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Dungarvan To Honour 3-In-A-Row Football Champions

The members of the Dungarvan Senior Football team who scored a historic 3-in-a-row win when they finally won the 1992 Waterford Senior Football County Championship last Sunday are to be honoured with a Civic Reception to be accorded them and their mentors by Dungarvan Urban Council.

It took a marathon four hours of tough football which, since last December, has gripped the imagination of the entire county before Dungarvan, the holders of the title finally overcame the dour challenge of Rathgormack on Sunday last.

On last Monday night at the February monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, the Chairwoman, Cllr. Nuala

Ryan said that it gave her great pleasure to propose a vote of congratulations to the Dungarvan footballers on their outstanding victory in the County Senior Football Final. She thought that in view of the historic 3-in-a-row win, the Council should honour the members of the team with a special recognition.

Seconding the proposal, Cllr. M. O'Riordan agreed that it was a historic occasion for the Dungarvan Club. The other members present all joined in paying tribute to the champions and it was then unanimously decided to accord the team a Civic Reception to take place later on a suitable date.

The last occasion in which a 3-in-a-row win was registered by a club in the County Senior Football Championship was by Kill 25 years ago. A full report of Dungarvan's historic victory with comments appears inside in our our G.A.A. section.

1993 L.A. HOUSING PROGRAMME

60 Housing Starts Approved For Co. Waterford

The Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith T.D., and the Minister of State with special responsibility for housing and urban renewal, Mr. Emmet Stagg, T.D., notified local housing authorities yesterday (Tuesday) of the number of houses which each authority have approval to commence or acquire under their 1993 housing programme.

The 1993 national programme of 3,500 houses is three and a half times the number approved in 1992.

The Ministers expressed their satisfaction that, despite the difficult budgetary position facing the Government, it has been possible to provide for such a substantial increase in the programme which fully implements the commitment in the Programme for a Partnership Government.

When all the authorised houses are under way, the expanded local authority housing programme alone will, provide over 4,000 extra jobs - 2,000 on site and a similar number of spin-off jobs, thus making a significant contribution to the Government's primary objective of tackling unemployment.

The programme will be complemented by the growing activity throughout the country on the various new measures introduced in the Plan for Social Housing, especially the voluntary housing and shared ownership schemes. The Ministers are continuing their efforts to ensure that all local authorities exploit the full potential

of all the measures in the Plan for Social Housing. The expansion of the local authority programme, to-

gether with these other measures, will add up to a

Rats As Big As Cats In Abbeyside Says Councillors

Under the item "Any Other Business" on the agenda for the February monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held in the Council Chambers at the Town Hall last Monday night, Cllr. Mary Dixon said that people living in three of the housing estates in Abbeyside were very concerned at present because the areas were infested with rats.

Cllr. Dixon who resides in Abbeyside herself said that she had received several complaints that the Kyne Park, Murphy Place and McCarthyville areas had become infested with rats and people living in the areas were very concerned about the position. She said that residents believed that the rats were coming from the old railway bank which adjoins the areas concerned and they believed that if the bushes and undergrowth along the bank could be cut away it would remove the cover there for the rats.

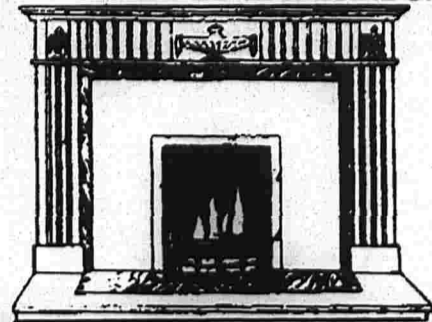

REPUBLICAN COTTAGE

Some time past a group of nuns on a visit to this country from Australia paid a visit to the Nire Valley and were very sad with what they found, a derelict old house. No sign-post to show where this famous landmark was. It was at that house, the home of the Wall family at Knockanaffrin in the picturesque Nire Valley in the foothills of the Comeragh Mountains that a historic meeting took place in 1923. A meeting of the Republican Army Council and members of the Republican Cabinet took place, and some of the people present on that day were Eamon de Valera, Liam Lynch, Bill Quirke, Tom Derrig, Jack O'Mara, Austin Stack, Sean Dowling, Frank Aiken, Tom Barry, Humphrey Murphy, Sean McSweeney and Tom Crofts. Those men had come there from their hiding places to discuss the

continuation or the end of the bitter tragic feud, the Civil War.

The meeting took place on March 23, 1923 and continued in secret session until March 26. During these tense days the men of the local column kept guard and watch all around the Nire Valley.

At the meeting a motion that resistance would not further the cause of independence was lost by five votes to six. Still, it can be said that those talks led to the ending of the war. Another meeting was fixed for Wall's on April 10, '23. The meeting never took place, for on that day, Liam Lynch was fatally wounded on the slopes of the Knockmealdown Mountains. Derrig, Stack and others were captured.

Those sad events gave added historical significance to this Republican Cottage in the "Glen of the Secrets,"

for it was here that these great leaders were together for the last time. The cottage stood unoccupied for many years. A local committee got together to preserve the famous house and the restoration and construction work was carried out on a voluntary basis by a team of willing workers. The cottage was converted into a museum, the furniture and household fittings were exactly as they were at the time of the famous meeting. Hundreds attended on Sunday, October 22, 1978 to see "Knockanaffrin Republican Cottage" officially opened by the then Taoiseach Jack Lynch.

For some years since the cottage was open to the public, but over the last few years the committee in charge seem to have lost interest. Could it be revived? It's a pity to see a place with such history being left fall

away. We appeal to the former committee to try and get things moving and make Tigh-Na-Siochana a place where people can again visit.

LATE MR. MARTIN HALPIN

On Sunday evening, February 14 an aura of sincere and profound grief was cast over the Nire Valley and the surrounding districts with the news of the untimely demise of Mr. Martin Halpin, Knockaun-Brandaun, Ballymacarbry.

Deceased was returning home with his wife Mary after feeding some livestock when he collapsed in his car. In his mid-seventies the late Martin Halpin was a deservedly popular member of a well-known and highly respected Nire Valley family. His exceptional thoroughness, integrity, joviality, kindness, courtesy, sincere and utterly unassuming nature were truly appreciated by all who were indeed privileged to make his acquaintance. A man who was always welcome in whatever company he found himself, Martin was a caring and thoughtful neighbour who never counted the cost when a helping hand was required. He was a friend to all and accordingly his sad demise is deeply and justifiably mourned. An outstanding footballer in the thirties and forties he was a member of the Nire junior football team that took a county championship to the Valley just over fifty years ago.

Many sincere tributes have been paid to him, but perhaps the finest tribute to him was when his remains were removed on Tuesday evening from Kiely's Funeral Home, Dungarvan, draped in the Blue and Gold colours of the club he was so much part of for many years, to St. Helena's Parish Church, Nire Valley, where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Michael Power, P.P., Nire/Touraneena assisted by Rev. Fr. Nicholas McCarthy, P.P. retired English Mission, who was also a member of the Nire team that won county honours in 1942. On Wednesday morning Requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul. The celebrant was Rev. Fr. Michael Power, P.P. After Mass the funeral left for Rathgormack where a loving person was laid to rest in the family plot. To his wife Mary and other relatives we extend our sympathy. Ar dheis De go raibh a anam.

Far too many co-op managers and board members, he said, had turned their backs on small suppliers who were always in a majority and who were the backbone of the co-

op movement in the early days.

Our PLC's, he said, were no longer co-ops and had completely abandoned the principle of "All for one and one for all." Acquisition, native and foreign, was now their main motivation and their commitment to their PLC shareholders would always be greater than their commitment to milk suppliers, large or small. If, he said, the

founders of the co-op movement could see a situation where co-ops, founded to give the maximum numbers of people a decent living on the land, were now actively pushing small farmers out of milk production, they would turn in their graves. The milk quota situation, since its inception in 1983 had been handled in a most unfair and unchristian manner, he added.

Plans for Further Housing Development In Dungarvan

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley has made an order on behalf of Dungarvan Urban Council appointing the National Building Agency Ltd., Dublin, to formulate proposals for housing development at O'Connell Street/Stephen Street to include a mix of Local Authority houses, Shared Ownership dwellings and Old Persons Dwellings.

Cllr. B. Kyne referred to the order at the Council's monthly meeting last Monday night and asked if the Manager could assure the members that the standard of such houses would be the highest that could be found.

Mr. Hurley in reply said that he had appointed the N.B.A. so as to expedite house building in the current year. He was satisfied that work carried out by the Agency around the country in recent years was of the highest order. "They will do the design and lay-out for the scheme and contracts for building will then be sought. I am anxious to

have a fairly active housing programme in the town accelerated and hope to have a builder on site after the August holiday break", said the Manager who added that over the next 2-3 year period he hoped to have 30 houses built on the site with a mix in types as stated.

A letter from the Resident Committee, Lismore Ave., Hillview Drive and Comeragh Crescent stated that as they had established that land at Spring Marquis at the rear of Dunabbey would eventually contain 22 houses they reiterated their request that the current

entrance be closed and a separate entrance opened to the Spring Marquis area.

Mr. Hurley said that the reference to the 22 houses was only a "duirt bean liom" story as there were no immediate proposals for this area. They would come back to the matter in 2/3 years when they had completed the O'Connell St./Stephen St. development. In the circumstances he thought it would be better to wait and see how future housing plans would work out. "Before any decision in this is then made I will consult you", the Manager said.

EXTENSION OF ONE-HOUR PARKING

An application by Mr. John Walsh, Spar Foodstore, 59 O'Connell St., to have the one-hour disc parking extended along the south side of O'Connell Street to service his area was approved on the proposal of Cllr. M. O'Riordan seconded by Cllr. P. Power.

Mr. Walsh stated that business people working in the town centre habitually parked their cars outside his premises now and this interfered with his customers and delivery vans which were forced to double park as a result.

PENSMAN Takes You . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

Jobs For The Boys But Not For The Unemployed

To-day, Wednesday, February 24 is Ash Wednesday but it is also Budget Day and we have been warned in a multitude of ways to expect the worst possible news as to increased taxes. This is the Government's usual scam to soften up the public on what bad news the annual budget is to bring to an already overburdened public.

But while John Citizen is being made ready for hair-shirts and sackcloth and ashes, the members of the new Partnership Government have already more than insulated themselves with fat salary increases in addition to a 36 per cent hike in their travelling and incidental expenses — the latter estimated to cost the taxpayer £2,513,000 this year compared to £1,847,000 last year!

And the generous Minister for Finance, Mr. Bertie Ahern did not forget our huge army of public servants who despite the cash-strapped position of the

country have been given fine fat salary increases also. The position we are in as a result is that the Government is now spending more on the people it employs than on the services they provide to the public. The wage bill for the public service will, as a consequence, soar above the £4 billion mark this year! Why was not a wage freeze introduced here to ease the dire position of the public finances this year?

And what about the Partnership Government's commitment to job creation? Well, they are to spend almost £500,000 a year to pay 13 new "partnership programme managers", most of whom will get salaries of £40,500. In all, the Ministers of the new Government have appointed 135 personal staff at a cost to the taxpayer of £3 million. These do not include the large corps of specialised advisory staff in the Taoiseach's office including 11 to look after his constituency affairs. Among the newly appointed personnel

are family relatives of Ministers — sisters, sons, daughters and others. It is no harm to mention either, that the newly established Office of the Tanaiste is to cost £831,000 in 1993, a charge which the taxpayers will have to bear in order to bolster a rather curious demand made by the Tanaiste for a Department which does not appear to have any real function.

But what of the Government's agenda in regard to the reduction of unemployment? By this we mean the creation of real jobs rather than to park people in assorted training schemes or in unproductive public service employment. With one of the largest public service payrolls in Europe on a percentage of GNP basis, it would certainly appear to be difficult to justify further job creation in this area.

Neither does there seem to be much future in looking to industry to solve the jobless problem so long as the Minister for Finance persists in

taxing employment through excessive PRSI charges and the Revenue Commissioners insist in taking not only their pound of flesh but the very blood that goes with it in the form of high Tax and VAT charges which in so many cases have resulted in cash flow problems which in the past have seen so many promising industries go to the wall.

In the long run the only realistic solution to the unemployment problem might seem to lie in sharing out the work that is available. However current employment law, tax arrangements and labour agreements militate against creative approaches to sharing out available work. If they were eased and matters were arranged so that the unit cost of employers would not rise and so remain competitive, then perhaps job sharing could become a reality.

In the meantime we must face up to the Budget and whatever dire news it contains.

More Power To Local Councillors

The Minister for the Environment, Mr. Michael Smith, T.D., announced last week that he has accepted the recommendations of a Working Group on the powers of elected local councillors. The report was entitled

"Local Authority Reserved Functions".

In the course of his announcement, Minister Smith stated: "I have asked my Department to begin immediately the process of putting the Working Group's recommendations into effect. My decision is in line with the commitment in the Programme for a Partnership Government to a continuing series of measures to reform the local government system. As a first step, I have made an Order, in line with the recommendations, designating additional functions of local authorities to be reserved functions" (these are the functions to be performed directly by the elected local council rather than by the Manager).

The recommendations of the Working Group set up in March 1992, which comprised eight nominees of the local authority members associations (General Council of Co. Councils and Association of Municipal Authorities), the local authority managers' association (City and County Managers Association) and the Department of the Environment include: wider local authority by-law powers with greater autonomy for local authorities to deal with matters of local concern; the making of by-laws to be a reserved function; the implementation of traffic control measures such as speed limits and parking controls to be simplified and the law to be recast accordingly with appropriate reserved func-

tions; the law relating to local authority meetings to be modernised and consolidated in a user friendly format; future legislation affecting existing local authority functions such as roads and housing to include appropriate reserved functions and finally improvements in the operation of the reserved/executive function system, the promotion of a more positive local government image with members to be adequately informed and kept abreast of legal, technological and other developments.

In order to implement these recommendations, the Minister proposes that a Local Government Bill which is in preparation will confer wide by-law making powers and allow for greater local autonomy and modernise and consolidate other aspects of local government law; a Road Traffic Bill which will give greater local control over traffic and parking regulations and local speed limits while a special Ministerial committee has been established to report on the devolution of additional functions to local authorities.

For the information of readers who may not be aware of the position, the reserved/executive framework which applies to all local authority functions comprises two elements: the elected members and the managers; functions which are performable by the elected members are called reserved functions while

those performable by the manager are known as executive functions.

The principal reserved functions which local authorities perform at present include adopting the annual estimates and striking a rate; adopting a local development plan, borrowing money, deciding on local service charges and adopting a scheme of letting priorities.

It now remains to be seen whether the members of our Local Authorities will be satisfied with the new recommendations proposed by Minister Smith or reject them as a mere cosmetic exercise. Councils in recent years have repeatedly requested some say in financial matters but none of the Minister's proposals includes any power over funding services - that appears to still remain a matter for the Minister and his Department despite the fact that at page 18 of the "Programme For A Partnership Government 1993-1997", it specifically states in regard to Local Government Reform: "We will accelerate the progress of Local Government Reform and the devolution of funding from Central Government to Local Authorities so as to give greater scope for local initiative in decision making."

Incidentally we understand that elections for councils at sub-county level have been postponed until next year so that will enable urban councils and towns commissioners to continue in their present role until then.

Springtime Re-Awakens The World

Our gardens have come alive and already the snow-drop, the crocus and the daffodil speak of the rebirth as nature re-awakens from its deep winter sleep. The tries were scored by Donna Cummins and Jeremiah O'Brien and Declan Glavin scored a drop goal and two conversions.

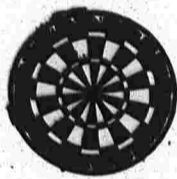

Fish With A Taste Of India



TANDOORI FISH FILLETS

Ingredients:

1-1 1/2 lbs (450-675g) thick white fillets, fresh or frozen, skinned
 1/4 pint (140ml) natural yoghurt
 1-2 tablespoons (15-30ml) prepared tandoori mix
 1 tablespoon (15ml) oil
 1 tablespoon (15ml) lemon juice
 salt

Method:

Mix together the yoghurt, tandoori mix and oil. Divide the fish fillets into four portions and arrange in a shallow dish. Sprinkle with lemon juice, season with salt and coat well with tandoori mixture. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes.



Remove excess tandoori mixture from the fish fillets. Grill for 7-10 minutes (10-15 minutes if frozen) basting with tandoori mixture and turning halfway through cooking, if necessary. Serve with yellow rice and a crisp green salad. Serves 4.

TIP: Choose a pasta or powdered tandoori mix or use a recipe from an Indian cookery book.

TIP: Add a teaspoon of turmeric to the rice as you cook it, to give a pale yellow

Don't Park In My Space

As a disabled driver, one of the things that annoys me more than anything else is the casual use of specially reserved parking places by able-bodied drivers.

I need a car space one and half times standard width to get my wheelchair out of my car. And usually this space is only allowed for or available in the specially reserved space.

Rather than wait maybe five or ten minutes for a vacant parking space some drivers seem to think it is perfectly all right to take the disabled space, saying to themselves that they often see it empty, or that it is unlikely to be needed.

It's certainly true that the disabled spaces are not in constant use — they often are, but not by disabled drivers. They are, however, essential to the disabled driver who may have travelled a considerable distance to visit a shopping centre or store which is accessible.

There are few enough facilities and special arrangements or provisions made for disabled shoppers who have the same needs and requirements as everyone else without us having to deal with additional problems caused by selfish, or careless individuals.

The majority of drivers are extremely helpful and considerate, but it only requires one driver to take up a space, to cause hours of frustration and difficulty for a disabled person. Disabled drivers have no other parking option available to them if the reserved space is taken.

Another common problem is delivery trucks parking across ramps and dished pavements, thus preventing wheelchair users from gaining access to shopping areas.

I also think that managements of shopping centres, car parks etc., who have gone to the trouble of designing special spaces for disabled drivers should ensure that these spaces are not abused.

They should make sure that carpark attendants or security personnel are aware of the special spaces and keep them clear for those who whom they were intended, i.e., disabled drivers, displaying the approved logo. Selfish drivers should be reminded of their selfishness by way of a window sticker or other such reminders.

After all if the shopping centre has gone to the expense of providing facilities, it is in their own interest to make sure that the disabled can use them. As a person with a disability I can say that we are far more likely to take our business to a place where they are suitable facilities, and where we can be sure they will be available to us.

The above article, taken from the Waterford, South Tipperary Branch of the Spina Bifida & Hydrocephalus Association newsletter shows how some

drivers, through a little bit of thoughtlessness, can cause considerable and unnecessary hardship for those amongst us who are not blessed with perfect mobility.

Here in Dungarvan, to the best of my knowledge, there are only two such spaces reserved, yet they are always or nearly always, used by "able bodied" drivers just because the spaces are situated at the top of the car park near an exit and convenient to the Square. Nowadays, with a lot more places vacant, there should be no need for this.

The next time you go to pull into one of these spaces, stop and think — do I really need to park here? Why not use one of the other spaces and leave those few for those who really do need them. While on the subject, I wonder would it be possible to provide a couple of spaces in the Friary Street car park? — John Moore (Secretary), Sunlawn, Affane, Cappoquin.

Options You Have If Laying A Patio

It may be bitterly cold out there now but it won't be long before the sunnier weather is here and you wish you had a patio for plant containers and sunbathing.

But while the choice of site is often self-selecting for reasons of garden size or aspect, materials are a trickier problem. Factors to consider are:

- Expense
- Visual appeal
- Texture — the patio needs to be easy to clean and quickdrying after rainy shells.
- Colour — concrete is boring to look at but bright slabs can detract from plants.

So, what are the options?

CRAZY PAVING — sadly, this is struck with a 'suburban' label not helped by man-made material used in increasing amounts, but well-laid stone pieces can look smart and traditional.

However, natural pieces do need skill when laying to ensure that the final surface is safe and level — patios are inclined to get much use from children and tripping and falling can be painful.

CONCRETE — the budget option and last resort, but dullness can be improved by use of a colour in the mix and concrete is easy to lay for odd-shaped patios. Any dull patio can also



be brightened by plant containers.

PAVING SLABS — Perhaps the most common form. They come in all shapes, sizes and textures. Beware any that are too smooth as they can be dan-

gerous after frost or rain, especially if they have gathered algae.

Some people save money by making their own slabs using concrete, a colour treatment and timber 'moulds.'

STONE — it is expensive, especially York stone, but comes with 'age' and looks at home straight away. But the uneven state of the stone does require expert laying. A possible cost-cutter is to buy direct from a demolition site.

BRICKS — a personal favourite since it is easy to lay and shape into steps, containers and even the base of a seat. They can also be laid in patterns such as herringbone or diagonal. Second-hand bricks can save you money and give instant 'age appeal.'

BLOCKS — these are now increasingly common in our streets as well as gardens. They are hard-wearing with all the versatility of bricks.

GRAVEL — inexpensive but liable to stray onto the lawn and into the mower blades.

COBBLES — inexpensive and versatile, but they do need care in laying properly and can be slippery when wet. — *Arthur Hines.*

Daffodil Day To Aid Cancer Homecare

Daffodil Day this year takes place on Friday, March 19 and the Irish Cancer Society hopes to raise £1 million. A sum of £485,000 has been allocated to the expanding daffodil funded nursing service which brings care and support, free of charge, to cancer patients in their own homes.

The bulk of the money raised on Daffodil Day will go to the daffodil-funded home care service. The balance will be used to fund the Society's night nursing service and cancer helpline, to educate cancer nurses and to provide support to major cancer treatment units in Dublin, Cork and Galway.

A 16-year-old Leaving Cert. student was awarded £500 at Dungarvan District Court in her civil action against her near neighbour whose Alsatian dog bit her on the leg last June.

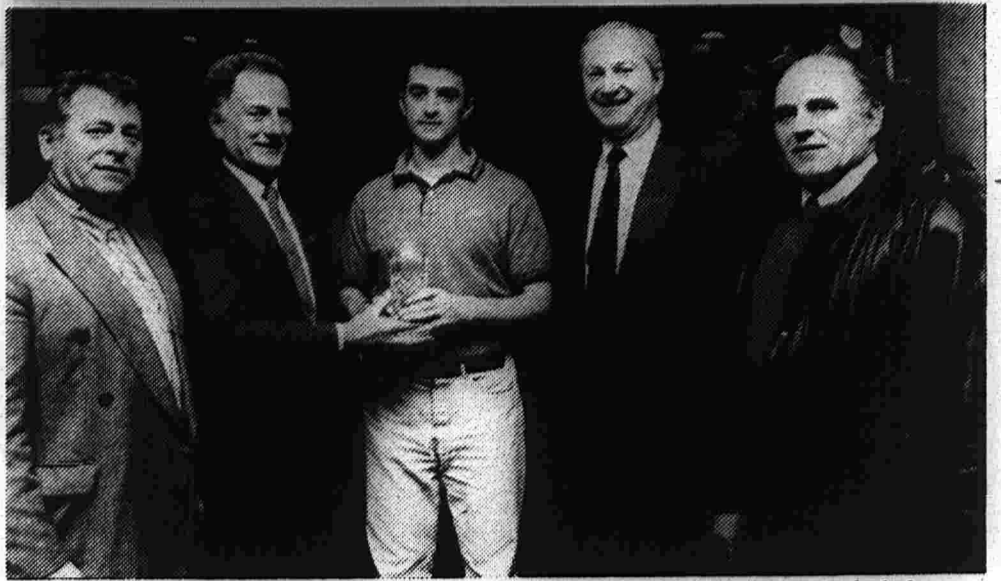

G.A.A. Coaching Scheme

In the world of underage G.A.A. coaching, a new season has commenced. The plans for 1993 are now in place. Both Peter Power in hurling and Pat Curran in football function for 11 months of the year while Paraic Fanning operates for six months in hurling. This year Paraic Fanning replaces Colm Bonnar as trainer/coach to the Waterford Regional College hurling and Gaelic football teams and as full time administrator within the college G.A.A. club. From March to the end of August Paraic will work in the Primary Schools and in the Summer Camps during July and August.

PRIMARY SCHOOLS

All the Primary Schools of the city and county with boys in them are covered in the coaching scheme — hurling and Gaelic football. Pat Curran our football coach, who is embarking on his second year, will coach the basic skills of the game in the 60 schools. Peter Power who is starting his 4th year will operate in 40 schools. Paraic Fanning will have 20 schools — from March to June.

SUMMER CAMPS

Summer camps in hurling and Gaelic football have now become part of the Waterford underage scene over the last few years. Next July and August for the third year special camps will be held in both games — 6 in hurling and 6 in Gaelic football at regional venues around the county. Each Summer Camp will be for the duration of one week — Monday to Friday — five full days. Close to 900 young hurlers and 300 young footballers attended last year. Numbers this coming summer will have to be limited and it will be important to apply early.

Hurling: July 5-9 — Portlaoigh; July 12-16 — Ardmore; July 19-23 — Cappoquin; July 26-30 — Kill; August 16-20 — Abbeyside; August 23-27 — Mount Sion.

Western Board Meeting

Ollie Wilkinson, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Western Board and at which all clubs in the division were represented. When the Chairman announced the decision of County Board in relation to championship structures, Nioclás Mac Craith complained that the Officer Board and our three representatives voted contrary to what the county convention wished to have implemented. He said that convention favoured the playing of the intermediate football championship on a county rather than on a divisional basis. This was defeated on a 23/21 vote and the Western officers were not mandated to vote against the proposition as they did. He said the Eastern Division had previously discussed the matter and voted accordingly. The Chairman stated that no intermediate clubs had approached him or other members of the Western Board requesting them to vote in any particular way and also that this Board did not have an opportunity of discussing the matter before tonight. John Lyons said that the Divisional Board would have been in a position to mandate the delegates if the County Board meeting had not been brought forward to a date earlier than normal for a first meeting. Divisional Boards, he said, were always given time to hold two meetings before the County Board met to consider such matters. Tom Browne, Ballinameela said that he had been told that the officers of the Western Board had taken a collective decision to vote as they did and this was refuted by Brendan Tobin.

OVERAGE PLAYERS

Nioclás Mac Craith said that his club were concerned about overage players being played and said that his club would seek an investigation into the constitution of such teams, if this happened again. The Chairman said that this was a very serious matter and that the Board would not hesitate in having a club investigated if a submission was made at any time.

KNOCKOUT

Eddie O'Grady, Geraldines, proposed that the junior hurling championship be played on a knockout with a losers group, but this was defeated following a proposition by Tom Browne and Stephen Power that the league system continue.

INTERMEDIATE FOOTBALL

It was decided to play this championship in one sec-

tion of seven teams and to have the top four qualify as was the case last year.

SENIOR FOOTBALL REPLAY OF REPLAY

Dungarvan Worthy Winners Of Third Title In A Row

Champions Survive In Hectic Contest After Extra Time

The marathon is over and the Conway Cup is back in Dungarvan after the most exciting football saga in the history of the game in Waterford. It came to a breathtaking finish at Walsh Park, Waterford after another 90 minutes of hectic and exciting football that delighted a huge crowd on Sunday in the city venue.

In the immediate aftermath of the final whistle, Dungarvan supporters went wild with excitement as hundreds of their supporters rushed on to the pitch to cheer the heroes who had done them proud in this never-to-be-forgotten football drama. The general feeling was that it was a great pity that there had to be losers. Rathgormack were magnificent in defeat and warmly congratulated the victors and the challengers must also be long remembered for their fine contribution to the Waterford county football final of 1992.

But no one can take from Dungarvan's deserved win as in the final fifteen minutes of this ninety minute contest they proved themselves to be worthy champions, having lasted the pace better and being able to maintain the pressure right up to the whistle that sounded the finish to the 1992 Lawlor's Hotel sponsored football championship.

EXCITEMENT INTENSE

The game was played in very good conditions with a

light breeze blowing into the city goal and while the standard of the game on Sunday was not as good as the replay two weeks previously, the excitement was no less intense and as the contest progressed very many of the crowd began to wonder if we would be making yet another return visit to Walsh Park. The score at the end of normal time compounded these expectations.

When it was 0-8 to 0-7 at the end of the first half of extra time the odds certainly favoured another draw. Such was the mood of the crowd at that point, that I am sure that no one would have minded if this had happened. To the delight of the big Dungarvan following, it didn't happen and judging by the way in which they celebrated, they obviously treated this as their sweetest victory since that Sunday in 1948 when they won their fourth title in a row on their home ground, Dungarvan.

Rathgormack were obviously and understandably disappointed but were certainly not despondent. They waited on the field while County Chairman, Eamon Murphy presented the trophy to team captain, Martin Sheehan and expressed their resolve to be back for another 'go' when the championship of 1993 gets under way in six or eight weeks time. That is another demonstration of the spirit of Rathgormack.

THE GAME

From the throw-in, Dungarvan playing into the country goal, were first to attack but Fahy cleared for Rathgormack. Another attack by the champions saw Morrie Ferncombe send out the first wide of the match in the second minute. Then, before the game was three minutes old, an ugly explosion of tempers halted the match and a number of names were taken. On resumption both sides had unsuccessful scoring chances and in the 7th minute Rathgormack had their first wide of the game when Finbar Crotty was off target.

Dungarvan continued to attack without making progress and were handling more of the ball than their opponents. Then in the 9th minute, Denis "Hopper" McGrath broke the duck when he sent over for the first score of the game. The 11th minute saw David O'Connor make his first save of the game.

Rathgormack attacked again and Darrell Donnelly saved what seemed a dangerous situation. His clearance came to Ger Power who passed to Brendan Curran who in turn laid it on for Martin Power to register Rathgormack's first score and leave the sides level at 0-1 apiece in the 15th minute. Up to this point the champions had more of the play, but very tight marking by the Rathgormack defence

in which Declan Power and Tom Hassett were supreme, prevented them from scoring. They were still level after Pepe Ferncombe sent wide from a 35m free and remained so until brother Morrie had a good point in the 22nd minute. A minute later, Donal Crotty, fielding a high ball from Finbar Crotty, had the sides level again. In the 26th minute John Ferncombe pointed following a great save by Pat Fahy. Three minutes later Joe Murray pointed a free to put the teams on equal terms for the third time in this half.

Another Rathgormack attack saw Martin Houlihan who was playing great stuff in defence, go down injured and play was held up for some time. Martin's injury was serious enough to warrant hospital treatment and he was replaced by Martin Kelly who was to prove himself a worthy substitute. In the 33rd minute Donal Crotty pointed for Rathgormack to leave the state of play at 0-4 to 0-3 in favour of the challengers at the break.

SECOND HALF

Rathgormack attacked and within a minute were awarded a free from which Martin Power increased their lead to two points. A 4th minute free for Dungarvan saw Pepe Ferncombe on target and the gap was narrowed to a single point. A 37th minute incident saw Rathgormack's Ger Power being sent off, but Rathgormack were undaunted by this and mounted an attack immediately after and full forward Sean Power sent over to stretch their lead to 2 points again. A minute later, following another incident, David Burke was sent off for Dungarvan.

In the 10th minute, Denis McGrath was wide after a great effort and a Morrie Ferncombe free was saved by Fahy a minute later. In the 49th minute, Pepe Ferncombe pointed a free to narrow the gap to a single point. Eddie Burke and Joe Murray each sent wide and Pepe Ferncombe pointed the one that brought the game to extra time again. This period had lasted for 31 mins. and 52 secs. and one could observe the obvious feeling of relief and de-

spair on the faces of the weary players whose sore bones were going to have to endure another 30 minutes of exertion.

A wit sitting close by in the dugout and who didn't seem to give a damn who won the game, gave his support to each team at different stages of the match. Sometimes he was putting his money on Rathgormack and other times on Dungarvan, depending on the progress of the sides on the scoreboard. When John Kelly blew full time at the end of normal time, the bewildered punter remarked "this bloody thing will never end. I think I'll put my money on the County Board. We'll be here for the rest of the year." Humour among pressures and tensions.

EXTRA TIME

Tom Whelan was back in for Rathgormack and Morrie Ferncombe was back for Dungarvan. Pepe Ferncombe had a 4th minute point and the sides were level again two minutes later when Tom Dee pointed (0-7 to 0-7).

Morrie Ferncombe's 7th minute point gave the champions the lead which they were not going to surrender. Rathgormack were enjoying a lot of the play at this stage, but their forwards were overplaying the ball and being well policed by the Dungarvan defence. At the break in this period, the champions led by 0-8 to 0-7 and both sides had it all to play for.

On the resumption, Tom Whelan was inches wide and two minutes later Pepe Ferncombe took a quick free which he passed to Derek Lyons who sent over to register the final score of the 1992 county final and give Dungarvan a two points lead which they defended with their very lives.

In this period, Dungarvan's defence held out the better and with some splendid clearances by Eddie Burke (who was awarded the man-of-the-match) with Bobby Lyons and team captain Martin Sheehan (who must also have come into the reckoning for the award) they managed to stay in front for the final twelve tension-packed minutes.

WALK TALL

As I wrote after the first replay, all the players who played throughout this saga, can well afford to walk tall and feel proud of their contribution to the historic final. David O'Connor did everything that could be expected of a top-class keeper and in front of him, Dermot Dee,

Darrell Donnelly (who retired with a shoulder injury) and Martin Houlihan were rock solid in defence, Niall Considine, Bobby Lyons, Eddie Burke and Martin Sheehan performing under enormous pressure, came through with flying colours. Derek Lyons and David Burke both did everything required of them in handling Rathgormack's highly rated midfield pairing of Donie Crotty and Martin Power. In attack the Ferncombe brothers, Peter, Morrie and John J. with Dermot Callaghan, Denis McGrath and Ger Beresford must be given deserved credit for their contribution to the victory while the parts played by substitutes Martin Kelly and Peter Queally in shaping the result will also be remembered.

If Rathgormack had won, I have no doubt but that goalkeeper Pat Fahy would have been acclaimed their hero because of his many fine saves. Declan Power at full back and Brendan Curry in the centre position of the half back line were brilliant, but hardly better than Denis and Tom Hassett with Dan Crotty also playing prominently in defence. Donie Crotty and Martin Power, with Ger Power, Joe Murray, Tom Dee, Declan Whelan, Sean Power, Finbar Crotty and their substitutes Kevin Power and Kevin O'Hara gave very admirable performances.

Congratulations then to both Dungarvan and Rathgormack for having given us so much delightful entertainment in a series of games that will be talked about for a very very long time.

Phil Cashin R.I.P.

The regretted passing of the late Phil Cashin, St. Augustine's Terrace, Abbeyside, evoked widespread sympathy throughout the entire area over the weekend. We offer our very sincere sympathy to his wife Margaret and the members of his family who were shocked at his unexpected passing.

Throughout his life Philly, as he was popularly known, had been acknowledged as a 'true blue' G.A.A. personality and in his active years he devoted his leisure time to promoting the games in a variety of ways. In his early years he played hurling with Dungarvan and was a member of the 1941 panel which won the club their last senior title in that grade. He played football with Ballycoe and for more than quarter of a century filled many roles on the administrative side of the Abbeyside club with whom his sons Austin, Nicky, Rodgie, Paddy and Eddie, all played their hurling and football. He also trained the club's senior hurlers during the fifties and was a selector for many years.

In recent years Philly was given the honour of being unanimously elected President and his wife Margaret who is a life-long supporter of the club, is one of the Vice-Presidents.

At the removal of his remains on Saturday and again on Sunday for his burial the members of the club including very many of his former colleagues, did the traditional honours.

As a mark of respect to his memory, a minutes silence was observed and the Tricolour was half-masted for the county final last Sunday. Ar dheis De go raibh a anam.

Final Facts And Figures

The total number of stoppages throughout the 90 minutes of this replayed game was 135 as compared with 145 in the previous 90 minutes. By coincidence Dungarvan had a total of 10 wides in the game as they had in the previous replay, and the champions also were awarded a total of 36 frees which was also exactly the same as in the first replay. In the first replay Rathgormack had 24 frees awarded and on this occasion it was 32.

Throughout last year's (1991) championship Dungarvan's total points scored exceeded the 100 mark and this constituted a record in the county. Throughout the present championship their scoring was down somewhat and going into the final in December it seemed impossible that they could reach the century mark for white flags as up to this point their total was 11-78 and they needed 22 points to get there. But having scored (2-5), (3-8) and (0-9) in the three games the magic figure of 100 points was reached. Their overall score for the championship was 16 goals and 100 points. major assault on social housing needs and radically improve the housing prospects of those on local authority housing lists over the next couple of years.

The Ministers emphasised that in 1993, for the first time in many years new local authority housing will be pro-

vided in every local authority area in the country down to urban district council level.

The total number of start ups approved for Co. Waterford in the 1993 programme is 60. This includes 45 for the Co. Council (11 last year) and 15 for Dungarvan Urban Council (4 last year).

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
