In His First Public Engagement **Minister O'Shea Launches Potato Promotion Campaign**

In his first public engagement since his appointment as Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture & Food, Mr. Brian O'Shea on Wednesday last, January 20, launched the Bord Glas potato promotion cam-

Minister O'Shea said that he would like to build on the good work of his predecessor, Mr. Liam Hyland, in the area of horticulture and to continue to encourage in every way possible the various agencies connected with the development of horticulture.

Minister O'Shea referred in particular to the importance of the programmes drawn up by An Bord Glas for the potato industry and asked to be kept informed by An Bord of the impact of these programmes on the

horticultural industry.

With regard to the market situation the Minister said that he was concerned by the difficulties encountered by Donegal potato producers because of the very difficult weather conditions during last season's harvest. These conditions, he said, have made it impossible for many growers to harvest their crops and they stand to incur losses. "I am having this matter examined as a matter

of urgency."
The Minister for Horticulture and Food complimented Bord Glas on their new potato promotion brochure and said that the section dealing with the food value of the potato and the many recipes should be particularly beneficial to the con-

In conclusion Minister

O'Shea said that there was much to be learned about the culinary possibilities of the potato and this

promotion by An Bord Glas should help in this direction. The promotion lasts until the end of January and will focus on in-store activities in selected retail out-

Dungarvan By-Pass To Be Declared A **Public Road**

Dismantling Controversial Quigley Plant At Ballinacourty

The old Quigley Magnesite plant at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan which, for a decade after it first went into operation in 1970, was a veritable hive of activity, is at present being dismantled.

Controversy always surrounded the plant since it was first located at Ballinacourty on the eastern tip of Dungarvan Harbour as environmentalists claimed that the white plume which was a constant factor over the tall chimney stack at the plant was causing pollution to the surrounding

In those days a workforce of 140 were gainfully employed at the plant and when its closure for economic reasons was announced by the Quigley Company in 1982, the news came as a great blow to the entire locality.

Since then the plant has remained closed except for a security presence but controversy still surrounded the area as the superstructure began to reflect its non-use and the effects of weathering and it presented an ongoing blot on the picturesque coastline at Ballinacourty.

Moves by some members of Waterford Co. Council to have the place declared a derelict site in recent years in face of the Quigley Company's failure to make a definite statement on the future of the plant failed to materialise as did also moves by Dungarvan Golf Club to purchase the site for the purpose of extending their adjacent golf course.

The Chairman of the County Council, Cllr. B. Kyne, then took the matter up directly with the principals of the Quigley Company now based at Tivoli in Cork and the matter had been the subject of ongoing correspondence between them since 1990. Incidentally it was Cllr. Kyne's father, the late Deputy Tom Kyne, who played a vital role in the late 1960's in getting Dungarvan born U.S. millionaire John A. Mulcahy and John R. Powers then Chairman of the Board of the international Pfizer Company to introduce the Quigley Company to Ballinacourty.

Now it appears that the controversy which has surrounded the Ballinacourty plant down through the years is to come to an end. Last week a team of work-

THE BURGERY AMBUSH

[continued]

Last week we dealt with the shooting of Redman the auxiliary policeman and of the Republican soldiers Fitzgerald and Keating. We said also that Sergeant Hickey of the R.I.C. was captured and taken up the bye-road that leads to Knockateemore and then towards the glen at Castlequarter. What happened is not quite clear but we can assume he was sentenced to death. A priest was procured and the sergeant was prepared for death. He received the viaticum (the communion given to a dying person) and the sentence was then carried out. His body was pierced with bullets and left in the glen. The soldiers scoured the countryside for two days trying to find him until Mr. Beresford, on whose land the body lay, discovered it. The soldiers took

charge of the remains which were removed to the barrack. The body of John Fitzgerald was also taken there. The relatives of Fitzgerald made application for the remains but they would not be given up until the funeral of Sergeant Hickey had taken place. No civilaccompanied Sergeant Hickey's remains to the grave as the cortege was composed entirely of soldiers and police. In fact there was some difficulty in having the grave dug. An order was issued by the military that all shops should be closed during the funeral and this was observed. The body was interred in the cemetery of the Parish Church.

FUNERAL OF JOHN FITZGERALD.

When the funeral of Sergeant Hickey was over the remains of John Fitzgerald were handed over to the relatives. The funeral took place from the barracks to the Parish Church. It was an immense concourse of people. On the following morning Requiem Office and High Mass was sung after after which the remains were transferred to Kilrossanty to be interred there. The military issued an order that only twenty people would be allowed to follow the remains. As the coffin was removed from the church soldiers were posted outside the railings with fixed bayonets, keeping the crowds back. As the coffin was carried through the outward gates and down Mary Street the ladies of Cumann na mBan lined up in processional order and marched

after the remains. The funeral passed over the bridge, through Abbeyside and on towards Kilrossanty. As the cortege proceeded on the road it was met by numbers of people from the country so that by the time it reached Kilrossanty it assumed considerable dimensions. The remains were laid to rest in the Republican Plot in the ancient graveyard of Kil-

FUNERAL OF PATRICK KEATING On the evening of the ambush Patrick Keating died. The news of this death was kept quiet for a time but he, too, was subsequently buried in the Republican Plot at Kilrossanty. His funeral took place at night time but coming from his funeral many of the people were met by soldiers and some arrests were made.

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EEC SPECIAL BEEF PREMIUM SCHEME 1993

The first application period for the 1993 EEC special Beef Premium Scheme runs from 1 January to 26 February 1993. It is confined to applications for the 22 months instalment of the premium.

Application forms are at present being posted to all registered herdowners and it is hoped that all herdowners will have received an application form by Friday, 29 January.

Applicants for the 22 months instalment of premium should note the following points carefully.

- 1. If the animals which they intend to submit for the 22 month premium have already been submitted on their holding for the old Special Beef Premium in 1992 or 1991, herdowners should ensure that there is no discrepancy between the age given in either of those years and the date of birth given on the 1993
- 2. If they are availing of the retrospective retention period of one month (which applies to applications submitted in January) the animals should have reached 22 months by the date of sale or
- 3. Herdowners must present the BTE Cattle Identity Cards to the Local Livestock Office for punching and stamping before disposing of the cattle which they have submitted for the 22 month instalment of Special Beef Premium. However if the animals are being sold direct to a Licensed Meat Export Premises and the Deseasonalisation Slaughter Premium is being claimed on them it is not necessary to bring the Cattle Identity Cards to the Local Livestock Office
- If a herdowner intends to claim both the 22 months instalment of the Special Beef Premium and the Deseasonalisation Slaughter Premium on the same animals it is essential that an application for the Special Beef Premium is lodged before the cattle are sent for slaughter. The Deseasonalisation Slaughter Premium must be claimed after the animals are slaughtered but the Special Beef Premium must be claimed before animals are sent for slaughter.
- 5. Each farmer should keep a copy of his/her application for the Special Beef Premium so that he/she may be able to give information in later applications which will be consistent with information already given. This will be particularly important in regard to ages of animals.

IMPORTANT NOTE

Herdowners who wish to avoid loss of Special Beef Premium and Deseasonalisation Slaughter Premium should ensure that from 1 February, 1993, they keep a record of the old and new tag numbers in each case where male animals in their herds are retagged. Herdowners are required to give written notification of both numbers to the Local Livestock Office of the Department of Agriculture and Food within seven days of each retagging.

Council Move On Urban Housing Estates

Moves by Dungarvan Urban Council to take over control of a number of housing estates in the urban area constructed since 1982 were finalised at the Council's January monthly meeting last week.

A report from the Town Engineer, Mr. G. Taylor on the condition of the areas in question stated that the Local Authority estates at Kilrush Park, Lios Mór Avenue and Kyne Park were all up to standard and no immediate expenditure was envisaged should the Council now take over their maintenance.

The report on the other estates stated as follows: Hillview Drive - No immediate expenditure. Some minor repairs to cobblelocking; Comeragh Crescent — No immediate expenditure envisaged; Ashcroft - No immediate expenditure, portion of footpath requires attention. Silversprings -This estate has been in operation for a period of 19 years. It is estimated that roads and footpaths need repair and a conservative estimate of the cost would be £12,000, the major portion of which would be devoted to footpaths.

With regard to the latter, the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White told Cllr. P. Power that the delay in taking it over was that a number of different developers were involved down through the years. He thought that it would be a good idea for the Council to take it over now as it could cost a great deal more later on to do the necessary repairs. In regard to the £12,000 estimated for the work, Mr. White said that this could be done over a period of years.

On the proposal of Cllr. B. Kyne seconded by Cllr. R. Walsh the Council unanimously agreed to adopt the report and to take over the control and maintenance of the roadways and footpaths in the estates listed.

The Cost Of Running For A Seanad Seat

For the last three months, former senators and defeated TDs who are aspiring to win places in the Seanad, euphemistically called the Upper House of the Oireachtas, have been conducting a countrywide canvass in a bid to secure one of the 43 seats which are up for grabs when the vote counting is completed next week.

According to the Constitution, elections for Seanad Eireann have to take place within 90 days of the dissolution of the Dáil and by the dates fixed now they have made it with just one day to spare - Monday

next, February 1.

There are 118 contenders for the 43 seats on the five panels and it is understood that some candidates have spent between £8,000 and £10,000 on their campaigns on top of what some of them had already spent trying to retain or secure a Dáil seat.

The campaign which sends contenders 'traipseying' around Ireland canvassing County Council members has been described as the most gruelling of its kind. The 43 seats to be filled by the electors on the five panels and the 6 seats from the

to be decided before the Taoiseach can nominate his 11 senators.

The counting of votes will begin on Monday next February 1 in the Members' Restaurant at Leinster House and unlike general election counts is generally a most sedate affair.

All voting in Seanad elections is done by registered post, but to prevent personation, those entitled to vote do so only in the presence of authorised persons.

The five panels involved in the election are the Cultural and Educational Panel (elects 5); Agricultural

two university panels have Panel (11 seats); Labour Panel (11 seats); Industrial and Commercial Panel (9 seats) and Administrative Panel (7 seats).

Members of Waterford Co. Council gathered in Dungarvan last Monday to cast their votes, the Fine Gael group meeting in the morning and the Fianna Fail members later that night in the presence of senior Council officials who supervised the pro-cess in each case. The Labour and Democratic Left members of the Council also voted on Monday for the candidates of their choice.

NEW TREES PLANTED

Cllr. Nuala Ryan, Chairwoman at the January monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council referred to the planting of new trees along the roadway at Hermitage, Abbeyside and suggested that, as the trees were very tall they would require a higher support than that which had been provided for them.

Newcomers to the Village have tended to call the entire extent of the roadway, Friar's Walk.

Jazz as epitomised by such "greats" as Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Count Basie and Fats Waller was swept away towards the end of the 1950s by the great tidal wave of rock 'n roll. But in recent years it has begun to make a big come-back and Jazz Festivals are once again major crowd-pullers when and wherever they are held.

Jazz is reputed to have originated when the field songs of Afro-American van thanks to the initiative

labourers in the US moved into the cities, first to the sporting houses of New Orleans and then to the 'speakeasies' of the industrial north, notably Chicago during the Prohibition years when the selling of alcoholic liquor was declared illegal. Trying to define jazz is tricky but the great Fats Waller probably hit the nail in the head when he told the lady who asked him what swing was, "if you has to ask ma'am, you ain't got it!"
The revival of the jazz

scene has been greatly accelerated in Ireland by the outstanding success of the International Cork Jazz Festival of recent years and this has now been added to by Jazz Festivals such as we have been enjoying for the past few years in Dungar-

and courage of the popular proprietor of Lawlor's Hotel. Through his efforts jazz fans throughout a wide area have had the opportunity of listening and dancing to not only the top combinations in Ireland but also to a number of internationally famous groups such as The Temperance Seven and Acker Bilk and his group.

And it can only be a bonus for Dungarvan that the Dungarvan festival is to go ahead again this year when jazz fans will be able to

again revel to the sound of such groups as The Big Geraniums, Cluskey Hop-kins and Paddy Cole, just to name but a few.

As County Manager Dan Hurley pointed out at the reception, this festival which is timed to take place in February deserves to be fully supported not only for the superb music it will supply for jazz fans, but for the fact that it will get the tourist season in Dungarvan and West Waterford off to an earlier than usual start.

Unemployment In EC Now Stands At 9.8%

According to the latest issue of 'Eurofocus,' the monthly news sheet issued by the Commission of the European Communities, unemployment in the European Community as a whole had risen to 9.8% in October. The figure which was up 1% from the previous month was published in early December by Eurostat, the EC's statistical office. The last time the unemployment rate for the EC as a whole reached this level was in June 1989.

In the 12 months to October 1992, unemployment in the Community rose from 9% to 9.8% while the number of those out of work increased by 1,260,000 people to reach a total of 14.6 million!

Of the EC countries it is Spain which has the highest rate of unemployment (18.8%), followed closely by Ireland (18.2%). Then came Britain (11.2%), Italy

the unwanted honour of being second highest of the 12 EC States in the Unemployment rates while at the same time we are proudly (and foolishly, we believe) boasting of having a very strong punt which is not going to be devalued and a sound economy.

Would it not be economically wiser to sacrifice the latter to some extent in order to create a few more jobs so that we might drop a few points in the EC unemployment ratings? What do you think?

40th Anniversary Of **Ardmore And Grange** Guild I.C.A.

The night of January 21 was a joyous occasion in Ardmore, when the Ardmore and Grange guild celebrated its 40th anniversary. Founding the I.C.A. in the area was the brain-child of the late Mrs. Rooney, Jim-mie Rooneys wife, and she was the first President. Anne Roche, I.C.A. organiser came to found it, and she has been a cherished friend ever since.

The celebrating began with Mass by Canon O'-Connor in the beautifully decorated I.C.A. room, the flowers having been ar-ranged by Brigid Keane, Margaret Flavin and Breda O'Brien. The Canon gave a lovely talk on St. Agnes whose feast day it was, and who was a much - revered saint of the early church.

The leaflets with the hymns were a co-operative effort between the President Victor Mullins, Principal of Ardmore National School. Marie Keane and Aine Colbert who painstakingly bound each one in narrow blue and green ribbon, the I.C.A. colours. The music was by Mrs. Sheila Hickey. Afterwards all partook

themselves to the Round Tower Hotel for a round of photographs, before sitting down to a sumptuous dinner provided by Mrs. Ronayne (herself an I.C.A. member of Ballinameela Guild) and the hotel staff.

Among the guests were Anne Roche, the founder, Lena O'Connor former Federation President, Breda Phelan, present I.C.A. Federation President, V. Rev. Canon O'Connor and Rev. Mr. Warren whose wife Leslie is a guild member while former I.C.A. members came from far and near. It was heart warming to see so many familiar

faces together once again. Mrs. M. Colbert presided

magnificently and was presented with a bouquet of flowers on behalf of the Guild, who also gave her a standing ovation. Anne Roche spoke of the found-ing of the I.C.A.; her involvement with it and specially with the Ardmore Guild, whom she had got involved in County Debating competitions the very first year and Ardmore became county champions. There was a hectic Drama phase and several other activities.

Miss Quain and Siobhán Lincoln spoke of other phases of I.C.A. activities, reminding people that the I.C.A. were the founders of the Tidy Towns Association in Ardmore, a fact referred to by Rev. Fr. Griffin when he wrote a congratulatory letter to the Tidy Towns Committee this year on winning the National Award. He, at the request of the I.C.A. was the first chairman and a short time later, when he was moved from the parish, Miss M. E. Quain acted as chairman.

The Historical Exhibition in Pattern Week 1955 was a marathon undertaking, involving months of preparation. It took place in the new building of the Irish College, now the Tower Hotel and there was a wonderful collection of artifacts, hooded cloaks, butter prints, old books and manuscripts and so on. Tommie Lincoln of Cappoquin contributed many items relating to the War of Independence and the late Pax Whelan of Dungarvan and his son Donal came out and arranged a whole section relating to it. For a full account see the 1992 issue of the Ardmore Journal.

The building of the I.C.A. room was a major project lasting some years. Rev. Monsigner Power donated a site behind St. Declan's hall and there was a long period of fund-raising, spear-headed by Miss Quain and the late Mrs. O'Brien. There was help from several sources; Ballinroad, Glensbar Corrichter and Materials beg, Carrickbeg and Water-ford guilds who came at various times and gave entertainment in the hall.

At the building stage, I.C.A. husbands helped out and brought loads of stones, which were thrown into the foundations by guild mem-bers, Mrs. O'Brien coming across from her own house with tea and currant cake on site. James Quain drew up the plans. John Keane opened the foundation (he had been at hand at various other I.C.A. crises); the Angling Association helped, but the person to whom the guild is above all indebted, is the late Jim Quain, who helped in ordering materials and also be raising the walls, block by block, with his own two hands, Saturday after Saturday. This should never be forgotten in I.C.A. history, that the guild is under a deep debt of grat-itude to Jim for the trojan work he did.

The first guild meeting was held in the new premises in March 1976.

This account concentrates on just a few aspects of past history. New history is in the making, under the superb direction of the current president, Mrs. Mary Colbert who with the secretary, Mrs. Liz Dolan and a hardworking committee made the celebration of the 40th anniversary a wonderful occasion, it is worthy of note that 5 founder members are still alive in the guild



TOM FIVES HONOURED

The proceedings opened with a showing of a video of the final followed by some very tasty refreshments provided by a hardworking ladies committee.

The formal business of the evening was opened by Ollie Wilkinson who spoke of Tom's performances throughout the campaign starting he said with an average display against Cork and ending with a first-class performance against Offaly in the final. He understood he said that hurling is a team game but Tom Fives alone brought glory to Tourin being the first player in the history of the club to win All-Ireland honours.

Team Selector Tony Mansfield said how pleased he was to be present and recalled that when Waterford last contested a final in 1974 Tourin man Peter Scanlon played a vital part.

Another selector Joey Carton was loud in his praise of Tom's contribution to a famous victory. Peter Power the third member of the management team spoke of Tom's dedication to training and his ability to give his full attention to team talks. He was he said the one player who always paid full attention to what was being said. Peter had in his possession a programme of the 1947 minor Munster championship which showed that the man who wore the No. 8 Jersey that day was Jim Fives (uncle of Tom).

This was, of course, Tom's number in '92.

Club chairman John Joe Scanlon welcomed everybody and spoke of the great contribution made by the Fives family since the Club was founded. Before making the presentation he praised Tom for his efforts at Club level and said he would certainly have qualified for "Player of the Year".



FRENCH TOAST

French bread, cheese, eggs and ham combine for a delectable open sand-

Ingredients:

- 1 loaf french bread Small tin of ham 4 eggs1/4 tsp. salt
- dash pepper 1/4 cup chopped onions
- 2 tspns butter or bacon drippings
- 4 tomato slices
- 2 slices processed cheese

Method:

Cut bread in half lengthwise; store top half for later use. Toast bottom half. Spread ham on top. Combine eggs, milk, salt and pepper, beating thoroughly. Add onions. Heat butter or bacon dripping in frying pan. Pour in egg mixture. Reduce heat; cook, lifting and folding occasionally, until eggs are set, but moist. Pile eggs over ham. Top



with tomato slices. Place one-half slice of cheese over each tomato slice. Place loaf on baking sheet. Grill just until cheese melts.

There's Lots Of Things To do If You Become Trapped Indoors

January can become the most frustrating month of the gardening year with even the most diehard enthusiasts driven indoors by the wintry chills.

And if you do venture out, you have to remember how much damage you can do with your welly boots.

Grass can be particularly vulnerable after frosts — it looks and breaks just like glass first thing in the morning. And if the beds, borders and vegetable plots are water-logged you will quickly compact the soil and undo any good from your digging, unless you support your weight by standing on a plank. Digging is, of course, one thing you can do even when it's bitterly cold since the exertion will keep you warm.

And you don't have to be zealous in and rain will do the job for you, leaving you to rake it into a fine crumble for planting.

Since you are often trapped indoors it is also a good idea to think about what you can do when the growing season starts:

- check seed catalogues you may be surprised how many different and more versatile varieties of old favourites are now available.
- consider investing in a greenhouse or cold frame so that you can start bedding plants and vegetables earlier to produce stronger specimens.
- no plan and mark out any new garden

features such as a rockery or path.

try to map out a month-by-month campaign of sowing, planting or restocking of borders after, say spring bulbs are finished and need lifting.

When you can get outside then make the time count by:

- * raking beneath hedges to flush out overwintering pests.
- * pruning hybrid tea roses hard to leave six to nine inches above ground but only cutting floribundas and climbers by a third.
- * completing pruning of apple and pear trees.
- * removing bumps and dips in the lawn by gently lifting the turf and adding or removing soil as necessary - small depressions can be filled with fine soil which the grass can grow through.
- * repairing fences and sheds and coating with preservatives — if it is three years since the last complete coat then recover the whole structure.
- * checking tools; wipe metal with lubricating oil and rub linseed oil onto wooden handles; sharpen blades as necessary and check engines; be particularly careful to check electric mowers and tools for split and damaged cables.
- * installing a residual current device (RCD) for electrical tools. It will cut the power supply quickly in the event of any damage to the cable and a short circuit — it could save a life.



Co. Convention Most Controversial Ever

The Waterford County Convention held at Clonea Strand Hotel on Saturday night last, was surely one of the most controversial meetings in the long history of the Association here and the greater part of the agenda was devoted to discussion on the financial statement and elections. Discussion on the motions was minimal.

County Board Chairman, Eamon O Murchu presided and was returned unopposed to commence his fifth year in office.

When delegates sat down at around 6 p.m. there was a one hundred per cent attendance on 159 present and chairman of the host club (Abbeyside/Ballinacourty), Pat Moore welcomed everyone and told the meeting that it was a great privilege to have the convention in their area. He congratulated the county on the wonderful success achieved by our county teams in 1992 and said it was another milestone in our proud history. He wished the convention well and hoped that further success on the playing fields would be achieved in the coming year.

Other formalities having been disposed of the county chairman introduced the statement of accounts and balance sheet. He said that as the accounts had not been in the hands of clubs until Wednesday, delegates were entitled to ask to have consideration of them adjourned to a special convention and if they wished, the convention could be reconvened next Saturday. Delegates agreed, however to proceed with the full agenda and discuss the accounts.

Joe Byrne, Erin's Own, proposed that convention go into closed session to have the accounts discussed, but after the Chairman stated that there was nothing to hide, the meeting decided to proceed with an open dis-

The preamble to the accounts which were audited by the firm of O'Neill and Foley and Company, stated that proper books of accounts were not maintained and much reliance had been placed on representations of the officers. Because of the significance of these matters they were unable to form an opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view of the association affairs in the county as at November 30 last.

The Treasurer, James Walsh, said he was glad to have the opportunity of clearing the air on the matter and spoke about the difficulties he had in taking over from the previous treasurer and that two months elapsed before he got the books and that some of the questions put by the Audi-

tor related to that period. who were out of work for a Former treasurer Garry Cunningham said there was always a transition period in such circumstances and that try sum of £400 after being every book and record was out for a year and a half. handed over. Mr. Shane Lannon, representing the firm of Auditors replied to questions put by Garry Cunningham in relation to the manner in which accounts had been submitted during his period as county treasurer. Mr. Lannon was very forthright in responding to questions from the floor. The County Chairman said that in previous years we had our accounts certified by the accountants, whereas this year there was a full audit. Mr. Lannon replied that the rules of the association required his firm to audit accounts and that this was the practice in other counties.

Tony Mansfield, Abbeyside/Ballinacourty asked why the gate receipts were not tabulated in the same way as heretofore. James Walsh stated that these had been supplied to the accountants and would be available refund of travelling expensto delegates if they requested them. John Jackson asked why All-Ireland tickets were not listed and said a breakdown should be given. The auditor said that they would only be an in-and-out entry and would not effect the accounts, and that the amount that related to the complimentary tickets given to players, etc. was included with teams expenses, etc. When asked for a breakdown of the figures relating to the expenses of the various county teams, the folfigures lowing were announced - Senior hurling £19,000; Senior football £17,000; Under-21 hurling £15,000; Minor hurling £24,000 and others, including minor football, etc., was £16,000. These figures included two overnight accommodations for the minor teams in Dublin. The overnight accommodations cost in the region of £11,000 and this included travel, etc. Jim Greene said that a total of eighteen games had been played by the minor team last year.

John Lyons complained about the delay in paying out accident scheme pay-menst to players. Tony Mansfield said that these should be paid out on receipt from the Munster Council. James Tobin was very critical of the amounts paid by Munster Council to players

In response to a question about the overall position, the Auditor said that we now have a debt of approximately £85,000 and that finance should be given priority by the incoming Board as the situation is of grave concern. Income for the year showed a total of £205,000 which was mainly made up of £60,000 for our championships, £22,000 share of National Leagues, coaching grants amounted to £23,600, sponsorship and programmes £21,000, refund of

es at £26,000. On the expenditure side travelling expenses were listed for £103,000, administration £61,000, general expenses £14,000, coaching scheme £24,000, etc.

P/L/ insurance £20,000 and

The deficit for the year was £12,000 and we had received a special grant of £15,000 from the Munster Council. The financial report was then adopted.

SUPPORTERS CLUB

The statement from the Auditor said that this had been reviewed without carrying out an audit and arising from their view they were satisfied about its accuracy.

This showed total income of £13,953 from membership, corporate donations, sale of t-shirts, videos, cassettes and calendars, etc.

On the expenditure side it showed various allocations to county hurling and football teams, banquet expenses, purchase of t-shirts, stickers, flags, etc. and a surplus available for allocation.

The Chairman in referring to the role of the Supporters Club, in his address was critical of the amount which accrued to the Board and was disappointed that more money hads not been given over to the Board.

In response to this Tony

terford Supporters Club had played a significant role in supporting all our county teams in 1992 and said that they had played an enormous part in generating support and enthusiasm for our teams in the All-Ireland when it was most needed.

CHAIRMAN'S **ADDRESS**

The County Chairman in his very wide ranging 25-30 minute address dealt with all aspects of county activity during the year and was severely critical of sections of the Press.

In relation to the publication of copies of his address he said there was an embargo on certain sections of the media.

THE MOTIONS

There was a time when the motions on the agenda were regarded as the highlight of convention and the great debaters of the day were looked at with a kind of reverence and respect. Those days are long gone and nowadays motions are no longer taken very seriously and there is little or no heat generated in the discussions on whatever proposals come to be discussed. That was certainly the case here on Saturday night as all the 'steam' had gone out of the meeting after the discussion on the balance sheet and the elections.

Seven of the eight motions were proposed and they helped to keep the convention ticking over while we waited for the results.

The first motion was from Dunhill and delegate John Murphy moved that a special committee be set up at central level to review annually the Grant/Travel and Hotel expenses as set out in rule 92, of the official guide. There was no objection and the motion was passed unanimously.

The second motion was withdrawn and the next three sought to have the intermediate football championship run on a countywide basis. These stood in the name of Ring, Ballyduff East and Dunhill clubs, but as they were not matters to be decided at convention, they were referred to County Board in accordance with general rule. Nioclas Mac Craith, John Murphy, John O'Leary and Seamus Alyward were allowed to make their views known and all spoke strongly in favour of having the Senior Board take over these competitions from the Divisional Boards. A number did not agree, but

Mansfield said that the Wa- no vote was taken. The Chairman said that before the County Board took a decision on the matter that the motions should be discussed by the Divisional Boards who would advise their three representatives as to how they might vote on the issue when a decision was being

> Motion 7. Asked that no senior championship games be postponed because of intercounty championship involvement of any player or players and in the event of such a clash, county selectors have first claim on the services of players. This gave rise to some discussion and was declared lost on a vote.

Motion 6, from Dunhill asked that the senior championships be run on a knockout system with a losers group. One team from each group to rejoin the championship proper at the quarter final stage. This was pro-posed by John Murphy before being referred again to County Board.

The final motion which requested convention to allow a representative from County Bord na n-Og on the County Board (adult) was ruled out on a technicality after it was discovered the words "County Bord na n-Og" was inadvertently omitted from the motion.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

This was another tensioncharged phase of the meeting and up to the start supporters of the various candidates were making all sorts of predictions about the outcome of the elections. The results reflected the club allegiance for the candidates and there were some surpris-

Chairman - Four were nominated but when three of those withdrew, the chair was left to the outgoing officer Eamon O Murchu who was declared elected for the fifth successive term.

Secretary Seamus Grant, first elected in 1971 was declared elected unopposed as there was no other nomince.

Development Officer -John Fraher was also given a free run as was county P.R.O. John Jackson and Central Council delegate Seamus O'Brien.

All the other positions were contested.

Treasurer — James Walsh, the outgoing treasurer was opposed by Christy Dowling (both are joint treasurers of the Supporters Club) and the man in possession won on a vote of 102 to 54.

In thanking the delegates

who supported him, James said he would continue to serve the Board to the best of his ability and in congratulating the victor, Christy said that while defeat was always disappointing, it would not diminish his resolve to help the county in

every way possible.

Munster Council — There were three candidates and the result showed outgoing Tom Hennessey to have received 73 votes, Jimmy O'Gorman 54 votes and Jim Greene 27 votes. As the first two had exceeded the quota (52) they were declared to be elected. The change here is that Jimmy O'Gorman replaces Greg Fives who did not seek reelection. All three paid tribute to the Abbeyside/ Ballinacourty member, as did Brendan Tobin, for the tremendous work done on behalf of the Board during his two years in office.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The very lengthy and comprehensive report of Secretary Seamus Grant was passed over in a matter of just two minutes while the Chairman took the delegates through the ten page document, para-graph by paragraph. With so many references to our hurling success in this historic year, it was extraordinary that not one single comment was offered from the floor. The failure of delegates to speak on the report was criticised by Erin's Own delegate Joe Byrne who said it was a disgrace that such a fine report which had covered every aspect of the Board's affairs for the year should be disposed of in such a manner in a matter of a couple of minutes. He congratulated the secretary and did the County Chairman who was in agreement with Joe Byrne's comment.

The various awards for the past year were announced and apart from one of five recipients, there was no surprise.

The above will be presented with their awards at a special function which will take place within the next two weeks or so. Also at this function, the championship medals will be presented to the winning clubs.

REFEREES

Addressing convention about the crisis situation in refereeing at the present time, committee chairman Jim Landers said that if something did

not happen soon to improve the situation, the Boards could find themselves in serious trouble. He said this was more a matter for clubs than for the Boards as if they were not prepared to encourage members, young men and retired players, then they could not blame the Boards.

At the moment, he said, the number of top referees who were fully competent to handle senior championship games, could be counted on one hand.

He told convention that a meeting would be held soon and all clubs would be invited to send members who would be coached and encouraged to take up refereeing. If this does not work, he said, we will be in very serious trouble in running the championships. He appealed to players, officials and patrons to show great respect for the people who were doing the job at the moment.

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
