Indemnity Against Injury Claims Major Drawback To Children's Playgroun

They were living in an era of accident litigation and the major difficulty in providing a children's playground in the town was in getting indemnity for the Council against accident claims that might possibly arise. This was stated by Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager at the February monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council when proposals to provide a children's playground in the town were once more discussed.

meeting indicated that a number of Urban Councils had provided such playgrounds at costs ranging from £2,000 to £30,000 but that others had removed equipment because of insur-

Correspondence before the ance claims on foot of accidents and the added costs of supervision while others had made no provision at all.

Mr. Ray Moloney, Acting Town Clerk told the members that no money to meet the costs involved in provid-

ing equipment for such a children's playground had been provided by the Coun-

cil in this year's estimates. Cllr. T. Wright who has been pressing for such a facility for some time again stressed the need for the

Council to provide a children's playground in the town. "We do need a playground for the young children and the young mothers of the town and the ideal location for it would be the Causeway Park," he said.

Mr. Hurley again referred to insurance claims that could arise from accidents which could possible happen if such a facility was provided by the Council. "I would be very worried about the enormous costs that could await us down the road from such insurance claims," he said adding that they had already had claims made from placing seats at the Causeway and the provision of a bicycle rack at the Square. "I think it would be better to again defer this matter until we got more information as to costs from our insurers," said the Man-

The members agreed to this suggestion.

Fines Totalling £2,500 For Youghal Hotel On Licensing Law Breaches

A company's managing director has pledged that henceforth the policies and procedures relating to the running of a well-known Co. Cork hotel will change.

"The licensing laws in the hotel will be rigidly adhered to in future", Mr. Dan Dorian told Youghal District Court last Thursday.

He was giving evidence as managing director of Borrack Investments Ltd., owners of the Hilltop Hotel, Youghal, who faced charges of being in breach of the licensing laws on September 26, December 25 and January 2 last.

Judge Michael Pattwell heard that there were five previous convictions for similar offences, and prosecuting Supt. Maurice Murray alleged that these have been the most blatant violations of these laws over the years. Fines totalling £2,500 were

Fines totalling £2,500 were imposed on Borrack Investments Ltd. and the hotel manageress Mary O'Keeffe, whose address was given as c/o the Hilltop Hotel. In addition the hotel licence was endorsed three times. The charge in respect of September 26 alleged that young persons under the age of 18 were permitted to be at a late night disco in the hotel at which there was a drink exemption.

The court heard that when garda officers visited the disco they found people as young as 14 in attendance. In direct evidence, however, a number of them admitted that they had been asked about their age and had stat-

ed that they were over 18.

The hotel's head door-man, Michael Kelleher, said they are very strict about not allowing under 18's into the late night discos. He refused admission, on average, to between 20 and 25 underage people every night.

Dan Dorian said their security staff are under strict orders not to admit under 18's. "We don't want them, we are not in the business of encouraging young people to consume alcoholic drink," he said.

In relation to the offence in the early hours of December 25, Supt. Murray said the hotel had been refused an exemption from 12.01 a.m. to 1.30 a.m., but yet had gone ahead in defiance of the court.

He said that gardai found between 300 and 400 people engaged in a "fully fledged drinking session" at 1 a.m. These people were genuinely there, however, in the belief that an exemption had been granted to the hotel. NEW PROCEDURES

Mr. Dorian then told the court that they have now instigated new policies and procedures that will change the way the hotel has been run todate. They had even closed the hotel for the past month to put these new policies and procedures in place.

He added that the company had spent £300,000 on the hotel in the last two years, and that between 40 and 50 people are employed there

during the summer season.

Outlining details of the offence in the early hours of January 2, Supt. Murray said an off duty garda had gone to a disco there when there was no exemption in force. However, the two bars were operating, and every time gardai came the manageress and other staff rushed in and the bars were immediately closed.

Convicting Borrack Investments in respect of Sept. 26, Judge Pattwell imposed the maximum fine of £100 for permitting under 18's to be on the hotel premises when an exemption was in force. He also endorsed the licence.

The Judge fined the company £600 in respect of Dec. 25, with a second licence endorsement, and the manageress, Ms. Mary O'Keeffe was also fined £600 for aiding and abetting in the commission of the offence.

Similarly the company was fined £600, with a third endorsement, in respect of January 2, with Ms. O'Keeffe also fined £600 for aiding and abetting. Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

Judge Pattwell said he wanted to congratulate Supt. Murray stating that he was delighted to see the gardai in East Cork tackling underage drinking as vigourously as they obviously are.

Council Must Bite The Bullet In Cemetery Crux

Reviewing the much discussed topic of providing a new cemetery for Dungarvan and the crux which has always arisen in finding a suitable central site, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley told members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their February monthly meeting last week that having considered all the options which have come before him, he thought that an extension to the existing cemetery at St. Mary's was the most feasible.

Mr. Hurley said that this cemetery had served the needs of the town for over a century and by taking a strip from the adjoining CBS property it would meet the burial needs for several more years to come. He said that he would get their engineers to look at the position and felt that a strip of about 13 metres in width could be spared and this would still allow room for two playing pitches at the CBS.

Cllr. B. Kyne thought it would be better to appoint a special committee to discuss the matter in private so that a proposal might be agreed without creating a problem. He added that if the Council was to start telling the Board of Management of the CBS that they were going to compulsorily acquire this strip of off a major controversy. He then suggested that the Council Chairwoman with the Town Clerk and Town Engineer meet with representatives of the School Board of Management and Parish Priest to discuss the matter in committee.

Cllr. Tony Wright described the Manager's proposal as a "non-starter" and pointed out that when such a suggestion had been previously put to the CBS Board of Management it was given a definite "No."

"If we were to take this land from the CBS there would be 'mfle murder' in the town as it would be accepted as a cruel decision," said Cllr. Wright who then reiterated his own view that the proper decision to take to solve the problem was a new municipal graveyard where people of all denominations could be buried.

BEST OPTION However the Manager re-

peated that the proposal to extend the existing cemetery seemed to him to be the best option. "Entrenched positions should not be taken up by either side in the matter as there could be room for compromise," he said, adding that Cllr. Kyne's pro-

posal should be recommended.

Cllr. A. Hallahan then asked whether there had been any developments in regard to the proposal to buy a strip of land at the rear of the new Dungarvan GAA Grounds at Clogherane and it was stated that this fell through on the issue of price.

Mr. Hurley stated that the provision of a new burial ground had now become a hardy annual but it was a matter for the Council to bite the bullet when it came to a final decision. "Such a decision may be, do we or not do it by Compulsory Acquisition. This will be for the Council to decide," he said.

Cllr. Kyne closed the discussion by remarking that he felt that the provision of a cemetery should be a matter for the Church authorities and not one in which the Council should be involved. He pointed out that the parish of Abbeyside (in the Urban area) had provided its own cemetery with an extension at Ballinroad and thought the same should apply to Dungarvan.

It was finally agreed that Chairwoman Clir. Nuala Ryan arrange to call a meeting as suggested by Clir. Kyne to discuss the Manager's proposal.

More Reprisals — The Abbeyside Burnings

Burgery Ambush the military rule in the district was enforced in a more vigorous manner. Martial Law was proclaimed throughout Abbeyside and surrounding districts and the CURFEW was enforced vigorously. People were obliged to retire to their homes at an early hour and the streets were patrolled throughout

the night by the military.

On the night of the 12th of April 1921, the tramp of armed men could be heard at intervals passing up and down the streets and this activity continued until the early hours of the morning. Close on midnight verey lights of great brilliancy

were sent off from Dungarvan Castle towards Abbeyside. No one could venture out and it was not until the morning that the people of Abbeyside could discover the reason for all the activity. MINNIES

Gradually it was learned that many of the houses in Abbeyside had been fired and destroyed by the Blackand-Tans. The Strand Hotel' owned by Miss Minnie Fitzgerald was a mass of charred ruins. This premises is now 'Minnies Bar and Lounge' run by the O'Brien family. Miss Fitzgerald stood the ordeal with commendable bravery. Also gutted by fire and completely destroyed was Mr. T. Fa-


Sexton Street. He had shortly before that spent a lot of money on improvements to the premises. The houses alongside were also completely destroyed for the petrol can was used freely to ensure the maximum destruction possible.

TERROR

Tales of horror abounded regarding the night in question. In the case of Mrs. Fahey, whose husband was in prison at the time, arrested on suspicion, she escaped with her infant child over a high back wall because she was in fear of death. It was a night of terrible suffering for the inhabitants of Abbeyside.



More than a million copies of special four-page newspaper presenting the Irish Bishops' pastoral letter "Work Is The Key: Towards an Economy That Needs Everyone" are to be distributed free to Catholics throughout the country's 1,365 parishes, North and South.

This distribution will coincide with homilies on the theme of the Bishops' pastoral in churches on the weekend of March 13-14, in all dioceses except Cork and Ross.

The special newspaper was prepared and published by the Catholic Press and Information Office on behalf of the Bishops' Conference. Its purpose is to make the contents of the pastoral, issued last December, widely

known among Catholics. Cardinal Cahal Daly the President of the Bishops' Conference has stated: "This is the first time a-newspaper format has been used to popularise a pastoral letter. The have sometimes been criti-

WITHOUT ADEQUATE FUNDING LOCAL GOVERNMENT IS RENDERED POWERLESS

Further to our reference last week to Environment Minister Michael Smith's announcement about what he described as more powers to local councillors and to our comments that the Minister's recommendations may be regarded merely as a cosmetics exercise in the absence of any move to devolve funding from Central Government to Local Authorities, we note that the latter aspect of this important matter was referred to during the course of a seminar in Mallow organised last week by the Institute of Public Administration.

Addressing the seminar on the subject of "Openness

and Decision-making in the E.C. Institutions and the Lessons for Local Government in Ireland", Fine Gael Member of the European Parliament John Cushnahan stated that the problem of decision-making in Local Government was, quite simply, that there was no decision making.

Mr. Cushnahan pointed out that power stemmed from one thing and one thing alone and that was the ability to establish financial priorities. With the abolition of domestic rates in 1977 and a reducing block grant from Central Government, Local Government has been rendered powerless. Such a position, he

claimed, was demoralising for those involved in local government and unhealthy for democracy. These are points with which we feel sure the members of all Local Authorities, irrespective of politics, will find themselves in agreement.
The Munster M.E.P. stated

that the main lesson to be learned from the European experience was the belief in the need for building the New Europe on the concept of a Europe of the Regions. He said that the longpromised reform of Local Government in Ireland must eventually take place and part of that reform should be the creation of Regional Authorities as an upper tier of local government. While ap-plication for E.C. funds could continue to be made on the basis of treating Ireland as one region, Regional Authorities (to coincide with cies, of which the province of Munster is one) should be established to decide how best these funds should be spent in their area.

Without doubt such a move should meet with widespread approval among members of local councils, especially County Councils as it would direct monies from the Structural and Cohesion Funds to them rather than to the Government Departments in Dublin. This would, in turn, breathe new life into local government and also into rural Ireland as it would bring the power of decision making closer to the people for whom E.C. monies were actually in-

I.C.A. TO REMAIN WOMEN ONLY UNTIL.....

Some weeks ago we made reference to the efforts of some feminist organisations to break the rules of "men only" clubs and associations up and down the country. While there are many situa-tions where public clubs such as tennis and golf clubs are concerned in which all members, both male and female are entitled to be treated on an equal basis, there are situations in which men or women may choose to remain exclusively alone among themselves. In such cases we believe, as we have already stated, that preferences as expressed in such cases should be accepted without any attempts by either sex to cross the dividing line or even to make an issue of the position. The existence of such exclusive associations and organisations should not be taken by one sex as discrimination against the other.

In our original reference to this latest move by the ladies to invade the precincts of some all male clubs, we referred to the fact that in many cases the ladies

displayed their preference to remain on their own in such clubs and associations as the I.C.A. and to which preference men took no objection and so as the soliloquy in the musical "My Fair Lady" asks "Why Can't A Woman Be Like A Man?"

Now the Irish Country Women's Association have declared their stand in the controversial issue. In a recent Press release on the subject, the National President of the I.C.A., Monica Prendiville who hails from Castleisland in Co. Kerry had defended the right of the I.C.A. to have an exclusive women-only membership. However, the I.C.A. President qualified the Association's stand by adding that they must remain a women-only organistion until women enjoyed equal opportunities to men.

In a direct quote, the Kerry woman who now leads the I.C.A. then went on to state: "Then and only then will the I.C.A. have fulfilled its role and then and only then can the I.C.A. have male membership - when the day of equal opportunity arrives, women will be enabled to make an even greater contribution to the national well-being than they have done in the past".

To our way of thinking the I.C.A. has been doing a magnificent job for Mná na h-Eireann despite what President Prendiville refers to as the restrictions in the I.C.A. Rules and Constitution that prohibit men from becoming members of the Association and her claim that she feels sure that 99% of the I.C.A. members would support the removal of these restrictions "when the day that women have the same rights and opportunities as men arrives'

One wonders whether the removal of such "restrictions" would benefit the I.C.A. to any great extent or whether the Association would be best served by continuing to operate under its existing Constitution. At the risk of being branded a male chauvinist prig we would think the I.C.A. would be best served by continuing in the latter course.

WAS THIS ACT EVER REPEALED

We were given a newspaper cutting from a recent issue of the "Leitrim Observer". The piece is an extract from their "A look back at the past" Column and relates to happenings in the year 1929.

As can be seen it deals with the legal implications of playing hurling on Sunday's. We wonder that maybe in 1993 the act has still not been repealed.

Hurling Illegal On Sundays — Act Never Repealed - That hurling on Sundays, according to an Irish Act of Parliament, was illegal, was a point raised by Mr. E. Carroll, solr., at Lismore Court, when ten young men from Lismore were charged under 38 and 39, Sunday Observance Act, Section 7 with intimidation.

The Justice agreed with Mr. Carroll, that on Sunday Nov. 17, a hurling contest was arranged for Ahaunboy, Glencairn, between two unaffiliated teams for a set of gold medals, presented by the Glencairn Committee. At the time it was to take place a number of men rushed to the gates, and this caused the alleged intimidation. Previous to this date there was a dispute with the Committee.

Mr. Carroll raised a preliminary objection that the summons did not disclose any offence. Continuing, Mr. Carroll said that these men named by the Superintendent were themselves

performing an illegal act hurling on Sundays. This Act of Parliament was never repealed by the Irish Parlia-ment, and it was still on the Statute Book.

Mr. Conner, acting D.J. -And did your clients act as citizens?" (laughter). Mr. Carroll quoted from

O'Connor's Revised 1915, and contended that this act was never repealed.

Supt. Mooney said that they had hurling Sunday after Sunday at Croke Park and elsewhere and he never heard of Mr. Carroll's point.

So Cheap, This Coq Au Plonk



This dish sounds expensive to make, but it needn't be if you use a cheap red wine from the supermarket.


Ingredients:

- 3 lb (1.4kg) chicken 2 oz (50g) butter 2 oz (50g) diced bacon 6 oz (175g) button mush-
- (175g) shallots or smáll onions
- 11/2 tbs brandy 1 clove garlic, crushed 1 level ths flour
- 3/4 pt (400ml) red wine 1 bay leaf
- 2 sprigs parsley 1 sprig thyme or rosemary

black pepper

Method:

Cut chicken in half lengthwise and divide each half into three, taking the leg as



one portion and dividing the breast with the wing into two equal portions. Melt butter in a flameproof casserole, cook bacon until lightly browned. Remove with draining spoon. Brown chicken on both sides and remove. Wash and dry mushrooms, skin shallots. Cook until lightly browned. Pour off about half the fat, add brandy,

set alight and let flame burn out. Stir in garlic and flour. Cook until flour begins to brown, then stir in wine. Return chicken and bacon to pan, add water to nearly cover chicken. Add herbs and season well, cover the pan with a well-fitting lid or foil and simmer for 45 minutes. Remove herbs, check seasoning.

It is time your dahlia tubers were woken up

PRING is on the way and it's time for dahlia tubers to be woken up to give you some şuperb garden displays later in the year. Lay them on a bed of peat in trays in a greenhouse or warm well-lit sill and mist

Once they start shooting, you can also take cuttings to increase your stock, but don't be too greedy - you can only afford to take about half the number of shoots on each tuber.

These are the steps:

- wait until shoots are about three inches long
- make the cut about a quarter of an inch from the tuber so that you don't prevent new shoots forming
- remove the lower pair of leaves
- dip cut end into rooting compound
- using three-inch containers, po as many as four cuttings around the edge of each
- water thoroughly
- place pots in a propagator or cover individually with clear plastic domes or polythene bags and protect from direct sunlight
- rooted cuttings can later be individually potted and hardened off before planting in late May/early

Meanwhile, don't neglect the established tubers. These should continue to be misted until they can be planted out

Dahlias are particularly popular due to the variety of colours, shapes and sizes though the family divides broadly in two: border dahlias which are leggy and reach three or more feet in height; and bedding types,

which never go above two feet. The former need secure staking to pre-

vent wind and weather damage but can make showy backdrops for beds and borders.

All types like open, sunny and welldrained locations away from trees but their shallow roots mean deep digging is

Plant tubers in six-inch deep holes with the crown about three inches from the surface.

Once planted, never let them dry out and start to pinch back once the fifth pairs of leaves has been reached so the plants stay bushy and bloom well. Always deadhead old blooms promptly to keep new ones coming through. Hand weeding is also recommended since hoeing can easily damage the shallow roots. Britain has really taken the dahlia to its hearts. Along with the rose and fuchsia it is one of our most popular garden plants, and the U.K.'s National Dahlia Society is the largest in

It is perhaps surprising then to learn that the plant is actually a native of Mexico and was brought to Europe by Spanish Conquistadors in the 17th century.



REFEREEING

It has been said on so many occasions that the time to talk about refereeing is at a time when there is no refereeing to be done.

Within a month or six weeks there is going to be a lot of refereeing to be done here in Portlairge and at the moment a movement to recruit new men to the whistle is underway. It is a rather modest effort and will, at the most, produce two or three newcomers to officiate in the lower age grades. The truth is that if the number presently in operation was doubled, there would still be a shortage if the several hundred games are to be handled without problems of having referees race from one venue to another to keep up with the demand. Many more referees will have to be recruited and trained and clubs will, if necessary, be compelled to co-operate in finding mem bers who are suitable and willing for the job. When the recruiting is done, the matter of training young and not so young referees will have to be taken very seriously and even if it means that the start of the championships must be held back until they are ready, then so be it.

Everyone is agreed that the standard of refereeing here in this county could be a lot better. We have some men who do a top-class job in most games, but are also capable of having the poor match for which they are criticised. Sometimes the criticism is severe. They seldom are praised when they do a very good job. These are facts of life in the refereeing business and those who take on the job must live with it.

We also have a number of referees who require a lot of training in the enforcement of discipline on the field of play. It is no secret that players very often go unpe-nalised for indiscretions and dirty play. Also some referees are slow to report a player for the type of foul committed and from the

records it would seem that more than ninety per cent of players who are ordered off are reported for rough play which carries a minimum suspension of two weeks, thus allowing the offender back in time for his next game and making the whole thing meaningless. Of course all our referees are in this category and play it by the rule.

As I have written, now is the time to start recruiting and training before the push comes in five or six weeks time. We are in a very bad state for referees and the problem won't go away all on its own.

SYMPATHY

Our very sincere sympathy is extended to Mrs. Margaret O'Donnell, Kilrush and family on the recent unexpected death of Liam O'Donnell, which occurred on Saturday morning last.

Liam was very active and very prominent in iocal G.A.A. affairs and in one way or another was involved all his life either as a player or administrator.

Dungarvan, of course, was his first love, but during his playing career he played with the famous Faugh's, Dublin Club. He also played at minor level with Abbeyside and with the Brickeys. In the late fifties he played senior football with Dungarvan. In more recent times Liam was Chairman of the juvenile section of the club and was a regular contributor to Bord na nOg and was involved in planning the upcoming development work on the grounds.

At his funeral and burial, Dungarvan club did the traditional honours and there was a large presence of G.A.A. people from all the surrounding clubs as well.
