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Co. Council & Medical Assistance At GAA Games In County

At the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday, Cllr. Oliver Coffey proposed a motion asking the Council to call on the Waterford County Board GAA to have medical assistance available for county finals and other important games in the county.

Cllr. Coffey said he put down the motion after receiving several complaints following the recent senior football County final during which several players had sustained serious injuries

and there were no medical facilities available to deal with them.

Seconding the motion Cllr. C. O Riain said that he had no doubt but that the GAA County Board would

take the matter up as a member of the Council was a member of the County Board Coisde Gnotha.

Cllr. Tony Wright however thought that this was a matter for the GAA Board to deal with themselves. "I

think it would be very dangerous for us to get involved in the affairs of any other organisation in this matter," he said adding that it would be difficult to know what could be called

Probe Into Young Dungarvan Girl's Unexpected Death

Widespread regret had been occasioned by the death of 18 years old Theresa Tobin which occurred unexpectedly at her home at 19 Lismore Ave., Dungarvan on Sunday last, March 7. She had attended the 21st birthday celebration of a friend with others on Friday night but was taken mysteriously ill on Saturday and died to the great grief of her parents, sisters and other family relatives and many friends on Sunday.

A post mortem examination to ascertain the cause of her death was carried out by Dr. R. Tait, Pathologist at Waterford Regional Hospital on Monday morning but the findings were not available up to the time of going to press.

Fire Guts Well-Known Cappagh Pub

Three units of the County Fire Service, two from Dungarvan and one from Cappoquin were called out to a fire which gutted the well-known licensed premises, "The Welcome Inn" owned by the Hanley family at Cappagh in the early hours of last Sunday morning.

The alarm was raised at 3.05 a.m. and the units from the Dungarvan Fire Station immediately sped to the scene where they were joined by the unit from Cappoquin. However despite the best efforts of

the firemen under the direction of Fire Officer John Shanahan, Dungarvan, the flames took hold and the interior and upstairs portions of the premises were completely gutted.

At first fears were entertained for the lives of anyone who might be in the premises at the time but it transpired that the owners were absent and the premises were unoccupied when the outbreak took place. It took the fire fighters 10 hours before the fire was finally damped out.

Co. Council Plans For 45 New Housing Starts

In accordance with the notification from the Department of the Environment received on February 23 authorising a programme of 45 houses for 1993 by way of building new houses and/or acquisition of existing private houses for County Waterford, the County Secretary submitted a report to the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday listing the the proposed starts. The report informed the members that the preparatory work on the various schemes had commenced with a view to having all the working drawings for the schemes submitted to the Department by June 30 next.

MEMBERS' VIEWS

Cllr. O. Coffey said that the County Manager and

the Housing Officer were to be congratulated on the manner in which the 45 starts were to be spread through the county. The fact that 45 new houses were to be started in the coming year was not only good news for the county but for the building construction workers.

Cllr. C. O Riain endorsed these remarks but then expressed disappointment that not a single house had been included in the list for the Ballymacarbry-Rathgormack-Knockboy and Kilbrien area. He thought that it would have been better if members had an input into the preparation of the list as in this way they might have seen the inclusion of houses for their own areas.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager pointed out that the

matter was a reserved function of the Council and the report which he had prepared had been approved by the members at the last meeting. As a result of that he drew the list as it was now before them. "I tried to be as fair as possible in allocating houses across the county but in the cases of any areas omitted these will be given priority in the next allocation if we get one," he said.

Cllr. W. McDonnell also expressed disappointment that no houses had been allocated to Tallow but agreed that the town had done fairly well in recent years. He was glad, however, to see that a total of 12 had been allocated to Lismore and Cappoquin as this would greatly ease the housing situation there.

Cllr. G. O'Halloran said that the Clashmore-Kinsalebeg-Grange area had been overlooked even though no houses had been built in these areas for years. When he raised this fact with the Housing Officer he had been informed that the reason was that no land for sites was available. In the circumstances he asked that the Co. Manager might take steps to set up a landbank in the area for the purpose of house-building.

In reply to a query by Cllr. T. Cunningham as to the number of 2 and 3-bedroom houses on the list, the Manager said that the categories had been allocated to meet the demands. They had to do the best they could with the 45 houses allocated for the 207 approved applicants which were on the Council's housing list. "At the present output it will take about 4 years to meet the housing demands of the county," said the Manager.

On the proposal of Cllr. O. Coffey seconded by Cllr. O Riain the housing list as submitted was approved.

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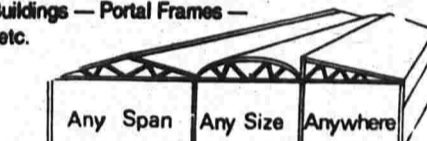
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KILROSSANTY NOTES

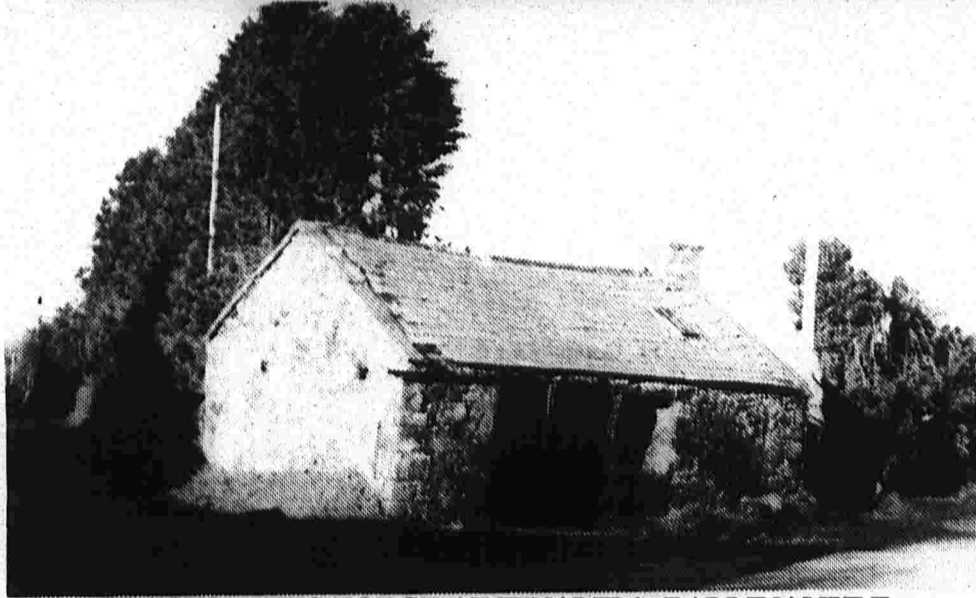

All-Ireland Title For Ballyduff Musician



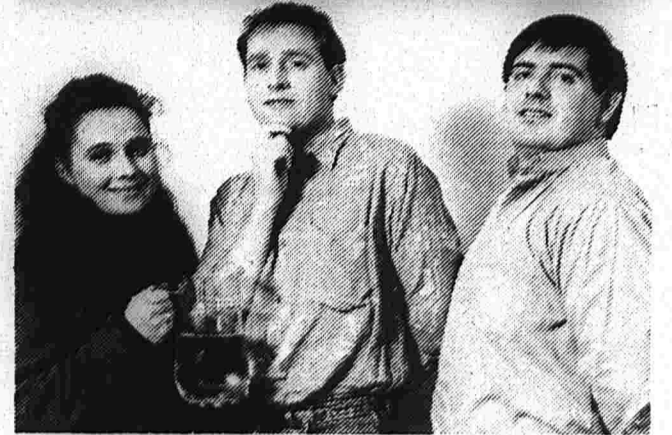

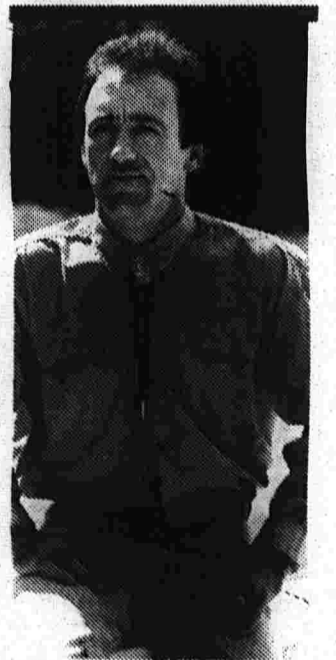

OUR LOCALITY

The Treaty - Neighbour Against Neighbour

After the signing of the Treaty between Ireland and England in December 1921 there was strong opposition to it on the Republican side led by De Valera. Michael Collins and the Free State Party supported the Treaty and this division was reflected in a division among the people of Abbeyside where neighbour was pitted against neighbour and in some instances brother against brother.

Mr. De Valera visited the locality on the eve of St. Patrick's Day, 1922 and was followed by Michael Collins on the 26th March, 1922. Michael Collins was one of the signatories to the Treaty and he held the position of Prime Minister of the Provisional Government.

Soon after this time the elections for the Irish parliament were due to take place but the intensity of the division among the people made it absolutely certain that no elections could be held.

CIVIL WAR

Early in the month of July 1922 civil war broke out. Great destruction of property followed. Public buildings, railways, railway bridges and road bridges were blown up. Abbeyside was partly isolated as the railway line on the Waterford side was torn up. The

railway service from Cork side continued all right and this ensured that the newspaper The Cork Examiner was delivered daily - the only paper to be delivered to the area. The cities of Cork and Waterford were completely in the hands of the Republicans. The Republi-

cans also controlled the Abbeyside area and at the end of July a large number of reinforcements arrived. The people of the locality prepared themselves for the forthcoming battle when the Free State Troops would arrive. *Reference Keohans History of Dungarvan.*

1993 IS EUROPEAN YEAR OF OLDER PEOPLE

Last month in Brussels saw the launch of 1993 as the European Year of Older People and Solidarity Between Generations, which is designed to highlight the place of older people in society and to raise awareness of issues of ageing.

By the year 2020 it is estimated that 20% of people in the European Community will be over 65 years as opposed to 14% at present.

BRAM STOKER'S DRACULA

Bram Stoker's Dracula which is having its second week run at the Ormond Cinema in Dungarvan this week has, despite the liberty which the film has taken with the story, originally written by the Dublin born novelist, proved an enormous box office success wherever it has been screened.

This success had, in great measure, been due to the tremendous advances in movie special effects in recent years. The film claims

to re-capture the spirit of the original Gothic novel but while it manages in many respects to recreate the atmosphere of the book, the screenplay also takes the enormous liberty of attempting to graft on the tale of the blood-sucking vampire on to the real-life historical figure of Vlad the Impaler - who, we believe is still regarded as a national hero in Romania for repelling the invading Ottomans.

We refer to this latest pro-

duction of the famous Transylvanian horror story brought to the screen on this occasion by ace filmmaker Francis Ford Coppola, who will probably be best known as director of the Godfather trilogy, because of a little bit of information passed to us by former Irish teacher of the County Vocational Education Committee, Donal O Cionmhaolaidh.

Now living in Abbeyside, Donal is a native of Gaeltacht na Rinne, and in a note written 'as Gaedhealg', he draws our attention to the fact that the late Seán O Cuirrín translated Bram Stoker's Dracula into Irish. Seán O Cuirrín, himself a native of Baile na nGall, An

Rinn, was a renowned author of a number of books written in Irish. He lived in Cappoquin for years with his wife Treasa Ni h-Ailpin, a most accomplished violinist, and was a member of the teaching staff of Mount Melleray College which at that time was one of the leading second-level education institutions not only in the county but in the province.

Donal assures us the O Cuirrín's translation was such a brilliant effort that on reading it (which unfortunately we have, so far, not had the privilege) one would be forgiven for believing that it was an original in the Irish language and not just a translation.

WORDSWORTH'S DAFFODILS

Following our inclusion in this column a couple of weeks ago of Robert Herrick's beautiful little poem "To Daffodils", we have received several requests for the more popular and more widely known tribute to these glorious Spring blooms composed by William Wordsworth. The requests sent us chasing through Pargrave's "Golden Treasury" which has been one of the most cherished relics that has survived through the years and remained with us since our secondary school years at Dungarvan C.B.S.

We found the words at page 291 of the Fourth Book and here then is Wordsworth's poem "The Daffodils" for the many readers who have asked for it.

I wandered lonely as a cloud
That floats on high o'er vales and hills,
When all at once I saw a crowd,
A host of golden Daffodils,
Beside the lake, beneath the trees,
Fluttering and dancing in the breeze

Continuous as the stars that shine
And twinkle on the milky way,
They stretch'd in never-ending line
Along the margin of a bay;
Ten thousand saw I at a glance
Tossing their heads in sprightly dance.

The waves beside them danced, but they
Out-did the sparkling waves in glee:-
A Poet could not but be gay
In such jocund company!
I gazed - and gazed - but little thought
What wealth the show to me had brought;

For oft, when on my couch I lie
In vacant or in pensive mood,
They flash upon that inward eye
Which is the bliss of solitude;
And then my heart with pleasure fills
And dances with the daffodils.

Guaranteed Irish Ltd. commissioned a national marketing survey at the end of 1992 and the findings reveal a clear evidence that the efforts put in by Guaranteed Irish and the manufacturers supporting the movement are beginning to have a real effect on sales and consumer brand choice.

However, while the numbers indicating a preference for goods bearing the Guaranteed Irish symbol are on the increase there is

still a considerable way to go before anyone can afford to get complacent. But the evidence of the survey clearly indicates that the changing times are beginning to make Irish adults far more aware of the importance of buying and supporting their own manufactured products.

In giving this support they will also not only be ensuring that existing jobs are kept secure but they could well be helping to create much wanted new jobs. In this week prior to the feast of the National Apostle we have the ideal time to make the resolve to support Irish manufactured goods for the future in greater measure and thus help to provide jobs at home for Irish workers.

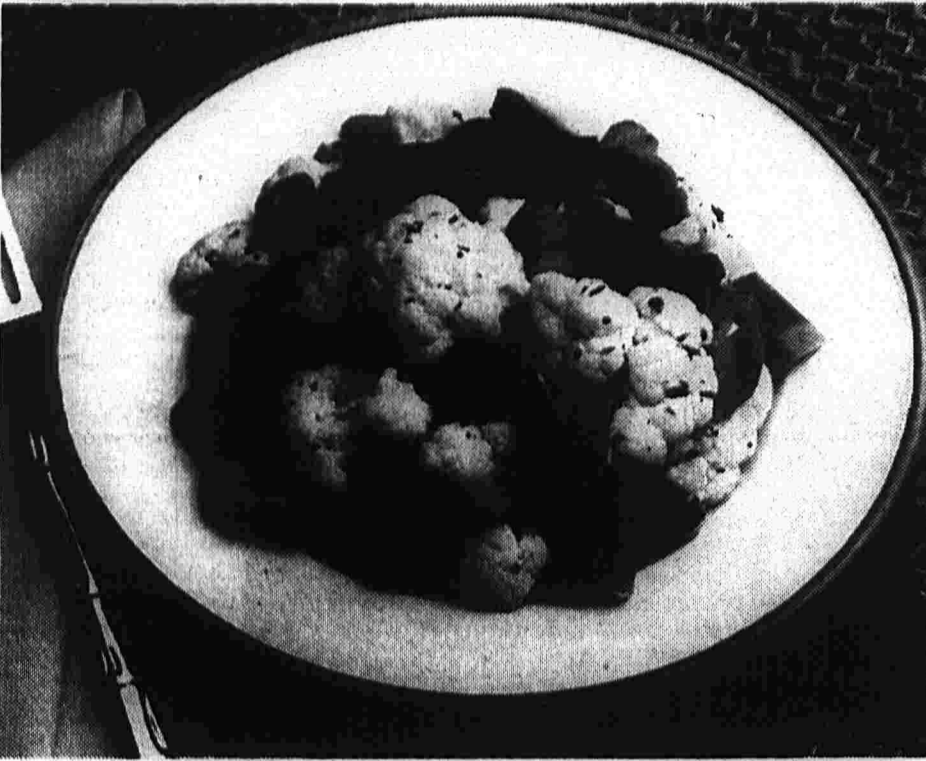

Super Salad Start



VEGETABLE ANTIPASTO

We usually think of antipasto as a before-the-meal platter with salami, cheese, peppers and onions. Here is a marinated vegetable antipasto that makes a perfect beginning salad.

Ingredients:

1/3 cup corn oil
1/3 cup white vinegar
1/4 cup water
2 tps sugar
1 clove garlic, minced
1 tsp dried basil
1/2 tsp dried oregano

1/3 cup crushed dried red pepper
4 cups cauliflowerets
1 1/2 cups carrots, thinly sliced

1 sweet red pepper, cut in thin stripes and seeded
1 green pepper, cut in squares and seeded
8 green or black olives, cut in half.

Method:

In a large saucepan, stir together the first eight ingredients. Bring to the boil, then add cauliflowerets

and carrots. Cook until tender-crisp, about 4 minutes, stirring frequently. Stir in remaining ingredients and cook for 2 minutes. Remove from heat and let cool. Pour into glass refrigerator bowl or 1-quart jar. Cover tightly and chill in refrigerator at least 24 hours. Stir or shake occasionally.

Combined preparation and cooking time: 30 minutes.

Serves 6-8.

Are you 'switched-on' when it comes to bulbs?

NOTHING heralds spring better than bulbs pushing their coloured heads up through the soil.

Apart from lifting spirits they can also be an inspiration to plant more bulbs, tubers and rhizomes during the summer months, whether it be for beds, baskets or displays indoors.

The colours and varieties now available are worth seeking out but favourites are gloxinia, amaryllis/hippeastrum, arum lilies and tuberous begonias.

Gardeners who have tried growing the begonias either love or hate them, depending on their success. When these begonias thrive, they are very rewarding, since the blooms are incredibly showy, but they are fussy plants.

Start tubers this month or next by pressing into trays of peat — it can be difficult to tell, but the depression on the surface needs to face upwards.

They should be kept warm, moist and out of direct sunlight, to await the sprouting of at least four leaves, before transfer to a five-inch pot.

You then have the option of displaying as a spectacular houseplant — which needs regular misting — or planting out when all danger of frost is gone. They make excellent centrepieces for hanging baskets.

The key to a good display is to pinch out the small female or seeded blooms so that the large males can reach their full size. Tubers can be expensive so don't discard



them at the end of the season. Simply bring plants in and allow to die off before drying tubers and re-planting next spring.

Gloxinias also make excellent pot plants. Allow one tuber per five-inch pot and you should have a good display

for July onwards, providing you keep them in the same moist, warm and slightly shaded conditions preferred by begonias.

RESILIENT
Amaryllis are more resilient and will be familiar as the trumpet-shaped flower on a stalk that results from those bulb, pot and compost kits sold in High Street stores.

They can be planted indoors any time from December to spring, but at least a third of the bulb must be left exposed and they also like warmth and moisture.

Give them that and they should produce long-lasting blooms in 6 weeks. After blooms fade, water and feed so the bulb can rejuvenate itself.

When foliage yellows, lay the pot on its side in a cool place and cut the leaves away when shrivelled. The bulb can then be stored ready for next season.

Arum lilies need larger pots, well-drained compost and, like hippeastrum, a third of the bulb should be left proud.

They also need ample water and feeding once started, but modest warmth. If you want flowers next year, move pots outside after blooming so that the rhizomes can recover. — *Arthur Hines*

Finance Minister Urged To Rescind Punishing VAT Increase On Newspaper

Finance Minister Bertie Ahern was urged in the Dail last Wednesday to realise his mistake and rescind the punishing VAT increase on Irish newspapers from 10% to 12 1/2%.

Deputy Michael Finucane (FG) warned the increase would seriously imperil jobs in the industry and called on every TD to highlight the issue and seek removal of such a damaging

rise. "At a time when the Irish print industry was experiencing severe difficulties — including the most unfair competition from UK newspapers not subject to VAT in Britain — this increase is an entirely retrograde step," he said.

British newspapers selling here had an extremely unfair advantage and it was up to the Government to en-

sure an equal playing pitch for all.

The Minister would have an opportunity in the Finance Bill to rectify his mistake, said Mr. Finucane.

Earlier, PD leader Des O'Malley, speaking on the removal of RTE's advertising cap, said a "very privileged run" should not be given any one section of the media to the detriment of the others.

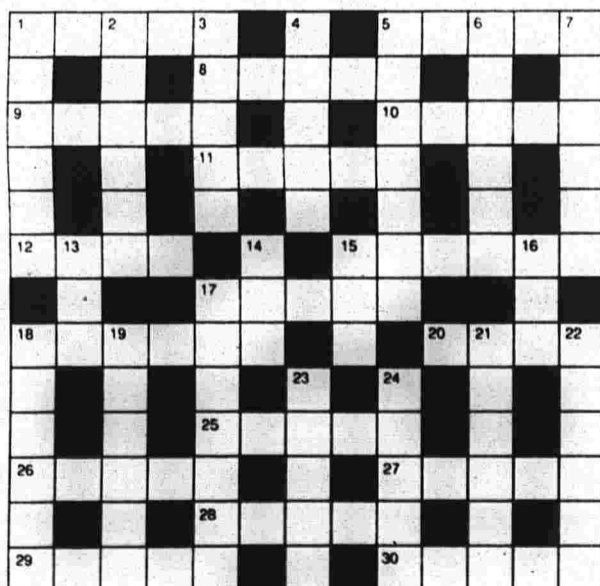

Glaucoma Week Results Show High Incidence In South East Region

The results of eye pressure tests conducted during National Glaucoma Awareness Week last July reveal how important it can be to bring health initiatives out into the community. The results of the week have now been released by the Irish Fight for Sight Campaign, who organised it in conjunction with the Society of Optometrists, Ireland. Nationwide, 24% of the persons tested had eye pressures equal to or greater than 22 millimetres of Mercury; in the area covered by the South Eastern Health Board the figure was 32%. Such persons may have a tendency towards glaucoma and were advised to visit their optician or doctor for further testing or investigation.

Glaucoma is an eye disorder which can cause blindness if it is not treated. It is caused by pressure building up inside the eyeball which may damage the optic nerve. It is not a contagious disease — it cannot be 'caught' from someone else — but it can run in families and close blood relatives of a sufferer may be at risk.

"The figures that we obtained for people who may be susceptible to glaucoma — 24% nationwide and 32% in the area of the South Eastern Health Board — are both phenomenally high," said Brian Harris, Chief Executive of Irish Fight for Sight. "The Campaign's medical advisers tell us that in Ireland glaucoma affects from 2% to 5% of the population, depending on the particular age group. Clearly, there is an explanation for the figures that we ob-

tained, but this explanation is not that there is a much higher incidence of glaucoma than anyone believed."

National Glaucoma Awareness Week was so successful that the Irish Fight for Sight Campaign will be repeating the event in the summer of 1993. The information unit will tour different areas to those visited in 1992.

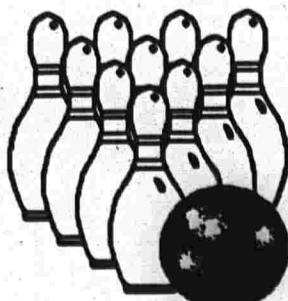

The chances of upsetting the form book look pretty bleak for Waterford, but having seen them go close to creating a few surprises throughout the series, supporters will look forward to seeing them give another wholehearted display against top-class opposition.

Down with their All-Stars and provincial players included on the line-out will go all out to win and remain in contention for a place in the knock-out stages of the league. They are a county who never take others for granted so our poor rating as a football county, won't win any sympathy against this determined side. With the Dungarvan and Rathgormack players now available it

will be interesting to see if any of the football county finalists will be brought on to the actual team. Against Roscommon two weeks ago, Waterford played very well and had a goal disallowed to deny them a point victory. The team which did duty on the day, could not be considered the regular team, but the selectors will find it hard to drop these men now. Tom Walsh is now reported to be fully recovered from his injury, but may not be fit enough to take his regular full-back position, not having been in training for some weeks. CONGRESS 1993

The election of a new President who will take over from Peter Quinn at Congress 1994, will be held on Saturday, April 3, at the Burlington Hotel, Dublin. The field is now reduced to three candidates, Michael Maher, Tipperary, former Provincial Chairman, Jack Boothman, former Leinster Council Chairman and Joe MacDonagh of Galway. The expectations are that the contest will resolve itself into a battle between Jack Boothman and Michael Maher.

The Congress is to be a two-day affair only on this occasion and will end with the Congress Banquet on Saturday night.

There are a total of 33 motions on the agenda and with nothing of a very controversial nature listed, these should be disposed of in a matter of hours.

GATE RECEIPTS

Income from gate receipts for 1992 mounted to a record £3,074,703. Most of this related to the two All-Ireland finals. The senior and minor hurling finals had a gate of £791,790 and the football finals took £804,447.

The football semi-final figures are also interesting. The Clare v. Dublin semi-final at Croke park on August 213 netted £451,172. The other semi-final between Donegal and Mayo took a gate of £383,967.

The gate receipts involving Waterford in under-21 hurling were as follows: Waterford v. Antrim (22/8/92) £6,356; Waterford v. Offaly (13/9/92) £71,551 (draw); Waterford v. Offaly (27/9/92) £82,271 (replay).

Refereeing Duty

Abbeyside/Ballinacourtyman, Pat Moore was on duty on Sunday at Dr. Cullen Park, where he handled the Laois versus Carlow National Hurling League match which ended in a win for Laois.

The difference in attendance figures for the hurling and football All-Irelands was a mere 13; Hurling final (in which Waterford played Galway in minor) 64,534; the football figure was 64,547.

ANTRIM MOTION

If a motion listed in their name is successful, all coaches, team managers and trainers will have to be recruited from within the county involved and they must be affiliated as members.

The same county are seeking to have a provincial and All-Ireland minor club championship introduced, similar to that in operation at senior level at the present.

KERRY MOTION

This motion, if successful, will bring about a major change on the fixtures calendar; they seek to have the hurling All-Ireland played on the second last Sunday in August and the football final played on the first Sunday in September. This would put the successful counties under pressure, but

would give more breathing time to teams involved in the early rounds of the leagues.

MATCH SUSPENSION

Proposals that suspensions for a number of matches as well as weeks/months have been before Congress in the recent past and were given a fair amount of support. Two

counties, Lancashire and Mayo are back with similar motions, which would seem to have a small chance of success. Concern abounds throughout the Association about the present discipline rules which are rendered completely meaningless when a player with no further games coming up, is suspended.

Disappointing Result At Croke Park

Had Waterford succeeded in snatching a last second draw in this rather one-sided league game at Headquarters on Sunday, it would have been a great travesty of justice against Dublin and had we got a winning score with time running out, it could only be described as daylight robbery. We did not deserve to beat this Dublin team who set about winning in a most business-like way from the moment the ball was thrown in at cold and windy Croke Park where our few hundred supporters got little to cheer about.

The Waterford team showed seven changes and many switches from the side who drew with Cork in Dungarvan in November. The upcoming Fitzgibbon Cup games at Waterford on next week-end, were given as the main reason why a number were not available and whether it was a Colleges decision to embargo the players or a gesture by the county selectors to release them, we do not know. I believe it was a factor in shaping this result which now leaves us with a lot to worry about coming up to the Clare game at Cappoquin on Sunday week.

In an exchange of opinion between supporters in the immediate aftermath of the

game, it came across to me that many of our people sensed an air of overconfidence in the team from the start and this was compounded by our inability to cope with the situation when it was discovered that Dublin had been seriously underestimated. Dublin were hammered by Cork in a challenge on the previous Sunday and the publicity accorded this 'trial' may have given some people down here the silly notion that the Dubs. would be easily disposed of by table-toppers Waterford. By halftime when the sides were level, it looked a reasonably safe bet that Dublin, who were clearly the better team throughout the first half, would pile on the scores when aided by the strong breeze in the second half. This is just what happened.

ed a free in the 3rd minute. Dublin followed with three wides in succession and were getting and playing much more of the ball than were Waterford. In the 7th. and 8th. minutes Waterford sent wide from frees. In the 9th. minute Crowley sent side from a very scorable position and in the 10th. minute Crowley hit a free that was reached and saved by the goalkeeper. A great rub by Paul Prendergast in the 11th. minute saw Waterford open their account and draw level at 0-1 each. It looked ominous enough for us at this stage as the home side looked faster and sharper and their backs were keeping our forwards closed down. In the 12th. minute a great Pat Walsh run ended with him shooting for the Dublin goal, but their alert keeper, Hession saved. Ger Fitzpatrick sent wide and there followed another Dublin save. The clearance from this was poor and after some play around the '21', John Meaney got his hurley to a moving ball and sent to the Dublin net. This gave us some hope, but within two minutes Dublin had replied with points by O'Grady and Shane Dalton to leave the score 1-1 to 0-3 in the 15th. minute.

Noel Crowley was fouled and John Meaney pointed. Between the 17th. and 20th. minutes, Dublin were awarded four frees and two of these were pointed by Angus O'Grady. The same player sent Dublin in front with a 23rd. minute point and from the puck-out Billy O'Sullivan sent wide. Jimmy Beresford brought the teams level when he pointed a free and Brian Greene missed a chance of putting Waterford in front when he sent wide in the 26th minute. Shane Dalton pointed for Dublin and a Davy Foran run laid it on for Crowley who made it level pegging again. We edged into a slight lead when Jimmy Beresford pointed a 29th minute free, but on the call of time, O'Grady had the equaliser for the Dubs. Halftime Waterford 1-5 Dublin 0-8.

DOUBLED SCORES

On the turn-over, Waterford had to wait until the 22nd. minute before raising a whit flag and by that stage Dublin had added a further eight points to double their halftime score. In the 28th. minute of this half the score stood at 0-17 to 1-6, and this state of affairs bore relatively to their respective performances. Dublin were that much a better team on the day.

Sean Daly's 29th. minute shot looked destined for the net, but sailed over the bar to reduce Dublin's lead to seven points. Then coming up to the 60th. minute a Waterford free was shot home by Noel Dalton who had come on as a sub. and a minute later, Brian Greene blasted a shot past the Dublin keeper to leave just a point between the sides. Some seconds after the delay puck-out the final whistle sounded.

As I have written, the result was a big disappointment to the hundreds of supporters who travelled up as well as to those who stayed at home in the expectation that Waterford would score a decisive win.

Special County Board Meeting

Eamon Ó Murchú, Chairman, presided at last week's special meeting of the County Board, which was called to deal with the referee's report of the intermediate football county final between Affane and Portlaw in November last at the Kill venue. The report of the game was referred to the County Disciplinary Committee at a meeting on December 12 and their recommendations were submitted to the February meeting of the Board when the matter was further deferred because one of the parties named in the report had initiated legal proceedings.

The Board had since been advised that such cases should proceed regardless of

a threat of legal proceedings.

At this meeting it was proposed that the recommendations of the Disciplinary Committee be accepted, but that the suspensions of two months on Kieran Laffin and Ger O'Brien, both Portlaw, be dated from December 12 as both players had answered an invitation to be present to be heard in their own defence. Another member from the same club who is not a player was suspended for 12 months.

Portlaw Club argued that as the wrong procedures were applied, the matter was not properly before the Disciplinary Committee. No other business was transacted at this meeting.

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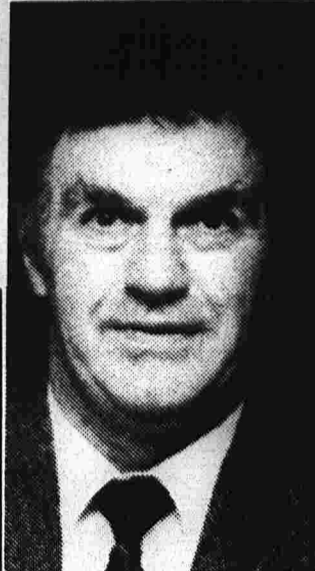
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Moving Funeral Tributes To Outstanding Dungarvan Garda

an important game when youngsters playing in underage games could just as easily sustain serious injury. "I think it is ludicrous for this Council to be dealing with a motion like this as it deals with a matter to be handled by the GAA," he said.

Cllr. P. Coffey agreed that there was an absence of medical support at the county football final and on such occasions he said that such facilities should certainly be provided.

Cllr. P. Kenneally then referred to the danger to spectators who attended the county final and declared that "the Waterford field should be closed as it is a danger to the public in its present state."

Cllr. J. Carey said that he had personal experience of the situation as his son sustained a very serious knockout playing in the field at an earlier game. "He was given up for dead but there was nothing about it then and all the song and dance has been raised since the football final."

Cllr. Carey said that it's about time the GAA got their act together where this was concerned. "As matters stand it's an absolute disgrace," he said.

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who is Chairman of the Western GAA Board and member of the County Board Coiste Gnotha accepted that there was need for a medical back-up which was not now available at games but he thought the matter was one for the GAA Board to discuss and deal with themselves. He felt sure they would do this.

In regard to the remarks of Cllr. Kenneally, Cllr. Wilkinson said that generally the GAA were quite good and their crowd control system was the best in the world.

He added that the while the criticism voiced was valid he said it would be taken on board when the matter came before the next County Board meeting.

On this undertaking by Cllr. Wilkinson, Cllr. Coffey said he would withdraw his motion and this was agreed.
