hurling teams on reaching the All-Ireland finals and in wishing both teams success in the final hurdles. Congratulations were also extended to the trainers, coaches, selectors and to the members of the County Board.

The formal vote of congratulations was proposed by Cllr. G. O'Halloran and seconded by Cllr. O. Wilkinson and in declaring it passed unanimously, the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne said that the victories of the minor and U-21 hurlers had proved a tremendous boost for the county and for all concerned with them. He said that the fact that it was their young hurlers who were now coming to the fore reflected on the great work done in recent years with the under-age players throughout the county. "Great credit is due to them all and it's nice to see the County back in Croke Park", said the Chairman.

Back To School Next Week

The start of September will mark the commencement of the new school year and many excited five-year-olds will spend their first day at school. The roads will undergo a transformation overnight. There will be marked increases in vehicular, pedestrian and cyclist traffic. The National Safety Council is appealing to everybody to take extra care on our roads.

WALKING TO SCHOOL

- ★ Children under 7 should not cross roads on their own. They cannot decide how far away a car is or how fast it is going. They should be taken to school by an adult.
- ★ Choose a safe route to school and keep a hold of your child's hand, — children of this age act very quickly.
- ★ Show your child how to cross the road by example. Choose safe places to cross and explain why to your

child, i.e. subways, footbridges, zebra or pelican crossings, with a policeman, a lollipop man/lady or junior warden patrol.

★ Ensure that your child always stops at the edge of the footpath and always put the Safe Cross Code into practice.

★ After some weeks assess your child's understanding by asking him to bring you across the road.

★ Remember the best person to teach your child to cross the road safely is you, but, if you do not do as you say, don't expect your child to.

★ Children walking on country roads should wear reflective armbands.

TRAVELLING BY BUS

★ Teach your child to take special care when getting on

or off public transport.

★ While waiting for a bus, teach them to stand well in on the footpath or grass verge.

★ Before crossing the road they should wait until the bus has moved off and they can see clearly in both directions.

CYCLING

A bicycle is a vehicle not a toy and a cyclist is very vulnerable. Think twice before allowing your child to cycle to school.

★ No child under the age of ten should be allowed to cycle in any sort of traffic.

★ Ensure that your child thoroughly understands the Rules of the Road, and can look behind without wobbling while cycling.

★ Impress on children that traffic lights apply to cyclists too and that Red means Stop.

★ Check that the bicycle's brakes, lights, reflector and bell are in good order.

★ Make sure your child is highly visible: a reflective belt, bright clothes. The higher the visibility, the lower the risk.

★ The risk of head injury which is the cause of about 70% of cyclist fatalities can

be greatly reduced by wearing a cycle helmet — it makes sense for your child to wear one.

DRIVING YOUR CHILD TO SCHOOL

★ Children should sit in the back and each should have his own safety restraint. Ensure that they cannot open doors or windows.

★ Set down and collect your children on the school side of the road whenever possible. Never park opposite and call your child — many five year olds have died this way.

★ Do not park within 20 yards of the school entrance. Because of their small size children cannot see and cannot be seen if parked cards are in the way.

★ Co-operate with school wardens and never overtake a school bus when it is stationary.

ALL DRIVERS

★ Please remember our children are back on the roads. As they are not shatterproof please take special care at schools — slow down — take a few seconds more — it could save a lifetime.

★ Give cyclists plenty of room.

★ Drive defensively: expect the unexpected.

Scholarships Commemorate 70th Anniversary of Griffith's Death

Two generations of the family of Arthur Griffith were present on Wednesday, August 12, at Griffith College, Dublin, formerly Griffith Barracks, for the announcement of four commemorative scholarships by the College to mark the 70th anniversary of the death of Arthur Griffith. The scholarships were launched by The Lord Mayor of Dublin Alderman Gay Mitchell TD at a special reception.

Mrs. Ita Gray, daughter of Arthur Griffith and Commandant Shane Gray, grandson, joined College Staff at the new College campus, which is named after Griffith, a member of the first Dail, for the announcement of the establishment of the

"Griffith Scholarships."

Announcing the establishment of the "Griffith Scholarships," Mr. Diarmuid Hegarty, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the College said: "The setting up of the "Griffith Scholarships" is I believe a fitting way to commemorate the death of Arthur Griffith on this its 70th anniversary. We are delighted to announce the setting up of these four scholarships, two of which are being offered nationally and two of which will be offered to students from the eight post primary schools in the immediate area of the college in Dublin who might not otherwise have an opportunity to pursue a Third Level Education."

£30,000 Advertising Campaign In British Newspapers

Dungarvan Museum Society Weekend Commemorates Tallow Born Sculptor

The Tallow born and educated neoclassical sculptor John Hogan (1800-1858) is the subject of the 1992 Dungarvan Museum Society Commemorative Weekend, which takes place from Thursday to Sunday, 3rd-6th September. Mr. Brendan Kenneally, Minister of State at the Department of Tourism & Transport will perform the official opening at Lawlor's Hotel on Thursday evening at 7.30 p.m.

John Hogan of Coolisheal, Tallow became Ireland's leading 19th century neoclassical sculptor and his work is to be seen in many churches, ecclesiastical institutes and public galleries. After commencing in Cork, Hogan departed to Rome in 1824 and established his studio there. He received many commissions from the Irish bishops and clergy in the post-empire cathedral and church building period and from public bodies and private individuals here and abroad. He returned to Ireland on many occasions, finally settling in Dublin in 1849. John Hogan died in 1858 and was buried in Glasnevin Cemetery.

His importance as a major artist was recognised in Rome in 1839 with his unanimous election to the Congregation of the Virtuosi of the Pantheon, of which the Pope was Titular Head and members being normally all Italian (fifteen painters, fifteen sculptors and fifteen architects).

The key event of the weekend is the lecture on Friday, September 4 in Lawlor's Hotel at 8 p.m. — "John Hogan — His Life and Works" by Dr. John Turpin, M.A. Ph.D., Director of the National College of Art and Design, Dublin. Dr. Turpin is author of "John Hogan — Irish Neoclassical Sculptor in Rome" (Irish Academic Press 1982). His doctoral thesis was a study of Cork born artist Daniel Maclise (1806 - 1870) in whose company John Hogan visited Cappoquin in 1843, and 19th Century Irish Art is Dr. Turpin's main interest.

The weekend opens with a oneman exhibition by Dungarvan artist and historian William Fraher, followed by a poetry reading by Co. Waterford poets, Fr. Pádraig J. Daly, O.S.A. and Thomas McCarthy. Fr. Pádraig Daly, like John Hogan, spent a number of years in Rome and much of his poetry reflects that period.

Thomas McCarthy, a native of Cappoquin, has published three collections of poetry — "The First Convention," "The Sorrow Garden" — both award winners and "The non-aliqhted storyteller." His novels "Without Power" and recently published "Asya and Christine" and his poetry strongly reflects his upbringing and early experiences of life in West Waterford.

By the kind permission of Dean Weekes, St. Mary's Church of Ireland provides the setting for Saturday's Choral Recital. Dungarvan

Museum is honoured to present the choir of the Italian Cultural Institute, Dublin.

OUTING TO TALLOW

On Sunday afternoon an outing to Tallow will take place and participants will visit the John Hogan Memorial, the Tallow Heritage Centre and buildings of historic interest in the Brideside town in association with the Tallow Enterprise Group which is based in Nora Herlihy house, West Street, a beautifully restored 19th century building.

The West Waterford Tour

includes a visit to Glencairn Abbey, formerly Casterichard, where in 1795 John Hogan's father was employed as artisan builder. There he met Frances Cox, cousin of the owner of the manor, William Gumbleton, with whom she resided. Despite her family's opposition, Frances and John Hogan married in 1796. Even with the passage of the years the oral tradition of John Hogan's (Senior) time and work at Glencairn Manor is very much alive among the Abbey community.

Crystal Company Demands 500 Job Cuts And Pay Cuts In New Survival Plan

Waterford Crystal management last Thursday night spelled out details of a new survival plan to save the ailing industry, which has lost over £80m in the past five years.

The company is demanding 500 job cuts by Christmas, pay cuts right across the board, a revised piece rate system for craftsmen, further streamlining of operations and industrial peace for five years.

Chairman and chief executive Dr. Patrick Galvin said the company is in a serious financial situation and urgent action is required to make cost structures more competitive and return it to profit.

"If we do not improve our cost base we will put the jobs of all 1,900 workers at risk," he added. "Our objective is to make the business profitable and secure the

jobs of the 1,400 who remain in the industry."

Dr. Galvin said that due to recession in the major markets the company had been operating a short-time working programme for the past two years to balance supply with demand.

Effectively, its operations were overmanned by some 500 people. It was planned to address this problem by a limited voluntary redundancy scheme which would reduce the need for short-time working.

Annual leave, bonuses and profit share schemes would be revised and all existing and outstanding claims must be withdrawn and consid-

ered to be resolved at no cost to the company, added the chairman.

On foreign sourcing of crystal, he said the new Marquis brand will shortly be introduced in Ireland. The recession had forced many customers to "trade down" and the company had decided to source three entirely new products from overseas manufacturing units.

He was conscious, added Dr. Galvin, that the new initiatives called for tough sacrifices from the workforce at all levels — he was confident they would lead to a turn around in the company's future.

Dev's Grandson Addresses Ring Daonscoil

Speaking at Daonscoil na Mumhan in Coláiste na Rinne, Ring last Thursday, Senator Eamonn Ó Cuiv said that any discussion of Articles 2 and 3 of the Irish constitution would, inevitably and logically, have to consider the first Article as well.

Senator Ó Cuiv, a grandson of the author of Bunreacht na hÉireann, Eamon De Valera, said that of the first three Articles in our constitution which concerned "the nation" rather than "the State", Article 1

was the most important and the one from which Articles 2 and 3 logically derived.

This fundamental first Article asserted "the inalienable right of the Irish people to choose their own form of Government." If people were suggesting that we tamper with this provision by modifying Articles 2 and 3, we should be told to whom this inalienable right to govern ourselves would pass.

Senator Ó Cuiv conceded that the Unionist minority in

Ireland would have to be accommodated in any future settlements. This might possibly involve a reconsideration of membership of the British Commonwealth of nations which the 26 counties left only as recently as 1949.

He also emphasised the importance of cultivating all national cultural attributes, but especially the Irish language, in an era when national identity was assuming a growing importance for communities throughout the world.

Ballinacourty Lose Local Derby

The local senior football team lost to Dungarvan by two points in a vital senior football championship match at the Fraher Field on Sunday night last. In a tough, tense encounter the referee awarded frees against the Ballinacourty backs on at least four occasions in the second half when no fouls were committed at all. All these frees were in scorable positions. However, Ballinacourty had the winning of the

match in their own hands but John Mulligan struck a penalty wide in the last minute of the game.

The club have no chance

of winning this year's championship and must strive in the remaining matches to avoid relegation to the intermediate grade.

All-Ireland U-21 Hurling Semi-Final

A large contingent of supporters from the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty area travelled to Dublin by train on Saturday afternoon last

for the penultimate stage of the competition. It seemed like two carriages had been pre-booked by the local fans as they created a party atmosphere to and from the game. On the journey home through the darkened countryside the success to date of the Waterford minor hurling team became a topic of conversation as well and for many locals a genuine worry was expressed as to where tickets could be procured for the All-Ireland hurling finals on the first Sunday in September.

OUR LOCALITY

It is interesting to note that the original plan for a bridge linking the town of Dungarvan to Abbeyside proposed building a bridge of five arches. However this plan was not accepted as it was considered too expensive an undertaking especially as elections had been held shortly beforehand. A Mr. Knowlton stated that it was more necessary to build houses in order to increase the number of voters. However Knowlton felt "that the bridge would be of great advantage to the Duke and suggests that the Duke's friends be allowed free passage but his enemies should pay a toll."

The building of the bridge remained a contentious and volatile political issue and eventually a bridge of 3 arches, the land arches each 49.6 ft. span as originally

proposed and the middle arch 80 feet would be sufficient for the river as mid-stream would then be about the middle of the bridge.

A Mr. Ware was hired to try and cut down on the costs of the bridge and the final plan proposed the building of the existing single arch bridge and a long Causeway connected to it. Mr. Ware states "in consequence of reducing the length of the bridge, it will be necessary to extend that of the embankment." Mr. Ware continues that there was a large quarry in Abbeyside where he saw large stones being cut and the fact that such materials were available nearby would mean that the cost of building a causeway would not be too expensive.

borough in England, was also the celebrant of a Sunday Mass at Abbeyside while holidaying in the area.



Both Bishops were welcomed to the Parish by our esteemed Parish Priest Very Rev. Fr. R. Doherty.

A gate on the Church was ripped from its hinges and thrown into a nearby wooded area, while brick work has been hammered out of the Church Walls. The Well area has also become a popular location for unruly Cider parties. Society president and Curate of St. Marys Parish Rev. Fr. Billy Meehan, C.C., expressed dismay at what is happening there. People don't appreciate the Well as a place of beauty and heritage he said. St. Patricks Well has never been locked, but from now on it will be locked from 9 p.m. to 9 a.m.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

Lismore Author On TV Tonight

The "Winter In Profile" programme which features interviews with Irish Authors on RTE 1 television will be of more than ordinary interest for viewers in West Waterford this week as the programme which is timed for 9.20 p.m. to-night (Wednesday) focuses on Lismore author Dervla Murphy.

Born in 1931, Dervla who is daughter of the late Fergus Mac Murchadha former Waterford County Librarian was certain from a very early age that she would be

a writer. In 1962 she cycled to India and wrote about this trip in her first book "Full Tilt" which was published in 1965. Since then she has written many travelogues including "Muddling Through In Madagascar" (1985) and "Cameroon With Egbert" (1989). She has also written an autobiography, a book about nuclear power and a book about urban communities in Belfast and Birmingham.

In a news release concerning the programme, RTE points out that in regard to

early decisions in her life, Dervla says, "I knew two things when I was very small. One, that I'd be a writer and two, that I'd never marry. I knew that kind of relationship was not for me because I knew I would always want to be just on my own".

On writing she says "I started to write when I was about seven or eight and my parents always asked me for a little essay or short story for Christmas or birthdays. My early years were spent trying to write

novels which weren't worth typing, much less submitting to a publisher. The wish to write and the wish to travel are separate matters. They are equally strong in my case, but they happen to converge and that's how you become a travel writer".

We understand that Dervla Murphy's next book will be about Romania but you can learn more of this and about this very much travelled Lismore writer by tuning in to-night to RTE 1 TV at 9.20 p.m.

Square-Toed Boots

A great crowd converged on Helvick in the Ring Gaeltacht in the vicinity of the Fenian Monument a couple of Sundays ago to join in the Commemoration of the landing of the Fenian Officers who had sailed from America in the "Jacknell: which name they changed to the "Erin's Hope" en route, bringing with them a cargo of arms and ammunition for the planned Fenian Rising. They came ashore in Ring on June 1, 1867 but unfortunately were quickly captured, having been seen by an alert watch-out from the nearby coastguard station.

As a consequence of the Helvick commemoration we have chosen a ballad of the Fenian times as our choice for the ballad corner this week. It was written in 1867 by T. D. Sullivan, the well-known Cork poet, in derision of the Fenian scare that then had British officialdom in Ireland in its grip. All Irish-Americans visiting this country were suspected, and it was supposed that they all wore square toed boots, hence the title of the ballad. Larcom who is mentioned in the ballad was the head of the RIC in Ireland at the time.

Says Johnny Bull to Larcom: "Oh! tell my dear police
To watch those wicked foreigners who so disturb my peace;
Who come across the ocean on no manifest pursuits,
And who swagger down my thoroughfares in square-toed boots.

"Their hats caved in and shapeless, to slight the Crown are meant
Their knickerbockers and gaiters show a desperate intent;
Their beards look all seditious, from the tips unto the roots;
And there's mischief beyond measure in their square-toed boots.

"When met by Sub-Inspectors, High Sheriffs or J.P.'s,
There's something quite defiant in the wag of their goatees;
They never bow submissively; they dream of no salutes,
Save what's hinted in the action of their square-toed boots.

"But now no more those rovers shall fright me and annoy—
I'll treat them to the beauties of Kilmainham and Mountjoy;
For I've made the resolution, whatever be its fruits,
That my laws shall not be trampled on with square-toed boots."

From Larcom to the "Royals" the word was sent around,
And fast they seized Americans, where'er they could be found,
They dragged them off to prison, and they treated them like brutes,
On a charge of foul conspiracy — and square-toed boots.

And now the news has travelled afar across the sea,
Old Uncle Sam has heard it, and a mighty man is he;
Through all his huge anatomy a thrill of anger shoots,
And like thunder come the stamping of his square-toed boots.

And Johnny Bull grows fearful, as surely well he may,
When up the giant rises, and strides across his way;
For past experience whispers, what no later fact refutes,
That there's terrible propulsion in his square toed boots!

A Good Dog Is Still Best Burglar Alarm

Following a number of house-breaking incidents throughout West Waterford earlier in the year there was a great deal of interest generated in the need to install burglar alarms and in fact many people (at least those who could afford it) did in

fact go to the expense of installing one.

However, a senior garda officer went on record last week as stating that a good dog is still the cheapest and best form of burglar alarm for the elderly and anyone living alone.

Speaking in Galway, former Chief Supt. Tom Greene said that people living on farms and in rural areas should even keep two dogs, one inside the house at night and one outside. He pointed out that the dog outside would alert the one inside of the presence of any intruder and then if the dog outside was 'got at' in some way, the one inside would still prove to be the household's second line of defence.

Mr. Greene also suggested that pensioners living alone should also be granted a free dog licence to remove any possible impediment to

keeping a dog.

While the ordinary commonsense recommendations and precautions to safeguard property and prevent robberies, particularly in isolated rural areas should always be followed, the former Chief Supt. thought that a dog could still be one of the best and cheapest methods of protecting any property. A dog in the house would raise the alarm at any sound and would definitely make a thief think twice before entering any house. Even a small dog can make an awful racket and that was what was needed to scare off any would-be robbers.

Pedalling Around Ireland For A CAT Scan

Over five week-ends commencing on Friday, September 4 the 1992 Uniform Challenge-Around Ireland Cycle will commence. Sponsored by Dublin Bus, Iarnrod Eireann and Bus Eireann, it is a major fundraising campaign being organised by the Defence Forces, Garda Síochána, Fire Services, Prison Service, Scouts and Guides in aid of Our Lady's Hospital for Sick Children, Crumlin, Dublin.

An entourage of service vehicles will lead the cyclists, representing each uniform through towns and cities on the route, guaranteeing a festive atmosphere for the event.

Volunteers throughout the country will be organising collections as the entourage passes through each town as well as other fundraising events coinciding with the Uniform Challenge. Route 4 of the project to take place on Friday, September 25 will see the cycling group peddling from Cobh to Waterford City via Youghal and Dungarvan from where they will swing north to Clonmel

and then via Carrick on to Waterford.

Our Lady's Hospital for Sick children is the national referral hospital for seriously ill children from all over Ireland. There are over 100,000 child attendances at the hospital each year.

The funds raised by this event will go towards the cost of a CAT Scan. The hospital urgently requires a CAT Scanner on site to provide vital information for doctors and surgeons in their fight against serious childhood disorders such as tumours, heart disease, spinal disease, severe head injuries, infections and traumatic injuries.

Having such equipment in place at Our Lady's Hospital, may in effect, save the lives of some very ill children. It will certainly save many of them from having to undergo the trauma of exploratory surgery or having to make a very difficult trip to an adult hospital for a CAT Scan.

With this knowledge you will surely find it easier to be generous when the stalwart cyclists visit your locality on Friday, September 25.

Another Hi-jacked Ballad

Some time ago we related how the Welsh ballad "The Old Carnarvon Oak" had been taken over in its original form and republished in Ireland as "The Old Dungarvan Oak" despite the fact that the story on which it was based had no association whatsoever with the town of Dungarvan.

While listening to BBC Radio-Wales last Sunday morning we heard a request for a sea shanty called "Old Swansea Town" and the programme presenter went on to elaborate how this was another old ballad which had been "hi-jacked" and republished in Ireland as "The Holy Ground", a version which had been made famous by the former ballad group of the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem when they were in their hey-day.

The Radio Wales presenter then went on to play the recording of "Old Swansea Town" rendered in typical Welsh fashion by the Triochi Male Voice Choir and as we listened we realised that the words of the ballad were exactly the same, the only change being that the line "Old Swansea Town Once More" was changed to "The Holy Ground Once More". The radio presenter added that when the ballad was sung in olden times by the old salts in such seaports of Cardiff, Swansea and Newport they added the old Welsh cry of "yacida" to the end of each verse.

Old Landmark Has Disappeared

The ruins of the old coast-guard station on Helvick Head which for generations past have been a well-known landmark recently disappeared. A query was sent to us some weeks ago as to when this had happened but we were then unable to give any answer. We had not missed the old ruin from the skyline on the 'Head' until this query was directed to us. However, when in Helvick for the recent "Erins Hope" Commemoration we met the man who quickly put us in the picture.

This was Nicholas Graves

on whose lands it stood and he informed us that as the place had become dangerous by the constant removal of bricks and stones from the old building, he had, in the interest of safety, had it completely removed about six months previously.

We recall from our association with many of the old fishermen of Ring, most of whom have since gone to their final reward, that this old landmark aligned with a point of the Comeraghs assisted them on many an occasion in making a safe landfall.


REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS

At the Inaugural meeting of the Cappagh area shareholders of Waterford Co-Op held on Monday 24th August at Whitechurch House Hotel, attended by a small but representative group, Mr. Tom Carroll, Graunfadda was elected Chairman, Mrs. Mary Stack, Canty was elected Secretary and Mr. Edward Sheehan Knockgarron was elected Treasurer.

The group was convened for the purpose of ensuring a proper line of communication between shareholders and management and vice versa through their elected representatives.

On milk price, the meeting felt that the criteria for the payment of milk were set at an unacceptably high level and were, in fact, harsh penalties levied on farmers. The meeting also agreed that there was ample scope for an increase in milk price of 4p /gallon through the adjustment of these criteria and the cessation of the milk assembly charges.

On the Co-Op Share issue the meeting felt that no effort should be spared to secure the majority shareholding that Waterford Co-Op Society Ltd. owns in

Waterford Foods Plc. so that the Co-Op shareholders can reap the long overdue rewards promised at the time of going public.

The meeting also agreed that when the internal market for Waterford Co-Op shares is set up, unless it is financially attractive to own Co-Op shares nobody will buy or be able to sell them, therefore indulging in the recent paper shuffling exercise was a waste of time by Waterford Co-Op.

The meeting concluded on the proposal that an expert of renown, either nutritional or genetic, should be sought to address the next meeting of the group for the purpose of educating farmers on how to improve the protein content of our milk.

This meeting is planned for October.

Here's How You Can Try Thai



Thai food is becoming increasingly popular, and many of the supermarkets and bigger shops are stocking a range of ready-prepared Thai-style dishes and authentic Thai sauces and marinades.

You can capture something of the taste of Thailand with the following recipe, which, incidentally, is also calorie-conscious.

THAI TURKEY

Ingredients:

2 turkey breast steaks, about 125g (4 oz.) each, thoroughly thawed if frozen.

Marinade:

2 tbsp fruit chutney.
1 tbsp light soy sauce
pinch of chilli or cayenne powder
1/2 tsp ground cumin
1 clove garlic, crushed
125g (4 oz) dried egg noodles.

Method:

Cut each turkey steak in half lengthways. Mix marinade ingredients together in a bowl. Place the turkey pieces between two pieces of clingfilm and batten with a rolling pin until flat and

thin. Marinate the turkey in the marinade for an hour then thread the turkey strips onto skewers like plaats. Prepare the noodles either by soaking in hot water or cooking, depending on the pack instructions. Grill the turkey under a preheated grill for 3-4 minutes each side. Serve the turkey hot with the noodles, cucumber shreds and baby corn. Calorie count for dish (including noodles) 800 kcal. **Serves 2-4.**



Vegetables Are Worthwhile



More gardens seem to be switching areas of their garden to vegetables and finding that it need not be an extra burden.

The advantages are many:

- a ready supply of tasty vegetables — a freshly-cut calabrese or new potatoes straight from the earth just cannot be matched by anything from a shop.
- high shop prices for some vegetables.
- the 'green' movement. If you want organic vegetables you have to pay a premium and some don't look appetising — why not grow them yourself?
- newer and more flexible vegetable varieties. Some are extremely compact and can be grown in cramped areas of the garden.
- availability of grow-bags, cheap and carefully-designed tubs and other containers which can be used to grow such crops as tomatoes in awkward spots — even roof gardens and balconies!

If you plan your vegetable plot carefully you can enjoy fresh produce all year round. Use of cloches, a cold frame or a cool or heated greenhouse will considerably boost your options.

Don't worry if you haven't much space because you can choose crops and varieties to suit — there have been many reports of people growing tomatoes and courgettes on the balconies of flats! And if you are worried about the vegetable patch being a blight on your immaculate garden, then screen it with a trellis of honeysuckle or rose. Alternatively, set up a sturdy frame and grow runner beans — a lovely crop and the ideal screen.

If you are less fussy then have the plot as near to the house as possible so that

you can nip out of the kitchen and do some quick harvesting as required.

This is particularly important in the case of fresh herbs where you may need just a handful, but quite often. Many people get around this by having a small but attractive herb garden close to the kitchen or even in a box or planter on the window ledge.

However, wherever you grow your vegetables, whether it be one site or a series, you must choose somewhere fairly open and sunny and then dig and prepare it properly.

Digging is crucial in both the short and long term. During the winter digging season, always try to dig to a double depth and mix in plenty of well-rotted garden compost to ensure good soil condition and drainage.

And try to keep your weight off the soil as much as possible to avoid compaction and reducing water penetration. A wide plank to spread your weight is a useful aid when venturing onto the plot to harvest, sow or dig.

Keep on top of weeds by frequent hoeing rather than using pesticides and keep rotating your vegetable crops. If you carry on growing the same types on the same part of the plot then you invite weakness, disease and pests.

Another basic tip is to make small and successive sowings of crops such as carrots, beetroot, cabbages and, in summer, salad crops such as lettuce and radishes. Otherwise everything will ripen at the same time, leaving you to waste it or give it away. — **Arthur Hines.**

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I am married with 4 children and am receiving long-term Unemployment Assistance of £136 per week. We find it hard to manage on this. If my wife took up part-time work and earned £55 per week what effect would this have on my Assistance?

Answer — Your wife could earn up to £55 gross and she would still be regarded as your dependent and you would continue to be paid for her and the full rate for your children.

However, part of her earnings would be assessed against you and your payment could be reduced. Assuming that she would be a PAYE worker and not self-employed, her income would be assessed as follows:

From her gross pay deduct PAYE and PRSI, union dues and an amount for travel expenses in getting to work. From the balance deduct a further £45 personal allowance. The balance would be assessed against you.

In your wife's case she would be exempt from PRSI as her earnings would be less than £60 per week. She would not be liable for tax as she could claim all the tax free allowance. If she had no travel expenses or union dues to pay, this would leave £10 to be assessed against you and your Unemployment Assistance would be reduced by £10.





Students and parents are anxiously awaiting the first round offers of College places which will be published on 29th August. Getting the finance to cover the cost of the college place is another major headache.

At the Youth Information Centre, we find that those who are facing these questions for the first time often get into a maze of red tape and frustration. At the moment, one of the difficulties seems to be confusion about the ESF Grant scheme.

Application forms are now available from your local V.E.C. It is important to note that your application will be processed by the V.E.C. which covers the area where you live. For example if a student from Waterford City hopes to go to Sligo RTC, he/she should apply for the grant to the Waterford City V.E.C. It goes without saying that it is imperative to actually apply, yet our experience is that every year you will get students who actually forget to submit their application.

As this is the first year for the new arrangements regarding the means test, it is likely that there will be some delays. It is important to note that County Waterford VEC has fixed its closing date for Friday 11th September.

The closing date for Waterford City VEC is September 15th and Tipperary (SR) VEC's closing date is 31st August.

If you have any queries about the ESF grants or any of the other grant schemes, perhaps we can help.

UNDER-21 HURLING SEMI-FINAL

Classy Waterford Qualify For Second All-Ireland Hurling Final

WATERFORD 4-16 ANTRIM 2-8

Six days after beating the Clansmen of Antrim in the minor semi-final, Waterford's under 21 hurlers scored another resounding defeat on the same county in a top class display of hurling at cold and windy Parnell Park on Saturday evening.

Thousands of Waterford supporters greeted the result with unconcealed delight and there was a stampede to the dressing room area to cheer the players as they came off the pitch. It was another wonderful result for Waterford and it was a wonderful feeling to witness so many loyal Waterford supporters move around in high spirits for over an hour or so after the game, the result of which puts us through to our second All-Ireland final when we play Offaly on next Sunday fortnight in Nowlan Park, Kilkenny.

Before writing about the game, I must deal with the exciting preliminaries which generated another great 'buzz' around the county all the week as followers made their travel arrangements. They went by train, bus and car and were joined at the venue by a very big number of Dublin based Waterford people who came along to share the pride of Waterford on the occasion and to enjoy the game. Many of the 'emigrant' contingent were seeing our under-21's in action for their first time and didn't hesitate to tell us that the exhibition of hurling they witnessed came well up to expectations.

Extra coaches had to be put on to the second special train which was laid on by Iarnrod Eireann to accommodate the huge crowd who travelled by rail and all credit to the company for the top class organisation which ensured the satisfactory transportation of such a huge crowd to the game.

In the attendance of approximately 3,600 only a small number were from Antrim and well over 90% were from Waterford.

PLAY

Both teams lined out as selected and Antrim having won the toss decided to play with the very strong breeze which blew into the Northside goal. The outsiders mounted some early pressure and had three very early wides, before Waterford put in their first attack. A Waterford attack yielded a '65' but the strong breeze prevented Johnnie Brenner's shot from going the distance. Another Waterford attack brought us our first score of the game when newcomer to the team Paul Power sent over in the 5th minute. Antrim

came back with a wide, and the puck-out went to Tom Fives and then to Noel Dalton who had our second point after six and a half minutes. Waterford were now well on top and after some delightful team work involving several players, our man of the match, Sean Daly, shot home the first of his three great goals. The puck-out was added to and caught by full-forward Brendan McGarry who scored Antrim's first point in the 8th minute.

Encouraged by this they continued to press and had two wides, one of which was a rebound off the upright. The very first free of the game was awarded in the 13th minute and Noel Dalton sent over to make it 1-3 to 0-1 in the 14th minute and one minute later we had our first wide of the match. Allister Elliott had the first of his four points in the 16th minute, but Paul Power brought one back for Waterford in the 19th minute. Antrim fought doggedly to gain control and had two very good scores from play in the 20th and 21st minutes to narrow the gap to a couple of points with 22 minutes of play gone.

Team captain Sean Daly sent over a fine point in the 23rd minute and within another 60 seconds Anthony Fitzgerald, taking a pass from Tom Fives, broke through for our second goal to leave the state of play 2-5 to 0-5 in the 25th minute. Michael Hubbard had a 27th minute point before Sean Daly had a point, which arguably was the best score of the match, in the 28th minute. This ended the scoring in the first half and let us 2-7 to 0-5 in front and feeling fairly well relieved.

THREE GOAL LEAD

Two minutes after the restart Anthony Fitzgerald had a point to give Waterford a clear three goal lead. Scores now began to come regularly and after Noel Dalton and Allister Elliott exchanged points, Waterford came back for three points on the trot, per Sean Daly, Michael Hubbard and Kevin McGrath. It was 2-12 to 0-6 in the 42nd minute and the outcome looking beyond doubt when Antrim struck back for a splendid goal by Brendan Gillan. Fergal Hartley and Noel Dalton had points for Waterford (2-14 to 1-6) before

Kieran O'Gorman's very long free reached his club-mate Sean Daly who made no mistake in shooting his second goal in the 48th minute. Two minutes later Brendan McGarry's goal for Antrim gave notice that there was going to be no surrender. Midfielder Tom Fives had a beauty of a point in the 51st minute and after a further two minutes team captain Daly had his third and our final goal of the game. Elliott and Kane added points for our very courageous opponents, but to Waterford and to substitute Mark Geary went the final say with a point that made the final scoreline 4-16 to 2-8. A very well deserved win for Waterford.

Overall it was a splendid display, but it would be foolish to think that we will get it easy in our next game which will be against Offaly in the All-Ireland final in a couple of weeks time. Our prospects there will be dealt with at a later stage and this is the time for saying well done to the players and everyone connected with our achievements so far.

SPLENDID PERFORMANCE

It was a splendid team performance and we saw some really delightful passages of play throughout the hour. It was copybook or exhibition stuff, but we would unlikely get away with this at another time.

Ray Barry was coolness personified in goal and effected some delightful saves. Kieran O'Gorman, Owen Dunphy and Mark Sullivan formed a very strong full back line and each had their moments of brilliance. They all hurled very confidently behind Pat Fanning, Fergal Hartley and Johnny Walsh, who had been drafted on to the team for his first game this year. Johnny Brenner

and Tom Fives experienced some anxious moments before they got on top of Antrim's James Connolly and Con McGee. When they got their opponents measure they both hurled very well. All our six forwards scored as did Mark Geary when introduced, but the major role played by team captain Sean Daly deserves special mention, he having contributed 3-3 (3-4 according to some scribes). Kevin McGrath had his best game so far and was a torment to his opposite number Owen Colgan. Michael Hubbard and Noel Dalton both did everything that could be expected of them and Paul Power certainly justified his selection while Anthony Fitzgerald's fine goal again highlighted the Passage man's hurling skill. Colin Cunningham, Mark Geary and Seamus Keating all contributed their share when brought on during the game.

On arrival back at Plunkett Station, Waterford, a big crowd awaited the arrival of the team party who were given a rousing reception as were the minors six days earlier.

NEXT WEEK-END FIXTURES

Full List of Crucial Games In Senior And Intermediate Football To Be Decided

A temporary lull in the inter-county scene will allow us to focus our thoughts and attentions on the many important adult football championship matches due to be played over the coming week-end. It is very much like the calm before the storm, as the majority of the games listed are not likely to arouse any great excitement. There are a number of games which are vital to the clubs concerned and understandably, these are the matches which are generating most interest.

It would be well for patrons to check before travelling to any games as cancellations and postponements are possible after we have gone to press.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP DUNGARVAN v. GAULTIER

This game will be played as a curtain-raiser to the Wexford v. Cork junior hurling All-Ireland replay at Walsh Park and it is likely to see the county champions emerge victorious. A repeat of their form against Ballinacourty on Sunday evening should be good enough to beat a side who were lucky to draw with pointless Clashmore on the same evening.

Dungarvan are now so well situated that if they lost

they will still qualify, but they will try to make sure that they win here to retain second place on the league table. This will be Dungarvan's final game in the league section.

NIRE v. KILROSSANTY

This is one that will attract the crowds and everyone will be surprised if the fare does not live up to expectations. The Nire were beaten by Dunhill in the senior league last week and on the basis of this form they won't beat Kilrossanty, but then, the Comeragh team were not at all impressive when beating Tramore in the championship on Friday evening. It is of great importance to both.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Champions Survive Full-Blooded Challenge

DUNGARVAN 1-7 BALLINACOURTY 1-5

I must admit to having misjudged this game when writing a preview last week as it did, after all, turn out to be a thriller from start to finish and a local derby in every shape and form. The kind of serious preparation which Dungarvan engaged in led me to believe that the selectors and players were over reacting to the public perception of the quality of the challenge that Ballinacourty could mount for this vital tie. In hindsight it must now be said that they made a good judgment and can count themselves lucky for the last minute let-off when the challengers missed the penalty which would have undoubtedly won them the game and the points which would give them an outside chance of qualifying for the K/O stages of the championship.

I suppose one could describe the game as a hectic contest with the spirit of rivalry which was dormant for some years, being aroused in all its intensity between the sides. There were the few 'explosions' which at times stopped the

flow of the game, but referee Tom Maher showed himself to be well capable of controlling the game without having to sideline anyone.

It was seen by the biggest crowd to attend a championship so far this season and they certainly got good value with both teams serving up their best football to make this one of the best matches of the competition so far. The result will certainly enhance Dungarvan's prospects of retaining the title for the third year in a row, but obviously they will need to improve their scoring power as in this game six of their eight scores came from frees.

PLAY

Ballinacourty dominated the early exchanges and had the first point on the scoreboard when Jimmy Healy sent over in the 5th minute. By the 7th minute they had registered three wides and it was after this that Dungarvan began to settle and had their first wide of the game in the 9th minute. P.P. Ferncombe who was the champi-

ons' top scorer had their first point in the 10th minute.

John Mulligan's pointed free in the 14th minute restored the lead for Ballinacourty and a minute later Sean 'Hiker' McGrath had a splendid score to extend the challengers lead to two points. From the kick-out Dungarvan broke up field and caught the Ballinacourty defence napping and Ger Beresford's very well taken goal changed the trend of the match at this stage. Morrie Ferncombe's points in the 19th and 21st minutes gave Dungarvan a 1-3 to 0-3 lead and they were now improving their game. Ballinacourty however fought back and had a couple of wides before John Mulligan had 'Courty's final score of the half with a pointed free. P.P. Ferncombe restored Dungarvan's three points lead in the 28th minute to leave the score 1-4 to 0-4 at halftime.

PRESSURE

Ballinacourty put on the pressure from the restart and John Curran's rocket like shot was brilliantly saved by

David O'Connor at the expense of a '65' which was kicked in by John Mulligan and finished to the net by John McGrath to leave the teams level in the 34th minute. 'Courty piled on the pressure and John Mulligan's converted free gave them the lead in the 35th minute, but despite further pressure throughout the game, that was the final score for the challengers. Their failure to score from a 38th minute attack, when they put the ball everywhere except in the net, was the deciding factor as far as they were concerned. It was here that the game slipped from them.

Dungarvan after a very uncomfortable ten minutes at the start of the second half, now pulled out all the stops and continuous pressure yielded a free which Morrie Ferncombe converted to level the play in the 45th minute. A 49th minute free was sent over by the very accurate P.P. Ferncombe to give the champions a one point lead and the same player made it 1-7 to 1-5 in the 55th minute and with the exchanges becoming hectic as Dungarvan fought for the 'insurance' point, Ballinacourty came back and were awarded a penalty in the dying seconds of the game. Amazingly John Mulligan, shooting for the corner of the net, sent the ball inches wide to the great relief of the jubilant Dungarvan players.

The game ended after the kick out. The champions will have every reason to feel pleased and relieved as they are now certain to qualify. It will be difficult to visualise any side taking the title from them now and this seemed to be the opinion of very many people after the game.

Co. Council Approves Of New Coastal Authority

In the course of a report to the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn referred to the severe storms of the December-February period in the winter of 1989-90 which resulted in extensive and widespread damage to many coastal areas. Emergency repairs were estimated at £13 million nationally and were assisted by the Government who allocated £3 million towards the cost of remedial works. Waterford Co. Council expended just under £1 million of which 50 p.c. had to be borrowed with a consequent adverse impact on road upkeep and other services during the loan repayment period.

The Co. Engineer's report said that a Technical Committee was established in 1991 to examine the state of the country's coastal defences and this committee found out that of a total coastline of 5,800 kms in the Republic, over 1500 kms (26 p.c.) were at risk and some 490 kms (8.5 p.c.) required immediate attention at an estimated cost of £125 million.

The Technical Committee reported that Co. Waterford has a coastline (including estuary) of 170 kms of which 22 kms (13 p.c.) are at risk and 29 kms (17 p.c.) require urgent attention at an estimated cost of £5.13 million. Works are required at 20 locations, notably at Abbeyside, Ardmore, Ballyvoile, Bonmahon, Clonea, Cunnigar (Dungarvan), Tramore, Whiting Bay and Woodstown.

Mr. O'Flynn said that the

principal recommendations of the Technical Committee were the establishment of a National Coastal Authority to be responsible for all coastal matters and for combating ongoing coastal erosion and a new Coastal Management Act which would replace the existing unsatisfactory Foreshore Act and Coastal Protection Act. The Committee further recommended the preparation of Coastal Zone Management Plans for the entire coast to include guidelines for controlling development in sensitive coastal areas.

The Co. Engineer concluded by stating "the Report is a timely and valuable contribution to the state of knowledge of Ireland's coastline and its needs and it is hoped it will be useful to the Government in determining funding requirements and in seeking E.C. support".

EC Structural Fund Priority Sought For West Waterford Regional Water Scheme

He added that the essential point was that if the Council did not move on it soon, the scheme would not comply with the 1997 time limit.

Cllr. Flynn said that it was very important that the scheme should go in with the present round of proposals and that the necessary money for it be provided.

It was agreed that Cllr. Flynn should submit a notice of motion to cover the proposal for the next Council meeting.

CAPPOQUIN INDUSTRIAL ESTATE ROAD

Cllr. O. Wilkinson said that a scheme to improve the road to the Industrial Estate in Cappoquin should also be included in the list. He had raised this matter before as the road which was less than a mile in length was "the lifeline for industry in West Waterford". It was now in a very bad condition and because of the amount of transport and the number of people using it, coming and going to the industrial concerns at the Estate, it required priority, he said.

The Co. Engineer pointed out that where these EC structural Fund grants were concerned they were competing with 26 other County Councils and unless their schemes could compare with the others there was little point in submitting them. He added that if they

could get some "discretionary" grants from the Department they might be able to do something with the road themselves.

The Chairman Cllr. B. Kyne advised that the Council should get involved as much as possible where these Structural Funds were concerned or else they would be just left sitting.

Finally on the proposal of Cllr. R. Walsh seconded by Cllr. O. Coffey, the list as submitted with the report of the Co. Secretary was approved.

1992 People Of The Year Awards Launched In Waterford

Nominations are being sought in the eighteenth People of the Year Awards which were launched yesterday in Waterford by the Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Pat Power.

The awards, sponsored for the third consecutive year by the VHI and organised by the Rehabilitation Institute, aim to recognise the contributions made by Ireland's outstanding citizens.
