Council Approves Manager's 1993 Housing Development Plans

In all a total of 260 applicants had applied to be placed on the Council's housing list for 1993 it was revealed in a most comprehensive report on Housing Progress for 1993 prepared by the County Manager, Mr. D. Hurley and submitted to the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night.

The report dealt with all aspects of housing development proposed for the urban area in the coming year.

Four new houses being built at Spring Marquis are expected to be ready for letting about March. Work is proceeding at a very satisfactory rate on the Cathal

Brugha Refurbishment Scheme and when completed this will release about 10 houses for re-letting.

Mr. Hurley stated that as he anticipated an upturn in the Capital Allocation for housing in the coming years he advised the Council to have the land needed acquired and plans agreed so

that they could get off the mark without any undue delay.

Dealing with Land Acquisition in 1993 the Manager

stated that he has agreed to purchase an area of 2.8 acres at the rear of Dun-abbey at the Spring from the

Waterford Crystal Survival Plan Fully Approved

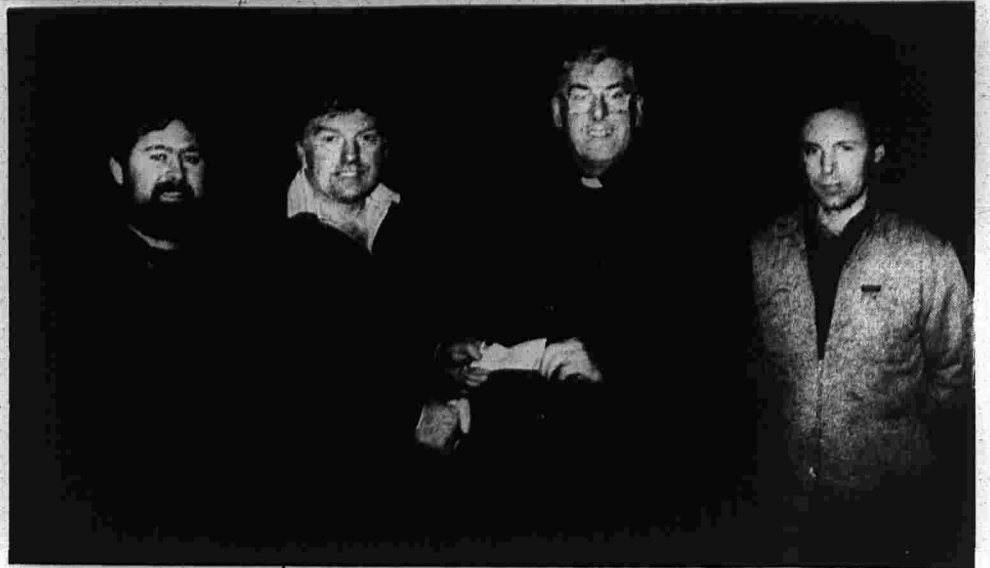
The general workers section of Waterford Crystal who caused consternation last week when a 40-30 vote of the total of 200 workers in the section rejected elements of the survival plan which had earlier been approved by mass meetings of the workforce in the Waterford City and Dungarvan plants, voted overwhelmingly to accept the package at a further meeting of the section held

on Friday last.

As a result the Company's survival plan was again back on the rails and Waterford Crystal Chairman and Chief Executive Dr. Paddy Galvin said he wholeheartedly welcomed the decision as a great outcome for everybody in the company. The plan was simply the best way to "keep Waterford in Waterford" because it set the industry on the road to true competitiveness, he said.

As a gesture of goodwill, management announced that the three crystal factories in Dungarvan and Waterford would re-open for work last Monday — a week earlier than expected after the Christmas shutdown.

The return to work signals the virtual end of almost three years of short-time working in the troubled industry and has been warmly welcomed by everyone.

Meeting To Discuss "Breeding For Quality Milk"

A.I. Services in conjunction with World Wide Sires Inc. will be holding a meeting on "Breeding for Quality Milk in 1993" at the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Tuesday, January 26 at 8 p.m.

Guest speakers will include Dick Fitzgerald BSc., Ph.D., of the National Dairy Products Research Centre, Moorepark. He will be highlighting recent work that suggests cows milk containing the AB and BB Kappa Casein variant improves cheese making properties significantly. Additional evidence has been reported showing that milk containing the BB Kappa Casein variant has better heat stability during the production process of milk powders and UHT milks.

Less than 1% of all dairy bulls transmit this beneficial genetic variant in their protein composition.

Complaints About Unsatisfactory Positioning Of Polling Booths In County

Several members of Waterford Co. Council at the Council's January monthly meeting voiced criticism of the positioning of polling booths in many parts of the county for the recent general election.

Discussion on the subject was initiated when Cllr. R. Walsh proposed a motion that the Council urgently request a meeting with the County Registrar to discuss the completely unsatisfactory positioning of polling booths in recent elections.

Speaking in support of his motion, Cllr. Walsh said that they could not allow the crazy situation, especially as it existed in Abbey-side, to continue. He said that people who had always voted in the polling booths at Abbeyside school were now obliged to pass by the school and go to the Tennis Club pavilion at the Causeway. As a result of this change he was aware that several people did not just bother to vote in the last election.

"We represent the public and we should be in a position to point out what the public want," said Cllr. Walsh who added that there was absolutely no need to shift any of the polling

booths from the school as there was plenty of room there for the six polling booths to service the Abbey-side area. The shifting of some of the booths to the Tennis Club should never have been allowed as it meant people had to cross the busy main road and this was particularly dangerous for the older people. "The whole situation there is very unsatisfactory and needs to be revised," he said.

Cllr. C. O Riain supported the motion and pointed to problems which existed in Kilbrien. "We are the elected representatives and we should have some say where these matters are concerned," he said.

Cllr. Austin Flynn also supported the motion pointing out that the location of the polling booth at the Sports Centre in Dungarvan was very inconvenient for the people who had to go there to vote.

Cllr. Patsy Kenneally referred to the difficulties which existed for people in Ballyduff and Glenbeg in Dungarvan rural area while Cllr. Nora Flynn said that people in Coolagortboy and Melleray were also placed in difficulty when it came to voting. "It is clear that rural Ireland is being overlooked where these matters are concerned and the authorities are forgetting how we live and how we work," she said.

Cllr. B. Kyne, Chairman thought that it should not be impossible to return to the traditional polling booths where Dungarvan and Abbeyside were concerned.

The County Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally pointed out that some of the complaints raised were a matter for the Co. Council to amend its own polling scheme.

Finally it was agreed that Mr. McNally prepare a report on the existing scheme for the Council's next meeting.

Ireland's and Villierstown's John Treacy finished a fine second to the Kenyan Ezequiel Bitok in the Granollers half marathon near Barcelona in Spain last Sunday.

Make Lottery Funds Available For Club Improvements

Cllr. Oliver Coffey proposed a motion at the January monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan that the Council call on the Minister for the Environment to make Lottery funds available to clubs to be carried out.

Cllr. Coffey said that several clubs and organisations had submitted improvement and develop-

ment plans with their applications for funding from the National Lottery in 1990/91. They were first told that such funds would be made available but then this assurance was withdrawn. He now proposed that they call on the Minister to make funds available in 1993.

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. Jimmy Quirke and passed unanimously.

Court Sequel To High Speed Garda Chase In Dungarvan

A 21-year-old itinerant who was arrested by Gardai after a high speed car chase around Dungarvan on the night of January 7 last appeared on remand in custody before Judge Michael Pattwell at Dungarvan District Court last week.

Martin Cawley, no fixed abode faced a total of 14 charges including 7 of dangerous driving, and also of drunk driving, assaulting two garda members, possession of a shovel and knife without reasonable excuse, refusing to give samples of either blood or urine at the Garda Station and causing damage at the Garda Station.

Supt. Ray McAndrew who prosecuted outlined the sequence of events as they occurred on Thursday night, January 7. He said that at 10.25 p.m., Gardai J. Nugent and E. Fitzpatrick saw a car being driven at Youghal Road without lights. They followed the car and a high speed chase with speeds up to 60 m.p.h. around the town ensued.

The Supt. said that the car, driven by Cawley, first turned into Childers Estate without giving any indication and travelled in a zig-zag manner. It turned and faced the Garda car and passed by driving on to the footpath. It then turned in towards the town and continued to be driven in a zig-zag fashion down Mitchel Street

and into Mary Street. At the junction at the Square it passed two cards at the traffic lights on the wrong side and with a handbrake turn, sped off down Main Street in a dangerous manner where a woman had to jump out of the way to save herself.

Supt. McAndrew said that the car then turned up Friary Street, on to Emmet Street and passed the bollard at the junction on the wrong side before again turning down Mary Street where it struck a parked car. "Throughout the entire chase the siren on the Garda car was blaring and the blue light on the roof was flashing," the Supt. said.

The defendant immediately abandoned the car at Mary Street and as the Garda members approached, he ran to the boot of the car and was about to remove a long shovel handle. A violent struggle followed as the Gardai attempted to restrain the defendant who at one point threatened to bite them. At that stage they formed the opinion that Cawley was drunk. They had severe difficulty in getting him into the Patrol car as he persisted in

throwing his feet at the car and then clinging on to the car door. Finally with the help of a civilian passer-by the defendant was forced into the car where he had to be sat on on the way to the Garda Station.

The Supt. then stated that when they arrived at the Garda Station, Cawley had to be forced inside and on being searched was found to be in possession of a Stanley knife. As he was being taken to the cell he head-butted a small pane of glass and injured his head and his face and he also broke another pane of glass. Dr. D. O'Mahony was then called and treated Cawley but when Cawley was asked for a sample of either blood or urine as required in the case of drunk-driving he refused to give either.

Convicting Cawley on all charges, Judge Pattwell sentenced him to one month in prison on each of the dangerous driving charges to run concurrently, with a number of endorsements; in addition he sentenced him to four months for assaulting Garda Fitzpatrick and a further two months for assaulting Garda Nugent, with a further month on each of the charges of drunk driving and refusing to provide blood or urine samples.

OLD OUTSTANDING CHARGE

Earlier Cawley was also arraigned on a charge outstanding since 1991 in reference to which two others involved had already been before the courts.

This concerned the taking of six crates of beer from Keane's Brewery at Friary St., on the night of March 14, '91.

Supt. McAndrew told the court that on the night in question, 3 Gardai suspected that a burglary was to take place at the brewery and surrounded the place and cut off any escape routes. At 1.25 a.m. two of the three involved gave themselves up and the third defendant Martin Cawley was then cornered on the wall of an adjoining garden. He cut his wrist which necessitated his removal to Ardkeen Hospital and subsequently absconded.

Convicting Cawley, Judge Pattwell sentenced him to a month in prison on foot of this charge.

Dungarvan Seminar On Debt Counselling

The group "Money Matters" was established in Dungarvan in early 1992 to provide a community response to the growing problem of door to door money lending in the town and surrounding area. It is a voluntary group whose main aim is to alleviate the problems experienced by those, especially low-income families, who are caught in the trap of moneylenders and often can see no way out.

The group are holding a day long training seminar entitled "Introduction to Debt Counselling Skills" on Saturday, January 30, 1993 (9.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m.) in St. Augustine's College, Duckspool, Dungarvan.

The main purpose of the seminar is to introduce participants to the specific skills needed when helping those who share with us that they are having problems "trying to make ends meet." The emphasis will be on the skills needed when working with low-income families and in particular, those who are experiencing difficulties as a result of borrowing from door to door moneylenders. While aimed primarily at those who are working in a

voluntary capacity, it will also be of relevance to professionals who encounter issues of poverty in their day to day work.

The seminar will deal with attitudes, skills, information and the helping relationship. It will concentrate on practical skills and information rather than social analysis and the learning process will be primarily group work and practical exercises. It is an introductory day to an issue which is very broad, and as such will be limited in what it can achieve.

A COMMUNITY PROBLEM

The seminar will be facilitated by a number of people who are already dealing with the problem in Dungarvan and so in a real way it is a community response to a community problem.

Queries Raised By Deputy Deasy

The following are replies received by Deputy Austin Deasy to matters on which he has made representations recently:

Childers Estate, Dungarvan — Regarding complaints about public lighting at Childers Estate, the Urban Council raised the matter with the ESB from whom they received the following reply: "This Estate suffers a high level of vandalism. The amount of bulb replacement is the highest in the Dungarvan area. We have on hand 31 vibration proof lamp holders which we intend erecting in this Estate in January. Should this vandalism continue we will not replace the bulbs."

Public Lighting At Stradbally And Kilmac — Letters from the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn referring to the need for new public lighting at Chapel Road, Stradbally accepted that while this would be justified on safety grounds, no funds have regrettably been made available in the Council's estimates for the purpose.

A similar reply referred to representations for the provision of additional lights for Kilmacthomas village but the Co. Engineer agreed

that it was desirable that the whole lighting system in Kilmacthomas be replaced and upgraded when funding became available.

Bus Shelter — Bus Eireann replied that it would not at present be possible to allocate a shelter at Moord Cross, Kinsalebeg as there would not be a sufficient number of passengers joining services there to justify it. The matter would, they promised be kept under review.

Fire Station At Tallow — The County Secretary wrote to state that proposals for a new Fire Station at Tallow submitted to the Dept. of the Environment for approval had been returned for amendment. They had been referred to the Council's architect with a request that the documents be amended as quickly as possible.

Library Service — Mr. Donal Brady, County Librarian replying to queries about the service for Kilmacthomas stated that a site for a purpose built branch library has been identified and outline plans prepared which would be submitted to the next scheduled meeting of the Library Committee. However, Mr. Brady added: "In the context of the present financial climate whether this project can be funded by the Council is seriously open to question."

With regard to the situation at Tallow, Mr. Brady said that the library there has been closed since last September when the Branch Librarian, Mrs. Joyce Coady retired. "In the context of the Library Estimate for 1993, it is extremely doubtful that the library can open this year," his letter added.

WINTER VISITORS

In the wetlands at the end of the New Line Road and opposite the Friary College we welcome a colony of Brent Geese who breed in the far north but who migrate to Ireland to escape from the hardships of the winter climate in that part of

the world. The name comes probably from its colour being likened to that caused by burning i.e. BRAND. This species of goose is much smaller than the common goose and in fact is not much larger than a MAL-LARD DUCK. The pale-bel-

lied form (the form occurring in Ireland) is greyish on the belly and flanks. Brent Geese have small white markings on the sides of the neck and the bill is very small. The young have pale edges to some of the feathers on the back. Flocks of Brents call with a low 'gurgling' noise both on the ground and in the air. They feed on eel grass and other marine plants on coastal mudflats, their primary habitat of which the area of Duckspool is a typical example. We sincerely hope that the mudflats in question will remain pollution free and that our visitors from the North continue to frequent this part of Abbey-side each year.

SHELL COTTAGE

When the bus loads of tourists stop at Shell Cottage the visitors are usually attracted to the Pond to view the picturesque harbour. The Burgery Ambush

(continued)

Last week we outlined the details of the ambush as far as daybreak when the lorry was yoked to a horse and towed towards Dungarvan. As they passed the gate of a field where there is a "short cut" to Lacken the auxiliary policeman, REDMAN, who was leading the horse was shot by a Republican Soldier and was mortally wounded.

One of the soldiers reacted quickly — covered John Fitzpatrick (Sean Mac Gearailt), one of the Republican ambushers who was behind the fence and shot him dead. Patrick Keating (Pádraig Céitinn) another of the Republican party rushed out from cover to bring Fitzgerald in, but he was fired at and wounded. He went back, but instantly returned again to the assistance of his fallen comrade, when another shot was fired at him which also took effect. It was only with the greatest effort that he was able to get into the cover of the fence. His companions took him away, carried him in the direction of Knockateemore, where he rested for a while. Ultimately he was housed in a dwelling in the highland that overlooks the valley of the Colligan where he lingered until he died at approximately 5 p.m. on the same day.

When Redman, the auxiliary policeman was wounded Mr. Barr cycled in to town for medical assistance. He called on Dr. Hackett. It was early morning and the doctor answered the call with promptitude. In a few minutes he was ready and cycled with Mr. Barr to the scene of the ambush. The ride was a risky one as bullets were whizzing around but through the ring of fire the doctor reached the wounded man. On examination he found that nothing could be done as Redman was mortally wounded. The auxiliary policeman was then taken in a motor car into Dungarvan, a soldier holding him in his arms. He lived till just before entering the barracks when he expired.

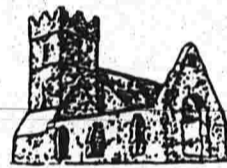

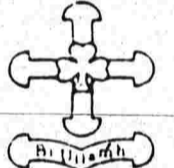

Local Councils Will Not Be Downgraded

In an interview during the week, Minister for the Environment, Michael Smith allayed the fears which have been repeatedly expressed by Local Authority representative associations over the past year when he promised that the proposed Local Government Reform would not result in any downgrading of Urban District Councils or Town Commissions.

He also revealed that elec-

tions to the country's Urban Councils and Town Commissions - expected this summer - were to be deferred until next year, pending the findings of a new Government sub-committee to be appointed by the Minister shortly. The Minister said these elections are now expected to coincide with the European Parliament elections in 1994.

Mr. Smith said that he

will be re-establishing a special sub-committee to discuss the reform of local government now that the new Fianna Fail/Labour Government is in place. "There will be no downgrading of existing local councils but I will be anxious that there is more co-ordination between the bigger and smaller councils", said Minister Smith.

In the course of the interview, the Minister also stat-

ed that he was in favour of giving local councils more control over spending and that the new sub-committee would be looking into this area.

Without doubt Minister Smith's assurances will be warmly welcomed by all Local Authorities especially that in regard to more financial control which has been a sore point with all Councils for some considerable time.

Waterford Is Top Winning Streak Performer

Since September 1990 almost £7 million has been won by 415 participants in the National Lottery's Winning Streak TV Game Show it was divulged by Mr. Ray Bates, National Lottery Director at a press conference held in Dublin last Thursday. And the number of winners in each province closely reflects the percentage of the population living in these areas, he stated.

In Munster, Waterford comes out as the second highest winner in the province during the period with a total of £396,000 which has been shared among 23 lucky winners. And apart from Dublin and Cork with their two large metropolitan areas, Waterford has turned out to be the biggest winning area in the entire country.

One of the luckiest districts in the county is Kilmac-thomas and lady luck has smiled on the area once again as another participant from the mid Waterford town has qualified to feature in the money-spinning TV game on next Friday night.

Balancing Your Budget In These Uncertain Times

Uncertainty in the currency markets, high short term interest rates and an uncertain economic outlook require families to keep a watchful eye on their household budgets.

A report published in "Consumer Choice" this month advises people on the merits of having a household budget and recommends that the heads of households examine where their money is going each

month. It also advises consumers on the need to divide expenditure into essential monthly expenses and discretionary ones. The report also gives practical guidance to help consumers plan expenditure and avoid the temptations of overspending or getting into debt.

Few people know exactly where the contents of their pay packet actually goes and in many cases actual

expenditure may be greater than realised. Like most people you could be spending more than you realise - in fact you might even be spending more than you earn!

If you find you are using credit cards for daily expenses, that you have increased your bank loan or that you have fallen behind in paying your bills it's time to take stock of the situation.

The report also features some handy tips on how to cut back on your expenses, outlines the pitfalls of credit and tells you where you can go for advice if you are having difficulties managing your financial commitments.

"You must be fully aware of your current financial position before you can construct a realistic budget", a spokesperson for the magazine states. Be sure your money plan is flexible - budgeting is supposed to reward, not punish. A budget you can live with is going to achieve far more than a drastic cost-cutting exercise that will be abandoned after the first month. Successful budgeting relies largely on a regular review of your situation and you should always provide yourself with an incentive to help you to continue your plan.

Developing a cautious attitude towards credit is an important preventative measure. Credit should only be used if repayments are within your means, always shop around for the cheapest loan or credit facility - the one with the least total interest, lowest fees and charges.

If you are caught with difficult credit commitments and no savings you should contact the lender and re-schedule your loan which will probably mean that your normal monthly payments will be reduced but will be extended over a longer period.

Who Can We Believe?

It is an accepted fact, just as the devil can quote Scripture to suit his purpose, that statistics can be twisted and turned any way for the sake of giving the semblance of truth to a statement. And it appears to us that the IDA are doing their best in this regard to put a gloss on what is now a very bleak jobs situation.

In the section of the IDA's end of year statement for 1992 issued last week-end concerning the south-east region we are told that the region was again one of the top performers in job creation and that "in a difficult year, with companies facing high interest rates and currency fluctuations, manufacturing employment remained broadly stable".

It also stated in another section that "last year was a difficult one for small businesses in the City and County (of Waterford). Nevertheless a range of projects were assisted during the year, which will provide employment opportunities in '93".

However an assessment of the latest prospects on the jobs front in Munster, published in one of our daily papers last Monday morning starkly proclaimed that "the unemployment crisis in Munster has deepened in recent weeks with a number of companies in Tipperary and Cork announcing lay offs while there are fears that over 600 jobs are on the line in Counties Waterford and Clare in the longer

term. The assessment in regard to the latter is based on the gloomy prediction that up to 550 jobs will be shed at Waterford Crystal over the next two years.

Unemployment at the national level is growing higher by the month and at the last reckoning had exceeded the 300,000 mark and Waterford City and County are not without contributing their share to this vast army of the unemployed.

So no matter what way one looks at it, the jobs situation in the coming year is a very bleak one despite the euphemistic terminology used by the IDA in its report. We leave it to you to make up your own mind as to the facts.

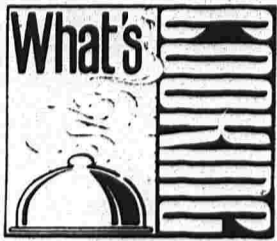

Children In Danger At Kilmacthomas New Houses

Proposing that a playground area be provided at the new houses in Kilmacthomas, Cllr. Jackie Fahey stated at the January monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last week that his reason for the proposal was that the land there sloped down to the public road and children would be in danger when playing if

they chased a ball on to the road. Pointing out that land was available for the purpose he said that the situation as it existed was very dangerous for children.

Cllr. Oliver Coffey seconding the proposal said that the area where the children now played was wide open right down on to the road and some protection was needed. The County Engineer, Mr.

John O'Flynn pointed out that the policy of the Council was not in favour of providing organised playgrounds because of vandalism and the cost of insurance. He added that the housing scheme in Kilmacthomas referred to was still incomplete but he said that he would have a look at the situation to see what could be done.

Start planning for next year's garden now

RELAX, put your feet up and start on the garden — the one you want this summer and in years to come.

For there is no better month for planning than January, when the weather is against you and there is little real gardening to be done anyway. Some sketching now can sort out things which have been niggling you or features that you have often wanted to include.

You can even lay some of the 'foundations' if the weather eases.

Typical projects worth thinking about:

- marking out or digging a new vegetable plot, perhaps with a fence or trellis screen
- marking and laying a new path
- erecting a greenhouse or shed
- laying a shed base
- building steps
- building a retaining wall for raised border
- creating a rockery
- digging out a pond
- building a new fence
- creating a new border

You may even decide that you want to re-design the garden from scratch but, whether you do that or simply add to the existing pattern, remember that a garden has height as well as width and depth — designs on paper can look flat when transferred to reality.

To avoid that, try to include plants giving height, and add man-made features such as trellises or pergolas.

The latter are doorways or arches,

preferably made of rustic timber, which can span paths and support plants to create breaks between different areas such as the vegetable plot and the flower garden.

Use walls and fences as a blank canvas on which to add climbing plants such as honeysuckle and clematis — remember that they love a sunny outlook but cool roots.

Alternatively, grow compact fruit trees against such surfaces and train them into flat 'espalier' and fan shapes.

A climbing rose is another excellent way to break the monotony of a fence, or frame a pergola.

Tree stumps can also be features rather than a nuisance — save yourself some backache by leaving them and growing nasturtium over them. The thin soil above the tree roots will encourage the plants to bloom rather than make greenery.

A well-constructed 'tent' of canes for runner beans can look impressive and be the focal point for an industrious vegetable plot.

For a touch of the exotic, plant pampas grass and yuccas if you live in the South — the former waves elegantly in the lightest breeze while the latter's spectacular foliage is sometimes topped by trifid-like blooms.

And, for sheer height without taking up a huge area, you could plant a Leylandii conifer. In a few years you will have a compact yet impressive tree to give your garden the height it needs.

Muintir Na Tire Notes

The annual National Conference of Muintir Na Tire held recently in Athlone was one of the most successful in recent years with delegates attending from most of the counties.

In the course of his address to the delegates, Mr. Michael Lynch, President, spoke of the important role Muintir can play in the new County Enterprise Partnership Boards. He said that Muintir believes that before economic development and the possibility of creating employment opportunities can begin to take off, there is a pre-enterprise phase of primary moves at local level to which great attention ought to be given. This is a phase in which Muintir, because of its experience and track record of achievement over the past fifty five years, can make a worthwhile contribution.

The President announced details of a new financial service unit which is being set up by Muintir as part of its on-going service to Community Councils affiliated to Muintir. This service when in operation will provide comprehensive information on how a Muintir Council should make an application to a bank or other financial institution for a loan for the development of a community project. It was announced at the

Conference that an up-to-date video on the community crime prevention programme, COMMUNITY ALERT, which was founded by Muintir in 1984, is being made with sponsorship from New PMPA and the Health Promotion Unit of the Department of Health. There are now over 450

Community Alert groups throughout the country a great number of which have been set up by Muintir na Tire in association with the Garda Siochana. It is to be hoped that in time every parish in rural Ireland will have an active Community Alert Committee in operation.

Minister Launches World Vision's Sixth 24 Hour Famine

At a press conference in the EC Buildings, Dublin the Minister of State at the Taoiseach's office, Mr. Tom Kitt T.D., officially launched details of World Vision's major fundraising event for 1993:— The 24-Hour Famine for the Children of Africa.

This year's 24-Hour Famine takes place from 7 p.m. on Friday, February 5 to 7 p.m. on Saturday, February 6, when thousands of people all over Ireland will go without food to raise funds for Africa. This is the sixth year World Vision has run the event.

The Foreign Minister David Andrews, who per-

sonally witnessed the tragedy in Somalia, sent a message of good wishes for the 24-Hour Famine and congratulated World Vision on organising the event.

The proceeds from the 24-Hour Famine will be used to fund World Vision's relief and development work in Africa, particularly in famine stricken countries such as Mozambique, Somalia and Liberia where war poses an even greater threat than famine for long term stability and preservation of life. Other countries in great need, such as Kenya and Ethiopia, will also benefit from the funds raised.





Just what is pitch and putt? Is it miniature golf, or is it sometimes called, short golf. To those not familiar with this uniquely Irish game which is gaining popularity amongst all ages, while it is obviously an off-shot of golf, pitch and putt is a game with its own skill and rules. Played on a 9 or 18 hole course, a player can only use two clubs, one of which must be a putter. The maximum distance of any shot from tee to green is 70 metres. Pitch and putt was first played in Ireland in the mid 1940's, Cork and Dublin were the first areas to show real interest, but the game grew in strength and popularity all around the country. In 1961 the Pitch and Putt Union of Ireland was formed, today there are in excess of 17,000 registered members, and registered clubs in 21 counties.

WHO CAN PLAY?

Quite literally everyone from 6 to 86! It is also a game in which women compete on equal terms with men, indeed in the last few years, the standard of play in the ladies events has been quite phenomenal.

IS THE GAME EXPENSIVE?

With only two clubs and a few golf balls to buy, pitch and putt is one of the cheapest forms of sport. Club membership for 1993 varies from £15 to £60 for a year.

The subscription rate for 1993 is as follows:

Family Membership — £60; Adults — £40; Over 60's — £15; Students — £30; Juveniles — £15.

James Sullivan Leads Waterford To Famous Victory

The Munster Senior Cross Country Championships were held in St. Flannan's College, Ennis, last Sunday and James Sullivan was part of a historic treble by winning his first senior individual title, by leading Waterford to their first inter-county victory and by capturing the winning Waterford City Club team.

Last Sunday's success ensured the grand slam of this season's Munster Cross Country titles for Waterford as the Novice, Intermediate and Senior titles have now all been won by a dedicated bunch of athletes who are the first to achieve this success in the long history of Waterford athletics.

No words of praise are too high for the team whose season began more in hope than in confidence but who have shown in no uncertain terms their true potential and now all of them can look forward with confidence to their next big assignment, the All-Ireland Intermediate Championship which will be held at the Friary College on the first Sunday in February.

Last Sunday's race was a personal triumph for James Sullivan, a former junior international who is now fulfilling his senior potential. Up with the leading group at the half way point, he forced the pace to open what proved to be a winning lead on the Limerick and Cork champions and pre-race favourites, Robert Costello and Donncha O'Mahoney. The pace also proved too hot for former Dublin City Marathon winner, John Griffin, Kerry.

A most impressive athlete in full flight, the Kilmacthomas man came home a hundred yards winner in a time of 32 mins, 19 secs. for the 10,000 metres course. O'Mahoney finished 17 seconds behind with the Kerryman Griffin in third place.

This was an important victory for James Sullivan and all Waterford eyes will be on him in the Friary College in two weeks time.

HISTORIC WIN

The senior inter-county championship was one title that had eluded Waterford teams over the years but all was put right last Sunday when the pre-race favourites and many times winners, Cork, were defeated by eight points in an enthralling contest. The performance of Sean Foley was a great boost to the team as he finished in a very fine 8th position. Sean was immediately followed by club mate Jimmy Mulligan who has made great strides in his recent comeback, while Michael Halley, the Munster intermediate champion, ensured four Waterford runners in the first eleven with an equally fine run.

At this stage the red-vested Cork athletes were packing well and Waterford doubts were being entertained until long-serving Derek Tebay and Garda Liam O'Reilly came to the rescue and in finishing 26th and 27th they gave it their all as did other team members Charlie Foley and Tom Murray, thus sealing a much sought after Munster title for the Deise boys. Waterford finished on 82 pts. with Cork second on

90 pts. and Tipperary third with 97 pts.

CLUB TITLE

Waterford City AC completed the Novice, Intermediate and Senior title with a great victory in the club championship. The last Waterford team to win this race were Deise AC in 1984 and their runners included Jimmy Mulligan and Sean Foley as well as Ray Treacy and Derek Grant. Well, last Sunday, Jimmy and Sean created their own bit of history as they made up the Waterford City team along with James Sullivan and Michael Halley. They were convincing winners scoring 29 pts. with East Cork second on 65 pts. and West Limerick third on 80 pts.

LADIES RACE

In the ladies senior race, Elaine Fitzgerald (Waterford AC) came of age when finishing fourth behind Maureen Harrington (Olympic AC) in a time of 23 mins, 56 secs. The winner's time was 23.32. Elaine is just out of junior ranks and going on last Sunday's performance she will be a major force in the senior grade for years to come.

Dungarvan Athletic Club hosts its 5th annual five mile run through Colligan Wood this Sunday at 11 a.m. The event which is being sponsored by Kiely Monumental Works has kept and indeed increased its appeal annually as the emphasis is on participation and the fastest runners in the run don't necessarily win the race — and indeed have yet to do so.

The timing system, the first of its kind in the world, was devised by race director Victor Mullins whereby each runner predicts his/her own finishing time and the winner is the person who finishes closest to that time without running faster than it. For example if the person who predicts 35 mins. even runs 34.59 or faster he is not counted in the prize winners. If he runs 35 mins. or slower he is included and he is in line for the athletic clubs perpetual challenge trophy, the Colligan Cup. The first five runners who finish closest to their times receive prizes while keeping with the spirit of the day everybody is included in a draw for the pair of Asics Gel running shoes presented by Ger Wyley Sports, who himself will be a participant in the run, and there are also numerous spot prizes on offer.

The runner with the slowest prediction time is the first to run and the clock starts at that time and it works in reverse to zero. As the clock passes their prediction times the participants start running and the last runner to go is the one with the fastest time which is usually around 26.27 mins., the slowest time is usually around 45 mins.

THE COLLIGAN WOOD SHIELD

A juvenile version of the run will be held at 10.30 a.m. over the Wooden Bridge - Stone Bridge circuit. It is 2 km (1 1/4 miles approx.) in distance and last

year forty three young runners took park in this event. It is open to boys and girls in the age groups U-11 to U-15 on January 1, 1993. Entry fee is £1 and there will be prizes for the first five runners nearest their time but not faster than it. Last year's winner was Alan Moore, Ballinamuck who predicted 9 mins. 30 secs. and he ran 9 mins. 37 secs. The next four runners were Kieran Curran, Skehacrine, Paul Radley, Ballymacmague, Michael Kiely, Ballycoe and Pat O'Riordan,

Kilrossanty. The fastest boy was Mark Radley, Ballymacmague (7 mins. 57 secs.) and the fastest girl was Niamh Harty, Springfield (10 mins. 12 secs.) Both these runners and the first two prizewinners are over age for this year's event. The run will start at 10.30 a.m. sharp as the Colligan Cup has an 11 a.m. starting time.

HENRY MAKES HISTORY

1989 — In an effort to promote fitness and running locally the first staging of the Colligan Cup took place in Colligan Wood in January 1989. Though entering the unknown the organisers were delighted with an entry of twenty two fun runners. It also gave us the closest finish to date and a blanket could have covered the first five over the line nearest to their prediction time. It was a case of the old dog for the long road as Lismore based Willie Henry squeezed home ahead of Catriona Hynes, Clashmore, Liam Moore, McCarthyville, Paddy Lannon, The Look-out and Liam Dwyer, Western Bay. Willie predicted 32.30 and he ran 32.38.

SHEEHAN SHINES

1990 — The event consolidated its position in 1990 when twenty three runners toed the line for the second staging of the race. Nicky Sheehan ran the course in 37 mins. and 32 secs. and he proved a most popular winner. Nicky just edged out Paul Keating, Childers Estate, by one second with Liam Moore again featuring in third place, while Liz Bullen, Villierstown finished fourth and Liam Rossiter, McCarthyville was fifth.

MOORE THE MASTER

1991 — There was a massive uplift in interest as entries increased by exactly one hundred percent for the third Colligan Cup. Forty six runners gathered for the run and Richie Moore taught everyone a lesson in pacing when he finished within two seconds of this prediction time. Amazingly Richie ran the exact same time as Nicky Sheehan did when winning the previous year. The unlucky runner that year was Eoin Russell, Silversprings, who predicted 37 mins. 30 secs. but he ran two seconds too fast when

1992 — Tigh an Cheoil stable partners Martin Geoghegan and Tomas Drohan stole the limelight in a field of forty nine runners. Only a second separated them both with the younger legs of the winner deciding the issue in a hectic sprint to the finish. Martin predicted 40 minutes even and he ran 40.05. The fastest runner on the day, Gerry Cantwell, Helvick, finished third with well-known handballer John Joe Wright, Congress Villas, fourth with Cappagh youth Jason Radley fifth.

After the race the chairman of the club Br. Patrick Lennon presented the Colligan Cup to the winner and the draw for the pair of running shoes was won by Jim Roles, Tramore.

SUNDAY NEXT

To choose a winner of this year's Kiely Monumental Colligan Cup would be impossible but this is not the priority as once again it is the sight of hopefully upwards of forty participants running with either fitness achieved or intent on getting fit is what the purpose of this event is all about. Come along and

join in the fun and begin 1993 as you intend to continue. We would ask all competitors to enter as early as possible as the order of running has to be organised, so we can therefore start on schedule. The full results, the draws and the video of the race will all take place in Paddy Foley's after the Point-to-Point races in Kilossera.

P.S. — Leave the stop watch at home on Sunday morning.

Western Convention

Ollie Wilkinson, former county and Tourin club player, was elected as Western Board Chairman when defeating Tom Cunningham, Stradbally by 51 votes to 39 at last week's Divisional Convention which was held at Kilrossanty's clubhouse on Thursday night last. The new Chairman who has acted as Divisional Vice-Chairman for eight of the past nine years, takes over from club mate and team mate, Jimmy O'Gorman, who stepped down after a three year term to contest the election for Munster Council Representative at next Saturday's County Convention.

For the third year in a row there was a one hundred per cent attendance at the convention which got underway after Kilrossanty Club Chairman John Power extended a welcome to everyone and said that for his club it was an historic occasion as it was the very first time that a convention had been held in their parish. The meeting got underway at 7.40 p.m. with a brief address by County Chairman Eamon O Murchu who congratulated all concerned with a very successful year.

BALANCE SHEET

Outgoing Treasurer, James Walsh gave a run-down on the various items listed and on the gate receipts from the various venues. He pointed out that the expenditure for the year exceeded income by £1,580 and that this was in the main due to clashing of fixtures because of the pressure on all the Boards to get the championships finished as delays had taken place due to the success of our county teams. In relation to the expenditure side of the account, Tony Mansfield asked in what circumstances a figure of £1, 843 had been paid over to the County Board when it had not been shown as having been collected on the income side. James Walsh stated that the figure referred to was for the intermediate hurling championships. Tony Mansfield said that if gates were collected and then passed on to another Board that the figure should have been list-

ed on both the income and expenditure side and he felt that instead of showing a loss that the Board should have shown a profit of approximately £280. James Walsh said that the matter would be examined again and a report made to the first meeting of the new Board.

In response to a question from Patrick Moore, the treasurer stated that only a small amount of the listed travelling expenses related to payments to the referees, but that a number of referees had not yet submitted claims for travel expenses. The Balance Sheet showed the Board to be in a healthy state financially with assets of £5,317.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The report of the Board's Secretary, Anthony Walsh (which was 2770 words in length) took just four minutes to deal with and there was no discussion on the document. Nioclás Mac-Craith complimented the Secretary on the issue of minutes of Board meetings throughout the year. The Secretary was complimented by the Chairman on the excellence of his comprehensive account of the Board's activities during the year.

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

In his very fine address outgoing Chairman, Jimmy O'Gorman covered all aspects of the Board's activities in 1992 and having thanked the officers and members for their wonderful co-operation during the year, he wished the incoming Board every success. (See report elsewhere in this issue).

ELECTIONS

As stated at the outset, Ollie Wilkinson was elected Chairman and in thanking the delegates for the great honour bestowed on him he asked the members for their support and co-operation. He paid tribute to his predecessor who had set a great headline for him and he promised to do his utmost to emulate the success that attended the administration under the guidance of Jimmy O'Gorman. He spoke

about the success of our county teams last year and about the abundance of talent in the county at the moment and praised the work done by Bord na nOg and the schools. He also paid tribute to the people working for the promotion of football in the county.

Tom Cunningham congratulated Ollie on his success and wished him well and assured him of his full co-operation throughout the year.

In the election for Vice-Chairman, former Board member Paddy Walsh, Colligan, defeated his namesake Billy Walsh, Fourmilewater in a cliff-hanger (47 votes to 43). Paddy thanked those who supported him and said he was delighted to be back in harness after a year on the outside. Billy, who was contesting his first ever election in the boardroom, congratulated Paddy and wished him and the Board every success and promised his full co-operation.

TREASURER

With the outgoing Treasurer, James Walsh not standing and the other two nominees, Denis McGrath and Eddie Cunningham having withdrawn, popular Geraldines man, Tony Morrissey was declared elected. James Walsh paid tribute to Tony, who had been a wonderful help to him in the matter of gate management throughout the year. The new Treasurer expressed his delight at being elected and promised to devote himself to the responsibilities placed on him.

The remainder of the positions were: Secretary — Anthony Walsh; Registrar — Seamus O'Brien; County Board Representatives — Tom Cunningham, John Lyons and Brendan Tobin were elected unopposed as was Nickey O'Donovan, outgoing Asst. Secretary.

MOTIONS

As expected, the Chairman did not allow any of the three motions to be put to Convention. The first motion from Geraldines Club was a matter for the Senior Board, but he did allow Ned Keane to air his club's views on the subject and he having made some interesting points on their reasons for wanting all clubs to have their say at County Board level, the next motion was read. This was for the same club and requested that the intermediate football and junior hurling and football championships be run on a losers group basis, but this was ruled to be a matter for the incoming Western Board.

Noel Costello spoke to the Stradbally motion which related to the structuring of the knockout stages of the

championships and this was referred to the meeting of the incoming Board who will deal with championship structures etc.

COUNTY DRAW

Greg Fives, Treasurer of the county monthly draw spoke at length about the organisation of the draw and the tremendous support given by all clubs throughout the county. He said that at a recent meeting of club co-ordinators the feedback was most encouraging and many clubs were doing even better than they had earlier expected. He said that its success was now guaranteed and appealed to all clubs to continue with the canvassing for membership in their own captive areas. He told the Convention that the first draw would be held on the third Friday in February at Clonea Clubhouse (East), and he asked all the Boards to refrain from fixing games for the third Friday of each month during the course of the draw.

REGISTRATION

County Development Officer, John Fraher gave details of the procedures to be followed in completing their club and membership registration documents and gave a deadline for the receipt of same.

KILROSSANTY CLUB

The Chairman on behalf of the Board, thanked the Kilrossanty Club for hosting the convention and for the warmth of the welcome extended to all the delegates when they arrived. The comfort of the clubroom was the subject of much favourable comment and so was the tea and sandwiches served after the meeting by their committee.

BOARD MEETINGS

The Secretary announced that the first meeting of the incoming Board would take place at Dungarvan on Thursday, February 4, when transfers, regradings and affiliations would be dealt with. These matters will not be dealt with at the second meeting which is scheduled for February 18.

Sympathy

Our very sincere sympathy is extended to the Nicholson family on the recent death of Mrs. Julia Burke. The family have had a life-long association with the games and very many people will recall the role played by her brothers, Jim and John during their playing years with their club, Shamrocks. Chairman Reviews Another Successful Year

Jimmy O'Gorman, Lismore, who stepped down as Chairman of the Western GAA Board at the Western Convention in Leamybrien on Thursday night of last week having served three years, in his address told the delegates that it gave him great pleasure to review another successful year and as they looked back with pride on the county minor and under-21 teams they could recall with satisfaction the outstanding performances and results which were long overdue.

The Chairman went on to praise the wonderful work of Bord na nOg and the Primary Schools Board down through the years. Those were the people, he said, that had laid the foundations for clubs and county teams to build their future on. It was a rewarding success too for the selectors of both teams as they had spent many hours coaching and promoting the love of Gaelic games.

On the domestic front the Chairman said that they had completed all but the under-21 championships due to the inter-county success. Having congratulated the winners and runners-up, the Chairman said that the Board had to organise in excess of 200 games and this was no longer an easy task. Clubs had felt hard done by when changes had to be made in fixtures but, he said, he believed that the Fixtures Committee had always acted in the best interests of the Association.

At present, he said, there was a serious concern at the drop in attendances at their games and he suggested that a more professional approach be taken.

"Hopefully," he said, "with the success of our inter-county teams and the launch of the new county-wide draw to develop our county grounds, this should help to improve the situation."

DISCIPLINE

Commenting on the above, the Chairman said that considering the number of games played during the year, the number of breaches of good conduct were, in the main, non-existent.

However, he said, some incidents did take place that necessitated Board action and while they were few and far between, the fact that they took place at all should be a good reason for greater vigilance and attention in the future.

REFEREES

The shortage of referees was again referred to by the Chairman who said that the position had got worse since last year. Despite the fact that the Referees' Association had organised a coaching seminar to help ease the situation and recruit new referees, he was, the Chairman said, sad to relate that the vast majority of clubs, including some of the successful ones, had failed to provide or encourage the services of one referee for the Association.

The Chairman also referred to the problems of unemployment from which, he said, no club remained unscathed. If their present structures were to survive they must strive harder to halt the senseless rate of unemployment.

SAD DAY

Referring to the planned development of Croke Park, Mr. O'Gorman spoke of the projected costs of admission which were going to rule out the ordinary supporter.

"It will," he said, "be a sad day when people who have given invaluable time to fostering and promoting our games will not be able to attend the highlights of the year from the best positions."

In reference to sponsorship the Chairman said that a welcome boost to the Board's finances in 1992 was the introduction of championship sponsorship and he went on to thank the sponsors Central Bar, Cappoquin, Comeragh Oil, Lawlor's Hotel and Waterford Foods.

SENIOR FOOTBALL

WATERFORD v. TIPPERARY

Our county football team will be in action on Saturday when they take on Tipperary at Stradbally in the Halpin Cup and this will be a final trial for both before they play their respective National League games three weeks later.

Our footballers have been training in earnest and there has been a full turnout for training at their recent twice weekly sessions at Fraher Field and they should be in good trim for this test. They hope to be able to field a full team for the game.

G.A.A. NOTES

Co. Convention Promises To Be Exciting Affair

About one hundred and sixty delegates and officers will attend the county convention which is due to take place at Clonea Hotel on this Saturday, commencing at 6 p.m. With contests certain to take place, the annual meeting is sure to be a very interesting and exciting affair and with the county having been so successful last year there will be countywide interest in what takes place there.

Extracts from the excellent and comprehensive secretary's report are published here and will no doubt have been fully digested by clubs who have received the report for discussion at club meetings.

FINANCE

The financial statement is not to hand and there is no indication as to where the county stands, financially. Expectations are that the

statement will show the county to be heavily in the red, even though we did receive £15,000 from the Munster Council to help us out this year and generous sponsorship was also received. Normally at this time we are in a position to make comparisons with the figures of the previous years, but this is not possible now.

ELECTIONS

There is no news on a con-

test for the chair or for some of the other positions but we do know that there will be an exciting battle for the two positions as Munster Council Representatives with Jimmy O'Gorman, retiring Chairman of the Western Board, Tommy Hennessey holder of one of the positions and Jim Greene who was trainer of the county minor team last year, in the field.

The popular view at the moment is that Jimmy O'Gorman will take the position vacated by Greg Fives who has stood down to devote his time to other matters including the county fundraising draw and that the two men from the Eastern division will fight it out for the second seat. It will be mighty interesting.

We do know now that there will be a contest for the position of County Treasurer and that former Eastern Board Secretary, Christy Dowling, will be a definite candidate. Christy Dowling who is joint treasurer of the Supporters Club with James Walsh who is an accountant and is also very well known throughout the county. Last year James Walsh took over from Garry Cunningham after a very close contest.

MOTIONS

Some of the listed motions do not seem to be quite in order and even if some are, they will not make major changes in our playing activities or administration. Two of these call for changes in the running of the intermediate football championships, but this is a matter for the incoming Board in accordance with rule. The rule which gives the authority to the County Board, rather than to annual convention to control and manage club championships was decided by Congress very many years ago, even though we have been doing things differently for a very long time.

A motion to change our bye-laws and giving County Bord na n-Og representation on the adult Board is likely to be approved and bring us in line with other counties who have a similar arrangement.

Some good points will undoubtedly be made when the motions are being discussed and it will be interesting to hear them.

Overall it should be an interesting meeting.

A Year Of Tremendous Effort And Considerable Achievement

—Says County Secretary

In the course of his annual report to next weekend's Annual GAA Convention, County Secretary, Seamus Grant says:

"It is only to be expected that at the outset of this review of 1992, the deeds and feats of our County Under-21 and minor hurlers should occupy their rightful place of prominence. By their combined efforts they have indeed broken the mould, provided a fresh and invigorating impetus to the game, and given us much to look forward to in the year ahead. It was a year of tremendous effort and considerable achievement. It was fashioned by dedicated people at the helm of the respective teams, and it deserves to be ranked with any of the glory seasons of the past.

"Total and absolute commitment abounded on all sides, and the way forward can only be meaningful and fruitful. A more detailed analysis of the inter-county scene belongs to another section of this report, but it would be most inappropriate not to afford honour where it is due at this introduction stage, and to sincerely congratulate all concerned for making this a year to remember in many respects."

The Secretary later in the report went on to deal extensively with both championships.

On the new County Draw, the Secretary says: "Success on the inter-county playing fields can in itself be a great motivator for better things, and in this respect the urgent need and necessity to improve facilities at both our major venues — Pairc An Breathnach and Pairc Uí Fhearaich, was never more demanding. Towards this end, the County Finance and Development Committee last month launched a major confined members draw designed to raise the necessary capital needed to update our grounds, improve club facilities, and to increase the level of financial assistance necessary to promote our games in the schools throughout the county. All very laudable work, which will not, and cannot, be brought to a successful conclusion, unless every club and member of the Association is prepared to stand up and be counted. The time for standing back and leaving the task to others has long since passed, and consequently one of the top priorities for the coming year must be to give this major innovation 100% support."

CLUBS

Commenting on the clubs in the county, the report says that the vast majority of them are well organised and well aware of the needs and requirements of the modern era. However, the report says a number of clubs regrettably existed which tended to merely go through the motions of fulfilling fixtures and rarely if ever attended to the important aspects of membership.

Thankfully the Secretary says the number was getting smaller with the passage of time, but while such clubs existed they could not proclaim to be the best organised sports association in the county.

LOCAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Their failure to complete the entire local championship programme within the year

was, the report says, a disappointment. Having long advocated that success at inter-county level would in turn bring its problems for a league cum championship series, the Secretary says that a happy medium must be urgently inaugurated if they were to avoid the pitfalls associated with a backlog of fixtures.

DISCIPLINE

One of the major sources of embarrassment for them as a Board during 1992, was the report says, the liberal manner in which both the Provincial and Central Council handed out fines for breaches of match regulations, chiefly directed at their team mentors. In some instances, he said, the strong arm of authority appeared to be somewhat repressive, if not selective. One felt that here also there should be a happy medium. On major match days, keeping team officials glued to their seats in dug-outs could be a well nigh impossible task. Perhaps, he said, the provision of extra dug-outs with suitable inter-com systems might be one solution to the problem.

However, the report says that they must acknowledge that as a county they were guilty of breaches of match day regulations and stringent steps must be taken to ensure that all transgressions were eliminated in the future. However, the Secretary says that they must first tackle this breakdown of discipline on the home front. The sorry spectacle of seeing hordes of team mentors — and in some instances, tormentors — parading up and down their sidelines on match occasions, had become the rule rather than the exception of late.

Practically every game played during the past season illustrated this point to the full, and it was indeed time to call a halt. Boards in all cases must stand up and be counted on this vital question, he said.

On a more broader issue, however, the report says that bearing in mind the huge volume of games played throughout the county during an exceptionally busy season, it was noteworthy to report that by and large, the standard of excellent behaviour and fair play manifested themselves on their playing fields. A very small number of instances did warrant sanctions at Board level and they stood out as a reminder that they must continue to strive for constant vigilance and excellence.

REFEREES

Referring to the wonderful service given by their small band of referees, the report says that the fact that their numbers remain small was a subject that must be sooner or later addressed if they were to continue to function in a proper and efficient manner.

The report goes on: "Sincere thanks to all those who fulfilled refereeing roles both inside and outside the county during the past year. Very often such people find themselves the subject of unwarranted and unnecessary criticism from those who should know better. It was once again an exceptionally busy year and to all concerned a sincere personal word of thanks for unstinted co-operation."

Mr. O'Shea referring to his appointment said that it was a great honour and should give satisfaction to the many people who had supported himself and the Labour Party in the constituency. On the other hand Deputy Kenneally said that he regretted that he had been dropped but said that the mathematics of the situation where the Government partnership between Fianna Fail and Labour were concerned were against him and as the youngest junior minister he was the most vulnerable. He expressed the hope that he would again be promoted when the Junior Ministries came up for review in two years time as indicated by the Taoiseach.

Council Approves Manager's 1993 Housing Development Plans

South Eastern Health Board for £52,500, based on a phased 3-year purchase, the deposit on which has been paid.

He is at present in the final stages of negotiating an exchange and purchase covering about 1.75 acres at Powers orchard adjacent to the Ormonde Cinema, O'Connell Street and an adjoining site at Stephen's Street. The cost of this land is £37,500 plus sites numbers 7 and 8 at the Industrial Estate, notionally also valued at £37,500. The report then added: "I am sure the members will agree with me about the suitability of the area for housing development as planning permission has already been granted for development of 12 houses at "Mountain View" and a planning proposal for 20 houses has been received for "The Beeches."

Referring to the Council's scheme for the replacement of windows and doors at Childers Estate, the Manager stated that because of the upward trend in the Council's finances he had now instructed that the balance of the outstanding work at the Estate should be examined with a view to having it completed for those tenants in good standing.

Pointing out that in all, 260 applications had been received for the Council's

1993 Housing List, the Manager said he understood the members thought it prudent to hold a special meeting to discuss the present system of allocation.

COMPUTERISATION OF RENTS

The Manager's report ended by stating that as from January 18, housing rents would be computerised. Rent cards would no longer be required and a computerised receipt will be issued to each tenant from a hand-held machine for each payment. This new system would eliminate a manual system of accounts and create an updated data base which will make the task of filing and storing information much less complex than it has been.

On the proposal of Cllr. B. Kyne seconded by Cllr. R. Walsh the County Manager's report was unanimously approved and it was agreed to hold the special meeting to deal with housing applications on Monday, February 1.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White stated that with 260 applications this would prove "a long haul." Referring to the computerisation of the rent accounts, Mr. White added that this would prove no problem as the Council's computer system was one of the best in the country.
