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Dungarvan Move To Aid Those Caught In Moneylenders' Web

Further to our front page story in last week's issue concerning the reference at a recent meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council to the operations of loan sharks in the town, the Secretary of the newly formed "Money Matters" has sent us the following letter for publication:

"It was heartening to read that the activities of moneylenders were discussed at a recent meeting of Dungarvan U.D.C. But have your readers an understanding of the real hardship felt by many families in our community?"

"The problem stems from trying to live on insufficient income, which may be unemployment benefit or earnings from low-paid work. This low income, sometimes made worse by bad household management, means that savings of any sort are usually "out of the question." Without savings, low-income families have little chance of borrowing, even small amounts, for occasions, activities, expenses, such as First Communion, Confirmation, Christmas, Education (especially back-to-school expenses), weddings, funerals, necessary trips, etc., etc.

"Moneylenders provide plenty of money, just for the asking, often at times when it is hard for a parent to say "NO".

SEVERAL MONEYLENDERS OPERATING

The letter goes on to say: "There are several moneylenders (mostly outsiders) operating in Dungarvan, many of them are illegal; money is paid off weekly, often at huge interest rates; loans are topped up and some families owe money to more than one operator.

"For those involved, the constant hardship of trying to make ends meet has several negative effects on individuals and households i.e. fear and anxiety within the family, feelings of inadequacy at home, at school, socially; poor diet and health problems (physical or mental stress).

"However, the widespread problems of insufficient income and dependence on moneylenders have been eased for many families throughout Ireland. The Credit Union Movement, and other agencies have become involved with individ-

No New Vocational School For Dungarvan

— Present Accommodation
Adequate Says Minister

On Thursday last, Deputy Austin Deasy again raised the need for a new Vocational School for Dungarvan in the Dail pointing out that since the architectural planning of a new school was suspended in 1989, the school had gone forward by leaps and bounds and particularly so during the last year.

Deputy Deasy went on to say: "It is now one of the most outstanding schools in County Waterford. The enrolment in the school is increasing significantly every year. For example, there are 345 pupils in the school, an increase of 72 or 25 per cent over last year's level. That has been the trend in recent years. It is not that long ago when there were barely 100 students in that school. The school is totally out of date and inadequate to cater for the numbers attending it. It should be borne in mind that many

of these children would be regarded as disadvantaged in some ways — they would not attend schools which are regarded as high on the academic list.

"There is a young and brilliant staff in the school. Through their work they have attracted an unprecedented number of students to the school. The Government and the Department of Education should respond by providing a new school for them. At present students are being taught in a school which dates back to the thirties and is totally inadequate. In addition to the main school building, there are a few prefabs. This situation should not pertain in 1992 as it can only get worse."

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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have been getting Unemployment Benefit for five months and am expecting a baby in October. Will I be able to claim Maternity Allowance and if not can I continue to draw my Unemployment Benefit. What happens when I am in hospital?

Answer — There is now only one Maternity Allowance Scheme and it only covers women who are in employment and earning at least £25 per week and who meet the PRSI requirements.

Special arrangements have been made for women like yourself who are signing on for Unemployment Benefit which will allow you to continue to be paid your Unemployment Benefit for the six weeks before and six weeks after the birth.

You should notify the exchange about your pregnancy approximately 3 months before the birth. They will give you a form for the doctor to complete, certifying the expected date of delivery. Then 4 weeks before the birth you will be allowed to sign on for the following 12 weeks. Your Unemployment Benefit will be paid by cheque for the 12 weeks. However, women with less than 12 weeks of their Unemployment Benefit remaining will only be paid for the number of weeks left on their claim.

Women claiming Disability Benefit who are no longer part of the workforce (who have no job to go back to) will continue to be paid their Disability Benefit provided they have a condition (other than pregnancy) to warrant their being on Disability Benefit.

Note — Women in employment who are eligible for Maternity Allowance but who happen to be on sick leave immediately before they are due to start on maternity leave will be paid their 14 weeks Maternity Allowance in the normal way.

Question — I was on a Cert Overseas Placement Programme in 1990/91. Immediately before that and since my return I have been working. Recently, I was refused a Social Welfare benefit on the grounds that I hadn't enough PRSI in 1990. Should I have got credits for the Cert course?

Answer — There is no legislation with the granting of credits to Cert trainees. However, credits may be awarded on an administrative basis to trainees on certain Cert courses.

There are at least 12 different types of Cert courses and they can range from full-time, part-time, work experience, language training and 2 day release courses.

Some students receive a training allowance while in college, then when they are placed on work experience they are paid by the employer who operates PRSI for them in the normal way.

You can't get a credit until you have actually worked. So, trainees who have never worked can't get credits.

Each case has to be looked at on an individual basis. In your particular case it would appear that you are entitled to credits. So, you should send details of your Cert course to the Schemes Section, Records Section, Department of Social Welfare, Gandon House, Dublin 2, who will look into your case.

Question — Can you tell me if all the changes announced before the Budget have come into effect with regard to Disability Benefit?

Answer — Some of the proposed changes have come into effect. These are as follows:

(1) — Pay Related Benefit is no longer payable with Disability Benefit in the case of all new claims started on or after April 6, 1992.

(2) — Since July 1, 1992 there is a requirement that of the 39 weeks P.R.S.I. you are required to have in the governing contribution year, 13 must be paid contributions.

However, the Regulations provide that if you don't meet this requirement in the governing tax year, then the two previous tax years can be used, or a subsequent tax year.

So, for a person claiming Disability Benefit anytime in 1992, the 13 paid contributions can be in any one of the tax years from 1988 to 1991/92.

One In Four People Get Shingles

"For some people shingles is just a passing annoyance, but for others it is the most devastating thing they will ever experience," says Dr. Hugh Raftery, Consultant Anaesthetist and current President of the World Society of Pain Clinicians.

Approximately one in four people will develop shingles at some time in their life. It affects both sexes and all age groups. People who have had chickenpox in childhood can develop shingles. Recently, tablets have become available which, if taken in time, halt the progression of the disease and reduce the likelihood of long term pain. According to Dr. Raftery, there is evidence to show that the earlier the condition is treated, the shorter and less severe will be the attack. Medical advice should be sought at the first signs of discom-

fort and pain.

The first sign of shingles is usually severe pain, followed a few days later by a rash appearing in the same area. Shingles is caused by a herpes virus, but not the same one which causes cold sores or genital herpes. It is the same virus that causes chicken-pox in childhood. After chickenpox, the virus remains dormant in the body and years later re-activates as shingles. Reactivation can be triggered by stress, illness, physical trauma, being generally run down or simply by getting older.

The most worrying side

effect of shingles can be the severe pain that some people suffer and which lingers long after the shingles rash goes away. Shingles associated pain has been described by patients as truly awful and can last for many months. Called Post Herpetic Neuralgia, this is a difficult pain to treat, according to Dr. Raftery and may require referral to a special pain clinic.

Close contact with shingles sufferers should be avoided as, though it is not highly contagious, it can cause chickenpox in people who have never had chickenpox.

"DEPARTURES" — Changes In The Patterns Of Rural and Social Life In Ireland

"Departures" tells about rural life in Ireland and the rapidly changing patterns of social mores over the past thirty years.

Old Irish fair days give way to modern cattle marts while home-made butter-makers and card players and walkers to the well are viewed by a new generation of depressed, despairing but know-it-all attenders at the Technical school.

Coachloads of young people who staff the city for Dubliners on week days make their ritual journeys on Friday and Sunday evenings, hitting the discos on hometown Saturday nights.

The characters, the stories, the social rituals, and

the quick irreverent humour of the world of "Departures" are all presented in the voice of the first person; a youth who sits under the alders by a river bank waiting for the first lines of poetry to form on the tongue; a homesick traveller and pilgrim stranger in London, Amsterdam and Paris who finds himself

back in Ireland in time for an election.

The author, Brian Leyden won the R.T.E. Francis McManus Short Story Award in 1988 with a story about the mining village of Arigna. "Departures" is published by Brandon Books, Dingle, and will go on sale towards the end of October, price £6.99.

Dungarvan "Tech" Crying Out To Be Brought Into 20th Century

No attempts have been made to modernise a Dungarvan school built 54 years ago, and where the current student numbers are at an all time high, the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee was told.

Held in Dungarvan last week, the meeting heard that the teaching staff at Dungarvan Technical College have now set up a new committee, the School Liaison Body, to endeavour to plan the future development of a school which they say is crying out to be brought into the 20th century.

Mr. Paudie Geary, a member of the school's teaching staff, said this year's enrolment numbers stand at a record 345, an increase of 72 on last year. Sadly, however, since the school was built in 1938 no effort what-

ever has been made to modernise it, and the current serious accommodation problem, together with the lack of facilities, now need to be immediately addressed.

Mr. Geary said the teaching staff held a special meeting on October 14 and a School Liaison Body was set up to specifically plan for the future development and expansion of the school.

"The teachers are now seeking a meeting between this new body, the VEC, a Department of Education official, and the school architect," said Mr. Geary. "There is a great need to bring the school into the 20th century."

The chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, agreed that the future development of the Dungarvan school has to be the

VEC's number one priority. There is now a serious over-reliance on pre-fab buildings, and the Department of Education people will have to visit the school to fully appreciate the extent of the problems.

Mr. Jimmy Byrne said that 12 years ago he had proposed that a new vocational school be built in Dungarvan. A site was purchased, the plans were well advanced, when out of the blue the Department of Education, for some inexplicable reason said "no."

"We should never have allowed our plans to die," he added.

OUTDATED

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally said a 30% increase in student numbers from last year represented their strongest hand with the Department. The school is outdated, it is

inadequate to meet modern needs, and the Department of Education must be made to realise that," he said.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan agreed and said it was "high time" to get away from the pre-fab classroom mentality.

He said he couldn't understand why the Department of Education had continually thrown money away on the provision of pre-fab classrooms at the school over the years. What they had spent to-date on them would have financed the building of a modern, permanent extension.

It was finally agreed unanimously to invite a senior official from the Building Section of the Department to the November meeting to which invitations will also be extended to representatives of the teaching staff and the VEC's architect.

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WHY NOT GIVE US A TRY?

The Story Of Petticoat Loose

[The One Time "Scourge Of The Western Deice"]

Close by the beautiful VEE PASS in the Knockmealdown Mountains are the waters of Baylough. This is the most haunted area from Cappoquin to Clogheen with its scourge of the Western Deise — the Ghost of "Petticoat Loose."

"Petticoat" as she is called still lends an aura of fear ever since the early 19th century when she lived and died in the area. She was a Mary Hannigan, a farmer's daughter from the townland of Colligan. A giant of a young woman almost six feet tall and built in proportion. she lived in the early part of the 19th century. It was the time of the hedge school masters. Mary worked on the farm — a good sized farm for those days with 15 cows and three servant girls.

Her outstanding skill was dancing at crossroads, in kitchens and barns. Mary could outclass any dancer in the county doing the reel and half-set except a young lad from a neighbouring farm. His prowess led him into an early marriage with Mary and an early death.

How Mary came to be called "Petticoat Loose" happened like this. There was a wedding in the neighbourhood with dancing and drinking during the night — Mary could drink as well as she could dance, and as she spun round in a wild, drunken dance the buttons of her skirt got caught on a nail, they burst open and down came Mary's skirt to the floor. The dancers jeered her but Mary with her fists sent some of them flying into the air and down on the ground. This incident earned her the name "Petticoat Loose."

Mary had been married a year when, one night as she was milking the cows, a man was heard shouting and groaning in a nearby field. One of the servants got up to run to the field, but "Petticoat" caught up her milking stool and struck the girl over the head.

Petticoat's husband was never seen after that and the people around concluded that that was the hour when he was murdered by the hedge-school master who was Mary's lover. To all who asked where he was, she answered "he went away before and will be back some day."

From that on "Petticoat's" temper grew worse — nobody dared to question her and she drank heavily.

About a year later she went on a terrible spree in a local public house with some of the neighbouring workmen. She called for a half-gallon of beer which she gulped down. Suddenly she fell forward on the table, dead. She had died without a priest — a sad and terrible thing to happen in those days.

ALMOST FORGOTTEN

Seven years passed and Petticoat was almost forgotten. Then one night there was a big dance in a certain house. Coming towards midnight one of

the men went out to stop the dogs from barking in the yard. He came back looking scared and with a breaking voice he said "Petticoat is down in the yard", but nobody believed him as the same man was ever playing tricks on people. An hour later another man went out but he came back fast, looking as pale as whitewash. "She is there alright" he stutered.

All were afraid to leave the house until daylight and from then onwards Petticoat was seen in many places across County Waterford and into Tipperary. A man was coming from Clonmel one night and he saw this woman sitting on the side of the road. A strange kind of fear came over him, but he spoke to her and asked if she had far to go and would she like a lift. "Yes," she said, "I'll take a lift for a few miles" and up she jumped on the side of the cart. The horse grunted and stopped, then with a slow hard pull the poor animal started to shiver and sweat. The woman jumped off the cart and the horse went into a mad gallop almost throwing the frightened driver to the ground. Next day he was told "you had Petticoat Loose for a passenger."

BANISHED TO BAYLOUGH

Petticoat became the dread of the district. People who had to travel in the area by night used to carry all kinds of safeguards — like hazel sticks or religious objects. Finally the people around asked the local parish priest to banish this wicked woman. He set out one night in his pony and trap accompanied by two local fearless men. Travelling along the road they saw her coming across a field, the priest saluted and asked her who she was. "I'm Petticoat Loose" she answered.

"I'm going to banish you for ever" said the priest, who then produced holy water "for all the cruel things you did in your lifetime especially getting your lover to kill your husband. I command you to leave this place now and forever. I'll put you where the water is deep — go to the bottom of the lake at Baylough and stay there till you make a "sugawn" (a twisted rope of hay or straw) of the sand."

She vanished in a flash and was never seen again. It is believed that she is still there at the bottom of the lake by the Vee. "At last she is finished" the men said with relief to the priest. "But I'm finished too," said the priest, "I feel all my strength has gone."

The brave priest was dead in two weeks.

The waters of Baylough to this day lend a strange aura of loneliness to that beautiful Vee Pass by the Knockmealdowns.

Motion Condemning Abolition Of Regional Tourism Boards Is Lost

The two Fine Gael members of Dungarvan Urban Council found themselves on opposite sides of the fence when a motion calling on the Council to condemn the abolition of Regional Tourism Boards was discussed at the Council's monthly meeting last week.

The motion was proposed by Cllr. Richie Walsh who called on the Council to condemn in the strongest possible terms the retrograde step being proposed by the Government of abolishing the Regional Tourism Boards and County Development Teams.

Cllr. Walsh said that the Taoiseach's announcement had come out of the blue

and had been made without consulting anyone. "It is the craziest notion of all time," he said.

Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that he would have to disagree with his party colleague on this issue adding that while he would compliment the Tourism Boards for the good work they had done he felt that a lot of dupli-

cation had now come into tourist development. He thought it would be a better idea if every county took steps to promote itself. "I would prefer to see a Waterford County Development Board in charge of its own destiny and having a direct say in the development of the county," said Cllr. O'Riordan.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan agreed

with what Cllr. O'Riordan said but added that the RTOs would not be disbanded until the new enterprise Boards to replace them would be in place and running. She felt that there would be a lot of local involvement in the new partnership boards.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan however seconded the motion pointing out that there could be a conflict of interest in the proposed new boards. He also felt that the abolition of the RTOs would be detrimental to the interests of tourism in the area.

"The Regional Tourism Boards were the greatest talking shops of all time," then quipped Cllr. O'Riordan.

The motion was lost by 3 votes to 2 with 2 abstaining.

They said that the additional 3% increase in interest rates introduced as a result of the international money crisis would only be a very temporary measure, but just as the FF-PD coalition was, in the words of Taoiseach Reynolds himself, only a temporary little arrangement, it just seems to go on and on with nothing being done by the Government to ease the situation.

These spiralling interest rates are crippling not only small business concerns but are putting many mortgage

holders in dire jeopardy. We are aware of many householders who are now literally at their wit's end, just struggling to keep their heads above water. More than one has made no bones in declaring that there was no way they would be able to fork out an extra £60 to £80 a month to meet the exorbitant increase on their mortgages caused by this additional 3% interest hike.

Small businesses with big borrowings are also in deep trouble and many may have to go to the wall because of the

added burden created by these crippling high interest rates.

It appears that bankers and international financiers are now the real power-brokers and not the politicians but they should not be allowed to create situations which inflict such suffering on ordinary, powerless people who are just struggling to make a living.

It's already gone time to put an end to this latest vicious "temporary arrangement" and to haul back the interest rates to what they were before the last financial upheaval.

Fire Safety Should Be Number One Priority

Chimney fires are by far the most frequent reason for calls to the Fire Brigade. Most are due to unswept chimneys. In 1989 chimney fires accounted for three quarters of the domestic fires that occurred in the country. The annual cost of running the fire service nationwide will reach almost £70 million this year. In some countries, for example in Germany, you can get fined for not sweeping your chimney.

These are some of the facts contained in the current issue of "Consumer Choice", the independent consumer magazine published monthly by the Consumers' Association of Ireland, which strongly recommends, fine or no fine, having your chimney swept

at least twice a year.

Fire safety should be the number one priority in the home, a spokeswoman from Consumer Choice says. At least fifty people die in fires every year, many more are badly burned and hundreds of homes destroyed. In addition to the human suffering, the community foots a huge bill because of fires and the sad fact is that many of these fires could be prevented.

Procedures that can be taken to prevent fires include the identification of such fire hazards as open fires, overloaded adaptors, poor wiring, matches and smoking materials, chip pans and foam filled furniture.

"Consumer Choice" then stresses that smoke alarms are the single most effective

piece of fire safety equipment. "They can provide those vital few minutes warning in which to escape if a fire breaks out" and adds that "at least two fire alarms should be fitted in every house." Should the worst come to the worst and a fire does erupt then the best line of action is to try to contain the fire, raise the alarm, get out and stay out and call the fire brigade.

With the onset of winter and the cold weather, fires which have not been used throughout the summer are now again being lit. If you have not had your chimney cleaned in the meantime then we advise you to lose no time in following the recommendations of the current issue of "Consumer Choice" and get it done without further delay.

Parked Vehicles Causing Serious Traffic Hazard In Dungarvan

At the recent monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. Tony Wright drew attention to the serious traffic hazard created at Mitchel Street in Dungarvan by school buses which park there each afternoon. The Councillor said that up to five buses park there every evening waiting to collect children at the Christian Brothers School and they create an obstruction to the free flow of traffic along this busy street.

Cllr. Wright suggested that these buses should be directed to park out the Youghal Road opposite the Garda Station where the roadway is wide and obstruction would be minimised.

While we have not ourselves seen the buses parked along Mitchel Street, we have occasionally passed along there between 3 p.m.

and 3.30 p.m. and noted the many cars parked on either side, some even double-parked, as parents wait for their children to come out from school. During this period in the evening it is highly dangerous to be travelling in the vicinity of the school and although there is a traffic warden to regulate the traffic as the children pour out on to the street, the density of the parked cars provides a hazard for all. In this regard we understand that moves to prohibit such parking in proximity to school had been initiated but we are not sure whether it constitutes an offence as matters stand at present.

The point raised by Cllr. Wright will be taken up by the Town Clerk who undertook to discuss the matter with the Garda Superintendent.

Why Not Follow Suit Here?

A news item which we came across in the latest issue of "The Kingdom", one of Kerry's leading newspapers, tells the story that Gardai in Kerry have urged the public to ignore outside charity collectors and pledge their support to local charities only.

Chief Superintendent Donal O'Sullivan is stated to have issued a strongly worded statement voicing his concern regarding the ticket sellers and collectors who are appearing on the streets of the bigger towns in the county.

"These ticket and line sellers", the Chief Supt, is on record as saying "provide very unfair competition for genuine local or national charities which have been granted bona-fide collection permits by the local Gardai."

"Ticket or line sellers from

other parts of the country should be ignored either on the streets or if they call door to door," the Chief Supt. said who added that a recent development where these matters are concerned is that individuals and groups concerned establish a company to take charge of these lotteries and just 10p. or 20p. from each £1 collected then goes to the charity with the remainder going to commission on sales.

Dungarvan and other towns in West Waterford have become regular targets for many of these outside collectors so perhaps it is time that the public hereabout should take the sound advice offered by Kerry's Chief Superintendent on board and pledge their support to local charities only for the future.

A Paradise For Professionals

Banner headlines in juxtaposition in one of our leading national daily papers one day last week stressed the sorry story, if it needed to be stressed, that Ireland now operates on a two-tier level where its citizens are concerned.

In a top front-page spread, the caption boldly declared "Solicitor earns £800 a day from legal aid scheme" while in a second lead over three columns on the same page, the headline read, "New cuts threat in curb on spending."

The top story gave details of what was described as "a top earning solicitor" and his colleagues got from the taxpayer for working on legal aid last year. It also gave details of what top-earning counsel and barristers generally received in fees under the same scheme and stated that according to Justice Minister Padraig Flynn, a total of £3.15 million was spent on the Criminal Aid Scheme last year. The rates under the scheme have been substantially increased recently following a strike by the legal people involved in it so that the total for the next year could be at least double last year's figure!

The other story gave the sad news that a fresh spate of cuts in health and social welfare was feared as Finance Minister Bertie Ahern warned that Government spending must be curbed.

Another minor headline on the front page of the same paper read, "1,000 jobs may go in airline sur-

vival plan."

In recent weeks we have been reading about the huge salary and fee increases being sought by the medical people while the money which accountants consultants and such like receive in certain cases reads like

telephone numbers.

Indeed it can be said that Ireland has become a paradise for professionals while the unemployed and underprivileged have to suffer on and the diminishing workforce has to pay more and more taxes.

Kevin Barry

In the last months of 1920 the struggle which had been knit for Ireland's freedom was entering its most intense phase. The fight was at its height and the fever of national pride was aroused by the sacrifice of Terence McSwiney in Brixton Prison. But Irish freedom fighters fought without belligerent rights. Soldiers were treated not as prisoners of war but as criminals.

On November 1 seventy-two years ago one of those soldiers was to go to the scaffold. He was a young boy, but eighteen years of age. A promising student of University College, Dublin, he had joined the Volunteers and was captured after taking part in an action against British Crown Forces.

There was no evidence that he had fired a fatal shot but his participation in the ambush was sufficient to lead to sentence of death. Despite interventions from the highest quarters the execution went ahead. So on November 1, 1920, Kevin Barry, in the words of an American judge, took his place alongside Robert Emmet in Ireland's Hall of Fame. He was to inspire the people to further endurance and his name was to be sung by ballad singer and by poet.

As this week marks the anniversary of his untimely death, the ballad immortalising his name is an appropriate choice for our ballad corner:

In Mountjoy jail one Monday morning
High upon the gallows tree,
Kevin Barry gave his young life
For the cause of liberty.
But a lad of eighteen summers,
Yet no one can deny,
As he walked to death that morning
He proudly held his head on high.

"Why not shoot me like a soldier?
Do not hang me like a dog,
For I fought to free old Ireland,
On that bright September morn.
All around the little bakery
Where we fought them hand to hand,
Why not shoot me like a soldier
For I fought to free Ireland."

Just before he faced the hangman
In his dreary prison cell,
British soldiers tortured Barry
Just because he would not tell.
The names of his brave companions
And other things they wished to know,
"Turn traitor or we'll kill you!"
Kevin Barry answered "No!"

Calmly standing to attention,
While he bade his last farewell
To his broken-hearted mother,
Whose sad grief no one can tell.
For the cause he proudly cherished
This sad parting had to be;
Then to death walked, softly smiling,
That old Ireland might be free.

Another martyr for old Ireland,
Another murder for the crown,
Whose brutal laws may kill the Irish
But can't keep their spirit down.
Lads like Barry are no cowards,
From the foe they will not fly;
Lads like Barry will free Ireland,
For her sake they'll live and die.

An Englishman named Samuel Lewis made a tour of all the towns and villages of Ireland and as a result of this journey he wrote a book in two volumes called Lewis' Topographical Dictionary of Ireland wherein he published a description of each town and village he visited. Volume 1 of the two volumes published in 1821 contained the following description of Abbeyside.

Abbeyside — "A village and suburb of the borough of Dungarvan, in the barony of Decies-without-Drum, county of Waterford and province of Munster, containing 1,859 inhabitants. This place derives its name from the remains of an ancient abbey, which is described in the article on Dungarvan; it is situated on an inlet of the bay, and is included within the electoral boundary of the borough of Dungarvan. The Roman Catholic chapel for the district of East Dungarvan is situated here.

VEC Objects To Proposed Transfer Of Free Books Scheme

A Department of Education proposal to transfer responsibility for the Free Books Scheme in 1993 from County Vocational Committees (VECs) to Community Welfare Officers, was rejected out of hand at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford VEC held last week in Dungarvan.

The chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne said community welfare officers already have enough on their plate without being given the added burden of dealing with "this very sensitive" free books scheme.

"The Department is planning to place a totally unnecessary burden on an already overworked ser-

vice," said Cllr. Kyne, "and the operation of the scheme is being taken away from the people best qualified to administer it."

Mr. Jimmy Byrne said he feared the proposal might well force some children out of education altogether. It was a highly retrograde step that they should strongly oppose.

Mr. Austin Flynn said the present free book scheme as operated by the VECs is "a good, tried and trusted one."

It was agreed on the proposal of Cllr. Con Casey to write to the Department of Education asking that the proposal be reconsidered on the basis that the new scheme would not be a cost-effective one.

Atrocious Conditions At Gaelscoil Gharbhain Raised In Dail

In a Dail Question last Thursday Deputy Austin Deasy asked the Minister for Education if his attention has been drawn to the atrocious conditions under which the pupils of Gaelscoil Garbhain, Dungarvan are working; and if he will take immediate steps to provide suitable permanent premises.

A similar query was made by Deputy Jackie Fahey.

In his reply the Minister for Education, Mr. Seamus Brennan said:

Drawings and specifications have been completed for a permanent National

School for Scoil Gharbhain. This proposed school will then replace the present accommodation occupied by the school.

The question of proceeding to the next stage, i.e. the invitation of tenders, will be considered in due course in the light of the financial allocation for 1993, when determined, and other commitments and priorities.

Mr. Deasy — That was not a very satisfactory answer. Does the Minister know that at present the school caters for 100 students together with nine

pre-school children and that they are housed in completely unsuitable premises? The school provides only two toilets for 109 children. This is the fifth time that the school has had to move in recent years. Would the Minister ensure that a great deal of urgency is brought to bear on this case as the school is losing numbers because of the unsatisfactory nature of the premises?

Mr. S. Brennan — I accept that this is a very serious and urgent case. My own research indicates the urgency of the case. The question of when I will be able to proceed with the proposed school will very much depend on the final figure arrived at after the preparation of the 1993 Estimates, which, as the Deputy will know, are being prepared in time for the January budget. I shall make every effort to ensure that the new school can be proceeded with in 1993.

Mr. Deasy — Do all-Irish schools such as Scoil Dungarvan, have priority in the provision of moneys?

Mr. S. Brennan — They do have priority in terms of the capitation fee. They receive a substantially higher capitation fee than other schools.

Mr. Deasy — But not for buildings?

Mr. S. Brennan — The level of capital moneys provided is much the same as applies for other schools.

Mr. Deasy — I shall be raising the matter again in six months time if no progress is made. I ask the Minister to please do something.

Mr. S. Brennan — I look forward to that.

Cost Of Children's Playground Literally Frightened Me Says Town Clerk

When the question of providing an enclosed children's playground came up again at the October monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last week, the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White said that following the discussion on the matter at the previous meeting, they had prepared a circular letter for dispatch to other local authorities seeking information as to costings.

Mr. White added that in the meantime he had received information con-

cerning the public playground provided by Mal-low Urban Council. This had no enclosure and had cost £50,000, of which £30,000 was provided through local contributions and £20,000 by the Council. "When I was told the cost of the project I was literally frightened," said Mr. White who added that this not even include the cost of supervision.

It was agreed to await the result of the inquiries made to the other local authorities.

Credit Union Interest Rates Good For Farmers

Farmers who are suffering under the burden of high interest rates have been advised to consider joining a Credit Union, by the Chairman of the ICMSA Taxation Committee, Mr. Frank Allen.

Mr. Allen said that the problem of high interest rates, which is having a severe impact on farmer borrowers, makes the Credit Union all the more attractive to farmers.

FARMERS NEED SECURE SOURCE OF FINANCE

"The present economic uncertainties can be ill afforded by any sector and most especially by farmers, who operate in a constantly changing market place. Farmers therefore would be well advised to obtain a secure source of finance where possible.

"It would seem an opportune time for more and more farmers to seriously consider joining the Credit Union Movement. From a farmers viewpoint it is very attractive to borrow money at an interest rate of 1% per month on the remaining balance, which is an A.P.R. of 12.75%. A higher rate of interest cannot legally be charged.

CREDIT UNIONS — NO HIDDEN COSTS

"There are no hidden costs associated with Credit Unions as the primary aim of the Credit Union is to serve its members — who are also its shareholders. Each member has one vote irrespective of the amount invested in the Credit Union. The Credit Union is a truly democratic co-op where all services are provided at their true cost and without excessive administrative formalities", said Mr. Allen.

ONLY FINANCIAL CO-OP SYSTEM IN IRELAND

He added that the Credit Union is the only financial co-op system in the country and that farmers in the dairy industry have illustrated the success of the co-op system.

He concluded that at present there are 515 Credit Unions in Ireland with savings in excess of a thousand million pounds, therefore a large influx of farmers would add enormous strength to the Irish Credit Union Movement.

Some Good Reasons For Hedging Your Bets



A few decades ago it seemed every house had a privet hedge. They came in many unofficial varieties: neat, a little ragged, very ragged and "that hedge needs cutting right back!"

Yes, it was fast-growing enough to quickly establish and could also be kept neatly trimmed by decent shears and a bit of elbow grease.

But the old privet has fallen out of favour. If any variety has leadership now it is leylandii or Leyland Cypress, a hybrid created by man which has all the privet virtues of fast growth and a lack of fussiness about size.

OVERGROWN

It also looks smarter even when a little overgrown — mind you, you need more than shears to keep it properly in check.

And, like privet, its popularity could soon see it dumped in favour of next year's model, whatever that might be.

Now is a good time to plan planting a hedge and there are good reasons for having one:

— hedges are efficient noise and wind breaks, yet more resistant to weather damage and rot than fences

— they are definitely cheaper and easier on the eye than walls

— they round off the edges of a garden and can be especially useful in the garden of newly-built homes

— some varieties have thorns and can help keep out intruders

— deciduous varieties can provide a good shelter and backdrop for flowers, but be aware that conifers are not always ideal companions to your blooming borders.

HEDGES

When choosing a variety, think what height you want your hedge to reach, how fast you want it to establish and how much clipping it will need — privet needs a little quite often — and how much you can afford.

Whatever you choose, start preparing the ground now while the weather is still mild and other garden chores are becoming fewer. It will be worth the effort because a well established hedge will survive for many years.

Evergreens can be planted now while others go in later in the calendar.

Varieties to consider are:

YEW — Expensive and slow growing but well worth the effort because it will create a magnificent hedge.

HAWTHORN — Beat the burglar! An excellent deterrent but it can quickly look scruffy and many people prefer a stout and bushy rose variety such as Rogosa which produces flowers and hips as well as thorns.

HOLLY — is another prickly customer but also a friendly one at Christmas time. However, it is expensive and slow-growing.

BOX — another traditional favourite producing a dense, evergreen screen which is beloved by topiary experts, but declining interest in this strange art form mirrors the declining population of box.

Villierstown Scores 170 In Tidy Towns Competition

Villierstown, recently visited by President Robinson, scored a total of 170 (out of a possible 250) in this year's Tidy Towns Competition. The following is the report of the Adjudicator.

Effort: 32(45) — The overall appearance of the village was neat and tidy on adjudication day. Some worthwhile improvements in the presentation of buildings and spaces were noted since last year. Additional marks have therefore been awarded as appropriate under the individual category headings.

Tidiness: 37(40) — Once again this year the village was completely litter free on adjudication day. This is indeed mighty commendable. In fact there was very little that could be described as seriously contributing to untidiness in the village on adjudication day except one or two entrances could have been weeded and generally more neatly presented.

Presentation Of Buildings: 30(40) — The majority of commercial and community buildings in the village were well presented. As mentioned in last year's report the shop adjacent to 'An Cruiscin Lan' would benefit from a fresh coat of paint. The problem of one vacant/derelict buildings is appreciated. However, in the meantime it is important that these premises receive a basic amount of maintenance in order to prevent them from falling into a state of complete dereliction and decay.

Presentation Of Natural Amenities: 28(50) — Flower displays throughout the village were colourfully in bloom at the time of adjudication. These displays greatly enhance the overall appearance of the village. Additional plant-

ing since last year is highly commendable. The planting of new trees was also noted. Your programme of tree planting should be continued on an annual basis. Recently planted trees add to the amenities of the village and their amenity value will be realised even more fully as they mature. The main green spaces were all neatly presented. However, don't ignore the amenity potential of smaller incidental spaces. All public open spaces no matter how small are of amenity value provided they are carefully maintained and neatly presented.

Appearance Of Approach Roads: 31(45) — Grass margins along all approach roads to the village were well presented. Incidental items of street

furniture were also presented to a high standard. The village is well supplied with litter bins. However, one or two bins need cleaning/painting.

Presentation Of Residential Areas: 17(30) — Houses and gardens were generally well presented. However, one or two houses would benefit from a fresh coat of paint. Stick to the use of strong bright colours when repainting. All boundary walls should be kept weed free. Try to encourage individual householders to take responsibility for the presentation of the space immediately in front of their individual boundary wall. There are a number of attractively presented gardens that enhance the overall amenities of the village.

Method:

Wash and peel cucumbers. Cut lengthwise and divide into 2in. sections. Melt butter and fry onions. Add cucumber, stock, wine, herbs, nutmeg and seasoning. Simmer 10-15 mins. Thicken with flour if liked.





No New Vocational School For Dungarvan

ter of State at the Department of Education stated:

The Vocational School is one of four postprimary schools in Dungarvan. Enrolment in 1991/92 was 290.

In 1981 the Department sanctioned the provision of a new building for the Vocational School to cater for 225 pupils. At that stage there were five postprimary schools in Dungarvan.

In 1987 the architectural planning of a new Vocational building was suspended in the light of the declining demographic trend and its implications for future postprimary enrolments in Dungarvan.

Also, in the light of a renewed emphasis on rationalisation of postprimary facilities talks were initiated

with all the postprimary managements to see what rationalisation measures could be achieved. As a result the amalgamation took place in 1990 of the Mercy and Presentation Secondary Schools and one of the boys' schools — St. Augustine's — became co-educational.

Over the past three years the Department have approved the provision of prefabricated classrooms at the Vocational School as follows: 1990 — 4 prefabricated classrooms; 1991 — 3 prefabricated classrooms; 1992 — 2 prefabricated classrooms.

It is considered, therefore, that the accommodation needs of the school are adequately catered for at present.
