Protest At Disbandment Of RTOs Put On Hold

A protest motion proposed at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday concerning the shock announcement of the disbandment of the country's six Regional Tourism Organisations was eventually put on hold on the advice of the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley.

The motion was proposed

by Cllr. John Carey and seconded by Cllr. R. Walsh who said that it was only in the previous week that South East Tourism launched a draft tourism plan for the South East projecting £80 million in extra earnings and 3,250 new jobs by 1997. "And now," said Cllr. Walsh, "we have been informed that all the regional tourism boards are to be scrapped."

Cllr. Brian O'Shea, T.D., said that the decision to disband the regional boards was a very retrograde step and he asked what was now to become of the function of the County Development Team which had been doing such great work in the county in recent years.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Hurley said that he had no further information on the

subject than that contained in the Press Release setting out the announcement by the Taoiseach giving details of the new County Enterprise Partnership Boards which were to be set up to promote job creation and economic and community development.

Because of the confusion that existed about the statutory and non-statutory functions of the new Boards he felt that it would be unwise for the Council to arrive at any decisions until they had discussions with the relevant State Agencies on the position.

"I am concerned," said the Manager, "about how long it will be before the new Boards are put into place and about how many jobs could possibly be lost in the meantime and I think the Council should take no stand until we know exactly what is involved." He added that he thought the objective was good but felt that the Council should reserve comment on the matter until they have been

fully briefed. "My advice to the Council is not to protest or pass any comment until the new Boards have been formally brought into being," said Mr. Hurley.

Cllr. Carey then agreed to withdraw his protest motion.

CHANGES IN P.E.S.P. REGION

Referring to job creation, the Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne said that the Council should maximise the changes in the Social Employment Scheme which the changes in the P.E.S.P. region brought. This region stretched from the Kilmac-thomas area to Youghal Bridge and important changes for Social Employment workers had taken place. This meant that people employed under the scheme in this region would not now be subject to de-

ductions for PRSI or PAYE while the Christmas bonus would be paid and all secondary benefits such as Fuel Allowance would be protected.

Cllr. Kyne added that Local Authorities and Health Boards had also been instructed not to consider increased income from the SES to raise differential rents or to charge medical card entitlements.

"I would urge the County Manager now that these additions have been offered to workers in this PESP Region to work with the FÁS organisation to make them available to as many people as possible," said Cllr. Kyne.

The County Manager replied that he would arrange with the County Secretary to open discussions with FÁS on the position.

Co. Council Votes Of Congratulations And Sympathy

Votes of congratulation and sympathy were passed at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council last Monday.

Congratulations were extended to the Waterford U/21 All-Ireland hurling champions; to the Waterford Ladies senior football team on winning their second All-Ireland title and also to the members of the u/14 team which also won the All-Ireland last Saturday; to Tony Coffey, Kilrossanty on winning the

All-Ireland "Culchie of the Year" title in Castlebar; to the local winners of All-Ireland Fleadh Cheoil Medals in Clonmel and to Tramore Golf Club on winning the senior All-Ireland title.

Votes of sympathy were passed with Cllr. Brian O'Shea, T.D. on the recent death of his mother and with Mr. Austin Casey, Stradbally, a member of the Council's clerical staff on the unexpected death of his wife.

Contract For Dungarvan's New £40,000 Christmas Lights Signed

We understand that the new lighting and sound system to brighten the streets of Dungarvan for Christmas became a fait accompli when Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce signed contracts documents on last Tuesday morning involving an expenditure of £40,000 which is stated to be the cost of providing and installing the system which has been described as "the most modern festive lighting system in Ireland." The contract is to be carried out by LX Expressions Lighting Design, the Dungarvan electrical firm headed by Mr. Dirk Baumann.

The signing of the contracts has been the culmination of many months of planning and hard work put in by members of the Commerce Chamber's Retailers Committee of which well-known business man, Mr.

Mario Flavin, is Chairman. Following the signing of the contracts Mr. Flavin stated that his committee were delighted to at last see the project enter its final phase and that the lights would be functioning for the coming Christmas season.

It is expected that the introduction of this new super lighting system will so improve the appearance and atmosphere of the town for the festive period that it will encourage people from the surrounding hinterland and those locals who otherwise shop out of town to spend locally in the run up to Christmas.

Mr. Flavin said that in succeeding to encourage people to shop locally for the Christmas period it would create a very good economic environment for the town and could even be translated into much needed jobs and

further downstream employment with consequent benefits for all concerned.

Referring to the cost involved, Mr. Flavin said that the Committee planned to raise the full amount from local contributions in just one year as it would almost double if spread on a commercial basis over five years. He added that to date the response had been tremendous with over 50% of the funding already contributed. "The £40,000 cost of the system is," said Mr. Flavin, "a huge financial investment but one which all of us involved with the project say will pay dividends in the future."

Mr. Dirk Baumann explained the working of the proposed new system and said that by incorporating a computer controlled signal system it would be possible to control the lights in any

given sequence to give a brilliant festive appearance to the town.

AN INVESTMENT IN THE FUTURE

Mr. Jim Ryan, President of the Chamber of Commerce praised the Retailers Committee for the immense amount of work they had put into the project. He also paid tribute to Sterling Winthrop, Dungarvan for making the services of Project Management Ltd. available for vetting the proposals and agreeing to monitor the project until it was completed. "This is an investment in all our futures," said Mr. Ryan.

Work on the installation of the new system will be carried out later this month and the whole system is expected to be in place and ready for the switch-on well before the commencement of the Christmas shopping period.

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County Libraries Committee To Discuss Overall Library Policy

In the course of a position paper on the Library Service for Kilmacthomas submitted by the County Library Services to the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday it was stated that the library in Kilmacthomas closed in 1986 due to the redevelopment of the premises by the owner for alternative purposes. It was found impossible to acquire a suitable building and a mobile library was substituted as an interim solution. This ceased in 1988 and since then despite continuous visits no appropriate premises was located and a decision was then taken to erect a new library. A site has been identified and architects asked to produce preliminary proposals.

It was estimated that the total cost of erection and stocking of this would be in the order of £250,000 with annual running costs of £25,000 to £30,000 which would have to be borne by the Council.

The question of priority then arose with regard to the

position of the library in Tallow and it was submitted that in the final analysis the provision of a mobile service for Kilmacthomas would be more logical, more affordable and more immediately attainable than the erection of a new library which would be impossible to stock and staff in the context of existing fund limits.

Cllr. Oliver Coffey said that he was very disappointed with this report and expressed further disappointment that it had not been submitted first to the meeting of the County Libraries Committee. Last March at a meeting of the Committee it had been decided to go ahead with the new library in Kilmacthomas but that had all now been changed. In the circumstances he proposed that the report be referred back to the Libraries Committee.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham said that it would be a disgrace if Kilmacthomas was now to be passed over in this way. He had identified a number of suitable sites

and said that the library could be incorporated in the Courthouse there at much reduced cost.

Cllr. W. McDonnell said that the Library in Tallow was now seriously in need of repair. It had been erected under the Carnegie Scheme in 1913 and he hoped that the necessary repairs would be carried out reasonably soon and the vacancy for a Librarian there filled. "In a town of 1,000 people there is a great need for the library which is used to a great extent," said Cllr. McDonnell.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that moves to identify a suitable site for Kilmacthomas were still in train. However he thought that it would be a good idea to refer the report back to the Library Committee to discuss the whole Library policy for the county and report their findings back to the Council. "We're in the hands of the Department of the Environment in regard to what money they will make available for library purposes," said Mr. Hurley. This was agreed.





GENERAL

OUR LOCALITY



CARVED STONE FRAGMENTS

Above are some illustrations of some pieces of stone from the old Abbey buildings which are incorporated in the present church.

(a) Limestone coat of arms — This consists of a GRIF-FIN (a mythical animal where the fore-part is represented as an eagle and the hind-part as a lion — as referred to last week) and three Scallop shells thought to be the arms of the Abbey and originally this was placed over the door of the Abbey.

(b) 3 Limestone capitals — Two of these are set into the South wall of the present church to the left of the entrance door and the other is underneath the wooden cross to the right of the entrance. These are probably bases or capitals of pillars which once formed the cloister. (An arched way or covered walk running round

the walls of certain portions of monastic buildings.)

(c) — A sandstone capital is set into the south wall just under the limestone fragments. It appears to be decorated with stiff leaf foliage in low relief.

(d) — A sandstone colonette with capital and moulded base is built into the corner of the West wall of the tower. It may have been from the side of a niche or sedilia or part of the cloister.

(e) Head of a Bishop — This is made of sandstone and is set into the corner of the second window from the South in the West wall of the present church. It is difficult to date this as it appears very fresh. It may only have been carved when the present church was built in the 1820's.



Consternation As Tourism Boards Are Axed

The announcement by the Taoiseach, Mr. Albert Reynolds, T.D. on October 1 that the Government was to set up County Enterprise Partnership Boards was received with a certain amount of anxiety. As the three key objectives of the new Boards included the development of Small and Start Up Enterprises employing up to 12 people; training and education, especially as linked to Enterprise Development, and local communi-

ty development, it was realised that the existing County Development Team structure was in jeopardy.

However while it now seems that the Development Teams will be absorbed into the new Enterprise Boards nobody expected the shock announcement which was made out of the blue last week by the Minister of State at the Department of the Taoiseach, Noel Treacy, that the six Regional

Tourism Organisations are to be wound up within a month and incorporated in the new Boards.

The consternation and anger generated by this latest Government decision among the Regional Tourism Boards was exemplified at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday when a motion to protest in the strongest possible terms to the Taoiseach against the dismantling of the RTO's was

proposed and seconded but on the advice of the County Manager was put on hold until the full implications involved in the setting up of the new Boards became known.

However we understand that the Government has already intimated that there is to be no backing down on this unilateral decision so it looks that we have now seen the end of both the Regional Tourism Boards and the County Development Teams.

An Off-Season Tourism Gimick?

This is the period of the year when Local Authorities up and down the country are targeted by invitations to send delegates to conferences and seminars on a variety of subjects in various parts of Ireland and now and again even outside the country.

At their last monthly meeting, Dungarvan Urban Council unanimously agreed to nominate the two lady members of the Council to attend conferences either in Cork or Tralee. As far as we know the individual cost involved was something in the region of £250.

But when the same invitations were considered last week by Kinsale Urban Council it was strongly suggested that local authority members were being lured to these type of conferences to boost the off-season tourism trade in some provincial towns.

Critical of the increasing number of seminar invitations being received by local councils each month one Kinsale councillor expressed reservations about conferences on tourism in Ennis and a housing conference being organised in Tralee. It was time, this councillor stated, to "put a foot down" and call a halt.

There was no mention in the report of the Kinsale Council meeting about the Cork City conference to be held at the Imperial Hotel to which the Dungarvan councillors may be going on November 4-5-6.

It does seem peculiar that these conferences take place either at the early part of the tourism season or at the tail-end and seldom or ever during the high season when the hotels are normally very busy. Perhaps there is more than a scintilla of truth in the claim that they are indeed nothing more than off-season tourism gimicks.

European Week Against Cancer

This week (October 12-16) has been designated European Week Against

Cancer and the Irish Cancer Society has organised a number of conferences

around the country to focus attention on this dreadful scourge.

Dr. Desmond Carney, Consultant Oncologist at Dublin's Mater Hospital and Chairman Medical Committee, Irish Cancer Society made no bones about what the main enemy was where cancer is concerned when he titled a talk which he gave at a Press Conference in Jury's Hotel, Dublin last Friday, "The War On Cancer Is The War On Tobacco."

Dr. Carney declared that smoking was the largest single avoidable cause of ill-health and premature death in Ireland. Each year at least 5,000 people in this country die prematurely due to their addiction to tobacco. One in every three cancer deaths (including almost 90 per cent of lung cancer deaths) and one in five of all heart disease deaths are caused by smoking.

In his talk Dr. Carney pointed out that these statistics have been released so often that we have almost become hardened to them and that the death and misery which tobacco causes have somehow come to be accepted by our society. And he warned: "we are still faced with the situation where large numbers of young teenagers are becoming hooked on nicotine, a dangerous and addictive drug which will in all probability take years off their lives."

Stating that urgent action was required, Dr. Carney then called on the Government to produce an integrated national programme to cut tobacco consumption aimed particularly at school children between the ages of 12 to 15 and a total ban on all forms of cigarette advertising and promotion. We fully endorse this call by Dr. Carney.

The Cheeky Sparrows Have Also Disappeared

Our recent reference to the disappearance of many small birds which we normally saw about our garden has prompted a response from a reader who has noticed the same thing. In our own case we referred to the absence in recent weeks to the little flocks of finches which were always to be seen feeding in our garden while a pair of aggressive little robins had also failed to appear to mark the passing of Autumn with their sweet plaintive little warblings.

Agreeing that many of these small birds had become conspicuous by their absence on correspondent

drew attention in particular to the almost total disappearance from around Dungarvan of the ordinary house sparrow. It was only when he pointed this out that we realised that it is indeed quite a long time since we saw these cocky little birds twittering from the eaves of houses or dodging in, around and under parked vehicles as they sought bits and pieces to feed on around our streets.

We recall seeing flocks of chattering sparrow as a common scene on the streets at one time. It is, though, a long time ago. We wonder why this is so.

Increased Medical Fees Will Up Drunk Driving Fines

Doctors called out after midnight to take a blood or urine sample for possible use in drunk driving prosecutions are to get a fee rise of almost 300 per cent.

As and from September 1 last the fee has been increased by £100 to £135.54 and it is estimated these revised fees will cost the Department of Justice in or about £1 million over the next year. However the monies paid to the doctors are recouped by the Department when the fines and costs are imposed.

The new fee structure for

reports carried out between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. goes up from £15.27 to £53; between 6 p.m. and midnight it will be £88.30, up from £24.48 while on Saturdays, Sundays and Bank Holidays examinations carried out between 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. will qualify for a £135.54 fee.

As a consequence of these fee increases, the costs to be borne by defendants convicted of drunk driving offences will certainly rise steeply and will make being caught driving with excess alcohol a very costly business.


On Sunday there will also be a short veteran car run, kart racing and hot-rod racing and the climax will be the pre-


RECALLING THE LAST HILL CLIMB EVENT AT THE SWEEP

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





As the situation is unlikely to improve much over the next several weeks, their chances of winning games in this high-profile group, are rather slim and they had hoped that with a full panel available and players being free to train together, they might win here.

A win now seems unlikely as it would be expecting too

Their fifteen points win over Shamrocks was probably their best display of the championship, but this might be downgrading their fine performance against St. Mollerans in a fine game which ended in a draw.

Abbeyside won decisively against Erin's Own on Sunday last, but it proved to be a rather costly result in that they lost the services of John O'Mahony and a couple of players required treatment afterwards. They are now a very formidable side who looked very impressive when beating the fancied Clashmore in their last match. They are not unduly worried about having lost by 5-8 to 1-6 to Ballysgaggart in the league section of the championship, as they had already qualified for the knockout stages at that point.

Ballysgaggart have been on the road for quite a long time without making the longed-for breakthrough at county final level. Their nine points win against neighbours Lismore in the semi-final showed them to have reached their peak and taking on all-comers in the championship. On the balance of things, Ballysgaggart must be considered favourites and to many people it will be a big surprise if the Pat Bennett led side are beaten here. They are given the vote to win but they should remember that Kilrossanty began as outsiders in a number of the games that they have won.

J.F.C. — SEANA PHOBAL V. TALLOW

Both teams have been inactive for so long that not everyone will remember when they last played. Tallow did have a lot of hurling activity up to five weeks ago but the Old Parish players have been relying on challenge games here and there to help keep them tuned up.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL FINAL

Affane Survive In A Close And Exciting Contest

AFFANE 1-5 RING 1-4

This could rightly be described as a grandstand finish to a great intermediate football championship which saw Affane defeat a very gallant Ring team in a match which provided excitement and no small number of thrills for the reasonably good crowd who remained on after the senior match which was played earlier.

This hectic contest began at a fast pace and remained that way until the finish. The tackling was close and tough and from the very beginning it was clearly obvious that neither team were prepared to give an inch to the other. Tempers boiled over for a bit in the second half and a man from each side was sent to the line. This quietened things but it failed to moderate the earnestness with which the final was contested. Over the hour, Affane had six scores and nine wides while Ring had five scores and four wides. Despite this, Ring did have their chances and might have snatched a draw and a second chance, but few who saw the game will deny Affane the right to be named the first divisional champions of 1992. They last won it in 1966, but in the meantime won the senior football championship in 1974.
