Crowds Jam Dungarvan For Motor Sports Festival

Crowds poured into Dungarvan throughout last week-end and jammed the town on Friday, Saturday and Sunday for the holding of what is now being described as the First Annual Festival of Motor Sport. The brainchild of local hotelier Michael Burke, Lawlor's Hotel and well-known Garage Proprietor Michael Moloney who has a vast experience and a most popular standing in all motor sports throughout the country for a long number of years, the venture proved such a resounding success, that plans are already afoot to make it an annual event in the tourism calendar of the Old Boro' from now on.

The organisers, assisted by the Tipperary Light Car and Motor Cycle Club and Dungarvan Tourism left no stone unturned in making this initial effort the huge success it

turned out to be. Indeed the crowds that jammed the town throughout the entire week-end far exceeded their

wildest expectations.

The festival got under way with the opening of the display of Veteran and Vintage cars and Motorcycles at the Sports Centre on Friday night where, thanks to the generous sponsorship of the local Radley Engineering firm, the big attendance were all most hospitably entertained. and from there on it was fun, festivity and excitement all the way.

A busking competition drew a wonderful entry and the various groups and solo entries provided great street entertainment throughout the week-end. A veteran car run and car test trials kept motoring enthusiasts fully occupied throughout Saturday while for those seeking thrills without having to travel were fully catered for by the giant simulator which Perks Amusements very kindly located at the Square.

THE HILL CLIMB

On Sunday the main attractions in a very comprehensive programme were the Hill climb at the Sweep and the 4-Wheel Drive Jeep Trials at Ballycreeen (sponsored by JRs hamburger Restaurant) and the huge entry which brought enthusiasts from all over Ireland thrilled one of the biggest attendances ever at such a fixture. The hillside was crowded to capacity with cars parked for miles along the approach roads and the

huge crowd really enjoyed the scene in the beautiful sunshine.

On the entertainment side the novelty stretcher race (in aid of West Waterford Hospice Organisation) which attracted 19 five-man teams from local licensed premises brought traffic to a standstill as they made their way, via the many "water-holes" from the Texaco Station in Abbeyside to the Moorings at the Quay. The winning team was Tommy Power's (B) who completed "the course" in 20:13. Added attractions were the helicopter rides and Hot Rod Racing and the selection of the Festival Queen.

The only dark cloud on the otherwise most successful week-end was the regretted death of Willie King, founder member and President of Tipperary Light Car & Motor Cycle Club which took place peacefully at the Regional Hospital, Cork on Thursday last. Loan Sharks Operating In Dungarvan


At the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night, the Chairwoman, Cllr. Nuala Ryan said that she was appalled and shocked when she learned that a number of loan sharks had been operating around the town in recent weeks.

Cllr. Ryan said that she understood that they worked in pairs with one going to a door to sell a tv or clothes to an unsuspecting housewife. If the reply was that such purchases could not be afforded the second man was called in who offered to provide a loan. As a result of this activity many people had now got themselves into deep financial difficulties.

Cllr. Ryan went on to say that so widespread were the activities of these loan sharks that she understood that a group of people from a number of organisations in Dungarvan had now come together to form an organisation which was to be known as "Money Matters." She said that she understood that this organisation would be going public this coming weekend with the intention of warning the public about the activities of these loan sharks and offering help to those already involved by di-

recting them to the local Credit Union and other recognised lending agencies.

Co. Council Protest Against Increased Bank Charges

A motion in the names of Councillors Pat Coffey, Patsy Kenneally and Michael Queally was moved at the October monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council calling on the Council to reject the payment of additional bank charges by local authorities as agreed between the County and City Managers Association and representatives of the Banks.

Proposing the motion, Cllr. Coffey said that this was a national problem with local authorities. "The banks are already getting enough by way of high interest charges from local authorities without now putting on these additional special charges," he said.

Replying to a question by Cllr. Coffey, the Council Finance Officer Mr. Paul Clerkin said that the cost of the new charges for 1993 when they would come into force would be about £9,000 as far as the Council was concerned.

Cllr. Coffey then warned that in time the charges could cost the Council up to £40,000 a year.

The County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley responding to a question by the Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that this had been an ongoing saga since 1970 and about two years ago the Banks introduced the new charges unilaterally and the matter then became a national problem. The Department of the Environment entered into the negotiations with the Banks at that stage and an agreement was reached which local authorities were now bound to accept.

Mr. Hurley then added that the day might come when they might have to change treasurers and look for quotations.

Cllr. Tony Wright said that as the Department had been involved in the final agreement with the banks they should now refund whatever extra costs it meant for the Council.

The Manager expressed the hope that this might be so and said that he would prepare a resumé of the position for the members.

The formal resolution of protest was then proposed by Cllr. Coffey, seconded by Cllr. Kenneally and passed.

Dail Query On Incidence Of Cancer In Abbeyside/Dungarvan Area

Deputy Austin Deasy at Question Time in the Dail asked the Minister for Health if there are statistics available for the occurrence of cancer in the various parts of the country; if there is any abnormal incidence of the disease in Waterford City and Waterford County, and more particularly in the Abbeyside/Dungarvan area of County Waterford. — *Austin Deasy.*

In a written reply the Minister for Health, Dr. John O'Connell said:

The Annual Reports on Vital Statistics which are compiled by the Central Statistics Office (CSO) include a table which classifies deaths by principal groups of

causes (including cancer) of residents in each county and county borough. In regard to Waterford, this table gives a breakdown of deaths from cancer in Waterford County Borough and in County Waterford but not in relation to the Abbeyside/Dungarvan area of County Waterford.

The following table sets out the age standardised death rates from cancer per 1000 population nationally and for Waterford County and Waterford County Borough for the period 1984 - 1988 (1988 is the most recent year for which final figures are available).

Ardmore Sweeps Board At Presentation Function

National and Regional Tidy Towns Awards for 1992 were presented at a very successful function organised by South East Tourism in a packed St. Declan's Hall, Ardmore on Monday evening last.

The attendance included Mr. Austin Crowe, Chairman of South East Tourism, Mr. Brendan Kenneally T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Tourism, Transport and Communications, Mr. Noel Kavanagh, Bord Failte, Mr. Seamus Scally, Chairman, Super Valu Supermarkets and representatives from Local Authorities and prize winning centres from around the region.

Our first league game of the season saw our unbeaten run in the Tony Bolger Cup continue. We had a few key players missing but despite this we won comfortably.



4 Months In Jail Or 240 Hours Community Service For Damaging Parked Cars

Melvin Anthony Duffy of 42 Childers Estate, Dungarvan, father of four, pleaded guilty at Dungarvan Court last week to charges arising from interfering with and maliciously damaging two cars which were parked in a Dungarvan car park.

Duffy was charged with interfering with the cars which were parked at the Friary Street car park on October 10 and causing malicious damage to the amount of £250 and stealing property to the value of £41 from one of the vehicles.

Inspector M. Blake told the court that Duffy caused damage to the amount of £150 to one car and £100 to the other. He forced his way into both vehicles but failed to start either. All the stolen property had been recovered.

The Inspector added that Duffy who had returned some time ago from England had no previous convictions.

Judge Patwell sentenced Duffy to a total of four months imprisonment but directed that he be remanded on bail until November 11 to ascertain his suitability to undertake 240 hours community service in lieu of the sentence.

Judge Patwell also indicated that he will make a compensation order against Duffy on production by the injured parties of receipts of

the malicious damage to the cars.

Dungarvan Man Tried To Swallow Cannabis When Challenged

A 30-year-old unemployed labourer tried to swallow a quantity of cannabis resin when approached on the street by a garda, Judge M. Pattwell heard at Dungarvan District Court last week.

Brian Needham, 19 Boreenatra, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to having a quantity of cannabis resin, 1.2 grammes, in his possession at O'Connell Street, on April 28 last.

Inspector M. Blake said when approached by a garda Needham put the cannabis in his mouth and tried to swallow it. The garda had to wrestle him to the ground and force the drug from his mouth. It contained enough cannabis to make eleven cigarettes.

Judge Pattwell fined Needham £200 and warned him that a prison sentence is probable if he is convicted again.

WELL KNOWN HOTEL CLOSES

Well-known South Tipperary Hotel, Knocklofty House, just across the River Suir from the County Waterford has closed down. A petition for winding up the company was presented to the High Court and was heard on Monday, October 19. Knocklofty was the former home of Lord and Lady Donoghmore who were kidnapped on June 4, 1974 and were released by the kidnappers at Phoenix Park on June 9, 1975.

These, along with stalwarts Michael Collins and Jimmy Healy, have given a new lease of life to hurling in the village. Hurling people have a lot to look forward to in the coming weeks.

OUR LOCALITY

Between the years 1863 - 1899 the lifeboat protection service for our stretch of coastline was situated at Ballinacourty. The three lifeboats which operated were named "the Christopher Ludlow," "the William Dunville" and "the Christopher Ludlow 2nd."

The lifeboat was moved to Ballinacourty from Helvick. At the moment the old boathouse is bricked up and most of the slipway is covered with sand and stones. The lifeboat crew slept in the golf clubhouse which was burned down a few years ago.

In 1899 the lifeboat was moved to Helvick again, due to the inquiry of the Moresby which was shipwrecked off Ballinacourty. Twenty people died on the Moreby and the inquiry found that the lifeboat did not give proper assistance to the crewmen.

The first coxman to the lifeboat was Mr. Cummins. Some of the oarsmen were Pat Daly, Pat Flynn, Dan Terry, Martin Veale and Michael Hogan. The second coxwain was Paddy Norris. All these names are associated with Ballinacourty to this day.

Michael Hogan died a month after the Moresby, with a severe cold. Altogether there were thirteen crew on the lifeboat. It is stated that Paddy Norris has the lamp and two oarlocks of the craft.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

Can Nothing Be Done To Arrest Rise In Unemployment?

Last week a public statement made no bones about the fact that the very young and the elderly will become more dependent on the working population in the face of a relentless rise in unemployment in this country.

At the same time statistics released from the Department of Social Welfare show that people in the 25 to 34 age group constitute the highest proportion of those on the dole. This group represents almost a third of the jobless in the country now claimed to be running at the record high figure of 306,939.

This problem of unemployment is the major problem now facing the country and the one which the government should be at pains to resolve in some way in-

stead of wearying us and confusing us with their versions of what the wording of the abortion referenda should be. It seems to us that the manner in which the Government has been fuelling this horrendous debate is aimed at distracting the people's attention from the main problem of unemployment and they are using it as a red herring to keep the minds of the people off the desperate economic situation which is looming larger every month.

Can the Government, in fact, do anything to halt the accelerating rise in the number of people who have nothing in prospect at present except the dole? According to the National Co-operative Council, up to

73,000 jobs could be created in Ireland in the next 12 months if people ensured that 10 per cent of their basic food and clothing requirements were Irish made. For the record over 90 per cent of the shoes we wear are foreign made and last year £142 million worth of shoes, boots and other footwear were imported. In the same period we imported £541 million worth of clothing!

And in a country like Ireland isn't it an absolute disgrace that we used £236 million of imported vegetables and fruit, including potatoes, cabbage, carrots, turnips and tomatoes and in addition £62 million worth of cheese and dairy products and £52 million worth of fish and fish products —

most, if not all of which could be produced here at home.

These facts constitute nothing less than an absolute scandal for a country like Ireland where everything favours the home production of all these items. The fact that so much is imported reflects badly on the Government and their lack of a policy to make the people conscious of how important it is, now more than ever, to buy Irish made goods and Irish produced vegetables, fruit and dairy products.

How much better it would be for the Government to hammer this message home to the Irish people rather than to be wearying us with the cock-up manner in which they are preparing to

present the abortion referendum. Just imagine — if from now on we each and everyone of us insisted on purchasing Irish made goods and Irish grown produce we could be helping to create

73,000 jobs. This would cut our employment figure by almost 25 per cent. It would be a good start in doing something positive to solve this growing economic problem.

The Mystery Of Disappearing Small Birds

Our comments in past weeks about the mystery disappearance of many species of small birds such as finches, robins and sparrows has prompted another correspondent from the Affane area to confirm that she has noticed the same thing in and about the district where she lives.

She said that hundreds of sparrows were a feature of the locality in years gone by but now they are all gone. In addition she tells us that the swallows were

greatly reduced in numbers during the past summer and she suggests reasons such as poison on grain or the ever-increasing number of magpies which rob the nests of small birds.

Our Affane correspondent also told us about a hawk which she observed in one of the farm outbuildings and which continually preyed on whatever small birds came into view — another reason for the disappearance of so many of our little feathered friends.

DO WE HAVE A DRUG PROBLEM?

Reference to an article in a recent issue of the Abbey-side Parish Newsletter prompts us to pose the question — do we have a drug problem, no matter how small, in Dungarvan? The article in the Newsletter dealt with drug laced tattoos called Blue Star which it was alleged were being sold to school children and it warned that the drug could be absorbed through the skin simply by handling the paper. It also warned parents, teachers and all other concerned people to take note.

Inquiries which we have been making since reading this article indicate that the leaflets warning about this Blue Star drug have previously been circulated anonymously in the Dublin area

and caused such a furore that the headquarters of the Garda Drug Squad were inundated by phone calls from people concerned about its contents. The forensic scientists of the Drug Squad have stated that they have never come across tattoos being used in such a fashion.

It transpired that a similar type circular caused widespread panic in the United States last year but on examination it proved to be a hoax. But while the circulation of the leaflet here now may be dismissed as a misguided effort to raise public awareness to the drugs position, there are indications that young people and even children are beginning to experiment with drugs at a younger age.

We believe that for some

time past there is a growing drug problem in the Dungarvan area. Recent local court sittings have dealt with drug offences while recently, detectives from the Drug Squad smashed a cannabis dealing ring in Waterford City following a surveillance lasting for months. There is evidence that it is from the city that some of the drugs being used are finding their way into Dungarvan.

So bad has the situation become in Cork City that the Garda Authorities there have now declared war on drug dealers in an effort to bring the problem under control.

It is of interest to note that in the official Garda Report on Crime for 1991, the

number of persons charged with offences under the Misuse of Drugs Acts was 3088, up nearly 50% from the previous year. Of the total, 769 of the defendants were aged under 21 years. In the Waterford/Kilkenny Garda District the number of persons charged with Drug offences in 1991 was 62 while the number in the East Cork Division, for some unstated reason, was a whopping 409.

This is a very serious matter and where young people especially are concerned, parents should be on the alert to notice any changes in lifestyle in the young people under their care which might indicate an initiation into the dreaded drug scene.

QUAKER TAPESTRY EXHIBITION

Because of other prior local engagements we were unfortunately unable to get down to view the Quaker Tapestry Exhibition which opened at the Garter Lane Art Centre in Waterford on Friday last, October 16.

The exhibition consists of over seventy 2' x 2' panels of superb crewel embroidery worked since 1981 by amateurs of all ages from many different counties depicting events, themes, beliefs and personalities of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) from 1652 to the present day.

One of the panels, "The

Great Hunger," reflects the potato famine of 1845-48 in Ireland and depicts harrowing scenes of the time over the legend "1,500,000 died of starvation and 1,000,000 emigrated. Irish Friends were entrusted with international relief funds to feed the starving, replenish seed and to redeem fishing nets and tools which had been pawned for food."

This unique exhibition will continue at the Waterford Art Centre in Garter Lane until Friday next, October 23 (10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily) and is, we have been assured, well worth a visit.

Sliabh Geal gCua — A Translation

Next week-end the Naomh Pádraig branch of Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Eireann are organising a traditional festival aimed at encouraging further interest among the community in its own background.

A special section of the festival for children includes projects under various headings, one of which deals with the life and work of Pádraig O Mileadha, the well-known Deise poet whose native area is covered by the Naomh Pádraig branch.

Recognising this, we think that it is most appropriate that we should choose O Mileadha's best-known song, "Sliabh Gael gCua," as our choice for the ballad corner this week. Composed originally in Irish by the author during his exile years in South Wales, we give here a translation for the benefit of those who are not so conversant with the Irish language. This translation was passed to us some years ago and was made at the time by a Christian Brother who was then an annual summer holiday visitor to Ardmore.

Under the title "Bright Hospitable Mountain" it goes like this—

Bright hospitable mountain from you I'm far away
Alone, extremely weak and sad, seated by a bay,
The yellow tide beside me, my land and me between
About a bright, kind mountain, is not my story keen?

In gentle, verdant Sceichín were I with mine to be,
When warmth of sun is spreading from skies of cloud
swept free,
Or bring there 'neath starlight when dew falls on the
grass
Would that not be a kindness if it could come to pass.

My sorrow! missing Irish in days when I was young
The music language noble should trip from off my
tongue,
I'd visit you o'er ocean, to you give victor's crown
Because, a bright Sliabh gCua for you I wish renown.

My love to yonder Decies, their fields, their glens and
hills,
For since I've crossed the ocean I'm prey to many ills,
But since Gold called me from it, a blessing on my part
To Ireland and a Mountain flows freely from my heart.

JOE BARRY, KILLEAGH R.I.P.

When we heard of the death at his home last Wednesday of Joe Barry we found it difficult to believe. Joe who had been so amicable and alert always and ready to speak on history, hurling or almost any fact of life.

His friends undoubtedly were numerous and his house was known to all the 'vagrant train' seeking information about various topics and all queries received his undeniable and generous consideration. Many years ago he enlightened us to the fact that the names, Kilty (Coillte) and woods were one and the same name through the power of the Irish language.

Jo, or Tom Joe Barry as he was known, lost his father in 1917 and later his mother went to her eternal rest, but Joe faced the world bravely. An excellent hurler in his young days he was an automatic choice for the Cork minor hurling team in 1932 after giving a superb display in a trial game at Midleton. He didn't favour the idea however but he lined out for a couple of years with his native Killeagh and was always interested and supportive of the games. Neither did he forget the famous Killeagh camogie girls when a rousing ballad from his gifted pen some years ago extolled their gallantry on the playing fields.

His entrepreneurial brain

him to erect the Bohemian Dance Hall in the late thirties and being proprietor of the Hall he catered for dancing patrons around East Cork and West Waterford. It was also available for concerts and plays, and Joe coached and produced many plays in his time and wrote one at least "The Belle of Imokilly." He was also an expert on painting scenes in the Hall. In latter years, like many of his confreres in Killeagh, he became known far and wide as a hurley maker. But his greatest achievement over many years with Mr. Henchion, Cork, was the survey carried out on the three cemeteries in his parish, including Killeagh, Dangan and Ardagh and Ballynoe, Clonmult, etc. It is reckoned to be one of his greatest accomplishments and proof of this is the many people, locally and from Australia, New Zealand, Canada and U.S.A. and elsewhere that have sought information concerning their forbears.

Joe, as the priest said in his homily at the Requiem Mass in Killeagh, did a wonderful service to communities everywhere. It was a labour of love with him and now tho' sadness grips us on his departure it must be still tinged with happiness, remembering that we knew and spoke to this great Gael and friend.

Our sympathy is extended to his near relatives, the families Donoghue's, Purcell's, Heaphy's and Barry's and many friends from all

Muire ar a anam uasal. He was interred in Killeagh cemetery with Fr. Glavin, P.P. and Fr. Kelleher, C.C. officiated at the graveside. — J.B.

Time for a good tidy-up of trees

Think 'pruning' in October even if you have only a small garden — these always seem to have at least one shrub or tree specimen needing attention.

The most obvious candidates for a good tidy up are fruit trees, but soft fruits should have had a trim after cropping.

And stems carrying this year's blooms on rambling roses should have been cut to the ground by now.

Check on deciduous trees too. They don't need regular pruning but dead material should be neatly trimmed back to the next branch or trunk, finishing the job with pruning paint to deter rot and disease.

Be prepared to cut live growth too if the centre of the tree is becoming tangled or branches are crossing and rubbing, but do consult a specialist if the tree is mature or valuable.

Pruning — Much pruning is common sense: making clean cuts, never cutting close to and damaging buds, never cutting too far from shoots — the wood will die back — and always sloping cut to take water away from the bud and avoid rot.

But there is also a skill in shaping trees to fit surroundings and these can be particularly effective in small gardens where modest gardeners might be unaware that they can grow fruit trees.

There are several styles for pruning and training trees. The methods are too involved to detail here but here are brief descriptions:

FANS — as the name suggests this is a fan shape stretching out from a shorter trunk. It is popular for cherries and peaches which like the shelter and warmth of walls and fences and look especially decorative at blossom time.

ESPALIERS — used for apples and pears, this method creates a central spine with long main branches trained out at right angles with heavily cut back secondary branches which bear the fruit.

CORDONS — less decorative, this method involves concentrating on training one branch against a wall or fence and pruning it down to short fruit-bearing spurs.

Soft fruit pruning should have been done by now and the golden rule is 'be ruthless' or they won't crop heavily next time.

Gooseberries need to have at least a third of the old stems cut back now and even more of the new growth.

Techniques : Pruning technique with blackcurrants does vary with varieties so do some research but the general rule is to cut back old wood which fruited this year. It's a similar story with blackberries and raspberries — cut old fruiting wood back to ground level.

Move To Set Up Separate Planning Committees Rejected

Moving a motion at the October monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council that a planning committee be set up in each of the four electoral areas of the county, Cllr. Tom Cunningham said that such a move would streamline the planning process in the county and avoid the many delays now being experienced by applicants.

Cllr. Cunningham stated that he had put down the motion as a lot of people had expressed their dissatisfaction at the present situation. "Applications are being held up for nine and even twelve months now and I feel that if the local councillors in each area became involved it would speed up matters," he said.

The motion was seconded by Cllr. John Carey.

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley immediately rejected claims that any undue delays in dealing with planning applications had taken place and he pointed out that decisions must be made on all planning applications within a period of two months as laid down in the Act.

Cllr. W. McDonnell said that last year when he was Chairman of the Council this matter had been discussed fully and it was agreed at the time that members who had any problems about planning could raise them at Council meetings. "In the circumstances I can see no reason for setting up local

planning committees as now proposed," he said.

The Chairman, Cllr. Billy

Kyne said that he would be slow to approve of a separate planning committee for

each area as any problems that could arise could be raised in public and discussed at Council meetings.

A vote on the motion was then taken and on a show of hands resulted in a 10-10 tie. The Chairman, Cllr. Kyne then gave his casting vote against the motion and declared it lost.

Big Week-End Programme Of Major Games Down For Decision

WATERFORD FOOTBALLERS PLAY WEXFORD IN 'B' QUARTER FINAL

Some teams are in action on four or five successive weeks and as a result, many are not a full strength because of the absence of injured players whose recovery time is limited.

The overall result of the situation is that we are sure to have a number of unexpected results between here and the finals.

With the hurling situation moving in to the semi-final stages we find that only two of the six senior clubs are from this division. Both are in action next week-end and if both are beaten, then the county final will almost certainly be played in Walsh Park for the second season running. Nothing wrong with this, I am just making the point.

SENIOR FOOTBALL WATERFORD v WEXFORD

The county football team play Wexford in the quarter final of the 'B' All-Ireland championship on Sunday next and with so many of the panel engaged in club championships, they will again be compelled to field a very weak side. Wexford have already beaten Limerick and were impressive in doing so. How we can expect to do well in the competition (which was initiated at our behest) in such circumstances, is difficult to fathom. The selectors will not be in a position to name a team until late in the week and after they know which players are not club tied.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP DUNGARVAN v NIRE

This very attractive semi-final will be played on Saturday at Leamybrien and it is a pity that it is going to clash with a number of other very attractive fixtures. It is

a 'death or glory' affair with the losers going out of the championship and the winners through to the semi-final against Stradbally or Rathgormack.

Dungarvan are the reigning county champions and will start favourites to qualify, but having lost a couple of their games on the way here and since winning their second title, it would be unwise of them to regard this tie as anything other than a very serious challenge to their crown. They have already lost to Rathgormack and were beaten by Gaultier on Saturday last and while their display on Saturday did not show their true form, defeats such as it was do not help the confidence of a team.

The Nire are an improving team and while they were beaten in their last match there were extenuating circumstances on the afternoon on which they lost to Stradbally. When the teams last met, Dungarvan won by 0-10 to 1-6.

This could be a 'touch and go' situation for the champions as the Nire at their best are capable of beating them. Maybe when there is a very serious threat to their title, they will pull out all the stops and pull through.

SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP TALLOW v PORTLAW

This will be one cracker of a game and will certainly bring along the crowds to Dungarvan on Sunday. Portlaw will be in action for the third Sunday in a row and will be pretty confident of maintaining their winning sequence. Defeating one of the championship favourites, Ballygunner and coming along on the following Sunday and taking the county champions out of the title race, is quite an achievement. As we saw on Sunday, they have very few weak links on their side which is a blend of youth and experience.

Tallow have been idle, championship wise, for a long time and whatever the quality of the challenge games which they have played, there is no substitute for the real thing. Tallow have qualified without being over impressive and will need to have improved quite a bit to defeat a side who have shown so much improvement. One of the most

skillful teams in the county, Tallow can be great when things go right for them, but compared with other times, they do lack the physical strength that could be needed here to overcome a team like Portlaw. It will be a close call for either side and if it is not going to end in a draw, Portlaw could be fancied to register their third win on the trot.

SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP BALLYDUFF v PASSAGE

This is the first of the senior hurling quarter finals at Fraher Field on Sunday and like the feature game, it is a hard one to figure.

Ballyduff, like Tallow, have been out of championship action for a while, or since they beat Fourmilewater at Cappoquin. They did play a senior league match which they lost to St. Saviours two weeks ago.

Passage have had plenty of recent activity including a championship decider against Ballygunner last Sunday and will be sharper than Ballyduff because of this. The visiting Eastern team will start favourites and I expect that they will beat Ballyduff, but Ballyduff have surprised before when they were unfancied.

JUNIOR HURLING COUNTY FINAL

Kilmacthomas and Ballysaggart meet in the junior hurling county final at Fraher Field on Saturday next in what promises to be a tremendous contest between teams who have never before met in championship.

Both teams have survived through tough campaigns in their respective divisions and on the basis of their displays in the divisional finals, a case can be made in favour of both. Kilmac's display against Ferrybank on last Sunday must put them into the final with a favourites chance, but if the Western champions can mount the kind of challenge of which they are capable, the result can go the other way.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING SEMI-FINALS

Abbeyside play Clonea at Kill in the first semi-final of this championship on Saturday, while Colligan and Stradbally renew rivalry in

the second semi-final at Fraher Field on the same afternoon. Regardless of which teams win, the county final will be played in Dungarvan.

Clonea who are the demoted senior team of 1991 began as favourites to take this title, even before a ball was struck and there has been little in their performances so far to suggest that this was not a reasonable forecast. They certainly have been very impressive, not having lost a game so far. The venue will also be to their satisfaction. This is a game that should be played in a hurling venue such as Walsh Park and it is difficult to know why it is not.

Abbeyside have defeated Erin's Own and Cappoquin over the past two Sundays and can be said to be well tuned up for the game. They have problems up front and seem unable to overcome their lack of scoring power which is evident from recent results. Here they are the challengers and can be relied upon to give it their very best, but on the form of the sides, so far, Clonea must be fancied.

Stradbally beat Colligan in their recent meeting at Fraher Field, but Colligan didn't kill themselves trying to prevent such a result as it meant absolutely nothing to them to win or lose. Now there remains the question will they be able to reverse the result against a confident Stradbally team, who in the meantime, have beaten a strongly fancied St. Mollerans. Colligan will rely a lot on county player Jimmy Beresford to bring them through and the expectations are that Jimmy will make the difference between winning and losing here.

A Colligan/Clonea final is predicted.

MINOR HURLING REPLAY

Among the very many other championship games listed for the week-end is the replay of the Lismore v Dungarvan minor hurling semi-final at Cappoquin on Monday (Bank Holiday).

This will be preceded by the Abbeyside v Naomh Brid minor football semi-final. This means that after the week-end, the divisional board will be ready for the finals in both codes. It is quite possible that Abbeyside and Dungarvan will meet in both.

G.A.A. NOTES

BY "COMMENTATOR"

CO. BOARD MEETING

E. O Murchu, Chairman, presided at last Monday night's meeting of the County Board. At the outset the Chairman referred to the Dr. Morris Under-21 All-Ireland hurling final trophy which was on display and on behalf of the Board he congratulated the players, selectors, supporters and everyone associated with a wonderful achievement which was long over-due in Waterford. He said he hoped that this victory would be a forerunner to bigger things in the near future.

It was agreed that the Board should send a letter of thanks to Kilkenny County Board for their wonderful co-operation and help during the drawn match and replay.

FINES

Fines totalling £900 were imposed on Waterford for breach of the match regulations during the three All-Ireland games: £300 for the minor final and £300 each for the drawn and replayed under-21 All-Ireland.

This notification from Croke Park gave rise to an amount of discussion and while some complained about the severity of these penalties, others agreed that since we were in breach, we had no defence. The fines will not be appealed and will be brought to the notice of those most concerned.

There was an amount of criticism of Games Administration Committee for not informing the Board of the particular regulation which was breached and also of the fact that members of the Board were able to read about the fines on the daily papers before the Board were notified of the decisions.

The meeting made it clear that this was not acceptable and a protest will be sent to Croke Park.

COISDE NA PEIL REPORT

In their monthly report, the football committee complained about the fixing of National Football League home matches for venues other than Dungarvan, Leamybrien or Stradbally. The case was made that these were the centres where greatest support can be guaranteed for football games.

The Chairman stated that the fixtures for the leagues had already been made and would have to stand.

They also urged that the under-21 and minor football selectors be appointed as soon as possible in order that they be given time to organise themselves for Munster and Leinster leagues in which they have been participating for a number of years. The report stated that the football committee were prepared to nominate the selectors if the Board approved. Approval was given and all clubs were

invited to submit names of members who were suitable and willing.

UNDER-AGE HURLING SELECTORS

On the proposition of John Jackson, the meeting agreed to appoint County Selectors in the under-21 and minor hurling grades for the coming season at the November meeting. Clubs may nominate, but because of the success attained by the outgoing men in 1992, it is virtually certain that these will be reappointed.

SPONSORSHIP

The Chairman informed the meeting that sponsorship had been obtained for the senior hurling and football championships and that an agreement had been made with Lawlor's Hotel for this year, two further years and an option of having the sponsorship for a further two years. It is also part of the deal that the county finalists in each code (senior) will be the guests of the hotel at a post-match dinner on the evening of the county finals.

Although strongly pressed by Michael Brophy and others, the Chairman stated that he was not in a position to disclose the amount of money involved. Phil Fanning made the point that the offer of the post-match meal could not be taken up by teams playing a county final at Walsh Park. The Chairman stated that in such cases nothing could be done to avail of this aspect of the agreement.

Some of the delegates thought that the sponsorship should not be confined to the senior grades. Michael O'Mahony, Clonea, said that the Board should attempt to get sponsorship for the intermediate hurling and football grades.

Greg Fives proposed that each of the participating teams in the finals be given a grant of £500. This was debated at length and the Chairman pointed out that because of the Board's financial position at this time clubs should agree to leave the sponsorship money with the Board until our position improved. The matter was finally referred to the Coisde Gnotha.

STAND AT FRAHER FIELD

Nioclás MacCraith in his report on the Fraher Field informed the meeting that in response to the recent advertisement inviting contractors to submit tenders for the erection of a stand that already six construction firms had intimated that they were interested.

RELEGATION

A motion from the Sliabh gCua Club to last year's county convention which re-

quested that intermediate teams being promoted to senior ranks after winning a county final be compelled to remain in that grade at least two years, was referred to at the Board meeting when it was noted that Sliabh gCua, who were promoted last year after winning the intermediate championship, were now in line for relegation.

The particular motion was given convention approval and was then referred to County Board who were the only body competent to make such a decision, but it was not subsequently discussed by County Board.

The Chairman said that a decision could not now be arrived at without having the matter researched and he undertook to have this done by the November meeting.

BUCKET COLLECTION

James Tobin, referring to the Somalia Famine Disaster, said that a bucket collection was being organised for the senior semi-finals in both grades of the championships. He said it was hoped to have the under-21 All-Ireland players available at the venues to help in this very worthy cause. The Board gave unanimous approval.

ROCK CONCERTS

Fourmilewater delegate, P. J. Ryan proposed a motion condemning the staging of Rock concerts and the like at our venues throughout the country. He said that the practice had already been widely condemned by the church and by other bodies who had any interest in preserving our culture. He said it was a well known fact that these occasions were encouraging excessive drinking and drug abuse and it was not altogether a matter of what went on inside the grounds on these occasions but what took place around the place. He said we should do everything in our power to stop these from being repeated.

Other members expressed agreement about the disgraceful carry-on at these events and there was unanimous approval for the motion.

CO-OP DRAW

A letter from the group of clubs who normally participate in the co-op draw to raise funds for grounds development was read. This applied for permission to run the draw in early 1993. The Chairman stated that in view of the upcoming county-wide draw being organised by the County Board, the group might defer the application and throw in their lot with the new draw.

Paddy Fitzgerald, Chairman of the group, said that the clubs involved had all undertaken major development at a huge cost and relied entirely on the proceeds

from the co-op draw to fund this development. He pointed out that they had no absolute guarantee that the county draw was going to be very successful and if they found out this too late they could not then go back to the public. In order to have their draw a success they would have to get working on it very soon. This matter is to be further discussed.

REPORTS

There were reports from the various committees and the final report from the outgoing under-21 hurling selectors was very comprehensive and listed all the factors and people, etc., who had contributed to the ultimate success of the team. It stated that the trio were willing to act again if reappointed.

FUND RAISING

On behalf of the County Finance and Development Committee, Declan O'Meara (Chairman) gave an outline of the proposed fund raising scheme which is presently being organised to help in the badly needed develop-

ment of Fraher Field and Walsh Park. He stated that it will require a minimum of 10,000 members to ensure the success of the draw for which generous prizes will be offered.

Also the scheme is designed to help clubs finance their own development projects and other activities. If every club can canvass an average of 200 members in their area at just £5 per month, the scheme will be a worthwhile success. He also pointed out that it is the responsibility of every club in the county to concern themselves about the state of our grounds and if this drive is not successful then the committee would have failed and the county grounds would continue to decline. This situation would certainly bring no credit on the county. Greg Fives, assistant treasurer of the committee, also spoke.

It was stated that all clubs will be spoken to and at these meetings the scheme will be outlined in greater detail. Having discussed it for some time, the County Board have its approval and all going well, the county

draw will commence just before or after Christmas.

NOMINATING TEAMS

Because of our failure to complete the senior championships on time, the Board are in effect being disciplined by the Munster Council and will be compelled to nominate teams to play in the provincial club championships next month. This was discussed by the Board who decided to make another appeal to the Council for a postponement of the games in which we will be involved.

In the event of the appeal being refused, it was agreed, after a discussion, to pick from a hat one of the four teams who will have qualified for the semi-finals on both hurling and football. A proposition that the reigning county champions, if still involved, be nominated, was defeated.

Note — The Munster Council decided on Friday night last that Waterford would have to nominate teams if they were not read in time.

Ahearn, C.C., Abbeyside and also in attendance was His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Russell, Very Rev. Fr. R. O'Doherty, P.P., Very Rev. Fr. M. J. Ryan, P.P., Stradbally, Mons. P. Lannon, Pat Fanning, former Association President, Declan Goode, Waterford Life President, as well as many former county hurlers and old neighbours. His Lordship recited a decade of the rosary for the happy repose of his soul.

On behalf of all his very many friends in the county, we offer our sympathy to his bereaved relatives in London.

Jailed For Fourth Drunk Driving Offence

A 43-year-old unemployed labourer who was convicted at Dungarvan Court last week of his fourth drunk driving offence was sent to jail by Judge M. Patwell.

Father of four, William Butler, Kiladangan, Dungarvan, was given a 3 months prison sentence when he pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol at Grattan Square, Dungarvan on April 24 last.

The court was told that Butler was returning from a funeral when Gardaí observed his erratic driving.

Inspector M. Blake who prosecuted disclosed that Butler had 3 previous convictions since 1982 for driving with excess alcohol.

In addition to the prison sentence Butler was banned from driving for a period of three years and had the conviction endorsed on his licence.
