## Forestry Planting Policy In County Creating Hazards

The policy of Coillte Teoranta which now has charge of forestry in planting conifers in various parts of the county came in for a good deal of criticism at a special meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

The matter was raised by the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne who asked whether any indications had been received from Coillte by the Council that forest walks could be closed to the public due to difficulties concerning public liability insurance.

In reply, the Acting County Manager, Mr. B. J. McNally said the only communication received from Coillte concerned the forest walk at Glenshelane Wood in Cappoquin. In this they asked whether the Council would be prepared to take over the public lia-

bility there. "The answer to the query was 'no'" said Mr. McNally who added that the Council was covered in respect of the work which they had done there themselves.

Cllr. Kyne said that each of the forest walks was a vital

asset to the tourist industry throughout the county and if there was now a difficulty in regard to public liability insurance where these walks were concerned then the members of the Council

## Floodlighting At Lismore — Who Pays The Piper?

At the special meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday Cllr. W. McDonnell referred to the floodlighting of the Castle and Cathedral in Lismore last year and said that it had been agreed that the Catholic Church there should be included. This had not happened and he asked why.

Cllr. McDonnell went on to say that the Co. Manager had assured him last year that it would be included in phase 2 of the plan and he thought that the Council should now ask the E.S.B. to floodlight the Catholic Church immediately to put it on a par with the Castle and the Cathedral. Already this year some 14,000 tourists had visited Lismore, he added.

Cllr. J. Quirke seconded the proposal.

Mr. B. J. McNally, Acting Co. Manager then posed the question, "what are we to use for money?" and added "we received a grant toward phase 1 from Bord Failte but have heard nothing so far this year."

Cllr. McDonnell said he felt sure all that had been threshed out last year and he had got an assurance that it would be carried out.

It was agreed that Cllr. McDonnell would raise the matter again at the next Council meeting when the question of financing the project could be discussed.

The small but beautiful village of Villierstown in West Waterford is very busy. Saturday, September 12 is to be a very special day, when President Mary Robinson has kindly consented to open a Festival of Flowers in the old historic church there.

The theme of the Festival is the European Community, and Flower Clubs from Conna, Youghal, Waterford/Tramore, Blackrock, Cappoquin, Cobh, East Cork, Fermoy/Mitchelstown and Dungarvan are combining to create what will surely be a spectacular display, each club having a country of the E.C. as its inspiration.

There is another very special reason for the Village to welcome the President, because this year Villierstown is 250 years old. It was in 1742 that the Village and the Church were built by John Villiers, first Earl of Grandison, when he established a linen industry on his estate.

The Church is now used as a Community Centre, and it was to encourage interest in

# Urban Council Honours Dungarvan Cyclists



Dungarvan Urban District Council accorded their highest honour to two of Dungarvan's best known sportsmen, cyclists Stephen Spratt (C.M.P. Blarney) and Robert Power (Cidona Carrick Wheelers) when they hosted a Civic Reception in their honour at the Council Chambers in the Town Hall on Tuesday night of last week.

Present at the Reception were U.D.C. Chairwoman, Cllr. Nuala Ryan and members of Dungarvan U.D.C., family members and friends of the cyclists and Ray Moloney, representing Town Clerk, Bertie White who was absent due to holidays.

Tom Keith proved a most capable M.C. for the occasion and the wonderful buffet was provided by Merry's Restaurant of Main Street.

Cllr. Ryan formally welcomed all present to the reception, particularly their honoured guests Stephen Spratt and Robert Power, whose names had dominated the Irish cycling scene for some years.

Both of them, she said, had brought great honour and distinction to the town through their achievements in the world of cycling and it was with great satisfaction that they, as a Council, extended this Civic Reception to them that evening. "It is" she said, "the highest honour available to us to bestow and I can think of no more

worthy recipients than both of you."

"Stephen Spratt's list of achievements would" Cllr. Ryan said "keep us here all night if I were to detail them all, but suffice to say that he has won virtually every honour amateur cycling in this country has to offer."

It had been a magnificent year for Stephen, she said, winning many domestic races, but his victory in the F.B.D. Milk Ras, would stay in the memory of everyone who had any interest in Dungarvan sport and indeed many more besides.

He followed this up, she said, with a strong, determined and patriotic Tour of Britain Milk Race and it was no small contribution of his which saw fellow Irishman Conor Henry become the first Irish man to win the biggest amateur cycle race in Britain.

#### CHOSEN FOR OLYMPICS

Continuing Cllr. Ryan said — "When the Council decided to honour these two sportsmen Robert Power

had just been chosen to represent his country in the Olympics in Barcelona.

"A most unfortunate traffic accident robbed him, and us, of a chance of Olympic glory, but we are pleased and relieved that he is here with us this evening, almost in full health again."

Olympic honours she said would only have been the icing on the cake for Robert, who had also been a dominant force in cycling not only in Ireland but on the amateur circuit abroad and there were few honours he had not won, or few trophies that had not stood on his sideboard.

"His third place in this year's F.B.D. Milk Ras" she said, "reflects the unselfish nature of his participation in his sport and in according him a Civic Reception in 1988, this Council recognised the great honour he had brought to the town, even in his early years."

They were, Cllr. Ryan said, especially pleased to honour a son of their esteemed colleague Cllr. Paddy Power, who had made a valued contribution to the administration of the town during the life of this Council.

She then presented both cyclists with framed illuminated scrolls to commemorate the occasion.

Vice-Chairman Tony Wright in praising the achievements of the cyclists spoke of the hard silent training that athletes had to do and he said that they had been a great example to the younger people of the town, which could be seen in the number of young people now cycling. Young people he said, like to emulate their sporting heroes and this was good as it distracted them from less favourable activity.

Councillors Dixon, O'Riordan, Hallahan, Walsh,

Goode and Kyne also joined in the tributes to both cyclists while Robert's father Cllr. Paddy Power noted that during the F.B.D. Milk Ras both had shown their friendship when they worked together to "keep out the Italians." "Ye are the best of friends" he told them "long may that continue."

#### HONOUR AND PRIVILEGE

Stephen Spratt in thanking the Council said it was an honour and a privilege for him to have such fine tributes paid to him by the Council. "It means a lot to me", he said "to be honoured in this way."

Stephen went on to praise Dungarvan which he described as a very nice town and its people who he said were very friendly. He had travelled to many places and was now based in Cork and he had always been proud to bring his friends to Dungarvan, something he could not say about other towns he had been in.

Robert Power in thanking the Council for the wonderful Reception also thanked the people of the area for what they had done for him before the Olympics. "When I told my Irish team mates about the support they had given me, they couldn't believe it" he said.

He also referred to the great reception Stephen and himself got from the people of the town when the Ras came through Dungarvan. It was, he said, the biggest turn-out of the Ras.

In again thanking the Council he said "it is a great honour for me to be here tonight for this Civic Reception."

Other speakers at the very pleasant function were Tommy Sheehan, President, Cidona Carrick Wheelers Cycling Club and Muiris O Ceallaig, Waterford Cycling Club.

## Traffic Problems At Lismore Bridge

Cllr. Willie McDonnell at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan referred to complaints he had received concerning the difficulty which lorries coming from the Ballyduff direction had in negotiating the bend at the bridge over the Ownashad river in Lismore.

He said on three occasions recently lorries travelling towards Cappoquin had knocked the wall on the bridge and the reason

was that the roadway was so narrow. "This is an ongoing problem," said Cllr. McDonnell, "and in the long term there will be major traffic problems there unless something can be done to widen the road."

## Walking Guide By Ballyamc' Lady

In her on-going efforts to make the attractions of the Comeragh and the Maonavullagh Mountains and particularly the beautiful Nire Valley known to tourists, Eileen Ryan, well-known Clonnav Guest-house owner, has already published many guides to the area. One of her guides "Angling Holidays" gives valuable information on fishing on the Suir, Nire and Tar rivers. Recently she commissioned and funded a "Walking Guide" to the mountains, the area is, of course, a walkers paradise.

This guide includes a series of maps 1:25000 with 5 metre contour and this is available in colour. The cartography was done by Pat and Marlena Healy and the research involved aerial photography and field surveys. The legend is detailed

and up-to-date. This guide incorporates the full range of mountains from the foothills at Clonmel to the coast of Dungarvan.

The marked walks are all very attractive, incorporating a variety of terrain and a choice of routes from the higher ridge to a lower circuit of Glenary Valley.

This is a welcome addition to the growing series of publications on these North Waterford mountains and is an invaluable source for any walker discovering the beauty and the challenges of the Comeragh Mountains.

In this latest publication she has literally blazed a trail, since most of the existing maps are out of date and do not show much of the extensive development of woodland on the lower slopes of the hills. This is a useful guide for any tourist or for anybody who enjoys mountain walking.

## NO PRIVACY FOR DOLE PEOPLE

The procedure used by Social Welfare Department inspectors when interviewing recipients of unemployment benefit in Ardfinnan have been condemned by South Tipperary/West Waterford T.D., Theresa Ahearn. She accused the Department of packing a crowd into the hall one day in the village of Ardfinnan without ensuring privacy or confidentiality for the people concerned.

The indignity of being out of work is bad enough but to conduct interviews in a crowded hall was not good enough, she said. The people of Ardfinnan were annoyed and upset about what happened in

the hall that day, Tuesday, May 19. People are not prepared to accept this kind of treatment, bad and all as their circumstances were.

The Department in a reply to Deputy Ahearn, said that no formal interviewing took place in the hall at Ardfinnan on that day. The people present were spoken to briefly. Where in-depth interviews were required a written request was sent to the person to attend at a specified time and date in the Hall and were conducted in two separate rooms which afforded the person complete privacy.

# Co. Council Approves County Development Plan

The County Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally, in the course of a report submitted to the August monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last week stated that the Office of Public Works (OPW) had submitted an observation requesting that an addition be made to the draft County Development Plan with regard to National Monuments. This requested that where any developments might impinge on a monument, the developer may be required to employ an archaeologist at his own expense to conduct test excavations to determine the effect of the development on the monument.

Cllr. T. Cunningham raised the question of public liability of landowners in regard to people entering lands to see such monuments and who might sustain injuries and Mr. J. Shine, Chief Executive Planning Engineer, agreed that this was a matter which badly needed to be looked into.

Cllr. M. Queally said that if the Council erected signposts to such monuments he believed it would be the Council and not the landowner who would be responsible. "I think that it would be most unfair that farmers should have to bear such public liability insurance which can be very costly," he said.

Cllr. Queally went on to say that in regard to such things as old ring forts he thought the OPW was going too far in the demands they

make on landowners.

Mr. Shine said that the OPW had these powers and it might be a good thing as this put developers on guard as to their responsibilities where such things were concerned.

On the proposal of Cllr. Queally seconded by Cllr. Austin Flynn it was unanimously agreed not to accede to the suggestion of the OPW.

### OTHER SUBMISSIONS

Mr. Declan McGrath, 2 Morley Terrace, Waterford in two lengthy submissions suggested that in addition to the designation of the Comeragh Mountains as an area of high amenity, a more rigorous statutory designation to ensure the mountain environment from further deterioration should be added to the draft plan. In this regard

he suggested that the Comeragh and Monavullagh mountains should, at the very minimum, be designated as an area of Scientific interest.

He also referred to the abandoned Waterford to Dungarvan railway line developed in conjunction with the old Quigley Magnesite Plant at Ballinacourty and suggested that the route which has important scenic and recreational attractions could be developed and promoted as a tourist amenity, locally, nationally and internationally.

Referring to these submissions, Mr. Shine felt there was no need to include anything specific in the development plan as both merited consideration.

On the proposal of Cllr. B. O'Shea, T.D. it was agreed to write to Iamrod Eireann

asking for their intentions about the railway line.

Cllr. O. Wilkinson referring to the mountain range said that he had referred previously to the sheep grazing problem there. There was now a new problem in the Crowhill area near Melleray in regard to the cutting and planting of trees by Coillte which he said was having a visual effect in a most attractive environmental area. He felt that a protest should be sent to Coillte about the situation.

This was agreed and then on the proposal of Cllr. R. Walsh second by the Chairman, Cllr. Kyne, the draft plan as submitted was approved unanimously.

Minister should also be asked that the recently introduced increased grant limits be applied not only to students starting third level education this year but to those who are already in college.


It was also decided to protest to the Department about the Government decision to means test students applying for grants under the European Social Fund (ESF).

## OUR LOCALITY



The construction of Devonshire Bridge was financed by the Fifth Duke of Devonshire at a cost of £5,000. The work on the bridge from beginning to end was supervised and carried out by Jesse Hartley who was born in Pontefract, Yorkshire in the year 1750. He was the son of a stonemason bridgemaster. He worked on the Bridge at Ferrybridge, Yorkshire and his next work was Castleford Bridge, Yorkshire which has an inscription stone "Jesse Hartley Builder, 1808". He came to Abbeyside and Dungarvan to construct the Bridge and Causeway in 1809 and remained here until 1818. While in Ireland Hartley married Ellen Penny, daughter of the Seneschal William Penny. [Seneschal = steward who superintended feasts and domestic cere-

monies.] Jesse Hartley is frequently mentioned in a series of Ledgers in the National Library, where he is mentioned as "Jesse Hartley architect."

In relation to the Bridge there is an entry in them — Dec. 25, 1818 — G. B. Jackson on account of timber for Dungarvan Bridge:— £328.

Another entry refers to the compensation given to tenants through whose property the new road from the causeway was constructed:

Jan. 11 1817 — "Paid sundry persons, half years rent due Sept. 29, 1816 for giving up their houses and small plots of ground at Abbeyside where the new road leading from the Bridge now runs."

The Bridge as built is both graceful and striking in appearance. It is single

arched and built of rusticated sandstone, all of which was imported from England. It has massive voissoirs [a series of stones shaped like wedges, with which one arch is constructed the middle one of which is called the keystone.] The keystone is a scroll keystone. The piers have rectangular panels with a cornice above, and over this is a small limestone panel. It is often said that the foundations were made from blankets but whether this is an 'old wives tale' or not it is difficult to tell. The author in his research into the construction of the bridge did not come across any reference to the matter of the blankets. The construction of the Bridge and Causeway must have been a massive improvement to the Abbeyside/Dungarvan area. The Bridge was opened in 1816.

## Traffic Problems Near Lismore Bridge

At the August monthly meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Willie McDonnell referred to the difficulty being experienced by large vehicles coming from Ballyduff and turning towards Cappoquin near Lismore Bridge and damaging the parapet walls on the bridge over the adjacent Owenshad river.

He has now received a communication from Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer on the matter which states that Mr. O'Flynn had referred the problem to the Area Engineer who confirmed that indeed such difficulties were being encountered and that the wall had been scraped on a number of occasions but that it had not been damaged badly at least in recent years.

Mr. O'Flynn's letter goes

on: "The problem is not easily soluble because of the significant difference in levels between the roadway at the location and the surrounding ground. Additionally it is most unlikely that a by-pass would be provided at Lismore for quite a few years. In the meantime, we can only hope that due care and caution is exer-

cised by drivers in making this turn."

Commenting on the Co. Engineer's letter, Cllr. McDonnell said that he could see major traffic problems at Lismore Bridge in the future and he thought that the Council should consider planning ahead for improvements which might be funded by E.C. grants.

## Council To Honour Defence Forces Chiefs

On Thursday of next week, September 10, Dungarvan Urban Council are to honour two locally born Chiefs of our Defence Forces with a Civic Reception. The unique ceremony is planned to take place partly in the open air (weather permitting) and at the Town Hall.

Commodore Joseph Deasy, Flag Officer Commanding the Naval Service who entered the Navy as a Cadet in November, 1950 is due to retire shortly. Married with four children, he lives with his wife Carmel at McKee House, Dublin. He was born in Dungarvan in 1932.

Brigadier General Tom Quinlan who was recently appointed General Officer Commanding Southern Command is a native of Colligan. Educated at Coolnasmear N.S. and Dungarvan C.B.S., he joined the Defence Forces as a Cadet in 1953 and was commissioned in Decem-

ber 1954. In 1985 he was appointed O/C Curragh Military College following a distinguished period of active service during which he served in the Congo where he was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal in 1961, Cyprus in 1968 and again as O/C 45th Infantry Battalion in Lebanon in 1979. He also served in the Mid-East as chief observer in Cairo in 1980/82 and as Military Advisor to the Irish delegation at the Conference on Security and Co-operation in Europe since November 1990 being based in Vienna and Helsinki.

He was promoted Brigadier General in July this year and appointed O/C Southern Command.

The Civic Reception will commence at 7.30 p.m. on September 10 when Guards of Honour will be inspected at Harbour View (Look-Out) following which the Dungarvan Brass Band will lead the Council and guests to the Town Hall for the formal reception.

It is indeed unique that two such high-ranking officers in our Defence Forces should be born in the town and it is only right and proper that they should now be accorded such a top civic honour.

## Minister Pays Tribute To County Management System

The 50th anniversary of the County Management System was marked by a special function in Dublin last week when the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith, T.D. addressed a gathering of County and City Managers and retired Managers.

The County Management Act under which the system was introduced became law in June 1940 and it was brought into operation in August 1942. Initially, Counties Waterford and Kilkenny were administratively joined under the jurisdiction of the late Simon Moynihan who was the first County Manager appointed under the new Act. He had previously acted as Commissioner, replacing the County Council for Waterford which had been abolished some years earlier for failure to strike a rate during the period which has come to be remembered as "the economic war." The

County Council was then reconstituted when the new County Management Act became operative.

Speaking at last week's function in Dublin, the Minister, Mr. Smith, said that, without doubt, the Management system has been one of this country's finest contributions to the development of local government and public administration generally.

The success of the system, the Minister added, was due in no small measure to the calibre and contribution of individual Managers and he expressed his appreciation and that of his Department of the pivotal role of Man-

agers in the development of local areas.

Certainly County Waterford has been well served by the County Managers it has had down through the years since the late Simon Moynihan first took over the executive role of local government in the county and not least by our present County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley.

Since his advent to the county in 1980, Mr. Hurley has contributed enormously to local development particularly in the field of tourism and which has now placed the Deise county among the leading tourism centres in the country.



## Popular 'Winning Streak' Game Show Returns To R.T.E. 1



# Official Presentation Of All-Ireland Final Jerseys

## Minor Trophies?

After the drawn Munster final game in Cork, a writer who is obviously very supportive of Waterford, wrote



that this new team from the Deise is good enough to lift the Irish Press Cup for their third time. Having done quite an amount of research into the matter I discovered that a Waterford minor hurling team have never won an All-Ireland trophy, yet anyway.

On a cold February afternoon in 1930 after team captain Paddy Donnelly, R.I.P. from Passage, led his team to victory in the delayed 1929 minor hurling final, the Association President, Sean Ryan, shook hands with the players and congratulated them on winning and that was the end of the presentation ceremony as there was no cup.

What was very surprising to find was that there was no cup either in 1948 and our winning captain Mick Flannelly, Mount Sion having got a shake-hands from the then President, Dan O'Rourke, was shouldered off by a group of our excited supporters. That was the end of that post All-Ireland ceremony.

In the following year, 1949, a cup was donated to the G.A.A. by the Irish Press Group and in that year it was presented to Tipperary who had beaten Kilkenny by 6-5 to 2-4.

So, in fact, Waterford are the only one of the nine leading hurling counties, never to have been presented with an All-Ireland underage hurling trophy.



# Excitement At Fever Pitch As Waterford Prepare To Meet Galway In The All-Ireland Minor Hurling Final

## Thousands Of Deise Supporters Travelling To Croke Park

It is just on 44 years since a headline like the above appeared on a Waterford newspaper and while we did have joyful and sorrowful engagements in Croke Park and elsewhere in the meantime, we did not have anything to compare with '48, as far as the minors are concerned until now and it is no wonder that the entire county are caught up in the excitement of it all.

The members of the panel are all reporting fit and at the training session in Fraher Field on Sunday evening, the selectors said that they were very pleased with the way the preparation had gone and even though they were fully

aware of the high standard of this present Galway team, they were, nevertheless, confident that if Waterford played to form, they will win.

The selectors had travelled to Limerick to watch Galway beat Kilkenny in the replay of their drawn match at Croke Park in the first semi-final and what they saw, left them with no illusions about the quality of the Connaught champions who were good enough to overpower fancied Kilkenny in their second game. They know that this final will be difficult to win and that it will require every player, playing at his very best for a full hour to give us a good chance, but they also very firmly believe that our team are good enough to successfully mount this challenge. Team manager Jim Greene told me on Sunday evening that he had never experienced such extraordinary loyalty and commitment in a group of young hurlers and said that there was nothing more that the boys could give by way of dedication and co-operation on every one of the very many occasions on which they met in training since February. He said they were a group of young players fit to be worthy champions. Eddie Cunningham the long serving and most experienced selector at underage level, with Pat Tyler Walsh, Jack Laffan and Billy O'Neill, both with years of experience in dealing with young players in all the juvenile grades, all held similar views about this group, whom they described as being special.

### VOTE OF CONFIDENCE

When the team for the All-Ireland final was announced on Wednesday evening of last week, no one was surprised that the selectors gave a vote of confidence to the team which started against Antrim in the semi-final. This indicated that the changes that were made during the Antrim match were purely experimental and a case of the selectors availing of the chance to give three substitutes the feel of Croke Park. In goal the young Ballygunner man, Pat Haran, has done little

wrong up to this and he does not seem in any way inhibited by Croke Park. This is very encouraging.

Our full backline may have had a couple of spasms of nervousness during the semi-final, but they acquitted themselves very well and kept the goals out until the team was changed about ten minutes from the end. Tom Morrissey, team captain Paddy O'Donnell and his clubmate James O'Connor kept their lines intact in two blistering Munster finals, and I'm sure they will do so again here against Galway. Our halfback line is one of our strongest sectors and will be given special attention. Anthony Kirwan, Ger Harris and Tom Feeney impressed the Galway observers in Croke Park on the day we qualified and Joe McDonnagh, who is one of the Tribesmen's most astute hurling judges, told me last week-end, that it will be difficult for Galway to breach the Waterford defence if they play to top form. In the middle of the field Fintan O'Shea and Tom Kiely have struck up a very successful partnership and they have survived with their reputations unscathed after battles with the best that Tipperary, Clare and Antrim could throw at them. A good display by both these players will greatly enhance our chances of winning. All our forwards have scored in at least two of the five games so far and all are very well capable of taking their scores, given the chance. In the half-line are John P. Fitzpatrick, who represented us in the national skills finals four years ago, Derek McGrath, who has scored in four of our games so far, and John Joe Ronayne whose brilliant goal against Tipperary in the replay was the kind of score that wins matches. Raymond Ryan, Paul Foley and Paul Flynn must be as good a full forward line as there has been in the game at this grade for many years. Between them they have scored a total of 10-30 on the way. If they 'click' on Sunday, I for one would have no worries about the outcome.

### WORTHY CHALLENGERS

At the same time, I do not wish to convey the foolish notion that Galway will not be very worthy challengers and very difficult to beat. The manner in which they came from behind to draw with the highly rated Kilkenny and then beat them decisively, entitles them to the greatest respect. Seven of the side were on the winning team in the Tony Forristal tournament final four years ago in Waterford and all their players have come up to minor grade through their under 12, under 14 and under 16 grades, so their standards must be good.

We came through two blistering provincial finals and that in any man's judgement, must count for something. The

His scoring rate had been so consistent during the 1948 All-Ireland campaign with a grand total of 4-8. He was a playing member of the Waterford senior football team, 1957, who defeated Kerry who were All-Ireland senior champions in 1956. Michael was marking the great Tadghy Lyne with distinction on that great day for Waterford football. Michael lives in Cappoquin and has his own business —





**MICHAEL KELLEHER**

At centre back, Michael Kelleher, was the pillar of a great Waterford defence in which so many attacks perished. He was an outstanding hurler both as a ground and air ball striker. One feature was his great goal from 94 yards direct in the semi-final versus Galway. He was born in Mayo as his father and mother left Cappoquin. His father was appointed Station Master but returned to Cappoquin to take up similar duties a few years later. However, following the All-Ireland victory he went to stay with his sister in Dublin and played with the Crokes GAA Club of Dublin. At that time he could not play with Waterford as one could only play for the county of one's birth or one's place of residence. What a loss he was to Waterford hurling teams! However, he now resides in England and is a constant visitor to Cappoquin.

**MICHAEL BROWNE**

Michael Browne was a key figure in this great Waterford minor team of 1948. His understanding at corner-forward with his team mates was just unbelievable, especially with Maurice McHugh. He laid on scoring chance after chance. Michael had to leave Cappoquin for England to find work. He is now retired and lives with his wife at Sea Park, Abbeyside. Michael's total scoring during the campaign was 2-2.

**VINCENT WALSH**

Vincent Walsh was part of a great half back line and his consistent play all through 1948 paved the way for this great triumph. Vincent played with UCC and Cappoquin and when he qualified in college he too had to seek employment in England.

**JOE FLYNN**

Goalkeeper Joe Flynn was the player that all his teammates depended upon and what an inspiration he was to them all — with his great displays and his placing of every ball he cleared. With his coolness he defied the best that Clare, Tipperary, Galway and Kilkenny in the final could throw at him. Joe left Cappoquin for New York later and what a great part he played in the Waterford New York teams for many years. Joe of course is married to Rose Lonergan a member of that great GAA family, the Lonergans of Cappoquin. Rose played camogie for Waterford and Cappoquin with distinction for many years.

**MICK JOE RYAN**

He is now Very Rev. Fr. M. J. Ryan and is P.P. in Stradbally. He continued to play hurling for a number of years but turned to football in a big way with the Brickey Rangers Club and became solidly attached to that club. Still a very committed GAA person he is very much looking forward to Sunday and a win for Waterford.

**JOHN BOYLE**

He is also a Parish Priest and is now administering in Waterford City. He, too, continued playing with Dungarvan Club even when he was studying at St. John's for the priesthood. Continued his very keen interest in hurling.

**MICHAEL SHALLOE**

Played for a time after '48 before joining Irish Shipping. Started his own business in Dublin. Is married and still living in Dublin.

**TOMSIE DEE**

Continued playing with Dungarvan for several years and won a senior football championship medal with the club in 1954. Became an official in the Office of Public Works. Now lives in Thurles and is married. Score 1-0.

**MARTIN MORRISSEY**

Continued to play for Mount Sion and won senior hurling and football medals with them. Married Eleanor Conlon, sister of midfielder Joe, on the '48 team. Had a successful upholstery business. Now retired.

**SEAN HAYDEN**

Played with the county in senior and as full back won several county senior championship medals

with Mount Sion. Continued playing well into the sixties. Married and now living in Ferrybank in retirement.

**JOE CONLON**

Won senior hurling championship medals with Mount Sion and continued playing until he moved to Dublin where he joined the Civil Service and is an executive in the Department of Finance. Married. Score 1-2.



Holds the record in Waterford for being selected on Munster football teams. Was an intercounty referee who handled Munster final and All-Ireland semi-final. Was Waterford's Munster Council representative for more than 20 years. Still involved with Dun-

Continued to play with Dungarvan in senior hurling for three years before transferring to Abbeyside/Ballinacourty with whom he played in senior and junior grades. Took a great interest in Irish music and Irish dancing and set up his own school.

### MAURICE MCHUGH

Was the top scorer in the '48 campaign and resumed after having to retire injured in the All-Ireland final. Had ten stitches in his head wound on the night of the '48 All-Ireland. Continued to play with the county up to 1952 and also with Abbeyside in junior and senior during those years. Is now married with one child and is a Staff Officer in the County Council. Scored total of 9-4.

### PADDY O'CONNOR

Continued to play for a number of years after '48 with Abbeyside and played in two county senior hurling finals with the village. Went to live in Caherciveen, Co. Kerry where he is a health inspector. Married and is still very interested in the fortunes of his club and county. Scored 3-2.

### DONAL WHELAN

Continued playing with his club and with the county up to the mid-sixties. Was on the All-Ireland teams of 1957, '59 and '63, also won Oireachtas and National League medals with Waterford. Played for Munster in hurling on a number of occasions. Was Waterford's Central Council representative for 14 years. Headmaster in Kilmac-thomas Vocational School.

### TOM GALLAGHER

Played for Waterford and for Mount Sion, with whom he won county championship medals. He is the only member of the 1948 panel to have died. Most of his '48 colleagues were present at his burial in 1985. Scored 2-5.

### MICK FLANNELLY

Captained the team and continued playing and won a record nine senior hurling medals with

Mount Sion and also won football championship. Played for Waterford in 1957, '59 and '63. Won Oireachtas and National League medals with the county. Moved to Roanmore and was their trainer in their early days. Married. Scored 0-4.

### JOE FLANNELLY

Played with Mount Sion

for a while after '48 before moving to Dublin to work with the Irish Independent. Won senior hurling championships with the Dublin based Kilkenny team Moondarrig and ended his playing career with his local junior club Craobh Ciarain. Married and

living in Dublin. Never misses a game when Waterford are playing in hurling or football.

### BRENDAN FOLEY

He played with Ferrybank for a few years after '48 but then faded from the scene altogether and took no further part in the games.

# THE 1948 ITINERARY

The senior and minor teams travelled together for the 1948 hurling double and the arrangement worked out very satisfactorily. They both travelled to Naas on the Saturday evening and travelled up to Croke Park on the Sunday forenoon. When they were getting ready for the minor game, there was pandemonium when it was

found that the Cappoquin contingent of six members of the panel had not arrived. For a short while it was expected that a major reshuffle of the team would be necessary, but to the relief of everyone, they arrived having been involved in a road accident.

After the historic victories the teams were feted

at Cleary's famous restaurant in O'Connell St. I am looking at the actual menu as I write and am reading about the "salmon from the river Blackwater, bacon from Denny's of Waterford and Dungarvan potatoes" which was served to the champions. Afterwards the group returned to the Royal Hotel, Naas, and then came home to Waterford on the

Monday to a tumultuous reception in the city, which had been organised by the Mayor, Cllr. Teddy Lynch and his assistant, P. Kenneally, who was Secretary.

It is interesting to note that the majority of the people on the welcoming committee were leading lights in the Association then and for a very long time afterwards. T. J. Morrissey and M. Dowling were the joint treasurers and the committee were Very Rev. T. B. Walsh, P.P., Liam Raftis, Alderman J. Aylward, Billy Jones, M. Browne, B. Cunningham, Councillors P. O'Connor, M. M. Halley, Messrs Liam Walsh, Richie Grant, Charlie Ware, S. Cummins, M. Coffey, M. Kelleher, T. J. Drohan, M. Phelan, M. McCarthy,

Tom Pinkert, S. O'Meara, T. B. Morrissey, S. Murphy, W. Keane and P. Kelly.

After the meal, a toast to Ireland was proposed by the Mayor of Waterford and responded to by M. V. O'Donoghue, Chairman of the Board. The toast to the guests was proposed by Alderman J. Aylward and responded to by Rev. Bro. Murray.

## DUNGARVAN RECEPTION

By comparison, this was

a low-key affair which was organised to honour the players from the Dungarvan area who were involved with the teams. The photographs of both teams were on the menu which was printed in blue and white and displayed the Dungarvan Coat of Arms on the cover. This celebration was held on October 5 in Dungarvan.

## 1948 Programme

On Sunday next patrons will pay £1.50 for the match programme but looking at the 1948 official programme as I write, I see that the cost was 4 old pence (about 2p) in today's money. It kept information to a minimum (it did not give the names of either of the referees who were J. Rosengrave, Dublin, for the minor and Con Murphy, Cork, for the senior final which we also won).

The minor teams were listed in Irish and without the full Christian name.

An advertisement on the programme showed that senior hurleys cost seven shillings and sixpence, hurling balls week six shillings and jerseys cost anything from nine to fifteen shillings, from the famous Dan Hobbs Outfitter Stores, 57, Patrick St., Cork. The entertainment for the programme at Croke Park that day was provided by the Artane Boys Band

who played the following music — Davis Centenary March, Selections from the Operas of Balfe, Sousa On Parade, Melodies of Victor Herbert, Roisin Dhu, Trial by Jury and Croppy Boy.

The scores were — M.H. Waterford 3-8 Kilkenny 4-2. S.H. Waterford 6-7 Dublin 4-2.

The ball was thrown in by Most Rev. Dr. Kinane, Archbishop of Cashel and Emly. The official attendance was 61,742 and the gate receipts were £5,302-17-0.

Of the 5 minor hurling selectors in 1948, four have passed to their eternal reward and only Pat Fanning, who was subsequently to become County Board Chairman, Chairman of the Munster Council and President of the Association, still survives. He was a selector

and one of the inspirational figures behind our rise to hurling fame in the fifties. The other selectors were Paddy Cunningham, after whom the Western Board M.H. Championship Cup is named, Mick Gallagher, Rev. Bro. Murray and Rev. Bro. O'Connor.

And also 1948 was the year in which the younger of the two Wright brothers, the famous airplane pioneers, died, but the biggest tragedy of that historic year was the assassination of the great Mahatma Gandhi, Indian political and religious leader.





Words do scant justice to the performances of Waterford. It was an occasion requiring all rather than some of football's virtues. Class was not enough. This was exemplified by the return of Áine Wall, who, 34 days earlier, had sustained a serious wrist injury in a National League quarter-final game against Monaghan. Her very presence bolstered Waterford's confidence, and she went on to play a major role in overcoming Kerry.

Yet this was no "one man show." Every player on this Waterford team, without exception, played an integral part in their victory. The Kerry team have nothing to be ashamed of. They lost honourably, pushing Waterford to the limit of their considerable resources.

## New McCarthy Cup For This Year's Senior Hurling Final

On August 25, in Croke Park, the new McCarthy Cup was for the first time put on show. The McCarthy Cup is hurling's greatest prize, the trophy presented to the winners of the senior All-Ireland hurling final. The original McCarthy Cup was first played for in 1923. It was made by Edmund Johnson, Jeweller of Grafton Street in 1922 and cost £500. Because of the disturbed political situation at the time, the 1921 All-Ireland final was not played until 1923 when Limerick by defeating Dublin became the first holders of the trophy. The trophy has been played for annually since then.

The McCarthy Cup was presented by Liam McCarthy in his own life time in appreciation of the good work being done by the GAA for the youth of Ireland. Liam McCarthy was born in London in 1851. His father came from Ballygarvan, Co. Cork and his mother from Bruff, Co.

Limerick. He became Treasurer of the first Board of the London GAA in 1895 and became President of the London Board in 1898. He subsequently became President of the first Provincial Council established in Britain and he worked effectively and selfishly for the promotion of the GAA and Gaelic games until his death in 1928. His family are still based in Sussex and attend games in Croke Park on a regular basis. They were consulted prior to the work on the cup being commissioned.

The new cup was made by Kilkenny based master craftsman, James Kelly, Gold and Silversmith. Mr. Kelly is a member of the famed James Stephen's Club of Kilkenny. Previous works executed by him include a Eurovision Song Contest Trophy, Presidential Trophy for the Dublin Horse Show and various presentation pieces for Taoiseach of the day.

should be made aware of it. Cllr. Nora Flynn said that there was a lot of concern voiced in the Cappoquin area about the matter. "It would be most unacceptable if the public were unable to use the walk at Glenshelane," said Cllr. Flynn who added that it was the high number of claims and the big injury awards that were now making insurance so costly and such a major problem.

It was at this stage that Cllr. O. Wilkinson raised the criticism on the policy adopted by Coillte in the planting of conifer trees. He said that there was grave disquiet about this in many areas and people from many parts of the county had been in touch with him about the hazards which the kind of planting being followed caused. He thought that it was time that Coillte became subject to planning regulations and certainly he felt that their activities


should be monitored. "When planted first these trees are grand when they're small but it's a completely different thing when they grow up," said Cllr. Wilkinson.

Cllr. C. O Riain said that concern had also been voiced in the Ballymacarby and Clonmel areas, adding that it would be diabolical if a stop was put to forest works.

The Acting Manager, Mr. McNally said that this problem was not one confined to Co. Waterford. It was national and the problem was that insurance cover could not be got.

The Chairman said that there would be tree felling in Glenshelane for some weeks during the Autumn and that could be accepted but he asked the Acting Co. Manager to contact with the Coillte Management in the County to discuss the other problems.
