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FAS Assisted 2,079 Unemployed In County Last Year

In an end of year report for 1992 issued last Monday FÁS South East Region reported that 2,079 unemployed persons were directly assisted in County Waterford last year.

During the year direct expenditure by the organisation in the county amounted to £4.5 million. A total of 858 persons completed training courses, most in Waterford Training Centre and some in External Training courses covering engineering, electronics, construction and computing. A total of 583 persons completed temporary employment schemes of which 256 were on Social Employment Schemes. The lat-

ter included school caretakers, services for the handi-

capped and environmental improvements.

The report went on to state that FÁS placed 683 job seekers in jobs through its Employment Services Of-

Echo Of Summertime Fracas In Dungarvan As 8 Are Sent For Trial

A serious fracas at Shandon road, Dungarvan in the early hours of June 20 last which left 12 people from the Kilmacthomas area injured and ten of them subsequently hospitalised, was recalled at Dungarvan District Court.

Eight defendants, including one juvenile, all from Dungarvan, were returned for trial by Judge M. Pattwell to the next sittings of Waterford Circuit Criminal Court on multiple charges of assault occasioning actual bodily harm and causing a riotous assembly.

The accused are: Edmond Kirby (26) and Brian Kirby (20), both of 18 Cathal Brugha Place; Danny Wade (23), 12 Upper King Street, Abbey-side; Liam O'Keeffe (17), 111 Childers Estate; Tristan Holt (17), 68 Childers Estate; Darren Lyons (17), 16 Byrneville; Paul Power (17), 48 Kyne Park, Abbeyside and a 16 year old juvenile.

Edward Kirby has also been returned for trial on additional charges of having

offensive weapons, a broken bottle and wooden baton, with intent to intimidate or cause injury.

Brian Kirby, Wade, Power,

Lyons and Holt have been returned for trial on a charge of having an offensive weapon, a wooden baton, also with intent to intimidate

or cause injury.

All eight accused, who have been granted free legal aid, were remanded on their own bail of £250.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION — Who decides whether I am entitled to a Medical Card and on what basis are they given?

ANSWER — Medical Cards are given to people who, in the opinion of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the Health Board are unable, without undue hardship, to afford medical services for themselves and their dependents.

The Health Boards in consultation with the Department of Health have laid down guidelines to assist the CEO in making her/his decision. These guidelines are not legally binding — they are for guidance only. In some cases Medical Cards can be given to people whose income is above the guidelines. This happens if the CEO is satisfied that the person has exceptionally high medical expenses.

The following are the guidelines in operation since 1st January 1993:

FURTHER ALLOWANCES

Outgoings on house in excess of £14 per week, e.g. if you pay £30 per week rent, you will be allowed to deduct £16 per week from your income in deciding whether you are eligible for a Medical Card. Reasonable expenses in excess of £12.50 per week incurred in travelling to work may be taken into account. In general, no allowances are made for income tax or other expenses, other than those described here.

GATT A Major Threat To Jobs Says Waterford Foods Chief

The GATT agreement in its present format will threaten jobs and the livelihoods of farm families in Ireland, according to Mossie Nealon, Assistant Executive of Waterford Foods. Mr. Nealon was addressing a recent meeting of Waterford IFA on the topic of GATT. He outlined how GATT would mean a 3.4% quota cut, which for Waterford Foods would mean 7.5 million gallons less. This in turn would mean 100 less jobs in Waterford Foods alone, a reduction of £7.5 million in turnover and an

unknown number of farm families being threatened.

Mr. Con Lucey, Chief Economist with the IFA outlined the likely affects of GATT to farming. He noted that many of the present subsidy and premium payments may be reduced or eliminated under GATT, as they did not fall into what is termed the "green box."

The Chairman of the meeting, Pat Murphy, Waterford County Chairman, said that the large crowd was indicative of the real concerns of farmers about their future in farming.

Lawlor's Hotel Among Britvic Award Winners

Gleeson's Pub in Clonmel is the national winner of the 1992 Britvic 55 Pub Challenge in aid of the Irish Cancer Society. Irene and Tom Gleeson, together with their staff and customers, raised £7,000 for cancer research through a series of fund raising events which included a fashion show in which customers were the models, sponsored soccer matches, table quizzes, raffles and a sponsored fast.

The Gleesons were presented with a plaque to

mark their achievement by Dr. John Murphy, Chairman of the Irish Cancer Society, at a reception in Dublin last week. They were also presented with a voucher for a holiday for two in Florida.

County winners were also presented with Certificates of Appreciation and the Waterford County winner was Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan. In all some £50,000 was raised for cancer research by pubs around the country who participated in the 1992 Britvic 55 Challenge.

Youth's Sex Attack On Young Boy Again Adjourned

At Dungarvan District Court last week Judge M. Pattwell refused jurisdiction in a case in which a 15-year-old youth has pleaded guilty to sexually assaulting a six-year-old boy.

Judge Pattwell told the Court that he was greatly concerned at even being asked to accept jurisdiction in the case despite the consent of the Director of Public Prosecutions for it to be dealt with on a plea of guilty in the District Court.

Garda Inspector M. Blake told Judge Pattwell that the local youth had committed the sexual assault on the boy as he played in the grounds of the Presentation Convent. The victim had suffered injury and the incident has had very traumatic consequences for him.

After reading a report from the young boy's doctor, Judge Pattwell addressed his mother and asked her to help him. "How do you feel about the case not being disposed of here and perhaps ending up in another court?"

The mother replied that while her son is only six years old he knows what is going on. "He even knows the court case is on today," she said.

She also disclosed that her son is now taking anti-depressant medicine. "The incident has had an awful effect on him," she added.

Following a recess Judge Pattwell confirmed his refusal to accept jurisdiction and adjourned the matter to the next Dungarvan District Court on February 24.

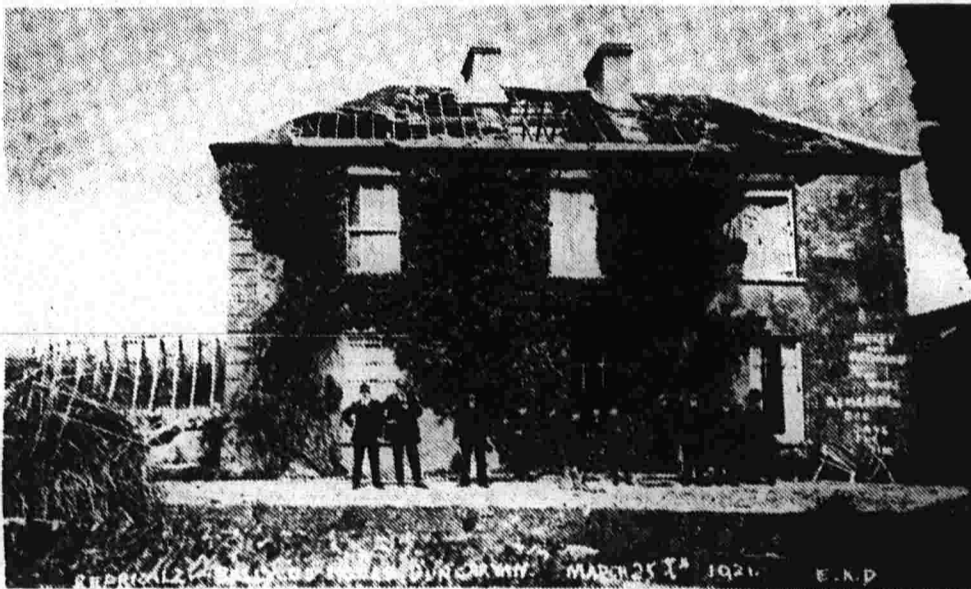

Burgery Ambush Reprisals — Destruction Of Property

Last week we gave an account of the destruction of furniture in business premises in the town which were reprisals for the Burgery Ambush. Further reprisals took place in the Abbeyside area. At about mid-day on Good Friday two military lorries left Dungarvan by the Square and drove in the direction of Abbeyside. They turned left for Ballycoe and their destination was the residence of Mrs. Dunlea, which was about one and a half miles from

the town. Mrs. Dunlea was a widow and she lived in Ballycoe with her two daughters. The lorries drove up the long winding avenue and halted outside the front door. All the occupants were ordered out by the officer in charge and the soldiers went inside. The beautiful piano was the first item to be smashed to pieces. The soldiers then went from room to room wrecking all the furniture until it was all destroyed. Next they directed their efforts to the outside.

The flowers and shrubs were cut down as were the fruit trees in the fruit garden. The hall door and windows were smashed and the same happened to all the glass in the conservatory. The military then procured a tall ladder, went on to the roof of the dwelling and hacked and broke all the slates. The fine habitation as can be seen from the photograph was a complete ruin. Further reprisals took place some of which will be outlined next week.

Polling Scheme For Elections A Matter For Co. Council

At the January meeting of Waterford County Council, a motion in the name of Cllr. R. Walsh requesting that the County Registrar meet the Council to discuss the completely unsatisfactory positioning of polling booths, particularly in Abbeyside in recent elections came up for discussion. A number of Councillors also referred to the unsuitability in other areas. It was then decided that the County Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally would prepare a report on the entire polling scheme as it exists for the next meeting.

This report came before the February monthly meeting of the Council held last week in Dungarvan and in it, the County Secretary dealt with the matter in a most comprehensive fashion.

Mr. McNally then commented on the specific matters raised at the previous meeting and in conclusion stated "the making of a Polling Scheme is a reserved function of the Council. If the Council consider that the existing scheme be revised, then the process can be arranged. The majority of the queries raised arising from Cllr. Walsh's motion are matters for decision by the Council and not for the County Registrar or Returning Officer."

Cllr. Walsh complimented the Co. Secretary on the excellence of the report and said that he was very pleased with it. He again expressed the view that the polling station now located at the Tennis Pavilion should be done away with and all the people of Abbeyside should vote at Abbeyside School as there was plenty of room to locate all the necessary booths there.

The Co. Secretary then pointed out that it took 7 years to get the last polling scheme for the county approved. It was a matter of

the Returning Officer to use what suitable buildings were available at the time of elections as circumstances could change from year to year. Under existing

legislation polling schemes were subject to review every 10 years.

Finally it was agreed that Councillors seeking changes in their areas

should submit their suggestions in writing to the County Secretary who would then refer them to the County Registrar for his observations.

Cllr. Seeks Removal Of Dangerous Bridge

At the February monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last week, Cllr. O. Coffey said that as the Quigley Magnesite plant at Ballinacourty was now being dismantled he thought the spur-line rail link with the site over which the raw material was brought from Bennetsbridge, Co. Kilkenny to Ballinacourty could also be removed.

He raised the matter as he thought the removal of the rail line would allow the dangerous road bridge known as the Crooked

Bridge at Garrynageragh to finally be demolished and the road there to be re-aligned.

Mr. John O'Flynn, Co. Engineer, pointed out that the rail line made the site at Ballinacourty very valuable as it could be again repaired and put into use, if needed. He said that the bridge referred to could be demolished and the road realigned and a level-crossing facility to cross the rail line provided. He undertook to write to the Company to inquire as to their intentions with regard to the Ballinacourty site.

BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

DRIVE FOR CARDIAC EQUIPMENT

Fundraising has begun to provide seven ambulances in South Tipperary/West Waterford with vital Cardiac Equipment. £70,000 is needed (£10,000 for each ambulance). The first fundraising venture is an attractive senior hurling game between Tipperary and Waterford in Clonmel on Sun-

day, February 21. If we can get a good crowd we could make enough on the day to equip one ambulance says Clonmel-based Ambulance Transport Supervisor, Benny Walsh, who is also Vice-Chairman of the South Tipperary Cardiac Ambulance Committee. Benny hails from Barra

Shinnane, Ballymacarbry.

The equipment needed for the seven ambulances based in Clonmel and Cashel are Heart Start Automatic Defibrillators which begin to analyse a patient's heart signal from the instant the power is switched on. This equipment can be lifesaving as early analysis of a heart condition is vital. Surveys have shown that 12,500 people die each year in Ireland from heart attack and

it is now proved that 50% of these can be saved. The equipment is being used extensively in the UK and Northern Ireland and last year in Dublin, Cork and the West of Ireland, but not so far in South Tipperary where the ambulance service covers a large portion of West Waterford. With this new equipment we could provide a better service says Mr. Walsh. Early treatment to heart problems is the key to saving lives.

PENSMAN Takes You Behind The SPOTLIGHT

NA CLOCHA FUAIMEACH ON BEARNA NA GAOITHE

As promised last week we return to the subject of the plaque in Gaelic and "Falla Na Sióga" at the realigned road at the Sweep on the Youghal Road outside Dungarvan. The plaque with its inscription as Gaedhealg has now been completed by the David Kiely Monumental works and has been placed in position at the start of the new road on the Dungarvan side.

The "Falla Na Sióga" or Wall of the Fairies, embodying a central loop element, designed by sculptor and stonemason Alan Counihan who has a holiday home in Clashmore will be located at a lay-by on the new road. The artist has designed a sculpture set to enrich the spectacular view from the high ground looking out over the river valley, the bay, the Monavullaghs and the distant Comeraghs.

"The sculpture", he says, "will be the lay-by as in my design I have transformed the total space of the lay-by so that stopping here will be a very special experience. Towards the ends of the lay-by and particularly in its corners the wall will be broken by large boulders and seating slabs to create informal picnic areas where car traffic is least likely".

The artist goes on to further describe what he calls an interactive piece of sculpture by saying that three of the boulders will be split, hollowed and reassembled with small wind holes drilled in their upper portions. Wind chimes shall be hung inside so that on windy days (more often than not) music can be heard coming from them. "For centuries", he then states, "they've had 'An Cloch Labhrais' over at the Pike. Now we can have 'Na Clocha Fuaimeach', the

singing stones on Bearna na Gaoithe. And this will comprise "Falla Na Sióga".

Work on the sculpture which will cost £18,000 is due to commence this

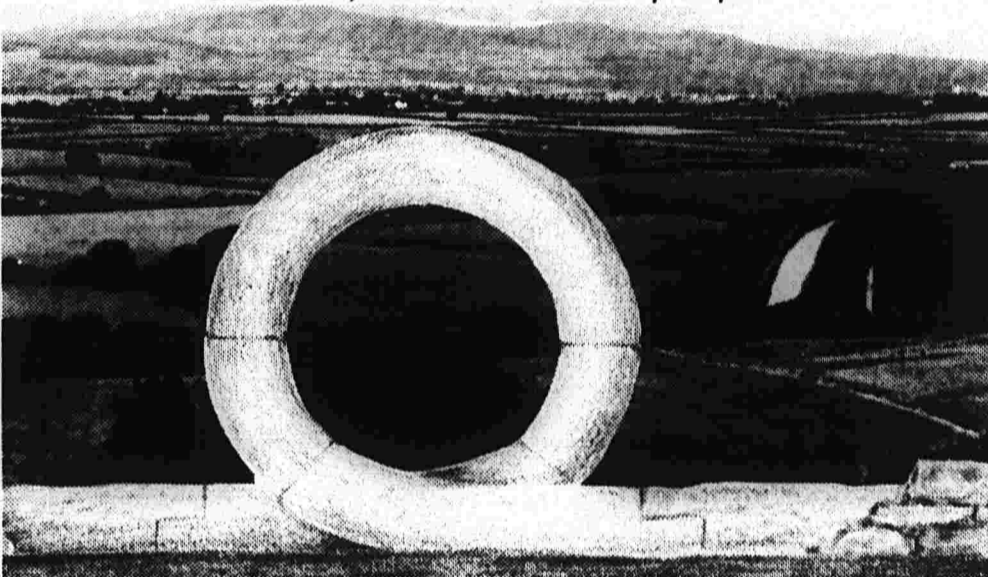
month. When completed it is claimed that it will be a beautiful, original and popular sculpture and that there won't be a lay-by like it in the country, not to mention

the continent.

JOBLESS TOTAL CONTINUES TO RISE

Those of us who watched the *Late Late Show*, or parts of it, last Friday night could not be but deeply disturbed by the doleful sight of a large group of unemployed people, some from Dungarvan, who expressed their desperation at being unable to obtain work and their despair at the bleak future facing them with no prospect of any kind of a job. It was a scene of utter desperation and reflected the doom and gloom which is widespread throughout the country now.

And the Government Minister, Dr. Woods who appeared as a panel member on the show typified the inept-

ness of the government in coping with the unemployment crisis. There was nothing new or hopeful in the old arguments that he put forward in reply to the desperate people who spoke about how they had to cope without any jobs or even the prospect of one.

And the jobless total in the country continues to soar with an admitted 302,000 now on the dole. Of that terrible total there are 7,630 registered in Waterford City, 1,251 in Dungarvan and 2,343 in Clonmel!

How long more can people be expected to put up with this awful state of affairs?

PLANNING PERMISSION FOR KNOCKANORE PROJECT APPROVED

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, made an order last Thursday granting full planning permission to Mr. Thomas J. Murphy for a mushroom growing plant to be located at Knockanore, Tallow. The order came in the wake of a meeting of Waterford County Council at which efforts to knock the development were discussed, the report of which was a front page story in last week's "Leader".

During the County Council discussion at the meeting on the previous Monday,

local West Waterford Councillors alleged that the bulk of some 80 objections lodged to the proposal had been put forward as the result of an orchestrated campaign in which professional agitators were engaged.

The matter was raised initially by Tallow Councillor Willie McDonnell who proposed that in the case of a balance existing in the recommendations of the Council's senior planning officials, it be tipped in favour of the applicant as the plant, when in operation would in the beginning pro-

vide employment for 20 people. He was fully supported by the other local Councillors Nora Flynn, Ollie Wilkinson and Jimmy Quirke who all rejected the case made by the objectors that the plant would create effluent and pollution problems in a high amenity area on the scenic Blackwater Valley route between Tallow and Youghal.

The decision of the County Manager to grant full planning permission for the project has received a wide welcome in that area of West Waterford in

view of the employment it will provide while the local Councillors who turned the spotlight on the campaign mounted by the objectors have all expressed themselves as unreservedly pleased with the outcome.

It now remains to be seen whether or not the County Manager's decision in the case will become the subject of an appeal to An Bórd Pleanála and in the event that such will not happen it is hoped that the development will go ahead without undue delay.

This Is A Tasty Soup Ideal For Cold Days



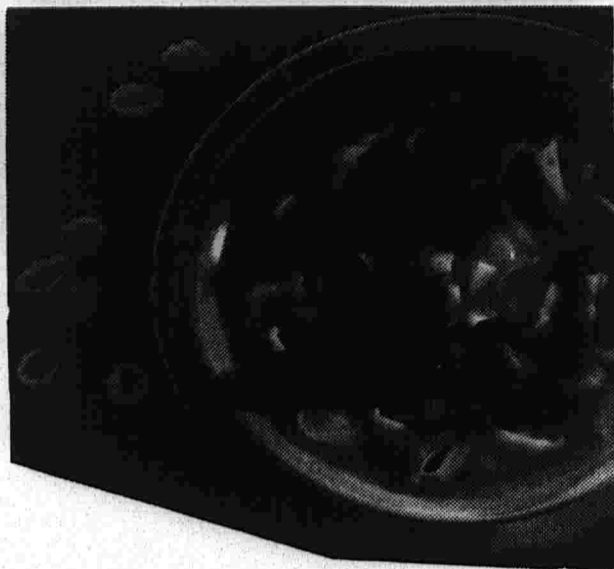
MUSSELS & PASTA SOUP

Ingredients:

2 lbs (900g) fresh mussels, washed and debearded
1 tablespoon (15ml) oil
1 large onion, sliced
1 dessertspoon (10ml) garlic sauce
4 sticks celery, sliced
8oz (225g) carrots, finely chopped
2 pints (1 1/4 litres) fish or vegetable stock
1 x 15oz (425g) can chickpeas, drained
4oz (125g) pasta shells salt and pepper

Method:

Heat the oil in a large pan. Cook the onion until it is



soft and transparent. Stir in the garlic sauce, celery and carrots and cook for a further 3-4 minutes. Add the stock and chickpeas, cover and simmer until the vegetables are tender.

Stir in the pasta shells and continue to simmer

until almost cooked. Add the mussels to the soup, cover and cook for 5-6 minutes, or until the mussel shells have opened. (Discard any that have not). Season and serve immediately with chunks of crusty bread.

Crusade of Prayer for Vocations

The Irish Augustinians are to celebrate the Beatification of William Tirry, OSA, by launching a national 'Crusade of Prayer' for vocations to the priesthood and religious life.

Blessed William Tirry, who was born in Cork, was one of the 17 Irish martyrs beatified by Pope John Paul II in Rome last September.

The purpose of this 'crusade,' which will take the form of an hour's adoration of the Blessed Sacrament weekly in all 17 Augustinian churches throughout the country, to highlight the importance of the Eucharist and, consequently, the priesthood. If there are no priests there cannot be a Eucharist — the central act of worship of the Catholic

Faith.

William Tirry was arrested as he was about to celebrate the Eucharist on Holy Saturday night. This crusade of prayer for vocations is to ensure that there will always be an Augustinian priest ready to step in and celebrate the Eucharist which Blessed William was prevented from celebrating.

The 'crusade' will begin with a special Concelebrated Mass at The Abbey in Fethard, Co. Tipperary, on Sunday, February 21, where the remains of Fr. Tirry were laid to rest after his execution. This will be followed by an hour's adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, simultaneously, in all Augustinian churches nationwide, beginning dur-

ing the first week of Lent.

This will create a situation whereby people from all ends of the country can gather together, in prayer, linked by a common cause.

The church in Ireland in recent times has suffered through human frailty and confusion. Some would say we have moved from our moorings. The Eucharist, however, anchors us and pulls us back to centre.

The Irish people had great devotion to the Eucharist, never more so than in Penal Times when we were a people rich spiritually, though poor materially.

Pope John Paul II spoke of the Irish peoples' devotion to the Eucharist at the Phoenix Park in 1979: "For the Irish it was always the Mass that mattered." The Blessed Sacrament, of course, is the Mass held in adoration.

To those who would denounce the place of the Eucharist in our faith and in our lives and say that devotion to the Blessed Sacrament is 'old fashioned,' the simple answer is that it is as fresh and as new today as the Holy Thursday night when it was instituted.

Fr. Columba O'Donnell, OSA, co-ordinator of the Augustinian vocations' team and who was attached to the Augustinian Community in Dungarvan for many years, invites people from every sector of the community — young and old, families and the sick — to support the crusade. St. Augustine said: "There is no labour where one loves, or if there is, the labour itself is loved." — PAT O'LEARY.

Dear Editor,

We in the Ambulance Service of South Tipperary and West Waterford would like to enlist your help in our efforts to raise £70,000 to equip our ambulances with cardiac equipment.

This equipment is being used extensively in the UK, North of Ireland and in the last year in Dublin, Cork and the west of Ireland.

The equipment called Heart Start Automatic Defibrillator begins to analyse the patient's heart signal from the instant the power is switched on. It continuously interprets the heart's rhythms using a sophisticated and field tested computer analysis programme and quickly guides the operator to provide life-saving defibrillation when appropriate. Six of our staff have been

trained in the use of this equipment.

Surveys have shown that 12,500 people die each year in Ireland from heart attack. It is now proved that 50% of these people can be saved.

The first fundraising event, a senior hurling match between Tipperary and Waterford has been arranged for Sunday, February 21 next at 2.30 pm. in the GAA Sportsfield, Clonmel.

THE REPLAY OF THE REPLAY

Champions And Challengers Confident Of Winning Epic Decider

There is little doubt about the fact that the excitement of this third meeting between Dungarvan and Rathgormack has hit the public in a very big way and on the G.A.A. scene, little else has been spoken about since the replay and extra-time, which failed to divide the combatants.

Never before has a county final been the subject of such animated speculation comparable with this football saga, that, one way or another will go down in history and be talked about into the next century.

For the first game and for the replay, Dungarvan going for their third in a row were slight favourites and while this view was not shared by the Rathgormack people, the vast majority of patrons did fancy the champions. Now having seen the 150 minutes of football which failed to divide them, there is general agreement that for this latest meeting, there are no favourites and very little surprise will result from the outcome, regardless of who wins.

Both camps have studied the video of the replay and extra-time period and will now have satisfied them-

selves about the mistakes and misjudgements which may have cost outright victory two weeks ago.

At the same time both camps are experienced enough to realise that a film of one game may have little relevance to what is going to happen in their next meeting and that the 30 players will have to cope with the problems, and opportunities as they present themselves in the course of the game. An analysis of both matches indicate that Rathgormack's problems came early in the hour, while most of the problems for the champions happened towards the finish when things seemed to be going nicely in their favour. Psychologically this scenario can favour the challengers whose confidence may be boosted by their ability to come from behind as proved on both previous occasions. Like the great flat race jockey, Harry Wrag, who was known in racing parlance as the "Head Waiter", very often coming from behind to catch the leaders on the line, Rathgormack have assumed the same tag for having been able to force a dead-heat in these two thrilling and breathtaking contests.

I have no doubt but that Dungarvan will have a plan to counteract this, but whatever this plan is, I'm sure it won't involve a change in their style of football which was good enough to win them two titles which they hold and which has helped them so well along the way since their juvenile days.

The planned celebrations by both clubs were cancelled almost within minutes of the final whistle after the extra time period and both got down to training again very early in the following week. Neither side are reporting injuries and the expectations are that both will field, more or less, as they did for their last meeting.

The thousands of supporters who will travel to the venue on Sunday are very divided in their perception of the outcome and many are inclined to the view that a kick of the ball may decide the destination of this never to be forgotten 1992 county football final. In fact what is indicative of what the public are thinking is the fact that questions are being asked about what is going to happen if the final ends in another draw? Of course if such is the case, extra-time will be played and if the situation is unresolved at this stage, the teams will have to meet again and the saga will go on like the now famous Meath/Dublin serial of two years ago in the Leinster championship.

The teams to do duty will not be named by the respective selectors until mid-week and as I have already written, few changes are expected. Rathgormack who played a total of four substitutes over the 90 minutes of the last meeting are thought to be giving consideration to including three of these, Declan and Tom Whelan and Tom Hasset for places on their first fifteen as all played well when brought on. Declan Whelan scored the vital goal which was the rescuing score for the challengers and I know that some surprise was expressed when he was not included on the original lineout on the last day. Dungarvan brought on Martin Kelly and Tony Hamilton at different stages of the game and both will no doubt be considered for inclusion on Sunday's lineout.

THE RESULT???

The question marks symbolise the problems in mak-

ing a decision before arriving at a prediction about what will happen on this occasion as a case can be made for naming either of the sides.

My view is that if the champions, Dungarvan, manage to get on top in the early stages, that they will not again allow themselves to be caught. Having succumbed twice to the enormous pressure exerted by Rathgormack in the closing stages, they must now have organised their match strategy to cope with such an eventuality.

It was obvious on the last day that both were determined to take early control of the game and neither succeeded here. The first 20 minutes was played at an extraordinarily fast pace and if the same tactics are adopted on Sunday, then the result might favour the fitter of the two.

It is no secret that some followers have expressed the opinion that the champions may have missed the bus. I don't share this view and I believe that, if they play to their very best form and not change their unique style, that they will have learned enough from 150 minutes of football against the same opponents to avoid making the mistakes which cost them outright victory on the two previous occasions.

On the last day Rathgormack conceded 36 frees to Dungarvan and the champions gave away 24. For both many of these were committed by the defences and resulted in giving away scores. This is something that will be taken on board when the team-talks are being delivered.

As I have written, a kick of the ball might decide the destiny of the title. Whatever the result, both clubs can walk tall and feel proud of their contribution to an epic saga that will be remembered in the history books of the future.

A penalty shot midway through the first half, was converted and brought the worried visitors back into the game and fight back from a four points deficit to draw level in the 29th minute.

The second half belonged to Clare as Waterford allowed them to break away for vital scores and even though they did exert great pressure and had two balls saved on the line, Waterford never reached the heights which saw them give Clare the run-around for periods in the first half.

The big difference was the greater speed of the visitors and their ability to use the overlap with great efficiency throughout.

The score certainly did less than justice to Waterford and the Clare mentors admitted this after the game which was witnessed by a big crowd who paid in excess of £1,200 at the gate.

Waterford opened in fine

DENIS CONROY R.I.P.

Denis Conroy, one of Cork's leading G.A.A. personalities who was known far and wide, having played a leading role with the rebel county for well over 60 years, died last week.

Denis was acknowledged as being one of the really great characters of the Association and will be remembered for his vociferous debating qualities at Council and committee meetings.

Throughout his life he held a variety of posts including Cork County Board Chairman, Central Council Representative, Munster Council Delegate and other important positions. He is on record as having said that the highlight of this G.A.A. life was being Cork Chairman when they won the elusive hurling and football All-Irelands two years ago. He was known to be a great friend to Waterford and an outspoken admirer of our hurling standards.

 Hurling Division 1 — 8 teams comprising of the top four teams from section A and B of the current league.

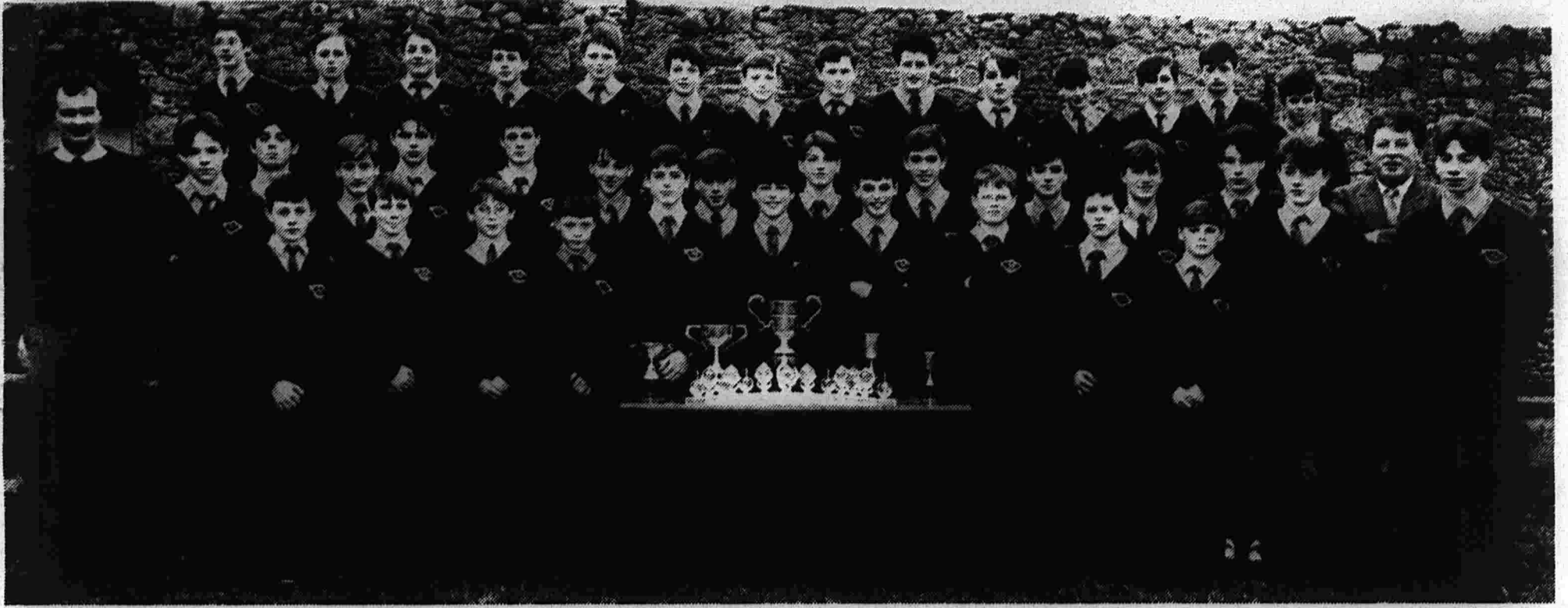
Division 2 — 8 teams; the remaining 2 teams from the present division A and B together with the top four in division 2.

Relegation — Three teams will be relegated from Division 1 and three will be promoted from Division 2. In the lower divisions, one will be relegated and one promoted.

Alternative Proposals — These propose that Division 1 will consist of 14 top teams (on mixed ability). It will be played in two sections of 7 teams each. Division 2 — Same. Division 3 — 10 teams, with 2 sections of 5 and played on a regional basis.

Call For Fair Allocation Of Government's Housing Promise

As promised at the January meeting of the Council, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, submitted a most comprehensive report on the housing activities in the county over the past eight years to the February monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last week.

This showed that over the last 5 years only 57 houses were built compared to a total of 258 in the previous 5 years. These figures, the report states, indicated the decline in the Council's house building programme since 1986. At present the total number of approved applicants for housing came to 207 (Dungarvan 26, Lismore 45, Kilmacthomas 47, Tramore 84 and 5 singles.)

The Manager's report went on to state that details of the housing demand in the county and proposals for "new starts" in the current year, should the money be made available, were submitted to the Department of the Environment in January. Cllr. O. Coffey comment-

ing on the report claimed that the building of 57 houses over the past 5 years was nowhere near enough to meet the demands. "I hope," said Cllr. Coffey, "that the Department will treat the submission by the Manager favourably and that they will give us a fair allocation of the 3,500 which they are promising to build this year."

Cllr. Nora Flynn also called on the Department to draw up a new purchase

scheme for local authority houses as there had not been one since 1988. She expressed the hope that there would need to be no more "demountables" as these had proved a danger of being blown over during recent storms.

In reply to a query from the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn said that they had land available and were ready to start building on 52 houses as soon as the Department came up with the money.

On the proposal of Cllr. Coffey seconded by Cllr. C. O Riain, the Manager's report was unanimously approved.

located in Patrick Street, Waterford while in addition 67% of people were placed in jobs following specific skill training courses.

Approximately 100 Community projects were assisted across the range of programmes and these included activities in the arts, sports and tourism.

In all the report states that in 1992 a total of 1190 employed persons were trained with the assistance of the FÁS Training Support

Scheme.

"The South East Region of FÁS", said Mr. Jim Hewison Manager, External Training, FÁS South East commenting on the report, "is satisfied that at a time of reduced options, particularly for unemployed people, it has been possible to assist large numbers of employed and to re-establish their linkages with the working environment which is a critical factor in dealing with unemployment in the Region".
