Missing Man Found After Search In Glendalligan Wood

Declan Flynn (78) of Bohadoon, Dungarvan who went missing after he went for a walk after lunch last Sunday was found alive and none the worse for his ordeal on Monday night shortly after 8 p.m.

Declan who had been staying with a friend at Killineen, The Pike about 5 miles outside Dungarvan decided to go for a walk at about 1.30 p.m. on Sunday and when he failed to return the alarm was raised. Gardai were notified and a search got under way in which members of the Civil Defence and a number of local people took part.

Deise Horses Make Their Mark In Cheltenham '93

A rousing welcome home for the Deise trained horses which scored such remarkable victories at last week's Cheltenham Festival was staged in Dungarvan last Friday evening. Because of the nature of the occasion, the Dungarvan Harriers Point-to-Point Committee had to finalise the arrangements hurriedly to honour what Point-to-Point President Don Carroll very correctly described as "one of the greatest sporting feats in Waterford history" in referring to the three great victories.

It was, without doubt one mighty week for Waterford with the Pat Flynn trained Montelado shattering the course record on the opening day in winning the Supreme Novices Hurdle followed by the great win by the Harry De Bromhead Fissure Seal but it was really on Thursday that the excitement struck Dungarvan following the shock 20/1 win of Shuil Ar Aghaidh in the Stayers Hurdle.

There was jubilation and tremendous scenes among the great Irish following in Cheltenham as the wonderful seven-year-old, trained by one of Dungarvan's favourite sons, Paddy Kiely, a member of one of the great racing families in Co. Waterford and carrying the colours of his wife Marie, came home with 21/2 lengths to spare.

The excitement extended to Dungarvan on Friday evening as to the sound of

Capacity Of Dungarvan Town Dump Is Being Quickly Exhausted

considered by members at the March monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, Mr. Denis McCarthy, Senior Executive Engineer in charge of Environmental matters with Waterford Co. Council stated that the capacity of the town's waste disposal site at Ballinamuck was quickly being exhaust-

The report added that efforts to locate an alternative site were ongoing, but to date had not been successful.

Mr. McCarthy's report went on to state that negoti-

In the course of a report ations between Waterford Co. Council and Waterford Corporation were currently taking place with a view to developing a joint waste disposal facility serving both authorities. "In the interim and because of the limited capacity remaining in Balli-namuck it is necessary to make maximum use of the space available. It is therefore proposed to recommence disposal on an area where disposal has already taken place to the right of the old railway line furthest from the entrance and it is intended to raise the level of

that area to facilitate this," the report stated.

Cllr. M. O'Riordan pointed out that this area was the nearest adjoining the river Colligan and he asked whether there would be a new risk of pollution to the river from the dump. That," he said "would be his biggest worry to the proposed changes at Ballinamuck."

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White said that he would get a further report on the point raised by Cllr. O'Riordan for the next Council meet-

Dungarvan's St. Patrick's Day Parade, over which a veil of uncertainty hung virtually up until the eleventh hour, was held in perfect weather conditions on Wednesday last. And to say that it was a fitting tribute to our National Apostle would be a complete understatement.

It was a superb presentation and a credit to the organisers, Dungarvan Pipe Band, who battled against insurmountable financial odds over a period of months to ensure the parade's continuation.

Dungarvan, was without doubt, the winner again as thousands flocked into the town to grab vantage points along the route and in the Square where the reviewing stand was situated.

Need For New Graveyard In Dungarvan

— But Who Should Provide It?

The provision of a new graveyard for Dungarvan which has come up for discussion at meetings of Dungarvan Urban Council on a regular basis since it was first raised in 1985 but still remains undecided, was yet again up for discussion at the Council's March monthly meeting last week.

At the previous meeting a suggestion from the County Manager that the existing cemetery at St. Mary's be extended by taking in a 13 metre wide strip from the adjoining CBS playing area was floated and a request to discuss the proposal with the School Board of Man-agement and the Parish authorities was sent out.

However at last week's meeting a letter was received from Mr. James J. Ryan, Secretary of the CBS Board of Management stating that the Board's refusal to such a suggestion last year remained unaltered and hence it was the unanimous

decision of the BOM that no useful purpose would be served by sending representatives to a meeting to dis-

cuss the proposal further.
Cllr. B. Kyne said that he had made the proposal for such a meeting merely to open public debate on the matter. The graveyard issue was going round and round but they were getting nowhere with it. He said that Cllr. Wright had referred to it on the occasion of the civic reception accorded Dungarvan GAA Club and thought this had been a most inappropriate occasion on which such a subject should be raised.

Cllr. R. Walsh agreed that the raising of the matter on such an occasion was in very bad taste. "Indeed," said Cllr. Walsh, "it was very bad manners to have done so then and I want to say that I never mentioned that the CBS strip should be acquired compulsorily as is now being put about nor did anyone ever ask me about the provision of a grave-yard."

Cllr. Kyne said that as far as he knew there had been no demand from the Parish Priest for the provision of a graveyard and he asked was there any official record of any such demand.

Mr. B. White, Town Clerk

— As far as I'm aware no.

Cllr. Kyne then said that the Council had now seemingly exhausted all the options which had come up and he now posed the ques-tion where is the demand for a new graveyard coming from. "Abbeyside and Ballinroad have done their own thing about a new graveyard," said Cllr. Kyne, "and so have several other parishes and I now believe that we should consider at our next meeting whether we are to do this at the request of the Parish Priest and if so under whose control would it be?"

Cllr. Kyne added that the CBS had now repeated that any of their land was not for sale and he would not, in any circumstances, support a move to acquire it by compulsory acquisition.
NO APOLOGY

At this point Cllr. Wright struck back at his colleagues and said he would take no criticism from either Cllr. Kyne or Cllr. Walsh for raising this matter on the occaion of the civic reception. That had been a public function and he was perfectly entitled to raise the matter there. "I make no apology for what I said then and don't want either Cllr. Kyne or Cllr. Walsh to write my scripts for me," he said.

Cllr. P. Power then said that he also had resented that Cllr. Wright had raised the matter on that particular occasion. "No one has come to me ever to ask me about

a graveyard" he added. Clir. Nuala Ryan, Chairwoman said that she was

disappointed when she saw this letter from the CBS as she would have liked a meeting with the School BOM and the Priests of the Parish to discuss the matter.

Cllr. Mary Dixon said that she had no doubt but that a new graveyard was needed for the town.

Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that

since this matter had first come before them they had discussed a number of options but no one had volunteered to sell land which would be suitable for a graveyard within the urban area.

Cllr. Wright said that what was needed was a non-de-nominational municipal graveyard where people of all religions and beliefs

could be buried.

Cllr. Austin Hallahan said that there had been a lot of talk and bickering about this graveyard but the point they should decide was 'whose obligation is it to provide it — the Council or the Parish authorities'?

Mr. B. White, Town Clerk pointed out that the Statute governing the matter stated that the Local Authority "may" provide such a facili-ty. It did not say "shall" which would place the duty

of doing so on them.
Finally it was agreed that the Chairwoman and Town Clerk should seek a meeting with the Parish Priest in order to clarify the situation.





ENVIRONMENT MINISTER ANNOUNCES £340 MILLION ALLOCATION FOR ROAD GRANTS

Mr. Michael Smith, Minister for the Environment last week announced details of the 1993 grants to Local Authorities for public roads and for works coming under the local Improvements Scheme. The grants total £340 million - by far the highest ever provision for the roads element of our national transport infrastructure and an increase of 26% on last year's provision of £270 million.

Minister Smith stated that the allocations are intended to maintain progress on current projects and to cater for additional starts so that Ireland gets the maximum benefit from the E.C. Structural and Cohesion Funds. In anticipation of benefits

from the Cohesion Fund, the grant provision has been boosted to a record level by allowing for additional expenditure of £40 million in 1993 on national primary routes included in the Trans European Road Network.

"I anticipate that the overall increase of almost £75 million in grants for the improvement of national roads - over 40% up on the 1992 provision - will ensure an additional 1400 road construction jobs in 1993, as well as a significant level of indirect job creation", Mr. Smith said.

The Minister pointed out that the level of investment now being undertaken would improve access and communications generally

within the country which in turn would benefit tourism and make Ireland a more attractive location for new industry.

Overall the Cohesion Fund will impact on the road improvement programme in a number of ways and will directly finance a number of major schemes and will permit a major acceleration of the programme of pavement improvement to previously realigned sections of road. This will include work on the N25 Leamybrien/Pike and Grange/Piltown in Co. Waterford. The grant allocations for major schemes on national roads includes an extension of the work at the Sweep also on the

As far as Waterford County Council is concerned the 1993 Road Grant allocated totals £8,760,000 while the grant allocated to Dungarvan Urban Council is £56,000. In addition an allocation of £40,000 under

the Local Improvements Scheme has also been made to the County Council for

the coming year.
All in all the Minister's news of these road allocations for 1993 will, we feel sure, be received throughout the county with a great deal of satisfaction as they will help to make up to some degree the shortfall experienced in recent years which has resulted in a major deterioration of much of the road network in the county.

COST OF STATE CARS EXCEEDS £2 **MILLION MARK**

In reply to a Dail query which she gave before she left for Australia earlier this month and the Dail yet again went into recess, but just for only one week on this occasion, Justice Minister Marie Geoghegan Quinn stated that the cost of State cars and the drivers who drive them exceeds £2 million.

The President, all members of the Government, the Ceann Comhairle, the Attorney General, the Government Chief Whip, all of the former Taoisigh are all entitled to cars paid for by the State. We were nearly going to add 'Old Uncle Tom Cobbley an' all'.

Minister Quinn stated that individual prices were negotiated for the cars and they were purchased at the

current list price. She told Fine Gael Deputy Theresa Ahearn that because of security reasons she could not give details of cars allocated to specific individuals but the fleet included Mercedes,

Ford, BMW, Saab, Alfa Romeo, Volvo and Opel. In case readers are not already aware these are all top of the range vehicles, but sure our Ministers in this very well off country are entitled to have only the best.

Mrs. Geoghegan Quinn went on to say that £374,000 was spent on the State cars last year. The annual cost of providing drivers who are members of the Garda Siochana was £1.8 million including overtime and allowances.

The Minister pointed out that after tax deduction, the net cost to the Exchequer was considerably less. This, we suppose must be some consolation but then what about the cars and the drivers used by all the Min-isters of State. While these are not provided directly by the State there is an "allowance" made in each case towards the cost of these. Without doubt another rather considerable

This means that 160 families have been given life and now hope for the future. They are now looking for introductions to other groups and other parts of the country so that they might equal that achievement during the current

The Chairman of Bóthar, MEP T. J. Maher said that the organisation was completely committed to helping very poor small farmers by donating one in-calf heifer per family. "Taking action at this stage, giving a donation when people can then go on to help themselves is crucial", he explained. "Famines and crises do not happen overnight and Bothar is committed to

helping people strengthen their infrastructure and plan to prevent crisis situations occurring. We would be very grateful for any financial support that is possible so that we can ensure the next shipment of in-calf dairy heifers will be with their new families in Uganda during the summer", Mr. Maher

Other members of the Board of Bothar include Archbishop Dermot Clifford of Cashel and Emly who wisely comments, give a man a fish and you feed him for a day; teach him to fish and he will feed himself for life! and Bishop Edward Darling of Limerick and Killaloe who states that "every time a person donates a cow to be sent to Uganda, or even makes a financial contribution a new hope and a real means of livelihood is afforded to a whole family".


