## Queuing In Rain For Dole Payments Is Degrading

Making a formal complaint for the people concerned, Cllr. W. McDonnell proposed a motion at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday calling on the Council to ask the Minister for Social Welfare to instruct an officer of his Department to examine the new Labour Exchange Office in Lismore in an effort to provide better facilities for the people who have to attend there.

Cllr. McDonnell said that

the people who have to attend the Lismore Office to obtain their payments have to queue along the main street waiting for their turn often in the rain.

Referring to the fact that there is a total of 8,000 unemployed persons throughout the county at the present time, Cllr. McDonnell said that he could not see why people had to queue along the main streets of towns and outside Garda Stations to secure the payments to

## Move To Defer Dungarvan Car Park Charges Defeated

A move to defer the proposed parking charges at Dungarvan's two public car parks until after Christmas was defeated by 5 votes to 4 at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night.

The parking charges were approved at a previous meeting but Cllr. Austin Hallahan proposed that their implementation be postponed until after Christmas as it would be difficult to iron out the teething problems that were arising with the approach of the Christmas shopping period. He also felt that the charges would have an adverse effect on the town for Christmas.

Mr. B. White, Town Clerk disagreed and said that the

additional demand for parking spaces during the period would prove a better trial for the new system. He said that the new equipment to implement the charges was due to arrive this week and he reckoned they would be ready to start in 7 to 10 days. Three new jobs would be created as a result.

Cllr. Hallahan's proposal was supported by Cllrs. M. O'Riordan, Mary Dixon and R. Walsh while Cllrs. Nuala Ryan, Chairwoman, B. Kyne, P. Power, D. Goode and T. Wright supported the proposal to go ahead with the new charges without delay and this was declared carried by 5 votes to 4.

But if one were never to visit a class it is still possible to practice yoga. Yes! by taking time out daily to rest and relax in silence or with


soft music and by eating plenty of fruit, vegetables and fish, one would be well on the way to a healthy life — yoga style! Good luck! — Aidan O'Brien.

### NEW IMAGES YOUTH CLUB



On next Thursday night we have lined up a game of superhoc, so team be forewarned to have tracksuits and runners because a very energetic night of fun will be had by all.



## VILLAGE TOPICS

### SPEEDING MASSGOERS CAUSE TRAFFIC HAZARDS

Cars speeding along the roadway from Land's End to Friars Walk as people from the Sea Park area drove to Mass at Abbey-side Church on Sundays were causing traffic hazards it was stated at the monthly meeting of Dun-

garvan Urban Council last Monday night. Cllr. B. Kyne stated that the speeding on this roadway was absolutely dangerous on Sunday mornings and could be the cause of a serious accident. He asked whether some innovative

method to induce drivers to reduce speed there could be suggested.

Town Clerk, Mr. B. White said that he would discuss the matter with the County Engineer, the Co. Council being the Road Authority for the Urban area.

### OUR LOCALITY

#### Ballinacourty Lifeboat Service

The lifeboat house was constructed in 1859 at the cost of £126. Two silver medals were presented by the R.N.L.I. in connection with the shipwreck in 1861 of the Brigantine Susan in a terrifying South-West gale

on the 19th of February, 1861.

In 1890 a rocket sound signal was supplied.

The lifeboat the "William Dunville" was a gift from Mrs. A. G. Dunville of London at a

cost of £354. It stayed at Ballinacourty from 1863 to 1899. It made twenty-two launches and rescued forty eight. Below is a table of some of the launches made by the "William Dunville."

#### Coastguard Station, Ballinacourty, Dungarvan

The houses were erected in the 1870's as living quarters for the coastguards. The designs around the windows were ornamental and the buildings were very impressive looking. The station was occupied by the Republicans during the civil war and were burned by them as they evacuated with the oncoming of the nation-

al troops from Waterford on the 8th August, 1923. The Military Barracks in Dungarvan Castle was also burned on the same day by the I.R.A. as they evacuated.

Forcible representations were made to the Republicans to spare the Coastguard Station at Ballinacourty, but without

avail. The burning of the buildings was regarded as a military necessity.

The Coastguard Station was afterwards reconstructed by Dungarvan Golf Club and was used as a clubhouse for many years. The golf premises was destroyed accidentally by fire a few years ago and the building was completely demolished.




This was a great achievement by all the players and selectors in getting so far in this competition with a team that was a blend of youth and experience.







## Death Of Noted Greyhound Trainer

The death has occurred of one of the country's greatest greyhound trainers, Dick Ryan of Goolds Cross, Co. Tipperary, whose name has been a household word throughout the greyhound world in Ireland for generations past.

The late Mr. Ryan, who was in his eighties, trained some of the best greyhounds to grace a coursing field, both here and in England.

He brought the Waterloo Cup back to Ireland for the first time, since Master McGrath won it, in 1957, when he was successful at Altcar with Old Kentucky Minstrel and went on to win the

event on two other occasions with Himalayan Climber and Doubedoon. He also sent out greyhounds to take the Waterloo Purse and Plate.

He won every cup worth winning in this country, with the exception of the Kingdom Cup at Tralee, once admitting, "I sent many good ones to contest that event but never managed to win it."

The reception he received on returning from Altcar with Old Kentucky Min-

strel was really tremendous. Crowds turned up at the North Wall to welcome him back and bonfires blazed in every town and village on the road back to Goolds Cross.

But a few weeks later he had another major success when he handled Kays Fairy to take the Irish Cup at Clounanna and to make it a truly great year he also took the Champion Stakes at Clonmel with Move on Swanky, who had won the 1974 Derby.

# PENSMAN Takes You . . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

## "We're Tired Of The Whole Lot!"

According to a report in the "Morning Ireland" programme on RTE Radio 1 on Monday morning last, an elderly lady who was one of a number of after Mass people in Waterford City who were quizzed by a radio reporter in the course of a survey on the forthcoming general election last Sunday morning very forthrightly declared "we're sick and tired of the whole lot of them." She was, of course, referring to the politicians and the candidates who would be seeking re-election to the 27th Dail on November 25.

And her clearcut opinion was not isolated as most of the others interviewed were more or less in the same vein, one, at least, more vehemently declaring that she would not even answer her door to any canvassers. Others made no bones about the problems which were besetting the country, highlighting unemployment and high interest rates as the major priorities which required attention but despondently pointing out that none of the political parties seemed to have any concrete solutions for them. "All we get are promises but we're sick and tired of hearing them too" another of those who were asked replied.

This shows in no uncertain manner how cynical the electorate has become where politicians are concerned and how difficult the current election campaign is bound to be for them. The good old

days are gone and promises, promises, promises will no longer woo the electorate.

By this time the main political parties here have declared their starters for the election race and by and large there were no great surprises in the declarations. However the stop/go campaign by the veteran Fianna Fail candidate, outgoing Deputy Jackie Fahey, in the days before his Party's selection convention left his supporters in a rather confused state.

It was reported midway through last week that the controversial Deputy was demanding concessions from his national executive in the event of his agreeing to go forward again which included a division of the constituency to give him a free run so as to copperfasten his position. However this proposal was rejected and then it was that the Deputy announced that he was going to stand down and retire from national politics.

The Party's Election Convention was held last Sunday and it was only a short time before it that Deputy Fahey came forward to say that as his cardiologist had given him the all clear only on the previous Friday he now felt free to again enter the election race and to seek a nomination. It was less than two years ago that

Deputy Fahey underwent heart by-pass surgery. And so once more, the name of Jackie Fahey will appear on the official list of candidates with that of outgoing Minister of State Deputy Brendan Kenneally and they form Fianna Fail's two-man team for the election.

There was a little surprise also at the Labour Party Convention with the news that County Council Chairman Billy Kyne was a late entry to seek a Party nomination to run with his colleague outgoing Deputy Brian O'Shea.

We understand that Cllr. Kyne was prompted to seek a nomination following the public declaration by Deputy Fahey that he was retiring as he felt that a sackful of votes would be floating around to be picked up and with a strong West Waterford base, Cllr. Kyne felt he was in a position to pull in more than a few of these. However as in most other political set-ups there are frictions and factions to be found within

the Labour Party and Cllr. Kyne, conscious of this and also of Deputy Fahey's late declaration that he was re-entering the contest, decided to withdraw his name and went on to endorse Brian O'Shea's nomination which was then given the unanimous approval of Convention.

As far as the Fine Gael Party was concerned we understand that everything went off smack smooth with not the slightest of hiccups at their tingestion which endorsed the nomination of their stalwart standard bearer Dungarvan man and outgoing Deputy Austin Deasy who will have as a running mate on the Fine Gael ticket Cllr. Maurice Cummins, a member of Waterford Corporation.

And as things stand that leaves 8 candidates for the four seats to be filled. The present party strength stands at Fianna Fail 2, Fine Gael 1, Labour 1. The political pundits are forecasting no change after the November 25 election although an interesting race to fill the last seat can be expected.

## Ireland's Poor Rating Where Homeless Are Concerned

According to the first report on homelessness in the EC which came to hand this week, there are between one and three million homeless throughout the twelve States which presently comprise the Community.

The homeless are found in most European cities and towns where they hang out in railway stations, in the streets, in parks and under bridges. They do not look like tramps or social misfits who have more or less chosen a roaming life. They are just people without a roof over their heads.

A homeless person according to FEANTSA which is the French acronym for the European Federation of National Organisations Working with the Homeless, is one who, "having lost or left his home seeks the help of, or is helped by social or voluntary bodies."

The report notes that if the number of homeless people has risen to disturbing levels in recent years it is because of the housing policy — or lack of it — followed by most EC countries (including Ireland — the parenthesis are outs) with the exception of Denmark

and France, two countries, the report points out, which do the most to help the homeless. The EC countries on the whole have largely withdrawn from the housing sector during the 1980's and the sharp fall in the number of Council houses had led to a rise in homelessness, the report states.

The report goes on to denounce the shortcomings of existing housing policies and divides the EC countries into three groups under this heading. To begin with, Denmark and France can be taken as a model for the others: then come Belgium, Germany, Italy and Luxembourg where homeless people have access to numerous services, most of them provided by voluntary organisations. But the report points to important shortcomings in the other EC countries which include Ireland, Greece, Portugal, Spain and Britain (the Netherlands have been left out because of insufficient data).

So this puts us at the bottom of the ladder where homeless people are concerned. It's nothing of which we, as a nation, can be proud.

## Council Call To Implement New Canvassing Prohibition

At the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council last Monday, the Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne proposed that the Council contact the Gardai to ensure that the new law prohibiting canvassers from operating within 100 metres in the vicinity of polling stations around the county at the forthcoming general election be fully observed and adhered to.

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that the Co. Council had no function in the running of the general election but agreed to ask the County Secretary to contact the County Registrar and to inform him of the Council's wishes in this regard.

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran however had other ideas. He said while such a law might be alright where built-up areas were concerned it was one which should not be applied in rural districts. In places like Clashmore said Cllr. O'Halloran, if a canvasser was to keep 100 metres from the polling station he would almost be in the next townland! For that reason he thought the implementation of such a law was impractical.

## John Mangan The Fenian From Lismore

This is, we understand, the full version of the poem, which was composed by John Mangan of Lismore, who was one of the Fenians who landed in Helvick from the "Erin's Hope" in 1867. The ill-fated expedition which was to bring officers, men and arms from America to help in the Fenian Rising ended with the capture of most of those who landed by the British. John Mangan, however, evaded capture and succeeded in returning safely to America.

It's years since I left you, it's twenty or more,  
Since I took my departure from ancient Lismore,  
I will come back again from a far distant clime,  
For to see you once more and perhaps the last time.

Your castles and towers there are none can excel,

## U.S.-Euro Trade War Could Hit Crystal Exports

The threatened U.S.-Euro trade war arising from the break-down of the GATT negotiations could have dire results for Waterford City and Dungarvan as it emerged last week-end that the internationally famous Waterford Crystal is included on a standby "hitlist" drawn up by the Americans in the event of EC retaliation for an initial tariff hitlist published last week.

With further redundancies already in line for the workforce at the Crystal plants in Waterford and Dungarvan, this latest threat of trade sanctions could make future prospects for the glass industry much more grim.

Under the second hitlist, punitive taxes would be slapped on the exports of Waterford Glass to North America estimated to be worth £35 million a year and these would cause the prices to soar in American

outlets, making crystal products unattractive to shoppers.

Washington has already gone ahead in imposing sanctions on \$300 million worth of European goods, mostly French food and drinks such as white wine and mustard. The Americans blame France for blocking the farm deal which flared into fresh prominence last week following the resignation of the EC principal negotiator Commissioner Ray MacSharry because of alleged interference by Commission President, Jacques Delors, a Frenchman, in the farm negotiations.

Trade officials from both sides will meet again this week at the GATT headquarters in Geneva in a bid to avert further skirmishes and unless progress can be made a worsening of the dispute would appear to be inevitable.

# TALLOW NOTES

## Tallow Post-Man Retires

Last Friday was the end of an era, the end of a 33 year commitment to his work by Sean Burke, Barrack Street, Tallow, who has retired from his position as postman in the Tallow area. Even though we all knew that he was due to step down in November Sean's retirement eventually came with such a suddenness and finality that people were taken somewhat unawares. But then that is scarcely surprising since he has been a common element of our lives for more than a generation and in all the rapid changes of the last decade he was the reassuring common denominator.

From Tallow town Eastwards to Knockanore and Westwards to Glengoura and Monaloo he was known to every man, woman and child. There was always a welcome from him — even when his mailbag disgorged only bills — because he took with him much more than the mail to his extended family. He had the latest

news, made time for civil and civilised communication and had a ready and sympathetic ear for people's worries, troubles and difficulties. He shared their joys and sorrows, ups and down. More than that he was an unofficial unpaid counsellor and social worker and many the good deed he performed above and beyond the call of duty, over these often times turbulent years. Ever available, Sean's Christian caring personality never allowed him to view people as other than friends.

His association with the post really goes back over 40 years to a time when Sean was driver of the mail van for the Mallow postal area which of course, includes Tallow. When assigned to Tallow area as postman his employers were the Department of Posts and Telegraphs and he was reduced from 4 wheels to 2. P. & T. in their generosity gave him a bicycle, so for over twenty years it was "bike it or like it", in all

weathers until comparatively recently, 1988 in fact, when the now familiar green van was introduced and those extra two wheels ensured that the country folk received the mail at an earlier hour.

Sean will be missed. His quiet efficiency and gentle obliging nature made him hugely popular and all of those on his route, especially the old and infirm, will find it difficult to come to terms with his retirement. ## Revenue Launches New Motor Tax

The Revenue Commissioners have formally announced details of the new vehicle registration procedures and vehicle registration tax (VRT) which will come into effect on January 1, 1993. They also have launched a guide which is being issued to motor traders on how the new system will operate.

From January 1, 1992 vehicles will have to be registered with Revenue instead of local authorities. However, the local authority will still be responsible for changes of ownership and road tax payments.

An important feature of the new scheme is that motor

traders must receive authorisation from Revenue before they can hold unregistered vehicles in stock. An application form for authorisation is being sent to all traders which they should complete and return immediately to ensure that they can continue to trade normally from January 1. A trader or any other person who is not authorised must register each vehicle brought into the State by the next working day.

The current registration number format will be used under the new system, with the registration number continuing to be related to the county in which the owner resides.

# You can't beat the taste of fresh veg

SUPERMARKETS do a good job getting fresh vegetables to us, but nothing ever seems to taste as good as those straight from the garden.

If you grow your own you can also be as 'green' as you like by using garden compost instead of chemical fertiliser, or chasing weeds out by hoe and hand rather than a dose of spray.

Unfortunately, many people don't think they have room to grow vegetables, but it is possible to enjoy homegrown salads from a garden on the balcony of a flat if necessary.

Points to remember are:

- Be realistic. There's very little point in using up valuable space on bulky rows of potatoes and carrots, for instance, when good quality ones are so cheap to buy.
- Choose small varieties — they are often heavy-cropping too.
- Be flexible about siting — who says cabbages shouldn't be grown at the back of the flower bed or lettuces raised in a half-butt?
- Try 'deep bed' cultivation, designed for tight spaces.
- Once you have started, switched crop sites each year. Different plants have different food needs and pests. 'Crop rotation' prevents them and the soil becoming tired and helps keep pests at bay.

The deep bed system is highly recommended for any 'part-time' vegetable growing. It creates patches of deep and easily-worked soil which can be more intensively sown than conventional rows and yet fitted into tight corners of the garden.

The secret is to create beds no more than 3-4 feet wide flanked by narrow paths — you can then do all necessary work on the crops without needing to step on and risk compacting the soil.

The new beds are also double-dug (to the depth of two spades) so that the soil is well-drained and plants can easily put down deep roots.

Such preparation will then allow you to single-dig for the next two years before a double-digging 'blitz' in the third and so on.

If space is particularly tight then consider growing carefully chosen crops for butts, pots, grow-bags and other containers. Replace the soil each year.

When choosing varieties for locations, divide them into three 'families':

- 1 — brassicas (cabbage, kale, turnips, swede, brussels, etc.)
- 2 — root crops excluding any that are also brassicas.
- 3 — the rest (beans, onions, celery, etc.)

The sites for crops falling into each family should then be rotated each year as discussed earlier.

Some suggested varieties for your 'mini-vegetable' patch:

RHUBARB — tough and easily grown in an odd corner of a pot.

BROAD BEANS — can be planted now in mild and sunny locations.

BEETROOT — short-rooted beetroots can easily be raised in pots.

LETTUCE — can be packed into grow bags or small beds.

RADISH — is very rewarding for small-scale gardening.

TOMATOES — ideal for grow-bags or confined spaces against sunny walls.

PEPPERS — great for livening up the cookery and just a few plants will slash pounds from the grocery bill.

# Lismore Notes



## Complaints About Lismore Social Welfare Office

In the Dail last Thursday, Deputy Austin Deasy asked the Minister for Social Welfare if he will investigate the conditions pertaining at the social welfare office in Lismore, in view of complaints, particularly regarding its size and lack of privacy.

In reply the Minister (Mr. McCreavy) stated: The Social Welfare Office in Lismore, was moved to a new premises on October 6, 1992. The move fulfilled a commitment given by my predecessor to provide a new and better office in the town.

In the search for new premises in Lismore were in-

spected and the office chosen was the best available. While it is smaller than the old office, the accommodation there for both staff and the public is of a higher standard. It was specifically modified internally with the dignity and privacy of clients in mind. There is a modern public area for routine enquiries and an adjoining office where matters of a

confidential nature can be dealt with in greater privacy as the need arises.

There is pressure on space on signing mornings which are the office's busiest times. At present unemployed people in the Lismore area call to the office on a fortnightly rota to sign.

My Department is in the process of introducing more flexible signing arrangements for the unemployed nation-wide. As part of this clients in the Lismore area will be required to sign once every month in the future. Consequently, only one quarter of the total number of people signing at the office will need to attend in any given week. This will reduce the number of callers substantially and should ease, if not eliminate, any problems arising from the size of the office.







# TRAINING SCHEDULE FOR COLLIGAN CUP

The Colligan Cup is a novel and fun event held over a five mile course through Colligan Wood each January and included in this issue is a ten week beginner's schedule ending on the date of this season's event — Sunday, January 24.

The principal aim of the Colligan Cup is to promote fitness and running locally in a fun atmosphere and if you often thought about getting fit but didn't know exactly how to start, then just try and follow this beginners schedule, comprised by our race director Victor Mullins and which starts on this coming Monday, November 16. The Colligan Cup is awarded annually to the runner who finishes nearest to the time he/she predicts, so everybody starts with an equal chance.

### COLLIGAN CUP

#### BEGINNERS SCHEDULE

**Week One:** Mon-Tues. — 5 min. run/5 min. walk/5 min. run; Wed.-Thurs. — 6 min. run/6 min. walk/6 min. run; Fri. — 7 min. run/7 min. walk/7 min. run; Sat. — rest; Sun. — 10 min. run (very easy).

N.B. — All running for the first two weeks is easy running. Sunday runs are always very easy.

**Week Two:** Mon./Tues. — 8 min. run/5 min. walk/8 min. run; Wed.-Thurs. — 9 min. run/5 min. walk/9 min. run; Fri. — 10 min. run/5 min. walk/10 min. run; Sat. — rest; Sun. — 15 min. run (very easy).

N.B. — Warm up (easy jog and stretching) before every run. Warm down after every run.

**Week Three:** Mon. — 1 mile easy; Tues. — 2 ml.; Wed. — 3 mile very easy; Thurs. — 2 miles; Fri. — 2x1 ml. (5 minute rest between); Sat. — rest; Sun. — 3 ml. easy.

N.B. — No flat out running for the first five weeks. "Train, don't strain."

**Week Four:** Mon. — 2 ml. easy; Tues. — 3 ml.; Wed. — 2 ml.; Thurs. — 3x1 ml. (5 min. rest between); Fri. — 2 ml.; Sat. — rest; Sun. — 3 ml. steady.

N.B. — Steady = three-quarter effort.

# Dungarvan Through To Third Final In A Row

**DUNGARVAN 3-8 STRADBALLY 0-8**

This hectic and exciting, and at times explosive county senior football semi-final between the champions Dungarvan and the challengers Stradbally, saw the Old Boro team end up deserving winners and safely through to their third county final in a row. For Dungarvan it was not only a display worthy of county champions, it was the kind of performance which puts them into the final as the hottest of favourites to score their eagerly sought after, three in a row.

As I have written the semi-final had an explosive element and during the second half Stradbally had two players sent to the line, thus reducing immensely the strength of their challenge which on the day failed chiefly because of their inability to score from a few golden opportunities which came their way midway through the first half. This was a period of the game when Stradbally, in control, might have taken a grip on the game and when they were on level terms on the scoreboard. In the 25th minute a Morrie Ferncombe delivery from a '65' was fisted to the net by brother John John and this was the score which set the champions on fire and gave them the lead which they were to maintain until the final whistle.

The game attracted a very large crowd who paid almost £6,000 to see the game, but there was some disappointment when the semi-final failed to provide the type of grand-stand finish which marked the last two meetings between the sides.

**PLAY**

A Morrie Ferncombe point in the 1st minute was negated when Liam O'Brien pointed a 3rd minute free for Stradbally. Morrie Ferncombe made no mistake with a '45' in the 8th minute and Ger Beresford made it 0-3 to 0-1 in favour of the champions in the 13th. Then came Stradbally's big chance that might have pro-

duced the goals that would make all the difference when they took temporary control and settled for points when goals looked to be on. Three points by Eoin O'Brien between the 14th and 16th minutes gave the challengers a lead which they held for nine minutes until the fisted goal by J. J. Ferncombe in the 25th minute. The score had a stunning effect on Stradbally who fought back for a point by Liam O'Brien which was again negated by P. P. Ferncombe's 29th minute score and which was the last of this half leaving the scores at 1-4 to 0-5 in favour of Dungarvan.

Pepe Ferncombe sent all the way over from a '45' and within a minute after receiving a well directed pass from brother Morrie, J. J. delivered his second goal which was the best score of the match. Their six points lead was turned into seven when Morrie Ferncombe pointed in the 37th minute, but Liam O'Brien brought one back for Stradbally to leave two clear goals between the sides in the 38th minute. Liam O'Brien had a point for Stradbally in the 42nd minute but this was answered by a third J. J. Ferncombe goal which had been laid on by Pepe. This score put the game out of reach for Stradbally, but they continued to battle on and after Conor O'Brien, moved from full-back to full forward, pointed in the 50th minute, it was their final score of the

hour. Points by Bobby Lyons and Morrie Ferncombe ended the scoring to give the champions a well deserved three goal victory at the end of the game that became a bit over robust in the closing stages and as a result of which James Keane and Conor O'Brien were sent off.

# Senior Hurling County Final At Dungarvan

## Waterford Footballers Play Meath In National League

The county senior hurling final between Mount Sion and Ballygunner will, after all, be played at Fraher Field as Ballygunner have again invoked the bye-law which gives the county final to a Western venue under the rotation system.

Mount Sion having played a draw with Passage won the replay on Saturday last and qualified to meet the team whom they defeated in the replay of the county final at Walsh Park in 1988. Rumour had it that the 'Gunners would bring the Monastery team here again as they did when winning their first ever title back in '66, and this was confirmed on Saturday last. Whether or not the decision will prove as rewarding as it did 26 years ago, is something we must wait and see. This year and last year, Ballygunner played their best hurling on the Fraher Field sod and the two occasions on which they were up here they played super hurling. Their first and last matches were played here when they drew with the reigning champions, Lismore and their last match in which they defeated Tallow. These were top-class displays by any standards and something that this present Mount Sion team will not find easy to match.

Ballygunner have embarked on a policy of keeping their players in their selected positions throughout the championship and

this, they feel, has the effect of improving their team work with every game. Ray Whitty is their regular goalkeeper but waiting on the wings is county minor goalkeeper Patrick Harnan. Charlie Laphorne, Nial Warren and Liam Whitty are their regular full-back line. Sean Lyons, Fergal Hartley and Kieran Cantwell will, as usual, field as their half line of defence with Ml. O'Neill and Eddie Brennan manning the centre field positions. Having averaged 2-13 per game over their eight matches, their forwards are doing alright with players like Paul Power, Billy O'Sullivan, Stephen Frampton, Paul Flynn, Michael O'Mahony and Seamus Holden have been doing all that was expected of them and there is little reason for supposing that this average will not be maintained here.

I cannot ever recall a situation where Mount Sion were not favourites going into a county senior hurling final. Now while they are not wearing the tag of outsiders, the general feeling is that they are less fancied than their opponents on this occasion. After the replay against Passage on Saturday, Mount Sion's Pat McGrath said on radio that Ballygunner will be favourites this time and even if one does ignore the gamesmanship that is part and parcel of all the pre-match strategy that goes on, this comment does express a certain amount of worry or

doubt about their prospects.

We do not read into it, a dissipation of the spirit of Mount Sion or a lack of confidence in their ability to win. It would be a pity and a sad thing for the county if the spirit of Mount Sion — which was a factor in bringing them to the top and Waterford hurling to the forefront over the years — were to show a weakening trend. I say this regardless of what the outcome of the county final.

They were beaten very unexpectedly in the final by Lismore last year, when again they qualified after a semi-final replay. They have a good record of success in Dungarvan's Fraher Field, but oddly enough on the two previous occasions in which they were brought up here by Eastern opponents who invoked the bye-law, they were beaten, Ballygunner in 1966 and Dunhill in 1978. Dunhill's gamble paid off when Rob Power crashed home a goal with just a couple of minutes remaining to give his side an historic victory (2-16 to 4-8). Another man to help make that gamble pay-off was the great Tom Cheasty.

Another interesting factor (or coincidence) I found in researching the record is that in the 28 finals won by Mount Sion, Ballygunner are the only club to have beaten them twice in finals.

Apart from their first game against Roanmore and their two matches against Passage, their performances did little to excite anyone this year. Their games against Passage were very good contests, but Ballygunner also played Passage and won both matches decisively. It must be a matter for concern to Mount Sion that they failed to score a single goal against Passage in two hours of hurling. Ballygunner have seven goals for their two matches against the same opponents.

The Monastery team will be represented by the side which defeated Passage in the replay. Shane Ahearne who was a sub in the replay is likely to be played as corner forward as he did when replacing P. Flynn on Saturday. Alan Robinson will be in goal in front of Peter Walsh, Pat Ryan and either Pat Meaney or D. Power. B.

Coughlan and the two Brownes, Tommy and Tony will be in their half back line, Ger Fitzpatrick and Garry Gater will play at centre field and in attack the city team who are now in the role of challengers, will play Brian Green, Donal Loughnane, John Meaney, Paraigh Fanning, Kevin Ryan and probably Shane Ahearne.

### THE OUTCOME

Although this is a year of surprises, the result of this one will not be a surprise to anyone, whichever way it goes. It would be a great year to be remembered as being champions as rightly or wrongly, history will in some way identify our inter-county success with the club who are champions. This is more often than not, misleading, but that is how it is.

This final can go either way, but the form of the teams up to now favours the chances of Ballygunner to take their fourth county title.

It is a final that must mean something special to Mount Sion as 1992 marks the 60th anniversary of the founding of the club.

Ballygunner who won their only minor county title way back in 1954, didn't surface as a top-class senior team until the mid-sixties. Their first senior final was against Mount Sion and because Walsh Park was undergoing development work, the final was played at Tramore. It was won by Mount Sion (1965) on a very low scoreline of 3-2 to 2-4. They met also in the following year's final and invoking the bye-law, Ballygunner took the reigning county champions to Dungarvan to win their first ever title, also on a low scoreline of 2-6 to 2-3. Mount Sion by that year had won 20 county senior hurling titles and were going for their 21st. The final was featured by the outstanding display of Tommy Ahearne. Other Ballygunner players who wore the county jersey around that era were Paudie Casey, Pat Flynn (father of Paul Flynn of the present minor team), Mick Gaffney, Vinny Connors, John Warren, Tony Cummins, James Phelan, etc.

Ballygunner won the next two county titles to complete a great three-in-a-row. During the years which followed, the club fell on lean times and went down to the intermediate grade where they remained for a number of years until regaining senior status at their third attempt when defeating Dungarvan by 1-13 to 2-4 in the 1984 intermediate final.

In 1988 they qualified for the senior county final once again and Mount Sion were their opponents. The final ended in a draw (the twelfth time that a Waterford final had ended in a draw). The score was Mount Sion 0-17 Ballygunner 3-8. In the replay two weeks later Ballygunner again scored 3-8, but this time it was not enough to equal Mount Sion's 2-15.

### MOUNT SION PROFILE

Mount Sion will be playing to win their 29th county senior title. They already have won more than 80 county titles since the club was founded way back in the year of the Eucharistic Congress, 1932. Their long and illustrious record of success in the club championships and their contribution to the inter-county scene is all a part of history of the county itself. In 1981 and again in 1986 they contested the Munster club titles. They won the provincial title in '86 when they defeated Limerick champions, South Liberties in an epic final.

Having won the minor in 1933 and '34, they qualified for senior ranks in 1935 they having also won the junior county title in 1935. In 1936 the new Monastery team won the title but were subsequently divested when Tallow, whom they beat in the final, objected. It was 1938, the year in which Waterford played in their first senior All-Ireland, that Mount Sion won the title for the first time when beating neighbours Erin's Own — who were then looked upon as the outstanding club team in the country — by 4-3 to 3-4 in a tremendous contest. The Monastery club were on their way and having retained the title in the following year, they brought the number of senior hurling titles up to the magical figure of 21 by 1969. Their big stars in their early days John Keane, Locky Byrne, Paddy Greene, John Baston, Paddy O'Connor, Mick Gallagher and company are still remembered as legendary characters in the hurling lore of this county. Possibly their best years were from 1953 to 1961 when they won their famous nine-in-a-row.

They are now just sixty

years in being and their enviable record of having won 28 senior titles as well as umpteen titles in the other grades of hurling and football looks like as if it will continue.

### WATERFORD V. MEATH

The visit of the mighty Meath to play Waterford in round three of the National Football League here over the week-end is understandably causing a big stir despite the other very attractive games on in the club championship front over the week-end. Meath remembered mostly for their marathon with Dublin last year, were All-Ireland champions in 1987 and 1988 and very close to winning two other finals in the interim.

Because of the newly structured football league, our county found themselves in the same group for the first time ever and whatever the result (and this in the judgment of practically everyone is inevitable), it will be an experience for the selected Waterford players to challenge the elite of the football counties.

At the time of writing the fixture is being reconsidered by the county fixture committee who originally fixed it for Dungarvan for Sunday afternoon, but subsequently changed it when the county final cropped up. Patrons should consult our fixture list.

Up to now the county football selectors have been plagued by problems. Selected players have become club tied and matches involving county players have been proceeded with on the day of the game or on the eve of the match and there has also been the matter of some clubs not releasing players to travel because important matches were in the offing. In spite of this situation they were unlucky to lose to both Westmeath and Roscommon who each beat us by two points.

Meath with players of the calibre of David Beggy, P. J. Gillic, Robby Molloy, Liam Harman, Tommy Dowd, Brian Stafford, Bernard Flynn, etc, will be the red hot favourites to score a decisive win, but it won't be for want of trying that players like Liam Dalton, Dan Casey, Alan Power, Michael O'Brien, Pat, Tom and Ger Walsh, Derry Kiely, Peter Queally and company from Waterford will give best to the visitors. I understand that the game will be played at Fraher Field on Sunday at 3 p.m.

## OTHER RESULTS

Ballygunner, who contest the senior county final next weekend, were the first to have their names on the cup (1984) and St. Saviours had theirs inscribed last year.

Tom Lannen needs little introduction to readers as very few will not remember the great Dungarvan man who rendered such sterling service to his club and the county also.

## Minor Hurling 'B' Co. Final

This, and not the 'A' county final will be played as a curtain-raiser to the senior county final at Dungarvan on Saturday. Fourmilewater as Western champions will play St. Mary's who are champions of the Eastern division.

The visiting team from the Eastern division are highly rated and will probably start favourites, but those of us who saw Fourmilewater defeat St. Patrick's in the replay of our divisional final at Cappoquin two weeks ago will have other ideas about the prospects of our representatives.

This year our 'B' minor hurling championship was played in two sections as there were a total of ten teams participating.

Fourmilewater won out in the section which included, Ardmore, Tallow, Kilrossanty and Stradbally and

having won out here they played St. Patrick's whose very young team won out in the other section.

The replay on Saturday last was not as good as the drawn game a week earlier, but the Ballymac' side were too strong for their opponents, 13 of whom will be under age to play minor again next year.

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

which they are entitled. "The people are not being treated properly where this matter is concerned and with so many now unemployed it's time to put an end to this business of them having to queue up," said Cllr. McDonnell.

Seconding the motion Cllr. Lar Hart said that the situation was the same in Dungarvan where long queues had to form along the street outside the Social Welfare Office sometimes in the rain.

Cllr. Billy Kyne, Chairman said that in most cases the accommodation for social welfare offices was provided by independent contractors who conducted the service. However he agreed that everybody concerned should be treated fairly. Unfortunately they were now in a high unemployment era and the technology to deal with the increased numbers did not appear to be available. He thought that arrangements should be made to make the payments by giro and the Minister should be asked to look into this.

Cllr. Patsy Kenneally said that it was degrading for unemployed people to have to queue along public streets to secure payments to which they were entitled. "These people," said Cllr. Kenneally, "are surely entitled to better treatment."

Cllr. McDonnell's motion was then declared passed unanimously.
