Accommodation At Dungarvan And Kilmac' Technical Colleges 'Taxed To The Limit'

Members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee were informed at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday that enrolment figures at the Technical College in Dungarvan and at St. Declan's Community School, Kilmacthomas now stood at an all-time high level.

Mr. Donal O Ceilleachair, CEO, however pointed out that because of the very high enrolments, the accommodation capacity at both schools was taxed to the limit with two pre-fab class-

rooms having had to be purchased for each school at a total cost of just over £45,000.

Mr. O Ceilleachair went on to say that there was an increase of 58 students in Kilmacthomas bringing the total attending the school this year to 428 while the addition of 45 new enrolments have brought the numbers attending in Dungarvan to a total of 318. "Both schools are now taxed to the limit and we are talking of an overall increase of 20 per cent in our student in-

take," he said.

The Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne said that the Principals, teaching staffs and students at both schools were to be congratulated on the outstanding results obtained this year.

Congratulations were also extended to the five students from both schools who played with Waterford in the recent All-Ireland minor hurling final. Mr. O Ceilleachair said that even though they had not won, they could all be proud of the fact that four of the team were students at Kil-

macthomas and one at Dungarvan.

EDUCATION GRANTS ASSESSMENT

On the proposal of Mr. Jim Harty, the Committee unanimously agreed to request the Department of Education to make allowances for interest payments being made in the assessment of education grants and also that a person's net income

£0.25m Boost For Gaeltacht TV Production

Udarás na Gaeltachta has announced that it is to establish a revolving fund of £0.25m to boost the production of Irish-language TV programmes by Gaeltacht-based producers and companies. The money will be available through Infheistíochta Teilifíse Teo, a subsidiary company set up by An tUdarás to allocate the funds.

Assistance will be provided for three categories of projects. Up to £3,000 will be available for the development and research of scripts and new programme ideas. Pilot programmes and projects that have been commissioned by a TV company

can avail of up to £8,000. Programmes of special merit which would not be made without the provision of special funding will qualify for up to one-third of the cost of the programme to a maximum of £20,000.

The money provided will be in the form of repayable advances so that a revolving fund will be maintained to assist future productions. Different kinds of programmes will be eligible, with priority being given to children's programmes and new productions. To qualify for funding companies must employ Gaeltacht personnel unless it can be proven that such are not available.

CLASHMORE TIDY TOWNS REPORT

In next week's issue we will publish the Adjudicator's full report on how Clashmore fared in this year's Tidy Towns Competition.

TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION

Another Few Marks Will Put Stradbally In The Running

While the main focus of attention has been on Ardmore during the past week after winning the overall national award and the award as the tidiest village in Ireland in this year's Tidy Towns Competition, the people of the other Co. Waterford seaside village of Stradbally should feel well pleased with their effort in the competition.

With a total of 193 marks, only 4 behind Ardmore's winning total of 197, Stradbally was highly commended as runner-up in the Best Village in Co. Waterford section. The total was 3 more than that scored last year.

The following are extracts from the adjudicator's report for Stradbally:

EFFORT

(39 out of 45, same as last year): It is always a pleasure to visit Stradbally for the purposes of Tidy Towns adjudication. Keep up the good work. Remember that the level of competition is very keen and that every extra mark is hard earned. Attention to small details that would go unnoticed in lower ranked towns and villages becomes significant when competing among the top ranked towns and villages.

TIDINESS

(33 out of 40, same as last year): The overall appearance of the village was neat and tidy. Stradbally has that special 'cared for' character and sense of place about it that sets it apart from many other towns and villages. Nonetheless, a slight scattering of street litter was noted near the handball alley and at the amenity space at the centre of the village.

You should be striving to maintain a completely litter free environment at all times. Adjudication took place during peak tourist season. Nonetheless, you must try to maintain the excellent standard of litter control that has been a feature of the village on so many occasions of adjudication in the past.

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS

(34 out of 40, same as last year): Once again this year all buildings in the village were well presented. The school and its grounds, Garda Station and the churches and grounds, all looked very well. The Cove Bar, Library and Credit Union were also presented to a very high standard.

As has been pointed out on previous occasions the plastic awnings detract from the overall appearance of an otherwise very well presented commercial premises. Dutch style awnings could simply be removed. It is not essential that they be replaced but if they are necessary, try to encourage the use of traditional roller awnings. A number of pro-

prietary products are now available that can be applied to glass in shop windows in order to protect goods in the shop from harmful UV light rays which cause fading, etc.

PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES

(33 out of 50, 1 more than last year): The standard of presentation of the major open space areas in the village is highly impressive. The central amenity space in the village is most attractive and was very neatly presented. Flower displays in beds and containers throughout the village enhance the appearance of the village and were all most attractively presented again this year. The effort involved in maintaining these displays is acknowledged and is indeed highly commendable. Keep up the good work. There is always the danger that enthusiasm for flower displays will begin to falter in the years following Entente Florale, but so far there are no such signs in Stradbally, rather you have developed new beds at Barrett's. Stone walls are an attractive feature of the village and recent work on these walls is commendable. Your continued tree planting programme also deserves high praise.

APPEARANCE OF APPROACH ROADS

(36 out of 45, 1 more than last year): Work on new stone walls is highly commendable. Grass margins on all approach roads to the village were well presented. However, some sections needed trimming. Keep all margins located within the limits set by the location of village nameplates neatly in trim with edges crisply defined. Regular cutting and weeding is necessary throughout the growing season.

Your plans for stone nameplates are commendable, however, this feature was not in place at the time of adjudication. Incidental items of street furniture, including the village pump etc., were all very well presented. The presentation of the handball alley is, as always, commendable.

PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS

(18 out of 30, 1 more than last year): Houses and gardens throughout Stradbally are, in the majority of cases, very well presented and effort should simply be devoted to main-

taining this standard. One or two boundary walls would benefit from a fresh coat of paint/whitewash. Your effort in relation to vacant premises is commendable. Try to ensure that vacant sites are not allowed fall into a state of complete dilapidation and decay.

SECOND ADJUDICATION

The village was looking quite extraordinarily attractive on second adjudication day as the amount of care

and artistry given to the floral displays had really come into its own. There is a fine consistency in the nature of this village, capitalised upon to excellent effect by the committee and the community in general.

Do not be anxious about comments in the first adjudicator's report in regard to marking — one minor discrepancy does not lead to a loss of one mark — it takes several noticeable discrepancies to do so at the top end of the competition.

ESB - IFA Agreement For Loss Of Tree-Planting Rights

The IFA and the ESB have reached agreement on compensation for loss of tree-planting rights for farmers due to over-head electricity lines. The agreement, which was signed in Dublin last week, provides for payment to landowners equivalent to 75% of the purchase price of affected areas. The agreement also provides compensation for loss of EC grants/premia intended to encourage tree-planting.

Mr. Gerry Murphy, of the IFA Industry Committee in Waterford, said that the new agreement provided a Code of Practice which would further improve relations between ESB and landowners.

The agreement details normal corridor widths required

under electricity lines which vary depending on the voltage of the line. Christmas trees or experimental trees may be grown in these conditions to a maximum height of 3m, provided a 4m wide gap is left for maintenance purposes.

Where a line is constructed through an existing plantation, the ESB will cover the cost of clear felling the area and restoring the affected ground to its normal use.

In the case of proposed developments, applications for compensation should be made before trees are planted.


Wrong Address In Court Report

IRISH MARTYRS

Dominic Collins was born at Youghal into a merchant family. After the town was sacked and burnt he went to

France. He served in the army first as a means of promoting the Catholic cause, but eventually became a Jesuit lay brother. He returned to Ireland in the fleet sent by Philip of Spain in 1601 and defeated at Kinsale. Dominic with others landed at Castlehaven. He was captured and interrogated about his life as a Jesuit and as a soldier. He was sentenced to be hanged and the hanging took place in his native Youghal on 31st October, 1602.

Terence O'Brien from Cappamore, Co. Tipperary, became a Dominican in 1621, taking the name of Albert. He was ordained priest in Spain in 1627. He became Provincial superior of Ireland in 1643, and in 1648 bishop of his native Emly diocese. He was in Limerick during the siege in 1651 and was arrested after the surrender. He was found in the plague-house tending the sick. He was immediately tried, sentenced to be hanged, and executed the next day, October 30th, 1651, along with many others.

MOUNTAINSIDE CEREMONY

The annual Commemoration in memory of Chief of Staff, Liam Lynch by the South Tipperary Republican Commemoration Committee took place on Sunday, September 13, at the memorial on the slopes of the Knockmealdown Mountains. Even though the weather was not vintage September, it was dry and clear and the attendance was up on previous years.

Chairman of the proceedings, Mr. Pat O'Donnell introduced the main speaker of the day, Mr. Martin McGuinness, Vice-President of Sinn Fein who made the long journey from Derry that morning to be with them on the mountainside. The speaker traced the origins of partition and stressed that there could be no lasting peace in the island of Ireland until the British government

withdrew their forces from the Six Counties. He said that a ceasefire was not a necessary precondition to the commencement of meaningful negotiations at which all strands of opinion must be respected.

At the end the Chairman who brought proceedings to a close, thanked the many people who travelled from many parts of Ireland to be present.

LATE MR. JAMES DUGGAN

The district learned with regret on Tuesday September 15, of the death which occurred that morning at his daughter's residence of Mr. James (Jim) Duggan, Mollough, Newcastle. Jim, as he was better known to his contemporaries was a popular member of a very old and respected South Tipperary family. His exceptional thoroughness, integrity, joviality, kindness, courtesy, sincere and utterly unassuming nature were truly appreciated by all who were indeed privileged to make his acquaintance. He was a man who was always welcome in whatever company he found himself. Jim was a caring and thoughtful neighbour who never counted the cost when a helping hand was required. He was a friend to all and accordingly his sad, untimely demise is deeply and justifiably mourned. An outstanding hurler with Newcastle he was full back on the team that took the first South Tipperary title to the village in 1949. He was also an outstanding member of Fourmilewater and Aughavoulinvain Coursing Club. He worked for many years with South Tipperary County Council where he was a favourite with his fellow workers. Many sincere tributes have been paid to him, but perhaps the finest tribute to him was when his remains were removed on Wednesday evening from Condon's Funeral Parlour, Clonmel, draped in the Black and Amber of Newcastle, to St. Marys Parish Church, Newcastle. Waterford Foods Interim Results Show Satisfactory Progress

Half-Year results for Waterford Foods reveal very satisfactory progress with profit before taxation and amortisation of goodwill up 21% to £9.32m on turnover up 15% to £250m.

Very good performances were recorded by all businesses except the UK fruit juice operations where results were below expectations. The first half results also benefited from the acquisition of United Co-operative Dairies in December 1991.

Outstanding highlights of the half-year period include:

- The signing of the contract to purchase Express Foods Irish interests, including 100% of Premier, thereby leaving Waterford poised to become Ireland's largest dairy processor. This purchase was finalised at the end of July 1992 and its

scale and profits will be very influential in future Group results.

- The successful Rights Issue in February where the company raised £24.3m.

Also of major importance are:

- Completion of the new casein plant at Dungarvan which is now fully operational,

- construction of the fromage frais plant in Co. Wexford which will come on stream at the end of the year,

- and the installation of a new modern cheese plant at the Group's US enterprise, Galloway West, in

Wisconsin.

Profit after taxation increased by 17 per cent to £8.239m and earnings per share amounted to 4.29p. The earnings per share before goodwill amortisation amounted to 4.64p and on this basis show an increase of 10% on the first half of 1991.

The Board of Waterford foods plc announced an interim dividend of 1.15p on both A and B shares. This compares favourably with the comparable 1991 levels of 1.1p on A and 0.75 on B ordinary shares. The dividend will be paid on November 6.

GROUP PRIORITIES

Stephen O'Connor, Managing Director, said that successful steps were being taken to broaden the product portfolio of Waterford Foods, thereby moving the business closer to the consumer. Cost competitiveness is also a group priority and is being very significantly achieved in the re-structuring of the UK business, where Waterford now has a turnover in excess of £220m and very exciting profit potential.

He said that the addition of Express Foods including 100% of Premier from August and the integration and development opportunities afforded to the enlarged group in Ireland and the UK give the directors great confidence for a very satisfactory outlook for the future of Waterford Foods as a large, international, consumer orientated food business.

Call To Make Toilets Accessible To Wheelchairs

Cllr. R. Walsh proposed a motion at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last week calling on the Council to take the necessary action to make the public toilets in Ardmore accessible to wheelchairs.

Moving the motion Cllr. Walsh said that he had received several complaints concerning this problem during the recent summer holidays. He said that quite a big number of people confined to wheelchairs visit Ardmore and find access to the public toilets there a problem and he would like to see something done to rectify the position.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn said that the answer to the problem was a new toilet which he agreed Ardmore did need. However this raised the question of money which was not at present available. As a temporary measure he said he would look into the matter to see what could be done.

ABBEYSIDE

VILLAGE TOPICS

OUR LOCALITY

ABBEYSIDE PRIORY

The ruins of the religious house founded in the 13th century for the Augustinian Friars and endowed by the McGraths and O'Briens of Comeragh, form an interesting pile; the walls, windows and arches are still entire.

Mr. J. Coleman writing in the journal of the Waterford

and South-East of Ireland Archaeological Society Journal about the old Abbey remains makes the complementary statement: "All these old Abbey remains still exist and form one of the very few pre-Reformation buildings of this sort in Ireland that have come back into Catholic hands."

THE OLD CHURCH

The converted church consists of a narrow nave and chancel connected by an arch of elegant design supporting an enriched tower which, as said before, is still in good preservation and is used as the belfry of the new Catholic church.

THE TOWER

This steeple is about 60 feet high and supported by a curious Gothic vault sustained by ogives (a French term for the Gothic or pointed arches) passing diagonally from one angle to another forming a cross with four other arches which make the sides of the square building.


The keystone in the centre of the vault is exactly cut being shaped into a union cross of eight branches, four of which being the diagonal ones, constitute part of the ogives, while the other four send members to the keystones of the lateral arches which are acute at the top.

The keystone of each arch sends members to the contiguous (neighbouring) arches in the same manner as do the impost (the point where the arch rests on a wall or column) of the square pillars which support the whole structure, each affording three branches from the same stone.

1887 Ballinacourty v. Kilgobinet

The following account of a football match between Ballinacourty and Kilgobinet appeared in the "Waterford News and General Advertiser" of October 28th, 1887—

"The adjourned football match between Ballinacourty and Kilgobinet was decided at Dungarvan on Sunday in the presence of a vast crowd of spectators. Unfortunately, those present did not merely come to look on, as at every opportunity they interfered in the game and rendered it almost impossible for the different officials to perform their duties. This system of outside interference should be put down with a strong hand or it will grow into an evil that will be difficult to eradicate. But for the undoubted superiority of the Kilgobinet team the chance of arriving at a satisfactory determination was remote.

"At all parts of the match the men from Ballinacourty were unable to cope with their opponents who, notwithstanding having the best of the game from start to finish, only secured two forfeit points. Mr. D. Fraher proved a very capable referee. He had a difficult task to perform, but he did it without fear, favour or affection."

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

£3,000 A WEEK FOR EACH OF RTE'S TOP 10

At a time when there are in excess of 300,000 unemployed in the country it was indeed most disturbing to read in one of last Monday's national daily papers that each of RTE's top ten "personalities" got an average of almost £3,000 a week in artists' fees last year.

It appears that the "stars" of TV and radio were paid an average of £148,000 each from the station. The figure includes a total of £82,000 in arrears from previous years between them.

What can only be described as startling figures

emerged only months after the Station's Director-General told an Oireachtas Committee that "the top personality" could, "arithmetically", be earning £500,000 a year. Members of the Committee subsequently sought a list of the top ten earners and these are believed to include Gay Byrne, Pat Kenny, Gerry Ryan, Marion Finucane and Bibi Baskin. The ten accounted for about £600,000 of the radio fees and almost £900,000 of the TV pay-out in 1991.

The "excuse" which the

RTE Authorities puts forward for paying these huge weekly sums of money is that the advertising income of RTE directly attributable to these top presenters comes to an estimated £13 million.

At best this is a very lame excuse and can in no way justify such over-the-top salaries to the people concerned. That the national Broadcasting Station should pay such huge sums as £3,000 a week to anyone who could probably be very easily replaced from the huge numbers of highly

qualified unemployed young people around the country is nothing short of scandalous. It is to be hoped that the Oireachtas Committee on Commercial State-Sponsored Bodies which is currently engaged in an examination of RTE's affairs will seek a full explanation as to how such enormously high sums of money are being paid to a select group of presenters when the RTE principals next appear before it.

Certainly the viewing public should not be expected to subsidise these kind of payments by an increase in the annual licence fees such as has been officially hinted at in recent weeks.

UNIQUE VOLUME PRESENTED TO PRESIDENT ROBINSON

When President Mary Robinson recently visited Villierstown to perform the official opening of the Festival of Flowers held in the Church Community Centre there, one of the lesser noted happenings that took place was the presentation of a very rare volume to the President.

In the possession of well-known Aglish man, Walter Terry for many years, it is, as far as we are aware the only extant copy of "The History of Dromana" by Lady Muir McKenzie which was originally privately published with a very limited number of copies.

Responding to the address of welcome delivered by Mr. James Villiers Stuart on her visit, President Robinson remarked that while she knew a good deal about the establishment of the "custom-built" village of Viller-

stown she intended to learn more about it and the area round about. "The History of Dromana" should now provide the President with a good deal of the information she may seek.

Incidentally the presentation of the unique volume was made by Mr. Villiers Stuart on behalf of Mr. Terry who, because of the

terrible inclemency of the weather on the occasion, found it not possible to do so himself. However, as the old saying rightly has it, "it's an ill-wind that doesn't blow somebody good". The torrential rain on the Saturday saw the Community Centre well crowded throughout the evening as people sought welcome

shelter from the continuous downpour while by contrast the beautiful sunny weather on the Sunday also enticed a great number of people to visit the Festival. As a result a total of £3,000 was realised by the festival which will go towards carrying out further repairs and improvements to the Community Centre.

HAS THE TITLE BECOME OUTMODED

One of the main programmes on RTE television last week, as far as Co. Waterford was concerned at any rate, was the announcement of the 1992 Tidy Towns competition Awards on Monday night. As we all know now, Ardmore was the overall winner and as such won, in addition, television coverage and publicity which money could not buy, while the event was also extensively covered in all the national daily and local weekly papers.

It transpired, however, during the telecast of the Awards programme that the official title of the competition, "Bord Failte National Tidy Towns Awards 1992", posed something of a difficulty for announcer John Bowman and also for Tourism Minister Maire Geoghegan Quinn. This has given root to the idea that the title no longer does the competition justice as it is now much more than just a matter of Tidy Towns as a great deal more than mere tidiness is required to get into the top bracket of award winners.

We are grateful to the chairman of the Tidy Towns committee Mr. Denis McCarthy for providing us with a copy of the adjudicator's report which is included with these notes.

Cappoquin did not compete in 1991 so the newly formed committee had to start this year more or less from scratch and as can be seen in the report the judges were impressed by the progress made. In point of fact the marks this time were higher than those awarded in either 1989 or 1990. All-in-all the committee and the townspeople can feel reasonably satisfied. The report recognised that only minimum progress is possible in one year and suggests a five year plan which is something to be considered over the coming months.

Effort: 29(45) — I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Cappoquin back into the competition. Effort on the part of all sections of the community was obvious on entering the town. Hopefully this type of effort will continue in the future.

Tidiness: 24(40) — On adjudication day the town was free of litter and pre-

sented a neat, tidy condition overall. As you are aware, litter control is of vital importance to any town or village. Please continue to discourage hoardings and keep after dereliction of any kind.

Presentation Of Buildings: 32(40) — Buildings in general were well maintained and properly presented. Perhaps the few buildings which still require attention will be dealt with over the next year. Walsh's Hotel which is a focal point could benefit from painting. This was also noted in the 1990 report. The appearance of commercial and public buildings in any town gives either a positive or negative impression to visitors. Please always ensure that these buildings are maintained to the highest standard.

Presentation Of Natural Amenities: 27(50) — Natural amenities in practically all cases were maintained to a high standard with well manicured grassed areas and colour from floral displays. Picnic areas should be developed as far as possible on road margins entering the town.

Appearance Of Approach Roads: 36 (45) — Approach

roads from all sides were maintained to a high standard. The people responsible must be complimented as far as approach roads are concerned. I would suggest that there is a community responsibility to Give back up to the local authority in ensuring that high standards are maintained and in fact physically carrying out some of the necessary works.

Presentation Of Residential Areas: 16(30) — As in most towns and villages residential areas are well maintained with some outstanding effort by individuals, flowers and paintwork have been used to good effect. The community effort is very important when aiming for higher marks.

Concluding Comment: — Cappoquin is a beautiful, well cared for town situated in an important visitor area. It does have enormous potential which should be fully utilised. It is important now that you are back into the competition to prepare a five year plan and seek assistance from your local council, FAS and the community at large. Good luck in your efforts.

Irish Ambassadors Should Promote Business Abroad Says Deasy

A public meeting took place at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan on Tuesday September 15 organised by Waterford Constituency Fine Gael. The main topic of debate was the National Jobs Crisis. There was a large attendance present including members of public bodies and reps. of many institutions. Mr. Donal Carey, T.D. Clare constituency and Chairman of the National Executive of Fine Gael, presided.

A lively discussion was held on the causes and suggested cures for the awful situation of almost 300,000 people on the live register of unemployed. Some of the pertinent points raised were that employees should get adequate remuneration for their work and the difference of pay between having a job and receiving unemployment relief should be so attractive to encourage people to work. The cost barriers to Employers to take on extra people should be lifted. Incentives of cash payments

should be freely available without penal strings attached and job creation should be profitable for all concerned. The present tax incentives of putting savings on deposit rather than in creating jobs should be changed. The arrangement whereby banks and credit unions give preferential rates to all except farmers for development must be changed as the meeting was unanimous in its view that farming was in difficult straits with no spare

capital or grants obtainable to allow them to modernise their holdings.

The educational system will have to be reviewed taking into account that 5,000 youths now leave school without any certification whatsoever.

JOB FORUM COMMITTEE LACKS PUNCH

Deputy Austin Deasy had some interesting comments to make in the debate. He advocated that the Irish Ambassadors abroad should be seeking new avenues for trade and use every opportunity to promote business. He stressed the difficulties and costs involving travel costs to traders in this country. He instanced that there is an average of three hours to move goods in this country by road to reach one million customers whereby on mainland Europe in the same time traders can reach one hundred million customers with a consequent transport saving. He stated that our educational system will have to carry one European language at least at primary school level to prepare craftsmen to travel for work. German or French employers have no time for workers who cannot converse or read in the language.

Mr. Deasy can see no advantage in joining the Government organised Jobs Forum committee while no Ministers sit in or attend these meetings. He referred to the Culliton Report and its revolutionary recommendations of getting rid of the massive State Agencies costing fortunes to maintain without achieving employment or development results. Half the cost of these savings should be invested in small industries freely so as to give across the board employment nationally.

The weather may not be good enough for a barbecue, but you can still please the family with this fish recipe:

GINGER & ORANGE KEBABS

Ingredients:

2 x 12oz (350g) mackerel or herring, filleted
1 green pepper, cut into chunks

1 large orange, cut into wedges
salt and pepper

Marinade:

3 tablespoons (35ml) orange juice
1 teaspoon (5ml) grated root ginger
1 teaspoonful (5ml) white wine vinegar

1/2 teaspoon (2.5ml) lemon juice OR

4 tablespoons (60ml) Lea & Perrins blended Ginger and Orange Sauce.

Method:

Slice fish fillets into 2" (5cm) pieces, thread on to 4 skewers, alternately with the pepper and orange, season.

To make the marinade (if using) mix all the ingredients together.

Lay the mackerel kebabs in a shallow dish, pour over the prepared marinade or sprinkle over the blended ginger and orange sauce.

Cover and marinate for 30 minutes in a cool place. Cook under a medium grill for about 8 - 10 minutes turning once.

Serve on a bed of rice or pasta with a mixed salad. Serves 2 - 4.

Our final fish dish is:

FISH FILLETS WITH SHERRY

Ingredients:

4 x 6-6oz (175-225g) flat white fish fillets, fresh or defrosted, skinned

1 tablespoon (15ml) oil

1 clove garlic, crushed

1 small onion, finely chopped

4oz (125g) mushrooms, chopped

4 tablespoons (60ml) dry sherry

salt and pepper

chopped parsley, to garnish

Method:

Heat the oil in a large shallow pan, fry the garlic, onion, courgettes and mushrooms. Add sherry and fish fillet, cover the pan and cook for 8 minutes.

Transfer fish to a serving dish and keep warm. Cook vegetables for a further 4-5 minutes or until liquid is reduced to a few tablespoons.

Season and spoon vegetables over the fish. Sprinkle with parsley and serve with mashed potatoes and green beans. Serves 4.

Sheep Farmers Under Severe Pressure

Members of Waterford Co. Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last week were asked to consider the following motion adopted at a recent meeting of the Munster Joint Sheep Dipping Committee: "That we ask the Minister for Agriculture to use his influence to prevent the EC from slashing Irish sheep farmers' incomes by up to £30 million in a year as decided by the EC Sheep Management Committee."

Proposing that the Council support the motion Cllr. W. McDonnell, one of the Council's two representatives on the Munster Com-

mittee said that sheep farmers were under severe pressure at present with wool prices the lowest in 30 years and lamb prices under £1 per kilo. He said

that the ewe premium which had been cut should also be restored. "The way things are now it's not worth while to keep sheep," he said.

Seconding the proposal Cllr. C. O Riain, the Council's other representative on the Joint Committee said that at present sheep farmers were going through a very bad time.

The motion was adopted unanimously.

Make Sure Your Tools Are Clean For Storing

There is a lot of digging to be done over winter, but, by and large, most garden tools will soon have done their job for the year.

And it's the forthcoming winter of idleness that can do most harm if we don't store them properly. Almost inevitably they then let us down in spring when we most need them.

All garden tools should be clean and dry when put away, especially machines such as mowers and power trimmers and saws.

Rust should be removed using wire wool before all moving parts are cleaned and oiled, but remember not to touch any of these until you are sure they are unplugged from the mains, or the fuel supply and spark cut off.

Traditional tools such as the spade, shovel, fork, rake and hoe, should have metal surfaces carefully cleaned and oiled before a long period of storage.

Many now have maintenance-free metal and plastic tubular handles but wood handles can be kept intact by light sanding and a rub down with linseed oil.

If a handle is broken then take out the retaining screws and yank out the useless handle. If you can't get a decent purchase then drive a screw into the end and grip this in a vice so that the broken shaft can be pulled free. Don't throw the old shaft away until you have used it to mark the length of the section which fits into the tool head. For spades and forks, you might also like a longer handle this time.

Recent research shows that it is much more efficient and better for the back to fit longer handles in the style of the Americans and some Continental countries.

When fitting the new handle/shaft you may also need to

shape the end with a rasp for a tight fit before replacing the retaining screws.

Garden shears also need cleaning, oiling and checking that they work efficiently. They should bow apart between the pivot nut and the tips. If not, adjust the nut until they do.

When sharpening, undo the bolt so that each blade can be properly dealt with in a vice using a fine file for a good edge.

Remove blades on rotary mowers for the same treatment and also grease the blade mountings. Check all mowers and trimmers for any build-up of grass which might cause inefficiency or overheating and examine cables closely for nicks or kinks.

Don't take chances if you find a problem. Replace the cable if it has several damaged parts or cut away the damaged section and joint the halves with a slim male/female coupling.

Insulation tape will not guarantee against electrocution and if you do fit an electrical connection do make sure that the female end is the one attached to cable running to the mains.

The other way round risks the joint being unplugged either accidentally or deliberately, leaving live prongs exposed, with disastrous consequences.

As a final safety point, consider buying an RCD or circuit breaker to fit between the plug and the mains when using power tools — it could save a life.

Lismore Notes



176 MARKS FOR LISMORE'S TIDY TOWN'S EFFORT

Lismore scored a total of 176 marks in the Bord Fáilte 1992 Tidy Towns Competition and received praise from the adjudicators for the good progress made in recent years. The following are extracts from the report.

Effort: 34(45) — Lismore is a very attractive town. Despite some obvious problem with derelict buildings, etc. the overall standard of presentation of the town was very impressive. You have made good progress in recent years and once again this year have achieved a significant increase in your overall mark.

Tidiness: 29(40) — The standard of litter control in evidence throughout the town on adjudication day is commendable. Very little litter was noted. Untidy features of the town noted on adjudication day include weedy roadside and footpath edges and open roadside storage of sand and gravel. Such storage should not be permitted on a long term basis and should only occur when necessary in conjunction with current construction of amenity projects.

Presentation Of Buildings: 32(40) — Lismore contains a stock of attractive commercial and community premises many of which have been very well presented. Recent painting of buildings is commendable. However, there are still a number of buildings that could benefit from

similar treatment. Once again this year the Garda station, Credit Union and Library were among the best presented buildings. The improvements carried out at Flemings, Bunty's, etc. are commendable. However, there are still a number of commercial premises that need general upgrading and improvements of signage, etc. Try to encourage the removal of plastic neon signs, etc. Where replacement signs are required encourage the use of simple traditional style non-internally illuminated signs which are of a size compatible with the scale and proportions of the building to which they will be attached. As a general rule signs should not be attached above ground floor level to the facade of a building. Hopefully the standard of presentation of the hotel will be upgraded as soon as a new owner emerges. The problem associated with vacant derelict buildings is appreciated.

Presentation Of Natural Amenities: 31(50) — The committee has obviously been active in relation to work on amenity features and areas of the town. This is highly commendable. Most public spaces were well presented on adjudication day. The development of the river walk and of the spaces at the Cathedral are excellent. Recent tree planting is also commendable.

You should continue this tree planting programme on an annual basis.

Appearance Of Approach Roads: 33(45) — The standard of presentation of grass margins along approach roads to the town has improved since last year. However, there are still some sections that could be improved. Try to achieve a uniform standard of presentation on all margins located within the limits set by the location of nameplates. Street furniture was all reasonably well presented but some directional signposts needed cleaning and repair. The main item that should be given attention under this heading concerns the presentation of side spaces and entrances, a number of which are untidy at present. Also don't neglect outbuildings and sheds when repainting especially if these structures can be clearly viewed from the public road.

Presentation Of Residential Areas: 17(30) — The vast majority of houses located in and along approach areas to the town were very well presented. One or two houses would benefit from a fresh coat of paint and some dwellings could do with upgrading the standard of boundary treatment. In general the simpler the boundary treatment the better. There are a number of well presented gardens that enhance the overall amenity character of the village.

Also those dwellings that have incorporated window boxes, etc. into their presentation are commendable. The work being carried out by the residents, etc. at Parks Road or the development of the amenity open space at this location is highly commendable. Well done.

PROPOSED PIG PRODUCTION UNIT IN OLD PARISH

Dear Editor,
We in Old parish congratulate Ardmore on its Tidy Towns achievement and wish them continued success in the coming tourist season. However, if the threat proposed by the proposed installation of a large-scale, intensive pig production unit in our midst is not immediately prevented, we fear that we in the neighbouring parish will never realise our potential in tourism or other environmentally friendly enterprises. Once again another powerful outside interest seeks to impose on the parish an unwanted development.

To anyone living in the area it is obvious that a majority of residents, both farming and non-farming, do not back the project. Many of those in favour are in fact absentee landowners. If ordinary slurry spreading methods are used the results would be disastrous for residents and visitors alike, while the profits from the operation would not remain in the area. Property values would surely be adversely affected. Who would provide compensation?

It now appears to be a

standard practice in the pre-planning stage of controversial developments to boast of large numbers of jobs. The promoters have claimed numbers ranging from twenty-five to sixty-five. How many similar existing pig units in Ireland currently maintain those numbers of permanent, full-time jobs? Due to the size of the proposed unit, if enough land is not available for slurry spreading in Old Parish, land for this purpose will be required in the neighbouring areas of Ring and Ardmore, both areas with potential for high employment in tourist related industries.

Ardmore's great achievement, resulting from many years of hard work and dedication to their environment, has focussed national and international attention on West Waterford. How much attention will the smell of pig slurry attract?

Munster Championship Draws

The full list is published here and it can be seen from the fixtures involving Waterford that we have a chance of reaching four Munster finals next year, if we can prepare properly. We have a chance in senior and junior football as we certainly got the easy end of the draw with the two other 'weak' counties, Limerick and Tipperary. We have a good chance too in minor football and under-21 football.

The acquisition of a football coach is again under consideration, following a brief discussion at Monday night's meeting of the County Board. This was further discussed at a Coisde Na Peil meeting on the following night when it was made known that the County selectors were also in favour. When the matter was previously discussed by the football committee it was found that no suitable coach could be got to coach the team and Coisde na Peil dropped the idea when they failed to get a worthwhile coach to train the team.

The idea of getting a football coach at the moment would seem to be a worthless exercise as there is no panel available to be coached. With the eight or ten top football teams still involved in the club championships, very few players are available to the county selectors for training.

As will be observed when reading the list of National League games, we will be in trouble when it comes to fielding teams on these dates, which are bound to coincide with club champi-

onship dates. If the championships are not completed in time the Munster Council will force Waterford to nominate teams for the semi-finals. As was pointed out at a recent County Board meeting, the members of the Provincial Council find it difficult to understand why Waterford are so far behind schedule with the championships, when Cork, who were in the All-Ireland hurling final and Clare who reached the All-Ireland semi-final, are able to finish theirs on time.

County Board Meeting

Eamon O Murchu, Chairman presided at last week's meeting of the County Board which was held at Dungarvan.

Arising out of the minutes of the previous meeting, the matter of the status of the supporters Club was discussed. The chairman submitted that this group were to be a sub-committee of the County finance and Development committee as a County Board meeting last year, decided that only one fund raising committee would be sanctioned in the county. Other members submitted that the Supporters Club were a sub-committee of the County Board. The argument went on for a long time without it being finalised before the meeting moved on to the next business.

FINANCE

Some idea of the considerable expenses involved in servicing the minor and under 21 hurling teams and bringing them to the All-Ireland, was given by county treasurer James Walsh. He said the monies raised by the County Finance group, would not nearly cover the expenses to date. Declan O'Meara, who is chairman of the County Finance and Development committee said that stage two of the fund-raising drive would soon commence and it was proposed to run a major monthly non-stop draw with very attractive prizes. He told the meeting that it was proposed to invite all clubs to a meeting within the next few weeks to outline the scheme and get the draw underway. The chairman stated that every club in the county should do their own fund-raising to help defray the minor and under 21 expenses. He said that if each house in each club area contributed only one pound, this would be sufficient to cover the expenses involved. He complimented Stradbally on having collected monies for this fund and handing it over to the County Board. Jimmy O'Gorman, said that the Supporters Club had raised a good amount of money and had given a lot of assistance to both hurling panels as well as buying playing equipment for the players. He said that a weekly balance sheet was available at the regular Wednesday meetings.

NOT TO APPEAL FINE

A fine of £100 imposed by the Munster Council on Waterford for having too many hurley carriers on the sideline during the course of the replayed minor final at Pairc Uí Caoimh was discussed by the County Board meeting and a proposition that the fine be appealed, was defeated on a vote. Some delegates criticised the association for introducing too many match regulations and one delegate said that we

were trying to ape other associations. Other members felt that since these regulations were introduced to improve presentation of the games, that they should be observed by us, just as well as they were being observed by the other counties.

SPONSORSHIP

The chairman informed the meeting that the officers were presently negotiating with an interested party to have the present club championships sponsored. He said that even though the competitions were well advanced, they were satisfied that it would be possible to obtain sponsorship for the concluding stages. The potential sponsor was not named, but permission was given to the officers to proceed.

KILMACUD CROKES

Tramore club were given permission, on the usual conditions to field a team in the 7 aside competition which was being run by the above club on the eve of the All-Ireland Football final. Paddy Fitzgerald complained that Dungarvan were forced to turn down this invitation, because they were given to understand that they would be involved in club championship on the date.

OTHER CO. BOARD MATTERS

A massive cake, which was specially baked for the occasion, was presented by Iarnrod Eireann to the Waterford minor hurling team before their departure from Euston Station, Dublin for home after the All-Ireland final on September 7th. The cake bore the inscription, 'Congratulations' for having reached and played in the All-Ireland final. The County Board at their meeting thanked the firm for this and also thanked and congratulated Iarnrod Eireann and Bus Eireann on the excellence and efficiency of the service provided to our teams and patrons for all our matches of the championships this year.

Congratulations on our recent achievements were received from I.C.M.S.A., Waterford County Council, the ladies football committee and other groups.

Our very best wishes are extended to the county ladies football team who play in the All-Ireland final in Croke Park on October 4th. The chairman urged as many as possible to travel in support.

The County Board decided to subscribe to a Golf Classic being organised in the association to raise very badly needed funds for victims of the Somalia Famine.

Humphrey Kelliher and the other members of the Dublin Branch of the Supporters club, were thanked for the very efficient way in which the celebration functions had been organised on the occasion of the All-Ire-

land minor final.

REFEREE'S REPORT

A very heated argument arose following the reading of a report which told of an incident which allegedly happened after a game at Walsh Park recently. The referee stated that it had been reported to him that a club official had been assaulted in a dressing room after the particular game. UNDER 21 HURLING ALL-IRELAND REPLAY AT NOWLAN PARK

Waterford Have Fifty/Fifty Chance of Taking First Title In 33 Years

Record Crowd Expected To Travel

Having played a draw with Offaly in our first meeting and probably lost a chance of snatching the title, we cannot now wear the label of underdogs going into the replay in which we will justifiably be rated at least as equals and given a fifty/fifty chance of bringing back our first title in the grade after another thrilling game on next Sunday.

The selection of the team was delayed until Tuesday and this gave rise to speculation that there was some concern about the fitness of a few players. I know that those who were suffering from injuries were making slow but sure recovery and a member of the selectorial team told me on Monday morning that they were keeping their fingers crossed that all the panel would be fully fit and available when they sat down to finalise the side on Tuesday night.

As I reported last week, Ray Barry (goal) who was badly shaken when bundled into the back of the net in the drawn match is responding very well and there will be no doubt about his being in goal again. Barry is a confident keeper, might be bit daring at times, but he is very good and if he performs as well again on Sunday, he will play a major role in the result.

It is reasonably certain that when the team is announced on Tuesday that the defence will be unchanged from that which lined out two weeks ago. Centre-half back, Pat Fanning was nursing a finger injury but is back in training and looked fine in practice on Saturday at Fraher field. He will be flanked again by team captain Tony Browne and Fergal Hartley. Hartley's mission was to keep Offaly ace forward Johnny Dooley's scoring rate down to a minimum and while Dooley did manage three points from play, the Ballygunnerman got on top of him long before the game finished. Our full backline did a good job in the drawn match and held the Offaly full-forward line to just two points. Kieran O'Gorman (the only Waterford defender whose opponent did not score) will again wear the number 2 jersey, Owen Dunphy will be at full back and Mark

Sullivan who had a splendid hour (65 mins. and 11 secs.) should give yet another good performance.

Tom Fives and Johnny Brenner will be at centre-field again. A fair assessment of their performance would be that they had a break even score with their two opponents Sean Og Farrell and Michael Hogan. If they do as well again it will help us to maintain a fifty/fifty chance in the result.

SPECULATION

There has been an amount of speculation about the possible inclusion of minor star Paul Flynn from the start and I'm sure the selectors will be under some pressure to name him on the first fifteen and it will be interesting to see how they respond when the team is announced. I am one of those who would not go along with the idea of playing the Ballygunner minor from the start. It could prove dangerous to gamble with a player who is three years junior to his opponent for a full hour in this grade and his introduction at a later stage in the match, could give the Waterford effort a psychological boost at a timely juncture in the game. Mark Geary played well when introduced, but was not given a chance to stake his claim to selection on the first fifteen, because of his injury which was deemed to have been inflicted under suspicious circumstances. Only Sean Daly of the first fifteen scored in the drawn game and all were top quality efforts by the Lismore marksman. We would be foolish not to expect that special attention will be paid to him on Sunday. A friend of mine, Mick Spain who is very close to the scene in the Faithful county, told me immediately after the drawn game in Nowlan Park, that Daly will never again get three goals against them. I doubt myself if he will, but I cannot see any defender from Offaly keeping him from scoring. Noel Dalton has contributed a total of 1-15 to our total overall so far in the championship, but amazingly he did not get his name on the scoreboard the last day. The same can be

Many of those were struck under pressure, but were hit while the forwards were free. Hopefully we won't have twice as many wides as we had scores again.

VERY QUIET

Offaly have been very quiet about their preparation and rumours that they have

a couple of injured players have not been confirmed. They will hope to field the same side and do a bit better on the scoreboard, having made a shrewd assessment of Waterford's potential, which they say, they underestimated before. At our end, everything that is humanly possible, had been done to ready the team for the replay. Ninety minute training sessions, team talks, individual player coaching, etc. etc. and minute attention to the smallest details that will be all important on the day, have been taken care of.

It is now a matter of bringing them to the highest point of motivation that will make themselves believe in their ability to win, before going out on Nowlan Park on Sunday. Believing in themselves and their ability to win, Waterford can be successful, even though it will be mighty difficult. Under-21 Scoreboard

In their four matches to-date, both Waterford and Offaly have scored a total of 74 points; Waterford have 9 goals and 47 points while Offaly have 4 goals and 62 points.

It is interesting to note also that the margin of victory in the respective provinces was the same in all cases; Waterford beat Cork by 2 points and they beat Clare by 2 points. Offaly beat Dublin by 2 points and they also defeated Kilkenny by 2 points. Each had a runaway win in the All-Ireland semi-finals and when they eventually clashed the match finished level.

Eleven of our panel scored. Our top marksman Sean Daly scored 6-9; Noel Dalton 1-15, Anthony Fitzgerald 1-4, Michael Hubbard 0-3, Tom Fives 0-3, Johnny Brenner 0-7, Kevin McGrath 0-2, Paul Power 0-2, Fergal Hartley 0-1, Mark Geary 0-1 and substitute Paul Flynn 1-0. Total: 9-47.

Offaly had ten scorers as follows: J. Dooley 0-36, N. Hand 2-2, J. Troy 0-7, M. Gallagher 1-3, S. Greenan 1-2, B. Whelehan 0-4, O. O'Neill 0-2, S. Farrell 0-4, E. Martin 0-1, M. Hogan 0-1. Total: 4-62.

REPLAY RESULTS

Waterford have so far played in two replays after drawn games in this championship. In 1975 as reigning Munster champions we drew with Limerick (3-8 to 2-11) and were beaten in the replay. In 1983 we drew with Cork at 1-11 each in a thriller at Dungarvan and lost the replay by 1-14 to 1-10 in Pairc Ui Caoimh.

Offaly were involved in three drawn games before this and lost two and won the other. Last year, with eleven of their present team, they drew with Wexford and won the replay by two points (1-11 to 1-9).

LOW SCORES

After the drawn game two weeks ago there was some criticism of our failure to raise more than four white flags over 65 minutes. It was a poor tally especially when we sent over fifteen wides, but it was by no means our lowest score in this grade. In the Munster final of 1964 (first year of the championship) we reached the provincial final and on the occasion we raised just a single white flag from a pointed free. Our score was 3-1. This final was at Walsh Park. In 1980 again we scored but a single point and this was when losing to Clare in Bansha. Our score here was 5-1.

In the '69 championship we scored just 2-2 against Cork and we registered only 1-3 against Tipperary in 1981.

COME IN TIME!

Because this match has been so widely publicised after such a thrilling draw it seems certain that it will attract a far greater attendance from all over the country. Many of the counties with their finals played will make their way to Nowlan Park in the expectation of seeing another breathtaking All-Ireland final.

Three years ago (1989) when Offaly played Tipperary in the under-21 final at Portlaoise the official attendance was 34,980 and that represents about 10,000 more than we had in Kilkenny for the drawn game. Patrons would therefore be well advised to travel early.

ADMISSION PRICE

Tickets for the stand in Nowlan Park were again available but were snapped up soon after they were put on sale. The admission price of £8 for the stand at the drawn match was the subject of very strong criticism at last week's County Board meeting. One delegate described the admission prices to intercounty games and particularly to the All-Ireland series as being outrageous. This was particularly so where a family is involved. The Butlerstown delegate, Mrs. Ann Murray, stated that children were charged £4.

The discussion was finalised by delegates agreeing that we should enlist the support of Offaly in making an official protest and seeking a reduction in price.

TELEVISION

There has been quite a lot of criticism of RTE when no effort was made to show at least some of the under-21 All-Ireland final. Many felt that at least the station should have had a camera there for recording the game, that could be transmitted at another time. An event which attracted more than 25,000 people and should have been enjoyed by far more, had they been able to travel, and was listened to by tens of thousands of interested people all over the country, must surely have been worthy of television coverage. It is all the more annoying when we find the same station transmitting so much rubbish that costs a lot of our money and is of little or no interest to the vast majority of viewers. On Sunday next the match will be broadcast by WLR FM and also by Radio Eireann.

The worldwide coverage given to last Sunday's football All-Ireland will give a fair idea of the growing popularity of the game. The game between Donegal and Dublin was shown live in over 25 major cities worldwide. Irish emigrants in European cities like London, Birmingham, Glasgow, Munich, Paris, Amsterdam, were able to see the action as it happened. Also the followers in a dozen American and Canadian cities including New York, Boston, Los Angeles, Toronto, etc., had the game live.

CLUB GAMES

S.H.C. — BALLYDUFF v. FOURMILEWATER

This refixed senior hurling championship game at Cappoquin on Saturday will do a lot of sorting out for the fixtures committee and also for the two clubs involved. At the moment Ballyduff have four points while Fourmilewater have three and this is the final game for both. A win for Ballyduff would put them level on points with Tallow and give them a place in the quarter finals. A win for Fourmile' would put Ballyduff out and qualify the Ballymac' team for a play-off with Roanmore for a quarter-final spot. A draw would rule Fourmile' out and put Ballyduff into a play-off with Roanmore.

So both clubs have it all to play for and by all accounts it is going to be the kind of match that will go to the final whistle before being decided. Ballyduff may be slight favourites, but playing against a well

prepared team from Fourmilewater, I would not give them more than a fifty/fifty chance. The Cappoquin programme will also include the Dungarvan/Naomh Brid minor hurling play-off.

AT DUNGARVAN

The big one here will be the clash between Ring and Ballinameela in the first intermediate football semi-final. Ring are the table toppers in the league and Ballinameela are lying fourth. Except for one lapse, when they were very well beaten by Faha, Ring have played like champions and are being spoken of as possible winners to follow up on their junior win of last year. Ballinameela, true to tradition, have shown improvement as they go along.

They are a side, if they rise to the occasion that can surprise the fancied Gaeltacht side, but if there isn't to be a surprise, I believe that Ring will qualify to meet either Faha or Affane in the final next month.

J.H. SEMI-FINAL — CLASHMORE OR KILROSSANTY

This will be the second game at Fraher field on Saturday afternoon and if both play to form it should be a cracker. After the full series of league games, Clashmore ended up with 12 points and Kilrossanty have 11. On Saturday last Kilrossanty overwhelmed Glen Rovers (Melleray) in a play-off game at Cappoquin and while the quality of the opposition was poor, the winners did play some good hurling as they have done throughout the championship so far.

Clashmore are being tipped as the side they all have to beat to win the title and they will go all out here to reach the Western final.


Clashmore might have a little too much experience in the grade and because of this they are given the vote to get to the final.

rather than gross income be the determining factor for these grants.

In raising the matter, Mr. Harty complained that the children of farmers and small business people were being particularly unfairly treated because the huge interest rates their parents were paying were not taken into account when it came to the assessment for grants

by the Department. "People with net incomes of as low as £4,000 and £5,000 a year are still deemed to be outside the grant income limit and this borders on the disgraceful," he said.

Mr. Harty also said that in regard to the grant application forms, these were very complicated and a person would need to be an accountant to fill them in.
