Opinion Polls Forecast Change

The brief winter election campaign ended on Tuesday last and to-day, Wednesday, November 25, the people are going to the polls to decide what form of government is to run the country for the next five years.

According to most of the published opinion polls taken during the past couple of weeks, the message coming from the electorate is that a change from the old system of one-party "strong" government is being sought and that the system most favoured is a coalition government consisting of three or more of the political parties contesting the election.

Both of the two main parties, Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael appear to have lost ground while the Labour Party appears to be riding high with an unprecedented upsurge in support. On the eve of poll, "best guess" forecasts of most political commentators were returning rough results as follows: Fianna Fáil 74; Fine Gael 53; Labour 23; Progressive Democrats 5/6; Democratic Left 5/6; Others 5.

Here in the Waterford Constituency forecasters are placing Labour candidate Brian O'Shea as the poll-topper followed by Fine Gael's Austin Deasy. Next is expected to be one of the two Fianna Fáil candidates, Junior Minister Billy Kenneally and Jackie Fahey who, however have been at loggerheads with each other in recent weeks

over canvassing arrangements in the constituency. The fourth and final seat is then expected to be a scramble between the remaining Fianna Fáil candidate, the PD candidate Martin Cullen and Democratic Left candidate Paddy Gallagher.

FOUR SEPARATE POLLS

Polling stations opened at 9 a.m. this morning (Wednesday, November 25) and will remain open until 9 p.m. this evening.

Electors will vote on four separate issues. For the Dáil General election they will receive a yellow ballot paper which they can mark in the usual way showing their order of preference 1, 2, 3 etc.

For the Constitutional Referenda they will receive

a white ballot paper headed "Ceart chun Beatha — Right to Life"; they will receive a green ballot paper headed "Taisteal — Travel" and a pink ballot paper headed "Faisnéis — Information."

If an elector approves of the proposal to which the ballot paper relates he/she should mark X in the square beside "TA/YES" while if it

Dungarvan Crystal Workers Reject "Rescue Plan"

The workforce at Dungarvan Crystal in a secret ballot held last Thursday voted

by 163 to 152 to reject the "rescue plan" proposed by the company.

The rationalisation plan at the centre of the latest crisis in the industry proposed cutting 500 jobs, wage cuts between 10% and 40% across the board, a four-year pay-freeze, industrial peace for three years and the contracting out of services including security, transport, canteen facilities and cleaning.

It was rejected on a 2-1 majority by the 1,700 workers at the two Crystal plants in Waterford City on a show of hands taken at a meeting held on the previous Monday night.

Of the 420 workers employed at Dungarvan, 390, all members of the A.T.G.W. Union, were entitled to vote but some 75 of those eligible to vote did not do so.

Before either of last week's votes were taken, Dr. Paddy Galvin, Chief Executive of the Company offered the stark choice to the workers: accept sacrifices to secure the industry or reject them and face a steady decline of manufacturing operations in Waterford and Dungarvan.

Following the rejection of the company's proposal (in Dungarvan by only 11 votes) it appears that the only options now to be considered are for management and union to commence

Prison Sentence For Affane Man On Sex Assault Charge

A three year prison sentence was imposed on a County Waterford man when he was convicted of sexually assaulting a young woman.

At Waterford Circuit Court last week, Brendan Hennebry (22) an unemployed bread van driver of Affane, Cappoquin pleaded guilty to the offence which took place on March 29 near Cappoquin.

Garda Inspector Michael Blake told the court that the defendant had followed the 18-years-old victim after

she got off a bus on her way home after a disco in the early hours of the morning. She realised she was being followed and tried to run away but he caught up and fell on top of her.

He tried to sexually assault her but she resisted strongly and managed to cover herself and wasn't touched sexually. She screamed and shouted for help and people came to her assistance.

Inspector Blake said the incident lasted about 15 to 20 minutes in all and was

extremely distressing for the victim.

Apologising for his behaviour, Hennebry said he was ashamed for the disgrace he had brought on his family. He had too much drink taken that night.

Counsel for the defendant, Mr. John Walsh, said his client had never come under the notice of the gardai before the incident. On the night in question he had a considerable amount of drink taken "and lost the run of himself." His client apologised for the distress and

upset he had caused the woman as a result of the incident.

Judge D. P. Sheridan said the victim was "very brave" and she had strongly resisted the attack. Such offences were unheard of ten years ago and he said he was getting tired of drink being offered in mitigation for such crimes. He asked the gardai to request the bus company bringing girls home from discos to take a different route and drop them at their homes. No matter how much drink a man had taken he should not chase a young girl on a dark, lonely road with lust in his heart.

He imposed a three-year prison sentence on Hennebry but suspended one year on condition he keeps the peace and does not interfere with the woman again.

WHY DO IT THE HARD WAY?...

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ABBEYSIDE

VILLAGE TOPICS

ABBEYSIDE CHURCH

The ornate chair that the principal celebrant of Mass sits on in the inner sanctuary area is very interesting from the historical viewpoint. The basic structure is built using one half of the brass gate that was erected many years ago at the entrance to the sanctuary from the church. Older people will remember that the sanctuary was separated from the main body of the church by a long marble altar rail with the gates dividing it in half.

The timber used in the construction of the Chair is pitch pine which came from the wooden altar rails that at one time divided the sanctuary from the main body of the Church in Ballinroad. This wood was carved by John Hearne's Company in Clonmel who were specialists in church furniture.

The materials were given to John C. Noonan, Clonmel, a cabinet maker who was given the job of making two chairs and the results of his work can be seen either in the sanctuary of Abbeyside Church on the left hand side of the altar as one looks up from the body of the Church or in the sanctuary of Ballinroad Church.

The idea of perpetuating

materials from another era in the construction of the chairs is an excellent one. As to the artistic qualities

of the chairs, well that is an area where individual people will have to judge for themselves.

College Sports Equipment Destroyed In Fire

Three units of Dungarvan Fire Service rushed to a fire which broke out at the Augustinian College at Duck-spool last Sunday night at 10.30 p.m.

The fire destroyed three storerooms located just off the College gymnasium at the rear of the main College complex in which sports

equipment used by the students was stored. This included foam rubber landing gear and mats for high jumping and pole vaulting which created a pale of thick black smoke and fumes as it burned. However the strong wind which was blowing at the time swept the smoke and fumes

away from the College buildings. The damage has been estimated to be in the region of £50,000.

Fortunately when the fire broke out there was no one in the gym area as the students had all retired for the night and consequently beyond the material damage no one was injured.



SCOUT MASS

Harbour And Markets Act 1863

Last week we discussed the bye-laws for the Abbeyside/Dungarvan area which were enacted in 1864.

However in 1924 Mr. Keohan in his History of Dungarvan has the following to say about these bye-laws:—

'The bye-laws are still on force but would seem to be more honoured in the breach than in their observance.'

Father of 5 Gets 7 Years For 'Savage Sex Attack' In Dungarvan

A 32-year-old father of five children, who raped a young woman he dragged into a field as she walked home from a Dungarvan disco, afterwards asked her to kill him, the Central Criminal Court was told in Dublin last Thursday.

Tony McCarthy, a scrap metal dealer of The Halting Site, Dungarvan, was sentenced to seven years penal servitude, when he pleaded guilty to raping the 20-year-old woman in Dungarvan on May 11 this year.

Sentencing him, Mr. Justice Declan Costello described the rape as 'most serious and savage' and said that while he gave credit to the accused for his guilty plea, an earlier indication of his intention to admit the offence would have saved the victim the trauma of believing she had to give evidence to a trial.

McCarthy, the court was told, grabbed his victim from behind as she was walking home in the early hours of the morning. He put his hand

over her mouth and dragged her into the grounds of a detached house at Upper O'Connell Street.

Supt. Ray McAndrew, Dungarvan, told prosecution counsel, Mr. Michael Feehan, SC, that at about 2.30 a.m. the victim was forced over a barbed-wire fence and cut both her hands as she tried to cling to the fence. She was struck on the face by the accused before she fell over the fence into a field.

He said the accused man

then grabbed her around the neck and dragged her a distance into the field, where he threw her onto the ground and got down beside her. He removed her clothing and when she told him she was pregnant, he told her he was not going to have sex with her. But almost immediately, he got on top of her and raped her.

Supt. McAndrew said that McCarthy tried three times to have sexual intercourse with the young woman and forced her to masturbate him. He then lay down beside her and smoked a cigarette. The victim then went home and told her parents.

He said the accused had five children, aged between 8 months and 8 years. He was formerly from an itinerant background and had lived in Clarecastle, Co. Clare, for some years. He had also spent some years in England.

BECAME REMORSEFUL

In answer to defence counsel, Mr. Denis Vaughan Buckley SC, Supt. McAndrew agreed that McCarthy became immediately remorseful and asked the victim to 'kill him.' He told her: 'I've raped you. I've ruined your life.' Starting to cry, he then asked her to kill him.

The accused man, the superintendent said, had a good deal to drink that day, having been to a Christening and a First Holy Communion for two of his own children and had had a row with his wife. Hours after the rape, he was arrested in Dungarvan and told the sergeant who approached him: 'I wish I were dead. I deserve what ever I get. I don't know what happened. I want to go to jail. I did a terrible thing. There's no need to put that girl in the witness box.'

Appealing for leniency, Mr. Vaughan Buckley pointed out that the accused's wife was standing by him and that he had indicated, at the very first opportunity, his decision to plead guilty. He asked the court, in determining sentence, to leave some light at the end of the tunnel.

But, sentencing McCarthy to seven years penal servitude, to take effect immediately, Mr. Justice Costello pointed out that the victim of the most serious crime had been under strain for the past six months, under the impression that she would have to give evidence at a trial.

It would be preferable that he would have given an earlier indication of his intention to plead guilty and save the prosecutrix the trauma of believing she had to give evidence.

He refused an application from Mr. Vaughan Buckley for leave to appeal against severity of sentence.

Big Drop In Adult Education Classes

The number of people attending adult education classes in Co. Waterford has fallen from 3,000 to little over 600, members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee were told by the CEO Donal Kelleher at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last week.

Mr. Kelleher said they don't have the personnel to run the classes and Waterford is one of the very few counties without an adult education officer.

"We had such an officer up to 1988 but when she left the Department steadfastly refused to fill the vacancy," Mr. Kelleher said.

Mr. Kelleher added that they have applied to the Department almost on a monthly basis for the last six months to have the post filled but without success.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan proposed that they proceed to make the appointment if

approval from the Department is not forthcoming by the December meeting. "We cannot continue to see our adult education classes being decimated because of the lack of personnel," he said.

Cllr. Con Casey seconded and members unanimously backed the proposal.

The meeting was also told by the CEO that their application to the Department to appoint three additional permanent whole-time teachers at the Dungarvan school had not been acceded to.

"The Department will ap-

prove of one but no more," said Mr. Kelleher.

On the proposal of Paudie Geary it was decided to renew the request to the Department.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

Voting At General Election And Constitutional Referenda

To-day Wednesday, November 25 is polling day in the '92 General Election and for the Referenda on the proposed changes to Article 40.3.3° of the Constitution.

By the time you read this, many people will already have voted as the polls opened at 9 a.m. this morning but they will remain open until 9 p.m. to-night so there's still a few hours to go.

Despite the brevity of the election campaign we are

sure that most people are by now well sick and tired of listening to the politicians as they tried all the tricks of the trade to entice the electorate to support them with their votes.

Today is the day on which the voting public have the power to decide what type of government is to govern the country for the next five years. The opinion polls indicate that the people are in favour of a change from what we have had in the

past. If that is to be the result, so be it.

It is a great pity, though, that the Constitutional Referenda on the Right to Life, Travel and Information had to get mixed up with the General Election. This has been greatly overshadowed by the race for control of the Dail as the political parties tried to outdo each other with promises, promises and more promises — very few of which, if any will eventually materialise. As a result people

never really were given an opportunity to adequately understand the import of the referenda proposals and consequently many were left in a state of utter confusion.

However in the hours remaining we think that it would be wrong if as many as possible did not bother to go to the polls to cast their votes. After all the right to elect the government is the greatest power which democracy bestows on people.

Unemployment In County Is Uppermost Problem

Waterford County Council members following their adjourned no-business estimates meeting on Friday, November 13 are due to meet again on Monday

next, November 30 to consider the estimates to fund the services of the county during 1993. They will be grappling with a budget which totals an expenditure

of £15.22 million for the year and calls for a rate of £31.50, an increase of 5% over the current year's figure.

In the course of his report to the Council on the estimates, the County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley referring to the unemployment situation in the county states that in preparing the report there was no doubting but the level of unemployment in the county was uppermost in his mind.

He goes on to say: "This situation is caused by many factors outside our control. Where decisions on jobs must be made, be it for their retention or the creation of additional ones, I appeal to those involved to act in a prudent way."

The Manager's report then

gives a table showing the level of unemployment for the City and County throughout 1992. In January the figure stood at 8,579 while the figure for September (the last period for which figures were available prior to the preparation of the report) stood at 8,175. "While you will observe that there is no great deterioration in the figures, nevertheless the level is unacceptable," stated Mr. Hurley.

A total of over 8,000 jobless people in the County and City of Waterford is certainly an unacceptable situation and shows up for what they are worth the failed policies of the politicians where tackling the unemployment problem is concerned.

Will The Stark Choice Apply?

The 2,000 plus workforce at the Waterford Crystal's three plants in Waterford City and Dungarvan at separate meetings last week rejected the rationalisation plan put forward by the Company. These decisions were taken despite the warning issued prior to the meetings by the Company's Chief Executive, Dr. Paddy Galvin, in which he offered the stark choice to the workers: accept sacrifices to secure the industry or reject them and face a steady decline of manufacturing operations in Waterford and Dungarvan.

We understand that options now being considered include a Labour Court hearing in the matter or moves by a Labour Court Industrial Relations Officer to initiate discussions be-

tween Management and Union.

While it is to be hoped that one or other of these options will materialise we have been given to understand that the Company will not deviate from the main cutbacks set out in their rescue plan on the grounds that these are absolutely necessary if the future of the industry is to be secured.

Should an amicable and agreed settlement fail to be reached it would be a devastating blow to the economy of both the city and Dungarvan and indeed many parts of the county if the industry was to go into decline so let us hope that common sense will prevail all round and that in due course the local crystal industry will again return to its former glory.

Having heard this ballad sung at a recent concert we have been asked by a group of readers to include it in this corner to give them an opportunity to get the words. The ballad was composed by Australian songwriter Eric Boyle who was author of several other very popular ballads including "The Green Fields of France."

When I was a young man I carried my pack
And I lived the free life of a rover;
From the Murray's green basin to the dusty outback
I waltzed my Mathilda all over.
Then in nineteen fifteen the country said,
'Son it's time to stop rambling there's work to be done,
And they gave me a tin hat and they gave me a gun
And sent me away to the war.



Fianna Fail Agriculture Proposals Waffle — ICMSA

In response to the launch by the Minister for Agriculture & Food of the Fianna Fail proposals on agriculture, the President of ICMSA, Mr. Tom O'Dwyer said that he was shocked and extremely disappointed that there is nothing new in the Minister's proposals for agriculture.

"This is nothing more than the usual general election waffle. From our meeting with the Taoiseach and the Minister we expected detailed proposals to be announced — instead the Minister did nothing but applaud his own disastrous performance on the CAP Reform. He failed to address the reality of the hundreds of millions of pounds loss for the beef and dairy sectors which will result from the EC decision to reduce the U.K. MCA's", said Mr. O'Dwyer.

On taxation he said that the Minister's proposals were not in accordance with the commitment given by the Taoiseach at his meet-

ing with the ICMSA. DEVALUATION "Clearly the Minister advanced no solution to the problem caused by the reduction in U.K. MCA's. Four weeks ago I suggested that Euro funding should be sought to compensate for the losses incurred by the currency crisis and in the event of this not happening that devaluation should be considered. While it is not desirable, devaluation may be inevitable," concluded Mr. O'Dwyer.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — I have been getting Unemployment Benefit for five months and am expecting a baby in October. Will I be able to claim Maternity Allowance and if not can I continue to draw my Unemployment Benefit. What happens when I am in hospital?

Answer — There is now only one Maternity Allowance Scheme and it only covers women who are in employment and earning at least £25 per week and who meet the PRSI requirements.

Special arrangements have been made for women like yourself who are signing on for Unemployment Benefit which will allow you to continue to be paid your Unemployment Benefit for the six weeks before and six weeks after the birth.

You should notify the exchange about your pregnancy approximately 3 months before the birth. They will give you a form for the doctor to complete, certifying the expected date of delivery. Then 4 weeks before the birth you will be allowed to sign once for the following 12 weeks. Your Unemployment Benefit will be paid by cheque for the 12 weeks. However, women with less than 12 weeks of their Unemployment Benefit remaining will only be paid for the number of weeks left on their claim.

Women claiming Disability Benefit who are no longer part of the workforce (who have no job to go back to) will continue to be paid their Disability Benefit provided they have a condition (other than pregnancy) to warrant their being on Disability Benefit.

Note — Women in employment who are eligible for Maternity Allowance but who happen to be on sick leave immediately before they are due to start on maternity leave will be paid their 14 weeks Maternity Allowance in the normal way.

Question — I was on a Cert Overseas Placement Programme in 1990/91. Immediately before that and since my return I have been working. Recently, I was refused a Social Welfare benefit on the grounds that I hadn't enough PRSI in 1990. Should I have got credits for the Cert course?

Answer — There is no legislation with the granting of credits to Cert trainees. However, credits may be awarded on an administrative basis to trainees on certain Cert courses.

There are at least 12 different types of Cert courses and they can range from full-time, part-time, work experience, lan-

guage training and 2 day release courses.

Some students receive a training allowance while in college, then when they are placed on work experience they are paid by the employer who operates PRSI for them in the normal way.

You can't get a credit until you have actually worked. So, trainees who have never worked can't get credits.

Each case has to be looked at on an individual basis. In your particular case it would appear that you are entitled to credits. So, you should send details of your Cert course to the Schemes Section, Records Section, Department of Social Welfare, Gandon House, Dublin 2, who will look into your case.

Question — When I contacted the school recently about the Free Book Scheme I was told there was no scheme this year. Is this correct?

Answer — No! This is not correct. It was announced some months ago that the School Book Scheme for this year was to be changed and that it would be linked to the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Scheme and that the families who were eligible for the Clothing Scheme would be given a Certificate which they were to bring to the School Principal. This Certificate only stated that they may be eligible, not that they would be eligible.

This particular Scheme has now run into difficulties, probably because the schools had already applied for and received their allocation in May before details of the new scheme were announced.

So, the current position is that the Scheme for this year will operate the same as last year and the School Principal has total discretion as to who is eligible.

The Certificates issued by the Community Welfare Officer should be handed in to the school where they will be filed away for next year. This will give them some idea of how much money they will need when they come to put in for their funding next year.

Note — One of the difficulties about this scheme is that parents have come to regard it as a Free School Book Scheme when in fact it is not a free scheme. What happens is that the school receives a small grant for each necessitous child in the school (this year it was £4 for infant classes and £9.25 for 1st to 6th classes in primary schools). It is then up to the school principals to use this money as best they can.

Make Plans For A New Plot

If there's something about the layout of your garden which niggled you all summer then now is one of the best times to put it right.

Whether it be a complete re-design or a re-arrangement of a particular area, things are fairly dormant at present.

Major exertions such as spadework are also better suited to the cool conditions.

If you are designing from scratch then the best starting point is the size and approximate shape of the lawn, taking into account:

- the amount of use intended — will you want space for children to play in or would it be simply somewhere to lie when it's sunny?
- how much time can you devote to gardening? It's easier to mow a large lawn than tend numerous beds and borders.
- will the shape or any intended paths make mowing more difficult or damaging to the mower?

If you are coming down on the lazy-man's side you may even want to give more space to a patio.

It doesn't have to be paving stones or crazy paving — ornamental brick can look very stylish — and enclosed beds or butts can be used to break up any harshness on the eye.

With these major elements decided it is then worth drawing up a plan, but keep things flexible as you add borders and paths and features such as rockeries and ponds.

The trick is to try curves and odd shapes, particularly if you have a small garden. There is nothing worse than straight lines and rectangles for giving a garden that cramped 'shut in' look.

If you want to get some idea of how these shapes might look on the ground

then you could use one of those fold-flat hosepipes as a marker — it will make a change to find a use for the things after all our hosepipe bans!



Avoid straight concrete paths too as they bring an element of regimentation to even the most curving lines of beds and borders.

Try using a snake of stepping stones instead to take you around the key features.

Aim to give an impression of distance by hiding the ends of the garden behind intruding features such as hedges, bushes, trellises and pergolas.

Don't forget to create space with height too, using small trees, climbers, hedges or raised rockeries, perhaps making them appear higher by raising their sites.

Once you have decided on your layout you can get on with any excavations, paving, step-building and fencing.

You can also make a start with some of the greenery:

LAWNS — turves can be laid now although they are vulnerable to frost. It is also best to wait if you are still digging and working elsewhere in the garden.

But you could prepare the lawn site for sowing seed next spring.

BULBS — make sure the new look garden has an early show of colour by planting daffs and other spring bulbs to pep you up after your efforts.

TREES — deciduous trees and hedges can go in now ready for a flying start in the spring. It is surprising how quickly you can establish a new look.

Dungarvan Technical College Needs Permanent Extension To Cater For Major Student Influx

A meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee heard last week of the increasing problems of a school which has literally become too successful for its own good.

Dungarvan Technical College is now providing one of the most wide-ranging lists of subjects available at any second level school in the country. These, and its outstandingly successful record of job placement, have resulted in enrolment numbers spiralling from 217 a decade ago to 347 in the present school year.

Between 450 and 500 students are expected to be attending the college by 1997, but still the Department of Education is refusing to give the go-ahead for either a new school or a major extension to the existing one.

Last week's VEC meeting was attended by a deputation from the teaching staff headed by the school principal, Kieran Heffernan and vice-principal Pat Buckley. They presented a detailed submission which highlighted that the present seven-classroom school was built over half a century ago to cater for a maximum 100 students.

Mr. Heffernan said that in the intervening years no permanent extension has been made despite student numbers rising by 250%. Eleven prefab classrooms have had to be provided but what is most urgently need-

ed is a modern permanent extension that will adequately cater for the ever increasing student numbers.

"The school is becoming more and more popular because it is so successful and so progressive," said Mr. Heffernan. "Our minimum requirement is a permanent extension and a complete updating of the existing school."

Vice-principal Pat Buckley said a town of Dungarvan's size and status is deserving of a modern vocational college.

TWO STOREY EXTENSION

The VEC's architect, Mr. W. O. Morrissey, said he envisaged a two-storey extension incorporating 14 to 15 classrooms. That, and the upgrading of the present school, would cost between £1m and £1.5m.

Cllr. Austin Flynn said the

people of Dungarvan and surrounding areas had voted with their feet in support of the school by sending their children there in record numbers, while Cllr. Declan Good said Dungarvan is just as entitled to an ultra-modern vocational colleges as many towns in Co. Cork.

The chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, said they must endeavour to build on the success of the school. "We cannot go on for another two or more years without a positive response from the Department.

Finally, it was unanimously agreed to accept an invitation from the Department to send a deputation from the VEC and it was also agreed to invite the new Minister for Education in the next Government to visit the Dungarvan college and see the inadequacy of the facilities first hand.

Cappoquin Artist To Exhibit In Brussels

Best wishes are extended to Cappoquin artist, Arthur Maderson, who has a major one-man exhibition opening in Brussels on Thursday, November 26. The show will be officially opened by the Irish Ambassador to Belgium, Mr. Gearoid O Clerigh.

Many of Arthur's recent

paintings are based on studies of bathers at Lismore River Pool. The exhibition is organised by the George Gallery, Dublin, who have held two sold-out shows by this artist in the past eighteen months. There will be over 70 paintings on show ranging in price from £500 to £5,000.

Dark, Rich And Tasty



FLAVOURED with tea and sweetened with honey and fruit, this bread is dark and rich. Stored in an airtight tin it will stay moist for three weeks.

FRUITY TEA BREAD

Ingredients:

- 8 oz. (200g) mixed fruit
- 1/4 pt. (150ml) prepared tea
- 4 oz. (100g) clear honey
- 1 egg beaten
- 8 oz. (200g) self raising flour
- salt
- 1 oz. (25g) butter, melted
- Topping
- 1/4 oz. (10g) walnuts, chopped
- 1/4 oz. (10g) unrefined sugar

Method:

Put fruit, tea and honey in bowl. Cover, leave overnight to allow fruit to swell and absorb tea flavour.



Stir in beaten egg, sifted flour, salt and melted butter.

Transfer to a greased 1 lb. bread tin and bake at 350°F., 180° C., gas mark 4 for approximately 50 mins.

Take out of oven, brush bread with honey, sprinkle sugar and walnuts on top. Trickle more honey over nuts and sugar. Return bread to oven and bake for about 20 mins. more. Cool.

Attendances And Gate Receipts

The gate receipts for the senior hurling county final between Mount Sion and Ballygunner at Dungarvan on last Saturday week were £6,100 which at £4 represents a paying attendance of around 1,500 or about 2,000 when pensioners, etc., etc. are taken into consideration. This by any standards is small for a county final, more particularly a hurling final in a year in which tens of thousands of Waterford people followed our successful teams all over the place. I was asked how the attendance compared with finals in other years and having done a little research I found that it appeared to be well done.

Going back five years to 1987 when Ballyduff (0-10) and Roanmore (2-4) played a draw at Walsh Park the gate receipts were £10,565 and in the replay (Ballyduff 4-7, Roanmore 2-11) the receipts were £7,477, making a total of £18,000 for that year. With admission prices much lower back in 1987 the attendance for the draw was over 5,000.

Going back exactly ten years to 1982 when Ballyduff won their first ever senior hurling title by beating

Dunhill 0-20 to 1-11 at Dungarvan, the gate receipts on the day were £6,024 at a much lower entry charge. So the answer is that attendances have gone down considerably.

What is interesting is that the receipts at Walsh Park for the Lismore v. Mount Sion county final last year, were very similar to what was taken here at Dungarvan last week. Last year's figure was £6,393.

This year the final was played in wintertime and on a Saturday and the match was between two city teams at a venue involving a 60 mile round trip for supporters, so in the circumstances it is reasonable to suppose that if this year's final was played on the second Sunday in September at Walsh park, the attendance might have been much bigger.

Whatever the causes or the factors involved, we must be getting the message that Saturday is out for important games as it becomes impossible for very many of our regular patrons (farmers and workers, etc., etc.) to attend. Then again this is part of the price we have to pay for success.

Paul Flynn's Achievement

The honours gained by the young Ballygunner star this year must surely be a record for this county. As well as winning a Munster minor hurling and All-Ireland runners-up medal, Paul Flynn won a Munster and All-Ireland under-21 medal. He has since added county championship medals in senior and minor grades. He also won the Park Hotel Player of the Month Award this year. Some record for an eighteen year old!

NATIONAL HURLING LEAGUE

Thriller Ends All Square At Fraher Field

WATERFORD 1-12 CORK 2-9

For the second time and in our second game in the National Hurling League, Waterford came away with a share of the points, this time against Munster champions and All-Ireland finalists, Cork, after a thrilling and thoroughly enjoyable game which was watched by a good crowd (gate £3,330) at Dungarvan on Sunday last.

Heavy overnight rain and bad weather leading up to the week-end made conditions miserable for the players who deserve the highest commendation and praise for the manner in which they coped after adapting themselves to the wet and heavy underfoot conditions.

Both sides showed a couple of changes from the programme. Waterford brought on Liam O'Connor and Noel Dalton to replace the unavailable Jimmy Beresford and John Meaney.

In the end of this thriller a draw might have been seen to be a fair result, but it would be wrong to blame Waterford supporters for complaining about referee Terence Murray's handling of the match and his failure to award justifiable frees to Waterford twice in the closing minutes when the scores were level and Waterford forwards were openly fouled. Supporters became very agitated and didn't hesitate to express their feelings afterwards.

Other talking points after the game were Waterford's defensive lapses in the 8th and 9th minutes which allowed Cork forwards in for two goals and Cork's failure to score from play for the final 40 minutes (almost 63 minutes were played).

THE PLAY

Cathal Casey pointed for Cork in the 3rd minute but a Waterford attack from the puck-out resulted in Sean Daly bursting through the Cork defence and rattling the net to put Waterford in front. John Corcoran and Paul Prendergast exchanged points in the 5th and 6th minutes before the first free of the game was awarded and Sean McCarthy sent over for Cork. The first wide of the game came in the 7th minute and a minute later Cork's ace marksman,

Teddy McCarthy, playing at full-forward, found himself all alone on the edge of the square when the ball was delivered to him and he sent to the net to make it 1-3 to 1-1 in the 8th minute. The members of the press were recording the score when a second Cork goal went in, this time it resulting from a bad puck-out after the first goal. This time substitute Paul Callaghan was the scorer. In the 10th minute Teddy McCarthy made it 2-4 to 1-1 and Cork were firing on all cylinders and attempting to build a good lead while they had the assistance of the wind. Sean and Teddy McCarthy added points before Waterford had their third score and this was a point by Liam O'Connor from a pass by Noel Dalton. Then in the 22nd minute John Corcoran shot over a delightful Cork point, that amazingly was to be the final score from play for the Munster champions. Barry Egan pointed a free to make it 2-8 for Cork and we brought one back when Billy O'Sullivan sent over in the 24th minute to leave us with 1-3 and that was the half time score.

BELONGED TO WATERFORD

The extent to which the second half belonged to Waterford is illustrated by the fact that over the 32 minutes and 9 seconds we scored nine times as against Cork's solitary pointed free in the 49th minute.

Two minutes into this half, Billy O'Sullivan laid it on for Tom Fives who made no mistake with his delivery to narrow the gap down to a double score situation (2-8 to 1-4). Cork mounted several dangerous attacks but an unyielding defence in which Dathai Foran, newcomer Pat

Walsh, Fergal Hartley and Damien Byrne were all dominant, kept their forwards at bay. A great run by Foran in the 37th minute got the ball to Sean Daly who added a point. In the 38th minute Waterford had their first wide of the game but minutes later Liam O'Connor made no mistake in sending over to reduce the leeway to five points. In the 45th and 46th minutes midfielders Fives and Brenner each added a point to leave the situation 2-8 to 1-8 and Cork without a score for 24 minutes.

'Chuck' O'Connor narrowed the gap still further with a 47th minute point before Cathal Casey pointed a Cork free to give them their only score of this half and their last one of the game. Another free was sent wide by Casey, but Cork continued to attack. In the 52nd minute Johnnie Brenner pointed and five minutes went by before Billy Sullivan brought the scoring difference to a single point and the difference was wiped out in the 59th minute when Brenner made no mistake with a close free. Cork made one final sortie into Waterford territory in a brave effort to snatch a winning score, but it was Waterford who were unlucky in the end when obvious frees were not given as the visiting defenders tried desperately to restrain our forwards.

Taking into consideration the awful conditions, the standard was good and the performance of the six members of the Under-21 team was most encouraging.

County Board Meeting

CHAMPIONSHIPS 1993

With the county convention in the offing and motions, etc. being prepared for submission, the matter of the championship systems will be a talking point over the next several weeks. It was a big talking point last year when the special committee headed by Timmy O'Keeffe prepared a very comprehensive document which outlined a new system of knockout championships with a proper league included, but after a number of meetings the proposals were not accepted. Now, following a year filled with problems because of postponements, re-fixtures, cancellations and other obstacles we find many clubs disgruntled about the very late finish to the championships and having to play in poor weather, etc. and because of all this, it would appear that the chances of a change in the system are good and that the possibility of the introduction of the knockout system is increased. It now seems as if enough clubs are prepared to support the formula proposed by the Lismore club last year (for the senior championships) and with all clubs being guaranteed a number of games, this system might be accepted for the coming year.

It is a matter for County Board to decide, but support at convention would be a big help.

MORE TEAMS

On the suggestion of county secretary Seamus Grant, there will be no relegation of senior teams next year. Dunhill, De La Salle and St. Saviours who are due to play to avoid relegation, suddenly find themselves free from the threat of demotion and qualified to remain in senior grade again next

year (only one team would have been regraded). Likewise, Sliabh gCua, who were due to go down to intermediate ranks, will be up for another year, at least. The decision by the County Board was unanimous.

This will mean that fourteen teams in hurling and fifteen in football will set out in search of a title next year.

Colligan will be the newcomers to the hurling competition and Affane or Portlaw will go up in football.

COUNTY CONVENTION

By decision of County Board last week, the date for the annual convention will revert to January. Last year following a Clashmore motion, the convention was held in December. It was decided on a vote to hold the meeting in Clonea as part of the rotation arrangement agreed last year. Next year it will be held in the Park Hotel.

Fraher Field Vandalised

For the second time within months, the Fraher Field has been vandalised, only on this occasion the damage has been more serious.

On Friday night last after the grounds had been vacated by the county senior footballers, who had been training, the boiler-room door was smashed open and the copper cylinder was cut away and removed, leaving considerable damage to the plumbing system. This put the showers out of action and unusable and for the National League game on Sunday, Cork had to 'shower' at Lawlor's Hotel and Waterford went to the Abbeyside grounds. Apart from the considerable expense involved there was great inconvenience caused by those good-for-nothing-bums who continue to give the area a very bad name.

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
