Ballinacourty Golf ourse Purchased By Business

The picturesque seaside 9hole golf course at Ballina-courty which has been the home and headquarters of Dungarvan Golf Club for more than 50 years has been purchased by Mr. John McGrath, popular Dungarvan businessman who is principal of Waterford Joinery Ltd. and who with his wife Ann is owner of Clonea Strand Hotel and Leisure Complex and Gold Coast Holidays Ltd., Ballinacourty.

The purchase price is stated to be £290,000 and the contract of sale for the 43.5 acre property which was signed last week with a deposit of 10 p.c. as down payment, provides for the Golf Club to vacate the property by next August.

However, the Dungarvan Golf Club expect to move to their new 18 hole, 6,716 yards par 72 Championship course in June, all going well. The new course, architecturally designed with seven lakes and man made hazards strategically placed to test all level of golfers is located at Knocknagranagh on the outskirts of the town. Set against the backdrop of the Comeragh Mountains it runs adjacent to Dungarvan Bay and has a magnificent Club House which overlooks the 18th green and where full bar and dining facilities will be available daily.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question — A recent Know Your Rights column explained how to change your name by Deed Poll. This prompts me to ask if a single mother can change her children's name at the same time as she changes her own surname?

Answer — Yes. It is possible for a parent to change their children's surname at the same time as they are changing their own name. There is a special form for doing this for parent plus child.

Normally, the father's consent is required if the child is aged under 18 years. However, in the case of a single mother, the father's consent is not required unless he has been appointed guardian by the court.

We explained the procedure for making a Deed Poll in our previous Know You Rights column. If you are calling in person to the Deed Poll Section in the Four Courts they will give you the necessary forms for your particular circumstances. However, if somebody else is collecting the forms for you, they should state that you wish to change your children's name as well as your own, the age of the children and whether the father has been appointed a guardian.

Adults over 18 years, Child
under 14, Child between 14
and 18, Parent plus child
under 14, Consent of Father
(or mother if father executes
deed), Affidavit or Declaration of Attesting Witness (to
be signed by Commissioner
for Oaths or Peace Commissioner).

HEAVY FINES ON CORK DEFENDANTS AT TALLOW COURT

Two Cork city defendants with the same address were fined a total of £1,565 in their absence by Judge Michael Pattwell at Tallow District Court last Friday.


Eleanor O'Gorman and Derry Carey, both with an address at 60 Corrib Lawn, Mayfield, failed to appear on charges relating to the uninsured driving of a car on July 24 last.

Ms. O'Gorman, the car owner, was fined £500 with an endorsement for allowing it to be driven by an uninsured person (Carey) on the occasion. She was also fined £200 for not having the vehicle taxed and £100 for not having the tax displayed.

Carey was fined a total of £765 and was also disqualified from driving for one month.

For uninsured driving, he was fined £500 with an endorsement, while a fine of £150 was imposed for not having stop lamps. This conviction was also endorsed and Carey was banned from driving for one month.

Additional fines of £30 and £35 were imposed on Carey for not having a current driving licence and for not wearing a seat belt.

THE BURGERY AMBUSH



Last week we outlined how the car sped to Dungarvan for reinforcements. Meanwhile Captain Thomas, Sergeant Hickey and the two soldiers began firing into the darkness and while proceeding to the scene of the ambush, a number of Republican soldiers armed with rifles jumped over the fence and shouted "hands up." Captain Thomas ran over the fence as well as the others but they were followed by the attacking party and placed under arrest. Captain Thomas had a Colt .455 automatic pistol, while Sergeant Hickey was also fully armed. The Republican soldiers took them up the road and placed Captain Thomas in the house of Mr. Barr (Hughie Barr a Protestant - now Mary Mansfield's house) and the soldiers were imprisoned in the house of Mr. Kennedy. (This house stood at the side of the boreen that exists next to the entrance of the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty G.A.A. Grounds). Sergeant Hickey was taken away by others up the boreen to Knockateemore and was never afterwards seen alive. Captain Thomas was held a prisoner but suffered no further injury.

THE AMBUSHED PARTY

The soldiers made away over the fields. It is not known if there were casualties but afterwards it was stated that there were coffins seen at Waterford being brought to England. The ambushed lorry was set on fire and portion of it was burned. The reinforcements came out

from Dungarvan and in the confusion that prevailed Captain Thomas and the soldiers who were prisoners escaped. They then proceeded to where the lorry was disabled and remained there for some time. Soldiers were stationed at the Burgery. The Marines from Ballinacourty came along and they placed themselves at every vantage point. Some of them mounted the roof of Mr. Barr's house and poured volley after volley into the darkness. Many other houses in the locality bore bullet marks that were seen on the following day. In the early morning, as Mrs. Keating was milking her cow in an out-house visible from the road, the cow was shot dead with a rifle bullet. One bullet pierced Mr. Fives' (Pat Fives who was Michael Fives father and so Greg Fives grandfather) window but no one was hit.

POLICEMAN KILLED

As day broke the soldiers commandeered a horse belonging to Mrs. Morrissey to draw in the disabled lorry, to which they yoked the animal and accompanied by soldiers, the lorry was drawn up the hill on the road to Dungarvan. When they reached the gate of the field (in picture) which is a "short cut" to Lacken the auxiliary policeman (foreign policeman in the service of a nation at war) was shot dead. (More next week).

EDNSMAN DARES FOIL. BOTH OF STRONG CHAIN

Flat Rate Of Expenses Proposed For Councillors

A flat rate of expenses for members of Local Authorities, County, Borough and Urban Councils and Town Commissioners is proposed by the Minister for the Environment in a discussion document which has just been issued.

The document proposes that County councillors be paid a set fee every month based on the number of meetings they attend and the distance they live from the venue where council meetings are held.

At present, Councillors submit a separate expenses account for each meeting they attend, to cover the mileage travelled and the approved subsistence allowance. On this basis a rural councillor who has to travel a round journey of 50 miles to a meeting can claim £50.50 for it: made up of 50 miles at 72p a mile plus the subsistence allowance of £13.50. In the case of members living within 4 miles of the Local Authority HQ, an allowance of £20 is made in lieu of mileage for attending a meeting. Under the new proposals there will be a set monthly payment which in addition to travel and subsistence will include an allowance for postage and telephone calls, something for which all councillors have long been looking for. The monthly payment will be calculated on a yearly basis and paid out monthly. The proposals also set out

different rate bands regarding the number of meetings which may be held each year. It is thought that this is directed at the holding of an unnecessary number of meetings and so reduce the spiraling local authority administration costs.

ministration costs.

Waterford County Council has been placed in Band A of the new proposals which permits the holding of 20 meetings per year. As an example of the calculation of the annual allowance for a member of the Council under the new system who lives 20 miles from the meeting venue the following is method: Travel - 20 x 2 x 0.7583p x 20 = £607; Subsistence £12.50 x 20 = £250; Telephone and postage £200; Miscellaneous expenses £300. Total £1,357.

The "miscellaneous" allowance is to cover travel and other costs which arise from councillors' representational role which may include attendance at local functions and other similar events.

In the case of members living within 10 miles of the local authority headquarters, the full 10 mile rate will apply in all cases for the purpose of the travel element of the calculations. This puts the travel allowance at £303 with other items the same as set out above, making the total in this case £1,053 for the year.

Under the new proposals members of Urban Councils

and Town Commissioners would be paid on the basis of a graduated scale of flat rate allowances for different groupings of authorities. In the case of Dungarvan Urban Council, the annual allowance per Councillor will be £500 (this includes the "miscellaneous" expenses element mentioned as for Co. Councillors) while for all members of Town Commissioners the allowance will be £250 a year.

The matter has already been discussed in preliminary fashion by the County Councils General Council, by the Local Authority Members Association and the Municipal Authorities Association but while no firm decisions have so far been taken on the proposals, no great welcome would appear to be in store for them either.

The proposals were briefly discussed at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday but it was decided to await the decisions of General Council, LAMA and IAMA on them. However, Cllr. Pat Coffey who is the council's representative on the General Council said that a snag which he saw in the new proposals was that a member would be paid the monthly allowance without even attending a meeting* which is something which cannot be done under the existing regulations.

Family Law Courts

At its Annual General Meeting held last month, the Courts Branch of the Public Service Executive Union condemned the lack of facilities provided by the State for Family Law Courts

The vast majority of District Courts do not have separate sittings for hearing Family Law cases and only approximately half of the Circuit Courts have. This means that members of the public who are unfortunate enough to be involved in Family Law cases have to put up with a most embarrassing lack of privacy. Family Law is a distressing enough matter without the added burden for litigants of having to transact their business in such public circumstances.

And as we have pointed out ourselves in this column when dealing with this matter in the past, the position where District Courts are concerned is that Family Law cases are dealt with first by the Judge in his chambers which means that the main business of the court sittings, together with the members of the legal profession, gardai and witnesses involved have to wait until all the Family Law cases have first been dealt with. At least that was the procedure in the past and was one that often held up court sittings for hours.

Where Circuit Court sittings are concerned, the Family Law cases are listed together, usually to be dealt with on a half-day usually set aside for the purpose in the course of the period of the sittings.

The Courts Branch of the

Public Service Executive Union which represents the Clerks and Registrars in the District and Circuit Courts also condemned the poor accommodation available for Family Law hearings at its AGM. On the District Court side, two-thirds of the venues do not have separate waiting rooms or consultation rooms. Indeed twenty counties still have hearings. in Courtrooms despite the fact that the 1989 Family Law Reform Act stipulated that Family Law Courts should be held in buildings other than Courthouses, because of the delicate nature of the business involved.

However, the Union noted that the Department of Justice was anxious to make

the hearing of Family Law cases easier and less formal for the couples affected but was constrained by the absence of funding for staff and accommodation. In the circumstances the Union has called on the Government to make available the necessary funds for additional judges, additional court clerks and new accommodation so that separate sittings could be held in all District and Circuit Courts and decent accommodation could be provided with proper waiting and consultation room facili-

We endorse this call as we feel that the facilities and changes sought are long

Home Sweet Home

Our choice for the ballad corner this week "Home Sweet Home" is one which has long been a favourite especially by those of the older generation. But while the song may be well known, not so much is known of the man who wrote it.

"Home Sweet Home" was written by an American actor, John Howard Payne who did not have a very prosperous life. Born in 1791, he was dogged by misfortune and poverty. Even his famous song did not earn him the money it should have made because it was included in the liberetto of the opera, "Clari or the Maid of Milan," which he had sold for an outright sum.

The song was set to music composed by Sir Henry Bishop for a poem by

Thomas Haynes Bagly. "Home Sweet Home" was first published in 1823 and is said to have sold 100,000 copies that year.

John Howard Payne lived in England for some years and fell in love with Mary Shelley widow of the poet, Percy Bysshe Shelley who died in 1822, but she turned him down. He later joined the foreign service and acted as American Consul in Tunis for a number of years.

Here then are the words of the world famous song:

'Mid pleasures and palaces though we may roam Be it ever so humble, there's no place like home; The charm from the sky seems to hallow us there, Which, seek through the world, is ne'er met with elsewhere.

Home, home, sweet, sweet home! There's no place like home, there's no place like home!

An exile from home, splendour dazzles in vain;
O, give me my lowly thatched cottage again!



Co. Council Call For Fair Share Of New Housing Starts

A progress report on housing submitted to the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday showed that 2 houses had been completed in the county during the month of December while for the entire year of 1992 a total of 15 houses had been built. The report stated that further houses were under construction at Dunmore East (4), Ballinagoul (2), Tallow (2) and Ardmore (3). In all cases progress was stated to be satisfactory.

Cllr. Oliver Coffey stated that there had been a great deal of publicity recently that there would be 3,500 new houses started throughout the country during the coming year and he thought that they in Co. Waterford should make sure that they got a fair share of this number. He recalled that at one time in the past Waterford Co. Council were building 50 houses per year and he felt that a move should now be made to ensure that they get a fair share of the 3,500 which it was stated were to be built this year.

Cllr. C. O Riain supported the call made by Cllr. Coffey. He pointed out that house building in the county was almost at a standstill at present. "I look forward to great things from our new government and we should certainly now look for our fair share where these housing schemes are concerned,"

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager said that if the figure for housing starts mentioned was realised then he certainly believed that Waterford Co. Council should get a substantial allocation. He said that he would prepare an up-to-date report as to the housing needs in the county and when the new Minister for the Environment was appointed he said he would be making a submission to him on the matter by the end of the week.

Hoe, hoe hoe if you want better vegetables

WHILE some gardeners cannot be blamed for staying indoors during January, the vegetable gardener has fewer excuses.

For a start it is worth hoeing between the rows to break up soil after flattening by teeming winter

Once the surface is broken the soil will then quickly regain its drainage and condition as the wind and frost crumble the texture further, but be ready to wield the hoe again before the season is out. Members of the cabbage family particularly like such human support for their brave resistance to the winter weather. Some of the family, such as broccoli and sprouts are particularly prone to being loosened by strong

Tread carefully but firmly around the base of the stem and be ready to drive in separate support if necessary.

You may also need to guard against marauding pigeons and other birds by covering the crop with plastic netting as a deter-

Apart from that you

should find 'greens' are easily cultivated and rewarding crops because they:

- like the Irish climate
- will grow almost anywhere providing the soil is boosted by mixing in well-rooted compost or manure
- can withstand severe frost
- are some of the healthiest vegetables the gardener can grow
- can be grown all year. depending on the variety. Brussels sprouts are particularly popular and useful since you can be planting and harvesting now if you choose varieties carefully. Though they are biennial, plant afresh every year for a good harvest. Plant in a sheltered posi-

stem regularly. Luckily, there has been a move from top heavy varieties to compact types producing tastier and more easily frozen sprouts.

These plants mature from the bottom up but as you pick the last sprouts, don't discard the leafy tops — they cook up and taste just as good



as cabbage.

- * summer and autumn types maturing from June-September. SHRIMP A LA MIKROLIMANO

This tasty dish is great served with rice. Ingredients:

1 carrot, finely chopped

1 small onion finely chopped 1 small green pepper, seeded and finely

chopped 4 stalks celery with leaves, finely chopped 1 tbsp butter

11/2 lbs (700g) shrimp, peeled and deveined 1/3 cup white wine 3 medium tomatoes, peeled and seeded, or large can whole

tomatoes 1 tsp oregano salt and pepper to taste 6oz (175g) feta cheese,

crumbled 4oz (110g) Parmesan cheese, grated

Method:

In a medium-size saucepan, sauté carrot, onion, green pepper and celery in 1/2 tbsp of butter until the onion is golden. Remove vegetables from pan, in same pan, melt remaining butter. When butter bubbles, add whole shrimp, stirring for two to three minutes. Add wine and cook on medium heat. Return vegetables to pan. Add tomatoes, oregano, salt and pepper. A leading U.K. medical expert has warned that anti-depressant drugs can affect drivers safety - in some cases even more than illegal levels of alcohol. Professor Ian Hindmarch of Surrey University has stated that results from blood tests show that psychoactive medicines are implicated in

In a recent paper presented at an international conference in Nice, on the Social Aspects of Treating Depression" he showed that tiredness is a principal cause of many road accidents. Sleepiness, he stated caused 27% of motorway accidents in the U.K. resulting in 83% of fatalities. Some anti-depressants he found, produced impairment of brake reaction time which can be greater than that associated with illegal levels of alcohol.



Conradh Na Gaeilge's Centenary Year

1993, Bliain na Gaeilge, is the Centenary Year of the Gaelic League, Conradh na Gaeilge, founded by Eoin MacNeill, Douglas Hyde, J. H. Lloyd and others to gain status for the beleaguered Irish language. For hundreds of years, Irish was outlawed, suppressed, insulted, ignored and those who spoke it punished and derided. The Gaelic League turned the tide.

New Year's Day saw the start of twelve months celebrations and commemorations in each of the 32 counties, as well as in the United States, England, Canada, France, Scotland, Wales and Australia.

Conradh na Gaeilge changed Ireland. It came into being with its gospel of hope just as many Irish people had lost faith in the political process. This was immediately after the fall of Parnell, the split in the Irish Parliamentary Party and the bitterness and social divisions which came in its wake.

Part of its strength from the start was that it concentrated all of its efforts on the cultural objective of gaining a place in the sun for Irish and totally avoided party politics and sectarian divisions. Conradh members could and did involve themselves in all sorts of other public activities, but not as members of the Gaelic League.

More than any other movement in Ireland, Conradh na Gaeilge from the beginning welcomed Catholics and Protestants, women and men, poorer people and better off people, country people and city people as absolute equals. Democracy held sway in

na Gaeilge Conradh throughout its first hundred years and this is hardly likely to change. As far as can be gauged, Conradh na Gaeilge was the first country-wide organisation in which women had equality with men. Nowadays, that may not seem to be as progressive as it in fact was. 1893 was long before women's liberation.

The Conradh met with many obstacles over the years, perhaps as many after independence as during the period of British direct rule. Not alone was Irish barred from all school houses but the language lacked legal existence under British law. Very few books were available in Irish in 1893. Political, cultural and religious work was all carried out in English only. The very idea of doing otherwise would have been thought odd by most people.

Yet, by example, organisation and tireless endeavour, Conradh na Gaeilge people placed the restoration of Irish on the national agenda and persuaded doubters that jective.

I have little doubt but that the Irish language might have faded away for all practical purposes were it not for the vision of Mac-Neill and Hyde and those who followed in their footsteps.

It is thanks to people such as Eoin MacNeill, Father Michael O'Hickey, the Rev. Maxwell Close, Peadar O hAnnracháin, Colm O Gaora, Neilí Ní Bhriain, Séamus O hEocha, Michael Collins, Fionán Mac Colum, members and supporters. It

A gentle cultural revolution which is still in train was initiated and conducted by Conradh na Gaeilge. It found echoes all over Ireland. The fact that Irish is now casually accepted as a normal part of life is due to the zeal of Conradh mem-bers, great and small, old and young.

More than one million people throughout the island now claim knowledge of Irish. Others who do not their children should master it. Language classes for adults are in constant demand. Thousands of books on all sorts of subjects are available in Irish. Raidió na Gaeltachta is listened to in all parts of the island.

As BliaIn na Gaeilge, 1993, approaches, Conradh na Gaeilge has branches and individual members in all counties and in some foreign lands. It is a voluntary non-Government organisation controlled and run by its

faces its second century with confidence in the sure knowledge that the Irish language is now on a firm footing and is generally accepted as the most precious and most Irish of our characteristics.

With Irish we are equal to other nations and peoples in possessing the most definite of all badges of nationality - our own language.

1993 SPRING ROAD RACING

SERIES This week we have details of the club's 1993 Spring Road Racing series for local runners which is being held in conjunction with a number of races being staged between now and Easter. The series is being generously sponsored by Michael Roche Carpets, Wolfe Tone Road and it will cater for every age and ability and at the same time it will provide keen competition for all local speedsters with overall winners being announced at the end of the series.

The sponsorship by Michael Roche, who, himself, will be a participant in the series, ensures great prizes for the winners in each of the five age groups plus a series memento for all runners who finish the programme of races. Not only will the series provide many exciting clashes but it will for once and for all categorise many of our ageing athletes!

The series is comprised of four races, the Kiely Monumental Colligan Cup, the Dungarvan Crystal Sports and Leisure Centre 10k, the Ballycotton '10' and the Athletic Club's 10k on Palm Sunday. These Spring races take place in each of the first four months of the year.

The five age groups are under 30 (born 1963-1976), under 35 (born 1958-1962), under 40 (born 1953-1957), under 45 (born 1948-1952), and over 45 (born 1947-1900). Each competitor's total time after the four races will decide their finishing position. Entry fee to the series is £2 and entries will be taken at the Colligan Cup or by any committee member. The series is being run with the co-operation of the organisers of the Dungarvan Crystal 10k and the Ballycotton Running Promotions.

The Colligan Wood Shield is a fun running event for boys and girls under 11 to under 15 years (on January 1, 1993). This event will be held in Colligan Wood at 10.30 a.m. on Sunday, January 24 and it consists of a 2km. run (11/4 miles approx.) over the Wooden Bridge - Stone Bridge circuit. Each runner predicts his/her own finishing time and the shield will be awarded to the runner who finishes nearest to that time without running faster than it. For example, if you say you will finish in 11 mins. and 10 secs: and you finish in 11 mins, and 2 secs., you have run too fast and you will be disqualified. If you finish in 11 mins. and 20 sees, you would have a very good chance. These are only made up times, used as an example.

Alan Moore won last year's event when he predicted 9 mins, 30 secs, and he ran 9 mins, and 37 secs. The use of a watch is not allowed. Entry fee is £1 and there will be prizes for the first five finishers nearest to their time. Come along and enjoy the fun.

COLLIGAN CUP

The mind boggles when one realises that last year 28 runners finished the five mile course within a minute of their predicted time. This statistic shows just what it will take to win this much sought after piece of silverware. Consistent close callers every year include Paul Keating, Liam Moore, Michael Hennessy, Gerry Cantwell, Eamonn Martin, John Joe Wright, Liz Bullen, Liam Rossiter and Jason Radley.

Perhaps the 1993 winner of the Kiely Monumental Colligan Cup is included here and all of them are now being installed as favourites to take the honours. With the race a little more than a week away the traffic around Dungarvan is at its highest point but there still remains a few dark horses unwilling to show them-

selves until the big day.

Mentors should be fully aware of their responsibilities not only to reprimand and discipline players guilty of breaches of discipline, but also to set good example themselves.

The number of breaches of good conduct during the year under review were virtually non existent. However, some incidents did take place that necessitated action and while these were few and far between, the fact that they took place at all should be a good reason for greater vigilance and attention in the fu-

"In presentation however, we leave a great deal to be desired. How many times have we witnessed players and through them, club officials showing scant regard for uniformity of attire. Even at Divisional and County final level this old bug bear manifested itself

and clubs must be fully prepared to eradicate this problem totally from our midst. A further reminder in relation to punctuality whether it be getting our games or meetings under way at the appointed time would not be out of place. By our attention to such matters we are improving our image and winning the admiration and respect of all."

REFEREES

With regard to referee's the report states - "I reported to Convention last year that in my opinion a near crisis situation had been reached in regard to referees. Little has happened in the meantime to make me alter this opinion with the exception perhaps of the efforts of the Referees Association within the County. Sadly, to relate their efforts within the Division to recruit and improve standards were largely ig-nored by the clubs. No longer can we expect to be served by a mere handful of the most dedicated officials one is likely to find anywhere in the land. What is not appreciated by most people is that many, if not all of our referees are activelý involved in some way with their clubs and their availability is determined by the clubs programme on any given day. I wish to express my appreciation to all the referees who have worked so unselfishly in the Boards interest during the year."

SOCIAL AND PLAYING **ACTIVITIES**

On the social scene Mr. Walsh says Scor again provided a real important outlet for many clubs both at adult and underage level and the efficient manner those behind the scenes worked for its continued success once more deserved and warranted the highest Boards commendations. Clubs still hesitant about participation should, he said, put Scor as one of their priorities during the coming year.

ELECTIONS

Unfortunately we are no wiser now than when I referred to the same subject last week.

I do know the election of a new chairman to replace Jimmy O'Gorman will resolve itself into a battle between Ollie Wilkinson who has filled this post for eight of the past nine years and Tom Cunningham, Stradbally, who is seeking a change from the position of County Board Representative, which he presently holds. Whichever one takes the job will have a hard act to follow in keeping up the high standard set by Jimmy O'-Gorman, who is standing down to contest the Munster Council Representative position vacated by Greg Fives. Jimmy was a very popular official who dealt fairly and honourably with all people and all situations and certainly gave the job, his all.

The election of a vicechairman is also arousing considerable interest throughout the division and there are four members in the race so far. Paddy Walsh, who was a County Board Representative for many years, Billy Walsh, who is Fourmilewater's representative on the County Board and Tom Cunningham of Stradbally, who is a present Board representative on the County Board. Tom's intentions are not known as he is nominated for three posts and if he does not make it to the chair, the expectations are that he may decide to stay on as a rep., but this, at the moment, is mere speculation.

Ollie Wilkinson is the holder of the office and the fact that everyone seems so sure that there is going to be a contest, is probably indicative of popular opinion about the outcome of the election for the chair.

TREASURER

As already announced, James Walsh has announced his retirement from the position of divisional treasurer because of the amount of work involved at County Board level. Three are nominated, but it is expected that there may not be a contest and that Tony Morrissey, Geraldines Club will take over. Tony has been involved in gate-management at Fraher Field and elsewhere during the past couple of seasons and has the experience needed.

OTHER **POSITIONS**

The outgoing runai, Anthony Walsh and registrar, Seamus O'Brien, are not being opposed and there are no rumours that Denis Mc-Grath, who is nominated, will oppose Nicky O'DOnovan for the position of assistant secretary.

FINANCE

The financial report, while it shows the Board to be in a very healthy state with a halance of over £5,000, points out that the loss to the Board over the year was £1,580 which was due to smaller gate receipts.

In 1991 the Western Board had gate receipts of £9,187 and this year the figure (1992) is £8,656. The difference is almost insignificant but when it is seen that this Board has to pay over £1,843 share of gates to County Board we see a sizable drop of revenue from our only source of income. Because of reorganised schedule of matches (made necessary because of the success of our county underage teams) the Divisional Board has no option but. to play some attractive games almost in competition with attractive County Board fixtures at other venues not far away.

The bulk of the gate receipts were taken at Fraher Field (almost £4,000) and at Cappoquin with receipts of £3.172 — the biggest gate

of the season £640 was - Walsh has expressed his taken for the Ballysaggart versus Kilrossanty junior hurling final at Cappoquin.

The total income of the Board for the year under review is £33,441 as against £29, 074 for the previous year.

The very well tabulated statement of accounts shows there is little difference in the other comparative figures shown on the sheet.



Council Reguest To Restore Ballyduff Banking Service

The withdrawal by Allied Irish Banks of their oneday banking service from the West Waterford village of Ballyduff Upper was referred to at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday when a request was unanimously made to the Bank to restore the service.

The matter was raised by Cllr. J. Quirke who stated that the Chairman of Ballyduff Community Council had already raised the mat-

ter publicly.

Cllr. Quirke said that for the past 60 years the Bank provided the service in Ballyduff on one day each week. The business was carried on first from a shop premises which was sold and was then transferred to another outlet but this had then closed.

This closure had given the Bank people the opportunity to walk away from Ballyduff which they did, said Cllr. Quirke. "It is not right that this service should be withdrawn from the people living in Ballyduff and the surrounding area and I hope the Bank will reconsider their decision," he said, adding that if there was any problem about locating a suitable premises, the Community Council

Sighs Of Relief As **Crystal Workers Back Survival Deal**

tance of the £8 million survival plan.

The crucial New York meeting was arranged before Christmas with management facing an ultimatum to push through the rescue package or draw up an alternative strategy to wind down production in Ireland and buy in foreign glass for sale under the Waterford name.

Chairman and Chief Exec-utive, Dr. Paddy Galvin said the workers had now provided the opportunity to again turn the company into a profitable enterprise.

But before Dr. Galvin and Chief Operating Officer Brian Patterson leave for the US next week, they will insist that all seven sections in the three crystal plants have concluded final talks on the "nuts and bolts" of pay cuts and new work practices.

It is seen as essential that the two executives have a clear and unqualified acceptance of the rescue package in their hands to convince the foreign investors that the industry can be put back in the black.

JOB CREATING **PROJECTS**

At the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday both the chairman Cllr. B. Kyne and the Co. Manager Mr. D. Hurley spoke of the relief and happiness which the outcome of the Waterford Crystal votes in Dun-

garvan and Waterford had given them.

Mr. Hurley said that because of the shadow over Waterford Crystal in recent times he had refrained until now from referring to the good and positive things that were happening in the county and the successful industrial projects in which the County Development Team had been involved. These included the Flair Garden manufacturing plant in Tallow which last year created 50 jobs; the new leather industry in Portlaw which would provide 50 to 60 jobs while extensions at Sterling Drug in Dungarvan (30 jobs), Pinewood Laboratories in Ballymacarbry (10 jobs) and Radley Engineering in Dungarvan at least 10 jobs. "I feel it should go out from this meeting that while there have been job losses in the county last year there have also been many new jobs created, said Mr. Hurley.

The Chairman Cllr. Kyne said that the outcome of the Crystal vote was welcomed not only by the workers but also by their families who would now appreciate a reaction from the management. He felt that the outsourcing of jobs should be phased out while he thought that the State through the IDA should make an investment in the

company.
