## Garda Clampdown On Law-Breaking Road Users

A new tough garda clampdown on law breaking motorists, cyclists and even pedestrians has been launched in the Dungarvan and Tramore Garda Districts which cover almost the entire County of Waterford.

According to the Garda Inspector Michael Blake, Dungarvan, motorists, cyclists and pedestrians are all being targeted in the blitz which is part of a national campaign aimed at cutting down the slaughter on Irish roads. The aim is to prevent accidents taking place, saving lives and cutting down on the numbers of people hurt, often badly, every year on County Waterford roads.

Excessive speed is a contributory factor in accidents, said Inspector Blake and drivers should note and keep within the speed limits in built-up areas. "To help remind them, speed checks are being set up on all main roads and in built-up areas," the Inspector warned.

Inspector Blake told the "Leader" that the garda authorities had received many complaints about motorists speeding through built-up areas and he said that they were determined to stamp this out. Aggressive driving was another major factor in causing accidents and the Inspector advised drivers to slow down and be more courteous to others on the road.

Now that the winter months are upon us, Inspector Blake stressed the need for drivers to ensure that their vehicles were in good condition and mechanically fit to deal with such weather vagaries as frost, snow and wet surfaces.

Turning to pedal cyclists, he said that the gardai had received numerous complaints about people cycling in a dangerous manner and in so doing putting not only their own lives but the lives of others at risk. All bikes should be properly lighted when used at night and parents were asked especially to check that the bicycles used by their children were all in good and proper order.

### BREAKING TRAFFIC LIGHTS

Inspector Blake had a special word of warning for cyclists who disobeyed traffic lights and other traffic signs

and said that in the weeks ahead these would come in for close scrutiny while he added that where motorcyclists were concerned the law concerning the wearing of crash helmets, including pillion passengers, would be vigorously enforced.

In regard to pedestrians, the Inspector said that they should always walk on the right-hand side of the road facing oncoming traffic where no footpaths are provided while joggers, especially those out on the roads after dark, should wear reflective arm bands and bright

clothing.

Finally Inspector Blake referred to the approaching season of Christmas and to the dangers of drinking and driving. As people get drawn into the festive spirit they should, he said, either leave their cars behind or arrange for a lift home after any celebrations. "Drinking and driving are a lethal combination and must be avoided at all costs," he said.

In the weeks coming up to Christmas gardai will enforce the law in this regard very rigidly and the number of checkpoints and patrols will be increased to ensure that this is done. So be warned and take care!

## Charged With Stealing Newspapers

Over a period of months an unemployed father of five had been stealing "Cork Examiner" newspapers in the early morning from outside a Dungarvan newsagency, Judge W. Hartnett was told at Dungarvan District Court last week.

John Bulfin, 14 St. Patrick's Crescent, Dungarvan pleaded guilty to stealing the newspapers to the total value of £51, the property of James O'Donoghue, Main Street, Dungarvan. Inspector M. Blake who prosecuted told the Court that the defendant was apprehended by a Garda at 6.15 a.m. on July 14 last. The newspapers had been disappearing since last January and in a statement the defendant admitted that he had been taking them since last March.

Judge Hartnett adjourned the case for five months to enable the defendant to pay full compensation and added that it would be in his best interest to do so.

### FIRM

A £1.5 Million investment and the creation of 32 new jobs has been announced by Pinewood Health Care, Ballymacarbry. It will take the total workforce at the Ballymacarbry plant to over 100 in three years time. The pharmaceutical manufacturers started work in Ballymacarbry just almost fourteen years ago and they employ 72 people at the moment.

The sod will be turned in the next few weeks on the £1.5 million extension and it is hoped the new facility will be operational early in the new year.

Mr. Dan O'Riordan, Sales and Marketing Director, said the new ex-

ension would give Pinewood Health Care a bigger capacity for manufacturing products for the European Market in particular. It will make them more competitive for European and UK markets, they want to focus in on the Single European Market and take on new opportunities, he said. This will be the third extension to Pinewood's buildings.

## GIVE THE FARMERS FAIR PLAY

Mr. Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, President of the United Farmers Association, has issued a warning that the availability of £80 million from the EC funds for TB Testing of cattle in Ireland will make "no difference" unless the money is spent honestly and wisely. The basic and most important ingredient of the scheme should be full and proper legal compensation for farmers who have reactors removed from the herds.

This most vital aspect of fair play has been ignored to date and is still being ignored by the powers that be, including some of our farming organisations despite High Court decisions won by a number of farmers, said Mr. Phelan.

In those cases the High

Court found that the Department of Agriculture must take possession of reactors by agreement on value with the farmer and the Minister must pay compensation for reactors under the 1966 Act. He said that in the event that the Minister and farmer cannot agree a price then an independent valuer can be agreed by them. There is, he said, provision in the Act for a valuer to be employed at the Minister's expense. The President of the U.F.A. claimed that these procedures which protect the farmers right to proper legal compensation, have been pushed aside by the imposition of an illegal non-statutory scheme which allows reactors to be taken without any reference as to their value.

## NEW HEART EQUIPMENT

A long awaited piece of equipment crucial to the treatment of patients with heart disease is now fully operational at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel. A major fund raising drive will be launched on Monday, November 9 and people throughout South Tipperary and West Waterford are asked to contribute as £7,000 is still outstanding on the machine.

The new machine at Clonmel Hospital is an Eco-Cardiograph which is used extensively in the treatment of patients with heart conditions. It is used in the diagnosis of patients with valve problems and in the assessment of patients heart functions after a coronary.

Before the machine was installed patients had to travel to either Cork or

Dublin. Now, full treatment is available at Clonmel.

Ticket sellers will go on a house to house collection throughout South Tipperary and West Waterford — a book of tickets costs £1. Groups such as Ballymacarbry Ladies Footballers and soldiers based at Kickham Barracks, Clonmel, will be involved in the campaign. It is hoped to raise the £7,000 by Christmas.

#### Municipal Government [A town governed by its own laws]

The Towns Improvement Act was passed in 1854. A public meeting was called in accordance with its provisions and by a large majority it was decided to have the district of Dungarvan and Abbeyside under municipal government. A petition went to the Local Government Board and sanction was given to the Act. First Election

On the 29th January, 1855 the first election of Town Commissioners was held. The results were: Dungarvan Ward (12 members) — Andrew Carbery (Chairman), Christopher O'Brien, Patrick Ronayne, John O'Sullivan, Michael Mahony, John Wall, John Dower, Patrick Cody, James Byrne, Edward Shaw, Richard Hudson, John Har-

rington. Abbeyside Ward (3 members) — Sir Nugent Humble, Mr. Beresford Boate, Mr. Maurice Goff.

The Humble family remained an important name in the political life of Abbeyside for the rest of the nineteenth century.

Reference: History of Dungarvan by Edmund Keohan.


### ABBEYSIDE SCOUT NOTES



## Brinkmanship Continues — But Election Will Solve Nothing

As 11 a.m. on Tuesday morning this week approached many wondered whether the F.F.-P.D. Coalition Government was about to fall with the withdrawal of the P.D.'s. However 11 a.m. passed and the brinkmanship continued and then at 11.30 a.m. the announcement came

that the P.D. meeting was adjourned until Thursday without any decision being reached. So the brinkmanship continues and we must continue to hold our breath until Thursday to see whether that we continue to have a Government or not. In the Coalition engi-

neered by former Taoiseach Charles Haughey it was always held by the Fianna Fail rank and file that the P.D. tail was allowed to wag the F.F. dog but since new Taoiseach Albert Reynolds took over there has been a change as he set about altering the character of this

"very temporary arrangement" as he himself termed the coalition from the outset.

Mr. Reynolds has downgraded the P.D. element in the Government at every opportunity since he took office but whether he has now bitten off the P.D. tail that has been wagging the F.F. dog still remains to be seen.

The dissolution of the Government will, of necessity, plunge the country into a general election but it is doubtful whether this will solve anything. It will be the same old names that the electorate will be faced with in an election, many of them there for the past 25 years. As an old woman wisely commented, "it's like a circus with the same old clowns dressed up in different clothes!"

What change can the country expect from such a set up? We want new, young talent in the government but the problem is how are we to get it under the present system which our political parties operate?

That's really the problem!

## Unemployment Refuses To Come Down

The main problem which we have to contend with not only here in Ireland but which countries all over the world have to face up to at present is unemployment. Throughout the European Community States the number of jobless has risen by one million in the past year and now stands at an average of 10 per cent or one in ten. This means that throughout the E.C. some 14 million people are at present unemployed. This shows how widespread and frightening this problem has now become.

In recent months leading

economists and captains of industry in this country have placed the major blame for the high unemployment figures in the country on our taxation system. A.I.B. Chairman Peter Sutherland has urged a radical reform of the system because of its "inbuilt bias against employment." And the former E.C. Commissioner has declared that he had seen "a heartbreaking disincentive" among employees to work overtime or put more into their jobs while the so called "tax wedge" between the cost of

what they take home in their pay packet really was far too high in this country.

Last week the Chairman of the E.S.B., Paddy Moriarty touched on the same subject when he pointed out that each extra £1 in the pay packet of the average worker in recent years cost his employer £2.25 because of our outmoded tax system.

We have pointed out these facts as major drawbacks to job creation in the past and even at this critical stage can only again urge an immediate radical reform of our tax and indeed also our social welfare systems.

## KEEP IN TOUCH OVER WINTER MONTHS

Now that winter has arrived (a little earlier than expected) and that we find ourselves in long dark nights and dreary cold days it would be a good idea for us all to keep in touch with our neighbours on a regular basis.

This is particularly important in rural areas where many old people live in varying degrees of isolation and in cases where people are living alone it is extremely important that regular contact be maintained.

It has not been unknown that even in built up areas old people have been found in difficulties and even dead in their apartments and houses which in a way is a very sad commentary on the careless attitude of society in general.

Therefore it is all the more important that constant contact be maintained with all senior citizens especially

those who may be living in remote isolated country areas. Most districts around the county now have Community Alert groups operating which, while principally concerned with the detection of crime could also, ever the long, cold dreary months of winter, also take on the caring role of looking after the welfare of the aged who may be living in their localities.

Hypothermia is the principal enemy which old people have to contend with throughout the winter so it is highly important that every effort is made to ensure that they are kept warm and that they have the wherewithal in the form of food and fuel to do so.

So if there are any old persons you know out there, be a good neighbour and keep tabs with them during the winter months ahead.

## The Felons Of Our Land

Our choice for the ballad corner this week is a real old-time patriotic ballad which, while unknown by the younger generation may be still recalled by some of those in the older age groups. "The Felons Of Our Land" was written by one, Arthur M. Forrester and we recall it being the party piece of a man long since gone who always made a point of singing it at Christmas Eve parties in the long, long ago.

Fill up once more, we'll drink a toast  
To comrades far away;  
No nation upon earth can boast  
Of braver hearts than they,  
And though they sleep in dungeons deep,  
Or flee outlawed and banned,  
We love them yet, we can't forget  
The felons of our land.

In boyhood's bloom and manhood's pride  
Foredoomed by alien laws,  
Some on the scaffold proudly died  
For holy Ireland's cause,  
And, brothers say, shall we to-day  
Unmoved, like cowards stand,  
While traitors shame and foes defame  
The felons of our land.

Some in the convict's dreary cell  
Have found a living tomb;  
And some unseen, unfriended fell  
Within the dungeon gloom;  
Yet, what care we, although it be

## Early Athletic Pioneers In Waterford

The great run of victories scored by Waterford G.A.A. teams — men and women — in this year's All-Ireland Championships prompts us to refer this week to the early athletic pioneers in Waterford. The idea came to us through an extract of an Irish Independent G.A.A. Golden Jubilee Number which was published at Easter, 1934. In that year the Chairman of Waterford County Board G.A.A. was Liam Walsh, who we understand Walsh Park in the city has been named after while the Secretary of the Board was Pax Whelan, Abbey-side. Incidentally it is of interest to note that the county colours then was just blue — not blue and white as at present.

The extract which was passed to us by Nioclás Graves, Helvick commences as follows: "The name of the late Dan Fraher, Dungarvan (after whom Dungarvan's Fraher Field is

named), is inevitably the first that occurs to the mind of anyone who thinks of writing an account of G.A.A. activities in County Waterford during the past forty or fifty years" (that is up to 1934).

It goes on: "What the Davins were to Carrick and South Tipperary, Dan was to Dungarvan. Not only was Dan Fraher the outstanding athlete of County Waterford for over thirty years, but his personality as an organiser and inspirer of athletic enthusiasm dominated G.A.A. activities in Co. Waterford until the day of his death."

The article then goes on to the record that as far back as 1885 at Piltown he threw the 7lb hammer 69ft 7ins while in 1888 he scored notable honours in three counties in the high jump and weight throwing. Dan's proudest possession was the Championship Belt for the best all-round athlete, a trophy which he won some

time in or about 1896. He was equally proficient at bowling, wrestling, vaulting, hurling, football and handball and could be said to have been the all round Gael — native Irish speaker, athlete and patriot.

The extract proceeds to give an interesting account of a great challenge between Dan and another Dungarvan man — Pat Morrissey of Killosera — who incidentally would have been a forbear of the Morrissey family, owners of the well-known victualling and grocery business at O'Connell Street at the present time.

It was in 1873 that Dan and Pat Morrissey competed in throwing the 7lb shot and after a close and thrilling contest Dan was declared winner with a distance of 73ft while Pat Morrissey had a throw of 71ft 8ins!

The extract then records that Dan was Chairman of the Waterford County Board for 30 years, Frank Drohan

was Secretary and Phil Walsh was Treasurer. The latter had served his apprenticeship at Fraher's Drapery business at Grattan Square before going on to open his own business later on the other side of the Square.

Other names mentioned in the article were Dungarvan man Tom Barry who held the world record for the standing long jump (12ft 71/2ins), James Wall, also of Dungarvan who held the world record for the hop, step and jump and Patrick Keohan who won the international hop, step and jump championship in America. Also mentioned were Percy Kirwan of Kilmacthomas and Peter O'Connor of Waterford both internationally renowned athletes of Olympic calibre.

And so it can be seen that Waterford has indeed a great tradition and one of which we all, as Waterford men and women, can well be proud.



# Impressive, But It's So Economical



Lunch for a big family get-together, or a dinner party, can prove a rather expensive affair. But here's one way out of the problem.

## CROWN PORK ROAST

A crown pork roast looks impressive, but will feed from 12 to 16 people quite economically, allowing one chop for each person, plus a portion of meaty stuffing.

### Ingredients:

1 prepared crown roast of pork

### Stuffing:

4oz (100g) minced pork or sausage meat (use scraps from trimmings):

2oz (50g) smoked bacon, diced finely

2oz (50g) presoaked prunes, stoned

1 stick celery, diced

1 medium onion, chopped

1 clove garlic, crushed

2oz (50g) fresh breadcrumbs

1 oz (25g) shredded suet

1 size 5 egg


1tbs (15ml) soy sauce

1tbs (15ml) lemon juice

salt and pepper

### Method:

Ask your butcher to prepare the joint from loin of pork, using 6-8 chops from each pork side. Make sure most of the fat is cut off from inside to allow for the stuffing. The joint should be a neat, round shape. Carving will be easier if it is chined first by the butcher, who



should also have removed the rind and scored it.

Tie the rind loosely around the bones so that it roasts into crisp crackling which can then be served in strips.

Mix stuffing ingredients together and spoon into the centre of the joint, pressing down lightly, leaving slightly domed. Cover the exposed bones with pieces of foil to prevent burning. The filling may need covering too during cooking if it gets too brown.

Weigh the joint and allow 35 mins to the lb. 1/2kg. plus 35 mins, over at 180deg. C., 350deg. F., gas mark 4. For crisp crackling do not baste.

The meat is cooked when a thin skewer inserted into a thick part shows clear juice escaping. If it looks even slightly pink, cook a little more.

Serves 12-16.

# Now's the time to dig this!

DURING the past few months we have taken a lot out of the soil by raising our blooms and vegetables. Now comes the time to put something back to restore soil condition and it's hard work!

It means digging and working in lots of good organic compost.

Hopefully, you have plenty of the latter decomposing nicely on your compost heap after a summer of collecting weed-free lawn clippings, dead plant heads, spent blooms, fallen leaves and other organic debris.

But if you haven't any 'homegrown' compost then scrounge or buy an alternative such as leaf mould, shredded bark, farmyard manure or the spent compost from a mushroom farm.

Don't be tempted to skimp. Digging is hard work, so make it worth your while by doing the job properly. You are not only aerating and improving drainage by the act of turning the soil, but feeding it with the organic material. As this rots further it also enhances drainage and condition.

You don't HAVE to dig now but November is a preferred month be-

cause the weather is not yet cold enough to be a deterrent for the job. And the winter mayhem to come — frosts, biting winds and pounding rainfall — are ideal for breaking up the sods after digging.

You should be left with a crumbly surface which can be easily broken up and raked ready for the next planting.

If you are buying new digging tools, check out the long handled types now appearing in the stores. Apparently, we make heavy weather of the job and risk damaging our backs by preferring short-handled tools.

If we are honest, the next question is: "How little digging can I get away with?"

For flower beds you don't really need to turn the soil over more than the depth of one spade, particularly if you avoid putting weight onto the earth and undoing the drainage gains we hope to make by digging in the first place. A good tip is to use a stout plank to support your wellingtoned feet.

But even this sensible precaution does not allow the vegetable gardener to avoid double-digging every

three years — vegetables need to root deeply to ensure good crops. When you do double-dig, add the compost/manure to the opened section before turning soil onto it, thereby ensuring that good drainage extends as far down as possible.

This is particularly important with clay soils and means some extremely hard work if it is the first time the area has been dug.

But it will make the job easier next time and you can help further by adding a clay soil conditioner, usually based on gypsum.

The opposite problem, excessively sandy soil, can be helped by spreading clay onto the top of the dug soil so that winter can break it down ready for forking in before the next planting.



There was a splendid turn-out of club members and supporters who paid their respects in the traditional G.A.A. manner at his funeral and burial on Monday evening and Tuesday morning.



# Saturday Games — A Difference

The introduction of a policy of playing major games on a Saturday was recently discussed and while a big number did not favour such a decision, a number of delegates felt that it would make little difference to the public or to the financial returns for these games.


If last Saturday's two very attractive county senior hurling semi-finals at Walsh Park and Dungarvan can be taken as a guide, then the people who did not favour playing on Saturdays, were right.

At both semi-finals the attendances were disappointing and compared with the gate receipts from the hurling semi-finals last year we see a huge difference. Last year, both semi-finals ended in draws, but for the purpose of making a comparison here, I will take the drawn match in both cases. Last year the Tallow/Lismore semi-final played a Cappoquin brought in a gate of £4,515 and the replay gate was £3,136. Both were played on Sundays. This year the semi-final played on a Saturday brought in a gate of £1,600 for the game between Tallow and Ballygunner. At Walsh Park last year the gate for the hurling semi-final between Mount Sion and Roanmore was £4,853 (replay £4,390). It was played on Saturday evening, September 7. This year the semi-final at Walsh Park was played on Saturday afternoon attracted a gate of around £1,300. To put it more clearly, last year the semi-final drawn games yielded a total gate of

£9,368 while the total this year for the two semi-finals was just about £3,000.

There were some extenuating circumstances as last year one was played on a Sunday and the other at 7.30 p.m. on Saturday, also the pairings last year may have been more attractive, but these would not account for a huge difference such as we had. There are two important factors involved. First there are the patrons, who either don't want to go to games on Saturday afternoons, or are unable to go because of the nature of their employment. While recognising that not everyone who wants work is able to find a job, we must face the facts that it is the people who work for a living that provide the finance to help in keeping the show on the road every year. Hundreds of those people were not free to go to matches on last Saturday afternoon, hence the attendance of paying patrons could not have numbered much more than a thousand all told and that should be a matter for concern all round.

The second factor is County Board finances which are now obviously going to show a big decrease on last year's returns because we are running so late.

# Waterford Play Wexford In National League At New Ross

## Exciting Fare Programmed For Fraher Field

Although I know that a huge crowd of people from this end of the county will choose to remain at home on Sunday to enjoy what is being provided at the Fraher Field, the meeting of Waterford and Wexford in the second round of the hurling league at New Ross must be given pride of place in our match preview. As far as I am aware the side to do duty has not been named at the time of writing.

It was intended that it would be selected after the game in Dingle on Sunday, but because of the drawn hurling semi-final and the replay on Saturday, there is an understandable problem relating to a number of players who would be sure of selection. The county players involved in the Mount Sion v. Passage game could hardly be expected to be at their best on successive days and for our first game in the league we need players who can give a top class performance. There is a possibility that a number of the newcomers to the team who performed satisfactorily in the Oireachtas final will be retained.

Needless to mention, the entire county will be hoping for a winning start to the league, but in the circumstances our chances are not great. Because there is now no great urgency with the hurling county final as we have no option but to nominate for the Munster Club Championship, maybe the semi-final replay could be deferred until the following Saturday. The case that can be made against this is that the football would also be held up because of the involvement of Gaultier in the Kilmacthomas v. Gaultier football quarter-final.

Anyway, the county will be keeping fingers crossed that things will go right for us at New Ross. If the team is available before we go to print it will appear elsewhere in the paper.

### S.F. SEMI-FINAL: DUNGARVAN V. STRADBALLY

Only a kick of the ball separated the teams in the last county senior football finals and despite Dungarvan's brilliant performance against the Nire in the quarter-final at Leamybrien two weeks ago, the expectations are that this latest meeting between the two will be every bit as close.

Spectators are, no doubt, hoping that the contest will be as exciting as the county

final of 1990 when Dungarvan ended a 36 year famine by beating Stradbally on a 1-6 to 0-8 scoreline at Walsh Park and as good as the final at Fraher field last year when the champions survived with a 1-9 to 1-6 score after an hour of hectic football.

In previewing this intriguing semi-final one could spend much time in analysing the form of the teams and their performances so far in this year's championship, but I feel that it would avail nothing because both Dungarvan and Stradbally will bring out the best in each other and each will play even better than they have played so far this year.

There is an awful lot of prestige at stake in this one and the players will try as they have never before. It is being viewed as a repeat of the two previous county finals even though the winners will afterwards have to gear themselves for a match against Kilmacthomas, Gaultier or Rathgormack before knowing if they are champions. Dungarvan will be attempting to achieve the magic three-in-a-row which was last accomplished by Kill in 1966, '67, '68.

According to reports, both teams will field at full strength and there will be very little change from the sides which clashed here last year. In the final last year, David O'Connor missed out

through injury and was substituted by Pat Flynn who proved an able deputy. David is back and he will mind the champions net behind David Lee, Darrell Donnelly and probably Martin Houlihan. Eddie Burke, Martin Kelly and Martin Sheehan and Bobby Lyons are four of the three who will be selected for the half back line with David Burke and Derek Lyons at centre field.

Peter Ferncombe (who scored 2-8 against the Nire two weeks ago), Morrie and John Ferncombe, with Der-

mot Callaghan, Ger Beresford and Denis McGrath, will all be active in attack. That group, or most of them, have played together as a team from their under-16 and minor days and have developed a style of movement that is very difficult to match. The efficiency with which they move and play has won them matches

against stronger and more experienced teams over the past couple of years.

Stradbally, too, are unlikely to show much change from the side which lost to Dungarvan in the final last year, but young Richard Gough could find himself playing at midfield, maybe with Paul Mullaney or Pat Curran.

Kieran Heffernan will be in goal and in defence will be Conor and Fintan O'Brien, Laurence Walsh, David Kirwan, Eoin Phelan and Martin Curran.

In attack the red brigade will have Liam and Eoin O'Brien with young Paul Foley of the county minor team, Ger Hogan, Pat Halpin, Sean Dee and others to select from for their line-out. Of their nine titles won so far, three have been won in the eighties and they have lost a number during

this period also. Most of their own people reckon that they played their best football when beating Kilrossanty, but they have played some very indifferent stuff as well.

However, I have already written that all previous form this year should be ignored. Dungarvan and Stradbally will each turn on full power in this battle for a place in the 1992 county final and this will surely produce the best of the game of club football in the county this year. It is certainly something to look forward to.

If it ends in a draw it won't

hold up anything as the other side of the draw are way behind time, but it will again interfere with the availability of players for the county panel. Dungarvan's recent brilliant win over the Nire showed what they are capable of producing, but whether or not they can do the same against Stradbally is highly doubtful. At the same time they must be given the vote to edge home in front again and that is what I expect to see happen unless Alo Curran's team have something up their sleeves that we have not heard about!

## INTERMEDIATE HURLING COUNTY FINAL

This county final between Clonea and Colligan will see one or other of them back up in senior ranks for next year. Whether this is a good or a bad thing for them and for the senior championship is a matter of conjecture. I don't believe that either of them, anymore than any of the other ten intermediate teams, are material for the senior hurling championship. Not yet anyway.

I know that such an opinion will not be shared by them or any of the twelve who set out in search of this title, but a team going up there must realistically have some chance of winning the senior hurling title and I believe that the dozen intermediate teams at the moment do not fit into that category. At the same time I believe that a number of the senior teams at the moment are not good enough to win the intermediate championship (this should ease the blow for those who feel offended in the intermediate grade!)

Maybe this is not the proper manner in which to introduce a preview of a county final that very many players from Colligan and Clonea have worked towards since the campaign began way back in April, but the thought has been building up within me for quite a while and I'd feel I had let myself down if I left it unsaid until it was too late.

I have no reason for supposing that this will not be one splendid hurling final. An exhibition of commitment, endeavour and good honest hurling by two very well tried and prepared teams, each of whom have survived some real tough contests on the way up. The "paths to the final" piece at the bottom, in a way, show their credentials, but as they have never met in the intermediate championship these facts and figures, while being of interest, are of little help in making up one's mind about the outcome.

Clonea, following a very long period in senior ranks were demoted last year, they having lost several games because some of their key players were out through injury. Their big disappointment was that they never made the kind of progress they had expected after winning three county under-21 titles. About seven of those teams are still playing. I was very impressed with their good display against Abbeyside two weeks ago when they struck me as being a team that would not be beaten in the intermediate championship.

They have players like Denis Hassett, Paul Power, Ger Kirwan, Harry Skehan, Joe Murray, Mark, Martin, Sean and Ger Power, Eddie Connolly (top scorer on their team) and others with a lot of senior championship

experience. Though out of championship competition for a long time, they have played several challenge games against good outside teams. They are coming here expecting to win.

Colligan, apart from their unexpected defeat by Stradbally, came through their campaign quite impressively also and they are gradually becoming a team who can turn on the power when needed. I thought their most impressive display so far this season was when beating Abbeyside by four points, but there were other matches in which they also turned on the power and recovered from ominous looking situations to win.

Jimmy Beresford stands a man apart in this whole championship and his contribution to Colligan's progress is difficult to quantify. His brothers Michael

(goal), Lar and Liam Beresford, John and Pat Dunford, Ollie Whelan, Patsy Coffey, Paudie Flynn, Kevin and Benny McGrath, Noel Drohan, Billy Fraher, John Quinlan are the other regulars on the side who have been playing together long enough to perfect a high degree of teamwork, which is difficult to upset.

On the basis of known form and records of recent seasons, Clonea must start favourites and be given the vote to win, but I'm sure predictions such as this will have little bearing on the kind of challenge that Colligan will put up to win this championship. It is a match not to be missed and patrons should note the early start, as the Board are making time available for the presentation of the cup before the Dungarvan v. Stradbally game which follows.


