Bank's Reply To Closure Of Ballyduff Sub Office

Arising from a motion in the name of Cllr. J. Quirke calling on AIB to retain their sub office at Ballyduff, passed at the last meeting of Waterford County Council, the following letter was considered from Mr. Peter Hudson, AIB Regional Manager, Waterford at the Council's monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

"The decision to discontinue the attendance at the sub-office at Ballyduff has been taken following an in-depth analysis of the business it services and the upgrading of Banking facilities in West Waterford.

"The ongoing review of outlets can result in the opening of new outlets in some area and the closure

of others. From a security point of view outlets such as Ballyduff are vulnerable and accordingly we are very conscious of the safety and welfare of our customers and staff alike. This office alone has had to deal with five armed raids in our Region's Branches in the

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"Professional Agitators" In Attempt To Knock West Waterford Enterprise

When Cllr. W. McDonnell proposed a motion standing in his name at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday concerning a proposed new industry for West Waterford it was stated in the ensuing discussion that professional agitators had been engaged in an effort to knock the project.

Cllr. McDonnell's motion proposed that as senior planning officials of the Council were at present pro-

cessing an application for a mushroom plant at Knockanore in West Waterford to which he was aware objec-

tions had been raised, he asked that in the case of a balance existing in the decision it be tipped in favour of the applicant as the plant would employ 20 people when in operation.

Cllr. McDonnell said that he knew the plant was to be located on a scenic route between Tallow and Youghal and on that score he realised that some difficulties would arise. He understood that some 80 objections had been lodged to the application, the main number of which came from Cappoquin, Lismore and Youghal.

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Progress Report By West Waterford Development Partnership

The West Waterford Development Partnership Ltd. was established in 1991 with the aim of tackling the blight of unemployment, migration and emigration that has been all pervasive in the West Waterford region.

In the course of a Progress Report for 1992 the organisation stated that as the West Waterford area was predominantly rural it was decided to undertake two surveys, the first entitled "A Needs Assessment Survey of the Unemployed" was completed in August 1992 and the second, entitled "A Survey of Employers in the Area," was completed last December.

One of the comments on the first survey was that the majority of those interviewed had not worked abroad; that the number of returning emigrants and the continuing recession in foreign economies cited by many as a reason for not considering emigration, "suggested that the traditional safety valve of emigration will not be available, in the near future at least." This, it was added, could only mean that the numbers of unemployed in the West Waterford area, particularly rural areas, would continue to increase.

The Report, commenting on the result of the second survey, stated that the level of employers PRSI and employees tax payable was perceived to be an obstacle to increasing employment levels in the area. Since the tax burden was seen as such an obstacle to both employers and employees, it recommended that extra tax free allowances could be made

as a form of State subsidy towards employment.

"In conclusion therefore," the Report added, "the view of the employers expressed in the (second) survey is that there is a need for a more integrated package of assistance businesses, in particular from the State agencies, in a more co-ordinated manner."

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

With regard to future development the Report stated that the company considered Community Development as the bedrock and as a result from the outset they had linked into the FÁS Community Enterprise Programme.

The CEP had been established successfully in Cappoquin, Stradbally, Ballyduff Upper, Ardmore, The Nire Valley, Tallow and West Waterford Tourism while the following areas were being targeted for early 1993: Dungarvan, Lismore, Kilmacthomas. The basic programme would provide local groups in the designated areas who were interested in doing something for their own area with a "facilitator" who would help them to structure themselves, plan a way forward, bring local projects to fruition and develop strong community entities which could handle the local socio/economic challenges.

Under the heading "Employment Creation," the Report pointed out that to date, 23 people had been assisted to commence their own business and it forecast that 31 jobs would come on stream in the area from mid-February.

Minister Warns On Marketing Of Agri-Chemical Products

The Minister for Food & Horticulture, Mr. Brian O'Shea, T.D., stated last Thursday that a substantial responsibility was placed on the manufacturers of pharmaceutical and agri-chemical products to produce and market consumer and environmentally friendly products.

Consumers had major concerns, he said, about residues in food and the effect of chemicals in the environment and it was essential that EC and national legislation provided a mechanism to ensure the protection of the environment, the health of users of chemical products and ultimately of consumers of treated produce. "It is heartening to see that leading

companies are prepared to anticipate and meet the requirements of today's society before being obliged by law to do so, and in many cases exceeding the strict legal requirements," he said.

Minister O'Shea who was addressing the annual conference of distributors of CIBA products said that the Liability for Defective Products Act, 1991, introduces, for the first time, into Irish Law the concept of strict (no-fault) liability. This Act will impose liability on the producer and in certain circumstances, the supplier, for personal injury or damage caused by a defective product or component, irrespective of whether or not negligence was involved in its manufacture.

Údarás Report On Gaeltacht Employment

EMPLOYMENT INCREASES

Employment on the ground in Údarás na Gaeltachta supported companies in the Munster Gaeltachts (in Kerry, Cork and Waterford) remained stable at 863 jobs during 1992. Although 34 new jobs were created in Kerry, total job losses of almost the same amount in Cork and Waterford removed any gains.

JOB APPROVALS

A total of almost 200 new jobs were approved over the three counties, representing a State investment of £2.34m.

SIGNIFICANT DEVELOPMENTS

There were a number of significant developments during 1992. Through the activities of gCom Teo. "Telecottages" were established in Dingle and Oileán Chléire. (Under the EC STAR Programme).

MARINE RESOURCES

Turbot fishfarming trials on Oileán Chléire are indicating a very positive outcome. Údarás na Gaeltachta established, in a project in association with the local co-op and UCC, that it is technically feasible to grow

turbot to a marketable size in the Irish climate and that this valuable white fish can be economically produced in Ireland in certain cases.

An oyster packing centre was established in Ring and great interest has been generated in this project.

At year end £1.18m. in FEOGA grants were being administered for fish processing companies in the Kerry Gaeltacht.

SOCIAL EMPLOYMENT SCHEMES

Fourteen Social Employment schemes at a cost of £360,000 were administered in co-operation with local community groups and FÁS, employing 64 people (3 schemes in West Kerry, 4 in South Kerry, 3 in West Cork, 2 in Cape Clear and 1 in Ring).

TOURISM

An tÚdarás financially assisted the Cill Rialaig cultural tourism project in Uíbh Ráthac, South Kerry.

CAPITAL INVESTMENT

In the Kerry Gaeltacht, £1.85m. of expenditure was approved for factory and craft units. The principal construction projects involved were two factory units on the Industrial Estates in Bally Booley in Dingle, a 300 sq. metre advance factory unit in Clogane, two craft units in South Kerry and a 500 square metre advance factory in Old Parish. During the year a factory in Ballingearry in West Cork was converted into small enterprise units and four craft units were built in Ring.

Ardmore Man Jailed For Assaulting Fishery Officer

A 43-year-old man, whose behaviour towards officers of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board in Ardmore last July was described as "appalling and disgraceful," was sentenced to a total of seven months imprisonment by Judge Michael Pattwell at Youghal District Court last Friday.

The court heard that John Farrissey, College Road, Ardmore, had nine previous convictions for illegal salmon fishing and two for assaulting fishery officers.

Farrissey pleaded guilty to assaulting fishery officer Michael Bowes on July 1 and

using a fixed engine for the unlawful capture of salmon.

Mr. David Keane solr. prosecuting, said that on the occasion Farrissey picked up a slash hook and told fishery officers that they would not inspect his boat. He also invited the officers onto his boat to fight him.

Mr. Keane said Farrissey continued to wield the slash hook and he made an extremely derogatory remark to Fishery Officer Michael Fanning jnr. about the Ballycotton drowning tragedy of which he was a survivor.

Ms. Mary Ronayne solr. defending, said Farrissey got

very excited at the sight of the fishery officers but he didn't strike any of them with the slash hook.

Judge Pattwell said the fact that Farrissey passed a hurtful remark to Fishery Officer Fanning about the Ballycotton drowning tragedy made a bad matter a good deal worse.

"Your behaviour towards the officers on this day was appalling and disgraceful," the Judge told Farrissey. "You did decent, hardworking officers no credit on the day."

For assaulting fishery Officer Bowes the defendant was sentenced to five months imprisonment, and a concurrent one month sentence for the unlawful use of a fixed engine.

Later in the court Farrissey again pleaded guilty to unlawfully using a fixed engine and monofilament net for salmon fishing at Ardmore on July 8.

Sentencing Farrissey to a further two months to be served on expiry of the five months in addition to a three year disqualification from holding a salmon licence,

Judge Pattwell commented that just one week after confronting fishery officers with a slash hook he was again breaking the salmon fishing laws.

Two other defendants, Paul Dunne, College Road, Ardmore, and Edmond Fitzgerald, The Cliff, Ardmore, also pleaded guilty with Farrissey to illegal salmon fishing on July 1.

Dunne, who it was stated, had five previous convictions including two for obstructing fishery officers, was directed to undertake 10 hours community service in lieu of a one month prison sentence, if he is deemed suitable to undertake the work.

Additionally, he was ordered to pay costs totalling £181.50 and was disqualified from holding a salmon licence for three years.

Fitzgerald, who had two previous illegal salmon fishing convictions, was fined £100 with £181.50 costs for using a fixed engine, £100 for having unlawfully captured salmon in his possession, and he was also disqualified from holding a salmon licence for three years.

Having finished at Messrs. Moloney's they next proceeded to the premises of Miss Boyle, O'Connell Street where the same procedure was gone through. Next the soldiers

went to Miss Fuge's in Mary Street and did the same and in fact some of the furniture was thrown from the upper windows and smashed with the hammer in the street. A crowd was collecting at this stage but a shot was fired by the soldiers and this sent the people back. When finished the military formed into line and marched through Main Street to their barracks. Before the soldiers began to break up the furniture they imposed a levy of £100 on each of the parties named but payment in each case was refused. As can be imagined this sort of destruction made the military very unpopular with the local people and next week we will outline further destruction resulting directly from the Burgery Ambush.

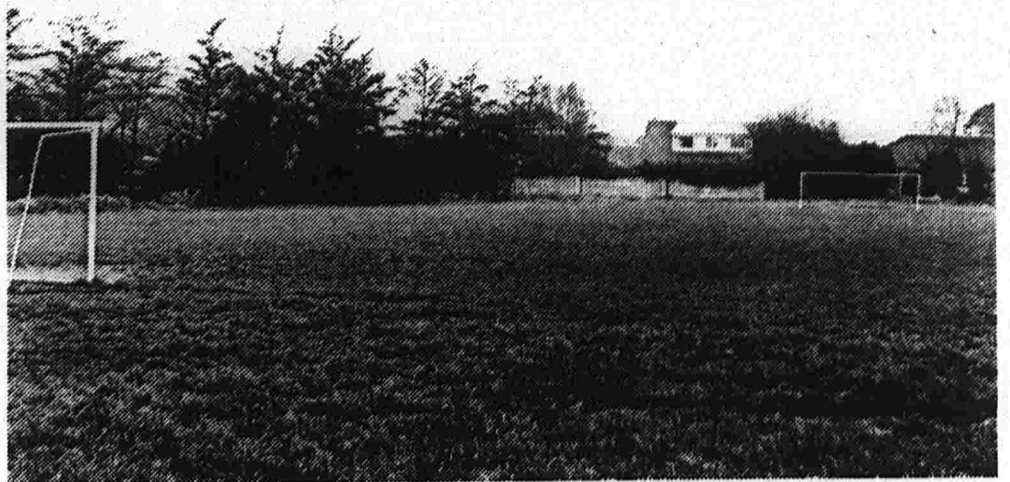

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

Beidh An Gaedhealg Ann Ar Ball

There was a very quick response to the letter from Siobhán Lincoln, Ardmore published in last week's "Leader." Siobhán's letter referred to the fact that the plaque commemorating the opening of the new road at the Sweep on the Youghal Road outside Dungarvan hadn't "as much as one word of Irish" and she said that it was a case of "shame on us all" that this was so.

The "Leader" with the letter was on the streets in Dungarvan on Wednesday of last week and within a few hours a phone call was received at our office explaining the position. The caller was Daithí O Cadhla, principal of the David Kiely Monumental Works, Dungarvan who cleared up the situation by stating that it was proposed to erect a second plaque which would be completely in Irish.

This was confirmed to us by both Deputy County Manager, Mr. Brian McNally and the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn with whom we discussed the matter following the month-

ly meeting of Waterford County Council last Monday.

It appears that the original plan envisaged that two plaques would be erected to commemorate the opening of the new road, one at the top in English and the second at the bottom in the vicinity of the junction with the road to Gaeltacht na Rinne which would, most appropriately, be in Irish.

The plaque in English at the top of the road was prepared and placed in position in time for the opening but the preparation of the Irish plaque was delayed as the inscription had been submitted to Bord na Gaeilge to ensure that it was word perfect as far as the Gaedhealg was concerned. It is hoped that this will be completed soon and the plaque will then be put in position on the roadside near the Ring cross.

In addition the importance of Irish will be enhanced when the artistic design to be called "Falla na Síoga" — the wall of the fairies, incorporating a limestone

loop, will be erected at the Lay-by on the road. We understand that the sculpture will be fashioned in such a manner that it will emit some ceol draiochta when the wind blows.

So now that has been cleared up and Siobhán Lincoln will, we are sure, be pleased about all this and to learn that indeed there will be no shame and that our national pride has not been forgotten or overlooked

where the Pulla Sweep is concerned.

We can therefore truthfully recite the lines:

Is Gael mise 'gus mise im'
Ghael,
Ní thuig liom gur náir dom e,
Ní chasfainn mo dhrom le fearaibh an tsaoghail,
Is ní fearr d'fher cách ná me!

Blown Out Of All Proportions

It's amazing what a small group can do when they become vociferous about a specific issue. This was brought home to us last week when we saw the issue of the all-male Fitzwilliam Lawn Tennis Club in Dublin hit our television screens and sprawled all over the front pages of our national daily papers. We were even more amazed when we saw a Cabinet Minister being televised making veiled threats of sanctions on any clubs which continued to refuse to open their doors to women.

The move last week was very evidently orchestrated by minority feminist groups and it really got our goat to watch how they went about making the issue one of national import as if the very status of women rested on their efforts to get the doors of the all-male club to open and admit women.

We are not concerned about Fitzwilliam LTC but about the attempts by these minority feminist groups to gate crash this or any other properly constituted man's club. These groups would like to see such a move made a national issue. It is

not a national issue nor even a public issue.

We are of opinion that any number of members of either sex has the right to form and run a club in a manner they see fit. In other words if men wish to form a club they should be perfectly entitled to do so just as women have the same right.

We cannot understand what motivates women to lay siege to these male preserves except that they see it as a challenge in their ongoing struggle to prove their equality with their male opposite numbers. We see nothing wrong in women having their own clubs and organisations such as the ICA. Men do not seek to infiltrate such clubs and the ladies, God bless them, in their turn are fully entitled to do their own thing in their own exclusive clubs without any male criticism.

The same should apply to any properly constituted all-male clubs and we cannot understand why such bruhaha is taking place about a matter which has now been blown out of all proportions.

Plan To Determine New Natural Heritage Areas

The Office of Public Works (OPW) have initiated a conservation plan beginning with a £2 million countrywide survey to determine new Natural Heritage Areas (NHAs) — places of special interest throughout the country.

Minister of State Noel Dempsey gave details of the survey and the conservation plan at a press conference held in Dublin last Thursday and said that the survey would identify an estimated 7 per cent of the Republic as NHAs which would include raised and blanket bogs, sand dunes, wetlands, estuaries, important bird sites and woodlands. Owners of such land will be eligible for farming grants provided they manage the land in an environmentally friendly way, he said. The special sites are commonly found in areas that have remained in a relatively natural state without which many species would become extinct.

Mr. Dempsey added that

there was no doubt that the farmer was the principal conservationist although he was not always given full credit for this role. He promised to push for the highest levels of compensation for those farmers affected.

The new system will replace the old Areas of Scientific Interest (ASIs) concerning which there has been some controversy recently and will start with a review of the ASIs which cover most of the important areas for conservation of Ireland's native flora and fauna. The carrying out and co-ordination of the survey will create 30 jobs.

The official advertisement from the OPW which was carried in last week's "Leader" asked farmers for their co-operation and help if an area on their land was involved in the survey. "When the survey is completed we will know a lot more about the unique natural heritage of our island," the OPW states.

Winners And Losers In Senate Race

The results of the Senate elections announced last week were referred to at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday when the Chairman Cllr. B. Kyne congratulated their Council colleague, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran, Clashmore on his fine showing in the election, the campaign for

which is reckoned to be the most gruelling and exhausting in public life.

Cllr. O'Halloran, a long-time Fine Gael member of the Council was having his first experience of an election at national level and running in the Cultural and Educational Panel he scored 49 votes which put him ahead of many old and experienced figures but not

high enough to secure election.

On the proposal of Cllr. Tom Cunningham, the Council also congratulated Ann Ormond, a teacher in Dublin who proved successful when she was one of the three women elected as a Fianna Fail member also on the Cultural and Educational Panel. Incidentally her first count poll

totalled 67 votes and she was declared elected on the 17th count.

Senator Ann is daughter of the late Sean Ormond, Kilmacthomas former Fianna Fail Minister for Posts and Telegraphs and she is sister of former TD and Senator Dr. Donal Ormond and of Mr. Sean Ormond, Pinewood Lawn, Monang, Abbeyside, Dungarvan.

1,000 Dairy Farmers Attend I.F.A. Protest In Waterford

A large contingent of Waterford dairy farmers led by Waterford I.F.A. dairy chairman, Gerald Curran and County chairman, Pat Murphy joined one thousand farmers from all over the South East to take part in I.F.A.'s milk quota protest rally in Waterford city on Monday last February 8. The protest at the EC Commission proposals to make permanent a 4 1/2%

cut in the national dairy quota without compensation took place a day before EC Farm Ministers met in Brussels.

The large crowd heard I.F.A. President, Alan Gillis, call on Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, TD to set down a marker to the Commission and to the other Farm Ministers on Tuesday as Irish dairy farmers would not be sacrificed.

"As far as we are concerned, this is the superlewy battle all over again. Our quota is our livelihood. Our milk is the life blood of rural Ireland. Quota asset stripping must stop", Mr. Gillis said. He stressed that the Minister must get the 4.5% temporary quota restored to Irish dairy farmers or, failing that, to get ongoing compensation for the reduction.

"While I have received nothing but encouragement from the Lismore Town Commissioners, Waterford County Council, Bord Fáilte and the Lismore Heritage and Experience Companies", says Jan, "my ambition is that this Festival will involve everyone, that it will be a community effort."

portantly in the hopes that some people will be prepared to take an active part in organising events, it has been arranged to hold a public meeting to this end at the Lismore Hotel on Thursday, Feb. 18 at 8.30 p.m.

At this meeting a request will be made to residents to offer — on a voluntary basis — bed and breakfast for visiting musicians both from Ireland and abroad. "If Cork can do it for its Choral Festival, why not Lismore and surrounding area?" asks Jan.

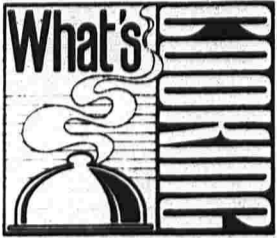

DELICIOUS LAMB BONE STEAKS WITH A TANG



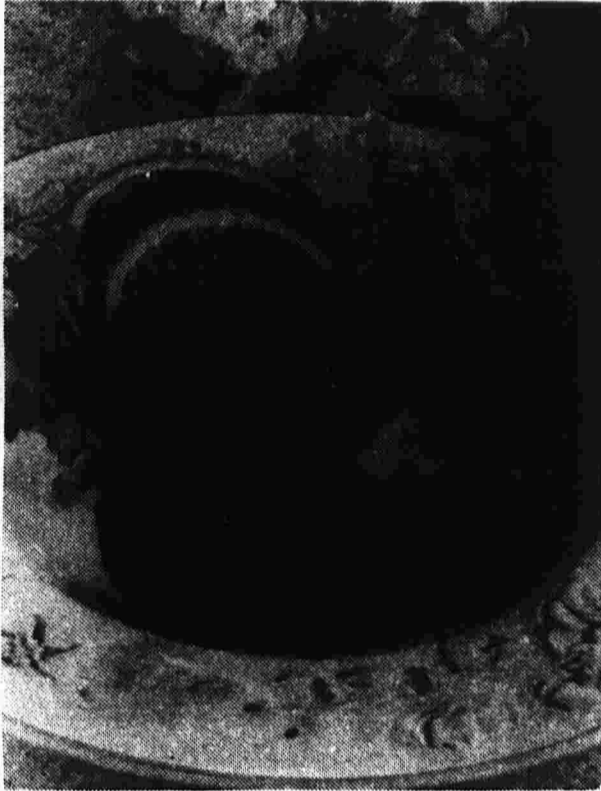
CITRUS & CINNAMON LEG BONE STEAKS

Ingredients:

4 lamb leg bone steaks
Grated rind and juice of
2 oranges
Grated rind and juice of
2 lemons
3/4 tsp ground cinnamon
2 tbsp oil
50g/2oz butter
black pepper

Method:

Trim lamb steaks and place in shallow dish. Blend together half the grated lemon and orange rind with all the juices, add the oil, 1/2 tsp cinnamon and some black pepper. Pour marinade over lamb, turn to coat then leave to marinate for at least 2 hours, turning occasionally. Meanwhile beat butter until soft then beat in remaining orange and lemon rinds and cinnamon. Pile onto a



piece of damp greaseproof paper, form in to a roll and using the paper as protection roll it into a sausage shape. Chill until required. Grill the leg bone steaks for 15-20 minutes turning frequently and basting

occasionally with the marinade until tender. Serve immediately with a slice of the blended butter on top so it melts and seeps into the lamb. Accompany by the vegetables of your choice. Serves 4.

Things To Plant If It's A Warm Dry February

NEVER mind those chilly winds and severe frosts, February can be dry, and sunny and the soil will start to dry and warm around mid-month.

Of course, picking the moment is tricky and early sowing will either waste seed or produce such weedy growth that you will wish you hadn't bothered.

However, if there are signs of warming and drying in the soil then you can think about planting:

● Broad beans — early varieties should be sown about two inches deep and six inches or more apart.

● Parsnips — preparations should go much deeper for parsnips. Use a dibber to drive holes a foot deep and about eight inches apart in a well-drained site.

These holes should then be 'loaded' with good crumbly loam before two seeds are placed in each one, about half an inch deep — discard the weaker of the two seedlings once they poke through the surface.

● Lettuces — these prefer light loams and will need a warm and sheltered spot if they are to get off to a healthy start. Little Gem lives up to its name and is highly recommended for early sowing.

Place the seeds in rows a foot apart and cover with a quarter of an inch of soil. Be ready to thin later to create gaps of about eight inches between plants.

● Potatoes — these can be made ready for planting in March. Buy seed tubers and stand them in wooden trays or card-

board egg trays with the eyes facing upwards and then place the trays in a cool

and airy place such as an unheated greenhouse so that they can sprout.

● Onions — Sow these under glass so that they can be planted in May.

● Peas and runner beans — make ready for these by over-filling trenches with well-rotted compost or manure topped with soil.

These will settle to produce the ideal soil texture for planting in April/May or even earlier for some pea varieties in warmer parts of the country.

● Garlic — warmer areas may also be able to support garlic, now more highly valued for cooking on this side of the Channel.

EARLY SUNSHINE

It needs early sunshine, so pick a good bright spot with well-drained soil conditioned with garden compost or manure. Plant cloves upright about a foot apart and covered by half an inch of soil. As you go about your planting, make sure you clear up any leaves and other vegetable debris which might encourage pests and particularly slugs.

Do that and you will not only give your seedlings a better chance but stop the pests getting a strong hold early in the growth cycle. — Arthur Hines.

WATERFORD G.A.A SUPPORTERS CLUB

Statement Issued By Executive Committee

In the County Chairman's address to the recent County Convention he stated that "only £1.65 out of my £10 and every other £10 collected in membership was ultimately expended on our teams" in reference to the expenditures of the Waterford GAA Supporters' Club. His figures are, of course, grossly inaccurate and distorted and coupled with other comments by him can

only be construed as an attempt to discredit the Waterford GAA Supporters' Club, and, cannot, therefore go unchallenged.

For the record, and, as the County Chairman is very well aware, £5,800 was collected in membership fees for the first 6 months of 1992. Of this, £2,300 was allocated directly to county hurling and football teams, plus a further £1,485 con-

tributed to the Victory Banquet for the minor and under 21 hurling teams. This alone totals £3,875 or £6.53 for every £10 membership. Another £1,800 was committed and since paid as a contribution by the Club to the new urgently required floodlights at Walsh Park which brings the total to £5,585 or £9.63 out of every £10 of membership fees. Maybe the County Chairman can explain the logic of his mathematics which does not stand up, and, is totally at variance with all of the facts.

The unwarranted outburst by County Chairman makes it very obvious to all supporters and members that, despite all of the genuine efforts of the Club in 1992 to support our county teams, that he has no understanding of the role of, and least of all, any appreciation for the Waterford Supporters' Club. Apart from its monetary contributions, the Club sought to organise and harness the great goodwill that exists towards our county teams by its many activities in 1992 — organising trains, providing tee shirts, banners, hats, flags, car stickers, audio tapes, videos, calendars, and, generally playing its part in the great atmosphere that was 1992.

Recently, it established a Jobs Placement Committee to ensure that our young men and women would find work at home, and, has already succeeded in placing a number of young players. And, of course, the club's Gala Victory Banquet at Jury's Hotel in October was acclaimed as an outstanding success and a unique and unparalleled night in the social history of the GAA in Waterford. The Club's 1993 budget envisages expenditure of over £16,000 on our county teams and with this level of commitment it is hard to appreciate why the County Chairman has seen fit to misrepresent our figures or to make such disparaging remarks against this club. There are many who will wish to have an answer to these questions and the onus is on the Chairman to explain his statements.

In the light of the above facts and inaccurate figures issued by the County Chairman, which could mislead our supporters and followers and in the interests of the GAA in Waterford, we now call on him to immediately publicly retract the statements he made at County Convention and to which as he then stated in his own words "there is no right of reply."

We would like to express our thanks to all the people who are participating in the draw and wish them every success. We also wish to thank the clubs, club co-ordinators and promoters who have given the project their

wholehearted support. Without their co-operation and good will, the draw would not have materialised. Club Co-ordinators have indicated they have canvassed all houses in their respective club areas but, on a few occasions, the occupants were absent. SENIOR FOOTBALL FINAL REPLAY ENDS ALL SQUARE AFTER EPIC CONTEST

Dungarvan And Rathgormack Teams Applauded At The End Of Thriller

DUNGARVAN 3-8 RATHGORMACK 2-11

What the thousands of excited and delighted supporters thought of this fine exhibition of football, courage and sportsmanship, was clearly expressed in the spontaneous ovation accorded both teams when referee John Kelly whistled the game to a stop after 90 minutes of excitement and enjoyment at Walsh park on last Sunday afternoon.

People with long memories may argue that there were county finals as good at some time in the past, but it would be difficult to find the one who could name a game where there was excitement comparable to what was experienced at the city venue during the 94 minutes of football in the ideal conditions which prevailed on last Sunday afternoon.

It was the first time in our history that a football final replay did not reach a conclusion after extra time was played and the mood of the huge crowd leaving the field clearly reflected their delight that both of those fine teams had lived to fight another day. Claims will be made that each side, for whatever reason, should have won, but in the overall, it would have been a travesty of justice if one of them had lost. It was a test of courage, endurance and sportsmanship and both came through with flying colours and hopefully when the saga resumes at the same venue on next Sunday week, that our enjoyment of the game will be just as good.

In many ways the replay followed the same pattern as the drawn match in that the champions seemed on course for their three-in-a-row, when the challengers began their fight back to equalise in the dying seconds.

In the extra-time period,

Dungarvan scored three points in the first half, while Rathgormack replied with a single score to leave the champions two points up with fifteen minutes of time remaining. The challengers fought back for the two scores that rescued them from defeat and the champions did not score in this period.

The first hour's football showed a remarkable similarity to the drawn game as in the 57th minute Dungarvan were a clear five points in front (3-5 to 1-6), when Rathgormack's grandstand finished began to take shape and resulted in the equalising scores. Dungarvan's disappointment at not being able to hold this lead was matched by the disappointment of Rathgormack's failure to register scores from close in frees in the early part of the match. These are some of the many aspects of the county final that will be discussed over and over until they meet again in the next episode of this delightful saga on Sunday week.

PLAY

Dungarvan, defending the city end, were first into attack, but a Brendan Curry clearance sent Rathgormack into attack and a pointed free by Finbarr Crotty put them in front in the 2nd. minute. A minute later Crotty sent wide from another free. Dermot Callaghan passed to Morrie Ferncombe who sent the ball inches wide but a

minute later made no mistake with his free and this put the teams level in the 6th min. Denis McGrath passed to David Burke who in turn sent over to give the champions a one point lead in the 9th minute.

Ger Power operating now on the right wing sent in a lobbing ball which was expertly fisted to the net by brother Martin for the first goal of the match. Dungarvan won the kick-out and Eddie Burke laid it on for Morrie Ferncombe who rattled the net to put Dungarvan back in front in the 13th minute.

Peter Ferncombe pointed a free and a minute later Finbarr Crotty sent wide from a free in a scoreable position in the 23rd min. Ger Power brought one back for Rathgormack with a fine score from play and a minute later (25th min.) Peter Ferncombe had the final point of this half to leave the interval situation 1-4 to 1-2 in favour of the champions.

Within two minutes of the restart, Ger Beresford won a ball from two opponents and crossed to Peter Ferncombe who shot to the net to make it double scores for Dungarvan. Two attacks by Rathgormack resulted in two wides before Finbarr Crotty opened their second half account with a pointed free in the 38th min. Ger Power sent inches wide in the 39th but having collected the ball from the kick out sent a return shot which was deflected over the bar to narrow the gap to a single goal (2-4 to 1-4) in the 40th min.

ON DEFENSIVE

The next fifteen minutes saw the champions more on the defensive as Rathgormack took over, but their resolute defence with Darrell Donnelly, Dermot Dee, Bobby Lyons, Eddie Burke, team captain Martin Sheehan and Martin Houlihan giving it their all, the challengers failed to make the kind of headway on the scoreboard, which their efforts deserved. Finbarr Crotty pointed a 44th. minute free and only two points separated the contestants that might have been wiped out by Ger

Power and Joe Murray who sent wide. Full forward, Sean Power (who had missed the drawn game) had a fine score to narrow the gap to the minimum in the 53rd min. Derek Lyons fielded the ball on the kick-out, sent to Dermot Callaghan who in turn laid it on for Peter Ferncombe who got Dungarvan's most relieving goal of the game and restored a four points lead in the 55th min. The champions had gone for 23 minutes without a score when this one came. There was only three minutes of normal time remaining when a splendid effort by John Ferncombe made way for Ger Beresford's fine score which looked like being the 'insurance point' for the champions. Ironically the next three scores were for Rathgormack. A point by Ger Power in the 58th minute, didn't seem enough to sparkle a resurgence for the challengers who were now trailing by four points and the game due to go into injury time. Then disaster struck for the champions, when substitute Declan Whelan broke through for a Rathgormack goal, seconds into injury time and the point that sent the replay to extra time was scored by Finbarr Crotty who had the first and last score of the game. It was 3-5 for Dungarvan and 2-8 for Rathgormack when time was blown.

EXTRA TIME

In accordance with general rule, extra time had to be played and after a ten minute break the game resumed. Expectations at this point were that it would be a case of the survival of the fittest (jungle law), but when it got underway, neither side showed signs of leg-weariness, but the game was a bit slower than the fast hectic pace which was a feature of the previous hour. This period of the replay was marked by splendid saves by both keepers, when Pat Fahy in goal for Rathgormack saved a rocket from Morrie Ferncombe with David O'Connor making a spectacular save on the line about 10 minutes from the end.

In the 2nd minute Peter Ferncombe pointed a free to give the Blues the lead and their second score came when brother Morrie pointed another free. Rathgormack were twice wide of the mark for scores before Finbarr Crotty had a point from a placed ball. Then just a minute before the break Dermot Callaghan had a nice point (which was the

final score for the champions) to leave the score 3-8 to 2-9 at the interval.

In the second period of extra time Rathgormack had an eight minute point and with four minutes remaining Ger Power had the point which had the teams level once again and for the final time in this epic.

John Kelly handled the game very fairly, was always up with the play and well in control throughout.

The only complaint that can be voiced related to the problem of patrons on the sideline moving out on to the line during a late stage in the game and making it difficult for the Press people to observe the full field of play.

Including the two halftimes and three 'throw-ins' this makes a total of 145 stoppages overall for the 90 minutes, and is somewhat less than in the drawn match.

Because of injury time stoppages the replay had a duration of 64 minutes and 10 seconds on the Press stop-watches. The extra time went just a few seconds over the allotted 30 minutes.

For the final, Rathgormack wore a strip sponsored by "O'Shea's Shoes" and Dungarvan had their strip presented by the "All-Rounder Sports Shop."

The match parade was led by the Bonmahon Band. The gate receipts were £6,500.

Waterford Footballers Take On Munster Champions Clare In N.L. Game At Fraher Field

Seniors Hurlers Play Limerick In Tournament At Cappoquin

Everyone will agree that having two important inter county fixtures, both of which are attractive in their own right, staged at venues so very close to each other on the same afternoon, is not a good idea. The programme will pose a problem for many people who will wish to see both matches, even though the hurling game against Limerick is only a tournament.

The visit of the Munster champions, Clare to Dungarvan to play Waterford in round five of the National Football League, is the important one and will undoubtedly attract great support. To-date Waterford have fared quite well

against a number of the top football counties in the country and they have prepared very well to meet this challenge. Their performance will be watched with great interest and the game will give us a pointer to our Munster championship

prospects later in the season. Some years ago we were able to beat Clare and many football followers will recall our epic encounter in the McGrath Cup home final which was decided in our favour after extra-time in a replay.

In the 1990 provincial championship Waterford lost to Clare by 0-13 to 0-9, but later in the same year we travelled to Ennis and beat the Banner countymen on their home ground.

In the two years since then, Clare have risen to great heights and defeating the mighty Kerry in last year's Munster final proved to be no fluke when they later gave a great account of themselves in the All-Ireland semi-final against Dublin at Croke Park. It is interesting to note after all that, that in the McGrath Cup semi-final at Limerick last year Clare were a trifle lucky to come out winners after a thriller in which we lost by 2-7 to 1-7. So in spite of their present very high profile as a football force, there cannot be a great difference in standards between us.

In the present National League Waterford have shown improved standards, even though we have not won a single game. The quality of the opposition this year is much higher than in previous years and for us it has been a welcome experience in being in the same group as some of the leading counties.

In our first game we were very much understrength when losing by 1-8 to 1-6 against Westmeath at Portlaw and we were also without a number of our top players when losing, again by two points, to Roscommon at their Kilttoon venue (0-9 to 0-7).

In our next game we took on the 1990 All-Ireland champions Meath at Walsh Park and were doing very well until running out of steam in the closing stages and allowing the visitors through for vital scores to give them a flattering 2-9 to 0-6 victory. Our final match before Christmas saw our footballers play some splendid football against Offaly at Tullamore before losing by 1-10 to 0-10.

Following on to such re-

spectable performances, the panel got into serious training for the remaining rounds against Clare, Monahan and the 1991 All-Ireland champions, Down. The Clare and Down matches are fixed for Dungarvan and we travel away for the other one.

For Sunday's clash, the selectors are hopeful of having a full panel to select from and if so, this will be the first time since the start of this league that we will field at full strength. It is possible, of course, that the Rathgormack and Dungarvan players on the panel may not be available because of the replay of the final on the following Sunday.

The team to do duty will be selected in time and will appear elsewhere in the "Leader".

HURLERS IN CAPPOQUIN

It is certain that the line out will see a number of changes from the side which lost heavily to Kilkenny in Nolan Park on last Sunday week. Limerick have promised to field their strongest side and will be favourites to win, as they did in the championship at Thurles last year.

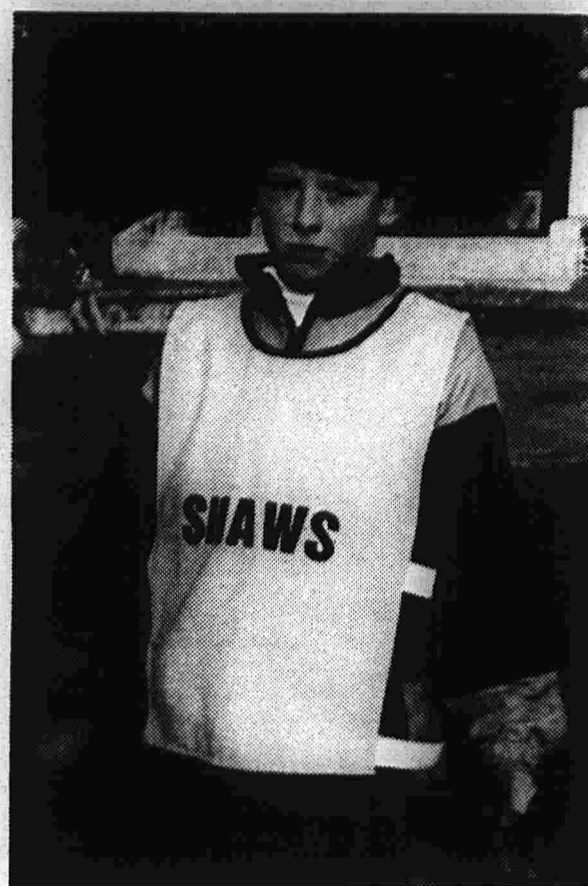
Like us they are doing well in the League and may meet us again at a later stage in the knockout section.

"The peculiar aspect of the objections," said Cllr. McDonnell, "is that they were all on similar headed notepaper with the same typescript but signed by different people. It would seem that many of those who signed these objections don't even know where the plant is to be located nor do they know what they are talking about. In the circumstances I hope that the decision will be in favour of the applicant."

Cllr. O. Wilkinson said that a number of jobs which could eventually be well in excess of 20 were at stake where this project was concerned and he was aware that the objections lodged had been orchestrated by a man who travelled around the district collecting names. He wondered, in the circumstances, if the people who signed as objectors really knew what they were objecting to as there would be no smell nor any pollution which would give people any reason to object. "In the circumstances," said Cllr. Wilkinson, "I would have no objection in recommending to the Planning Engineers that they should grant this application which would provide a bright spark in a dull environment."

SOARING UNEMPLOYMENT

Cllr. P. Kenneally said that professional agitators from Youghal were involved in collecting the objections. People of that kind tried to stop such developments wherever they were to take place. They cost a lot of jobs to the Killeagh area and we must remember that we are now in an era of soaring unemployment, he said.

Cllr. J. Quirke thought it was unfair to have such people going around collecting the names for objections and Cllr. Nora Flynn

said that it should go out loud and clear from the meeting that people should take stock of what they are being asked to sign before doing so. "Two people have since come to me wanting to withdraw their names as they did not realise what they had signed," she said,

adding "jobs are at stake where they are very badly needed here."

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer said that the conflicting views involved would have to be taken into consideration in reaching a decision in the matter. A very detailed analysis of the

position was being made by the Planning Officers and a recommendation would then be submitted to the Manager who would make the final decision. "I hope," said the Co. Engineer, "that this decision will be able to meet the views expressed by the Council members."
